Kindhearted expands to meet growing needs in community

The Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon cutting at Kindhearted Home Care on Aug. 23, 2023, to celebrate the expansion of the Kindhearted facility to accommodate more clients, to meet a growing need in the community.

This expansion wasn't a physical expansion of the space, as that wasn't needed. "When we built our building in 2016, we created additional space [so we would have that available] if we ever wanted to expand our services," said Diane R. Goetsch, owner of Kindhearted Home Care, LLC.

Rather, this expansion relates to increased licenses for the state certified adult day care facility. In November 2022, Kindhearted increased their licenses from 18 to 32 participants, providing the ability to meet a growing need for their services.

We see that there is a growing need for care in our community as people are living longer, wanting to age in place, living with a loved one, and there are less resources for placement in assisted livings and long-term care facilities, Goetsch said.

"Our adult day care gives them a supervised social outlet during the day or when their loved ones are at work," she said. The staff focus on providing a positive, fun, uplifting environment where everyone feels welcome and supported, she said.

Kindhearted Home Care opened their State certified adult social center in 2012. "While caring for a client in their home, they asked about a place to take their loved one instead of having to leave their house [and moving to a nursing home or assisted living facility]," Goetsch said. That planted the seed of an idea Goetsch grew into the current and still growing facility.

Kindhearted offers a social day program that provides a supervised safe, supportive environment for adults with dementia and Parkinsons disease, elderly who are isolated or in need of social interaction, and individuals with physical and/or intellectual disabilities.

Those clients of the facility enjoy a wide variety of activities including light exercise, games, arts and crafts, educational tours and demonstrations, music, and daily community outings to go out for lunch, go bowling or shopping, and much more. Volunteers and organizations in the community provide additional experiences for day care attendees, such as bringing in therapy dogs. All of these activities and opportunities give attendees much-needed regular social interaction, along with a sense of purpose and accomplishment.



State road construction projects in Lincoln **County continue on Wis. Hwy. 107**

Wis. Hwy. 107 remains closed to through traffic in most areas as various culverts and bridges between Merrill and Tomahawk are repaired, replaced, or improved.

Crews are installing traffic control and working on culvert replacement north of Eggert Dr., then installing seed, fertilizer and erosion mat.

The project will include paving culvert locations, installing new guardrail at the culvert over Joe

Snow Creek, installing pavement markings at the culvert locations, setting up the road closure at the culvert over Skanawan Creek, and removing guardrail at the culvert over Skanawan Creek.

A signed detour is posted to route traffic around Joe Snow Creek approximately 4.2 miles north of Wis. 64. and that detour was expected to remain in place until Sept. 1.

Then, starting Sept. 1, Wis. Hwy. 107 will be closed to through traffic

and a signed detour will be provided to replace the culvert over Skanawan Creek approximately 0.3 miles south of County S. Traffic will be routed around the project area via Cty. J, US 51, and Cty. S. This detour will remain in place until Nov. 1.

The project is scheduled for completion in November 2023.

History Hunt 2023: On location with filmmaker Bill Rebane

The Merrill Historical Society (MHS) will hold "History Hunt 2023: On location with filmmaker Bill Rebane" on Saturday, Oct. 7, 2023, from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m.

The event is designed as a fun fundraiser for the MHS, and this year, the theme will revolve around the films made in Lincoln County locations "back in the day" when many of us were old enough to remember the excitement of putting our area "on the map," so to speak.

Ito "Bill" Rebane was the man behind the movies, the most famous and successful of which, the "Giant Spider Invasion" was distributed worldwide.

This year's History Hunt will focus on his work, the films, and the local locations for the films.

History combines a scavenger driving/walking rally, and trivia contest," organizers at the MHS said. "Participants follow clues to locations to learn about the history of the area."

"It is NOT a race," they

emphasize. Participants can-and are encouraged to-deviate from the route to "enjoy and explore" the places they discover along the way.

Check-in time for the event is between 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. on Oct. 7 at the MHS, 100 E. Third St. in Merrill.

Teams are required to register in advance, and registration will close on Wednesday, Oct. 4. Registration forms are available at the MHS or online at MerrillHistory. org. There is a registration fee, with a discount for MHS members. The fee includes "History Hunt driving directions, the guidebook, three raffle prize drawing tickets, and admission to the After Party," organizers said. Don't forget to give your team a catchy name.

"The minimum team size is two people, because you need a driver and a navigator, but your team can be as large as you would like."

Learn more about Bill Rebane, who came to the U.S. with his parents at age 14 and settled in Chicago, where he would later begin his film career.

In 1967, Bill moved to Wisconsin with his wife, Barbara, purchasing an old Lincoln County farm they turned into their home and Bill's film studio.

"The object of the 2023 Hunt is to find various locations used by Bill Rebane with your 3D glasses and your guidebook and then travel there to learn the backstory of these locations that appear in Bill's movies, taking some selfies along the way,' organizers said. "There will also be restaurants or local taverns who have specials for the hungry and thirsty 'hunters' along the way."

Costumes are highly encouraged. "Costumes always make the event more fun for the teams and the hosts," organizers said. "Be as creative as you can in showing off costumes of movie directors and movie characters."

At 3 p.m., the hunt concludes and the After Party begins. Here the group will enjoy reliving the experience of their day and awards will be given out for: Best Team Name, Best Costumes, and Best Social Media Presence.


PUBLISHER'S LETTER

To the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors, the employees and residents of Pine Crest Nursing Home and our fellow citizens of Lincoln County,



We are a group of people from all over Lincoln County who have come together out of deep concern for the future of our 5 Star county owned Pine Crest Nursing Home. Some of our County Board supervisors appeared to be under the belief that after their failure to pass the resolution to allow voters to decide on one option of keeping it county owned, we would go away.

We are not going away. We are more encouraged than before.

We have over 900 petition signatures to keep Pine Crest county owned. Over 120 people were present at that August 15 County Board meeting and six spoke eloquently of the economic benefits, the compassion and the moral contract our ancestors created in this community. Still, thirteen supervisors voted to deny the citizens of Lincoln County our say in this matter.

The crowd left that meeting embarrassed by the actions of the Board.

Board members were throwing numbers around like confetti. They could not even agree on which numbers to use for their arguments. At least three board members plainly stated they did not understand the math involved but were going to vote (in spite of their lack of understanding) to sell Pine Crest.

Marathon County completed an exhaustive review of their ownership of their nursing home and determined that the best choice for the county—both economically and morally—was to continue to own and maintain the best facility possible.

In contrast, some Lincoln County supervisors assured those present at the meeting they were in favor of keeping Pine Crest even as they moved forward with a brokerage agreement; they blamed other parties and previous supervisors for the problems this Board does not seem able to address. At least one of those who spoke had clearly stated an intent to work for selling or closing Pine Crest before the last election and before the ad hoc committee's report on Pine Crest's viability.

We believe, the Board is derelict in its fiduciary duties by not ordering an independent appraisal and for not performing an economic impact study on the effects of selling or closing Pine Crest, especially given the likelihood that any purchaser will drastically limit the number of Medicaid funded beds.

Furthermore, what will be the economic impact of

- Potentially shutting down or cutting back a major employer in the county and sending all of that revenue, payroll, gas taxes, retail sales and other related economic benefits to other counties?
- What will it cost the county to transfer up to 60 Medicaid-funded residents to other nursing homes in other counties; how much will it cost to maintain Pine Crest for 6 months or more of a shutdown process with dwindling revenue?
- What will be the impact of the perceived quality of life in Lincoln County? How will shutting down care for the elderly and violating the promises we have made to the residents during their lifetime of paying taxes and bettering this community affect this county's reputation and the desire for businesses to locate and expand here and for new residents to move here?

Yes, the Board might save some money short-term by closing or selling Pine Crest, but the Board has a responsibility to the overall economy of the county. They are failing in their duties to fully understand the impact of their decisions and make those potential impacts clearly understandable to their constituency.

Other counties have found ways to fund their county owned nursing homes. If our Board of Supervisors cannot figure out how to keep Pine Crest, we respectfully suggest they consult with the leadership of Marathon County to see how it can be done.

People For Pine Crest is here. We are staying and we are growing in numbers. We are advocating for the employees and residents. We are advocating for the way of life and the charge left to us by our ancestors who established a legacy through which we would care for the most vulnerable in our community. It is a battle for the soul of this county. We deserve leaders who understand that.

We rightfully demand SOLUTIONS—not excuses! VISION—not confusion! LEADERSHIP—not pandering!

SC Swiderski breaks ground on new Alexander Estates complex

On Aug. 1, 2023, the Merrill Area Chamber of Commerce and SC Swiderski (SCS) held a groundbreaking ceremony at 2015 Webster St. in Merrill, the location of the complex that will be known as Alexander Estates. (Webster St. was extended by the City of Merrill in preparation for this development and now connects Eugene St. and Alexander St., and the new complex will be located on this new street.)

Short formal ceremonies prior to the ceremonial groundbreaking included a

few words from special guests including Clyde Nelson, Executive Director of the Merrill Chamber, and Merrill Mayor Steve Haas. A large number of SCS employees involved in many phases of the project, along with Merrill City Council members, Merrill Chamber staff and ambassadors, team members from REI Engineering, representatives from County Land and Title and North Shore Bank, and special guest, Woody the Woodchuck from the Wausau Woodchucks Baseball Team, gathered along with neighbors from the area to learn more about the scope of the project.

Refreshments included donuts from Helene's Hilltop Orchard and Ana Blair's Coffee on the Go.

When completed, Alexander Estates will include nine multi-generational buildings in three different styles, featuring eight different floor plans. Some will be single level units, while others will be multi-level. All will rent at current market rates, and SCS is already starting a list for those interested in renting at the property. Rental rates will include heat, water, sewer, cable, Wi-Fi, trash pickup, lawn care, and snow removal. Altogether, the new complex will add 68 new units to help provide additional needed housing in Merrill.

Apartments will each feature a private entrance, attached or detached garage, private laundry, and patio or balcony. And, the apartment homes are pet friendly

Services are also available for area children with physical and/or intellectual disablities. "In 2013, we changed our program description to have an intergenerational environment," Goetsch said.

In addition, Kindhearted offers in-home services to many clients in the Merrill area community. "Our supportive home care companion/homemaker services assist/allow our clients to remain living in their homes," Goetsch said, for clients who need both short-term and long-term care.

Kindhearted Home Care initially began as a business to provide supportive home care services, and they continue these services as the foundation of their business today.

Those in-home care services include post-operative assistance, respite care so family members can take a break, personal care and dressing assistance, meal planning and perparation, laundry and ironing, housekeeping, shopping and running errands, coordinating and scheduling appointments, and providing supportive companionship.

In working with clients over the years, Goetsch identified additional needs within the community and set out to meet those needs. That ultimately resulted in construction of the adult social center building at 120 S. Mill St. in Merrill. "In 2016, we built a new center to incorporate all our services under one roof," Goetsch said. "We also added a Health & Fitness Center [that is] open to the public. This gives community members a place to improve their strength, balance, and stability in a clean, friendly, and comfortable environment with cardio and strengthening equipment."





THE GLEASON CORNER

Gleason Mennonite Church welcomes visitors

The Gleason Mennonite Church began in January 2001 as an outreach of the Athens Mennonite Church. Andrew Wissell and his family lived in the Gleason area and traveled to Athens to worship with their Brethen, so when the Athens Mennonite Church began looking for a place to establish another church, Wissell suggested Gleason. "[The Wissells] were instrumental as to why we picked Gleason as a place to go," said Jonathan Martin, Bishop of the Gleason Mennonite Church.

Six men–Luke Martin, Jonathan Martin, Jonathan Showalter, Aaron Scearce, Mervin Brubaker, and Burdette Weirich–and their families came from Athens to begin and establish the Gleason Mennonite Church and community under the direction of the Bishop of the Athens church. Luke Martin was the new congregation's first pastor.

The families purchased land and homes, established businesses, and planted roots that have grown deep in the community. Additional leadership was ordained in Gleason, and in 2009, Jonathan Martin was ordained as Bishop. Thus the Athens Mennonite Church became their "sister" church rather than a "parent" church.

Today the Gleason Mennonite Church is its own entity, with Jonathan Martin as its Bishop; three additional ministers—Luke Martin, Elwood Derstine, and Nathaniel See; and a Deacon—Jonathan Showalter. The church is a part of the Nationwide Fellowship of Mennonites here in the United States, and they are one of many Mennonite and Anabaptist churches and communities throughout the world.

The Gleason Mennonite Church is developing outreach churches of its own, including one in Polar, Wis. (established in 2018) and two in Uganda (East Africa). Jonathan Martin is also currently assisting as Bishop of the Mennonite church in Augusta, Wis.

The Mennonite church, as a whole, and the Gleason Mennonite Church are also very involved in missionary work. Outsiders might think the Gleason Mennonite community to be a small, rather isolated community, but they are actually actively involved with other Mennonite communities across the nation. Their youth attend camps and Bible schools in other states, are involved in mission work, and develop friendships far beyond central Wisconsin, including internationally.

A quick primer on the Gleason Mennonite Church: The faith

The Gleason Mennonite Church is a Christian faith community that devoutly adheres to the teachings of the Bible, using the King James Version for worship and preaching, and they baptize youth or adults when they themselves make

the decision to become believers/members and to actively practice the faith. They believe in a two-kingdom concept: There is God's kingdom, and there is the devil's kingdom, and each person must choose which kingdom they will serve. Mennonites firmly believe they will serve God and His kingdom.

During worship, the men sit in pews on one side of the church and the women on the other. Sunday morning worship services are two hours and include Bible study and 40-minute Sunday School for the children, interactive discussions about the teaching of the week among the men, singing (no instruments), scripture readings, and preaching/teaching. Afterwards, another hour is filled with lively conversation and visiting for all. After that, it is home for dinner where many are likely to be hosting other members for more visiting.

Except on the first and third Sundays of the month, there are also Sunday evening services, one of which is a singing service and the other is a topic evening, on a topic selected by one of the Brethren. There are no Bible studies/catechism at those services. On Wednesday evenings, except on the fourth Wednesday of the month, they also have a prayer meeting. Children attend all services with their parents.

The men and women refer to each other as Brothers and Sisters. The church celebrates communion twice a year in special services dedicated to communion and makes careful, earnest preparations in advance of these occasions.

Visitors are welcome


One might think all Mennonites are born into the faith/community, but the Gleason Mennonite Church welcomes visitors to come to their worship services, and some visitors do later become members.

All are welcome to attend and visit, regardless of ideology. Visitors will be warmly welcomed, treated with respect, and likely invited to dinner afterward, Jonathan Martin said. As Bishop, he is happy to answer questions about the Mennonite faith, traditions, culture, and lifestyle.

However, while the Mennonites love everyone, they do disagree with many emerging social ideologies and believe individuals are responsible for reconciling their sinful behaviors, whatever that may be, with God, so joining the faith requires reconciling any sinful behaviors and adhering to the tenets of the Mennonite faith as a part of becoming a member.


Turn your attic into livable space

- 3. Repair Rotting Wood or Surface Damage - Replace or repair any rotting wood with an exterior surface repair compound. Once the compound has dried, sand the surface.

4. Replace Caulk -Remove and replace old caulk and putty from around windows, sills, doors and trim. 5. Protect Surrounding Areas - Use drop cloths to cover nearby cars, gardens, decks, patios, outdoor furniture, etc. 6. Prime Any Bare Wood - Use a primer to protect and prep any unpainted surfaces where repairs have been made. A primer should also be used when painting over a dark or bright surface with a light color.

due to creosote, a highly flammable residue that builds up in the flue that lines the chimney.

Inspect the interior

The interior of a wood-burning fireplace is likely lined with fire bricks. Check for cracks and loose joints. Hire a professional mason to make any repairs, as special materials are needed to withstand the heat of fires.

Install a chimney cap and screen

According to Family Handyman, a chimney cap is a protective covering that goes over the top of the chimney. It is made of steel or copper mesh with a cap on top. This protects the chimney from rain and downdrafts and keeps animals and debris from getting into the chimney.

Prune overhanging branches

If there are trees close to the home and the chimney, cut them back, as they can be a fire hazard. Branches and leaves also can restrict the proper draft of the chimney.

Assess the outdoor vent

Gas fireplaces typically emit exhaust through a vent in the home. Remove any blockages from the vent, including leaves, cobwebs and debris.

Check glass or other coverings

The glass or face of the fireplace helps regulate carbon monoxide exposure and protects people from the flames. Be sure the glass covering is intact.

Clean ceramic logs

Gas fireplaces use ceramic logs, rocks or beads that can become dusty. Clean them prior to use. Dirty ceramic logs can be a fire hazard and produce an unpleasant burning smell.

Check the blower and pilot

If the fireplace has an electric blower, clean and dust it so it doesn't become clogged. Inspect the pilot light for any wear and tear that includes wiring or structural issues.

present certain structural problems. That means a structural engineer also must be consulted to see if adding beams, flooring and drywall will necessitate other changes elsewhere in the home to accommodate the extra load.

In order to have a functional attic room, building codes will dictate that it needs to be accessible by a full-size staircase. Also, it will need to have another exit in case of an emergency so that will likely be an accessible window, according to the home information site The Fill. Homeowner's budgets and renovation plans will need to factor into these considerations. Homeowners also are advised to check local permits to determine what else may be required to go forward. It is best to follow the rules. Lack of a permit for work can affect the ability to sell a

home down the line.

Individuals also should plan for heating and cooling upgrades as the home will need to have ductwork installed in the attic, or at the least, a stand-alone heating and cooling unit. As heat rises, it can get quite warm in an attic, so ventilation and comfort should be considered. The attic will need to be wired for electricity for lighting and other needs. Air sealing and additional insulation can the attic space more comfortable as well. Consult with a qualified electrician and an HVAC technician and have an energy audit done to discuss needs.

Attic renovations can give homeowners more space in their homes, which can be used as offices, bedrooms or cozy corners. This is no small undertaking and all of the right steps need to be followed to ensure a legal, safe and successful renovation.





CONFERENCE OUTLOOK: We have more girls out this year than last year (19 compared to 13). We have a much more eager team to learn and excel in tennis this year than




