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Judge sends Zelenski to prison for life

COUNTY - Judge Raymond Huber sentenced William Zelenski to life in prison Friday, July 28.

Zelenski will become eligible for parole after he serves 35 years.

Huber said eligibility does not guarantee that Zelenski will actually be paroled. Family, friends and law enforcement will have an opportunity to testify at a parole hearing 35 years from now before a decision is made to release him from prison or not.

When he comes up for parole, Zelenski will be 82 years old.

A jury convicted Zelenski of first-degree intentional homicide on June 23 after a weeklong trial.

Zelenski killed Ryelee Manente-Powell with a 12-gauge, double-barrelled shotgun. The victim was 18 and the father of a 2-year-old son at the time of his death on the night of Oct. 19, 2020.

Four days before the shooting, Manente-Powell and a friend stole several exotic reptiles from Zelenski's rural Waupaca home.

"You don't bring a gun

to a fist fight," Huber said when weighing the three factors he must consider prior to sentencing.

Those factors are the gravity of the offense, the character of the defendant and the protection of the community.

"There is no more serious offense than intentionally taking the life of another," Huber said.

Huber said it was a cause for concern that Zelenski confronted an unarmed teenager with a shotgun, especially in light of Zelenski's training in law enforcement.

He also noted that Zelenski was involved in a similar, although not fatal incident while he was a Waupaca police officer.

Airport busy during air show

Sets fuel-sale record

WAUPACA - Air traffic peaked at the Waupaca Municipal Airport last week during the Experimental Aircraft Association's (EAA) AirVenture in Oshkosh, the largest fly-in air show in the world.

The Waupaca airport has become the equivalent of a park-and-ride for aviators. Like commuters that park outside of a congested city and take a shuttle or bus downtown, pilots looking to dodge the busy airspace around Oshkosh fly into Waupaca and take a shuttle service to the show.

As of Friday, July 28, 139 aircraft and more than 500 people passed through during the week. As the show ends, more airplanes will pass through on their way

NEW LONDON - Zoning Administrator David Vincent will move forward on producing a rough draft for a chicken ordinance in New London.

He proposed an ordinance to allow chickens on property within city limits at a July 27 meeting of the Planning Commission.

'We've been talking about this chicken ordinance for a while," Vincent said, adding that he reached out to other communities that already

Zelenski's character

During her arguments at sentencing, Assistant District Attorney Veronica Isherwood said Zelenski and another officer were shooting target practice on Zelenski's property.

A neighbor complained, an argument ensued and Zelenski fired his gun, Isherwood said.

During the nearly three years that Zelenski was an officer, Isherwood said he was the subject of three internal investigations, cited for unprofessional conduct, and his record included suspensions and written reprimands.

The prosecutor also accused Zelenski of being a meth user and dealer, as well as a loan shark.

Isherwood said woman said Zelsnski threatened to cut off her fingers if she didn't pay him the money she owed him.

Timothy Hogan, Zelenski's defense counsel, said Isherwood's portrayal of Zelenski relied on stories rather than evidence.

He argued that police found "not a single shred of physical evidence" of methamphetamine use in the vehicle that they seized when they arrested Zelenski the night of the murder.

Huber said he didn't

know whether or not to believe the allegations about drug dealing and threatening behavior. None of the people who reported them testified at the hearing about their experiences and Huber did not consider them to be reliable witnesses since many had

Huber noted that Zelenski had some positive characteristics, such as his love of animals and his efforts to help zoos deal with troublesome animals.

them as a "rogues gallery."

The judge also spoke of a drug court participant who described Zelenski as having a positive influence on

"Mr. Zelenski appears to demonstrate true remorse," Huber added.

Huber also questioned Zelenski's claim that he was motivated by his concern for the animals that Manente-Powell stole from him.

The judge noted that after Zelenski learned where the animals were located, he did not contact police or go to the home where the animals were located. He went to the home where he believed Manente-Powell was headed.

Noting that Zelenski's vehicle was loaded with "a plethora of weapons," Huber said much of Zelenski's "story doesn't make a lot of

Vincent said New London's chicken ordinance could have restrictions that a chicken house be located at least 20 feet away from the property line. The 20-foot setback would allow most property owners in the city to have chicken houses because the average lot size is 60-feet by 120-feet.

have chicken ordinances.

"I talked with the chief of police for Clintonville. He said they have had no problems whatsoever."

Clintonville passed an ordinance to allow residents to keep chickens in the city in July 2014.

Vincent distributed a copy of Menasha's chicken ordinance to members of the New London Planning Commission prior to the July 27 meeting.

He said Menasha city staff have heard no complaints regarding chickens since their ordinance passed.

"I have a question as to where this is coming from," commissioner Susie Steingraber said. "Is it something that we already have and that we want to control what we already have or is this something that we feel we need to have because you're getting requests for it?"

"We are getting quite a few requests," Vincent replied. "It is a trend that seems to be kind of taking over this area. Most of the outlying villages and stuff are adopting some type of chicken ordinance."

Vincent said chicken ordinances vary, with some



their backyards.

municipalities setting limits on the number of chickens, prohibiting roosts and requiring minimum setbacks from property lines.

"We've got them in the neighborhoods now," he said. "I know of at least five or six places that either have had them or do have chickens."

"I've had four different families just from my district contact me," Ald. BaLynda Croy said "They are not in favor of having chickens next door. They're noisy, stinky, their feathers, everything goes everywhere."

"Three chickens in a back lawn in a chicken house aren't going to be smelly," commissioner Jeff Handschke said. "I think those people are thinking about farms where there are a couple hundred, couple thousand (chickens). As far as noise, you're going to have a lot more barking dog complaints than you are clucking chicken complaints. Chickens are very, very quiet unless you

have roosters."

If the city decides against allowing city residents to have chickens, Vincent said he would be ready to enforce the ordinance, although he expressed some reluctance.

"I've got enough on my plate without being a chicken sheriff," he said.

Steingraber suggested the commission revisit the ordinance in six months.

"I think we need to act on this," Mayor Mark Herter said. "This is going on our second summer of discussing it."

City Administrator Chad Hoerth explained the history of New London's ordinances regarding chickens within city limits.

He said the city interpreted the municipal code to allow up to two chickens on parcels within the city.

However, a new city attorney reviewed the ordinance and found that it only applied to parcels that were zoned agricultural.


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

Standing on corner with a cross

WAUPACA - Two and half years ago, Tedd Lees asked the Lord: "What am I doing? Am I some kind of

He was standing near Burger King with a wooden cross. He felt the spirit of God was sending him out as a reminder.

Within 10 minutes, a woman pulled up in a white van, rolled down her win-

dow and started crying. 'Thank you for reminding me," she said. When he got home later that day, a government official that he knew left a voice message

"I saw you and I want to thank you for reminding me," he said.

"Since that day, I go out three or four times a week, an hour or two at a time. I can't wait to see what happens next. Once you take the cross off the building, it starts speaking and it says things I could never say as a minister," said Lees who is a nondenominational minister, a Waupaca resident and the former owner of The Paint Store.

He has six spots in Waupaca and has stood with his cross in every town in Waupaca County.

Lees has two crosses. One is light weight and made of wood paneling. The other is heavy and made of black cherry that he harvested from a fallen tree in his yard. He built it with a hinge so it can fold up and he can load

it in the back of his truck.

He stands with his cross in all seasons. In the winter he wears a furry trapper's hat.

'There's no bad weather, just bad clothes. You're either ready for it or you're not," said Lees.

He was standing on the corner of South State and School street, across from the Waupaac Recreation Center. People honked and waved to him. A man stumbled across State Street and approached Lees.

"Is there any way you got two dollars?" asked the man, slurring his speech.

"I already told you man, I'm not going to give you two dollars because you don't need two dollars. You

need to go home before the police come and get you," said Lees as he put his hand on the man's shoulder.

The man laughed at the mention of the police.

"Are you hearing me? Now go home before you get in trouble. Go home and take a break. The next time you see me, I'll talk to you when you haven't been drinking," said Lees.

The man walked back across State Street toward the Marathon gas station to the Northland Liquor Store. Five minutes later, a Waupaca police squad car rolled up and an officer approached

Local barbecue kept real

WAUPACA – Ed Klinger opened a restaurant during the Covid pandemic and it actually worked out for

Klinger owns the Moose Inn supper club in Wautoma and through that he started a catering business. When a Wautoma venue opened up four years ago, he opened Klinger's Real BBQ.

"We opened that right during Covid," said Klinger with a big laugh. "In hindsight, with our concept of food and how we serve people and our outdoor atmosphere over there was a perfect storm during Covid. People weren't eating inside. I think barbecue people are a little more resilient. Ît's not like my supper club that really suffered. This was a little more casual atmosphere so they liked going to a counter and your food is put to-gether and then went to sit outside," said Klinger.

The Wautoma location has seating for 150 people with a covered patio.

"The timing worked out. We just got lucky. That concept took off and people loved the product," said Klinger.

He doubled down and opened a Waupaca location on N2826 County Trunk QQ this spring. His son Spencer is the co-owner.

Right along the road is their smoker in the form of 1966 cabover Freightliner. It was made by a childhood friend of Klinger, John Wenniger of Wenninger Auto in Wautoma.

The truck looks like it is a tanker but the tanker is the offset smoker. The firebox is in back and it is mostly loaded with oak. Some hickory is used for seasoning the briskets. The meat is loaded onto racks on the side of the tanker and the smoke passes up and over the meat and out two smokestack pipes near the cab of the truck.

While driving down County QQ, it looks like exhaust is coming from the truck. People stop to take

Near the smoker truck is a trailer loaded with oak firewood. Between both

barbeque restaurants they will use 44 cords of wood per year. It takes 15 hours to smoke brisket. Pork butts are cooked overnight and ribs are cooked throughout the day as they take three to four hours.

Local ingredients

As for the name, Klinger's Real BBQ, the "real" part comes from using wood and keeping the ingredients simple.

Klinger became interested in barbecue and smoking meat through his grandfather. He was a hunter and angler and Klinger remembers him smoking salmon on Weber grill.

"I've always liked cooking with fire. At my supper club I always love running the grill. Smoking meat has always been a passion of mine. I'm an old kettle guy and I love the indirect heat concept. I still do it with wood and charcoal at home," said Klinger.

"I've always said food has gotten complicated over the years. People don't just want hamburger anymore. They want a burger with 30 different ingredients on it. I like taking things back to the basics like our brisket. It's a salt and pepper rub. For our ribs there are about seven different ingredients that go into the rub. It's something that we make inhouse. It's simple and anyone can do it and I'll give you the recipe if you want it," said Klinger.

from 6:30-7:30 p.m. Thursdays.

He sources potatoes from a friend in Waushara County. For potato salad, they boil them, add salt and pepper and add eggs, celery and Hellman's mayonnaise.

"I'm big on less ingredients but really quality ingredients. Everything here fresh is the key," said Klinger.

They use 1,000 pounds of baby red potatoes each week.

Their main meat supplier is Stoneridge in Wautoma. Flyte Family Farms is the produce supplier. Star Dairy in Weyauwega provides the cheese curds.

They feature beer from Knuth Brewing, produced by fellow who was born and raised in Wautoma and runs a brewery in Ripon. They have Central Waters, New Glarus, Leinenkugel's and other Wisconsin-based beers except for Shiner Bock, a Texan beer that goes well with barbeque.

On the menu is brisket, pulled pork, ribs, chicken and smoked sausage and the sides are classic barbeque fare including collard greens and cheddar jalapeno grits - something not easily found on Wisconsin menus. Klinger suggests trying a Texas Twinkie: a jalapeño pepper wrapped with bacon and stuffed with brisket, sautéed garlic and onions cream cheese and cheddar and then cooked in the smoker.

They are open from 10 .m. to close Wednesday through Sunday.

Black Hawk lands in Embarrass

EMBARRASS - Visitors to the Embarrass Fun Daze had the opportunity to view a UH-60 Black Hawk helicopter up close and talk to the crew who flew it to the July 29 event.

The Black Hawk landed in an open field behind the Embarrass Fire Department, which organized the event.

Once it landed and was secured, attendees were allowed to view the helicopter up close and climb inside.

Chief Warrant Officer 3 Scott Kramer told the Clintonville Tribune-Gazette that the four-member crew manning the Black Hawk came from a couple of different units that are part of the Wisconsin Army National

He said Black Hawk helicopters were first introduced in the early 1970s, and the one that was in Embarrass was a 1989 model.

"They're still making brand new helicopters for Black Hawks, but they've been around for over 50 years," Kramer said.

The Black Hawk that was in Embarrass, is and has been, used in duty, Kramer said.

"This aircraft will go overseas, wartime environments, stay here in the United States for domestic operations in states of emergency, as well as continuation of training for our folks, and community involvement as well," Kramer said.

Regarding community involvement, like the Fun Daze in Embarrass, Kramer said they usually do a couple a month.

"What I really like about the community type stuff is all of our crew members, mechanics, flight crew members, our maintenance people, we're all from the local community," he said. "I live in West Bend. The other folks live in the Fox Cities area and Milwaukee. So, we're part of these communities as well. Being able to come and bring some really, cool pieces of equipment out to local communities

is really fun. It's rewarding for us."

He added that it is fun seeing the big smiles on the faces of children when they view and sit in the helicopter.

The pink fire truck is owned by the Sheboygan County Chapter of Pink Heals. The Sheboygan chapter started in 2014, but Pink Heals is a national organization.

"It started through trying to raise money for cancer and help," Tara Albright, president of the Sheboygan County Chapter of Pink Heals. "Over the years we've broadened our horizons and realized there's much more help needed. So, if it's a debilitating disease that affects the family structure, we will also

help that way."

The fire truck was donated to the Sheboygan County Chapter by the Highwood Fire Department in Illinois. Albright said the truck had failed the pump test and couldn't be used anymore by the fire department, so it was donated to the Sheboygan County Chapter.

We just paid for the paint job and every truck that rolls, is named after somebody," Albright said. "We were fortunate enough to name ours after two people. We have Dawn. She was a volunteer with us. She ended up passing away from small cell lung cancer. And Ty, whose wife was also a volunteer."

The signatures, signed with a Sharpie marker, on the pink fire truck are for anybody who has battled cancer - a family member, a friend, anybody who has been touched by cancer can sign the truck.

"Over time they (signatures) fade," Albright said. "We like to say it's fading into the soul of the truck and giving room to the next batch."

Superintendent to hire, fire staff

CLINTONVILLE - The Clintonville school superintendent now has the authority to hire and fire support staff in the district, and then update the board at its next meeting of any action taken.

The Clintonville School Board approved that authority for the superintendent when it met July 24.

Superintendent Kuhn told the board that he was requesting this authority for the superintendent for multiple reasons. He said many times the district needs to hire support staff but a new hire can't start working for the district until they complete their preemployment physical.

Having to wait for board approval for a new hire delays that process.

He also said sometimes information about someone being hired starts circulating in the community before the hiring is made official by the board.

"Every other school district in the area, this is one of the things the superintendent does," Kuhn said.

Kuhn added that the hiring and firing of all salaried positions and all wage increases would still need to be approved by the school board prior to those actions taking place.

Kuhn noted that if a support staff employee leaves the district, sometimes it is important to immediately find a replacement. Having to wait for the next board meeting for approval delays that process.

Lindsay Norder, district business manager, said it is important for the district's superintendent to be able to hire and fire support staff.

"If it's a position that has to do with a special ed. kid, child, student, that has it in their IEP that they need a one-on-one and we don't have an extra person to move to that position that is already employed by us, and we have to hire somebody, legally, we have to have them here the first day that student's here," Norder said. "We can't wait until the next board meeting for that person to be approved because that IEP is a legal contract." School Board President

Ben Huber reiterated that most area school district allow this authority to their superintendent.

Skate park to be relocated

of room at that location for the skate park equipment. He added that a border

could be painted around the equipment so people don't park in that area. Council President Tammy

Strey-Hirt asked if there are any concerns about that location since it is close to the river that flows through the park.

"I've never seen that parking lot flood," Mc Auly said. Mc Auly said most of the flooding occurs in the center

of the park. "I don't see an issue (with flooding)," Mc Auly said. Since the area is already

paved, Mc Auly said the city wouldn't have to create a surface for the skate park.

Change of plans
In a July 27 memo to the Parks and Rec Committee,

Mc Aly said that after another visit to the site approved for the skate park, it was "decided that for long term reasons it would make more sense to pour a new concrete pad just West of the warming house. This will give skaters a better surface area for years to

Mc Auly said he will seek council approval for this, with the funds coming from the sale of the Armory building to Clintonville Utility.



Main Street building to be razed

Danger of 'imminent collapse'

WEYAUWEGA - The common council voted to raze the building at 118 E. Main St. during a special meeting on Monday, July 31.

All council members voted yes except for Tim Litscher who abstained. He owns the building next door and they share a wall. He estimated that it might cost him \$25,000 in electrical, masonry and roof work.

The meeting was a full house and 26 people were in the audience. During the public comments period, many people asked questions and some addressed the council at the podium.

Richard Rupno owns the building that is home to the Weymont Food Pantry and he is a keen observer of the older buildings on Main Street. He suggested to the council that if razing was an option, then why not also consider a renovation option.

"I just wish that if council decides to take action tonight and request bids for razing the entire building, then they simultaneously ask for bids for repairing that south façade because I strongly feel that would be cheaper in the long run and better for the city of Weyauwega if that building were to remain," he said.

Kim Rogers, president of the Weyauwega Chamber of

Commerce, told the council, "That was where my dentist was when I was in kindergarten. It's a beautiful building and if we could save it and do something to stop the crumbling of the south side and try to preserve it for our character and some city pride—that would be worth trying," she

There was a sobering moment when Craig Kubiak of Amundsen Davis, the city attorney, took the podium. He cited the architectural report and the message was clear: to pass a resolution to authorize him to go to court to get an order to raze the property.

"That does not preclude

someone coming in and rescuing but we can't wait much longer," he said.

Citing the report, Kubiak said, "The building is in dire shape and definitely a danger to the citizens. I expect more bricks and stones will continue to fall and the front wall is in danger of collapse."

He also cited other issues from the report and also from the building inspector: mold façade. There will be no bidding

and deterioration on the inside, asbestos is present and repairs involved much more than tuck-pointing the south

process because of the urgent

emergency situation. Kubiak

said the process must be "done in days, not weeks." He said the contractor must have insurance or post a bond and take full responsibility for the demolition work.

Kubiak reiterated that the safety of Weyauwega citizens is of utmost importance and "We've got an architect's report saying 'imminent collapse."

At 118 E. Main St. more bricks and rock have fallen onto the sidewalk and the protective barrier on the sidewalk now extends past the curb. The front door is boarded up. Up near where the building adjoins the roof of Litscher's building, more loose bricks teeter and lean towards the

Paying for the razing of the building will go to the property owners and will be charged to them on their taxes.

"We have the ability to go after the owners. There is already a judgment against them," said Kubiak.

The title holder is a defunct corporation that was administratively dissolved as of 2012, yet someone continued paying property taxes and utilities on behalf of the dissolved corporation. The registered agent of the corporation is deceased. Eventually, the city tracked

down the Bennett siblings of Chicago that were successor to the defunct corporation. For years, they did not answer the city complaints or correspondence until the city obtained a court order to enter the building to inspect its architectural

The School District of Waupaca announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program or milk for split-session students served under the Special Milk Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk if a split-session student does not have access to the school lunch or breakfast service.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number, program name, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, total number of household members, and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the box to the right of "Check if no SSN". Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy Determining Official, Samantha Lamers will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Hearing Official, Carl Hayek at E2325 King Road Waupaca, WI. 54981. If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact

the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 limits the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state educational programs. The team is still alive in the American Legion Class AA State Baseball Tournament, which began July 28 at Ashwaubomay Park in Ashwaubenon.



Warrant issued in county deer poaching case

WAUPACA – A bench warrant has been issued for one of two suspects charged in a Waupaca County deer poaching case.

Travis J. Vander Heiden, 37, of Pampa, Texas, had an adjourned initial appearance scheduled for July 25 in front of Waupaca County Circuit Court Judge Raymond Huber, but failed to show up in person or by telephone.

Vander Heiden faces 51 misdemeanor counts, including 25 counts of party to a crime of hunting/fishing/trapping after revocation (second offense within five years); 25 counts of party to a crime of illegal shining of deer, elk or bear; and one count of failure to obtain a deer hunting license.

He moved from Appleton to Texas after the charges were filed and has not appeared in court in person. All of his previous court appearances were by telephone.

"He was supposedly going to try to get a lawyer over time," Huber said July 25 after realizing that Vander Heiden was not going to appear. "I finally said we would send him a Dean application (for a

court-appointed attorney) and he would need to file it. Well, he has not filed it. He does not appear today. I will authorize a warrant for his arrest." Meanwhile, a sentenc-

ing hearing for the other suspect in the case, Eric A. Feavel, 41, is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 10, in Waupaca County Circuit Court. He faces 25 felony counts of bail jumping; 25 misdemeanor counts of party to a crime of illegal shining of deer, elk or bear; and one misdemeanor count of failure to obtain a deer hunting license.

Feavel, formerly of Menasha, recently began serving a one-year sentence at Dodge Correctional Institution in Waupun on an unrelated charge and originally had a jury trial on the Waupaca County charges scheduled for Aug. 10-11.

An investigation that led to the 102 charges against Vander Heiden and Feavel included six state Department of Natural Resources conservation wardens: Jeff Nieling, Zachary Seitz, Kaitlin Kernosky, Jonathan Kaiser, Jason Higgins and Mark Schraufnagel.

According to a criminal complaint filed Feb. 20,
