# MAPS to host Facilities Planning Focus Group sessions

Merrill Area Public School (MAPS) District is inviting community members, staff, and parents to attend a series of Facilities Planning Focus Group sessions. The purpose of these conversations is to gather community input regarding long-term operational and facilities planning, the future of the vacant Jefferson Elementary School building, and potential referenda.

The information gathered during these conversations would lead to the development of a community-wide survey, which would be distributed by School Perceptions to MAPS community members in Fall of 2023. Results from this survey will be used by the Board of Education to determine support for potential referenda.

The dates for the upcoming facilities planning community focus group sessions are:

• Tuesday, June 13, 2023 – 5:30 - 7:30 p.m., Prairie River Middle School

• Tuesday, June 27, 2023 – 5:30 - 7:30 p.m., Jefferson Elementary School

• Tuesday, July 11, 2023 – 5:30 - 7:30 p.m., Washington Elementary School

Participants are encouraged to attend all sessions if possible, as each will build on the previous session's work.

# **Sealcoating E. Main St. in Merrill** delayed by one week

The dates for the sealcoating project for E. Main St./Hwy. 64 in Merrill have been delayed by one week. Previously, the Merrill Street Department, along with Struck and Irwin Paving, announced the project would take place June 5 and 6, 2023; however, this work will now be completed on June 12 and 13, again, weather permitting.

The project involves sealcoating E. Main St. from Stuyvesant St. to Memorial Dr. Traffic will remain open during the work; however, vehicles traveling eastbound on Hwy. 64 will be detoured down S. Center Ave. to E .Main St. at the roundabout. Traffic will also be reduced to one lane in each direction during the work.

Residents living along this project will be asked to use adjacent side streets and alleys for the duration of the project.

The lane shifts and detour will be put up on Monday, June 12, at 6:00 a.m. and will be taken down on Wednesday, June 14, at 8:00 a.m. Contact the Merrill Street Department at 715.536.4222 with any questions.

# **North Central Conservancy Trust Seeks National Accreditation: Public Comment Period Open**

North Central Conservancy Trust (NCCT) announced it is applying for national accreditation through the Land Trust Alliance. A public comment period is now open.

Established in 1994, NCCT is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to conserve the natural heritage of Central Wisconsin through the protection of land. NCCT works with landowners to develop conservation easements that protect and preserve the ecological values of their properties. The organization operates in an eightcounty service area that includes Lincoln, Taylor, Clark, Marathon, Wood, Portage, Adams, and Waushara Counties, and is based in Stevens Point.

The land trust accreditation program recognizes land conservation organizations that meet national quality standards for protecting important natural places and working lands forever. The Land Trust Accreditation Commission, an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, conducts an extensive review of each applicant's policies and programs.

This is NCCT's first attempt at becoming accredited, though it has been a goal for the organization for a long time. There are currently more than 450 accredited land trusts across the United States. "We are very excited to have embarked on the journey towards becoming a nationally accredited land trust," said Chris Radford, Executive Director of NCCT. "This has been an organizational priority for NCCT, and the Board of Directors has directed resources to make this vision a reality. The rigorous accreditation process has already shown incredible value in ensuring our organization is living up to the highest standards of excellence while instilling confidence and trust with our members, donors, partners, and landowners." NCCT and the Commission invite public input and accepts signed, written comments on pending applications. Comments must relate to how NCCT complies with national quality standards. # Share the road with motorcycles to prevent crashes, injuries June Law of the Month: Motorcycle safety

As Wisconsin's summer weather settles in. motorcycle season is in full gear, which means drivers will be sharing the road with smaller vehicles through fall.

The Wisconsin State Patrol's June Law of the Month reminds vehicle drivers and motorcyclists to share the road to keep all travelers safe.

There are roughly 2,000 motorcycle crashes every year in Wisconsin, involving hundreds of injuries and dozens of fatalities.

"When we share the road, we also share the responsibility to make every trip as safe as possible for all road users," Superintendent Tim Carnahan said. "Vehicle drivers and motorcyclists need to be aware of each other on the roads and look twice before changing lanes or making turns."

Motorcyclists are 27 times more likely to die in a crash than other motorists, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

# Driving near motorcycles

Motorcycles are smaller than the average vehicle, so they can be harder to see on the roads and it's easy to misjudge their speed and distance. Drivers are asked to use caution when traveling near motorcycles.

Drivers are encouraged to:

· Look twice for motorcycles; many crashes happen when drivers pull out from a stop sign, turn left, or change lanes

• Keep a safe following distance from a motorcycle; they have a shorter stopping distance so if a motorcycle needs to stop suddenly, you need more room to avoid a collision

• Avoid distractions and drive sober

#### **Riding safely**

Sharing the road is a twoway street, so motorcyclists need to do their part to be visible and follow the same rules of the road as other vehicles. Safe riding practices help reduce the number of fatalities and injuries on the roads.



Riders are encouraged to: • Avoid distractions and ride sober

• Know and observe all traffic laws, including obeying the speed limit

· Ride defensively and don't take risks

• Scan the road ahead carefully, especially on curves, looking for gravel and sand

• Do not share a lane with another vehicle; staggered riding is suggested for multiple motorcycles

Protective, high visibility clothing and safety gear is recommended and helmets are strongly encouraged to prevent serious injury in a crash. Helmets are required by state law for riders un-

# Make your summer barbecues a success

With summer unofficially underway, the backyard grill comes into focus as the kitchen stove fades into the background. Barbecues are the centerpieces of many summer celebrations, and it may have been awhile since the grill was fired up, so anyone can use a little refresher course in barbecue etiquette. Here are some tips for making the most of summer parties.

#### **Ready the grill**

If your grill has lain dormant for several months, it's wise to inspect and thoroughly clean it in advance of your cookout day. Insects like spiders may have built homes inside, and grease and grime may be lingering from last year. Ensure the grill is in top form before cooking for guests.

#### Keep food safety in mind

A study from the U.S. Department of Agriculture found more than half of study participants don't try to wash their hands when preparing food. Wash hands thoroughly to ensure guests do not get sick at the barbecue. Keep food refrigerated until it is ready to be cooked or served. Use a food thermometer to cook to the required

internal temperature to make sure bacteria is destroyed. Do not use the same utensils that touched raw meat to remove cooked food from the grill.

#### Arrange for shade

It can get quite warm outdoors for many areas of the country. Therefore, prepare a spot where guests can escape the sun. If you don't have enough table umbrellas, consider light netting or canopies for shade. Shift them as needed as the sun moves across the sky.


