Reflections on the water

New exhibit at newARTSpace examines human impact on Green Bay's estuary

A new pop-up exhibit will open at newARTSpace in De Pere on Friday, Aug.4, featuring artwork by photographer Collette LaRue designed to prompt viewers to reflect on the waters surrounding the area and the impact humans have had on them.

"It's called Watermarks," LaRue said.
"It's a double reference to how images are marked so people know that they're copyrighted... and the name is a reflection of the human imprint on the Green Bay estuary."

The project, LaRue said, was not only made possible, but also inspired by an award she was granted, named for Jerry Dell, former UW-Green Bay professor, photographer and artist.

"This project stemmed from a scholarship award I received at UW-Green Bay," she said. "It's called the Jerry Dell Award. The specific focus of the award was capturing the human imprint on the Green Bay estuary. I was a student at UW-Green Bay



for years studying photography and, in that time, I earned several other awards. I started studying the estuary and I learned that it's the largest freshwater estuary in the world."

When she started working on the exhibit, LaRue said the significance of Green Bay's National Estuarine Reserve System was

something she knew she wanted to focus on.

"I thought it was just amazing that we live on the shores of this amazing, estuarine resource," she said. "I wanted to celebrate that. So I started into this project trying to think about how to approach this, because we all know about the negative things that have happened, but our human impact's also now a lot of preservation and conservation... Our human imprint has been positive, so it's a story of the human impact having an influence and direction."

To tell that story, LaRue said she has incorporated historical artifacts related to the areas she photographed.

that I took from 2020 to 2023, just to kind of juxtapose the history with the present," she said.

The history and present state of the estuary and surrounding areas is something LaRue said she didn't know much about until she started studying photography at UW-Green Bay.

"I was a marketing/communications professional for years and after our four children graduated and moved out of the house, I started studying photography and Spanish and I really enjoyed both of them," she said. "I study at UW-Green Bay, which gives me so many opportunities... Until







I started actually studying the estuary, I really had no idea of the impact that UW-Green Bay and UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee had on the preservation. That affects every person in the community."

Despite affecting the community, LaRue said the value of the estuary and the university's role in preserving it is something many members of the community — herself included — do not fully realize.

"I live right on the shores of the bay," she said. "I live right there, and the whole time, I thought I understood it. But the deeper I get into this, the more I understand how important the UW System is to the preservation and reclamation of the water."

With her exhibit, LaRue said she hopes to share that importance with the community and show viewers the importance of the areas she has photographed.

"What struck me is everyone thinks of Green Bay and they think of the Packers, which is super fun and it's something that brings the community together and that's a very positive thing, but we also have this

estuary that's a natural resource and that brings people together, too," she said. "I'd like to see more people using it and more people understanding it. I want the younger people to be exposed to it and understand its treasure. They will be the guardians, the directors moving it into the future."

If people could take only one thing away from her exhibit, LaRue said she hopes it would be an increased appreciation for the beauty and significance of the natural resource which residents of the greater Green Bay area have access to.

"Green Bay sits on the shores of the largest freshwater estuary in the world," she said. "The Great Lakes comprise something like 23% of all of the freshwater in the world, and in a time of extreme climate change and water shortages across the United States and world, we are so extremely fortunate to have this resource right at our shores. That's what I want people to know

— how the Green Bay is really our identity and we have this amazing resource."

LaRue's exhibit will open at newARTSpace on Friday, Aug. 4, from 4-8 p.m. and will remain at the gallery through Aug. 15.



The Cool Bus delivers sweet treats and smiles

There's a new source for sweet treats on the street — The Cool Bus, owned and operated by Pulaski's Jenny Hanson.

While Hanson knew she wanted to do something ice cream-related, she said the smiles an ice cream truck brings to people of all ages are what pushed her to take her business to the road.

"It's something that brings joy to not only the children, but it also brings a lot of joy to the older crowd," she said. "Not everybody gets to see an ice cream truck anymore. I live in Pulaski, so nothing is out there. We were going to open an ice cream shop and we were like, 'Well, why don't we just drive it around?' And then we found a bus and made it into an ice cream truck."

Since making that decision, Hanson said the experience of owning and operating an ice cream truck has exceeded her expectations — and brought up fond



memories of the past.

"It's actually more exciting than I thought it was going to be, just because I get to see the joy of all the kids running through their yards and stuff," she said. "It brings back a lot of memories from when I was a kid. I actually grew up in Allouez and Thibbys was always the ice cream truck that came by. I wanted to be that person that got to bring joy to our small town."

Not only does Hanson get to bring joy to others, but she said being able to run The Cool Bus with her kids brings her joy as well.

"I've been a stay-at-home mom for like eight years," she said. "So to be able to do something with our kids, like our boys usually run the bus, they're 17 and 13, and then the little one, she's my sticker queen, they get to help out a lot and get to build skills, it's fun... We used to play store at home, and now it's like a little mobile store that they're running."

Only a couple months into ice cream truck ownership, Hanson said business has been good and some fan favorites have already emerged from the selection of sweet treats The Cool Bus has to offer.

"Honestly, I love the Snickers and the Twix," she said. "Those are my top. But SpongeBob, he's the man on the bus."

This book is a collection of short historical stories about the early days of De Pere and the people who have called it home.

Volume II is a follow-up to a book of the same name published in 2006 by Mary Kay and Dan Milquet.

Volume I was born out of Mary Kay's articles in the De Pere Journal, which provided snapshots of De Pere's history.

Her "Back in Time" newspaper series, which ran from 2003-2006, also provided a foundation for Volume II.

The book chronicles the background and forbearers of village landmarks, such as the Union Hotel and Seroogy's.

Milquet also spotlights multiple pioneers and provides genealogical information for about 20 families, while sprinkling tidbits of some interesting events that shaped the past lives of local residents.


Among the pages are stories of struggles, opportunities and new beginnings, as well as tales of chance.

In one chapter, Lucy Williams recounts her family's relocation to De Pere in the

On April 1, 1847, Lucy and her husband, Dr. Abiather Buck (A.B.) Williams left Belvidere, Ill., to seek a new home.

Upon starting their trip, the couple needed to decide whether to head to Chicago or Fond du Lac.

"The advantages of the latter place were being noised abroad over the country, and the doctor was in favor of settling there. But



I preferred Chicago," her memoir stated.

"To settle the question, he decided to give the horses the rein at the junction of the two roads and let them choose the course."

Milquet's books will provide an entertaining read for those with ties to the city of De Pere.

Those not from the area will learn a great deal about its history and family connections.

Milquet is currently working on a third book, which she hopes to be published next year.

Cycling Brews open now in De Pere

For Fox River Trail travelers and beer enthusiasts alike, there's a new business in De Pere that's not to be missed.

Cycling Brews, owned and operated by Josh Smits and Steve Beckett, celebrated its grand opening just three weeks ago, but the pair said opening a taproom is a dream they've been working on for much longer.

"A couple years ago we were at The Brewing Projekt in Eau Claire and we had been to a couple breweries that day," Smits said. "We were looking around like 'We can do this. We'd like to start something like

this.' We know we can't brew beer... so we were like 'Let's open a taproom.' From there, the discussion started."

With both Beckett and Smits being survivors of lymphoma, Beckett said it was an easy decision to take the leap, leaving their careers in healthcare and IT to pursue a passion. "We both agreed that life was too short to just not do something we wanted to do," Beckett said. "So that helped us take the risk. We figured, as cancer survivors, what's the worst that can happen at this point? So we took the chance on it and so far, so good."

Smits added that the support they received from

their families also aided in their ability to take a chance on the new business.

"Our wives were also behind us and helped a lot," Smits said. "This was not a decision to make without their support."

Once the decision to open a taproom had been made, Smits said deciding what, and how many, beers they would serve was the first thing on the agenda.

"First off we thought, 'Let's do all local beers," Smits said. "We figured out the 11 local breweries, and then it became 'Well, okay, how many taps do we need based off of that?' We started off with 22 - two beers from each brewery. And then we were like 'Well you have to have room for other Wisconsin breweries.' And then we were talking about intruders from other states and we finalized ourselves at 36."

Working with the local breweries, Smits said, has been a smooth process.


"The brewery community has been really helpful," Smits said. "We met with all 11 breweries. Our plan is more to highlight them than to take away business from them. They were all very receptive."

When it came to finding a location, Beckett said Cycling Brews' home, located at 1109 Honey Ct. in De Pere, was found "by dumb luck."

"We had two other locations that we were looking at that both fell through just due to construction or the cost involved," he said. "I was online looking to see what other commercial real estate was out there and this was listed for a day.

I think within a week we were in here for the first time walking through it. And we both kind of agreed that this would be the spot... We didn't have much to do construction-wise. We took out a few walls, filled in a few doors and then just finished off all the openings."

Smits said the location puts the taproom right in the middle of the Fox River Trail, making it an easy stopping point for those traveling along it.

"What's nice is we're about halfway to Ledgestone Winery and about eight miles to downtown Green Bay and right off the trail," Smits said. "So we're a nice midway stop."

When looking for a name for the taproom, Beckett said it was important to both he and Smits that the business' proximity to the Fox River Trail and the cyclists who utilize it would be incorporated.

"We knew we wanted something kind of like Bikes and Brews, but that was already taken as an event name," Beckett said. "We just kept going around with other words for biking and settled on cycling."

From there, Beckett said the name played a part in influencing the business model for Cycling Brews as well.

"And once we had Cycling Brews, we also decided that if we're going to have that as our name, let's cycle through the beers that we have on the 36 taps," he said. "So no staples, no one brewery is always going to be in the same spot. It's just whatever we get, we'll put on."

To help keep track of all those taps and the different types of beer being swapped in and out, Smits said the taproom utilizes a new piece of technology — a digital pour system.

"We have a digital pour system," he said. "We're one of currently 10 places in Wisconsin that have that. The next two closest locations are Milwaukee and/or Madison. It keeps track of the keg levels and shows you the type of pour, what it is, where the brewery is from... It gives you information and then we can easily, when a keg kicks, swap it out, put the next one in and move on — keep rolling along."

With the digital pour system in place, Beckett said it is easy for not only he and Smits to see what's on tap and what's running low, but also customers.

A listing of the beers currently on tap, and how much is left of each one, can be found on Cycling Brew's website, cyclingbrews.com.

"The system updates to the minute with the app, the website and the display board," Beckett said. "It's all connected."

Not even a month since opening the doors to Cycling Brews, Beckett said that system has been put to the test as more than three dozen kegs have already been finished off and swapped out for new beers.

"In the three weeks we've been open, we've kicked 36 kegs," Beckett said. "So basically our entire tap system."

Beckett and Smits said that business has been good since Cycling Brews opened, and noted that soon, beer won't be the only thing drawing people in.

"We've got our first musical performance this Friday — Matt Stillwell from Tennessee will be here," Smits said. "We have other events planned and we have things we've talked about and different things that we'll incorporate as time goes on, but we need to get our feet underneath us first before we start jumping into that. We've had people ask us about mug clubs. They've asked us about having bags events. They've asked us about having trivia. It's all stuff that we want to do, we just have to figure out how it all works." 🖙
