

Town of Bradley man found deceased in Lake Nokomis


A Town of Bradley man, 83-year-old Leroy H. Rupnow, was found deceased in Lake Nokomis about 30 yards off shore from his residence on Tuesday, July 25, 2023.

The man was discovered by law enforcement and pronounced dead at the scene by Lincoln County Coroner Valerie Caylor.

Concern over Rupnow's whereabouts began Monday evening, July 24, after out-of-town family members had been unable to reach him for more than 24 hours. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) was asked to do a welfare check on the man at his home. Deputies responded "but were unable to make contact with Leroy," a press release from the LCSO said.

"The residence and surrounding wooded area, along with the shoreline of Lake Nokomis, were searched by deputies as well as a K9 unit," the release said. "A *See* **DECEASED** *page* 4







Quad dirt track racing comes to Merrill

Northern Wisconsin Dirt Track Racing (NWDTR) held their first event at the Merrill Festival Grounds last Saturday, July 29, 2023, with an extreme sports race on a dirt track.

The grandstand arena, which is home to the rodeo in early June, horse events throughout the summer, and tractor pulls and demo derbies during the fair, was transformed into a dirt track for racing just prior to the event that drew dirt bikes and quads for the excitement of a high-speed race right here in north central Wisconsin.

Merrill Mayor Steve Hass commented that he was really excited to see this new event coming to the Merrill Festival Grounds and hopes more new events will be on the horizon so the property can be fully utilized throughout the year.

Organizers who created the event, and organized the NWDTR in record time, were also excited to kick off this event in Merrill, where it would draw racers from the local area and surrounding north central Wisconsin communities. And that it did, with 110 entries in 19 classes for the day.

Quad race events included Super Pee Wee, two Pee Wee classes, Outlaw Pee Wee, and Improved Stock Pee Wee classes for the littlest racers; JR Quad

and Amateur Quad classes; a 30+ class for adults; a Women's class; Open 2 Stroke class; two Open classes; and a Pro Quad class. Seven classes were trophy races, with six classes having cash payouts for the top racers. A peddle bike race was held during the intermission between motorized races, with a one-winner-takes-all cash payout, as well.

The event was an all-day affair with gates opening at 8 a.m. and registration beginning at 9:00 a.m., practice sessions starting at 12:30 p.m., and official racing beginning at 2:30 p.m. with a showcase lap allowing all entrants to traverse the track at slow speeds so race fans could see them loud and proud before the green flag was waved on the first race. And loud it was, especially once the full-speed racing began.

Food trucks and a beer stand provided refreshments for racers and racing fans under the stands, camping was available on the grounds, and fans could purchase general admission *See* **RACING** *page* 5

Wisconsin employers give K-12 public schools a failing grade

73% of businesses say students graduating from the public K-12 system are unprepared for the workforce

MADISON–A new survey of Wisconsin businesses paints an unflattering picture of the education system in the state. According to the Wisconsin Employer Survey, conducted by Wisconsin Manufacturers & Commerce (WMC), nearly three-quarters of businesses think students graduating from the public K-12 system are not prepared for the workforce. Making matters worse, 56 percent of respondents said they have employees who struggle with the ability to read or do math.

The unsettling new information sadly reflects the fact that more than 60 percent of students cannot read or do math at grade level in Wisconsin, a press release from WMC said.

"Not only is this new data disappointing, but it should also make all of us outraged," said WMC Senior Workforce, Director of Education & Employment Policy Rachel Ver Velde. "Wisconsin's public school system is failing our children, and it is having an outsized impact on our workforce and economy."

With young people set up for failure, employers are now having to step in to provide remedial education for workers on top of the technical training they already offer, WMC said. Forty-one percent of businesses said they have provided employees with additional education or tutoring because their K-12 education did not prepare them with the basic skills needed for a career.

The educational failures are also impacting Wisconsin's already challenging workforce shortage. According to the survey, nearly two-thirds of employers said they have reduced

hiring requirements in an effort to get more job applicants.

"Wisconsin taxpayers should be asking themselves what our return is on the billions of dollars we spend each year on public education," said Ver Velde. "We cannot measure success by how much money is spent. Instead, we need to start focusing on what students are learning and if they are being set up to succeed upon graduation."

The Wisconsin Employer Survey also asked about the changing needs for higher education. Four in 10 companies said they have removed the requirement for a bachelor's degree for some jobs that had previously required it. And 81 percent of companies responding said that more than half of the jobs at their company require less than a four-year college degree.

WMC continues to work with lawmakers to reform the education system in the state. This includes helping to shepherd through increased funding for choice and charter schools in the most recent State Budget to expand educational opportunities and improve outcomes for all students.

Additionally, WMC's legislative agenda includes:

• Expanding school choice and charter options further to provide more students with educational opportunities they cannot currently access

• Tying new K-12 funding to increased proficiency scores, shrinking the achievement gap, and other accountability measures to ensure improved outcomes for students

• Creating additional K-3 reading screening assessments to identify at-risk students and providing a plan to get them back on track

 Increasing access to dual enrollment and work-based learning programs to expose students to careers and employers at a young age • Expanding registered and youth apprenticeship programs to improve pathways to more in-demand careers The Wisconsin Employer Survey is conducted twice a year by WMC. The assessment provides a snapshot of where Wisconsin's employers stand on a number of important issues and outlines their economic outlook for both Wisconsin and the United States. Town of Merrill residents still oppose rail spur development

Despite objections, there isn't much residents can do to stop the spur

The Lincoln County Land Services Committee (LSC) met July 13, 2023, and the controversial item on the Agenda was the request to allow heavy industrial use in a general industrial zoning district, in conjunction with the proposed development of a rail spur just north of Mill St. in Merrill, on property owned by Prairie River Junction LLC (Representative: Jeff Heller), G&M Peterson LLC, and James Peterson Sons Inc. The development is set to take place on about 47 acres of land bordered on two sides by Duginski Rd.

Jeff Heller attended the meeting in person, representing the property owners, for the public hearing on the request, during which many area residents came forward to share their opposition to the development of the rail spur in the location.

However. the actual issue on the table wasn't and isn't the development of the rail spur, but rather the heavy industrial use. The rail spur can, and will likely move forward, as it is permissible under the current general industrial zoning, members of the LSC said. The only issue they can address is the heavy industrial use portion and. members of the LSC said, under the current law, they don't see that they would have grounds to deny the request.

According to 2017 Wisconsin Act 67, relating to local government's authority with respect to zoning of property, the Act requires a municipality to grant a conditional use permit if an applicant meets, or agrees to meet, all of the requirements and conditions specified in or imposed by the relevant ordinance. Further, any such conditions must be related to the purpose of



K9 track indicated that Mr. Rupnow may potentially have walked up to and perhaps even into the lake, though Mr. Rupnow was unable to be located."



Salem Gleason



Sara Gleason

Gleason, a small unincorporated Lincoln County town about 12 miles northeast of Merrill on Hwy. 17, was originally timbered virgin forest. In the late 1800's, the land was sparsely settled, inhabited primarily by hunters, trappers, traders, and native Americans. In 1880, Salem and Sarah Gleason and their four children, Minnie, Emma, James, and Frank, traveled north via covered wagon pulled by oxen until they came to the Prairie River where they fell in love with the beautiful country and staked a 160-acre homestead claim. That land would later become the community of Gleason, named after these two homesteaders who were instrumental in the community's development.

Salem was born in Ohio; raised in Rosendale, Wis.; and served in the Wisconsin Calvary in the Civil War. Sarah was born in New York and moved with her family to Stockbridge, Wis. The two married and moved to Minnesota to farm, but years of drought, grasshoppers, and blizzards brought them back to Wisconsin and family. After several years of renting, farming, and hearing about the beautiful land available to the north, the family set out together to make a new life. They staked their claim, and Salem and Sarah built a log home and a small barn near the Prairie River from the abundant supply of timber in the area. Two more children, Leona and Charles, were born.

Salem logged the land and hauled the logs to the river where they were floated down to Jenny (now Merrill) in the spring. Eventually a log schoolhouse was built and a sawmill was established. Salem and Sarah's family outgrew their log cabin, and in 1890 Salem built an A-frame house with lumber cut from the logs, built nearer to the road.

Logging brought more men into the community, and as interest in the fledgling settlement grew, Salem sold some of his land to others to build. E.A. [or C.A. (conflicting sources were found)] Berkman built a small general store in 1884 and more homes and businesses were built. In 1897, Riverside Presbyterian Church at Gleason was organized by Rev. Brown, a Sunday School missionary from Marshfield, and Salem helped build that church. He and his family became members.

In 1901, the railroad connected to the settlement, prompting the establishment of a bank by W.H. Bradley of Tomahawk, and a post office was established in 1902. The community needed a name, and the names of Bradley and Gleason were bantered about, but ultimately the residents of the area selected the name of Gleason in honor of Salem and Sarah, upon whose original homestead the community was being developed. on April 11, 1903. The survey map platted out Gleason as a town, with blocks and lots, streets and alleys. Other early settlers included the names and families of John Flynn, Andrew Bascomb, William Rice, and Robert Cumming. On May 13, 1906, St. Pauls Evangelical Lutheran Congregation of Gleason was organized and formed by Edward Schmidt, George Gerbig, William Prueser, Otto Hintze, Karl Kegler, F. Beyer, and



J. H. Gerbig. The congregation purchased two acres of land adjoining the premises of the existing Gleason Public School which included a house that served as a parsonage.

In 1911, the Smith Bros. sawmill (operated by William and Robert H. Smith) moved to the area from Dudley and continued to employ about two dozen men in season and to produce thousands of feet of lumber and lath for many years. The same owners also operated a large Deleo lighting plant which furnished electric light for part of the new village at that time. Sarah Gleason died in 1911. A church building for St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran was dedicated on Dec. 22, 1912; a new parsonage would be built in 1919. In 1914, the Gleason Telephone Company began as a co-operative, and a new schoolhouse was built.

The Estonian Evangelical Martin Luther Church, the first Estonian church built in America, is also located in rural Gleason. Some sources say the land was purchased in 1907 and the church finished/founded July 16, 1914. Though still standing and an important landmark, the building became the target of vandals over the years and is in need of many repairs. It is now privately owned and in need of volunteers and donations to facilitate restoration.

Salem Gleason, the community's namesake, died in 1916. Once logging had cleared the land, farms were established in the area and became the mainstay of the community rather than logging. By the early 1920's, Gleason also had a blacksmith shop, the Gleason Mercantile Co.'s store, Gleason State Bank, an American Legion, and other active businesses serving the members of the small community.


Today, Gleason is home to a number of different and more modern businesses more appropriate to our time, as well as other churches and organizations.

Dear Reader.

We must reflect on ourselves. We have witnessed instances where politicians misled or defrauded us, thinking they could escape scrutiny. The original Postal Act of 1792 established low rates for newspapers, ensuring that the pub-



lic remained informed about current events. However, the Postal System now imposes exorbitant rates on newspapers, making it increasingly challenging to disseminate news.

Some might argue that alternative news sources exist. However, in many areas, this is not the case. As local newspapers shut down, more communities are becoming "news deserts," lacking a reliable source of local news, which has detrimental consequences, including increased governmental corruption and decreased community cohesion.

Politicians, being human, may sometimes be less than honest, especially when they believe no one is paying attention. However, we must prevent future news deserts because local journalism provides important insights into politicians' actions and reports on all laws and regulations, including their compensation, salaries, and pensions.

I ask you to support efforts to address the challenges in the Postal System and ensure accessible local news, starting with government mandated lowering of Postal rates for locally mailed newspapers rather than increasing them as they have been doing.

This opportunity only comes along once every three years. If you are interested in getting more involved in deer management in your area, apply no later than Aug. 15, 2023.

Council members meet annually to review deer management data, gather public input, and provide recommendations to the DNR and the Natural Resources Board regarding deer management decisions in their county.

Those selected will serve for three years and during that time will reach out to the stakeholders they represent as they develop recommendations for the fall season framework each vear.

CDACs were established in 2014 and continue to

Merrill Baseball Association makes Athletic Park a little safer

What if someone goes into cardiac arrest at Merrill's Athletic Park? While one hopes that would never be the case, it's something many area businesses and even recreational facilities are prepared for, by investing in Automated External Defibrillator (AED) systems accessible to the public in an emergency. You've probably seen one mounted on the wall at a local business or church without thinking anything about it. But they could save a life in an emergency.

At Merrill's Athletic Park, an AED unit was on-site, but was originally stored in the concession stand, which is normally locked. "Throughout the spring and summer, many teams use the facility without having access to the concession stand which could be a problem if someone is experiencing cardiac arrest," said Josh Klug, Vice President of the Merrill Baseball Association.

Klug is also the Fire Chief at the Merrill Fire Department and knows how important access to an AED unit can be.

At a Baseball Association board meeting this past spring, Klug explained the need for having a truly accessible AED. measures until paramedics arrive.

The AED device is now mounted in a secure cabinet on the

outside of the concession stand at Merrill's Athletic Park, where someone can call 9-1-1 to report an emergency and then get

immediate access to the defibrillator to perform life-saving

"After last NFL season's cardiac arrest incident with Damar Hamlin, it just made sense to get this cabinet so our AED would be available to users of the park," said Shawn Schultz, Merrill Baseball Association President and Merrill Varsity Head Coach.

The \$900 investment in the specialized cabinet, which includes a security feature to prevent theft and tampering, is an investment that could save a life. To gain access to the cabinet, a user must first call 9-1-1 to report the medical emergency at the park. While emergency medical services are being dispatched to the location, the dispatcher will also provide the caller with the code to open the AED cabinet so that the device can immediately be used to help the person in cardiac arrest prior to the arrival of the ambulance.

and a light. "Now that the AED cabinet has been installed at Athletic Park, other organizations are jumping onboard with the idea," the Merrill Baseball Association said. "Merrill Fastpitch groups are combining funds to pay for one by the ball diamonds at the Merrill Area Recreational Complex (MARC). Merrill Area Public Schools (MAPS) will be installing an AED cabinet at Jay Stadium which is used for football, soccer, and track & field."

"We are proud to help keep all of our athletes, coaches, and fans safe while attending beautiful Athletic Park," Schultz said.

The Merrill Baseball Association would like to thank the supporters of their program who fundraise each year through various events, they said. They would also like to thank the Merrill Fire Department and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office for their support of the AED cabinet project.
