# Deconstructing a legacy

Recycled church materials for sale

WAUPACA When Todd Jones explains he is "deconstructing" the old St. Mary Magdalene's Catholic Church building in downtown Waupaca, he differentiates this from "demolishing" the building.

"Recycle, reuse and repurpose. That's our job," Jones said. "Demolition is where they bring in a wrecking ball, knock it down and put it in a landfill."

According to a report by the Environmental Protection Agency, construction and demolition generates more than 600 tons of waste debris annually, more than twice the amount collected from homes and businesses

Jones noted that demolition accounts for 25% of total waste going into land-

His Waupaca company, Loot Vintage and Supply, works with several other companies to recycle materials from deconstructed buildings.

Re•volvs, which is located at the old county highway facility at 600 E. Fulton St., prepares and sells the materials that are salvaged from the buildings.

Jones said Re•volvs plans to hold a public auction of items from the church in early July.

"We plan to keep as many of the architectural salvage items as local as possible,"

Crews from Recyclean Inc., based in Kenosha, tear down the building and recycle the materials such as fixtures, bricks, doors, windows, wood flooring and other materials that can be

resold. Urban Evolutions is an Appleton company that works with architects and interior designers to provide wood flooring, slatted walls, doors and other items made from recycled lumber.

# **lola man charged** with starting fires

Nearly 10 acres burned in two days

COUNTY - David J. Engel-DeFord, 30, Iola, is charged with seven counts each of intentionally setting a fire to another person's land, negligent handling of burning materials and setting a fire that started a forest fire.

Beginning at 9 a.m. Thursday, April 13, wardens and rangers with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources responded to five fires within a 30-minute time span.

The fires occurred in rural Iola, on Engebretson, Ness, Brandt and Roosevelt roads.

Two more fires were reported for a total of seven that burned nearly 10 acres of land total.

Due to the proximity of the fires to each other, the DNR suspected arson.

According to the criminal complaint, a black pickup truck had been seen in the vicinity of one of the fires. The license plate was registered to

Dave's Auto Repair in Iola and commonly operated by Engel-DeFord.

At about 2 p.m. April 13, Waupaca County deputies located the suspect truck and Engel-DeFord at Manawa Elementary School.

Due to the presence of Engel-DeFord and law enforcement, Manawa Elementary School was placed in lockdown, the complaint says.

Engel-DeFord was taken to the Manawa police station to be interviewed.

"Over the course of the interview, Engel-DeFord stated several facts indicating his knowledge about starting fires, how fires spread, accelerants related

### **Clintonville decides** to keep streaming school board meetings

**CLINTONVILLE** The Clintonville School Board will continue to live stream its meetings and keep them available on its YouTube channel.

Board members made that decision when they met on May 8.

In addition, the board also approved recording any open session action after the board comes out of closed session if there is a vote on any action item other than adjournment.

Superintendent Kuhn told the board very few people watch the school board meetings live, but a lot of people watch the recordings of the meetings.

He added that it doesn't matter to him whether the district live streams school board meeting or not. But

he said the board needed to be aware that with the recordings of the meetings available on the district's YouTube channel, the possibility exists that the recordings could be ma-

nipulated. Board President Ben Huber said one of the difficult things about live streaming is if a student's name is accidently mentioned during a meeting. He said one way to avoid that would be to eliminate the live stream, but record board meetings, and then make them available once it is verified no student names were mentioned that shouldn't have been mentioned.

Board member Glen Drew Lundt asked Huber if he wanted the recordings edited in those situations.

Huber said in situations when a student's name should not have

The story of the serial killer and body snatcher was turned into a micro-budget horror film called "Ed Gein: The Musical."

It premiered in 2010 but after years of being unavailable, the locally made film is now on DVD.

The event at the Gerold was a kick-off for the DVD tour. The screening of the film was the main event and the cast played live music from the film and hosted a question-and-answer session with the audience.

Board member Laurie Vollrath said she liked the idea of board meetings being recorded, but not necessarily live streamed.

Kuhn said he doesn't have time to review meeting recordings.

"If you want me to be 100% honest, I kind of feel uncomfortable going in and taking out excerpts," Kuhn said. "If something happened, you need to acknowledge that something happened as well."

Because a school board meeting is an open meet-

ing, Lundt said he preferred that the meeting recordings not be altered at all.

For the protection of board members and the school district, Kuhn said legal experts recommended not live streaming board meetings. Instead, districts should record meetings to refer back to.

"But that doesn't mean we have to," Kuhn said. "That's a recommenda-

A motion was made to record but not livestream the school board meetings.

Prior to the vote, board member Chad Dobbe asked how recordings would be available to the public.

Kuhn said if individuals wanted to listen to a recording of a board meeting, the individual would need to make an open records request.

The motion failed by a 3-3 vote.

Lundt made a new motion to continue live streaming the board meetings as the district has been doing, but to also include the open session portion after the board comes out of closed session if there is an action item other than adjournment.

Lundt said his goal was for the district to be as transparent as possible.

That motion passed unanimously.







### **Financial penalties for** breaking contracts

Clintonville adds damages clause

BY BERT LEHMAN STAFF REPORTER

CLINTONVILLE All future contracts for administrators and directors in the Clintonville School District will include a clause specifying liquidated damages if they leave the district before the contract runs out.

The Clintonville School Board approved adding the clause when it met May 8.

A liquidated damages clause was already in the district's handbook for teacher contracts.

The new clause requires an administrator or director to pay the district \$4,500 if they leave the district during the first year of the contract, which would be from July 1 to June 30. If they leave during the second year of the contract, they must pay the district \$3,000.

After receiving feedback from superintendents in other school districts, Clintonville Superintendent Troy Kuhn said he developed three options for the board to consider.

Kuhn said some school districts let a teacher or administrator leave with-

out paying any liquidated damages.

"You don't want somebody being disgruntled in your organization," Kuhn said.

Kuhn said other school districts have liquidated damages for teachers and administrators. The liquidated damages range from \$500 to \$6,000. Some districts also use a percentage of the employee's salary.

If an administrator were to leave the district, Kuhn said the important date range would be July 15 through Aug. 15 because that is the time the district is preparing for the upcoming school year.

"I think if it's during the school year, that's a whole different conversation and that probably goes into some type of arbitration," Kuhn said.

An option would be to have different liquidated damage amounts depending on when during the year an administrator leaves, Kuhn said.

Kuhn reminded the board that teacher and administrator contracts are for two years. He also said the liquidated damtrict and the employee mutually agree to part

Prevea not included in new plan

The Clintonville School District will move forward with a new health insurance plan for the 2023-24 school year.

After approving the switch to a new health insurance plan at its last board meeting, the school board again discussed the district's health insurance when it met May 8.

At the meeting the board approved changing to the Robin Broad Network plan, which does not include Prevea.

Lindsay Norder, district business manager,, started the discussion told the board that Robin provided the district with another decrease of 1% on its bid because "they felt bad for their error."

In a follow-up email from Norder to the Clintonville Tribune-Gazette, she said it was "a communication error that involved pre-planned services versus emergency services and whether it was

"That one, as you can see, is the only one that would be a decrease," Norder said.

Norder shared a list of companies that the district requested health insurance bids from.

The list included Anthem, Health Partners (also known as Robin), Network Health, Security Health Plan, and WPS.

Kuhn said if the district stayed with WCA, the district would be having the same discussion about health insurance next year at this time.

"Because they can raise their rates whenever they want with us, and we might have to go back out to bid," Kuhn said. "If you can go up 10%. They put a cap on it."

Kuhn told the board that he found out that a increase in health insurance premiums in the single digits, percentagewise, isn't a bad deal. He said some school districts are facing increases in the mid-20% range.

"They're trying to figure out what they're doing with their health insurance and their raises," Kuhn said. "And they are not sitting where we're sitting."
He added, "We're actu-

ally sitting pretty good, even though these numbers look bad, considering where health care costs are right now."

Prevea discussion

The board discussed the exclusion of Prevea from the networks provided by Robin. Norder said Prevea was

not listed in the top 50 service providers used by employees in the district. She added that a lot

of district employees informed Kuhn and her that they use Ascension or Woodland providers. Board member Laurie

Vollrath asked Kuhn what the district recommended. "If you're looking for

financial stability for the district, I mean, I would recommend option three, but I don't think that's what we should do," Kuhn said. "I don't think we just look at finances. In order to keep the majority of our employees on the same plan, the Robin Broad plan does do the majority of the employees and it's only going to cost us an extra \$29,000. If you stick to exactly what we have, it's costing the district another \$184,000, but then you look at what it's also costing the employees, it's costing the employees a lot more. So, for that \$17,000 that's this year and \$16,000 that was last year, we're getting charged almost \$200,000 just to keep Prevea in the network. That's what the numbers are saying."

Kuhn said he spoke with two employees who use Prevea, and acknowledged they would be disappointed if the district chose a plan that doesn't include Prevea.

# Booze ban at gas stations repealed

NEW LONDON - Historically restricted to beer for their alcohol sales, New London convenience stores now may carry liquor and wine.

The New London City Council on May 11 unanimously approved an ordinance expanding the list of retail businesses that can hold Class A liquor licenses from grocers and liquor stores to gas stations.

The council adopted the ordinance in one reading rather than the usual two so it can approve next year's liquor licenses at the June meeting. "Small businesses, we're trying to help them out as much as we can and not limit them to what they can sell, so I think it's good for the city,' Ald. Tim Roberts said when the Finance and Personnel Committee recommended the ordinance to the council on May 3.

"It's kind of funny we had them limited for years, you know?" Council President John Hass said of gas stations.

"Yeah, they were not happy about that," City Clerk Nicole Ryerson said, "and they're happy at the prospect of being able to sell liquor.' Gas stations were uniquely

limited to Class A beer licenses in New London, unlike their counterparts in surrounding communities. "So my question is, what has been the reasoning for

not permitting gas stations to sell liquor in the past?' Ald. BaLynda Croy asked at an earlier finance meeting on

"It's been in there a while,

and I really don't know if it was like a puritanical thing or if it was lobbying from places that could sell liquor," Ryerson said of the ordinance.

Gas station owners have regularly complained about their competitive disadvantage when they renewed their annual beer licenses. Rverson said. "Their argument is why does a liquor store get to sell liquor and a convenience store not," Ryerson said.

Class A licenses allow for carryout sales of alcohol. Consumption on-site is for-

In contrast, Class B licenses are held by restaurants and bars and allow for alcohol consumption inside the establishment.

The state limits the number of Class B licenses issued per municipality. Quotas are not placed on Class A licenses.

# Patio space approved once again

During the May 9 meeting of the Scandinavia Village Board, Sliced Pizza owner Lisa Shirek asked to apply for the permit necessary to have an outdoor patio space on the south side of her building, a discussion that has gone on since July 2020.

These initial conversations were held due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In September 2020, Shirek asked to do this on a more permanent basis.

Trouble started in May 2022 after a survey showed the patio space may be on the village's right of way. Once this was cleared, an ordinance for patio space was to be approved.

According to the minutes of the June 14, 2022 meeting, this patio space was approved pending the village attorney's approval and installation of concrete barriers. Shirek had met all of the village's expectations, but was still waiting for the ordinance

Liability issues are also a concern.

"There is always another roadblock," Shirek told the board. "We have gone through all the asks already."

"You have given her so many hurdles to go through and she has accomplished every single hurdle," community member Carol Kraco said. "I don't understand. She has agreed to get the concrete barriers, her insurance says its fine. If you're not going to allow it, quit giving her hurdles. I don't get it."

According to Village Clerk Renee Smith, the insurance representative for the village has told the board it has nothing to worry about.

"Her insurance offered to put us on as an additional insured, which was what our insurance requested," Smith said.

According to a letter from trustee Bob Fredy, this matter was already approved last year as soon as barricades were put in

Fredy pointed out that Shirek had agreed to put up the barricade in the spring and remove in the fall, but did not pursue this last year because it was so late in the year when finally approved.

"I am all for this as long as the people are protected," trustee Becky Morgan

Morgan made a motion to rewrite the ordinance to include dimensions and barriers requirements for Sliced Pizza's outdoor dining on a one-year basis. The motion carried, with trustee Mike Hayes voting no.

Shirek also requested permitted winter parking spaces for the tenants of her three rental units.

This issue was tabled until the June meeting so that representatives from the Waupaca County Highway Department can attend.

In other business, Judy Watson, who serves as the village's deputy clerk and treasurer, and Smith indicated they will resign from their positions effective in April 2024.





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
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
