



Applications will be accepted until 12 p.m. on Monday,


Selected candidates will be interviewed at the Lincoln County Service Center in Merrill on Wednesday, Aug. 2.

Construction on WIS 107 in Lincoln County set to begin next week

LINCOLN COUNTY - The Department Wisconsin of Transportation (Wis-DOT), on Friday, July 21, announced that construction on WIS 107 in Lincoln County will begin next

Work is slated to start on Monday, July 31.

WisDOT said crews will replace the culvert pipes 0.6 miles north of Eggert Dr. and 0.2 miles north of Rock Falls Dr.

Structure repairs and pavement improvements to the bridge over Joe Snow Creek and a bridge structure replacement and pavement replacement at Skanawan Creek will also take place.

During construction, WIS 107 will be closed and detoured via WIS 64, County Rd. J, U.S. 51 and County Rd. S.

Construction is scheduled for completion by October.

"The schedule is dependent on favorable weather conditions and construction progress," Wis-DOT stated.

Single-vehicle rollover in Town of King claims life of Lac du Flambeau man

TOWN OF KING – A Lac du Flambeau man was killed in a single-vehicle crash in the Town of King on Saturday, July 15.

According to a release from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, at approximately 6:48 p.m., deputies responded to the area of County Rd. A and Villa Rd. for a report of a single-vehicle rollover.

Upon arrival on the scene, it was discovered that the operator and lone occupant

of the vehicle had sustained fatal injuries in the crash.

The family of the victim requested that the victim's identity be withheld.

Speed is believed to be a factor, the Sheriff's Office said. The crash remains under investigation.

The Sheriff's Office was assisted by Tomahawk EMS, the Tomahawk Fire Department and the Lincoln County Coroner.

Supervisors approve electronic timekeeping, broadband grant resolutions

MERRILL - The Lincoln County Board of Supervisors last week gave the thumbs up to a pair of resolutions focused on electronic timekeeping for county employees and broadband internet expansion.

The board approved the resolutions during its meeting at the Lincoln County Service Center in Merrill on Tuesday, July 18.

Electronic timekeeping

A resolution given the green light by the board will allocate \$148,500.00 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to the implementation of an electronic timekeeping system for county employees, many of whom currently use paper timesheets.

In May, the board approved a resolution directing \$101,000.00 to the purchase of electronic timekeeping software. The resolution approved last week requested an additional \$47,500.00, with the cost increase attributed to areas of improvement within the system that were identified during implementation.

According to the resolution approved last week, the switch to the MUNIS program will allow for the elimination of the currently-used BAMBOO human resources software.

"The upfront purchase is

expensive, but the annual costs are covered through the removal of BAMBOO," the resolution stated.

The implementation of electronic timesheets through MUNIS will eliminate most manual time entry for 250 county employees. enable employees to enroll in their own benefits and update personal information, reduce workload and human error of human resources and payroll specialists and increase telecommuting opportunities and oversight of real-time supervision, according to the resolution.

Utilizing ARPA funds for electronic timekeeping has the potential to reduce expenditures and tax levy obligations while creating a "more attractive organization for recruitment" by modernizing county procedures, which could "potentially increase revenues through relocations," the resolution said.

"The electronic timekeeping will also help create efficiencies within our organization that reduce the county's liability, as well as allow management more effective supervision tools," the resolution stat-

Broadband grant

The board also gave its stamp of approval to a resolution accepting \$18,171.15 in Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program grant

funds from the Wisconsin **Public Service Commission** (WPSC).

The funds will go towards supporting broadband internet expansion in Lincoln

According to the resolution, on Feb. 1, WPSC established funding allocations for the BEAD grant program to assist Wisconsin counties and federally-recognized tribes to define the need, vision and strategy for deploying broadband in communities.

Later that month, the board approved a resolution declaring its intent to participate in the BEAD program, and in March, the county informed WPSC of its plan to take part in the program.

The county participated in the program collaboratively with Centergy Inc., the local Regional Economic Development office.

The resolution said WPSC awarded a total of \$100,855.75 on a reimbursable basis to Centergy Inc. for Adams, Lincoln, Marathon, Portage and Wood counties to "support local broadband planning efforts and build local capacity that will be needed throughout the BEAD planning and initial implementation period."

"Funds will support planning activities that include, but are not limited to, outreach initiatives, conducting local needs assessments and developing local plans for broadband development," the resolution stated.

Lincoln County's total share of the BEAD funds amounts to \$18,171.15 on a reimbursable basis for the period of Feb. 1, 2023 through May 1, 2025.

The Northwoods Art Tour will be held from Friday, July 28 through Sunday, July 30, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

Some of the Northwoods' finest artists and artist-owned galleries are allowing visitors a behind-the-scenes view of how their work is created. Don't miss this rare opportunity to discover where many Northwoods artists live and work, view their processes and inspirations, and have the unique opportunity to make purchases directly from

Follow the tour map and take a drive through some of the prettiest back roads of Northern Wisconsin.

At the southern tip of the tour are artists in the Tomahawk area. There you will find one of the tour's new artists, Linda DeBroux, who owns the Chapel Art Gallery and works with pottery and mixed media.


The Fifth Element Gallery in Tomahawk is also new, owned by Shayna Kelley, who is a teacher and a contemporary artist. Plus, there are the returning Tomahawk-area artists, including Lisa Krueger, a painter and Andrea Fenner, a pastel artist.

Traveling north, stop in Rhinelander and look at Betty Christian's unique jewelry designs in silver, copper and gold.

Heading north on Hwy. 17, check out Eagle River, where there is a cluster of five artists. Wendy Ahnen is an art quilter and her husband makes unique wood-turned pieces. Donna Welhoefer creates sterling silver jewelry.

"I create because it is in my blood," Welhoefer said.

Don't forget the other artists in the area. On Hwy. 70, going west, there are several more artists in St. Germain. Tamara Lauder is a potter and printmaker, who creates because it is within her. She sees art in everything. Sheri Smith is a hand weaver, who designs one-of-a-kind scarves, shawls, ponchos and vests.

Continue west to Hwy. 51 and take a detour south and then west at Hazelhurst to see Jenny Gibson's 100-year-old sock machine. Phyllis Schuit displays exquisite. quilted wall-hangings with hand embroidery, while her husband David Barnhill reveals nature's art through his photography.

Over in the Lac du Flambeau area, stop to see Christine Alfery's contemporary fine art. Christine says that creating has been a spiritual calling for her.

At La De Da Gourds, Karen Caldwell sells hard-shell gourds.

"If you come to my studio, my gourds will make you smile," said Caldwell.

First let me say, I am a lifelong Democrat who believes intensely in helping the poor, disadvantaged, elderly and handicapped. I also have been a 27 year licensed nursing home administrator in good standing. I am now semi-retired of recent.

Readers: There are a few things you need to realize. Medicare is the premium payer for all nursing homes. I would venture to guess Pine Crest does not have a 70% Medicare occupancy. If they did we would all be getting reductions in our property taxes. Medicare is good business for nursing homes.

I think the writer is saying Pinecrest has a 70% occupancy of Medicaid, the State program that helps the poor that have run out of assets. It has until recently been a losing proposition for any long term care provider. In the last budget the Evers administration has secured a record breaking increase in nursing home Medicaid reimbursement.

Sadly, private stand alone facilities such as Pinecrest have become less and less in our state and country. Facilities need a network of centers that have collaborative efforts in purchasing and economies of scale.

In the nursing home business you must have positive cash flow whether you are for profit or not for profit, except if you are government owned. In this case the tax pavers foot the bill for nursing home losses. Not considered a huge problem in years past. But now county run or state run nursing homes are receiving backlash for these vast expenditures from the public in higher taxes.

All nursing homes in the country are held to extremely high standards by state and federal statute. Bad nursing homes are punished and good ones thrive.

Pinecrest can survive and flourish under different ownership. The government allows nothing less.

Even if the writer meant "Medicaid vs. Medicare" a 30% mix of other insurers such as Medicare, insurance, private pay, VA, is very good. Pinecrest should make a profit, however it just simply isn't the case with private stand alones just not able to compete for many reasons.

I know Pinecrest is very beloved in especially the Merrill area. The taxpayers of Lincoln County simply cannot afford this. When I lived in Shawano County and this very issue came up it was soundly defeated by taxpayers and the nursing home was sold. It was a similar situation. I voted to sell the Shawano County Home.

Fueling your health with food: A guide to eating for optimal well-being

By making conscious choices and adopting healthy eating habits, you can fuel your body with the nutrients it needs to thrive. A way to improve your diet and promote healthier eating habits is by embracing the concept of eating foods with five ingredients or less. By focusing on whole, unprocessed foods that are minimally altered, you can nourish your body while enjoying the benefits of simplicity in your meals.

The benefit of simplicity

Eating foods with fewer ingredients offers several advantages for your health. It encourages you to choose whole foods that are closer to their natural state.

Whole foods tend to be more nutrient-dense and provide essential vitamins, minerals, phytonutrients and antioxidants. When you limit what you eat to five ingredients or less, your exposure to artificial additives, preservatives, added sugars, or unhealthy fats that are commonly found in highly processed products is greatly reduced.

Meal prep made easy

Adopting a five-ingredient approach simplifies your meal prep by reducing the number of components you need to prepare ahead of time while still ensuring balanced nutrition throughout the week.

Plan out simple recipes that utilize common pantry staples, such as legumes, canned tomatoes or lentils; fresh organic produce; organic or grass-fed beef, wild game, free range organic chicken, wild caught fish, eggs or tofu for protein; and good fats from olive oil, avocado oil, coconut oil or grass fed butter.

You can create satisfying meals even on busy days when you keep it simple, and always include fresh or frozen vegetables.

Aspirus Health highlights UV Safety Month

WISCONSIN - In recognition of UV Safety month, Aspirus Health is sharing information on how to be safe in the sun.

"A little sunlight is good for you," Aspirus said in a release. "Your body uses it to make vitamin D, which keeps bones strong. But it doesn't take long for the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays to start causing damage."

That damage can lead to premature wrinkles, age spots and even skin cancer, the most common type of cancer in the United States.

"Many people go into summer with the goal of getting a suntan, not realizing how incredibly damaging it is to their skin," said Nikole Larkin, Nurse Practitioner at Aspirus Plastic Surgery and Aesthetics. "In fact, there's no such thing as a safe tan, and we should be doing what we can to protect our skin from getting one."

According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), when the sun's UV rays beat down, your skin tries to protect itself by kicking production of a pigment called melanin into high gear. The added melanin provides a sun protection factor (SPF) of about 2 to 4—far below the minimum 30 SPF that the American Cancer Society

(ACS) recommends for sun protection.

"It's the added melanin that causes your skin to darken and that tan signals that you were out in the sun too long," Aspirus stated.

Reduce sun exposure and skin cancer risk with these top tips from the ACS and the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD):

- · Seek shade. Don't stay out in direct sunlight for too long. The sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. That's the time to stay in the shade. A good rule of thumb: If your shadow is shorter than you are, seek shade.
- · Put on a hat. A hat with a two- to three-inch brim all around is a good choice, as is a shade cap (a baseball cap with fabric down the sides and back). Baseball caps and straw hats offer less protection.
- Wear sunglasses. Melanoma can develop in the eyes, so choose glasses

that block 99% to 100% of UV rays and wear them every day. Darker glasses don't necessarily mean more protection—check the label to be sure.

- · Wear protective clothing. Cover as much of your skin as possible. Dark colors and tightly woven fabrics offer the most protection. To get an idea of how protective clothing is, hold it up to bright light. If light comes through, the sun's rays can get through too.
- Use sunscreen. Choose a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or more. Apply it generously to all exposed skin before you go outside. Reapply at least every two hours and after swimming or sweating. You should follow these rules even when it's cloudy.
 - Use lip balm. Protect



WISCONSIN - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and its partners are inviting the public to help search for aquatic invasive species (AIS) on Saturday, Aug. 19.

Aquatic Invasive Species Snapshot Day is a fun, hands-on effort that relies on volunteers to monitor streams, lakes and wetlands at designated sites across the state for signs of non-native plants and animals. These aquatic invasive species pose risks to Wisconsin waterways and native wildlife. Volunteers have a choice to register at one of over twenty event locations hosted by local conservation groups.

Coordinated in partnership with UW-Madison Division of Extension, UW-Stevens Point Extension Lakes, River Alliance of Wisconsin and the DNR, Aquatic Invasive Species Snapshot Day is entering its 10th successful year.

Information collected will be used to inform and guide monitoring and response efforts. Volunteers are key to the success of the event.

"Projects like Aquatic Invasive Species Snapshot Day are a fun and simple way for volunteers to get engaged and for the local site leaders and the DNR to collaborate," said Maureen Ferry, DNR Aquatic Invasive Species Monitoring Coordinator. "The DNR has a long list of sites with suspected but unverified aquatic invasive species that Aquatic Invasive Species Snapshot Day targets. This increases the chances of volunteers finding a species. Plus, each year, we make new detections."

Last year, more than 150 volunteers rolled up their sleeves to monitor more than 234 sites across the state.

DNR: Spring surveys show mixed results for ruffed grouse, pheasant, waterfowl

WISCONSIN - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), on Friday, July 21, announced that data is now available from annual spring surveys of Wisconsin ruffed grouse, pheasant and waterfowl.

The spring waterfowl breeding survey indicated stable population numbers and habitat conditions for migratory birds. In contrast, the spring surveys showed ruffed grouse and pheasant counts below the five-year average, including an 11% decrease statewide in ruffed grouse drumming

The decreases observed in the ruffed grouse and pheasant populations in this year's surveys were not unexpected.

'We are entering the down phase of the 10-year abundance cycle," said Brian Dhuey, DNR Wildlife Surveys Specialist. "It is likely we will continue to see some declines in abundance in the coming years before we start to see increases, with the peak of the next cycle likely coming around 2029, 2030 or 2031. While the number of birds detected is down overall, there will still be pockets of good ruffed grouse abundance, although these areas will be fewer and harder to find this fall."

Pheasant populations are also down relative to historic averages.

DNR reported the 2023 average pheasant observations at 0.46 pheasants per stop, similar to 2022's average of 0.47 pheasants per stop. The count remains below the most recent five-year average of 0.55 pheasants per stop.

While pheasant numbers are down statewide, abundance was markedly higher in the northwestern part of Wisconsin's pheasant range than in the central or southeastern

WISCONSIN - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is encouraging members of the public with a passion for conservation to apply for a seat on a County Deer Advisory Council (CDAC).

Each County Deer Advisory Council includes representatives from the hunting community, as well as from a variety of stakeholder groups with interest in hunting and deer management.

The application period for each county is open until Tuesday, Aug. 15.

Council members meet annually to review deer management data, gather public input and provide recommendations to the DNR and the Natural Resources Board regarding deer management decisions in their county.

Applicants must have experience or involvement with at least one of these seven stakeholder categories: agriculture, forestry, tourism. transportation. hunting, land management and local government.

"All council seats are open to new applicants," said Jeff Pritzl, DNR Deer Program Specialist. "County Deer Advisory Councils are provided an in-depth look at deer management issues and meet with DNR staff as representatives of their community. Those selected will serve for three years and, during that time, will reach out to the stakeholders they represent as they develop recommendations for the fall season framework each year."

County Deer Advisory Councils were established in 2014 and continue to provide an open venue to county-specific develop deer population objectives and herd management strategies through public involvement. In doing so, council members review and consider a variety of metrics on deer herd trends, impacts to habitat and various human-deer interactions.

Natural Connections: Learning from Banded Loons

With a dozen sets of eyes scanning the water, it took us almost no time at all to spot the family of loons. A little cheer went up from the pontoon boat when we finally got a clear look at the fuzzy chick paddling around behind their parents. Since this was the first Loon Pontoon Tour on Lake Owen of 2023, the chick was as much a surprise to me as to the participants on this Museum program.

I pegged this little fuzzball with the big brown eyes at about 2 weeks old, even though they were swimming independently behind Mom and Dad and not riding on a safe, warm back. Zooming in on that cute little beak, I happened to get the tail end of an adult loon in the photo, too. Below

all those snazzy black and white feathers and quicksilver waves, there were some other, more unusual colors, too: this loon was wearing leg bands!

Bird banding is an old, if not ancient, practice, but loon banding has only been possible since 1988 when researcher Dave Evers developed a way to capture and band loons on Michigan's Seney National Wildlife Refuge. His technique revolutionized loon research by

allowing identification of individual loons from afar, without recapture. Colored leg bands are how we know that loon pairs split their parenting duties roughly 50/50, and that loons can live at least 34 years.

A week later, I revisited that same loon family (the chicks grow so fast!) and got even clearer photos of the loon's leg bands through the crystal clear water of Lake Owen. This time, I emailed the photos to researcher Walter Piper. His Loon Project blog at loonproject.org is a great resource for updates on loon behavior, ecology, population, and more. He wrote back "This looks like white over green, green over silver. If so, it is this bird. banded in 2003 as a chick on

Wow! A 20-year-old loon, still producing chicks, 50+ miles from where he was hatched! I asked Piper for more information, but this wasn't one of the hundreds of loons he's banded. Instead, we reached out to Mike Meyer, a biologist with the Wisconsin DNR's Science Services department, now retired. Mike confirmed that "yes this loon was banded as a chick on August 5, 2003 in a loon territory on the Turtle Flambeau Flowage we termed Beaver Creek. Beyond that we have no information, that is until your observations...which is excellent dispersal data...Always nice to hear from our past loon acquaintances..."

Turtle Flambeau Flowage!"

As it turns out, Mike has many past loon acquaintances from his 25+ years of research.

I gave Mike a call last week, hoping to hear a story of the night this particular loon, "white over green, green over silver" was captured. But as Mike began describing his summer field seasons. I quickly understood why he didn't remember this individual

Each spring, Mike and his team began monitoring loons on the 50-60 lakes

in their study area to see which pairs had chicks. A fluffy little chick is too small to take a leg band, so researchers waited until the chicks were 5-6 weeks old. Then the fun really be-

Their "day" started at 10 p.m. as the 3-5 person research team arrived on the first lake just in time to use the last light to spot the loons. When it was completely dark, they piled into a small boat with a small motor, a spotlight, a musky net, and a boom box. Using the spotlight, the researchers sought out the shining white breast feathers of the loons. Then they used the boom box to play the sounds of peeping chicks and other loon calls. This brought the family close, and kept them at the surface to investigate.

You always try to capture the female first, Mike told me. "She's the first one to get outta there, because she wants to live to reproduce another day." That's what the musky net is for. Then, the chick can

be dipped up, and finally the male, although "circumstances make shuffle the deck," Mike chuckled, stating a fact of fieldwork. The loons were housed in dark plastic tubs with air holes, and everyone headed to shore where the banding, measuring, and sometimes blood drawing, could take place on stable ground.

"It's a bit of an operation," explained Mike. He had stories of skin torn and bruised from loons' strong, serrated beaks, and having to swim for a boat that wasn't pulled up all the way, and even having the sheriff called on them for acting suspiciously with spotlights at 2 a.m.

With all of this, they averaged 3 lakes per night, caught 95% of the loons they attempted, and banded more than 2,000 loons. Mike's work on mercury toxicity in loons helped establish Wisconsin's 2010 mercury

Readers are invited to submit questions about God, the Bible, and religion. I shall try to answer them for you, using the Bible as the authority for my answers.

Since the 4th of July we have been looking at the writing of our constitution. We have taken a quick look at two competing philosophies that were present in the world of our founding fathers. We have been the benefactors of their choice to follow the teachings of the Bible concerning human nature and its application to government, as it had already been applied to the government of Geneva, Switzerland, in 1541. We are fortunate they rejected the philosophy called

The foundational principles of the enlightenment was that truth can be discovered only through reason and experience, and that all religions are false. The enlightenment allowed for only one god, human reason, as the ÿnal authority for all beliefs. That same philosophy has now managed to replace much of Christianity as a guiding light in modern American culture - in education, moral principles, and politics. In some churches it has even replaced the authority of the Bible. So we may ask, "How can this happen?" It is not a mystery and God tells us in His Word, the Bible, how this happens.

The Bible teaches that all people are sinners; the only exception was Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who had left Heaven and entered our world as a man so that He might die for the sins of mankind (1 Peter 2:22-24). Outside of Jesus Christ, all people have been sinners who sin. The nature of our sinfulness is selÿshness. We are tempted by what we want (James 1:14) and we sin when we try to get what we want while ignoring the Creator's deÿnitions of morality and responsibility (Ephesians 2:3, Romans 1:18).

The Bible warns that when we do not honor God as God, we will redeÿne who God is and what He says to match what we want (Romans 1:21-32). In the end, we will have made our thoughts the ÿnal authority for what we will accept as true. The principles of the enlightenment follow the Bible's deÿnition of our sinfulness and our sin against God. The consequence of depending on our own ideas about God is that we will never know God or His devnition of morality. Instead, our favored sins become acceptable because they are what we want. Even violence can become acceptable if it gives us what we want. Human reason, on its own, has no authoritative standard by which to judge morality because its opinions change with our desires.

God alone has any real moral authority because He is the Creator of all things and He never changes. His deÿnitions of morality and responsibility are consistent where human reason, base on personal desires, can never be.

Di†erent religions encourage di†erent forms of government, and the teachings of the New Testament have a history of encouraging the formation of democracies with political freedom and personal responsibility in the cultures they have in uenced - including our own. It is the rejection of God that brings despotism, as the last century has shown us.

Perfection and Mercy

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus utters one of the most awesome sentences ever recorded in spiritual teaching. He said:

You, therefore, must be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect. (Matt 5:48)

I have known many people over the years of my life. Most have been hard working folks of honest integrity who loved their families and did their best to build a good community to live in. Some were artist of exceptional talent who enriched the lives of others by their endeavors. 
Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy. (Matt 5:7)

emission reduction rule coal-burning power plants. Banded loons have contributed immensely to our knowledge of their population dynamics. migration, threats they face on their summer breeding grounds, and more. "Loons are biosentinels of lake health," Mike told me. "If you have loons on your lake, you're doing it right."

I wonder if "white over green, green over silver" remembers that dark night 20 years ago when he first met Mike Meyer. Probably not. But as part of the valuable long-term research on banded loons, both Mike's and the loon's contributions to science will be remembered for decades to come.

Similarly, wood duck populations decreased from 2022, although populations remain above the long-term average. The survey team also reported average to above-average wetland conditions across the state during the survey

estimated Surveyors the state's breeding duck population at 545,065 birds. a 3.5% decrease from the 2022 estimate, yet 23.4% over the long-term aver-

Canada goose numbers are also slightly lower than 2022, yet remain 58.4% higher than the long-term

Conversely, DNR's annual breeding waterfowl survey showed stable numbers for mallards and blue-winged teal, two of the state's primary breeding waterfowl. Highly

pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) has not shown any measurable impacts this year on waterfowl populations at a statewide or continental scale, and we had excellent nesting conditions immediately after the survey. The dry conditions during the brood


rearing period have not seemed to negatively impact brood success based on staff feedback.
