

ALLOUEZ – Upon the arrival of European settlers, the greater Green Bay area was home to multiple indigenous tribes speaking three major language stocks — Algonquian, Iroquois (Oneida) and Sioux (Winnebago).

Father Claude-Jean Allouez, an ordained Catholic priest, traveled to New France (now Quebec), where he studied the Iroquoian language with the Wyandot tribe and Algonquian with the Anishinaabe to enable him to begin missionary work along the St. Lawrence River region and Lake Superior area.

He continued the work of growing Christianity from Ashland on the shores of Lake Superior to Oconto near the waters of Green Bay and Lake Michigan.

Allouez's arrival in the Green Bay area is chronicled in his writings, published in Father Allouez's Journey into Wisconsin, 1669-1970.

"The village of Ousaki is the first where I began to give instruction. As soon as we were provided with a cabin there, I assembled all the elders, to whom, after relating the news of the peace with the Iroquois, I expatiated on the purpose of my journey, which was naught else than their instruction. I explained to them the principal articles of our belief, which they heard with approval, appearing to me very well disposed toward Christianity," he stated.

"On the 17th of February, I repaired to the village of the Potawatomi (thought to be the east shore of Green Bay), which is eight

Local organization in need of mentors

GREEN BAY – Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northeast Wisconsin (BBBSNEW) is experiencing a shortage of mentors who can provide an opportunity for communication, bonding and support to local youths.

Since opening in Brown County in 1977, the organization has served the area by providing a "donor- and volunteer-supported mentoring network [where] Big Brothers Big Sisters makes meaningful, monitored matches between adult volunteers (Bigs) and children (Littles)."

"The biggest need we have is for mentors right now... Our recruitment post-pandemic has been struggling. We're still getting people but it's not nearly the same, and now we're getting more kids than ever post-COVID... Now some of our kiddos are on a waitlist for mentors from six months to a year, and we have about 100 kiddos on the list," said Keren Marsh, program specialist for BBBSNEW.

"The mentors we have come from all walks of life — business owners, educators, retired folks — it's just about being a caring adult, so

GREEN BAY - Sting Cancer hosted its annual Wear Yellow Day on May 5, where individuals wear yellow to support others affected by cancer.

Nick Nesvacil, a brain cancer survivor, is the founder of the Sting Cancer organiza-

He was a college football player and a dean's list student when he was diagnosed, and his fight against cancer was further complicated by a stroke during surgery and meningitis.

Nesvacil said that "by leveraging the strength of his family, friends and even members of his favorite hometown team - the Green Bay Packers - Nick pushed through his cancer journey with a renewed appreciation for life and a determination to help others on their journey."

Nesvacil shared how the organization got its start.

'[Sting Cancer is] a student-driven cancer awareness group that we started at Preble High School. Their mascot is the hornet, and that's why we call it Sting Cancer, and it exploded after that. Other schools were coming to us and asking if they could start this

organization at their schools as well, and right now, we have 34 groups and soon to have 35," stated Nesvacil.

This was the 19th annual Wear Yellow Day, which is always held on the first Friday of May.

The group held a press conference on May 4 with Green Bay Mayor Eric Genrich and Brown County Executive Troy Streckenbach to make the proclamation, inviting cancer survivors to be honored and presented with "One Tough Nut" packages that Nicolet Bank sponsored.

Sting Cancer has done a variety of fundraisers such as dinner galas, speaking events, selling clothing and much more in order to promote their organization throughout the year.


Nesvacil reflected on why it is important for people to come together in this way.

GREEN BAY - Jessica Simonson has found a way to keep her mother close.

Simonson's mother. Bonnie Holman, owned a restaurant and was known to be "very welcoming."

Her favorite saying was "you come in as a stranger, you leave as a friend."

When Bonnie got sick with a disease that started in March 2012, it took a toll on her way of life and took away her presence in the community.

When Bonnie passed away in 2013, Simonson found a way to keep her close and retain her presence in the community -Bonnie's Blankets.

"The non-profit has been formed in memory of my mom after she lost her battle of multiple myeloma," Simonson explained.

"Her desire was to make fleece blankets for other people sharing her journey. Since she didn't get to, we are carrying her wish forward.

"We meet once a month to make the fleece blankets. A group of family and friends (and anyone that wishes to join us) are welcome to be blanket warriors. We work together cutting and typing and getting about 35-45 blankets done in about five hours.

"Our primary focus is Froedtert Hospital Bone Marrow Transplant unit, but we share blankets with

Simonson said that the group works from donations, but also donates time at Green Bay Packer games to raise funds, with all proceeds going toward the fleece blankets.

there's no special education

or requirement needed. Basically what we look for is everyday people who care and want to be a friend and caring person to kids in the community. We have amazing kiddos, and people volunteer here because they want to and they care.

"I believe that there is a misconception that the kids in our programs are troubled or are in the juvenile system, when in reality they come from supportive families that help set up a mentor match... kids come to us if they struggle with friendships, have confidence issues or have no siblings or may have a busy family life. We work with all sorts of kids with all sorts of different needs.'

BBBSNEW provides two programs that people can work with -community- and site-based programs — with the community-based program being the most in need of mentors.

As a mentor, a person is expected to meet with their matched child at least twice a month, with a year-long commitment to the program, while the site-based programs require a commitment that runs the school year.

"People can get concerned about time commitments, but it's only about four hours a month, or more if you're willing to give more," said Marsh.

Marsh emphasized that anybody and everybody can be a volunteer, which has its benefits.

"We have more boys than girls on the waitlist, so we always have a need for male mentors," she said. "For our younger, college-age Bigs they have an opportunity for resume-building, and having [BBBS] on your resume looks great. You also have these opportunities to work with someone not from your generation, who's younger than

your world view. You also just have a chance to take a break and have fun.

"[Mentors and their kids] can go out and about and do things in the community like going to the park, go get ice cream, go to the movies... . I think as adults we forget how to play and do things like going to the park for fun, and [BBBSNEW] is the perfect opportunity to get back to that while also making a major difference for a local kid," said Marsh.

She also added, "It's not meant to be a financial bur-

There are also other volunteer opportunities available to those who are unable to make a commitment of being a menpeople don't feel like they can commit, we have events where we need volunteers," said Marsh.

"You can donate supplies to us from our Wal-Mart and Amazon wish lists. You can make monetary donations through our website, but word of mouth is the best thing that, I think, people could do when helping our organization," Marsh added.

"I can truly feel the impact we have on the community bit-by-bit, and you really notice changes in the kiddos we work with as they grow up. Ultimately, community support means a lot."

Teen police academy to be held this June

GREEN BAY - The Green Bay Police Department and the Brown County Sheriff's Office will offer their 23rd annual Multi-Jurisdictional Teen Police Academy this June.

The program provides as an introduction to the criminal justice profession, where participants learn about specialty units such as dive team, K-9 and special weapons and tactics (SWAT).

They also hear from law enforcement officers and recruiting staff, and meet the forensics team.

They can also test their skills with techniques such as lifting fingerprints along with other hands-on demonstrations and tour the sheriff's office and county jail.

"If you are thinking about pursuing a career in the criminal justice field, the Multi-Jurisdictional Teen Police Academy is your opportunity to get a glimpse at police work in the real world," said Green Bay Police Department Crime Prevention Coordinator Natalia Sidon. "We often see a great number of youths who have participated in the past enter into a law enforcement career, sometimes locally."

The program is open to students who are in grades 9-12 during the 2022-23 school year and will run June 19-22, 9 a.m. - 3 p.m., at the Green Bay Police Department, 307 S. Adams St., Green Bay.

org/1077/Teen-Academy and are due by Monday, May 22.

They can be submitted to a school resource officer or delivered to the crime prevention coordinator at the Green Bay Police Department.

"Due to the structure of the academy, an application is required, and a criminal background check will be run on each applicant. Anyone with a

felony arrest record will not be eligible to attend the academy. Anyone under the age of 18 will need the signature of a parent or guardian to participate," a police department release stated.

leagues from this place, on the other side of the lake. After walking all day without halting, we arrived there at sunset, sustained by some small bit of frozen meat that hunger made us eat. On the day after my arrival, they made us a present of all the fat of a bear, with many manifestations of affection.

"On the 19th, I assembled the council, and, after relating the news, informed them of the purpose that had brought me to their country, reserving for the following day a fuller discourse of our religion."

Allouez wrote that he found four nations and 600 souls, with fields of corn, gourds, beans and tobacco.

During the winter of 1671-72, Allouez and Father Louis Andre established the St. Francis Xavier mission along the Fox River – then called the River Saint Francis

The mission became a post for fur traders and travelers and the center of

Jesuit missionary activities in the Wisconsin area.

The area around the mission became "les rapides des peres" (rapids of the fathers) which was later shortened to De Pere.

In 1856, the town of Bellevue was established between the city of Green Bay and what was then the village of De Pere.

The town covered all of the area east of the Fox River.

With continued growth, area leaders began working together in 1873 toward continued change.

The following year, Bellevue was divided in two through a legislative act, with the area of the town "bounded north by the city of Green Bay, east by [the] East River, south by the village of De Pere and private claim No. 29 on the east side of [the] Fox River, and west by the Fox River, shall on and after the first Tuesday of April next constitute a separate town."

The name of that town
— Allouez.

Village of Allouez celebrates 150 years at historic town hall

ALLOUEZ – The Allouez Village Board met in a new (well, actually old) venue for their May 2 meeting — the Historic Allouez Town Hall.

The building, originally constructed at 2143 S. Webster Ave. in 1912, is now a part of Heritage Hill State Historical Park.

The change of venue for the village board's meeting was in honor of the Village of Allouez's 150th birthday being celebrated this year.

In recognition of the longevity of the municipality, several representatives from county, state and national government were in attendance at the meeting to present resolutions from their respective offices.

Senator Robert Cowles and Representative David Steffens presented a resolution on behalf of the Wisconsin State Legislature, Assembly and Senate.

Both shared the connection they have to Allouez and the importance of remembering and celebrating its history.

"I can't tell you how much

I have grown connected to this community," Steffens said. "My wife grew up here and Allouez has become an extension of myself... It was an honor to find out more about the history and what you guys are trying to do to make it elevated in terms of the awareness — celebrating it, cherishing it."

"It's so important to reflect back," Cowles said. "In 1873, they weren't worried about GBCI (Green Bay Correctional Institute) – it didn't exist yet. We've got different issues now. They weren't worried about shared revenue, they were worried about getting the crops out of the field and finishing their time at the factory downtown which had tough conditions. They had a whole set of different issues, so we're lucky to have had those founders that helped use get to where we are right now."

Congressman Mike Gallagher also had something read into the congressional records in recognition of Allouez's 150 years of existence, noting the pride he has for his hometown.

"If you see a member of congress speaking on the house floor on C-Span, it will give their name, let's say Rep. So and so, and then it'll put R or D depending on what

party they're in... And it'll say where they're from... Mine doesn't say Green Bay, it doesn't say Brown County. It says Allouez, and that's something I'm very proud of."

County Executive Troy Streckenbach was also at the meeting to congratulate Allouez on its anniversary.

"When you look at today versus what was happening back then, what we found is the community comes together and we make decisions, whether it's in four walls like this or maybe it's outside at a campfire or maybe it's ar a place of work," he said. "But ultimately, we as a community came together to make decisions of how do we make our community? How do we invest in it, whether it's building roads, parks, building churches, building a town hall, places where people can gather. I think we're celebrating, when we think about that, 150 years for us to have the ability as a community to come together... We moved the community forward, so congratulations to Allouez for a successful 150 years of being in existence."

McCoy reelected as GBAPS board president

GREEN BAY – At their April 24 meeting, the Green Bay Area Public School (GBAPS) District Board of Education reelected Laura McCoy as board president.

"You have done a fantastic job leading this district, leading the school board through the last year that I've been on it and previously to it, and I appreciate your support and trust your leadership," Bryan Milz said before the vote.

McCoy was elected by unanimous vote and addressed what the board was heading into during the coming year.

"As you all know, this next year we're going to have a lot of very serious work ahead of us as a district. We always have a huge agenda. We're going to be greeting and onboarding a new superintendent, which will be exciting and we're all excited about having new leadership," said McCoy.

The board discussed the value of having a healthy differentiation in views among board members, especially in consideration of the president and vice president

roles, as they meet with the superintendent to establish the agenda

"We have intense and lengthy conversations at times about our feelings about public education in general and kind of how we approach things. And I find that in those conversations I learn things. I learn new perspectives and I value that enormously," McCoy said of James Lyerly, who was elected vice president.

Milz inquired about adding parliamentary responsibilities to the current roles of a board officer, due to the lack of a parliamentarian, but no action was taken.

Nancy Welch was elected treasurer; Andrew Becker

was selected as clerk; and Kinsey Lehr was unanimously voted to retain her role as secretary.

Lyerly

"We all depend on her and rely on her. And it's not just the board, it's our superintendent, it's our staff, it's the public as she takes their calls. It's a huge job with huge responsibility and requires long hours and a lot of hard work. So, she's been doing a great job," McCoy said.

Finding middle ground

During the April 24 meeting, the board also approved two motions for revisions to the district employee handbook regarding vacation leave carryover and vacation

accrual for district employees.

The district and employee representatives recently met to discuss options related to three areas: the number of non-paid personal leave days for teaching staff; whether granting non-paid personal leave days should be aligned to a break in the calendar; and revisions to the accrual of vacation leave for hourly employees.

During the discussion, a motion was made by Andrew Becker to amend the allowable rollover days from 10 to 15, but the amendment failed 5-2.

Employee representatives stated that they were comfortable with the proposals as presented on both items.

Milz added that this was only one of more decisions that needed to be made

"I recognize that we're going to be having lots of very difficult decisions that are going be fiscally impacting our district on this. I think that we've made some really strong progress on some other decisions," he stated.

"We have a lot of difficult decisions that we're going to have to make and find that middle ground."

Ashwaubenon to request Bridge Aid Funds

ASHWAUBENON – During their April 25 meeting, the Ashwaubenon village board discussed inspection and replacement of large culverts in the village that have been deemed old and weathered enough for changeover.

In previous discussions with the village engineer and director for public works, it was decided that the culvert on Timber Lane between Ken Drive and Oak Crest Drive required replacement.

The board submitted a budget proposal to the Brown County Highway Commission, which requires a culvert to be 36 inches in diameter in order to be eligible for funding — a requirement that the Timber Lane culvert meets.

The board unanimously approved moving forward with the motion to petition Brown County for Bridge Aid Funds to assist in the replacement of the previously mentioned culvert;

50% of the project's costs will be covered by federal funding, while the remaining funds will be covered by the village's stormwater utility, with a total cost of \$151,383.44.

Village changes date of Arbor Day celebration

The board also unanimously approved a motion to change the day that Arbor Day is officially celebrated in Ashwaubenon.

Traditionally, Arbor Day,

a day which encourages individuals to plant trees, is celebrated nationally on the last Friday of April, but the board sought to change this date to April 28.

Ashwauhanan values its

Ashwaubenon values itself as a village that heavily treasures trees, and a proclamation made official at the meeting moves the village one step closer to fulfilling the four requirements needed to continue being recognized as a Tree City, U.S.A, an honor the village has held for 30 years as of 2022.

Suamico Village Board approves major zoning items, public works project

SUAMICO – The Suamico Village Board approved three major zoning items and a public works project at its May 1 meeting.

Most notably, the board approved three preliminary plats for a total of 24 lots.

The lots will be located along Lost Trail west of Velp Avenue.

The land was recently rezoned to rural residential, opening the door for potential development.

Another development is a four-lot, 8.27-acre plat immediately east of the Escanaba and Lake Superior Railroad tracks.

One development is a four-lot, 29.68-acre plat farther east of the railroad tracks.

The third development is a 15-lot, 39.79-acre subdivision named Sunny Meadows.

Mach IV Engineering & Surveying of Howard prepared the plats.

The smaller two developments were approved unanimously by the board, pending Department of Natural Resources approval for wetland crossings.

The Sunny Meadows preliminary plat was approved 6-1, again pending approval.

Michelle Eckert was the lone dissenting vote, citing small lot sizes.

A project to raise East Deerfield Avenue was also approved.

Periodic spring backups in Barkhausen Creek can lead to sporadic flooding on the road, which is home to a number of businesses.

The project will lift the roadway by establishing a base under it, mitigating risk for flooding.

Nearly one-third mile of road around the Barkhausen Creek crossing will be raised 4.5 inches.

The project will be paid for with Tax Incremental District (TID) No. 1 funds.

TID No. 1 covers most of

East Deerfield, including the entire area where roadwork is done.

The motion to approve carried unanimously.

Virtual participation policy approved

A virtual participation policy for village meetings was also approved.

The matter was originally discussed at length during the March 20 board meeting.

Following the March 20 board discussion, village staff drew up the language of the policy.

The policy states that trustees calling in cannot vote, cannot participate in closed session discussions and cannot count towards a quorum for voting purposes

It also applies to committee members, who will also not be paid for meetings that they virtually participate in.

The policy was unanimously approved.

Recognitions

The board recognized several people at the meeting.

An official resolution was passed commemorating former Suamico President Robert J. Euclide.

Euclide was town president from 1962-63 and 1965-71.

He was also a member of the fire department from 1963-75.

Suamico Zoning Administrator Steve Dunks was recognized for 20 years with the village.

Former trustee Jason Ward, whose term expired last month, was presented with a formal certificate of appreciation and a gift certificate.

Village Administrator Alex Kaker said that Ward had served on village committees since 2010 and was a trustee from 2017 until last month.

Village President Sky Van Rossum added that Ward "provided a significant amount of wisdom and clarity on issues."

Local hospitals receive awards for tissue donation efforts

Oneida Nation receives grant to expand high-speed internet access

BROWN COUNTY – The Oneida Nation was recently awarded \$498,217 from the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program (TBCP).


The program, run by the Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), is part of the Biden-Harris Administration's Internet for All initiative and awarded a total of \$5,841,477.13 to twelve tribes in this round of funding.

The funding will allow the Oneida Nation to construct a fiber backbone to reach a future lower site with fiber for expanding broadband infrastructure and to provide improved resilience and reliability.

"The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is making crucial investments to connect more Wisconsinites with the high-speed Internet families need to run their businesses, attend school, access telemedicine and work remotely," Sen. Tammy Baldwin said. "I'm proud to help deliver this investment for the Oneida Nation to increase access to reliable Internet service and allow more Wisconsinites to participate in our economy."

"Through state and federal funding, our administration has made targeted investments that will help provide new or improved access to reliable, high-speed internet for



ALLOUEZ - The Village of Allouez will be collecting brush the week of May 8-11.

Brush, such as trimmings from shrubs, trees and stalks from garden plants, must be placed at the curb by 6 a.m. or the night before your garbage collection day.

Brush stacks must not exceed eight feet in length and/ or 6 feet in depth, be aligned parallel to the curb and be at least 4 feet away from any structure such as mailboxes, trees and cars.

Brush commingled with yard waste such as loose leaves, grass or garden waste will not be collected.

Brush can also be brought to the LeBrun Yard Waste Site, which is open 24/7 on Le Brun Street in Allouez.

Once at the LeBrun Yard Waste Site, brush is chipped for use in village playgrounds and tree planting and made available to residents.

From snow to summer: A recap of April's rollercoaster weather

fter a very cold and snowy March, -April quickly brought our first temperatures in the 50s, 60s, 70s and even the 80s.

As incredible as this seems, in the end it was mostly a typical April: a month that at times grapples with hints of winter, but mostly allows a slow unfolding of spring, and a greening of the landscape.

Highlights

The first day of April brought predawn rain turning to some slushy light snow, along with a strong north wind, making for a winterlike start to the month, with a high temperature of only 39 degrees.

Two days later (April 3), we headed in the other direction, hitting 55 degrees Fahrenheit — the first 50-degree reading of the

Election Day (April 4) was mostly dry, but the evening brought a steady cold rain, small hail, and thunder - nothing severe but a good soaking that didn't taper off until the following morning.

Most of us received a healthy inch of water, much of which was standing everywhere since the ground was still frozen and the water couldn't soak in.

Then, just days later (April 8), we awoke to a touch of morning snow that quickly melted here, but accumulated to half a foot just to our north.

We were lucky then, but our luck was about to get much better as the most incredible week-long stretch of weather unfolded. weather not typically seen here in April.

Easter Sunday (April 9) was sunny and gorgeous with a high temperature of 65 degrees, our first 60 degree reading of the

Not to be outdone, the next day (April 10) we topped out at 70 degrees, again our first of the year, and followed by 77 degrees the next day (April

The incredible summer preview got even better as we then enjoyed four consecutive days in the 80s,

again our first of the year, and some of them new record high temperatures beginning with 86 degrees the afternoon of April 12 - not only a record high for the date, but also the earliest 85-degree (or warmer) temperature ever on record!

More records fell the next two days (April 13-14), as we warmed to 82 degrees both afternoons, and although we hit 82 degrees again April 15, we were two degrees shy of tying the record for that date.

Within that one-week period, our surroundings were transformed as dormancy was rapidly replaced with buds, blooms and even the sudden emergence of tiny leaves; it was as if summer had suddenly arrived, and we were wearing shorts and short sleeves to prove it.

The rapid onset of warmth brought all of the typical spring problems: rapid snow melting and runoff, fast flows and flooding for some, increased fire risk and astronomical pollen counts, sending allergy sufferers into a tizzy.

Despite the problems, it was mostly fun, but it ended abruptly and was followed by the coldest day of the entire month, April 17. It featured a daytime high temperature of only 37 degrees, wind chills in the 20s, flakes of snow and the return of more winterlike clothing.

"Did you enjoy summer?" joked my grocery store cashier.

And so it was, as everything green that popped to life the previous week now suddenly needed to pause, waiting for warmth to return.

The remainder of the month was more April-like, with temperatures skewing a bit colder than average and precipitation coming in a variety of ways.

Predawn thunder woke some the morning of April 20, and just days later (April 22), Earth Day volunteers were pelted with spotty showers of rain, snow and tiny ice pellets.

Of note, the night of April 23 brought another brilliant display of northern lights, this time seen as far south as Texas.

The final weekend of the month was disappointing with unusually chilly temperatures and rain.

April temperatures

The month exemplifies how a few unusually warm days can distort climatological summaries, as the record book says April's mean temperature was 1.7 degrees warmer than the 30-year average, but a closer inspection reveals 18 days were actually normal or colder than normal.

The interesting tidbit is the range of temperatures during the month - 86 degrees the warmest (April 12) and 25 the coldest (April 2) - a spread of 61 degrees.

We had 15 nights with low temperatures of 32 degrees or colder.

April precipitation

In typical April fashion, precipitation types included rain, snow and some ice measuring a total of 2.81 inches of water, .19 inches

less than normal. A trace or greater of snow fell on 12 days, measuring a total of 1.2 inches, 3.5 inches less than the 30vear average.

languidly toward its far-off destination. The sun drifted across the sky as a once-vigorous wind mellowed into a gentle breeze.



Are you turning 65 this year?

What you need to know about Medicare options

ccording to IBM's 2022 "Cost of Data Breach Report,"the average cost of a data breach for a U.S. company has escalated to \$9.4 million, a result of scammers becoming more sophisticated in their approach.

Phishing, the fraudulent practice of sending emails or other messages purporting to be from a reputable company, remains the most prevalent cybersecurity threat for businesses.

In fact, phishing attacks account for 85% of all cyber

threats manufacturers face with backup systems are forced to pay the ransom as that is less expensive than having production shut down for an extended period of time.

> The number one way to defend against this threat is to ensure that employees, at every level within a com

pany, are trained to recognize phishing emails before opening or clicking on links that allow nefarious programs access to your network.

Unfortunately, this is becoming even more challenging as scammers have moved from traditional phishing activities involving mass email distribution to spear phishing, which specifically targets email to a select victim.

With spear phishing, the email may appear to come from someone you know and trust with similar messaging, increasing the likelihood they open it.

That is the danger.

Spear phishing emails look very real and are far more challenging for employees to spot, especially if they are not trained to watch for them.

The best of birds and blooms



Bay Area Birds

he next month will showcase some of the best of the spring migration of birds and the blooming of the spring wildflowers.

The warbler migration will start in the second half of April and peak in mid-May.

The wood warblers, of the family Parulidae, are a group of birds found only in the New World. As their name indicates they are found primarily in wooded areas and eat mostly insects and spiders.

The warblers are considered the jewels of the bird world, with most species exhibiting beautiful, vibrant colors.

Most warblers are called migrants, neo-tropical meaning that they spend winter in Central and South America and migrate to

A few species such as the vellow-rumped, black and white and pine warblers winter in the southern U.S.

In the Green Bay area, the Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary is a very important stop for migrating warblers.

Most terrestrial birds will avoid passing over large bodies of water if possible, so the location along the southeast corner of the bay intercepts a large number of migrants.

From the Sanctuary, warblers can travel up either the west or the east side of Green Bay.

Jim Johnson, a Bay Area Bird Club board member and a local bird expert, has been observing warblers at Bay Beach for 50 years.

He believes Bay Beach gets so many warblers because it provides a good habitat in the right location.

Bay Beach has lots of box elders and cottonwoods and the warblers will feed primarily on caterpillars and other insects on the branches of these trees.

Many of the warblers will stop at Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary and recharge on food, water and rest and then continue on to their nesting grounds.

"Migrant warblers can be seen at the Sanctuary from April 15-May 28, but the migration peak is from May 10-20, and the high count usually falls between May 15-18," according to Johnson. "During the peak, as many as

25 species can be seen in one

The Bay Area Bird Club will be conducting field trips at Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary at 6:30 a.m. on May 10, 13 and 17.

Club members are very welcoming to birding newcomers and will assist rookies in learning to identify warblers both by sight and

One of the best ways to take birding knowledge to the next level is to become a member of the Bay Area Bird Club.

We are now in the start of the season of spring wildflowers, a fleeting scene of beauty that is constantly changing and over all too soon.

Spring woodland wildflowers are described as ephemerals, which Webster dictionary defines as "lasting a very short time."

Ephemeral plants are adapted to take advantage of the short time in which there is adequate sunlight and warmth to support plant growth, but the deciduous trees have not yet leafed out to block the sunlight from reaching the forest floor.

The months of April, May and the first half of June will be the peak time for spring ephemerals; by late June, the leaves will be blocking too much of the sunlight for most plants to thrive on the forest floor.

The first woodland wildflower to bloom in Wisconsin is the skunk cabbage.

In early April, the skunk cabbage were in full bloom.

Their flowers are starting to drop their seeds and decompose, but their leaves will be visible throughout much of the summer.

Flowers just starting to bloom include hepatica, bloodroot, trout lily, spring beauty and marsh marigold.

The marsh marigolds put on a spectacular show during the peak of their blooming, which will be late April and early May this year. Look for marsh marigolds in low wet areas, the same areas where one will also find skunk cabbage.

Two plants that exhibit the ephemeral trait to the highest degree are the trout lily and spring beauty.

The trout lily begins blooming in late April and the spring beauty in early

roots to survive another year. In early May, many of Wisconsin's most beautiful wildflowers begin to bloom, species such as trillium, Jack-inthe-pulpit and Mayflower.

A great book for wildflower identification is Wildflowers of Wisconsin by Stan Tekiela.

A good location in the Green Bay area to see a variety of wildflowers is the Baird Creek Greenway.

If you go into the Greenway at Christa McAuliffe Park and follow the brown trail loop, you will walk by many good wildflower locations. The Baird Preservation Foundation will be hosting a bird hike on Sunday, May 7 at 8 a.m. and a flower hike on Sunday, May 14 at 1 p.m. The hikes are open to the public.

The hikes will depart from Christa McAuliffe Park, 3100 Both species grow in large Sitka Street, Green Bay 54311.



Pet owners and their furry friends alike won't want to miss the 16th annual Green Bay Pet Expo, happening May 12, 13 and 14 at the Resch Expo.

Senior Event Designer Amy Shadian said the expo covers a little bit of everything related to pets — from finding the right pet for you to learning how to best care for them and pampering them with treats and toys.

"The Pet Expo is a gathering of rescues, vendors, educators and entertainment all focused on the pet industry," she said. "There's lots to learn, lots of shopping

for pet accessories, [attendees can] search for a new family member and just have lots of fun!"

"This is probably the largest event where pets are welcome inside," she said. "Most of the attendees bring their pets so it's super fun and family-friendly. It's also great to be able to chat with the local rescues, search for your next family member, shop and just have a great time."

Shadian said finding the perfect addition to your family





will be easier at this year's Pet Expo than ever before due to the increased number of participating rescue organizations.

"We've really tried to make the event as family-friendly as possible," she said. "We've expanded the number of rescues, even bringing in non-dog rescues too. It feels wonderful to support those amazing organizations over the years and watch that aspect of the show grow."

If you're not looking to add a new pet to your family right now, Shadian said there are plenty of other components to the Pet Expo to pique your interest.

"We try to bring education and entertainment that families can get excited about," she said. "This year we have a complimentary photo for each pet in attendance. 



This is why it is vital to focus on the human element as most viruses enter a company's network via an employee unknowingly opening and clicking ona link they should not have.

For attackers, it is the easiest way into a network and the reason they take a more targeted approach.

To combat spear phishing attempts, it is important to have a strong awareness program in place at your company.

It should include immediate training for all new employees, and at a minimum, annual training for everyone in the company.

As part of this training, it is important to provide examples of phishing emails so team members can truly see how deceptive the email can be and what to watch for, including the following an unfamiliar greeting; grammar errors and misspelled words; email addresses and domain names that do not match; unusual content or requests such as a request to transfer funds or providelogin credentials; inconsistencies in email addresses, links and domain names; and un unsolicited email.

In addition to annual training, it is good to do monthly internal testing by sending out fake phishing emails designed to test an employee's ability to both spot and report them to IT.

These are not meant to be "gotcha" moments. Instead, the tests are designed to keep awareness of email scams top of mind.

They can also indicatewhether additional individual training is needed.

Or, if too many employees open the fake email, it may require you to revise how and how often you train team members.

One final point for manu-

facturers or businesses that work with outside suppliers or vendors, it is good to assess their cybersecurity protocols as well.


Attackers will often target small vendors, which are less likely to have stringent email security protocols in place.

The attacker's hope is that the vendor will unwittingly transfer the virus to the attacker's intended target via email or some other data transfer such as a flash drive or via a shared software platform.

The unfortunate reality is that every employee presents an opportunity for an attacker gain access.

It is vital to have the training and IT security systems in place to prevent the attacker from gaining

After all, an employee has to get it right 100% of the time, while an attacker only needs get lucky once.

ore than 30 women will be hitting the water next weekend for a Wisconsin Women Fish group outing on Green

"The goal of this event is to build confidence in female boaters by teaching them how to navigate on a big body of water," said Rikki Pardun, the club's vice president.

Of course, they'll also be learning various skills to help them catch some of Green Bay's trophy walleyes.

"Some are boat owners who want to learn more before taking their own vessels out on the bay, while others want to learn what it takes to be a good first mate," said Pardun, a first mate for Sheboygan Charter Captain and Club President Barb Carey.

Carey recently made a splash in Door County by

placing third in the maledominated Baileys Harbor Brown Trout Tournament. Her 34-incher smacked a stickbait on the bay and weighed 21.25 pounds.

Carey said she started the women's fishing group 17 years ago after getting tired of not seeing any other women fishing.

"Once we were able to find each other, it really took off," she said.

More than 600 women from more than 20 states and Canada are members.

"We do classes, clinics and travel to destinations to target specific species," Carey said.

Eleven boaters and 21 coanglers are registered for the May 12-14 event.

"While Wisconsin Women Fish holds many beginner level clinics and workshops, the club considers this one of their more advanced events," Pardun

Commercial trout?

A proposed bill is being circulated that, if advanced

and signed into law, would allow a limited commercial fishery for lake trout.

Bob Wincek, president of the Wisconsin Federation of Great Lakes Sport Fishing Clubs, sent a letter to sport anglers and encouraged them to contact sponsors of a potential bill, including State Senator Andre Jacque.

"There's been a lot of calls to legislators," said Door County commercial fisherman Charlie Henriksen, who said there were "inaccuracies" in Wincek's letter. "Mostly it's sour grapes, but no credible comments about why we

should not fish."

Henriksen said they're not asking to take more than whatever excess Department of Natural Resources models show the population could handle.

"T've built my whole business on local, fresh, healthy and sustainable fisheries," Henriksen said. "Every restaurant in Door County would love to have another local fish available, and the same for the smokehouses in Door, Kewaunee and Brown counties."

A Lake Michigan Lake Trout Commercial Harvest Stakeholder Group was formed by the DNR last fall and has met three times in recent months.

Some fish are still active by City Park, County Park 2 and the mouth of the Peshtigo River, with hair jigs and rippin' raps taking fish.

The trolling bite over the mud on the north shore has been good too, with flicker minnows in the 10-12 feet deep areas holding walleyes.

On the east shore, good walleyes are going near Henderson Point, the cup in Sand Bay, near Stone Quarry and the Chateau.

Hair jigs or trolled crankbaits are dominating this catch.

In the lower bay, decent catches are going near Bayshore, Geanos Reef and Suamico.

Trolled crankbaits have been best.

White bass have started to show up in the Fox River, with good catches taken on minnows, hair jigs and blade baits.

Shore fishing by Metro is still doing very well; crappies, walleye and pike are being caught.

UW-Green Bay men's basketball signs trio to 2023-24 roster

GREEN BAY - University of Green Bay men's basketball head coach, Sundance Wicks recently announced the addition of three more players to the team's 2023-24 roster.

Inking their National Letter of Intent were Foster Wonders, Elijah Jones and Noah Reynolds.

Elijah Jones

Jones started 16 of 35 games in his lone season at NJCAA school John A. Logan.

He became a lethal shooter last season, going 109-of-180 from the field (60.6%), including 19-of-36 (52.8 percent) from deep.

Jones and the Vols won the NJCAA National Championship on March 25 with a 73-70 win over Northwest Florida State College.

Jones started his career at Southern Indiana, where he appeared in 33 games in two years with the Screaming Eagles.

In 2021-22, he played in 23 games, making 16 starts and averaging 4.7 PPG in 18.5 minutes of action.

'Elijah is a winner, plain and simple, and he has

some serious juice. E.J. comes to us fresh off a national championship with John A. Logan College," Wicks said of Jones. "What you will see with him is how he impacts the game in all facets. In my opinion, versatility is not what you do on the offensive end but

who you can guard on the defensive side of the ball. and he can guard 1-5."

Noah Reynolds

Reynolds joins Green Bay after two seasons at Wyoming, where Wicks was an assistant for the past three seasons.

Reynolds is a dynamic guard and Mountain West performer with the Cowboys.

The Peoria, Ill., native played in 18 games, making nine starts.

Reynolds can score at multiple levels, and proved so a season ago when he averaged 14.1 points per game, the second-most on Wyoming.

"Noah is Green Bay grit personified," Wicks said. "There has been nothing easy about his journey, and he has earned everything he has gotten by the blood and sweat he has put into this game during the invisible hours. There is a reason why he was one of the most coveted players in the transfer portal.

"He can score it at all three levels, is a relentless attacker, and loves the challenge of guarding the other team's best. However, what makes him special is the competitive chip on his shoulder he plays with and the camaraderie he creates with his brothers in the locker room. He raises the level of any gym he is in because this dude loves to hoop."

Foster Wonders

Wonders is a transfer from Southern Illinois, where he played in 24 games last season.

A solid shooting option, he was 39% from the floor and 34.7% from deep. In his limited time on the hardwood, he grabbed 11 rebounds and tallied 12 assists.

Phoenix fans might know Wonders from his time at Iron Mountain High School where he led the Mountaineers to a 83-5 record over four seasons.

Wonders is a three-time Mr. Basketball in Michigan's Upper Peninsula (UP), and is the UP's all-time leading scorer with more than 2,200 career points.

Wonders was also a threetime all-state selection and led Iron Mountain to a 19-1 record and a runner-up finish in the Michigan Division 3 state tournament as a senior in 2021.

"Foster is a cold-blooded sniper and a relentless worker," Wicks stated. "His combination of size, skill and shooting ability gives him gravity that can disrupt an entire defense. What I think is even more impressive than his shooting ability is his ever-evolving knowledge of the game. 'Fosty' studies the game like very few I have ever been around, and he does it out of humility and a true love for the game."

"I feel the recruiting process is going well," Musial said. "With us just completing our (high school) season and now me moving into AAU (Amateur Athletic Union), it's picked up again. I do enjoy the process - I like getting to know about different programs and coaches."

Musial's first Division I offer came from Toledo in July of 2022.

"Because each college has personally reached out to me, I think it'll be hard to say no to any one of them," Musial said. "I've been building relationships for a long time, but once I find the right place, I'll be happy."

Musial, who might study dentistry in college, said she's changed her mind on when she'll likely commit.

'Initially, I thought this fall I'd make a decision," she said. "After I've thought about it more, I don't want to put a timeline on it — I want to go on more visits this summer and fall. It'll give me a better idea of where I'm at. Personally, I don't think I'm ready to commit yet. I also don't want to commit to a program without knowing more about them coaches move around quite

Musial said Notre Dame's recent success also helps.

'When I talk to coaches, they all say, 'I want players who know how to win and come from a winning program," she said. "There might be some really good players out there, but they don't come from winning programs or don't play with many good players on their team - I don't have that problem. I'm grateful to play with and against some great players who help me get bet-

Musial said Notre Dame coach Sara Rohde is also a good mentor for her.

"I love playing for Coach Rohde," she said. "Lots of people think she's so intense – and she is — but she cares for all of us and has a funny side. She knows when to push us. She has great skills and expertise."

Despite receiving multiple Division I offers, Musial said that doesn't mean she's perfect in her game.

"I have to get stronger, more athletic and quicker," she said. "I need to feel more confident, too. I spend so many hours in the gym, but if I get to a game and don't actually shoot the ball, what are all those hours going toward?"

Sydney Whitehouse

Like Musial, Whitehouse, who also plans to study dentistry, has been a fixture in the Tritons' lineup for the last two seasons.

She averaged 8.2 points per contest during her sophomore season and 10.2 as a iunior.

She also saw limited time as a freshman.

Unlike Musial, Whitehouse's recruiting process is just beginning.

She recently received an offer from Truman State, a Division II school in Kirksville, Missouri.

"That's been my first and only offer thus far," the 5-foot-7 guard said. "It was after a recent AAU game. I was about to leave the facility, and (Truman State) Coach Theo (Dean) tapped me on the shoulder and wanted to talk with me. He said, 'Syd, we'd like to offer you a scholarship.' I was at a loss for words — I didn't expect that."

Whitehouse said doesn't know where the recruiting process will take her, but she's going to enjoy

"I can't tell vou for sure." she said. "I'll be blessed with whatever offers I get, but I'm not guaranteed anything. I have to keep working hard to prove myself."

Whitehouse also said she hopes Notre Dame's success - three state titles in her three years on the team - will also help her recruitment.

"It can't hurt," laughed. "Because we are so successful as a team, lots of people — including coaches - want to see us play."

Whitehouse said she's "extremely lucky to have Coach Rohde as her coach."

"Coach really has a soft heart behind her coaching," she said. "I enjoy her being my coach because she knows our potential and what we're capable of."

When asked when she thought she'd make a decision on her college choice, Whitehouse had a quick response.

"No," she laughed. "I really haven't put much thought into that — I think I'll know when it's time."

Whitehouse, who has scored 577 career high school points, also said she has plenty to work on.

"My defense is my strong point, so I'd like to grow my offensive game," she said. "I want to be more confident with the ball and keep encouraging my teammates — which I feel I'm already

The Tritons will be going for a state-record four consecutive titles next season: something Whitehouse said makes her excited.

"I think we'll be under lots of pressure and stress to win another one — there are some nerves there," she said. "But, we've experienced it before, multiple times. Nothing will be handed to us, and teams will want to beat us even more. We have to finish strong, and hopefully, we can win a fourth."

According to the WIAA website (wiaawi.org), five other Wisconsin girls' high school basketball teams have won three consecutive titles: Beaver Dam (2017-19), Cuba City (2005-07), Flambeau (2006-08), Milwaukee Vincent (2007-09) and Milwaukee Washington (1994-96).

new players — eight of which being freshman — Giese has been a mainstay at the top of Green Bay's lineup.

Ultimately, the decision to come back for one more year was easy.

"Being able to still play softball and achieve a master's degree was a no brainer to come back for a fifth year. I didn't play much my freshman year and losing most of the 2020 season due to COVID that was tough. So having the opportunity to come back and play one last season was without a doubt an easy yes,' she said.

It's no secret that Giese's junior year in 2021 was her breakout.

After getting 31 hits in 124 at bats throughout her first two seasons, Giese broke through with 44 hits in 132 at bats in her junior season.

With a .333 average, up from .250 in her freshman and sophomore seasons, Giese also recorded her first five extra-base hits.

Those doubles and triples led to 13 RBIs, over double what she had (5) in her first

"Freshman year was hard; it was a big adjustment for me. I put a lot of pressure on myself to perform. I felt like sophomore year was going really good until COVID hit and shut our season down," Giese mentioned. "During spring and summer of 2020, I really grew overall as a person, and I felt more comfortable and confident within myself. COVID really taught me to never take anything for granted. So that was always in the back of my head as I trained and worked on improving my game."

After last weekend's series against Purdue Fort Wayne, Green Bay sits at 19-28 overall, 10-9 in the Horizon League.

That puts them in a tie for sixth with Youngstown State in the standings.

sits atop the Horizon League with her .460 average, 29 hits, 14 walks and a .558 on base percentage.

For individual career records, she is currently tied for first place with Hailey Mohrfield with 105 runs scored.

Her .326 batting average also ties Mohrfield for second all time, and her stolen base total might be unbreakable.

Giese has 61 stolen bases, 30 more than Jenna Woepse (2005-08) who sits in second place with 31.

After her 2023 campaign, Giese will undoubtedly see her name featured in these lists again.

UW-Green Bay to induct five into Athletics Hall of Fame

GREEN BAY – University of Wisconsin (UW)-Green Bay Athletics will induct five former Phoenix athletes into the Athletics Hall of Fame on June 10, as the 22nd class.

The 2023 inductees include men's soccer player, Joe Hoffmeyer '82; women's basketball standouts Kayla (Tetschlag) Karius, '11, and Celeste (Hoewisch) Ratka, '11; long-time university administrator, Dan Spielmann; and men's basketball standout Keifer Sykes, '15.

The enshrinement ceremony will take place at the Weidner Center at UW-Green Bay.

Joe Hoffmeyer

Hoffmeyer created a legacy on the Phoenix men's soccer team 1978-82.

In 1982, he was tabbed to the United Soccer Coaches All Region Team, WSCA All-Wisconsin Team and was given the Hagemeister Leadership Award.

During his time with the Phoenix, UW-Green Bay went 59-20-7.

Known as one of the best defenders in program history, an award named in his honor was given out from 2000-12 to the best defender on the team.

Hoffmeyer led the defensive line for one of the best defenses in program history in 1981.

That season, Green Bay gave up just 0.64 goals per game, which is the second-lowest mark in program history.

Kayla (Tetschlag) Karius

Karius left a legacy at Green Bay after her four-year career on the women's basketball team from 2007-11.

She broke out during her sophomore campaign, win-

ning Horizon League Sixth Player of the Year.

As a junior during the 2009-10 season, Karius set an individual season record with 214 rebounds and garnered three Horizon League Player of the Week selections.

She is one of 37 members in program history to eclipse 1,000 career points, which she did on Dec. 31, 2010, with a bucket against Detroit Mercy.

Karius ended her Phoenix career with 1,372 points, the ninth-most by any player since the program transitioned to Division I.

Celeste (Hoewisch) Ratka

Celeste Ratka ranks ninth all-time for most points scored in program history, racking up 1,425 career points from 2007-11.

Her senior season ranks among one of the best single seasons by a Phoenix player ever, garnering Horizon League Co-Player and Co-Defensive Player of the Year

She was also named Horizon League Tournament MVP after the Phoenix won the title in 2011.

She still ranks in the top-10 in career free throws made and attempted, assists, steals and games played.

Dan Spielmann

Purdue Fort Wayne

Named one of the top-50

most influential leaders in Green Bay Athletics history, Dan Spielmann served in multiple roles for UW-Green Bay over a 40-year span.

His duties included Athletic Director during the program's rise to NCAA Division I, University Counsel, Chief of Staff and Policy Advisor to five different Chancellors.

During his time as the athletics director from 1985-94, he helped propel the program to new heights in the early years of the Division I status, finding University support for tuition waivers for student-athletes and community support to develop the Phoenix Fund.

Spielmann was also instrumental to adding seven sports to meet the requirements of NCAA Division I membership.

Keifer Sykes

Keifer Sykes led one of the best runs the program has seen 2011-15.

He was a Bob Cousy Award finalist after a spectacular season in 2013-14, helping the Phoenix upset the Virginia Cavaliers while being named Horizon League Player of the Year.

Sykes finished his Phoenix career as one of just two players to ever eclipse the 2,000-point mark at 2,096, just under 200 points shy of the all-time leading scorer, Tony Bennett.

Sykes also ranks in the top 10 in free throws made, assists, steals and games played.

After playing overseas from 2015-20, Sykes joined the Indiana Pacers' G-League team in 2021 before being elevated to the professional team during the 2021-22 season.

Sykes is currently on the Detroit Pistons' G-League team, the Motor City Cruise.

Not only has Giese set the alltime hits record, but she has stolen the most bases, and it's not even

Giese has stolen a total of 61 bases throughout her five-year career, with 47 of those coming in her past two seasons.

Jenna Woepse (2005-08) is the next closest at the stolen base leaderboard, coming in at 31.

"Coach Kubuske ultimately makes the decision for me to steal. I think something that also helps is knowing the opposing catcher and their middle infield players," Giese said.

"A lot of practice goes into timing up the pitchers' release point, breaking down the mechanics of my running form and perfecting my sliding technique so I am making sure I am getting to that base as quickly as possible."

GREEN BAY - After a secondplace finish in last year's Horizon League Championship, the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay women's golf team captured its first ever conference championship.

The UW-Green Bay women put up a 914 throughout the three-day tournament, finishing with +50 - 12 strokes better than second place Oakland.

The Phoenix are coached by Lee Reinke, who just captured the program's first coach of the year recognition.

"Last year stung a bit — other than the COVID year where the conference championship was held at Purdue University, it has been at Mission Inn Resort in Howey-in-the-Hills, Florida, for 10+ years," Reinke stated. "We shot a score last year that would have won eight of the previous nine years, we just ran into a buzzsaw. Winning this year with this group of ladies is definitely a special feeling."

Things weren't looking good for the Phoenix after day one of competition.

Green Bay found themselves in sixth place out of eight, but coach Reinke delivered a strong message to the ladies.

"I've seen, all too often, seniors put undue pressure on themselves, as it's likely their last college tournament. I told them we couldn't play any worse that first day and we were only seven strokes back. I told them, 'not to be cliché, but they don't hand out

trophies after day one," Reinke

Courtney Matschke, a fifth-year senior out of Franklin, echoed Reinke's quote.

"The first round I definitely struggled. I think it was a combination of maybe just having too much pressure on myself and just the nerves of it potentially being our last college tournament," Matschke said.

Ashley Kulka is in her sixth year with the program.

The Beaver Dam native improved 13 spots from her performance in last year's conference

"Another year of experience at the same conference course allowed me to feel more comfortable there. In March over spring break, we were able to get to Florida as a team and play at Mission Inn. I think that trip really helped us gain more exposure to the course and more confidence in playing there," Kulka stated.

With almost half of the team in their fifth or sixth year, Kulka discussed her journey as a Phoenix, "Six years here at Green Bay has not felt that long. My sophomore year I took a medical redshirt when I had to have surgery on my left ankle. Taking that year off from golf showed me how much I wanted to accomplish great things with this team at Green Bay.

"Unfortunately, my first year back was cut short with being sent home with COVID. The next three years I felt we really grew as a team and started accomplishing such great things. UW-Green Bay golf has allowed me to learn how to be a leader."

Similar to Matschke, Isabelle Maleki is a fifth-year senior.

Maleki finished second in last year's Horizon League Championship, but was still undecided as to whether she would come back for vear five.

"Deciding to stay for a fifth year was a tough decision for me to make." Maleki stated. "I was planning on applying to PA (physician assistant) school and I wasn't sure I wanted to push it back a year. But after having a lot of conversations with my parents and older brother I knew that coming back for a fifth year is what I wanted to do. Being able to experience one more year with my teammates and coach is something that I would never trade for anything."

Simply put, "I was not ready to leave my second family just yet. Another reason is that I knew what this team would be capable of the next year, and I wanted to be a part of that," she added.

As Maleki expected, the team was capable of a whole lot.

With Maleki and Kulka taking home All-League Second Team honors, the Phoenix are heading to Pullman, Wash., May 8-10 as part of the NCAA Regional.
