

# Meet Green Bay actress Jolee Jackson

Born in Milwaukee but a Green Bay resident since she was three years old, Jolee Jackson can say acting on stages — and most recently on the set of a movie — has changed her life for the better.

"I started acting about six years ago. My daughter was around 11 years old at the time. I did a lot of costuming and behind-the-stage stuff at the time, but I would never go on stage," Jackson said.

She said that eventually her daughter, Ritter, who was 11 at the time and had some acting experience, made her promise she would audition for a role.

Out of love, Jackson delivered on that promise after she learned of a play at a theatre in Sheboygan. "I figured a few things: one, it's far away so I'm not going to know anybody, and two, if I fell on my face, again, nobody would know me."

She booked the role and the rest is history.

"It feels like I've been acting all my life," Jackson said.

She says she loves everything theatrerelated, the scripting part, seeing the finished product come together.

One show Jackson loves working every year is Broadway Theatre's "A Christmas Carol: The Musical" in De Pere. She has also worked "Elf" around the holiday season and said that was a lot of fun.

Jackson said the change of pace from stage to a movie set is something she said



she enjoyed, and something she got to experience in December of 2022.

On December 5, she worked both "Elf" and a scene of *Room* 108 at De Pere's Wine Cellar in the same evening.

"Those are two different breeds, but a lot of fun to go from one to the other," Jackson

Whether on stage or on screen, Jackson said one aspect of acting she always takes seriously is learning her lines.

For a long time, Jackson said she would write down all of her lines for a given role over and over until she remembered them well.

"To be able to have fun with your character and make things look real, you have to bring to your character a little bit of who you are in real life," Jackson said.

Sometimes, though, Jackson said the opposite can occur, and playing a character can change you.

An example Jackson cited is acting on set

at the Green Bay airport (Jet Air hub) for *Room 108* in January of this year, wherein she played a flight attendant role and even went up in the air with the cast and crew for some scenes.

Jackson said she did not share with anyone that she was scared of flying and that she had not flown in many years.

"It was neat, we got to see Lambeau Field from above while working the scene," Jackson said.

When it comes to getting started in acting, Jackson said her best advice is to "just do it, don't wait."



# Flo Rida brings the heat to Summer Fun Days

With June just around the corner and the start of summer in sight, plans are underway for Titletown's summer kick-off event, the Summer Fun Day Showcase.

A day of activities of all kinds will end with a free, non-ticketed concert by none other than Flo Rida.

Titletown Residential and Programs Manager Jackie Krutz said providing programming like this is part of Titletown's ongoing effort to give back to the community which has provided Titletown and the Packers so much support over the years.

"Really, the history, the reason why we're here and why the Packers remain here in Green Bay is due to the community support that we've had over the years," she said. "Building titletown has been for many reasons, but one is to give back to the community and take in the goals of not only the Packers themselves, but all of Green Bay and Brown County... We're considered now the number one city to live in in the U.S... What Titletown likes to do is look at, we have so many different places here within the city that offer amazing programming, events and things to do — what can we add to complement what's already here?"

When it first started, Krutz said the Summer Fun Day Showcase was a way to give people a taste of what Titletown offers over the summer but has since grown into something much bigger.

"Summer Fun Day has kind of evolved over the last few years, really starting out just showcasing the various programs and events that we'll have here in Titletown during the summer," she said. "As the various goals within the city change and what we're trying to do and accomplish here in this area, one of the things that we've noticed is it's great to turn this into a very large concert that the community can enjoy... Chicago, the Twin Cities, they all get large concerts and many people tend to buy tickets and drive all the way down there to capture that experience. To be able to bring it here to our community and make it free is very special to us... A lot of what we do here at Titletown is free and open to the community," she said. "And in doing this, it still holds true to that goal. It's amazing for people, whether they have been raised here all the way or just moved into the city, to be able to experience something like this."

The process for bringing in artists like Flo Rida or Jason Derulo, who performed at Titletown's Summer Fun Day Showcase in 2022, is one Kurtz said involves a large variety of people.

"Every company works with their own middle agent in order to source these kinds of artists," she said. "We tell them what we're looking for and our promoter will give us options and that's kind of how we go about it. Our goal here in terms of bringing people like Jason Derulo and Flo Rida to the area is really targeting that kind of 22-35-year-old range. They're the ones that typically say there's nothing to do in Green Bay. Looking at that, we actually survey people that fall within that range. So we're working with a promoter, we get a list of names and then we pick out the ones internally that we think could be represented here and we push that out to at least 30-40 people within that age range and let them vote."

Kurtz said Titletown has been very intentional about making sure that the more underserved age groups of the community will be excited about the performers for Summer Fun Days.

"Our goal is to really enhance the experience for that age group here," she said. "There's a ton of things for families and there's a ton of things for established adults, but when it comes to the 22-35 age range, it's been pretty consistent that many will say there's nothing to do here. So we've been really intentional in ensuring that when we try to target that demographic, we really talk to the demographic about what they want to see."

Before the big concert, though, Kurtz said there will be many other activities and things to do/see around Titletown.

"Starting at 3 p.m., we have various activities that target our community in general," she said. "These are daily programs that we host all throughout the summer, so there's tons of things for families, there's tons of things for more established adults and there are a ton of things for everyone in between. So during the course of the day, we will have activities out there such as arts and crafts, we'll have some trivia, lots of food and beverages available. Fingers crossed for a beautiful sunny day — people just want to take in the sunshine and socialize and relax and be out there. We'll have everything to kind of engage them in that way... One of our big art projects that we have coming for Summer Fun Days is a very large mural that we worked with Elevate 97 on to create and we'll have the community just come by and paint it."

Attendees of Titletown's Summer Fun Days Showcase can enjoy food trucks, kids' characters, an art cart, face painting, singo, giant games, henna, a paint-by-number mural, hammerschlagen, caricature artists, photo booths and music by This Side Up, DJ Coleman, DJay Mando and Flo Rida.

# The Maid and the Socialite



A true tale of late-19th and early-20th century scandal, The Maid and the Socialite is Green Bay author Lynda Drews' meticulously researched retelling of two women's personal struggles following their mistreatment at the hands of celebrated local doctor John R. Minahan. For the lower-class Mary Cenefelt, who spent her summers helping tend her family's farm and the latter half of the year working around the Midwest in "help" positions, one false accusation of syphilis — at the time undetectable by any sort of test was all it took to tarnish her reputation, render her unemployable and force her into squalor. Mollie Bertles, on the other hand, a college-educated, first-wave feminist, fought for her dignity and autonomy in the upper-class domestic sphere after her own husband accused her of the same.

More than 100 years and four waves of feminism later, Drews' book is as timely as ever. In our age of modern convenience and heightened scientific awareness, it can be difficult to imagine how the people who once lived where we do now lived their lives. While much has certainly changed, I could not help noticing certain themes in this story that have popped up time and again in our nation's history and which we see echoes of to this day. The debate over female autonomy, the struggle for survivors of rape and abuse to find proper aid and the overwhelmingly uneven footing between the disenfranchised and those in power remain startlingly present, if lessened in form and intensity. On those grounds alone, The Maid and the Socialite makes for a fascinating read.

Of course, Drews' pacing and prose are



nothing to scoff at, either. Drews seamlessly weaves historical record into her narrative without sacrificing pace or intrigue. In fact, the tale is just as much a page-turner as any modern scandal, each new detail providing further insight not only into what happened, but why. Drews is a natural storyteller whose passion for history and attention to detail shines in each page.

The Maid and the Socialite is not a tale that ends happily for many of those involved. But in telling it, Drews places power back into the hands of the women who suffered under Minahan and the power structures of their time. "To give Mary and Mollie a voice to tell their courageous accounts was important to me," writes Drews in her author's note. As a city shaped in part by J.R. Minahan and his family, Green Bay's popular history reflects these men's accounts. In the writing of this book, Drews aims to set the record straight. May this truth set Mollie Bertles and Mary Cenefelt free.

This book is for: Fans of history, especially local; true crime enthusiasts; lovers of women protagonists; those looking for a juicy book club read.

This book is not for: Those seeking escapism.

# Kegger's and The Lyric Room get new owner and new name

A ribbon cutting ceremony Tuesday marked the start of a new era for Kegger's and The Lyric Room in the Broadway District, complete with a new owner and

With Alexander Graziano at the helm, Kegger's will now be known as Stage 1—a rebranding Graziano said he hopes will bring a new vibe to the area.

"The idea behind Stage 1 is that it is just the beginning, for us here and for the individuals who will get their start on our stage, through music, comedy and other forms of expression," Graziano said.
