For the 13th year, Merrill's Haunted Sawmill is drawing thrill seekers and putting on a scare with new themes focused on the haunt's infamous ghoul, Vincent Mudgett. and other popular characters in the group's repertoire.

Scary entertainment draws visitors to Merrill

"The 13th Annual Haunted Sawmill - 'The 13th Door' has started the 2023 season off in spectacular fashion. The popular Halloween event is drawing large crowds and providing great entertainment and terrifying scares for all of the guests," said Jerry Hersil, Director of the Haunted Sawmill and the man behind multiple haunt characters including Vincent Mudgett.

"Over 8,000 people regularly attend the Haunted Sawmill and come from all over the state and beyond our borders to take part in the October attraction," he said.

We have had guests from all of our neighboring states visit us," said Dick Duginski who performs each season as the fan-favorite character Buzz Buzz the Clown. "The people that love the Haunted Sawmill come back every year. We have had a family this year who have travelled four hours to get here and have made several trips from the U.P. just to see us. Their little girl came to see her favorite character for her birthday. That is really amazing and

"The Haunted Sawmill not only brings attention to Merrill every October season, it also brings money into our community," Hersil said.

"If you just look at the guests that travel to the Haunted Sawmill from other cities, all of those people are spending money in our town for things like gas, food, and even motels," said Kristin Woller who helps terrorize haunt guests as Phaedra the Vampire Queen. "We are proud to be something positive for our community that brings people

In the end, isn't that what life is supposed to be all about – doing what you can to help others and making their burden lighter?"

raised from Haunted Sawmill the poured back into the community to help area children in many ways. Recently, the F.O.V. Foundation donated \$1,000 to the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

The Scare Crew also learned about a local family whose furnace went out, who could not afford to purchase a new one.

"The people who are part of the Haunted Sawmill are truly one big family." Hersil said. "When Dick contacted Kristin and myself about the family in need, we knew that we had to help. We actually went to our haunt family and asked everyone to throw in what they could afford.

Within four days we had enough money raised to help the family purchase and install a new furnace."

"That's what Haunted Sawmill is all about," Woller said with a smile. "Family takes care of family."

"We also support the community in many other ways," Duginski said. "We have our Christmas Giving program which is near and dear to all three of us."

"The F.O.V. also has an annual high school scholarship program, supports many other charities, and funds many other events," Hersil said.

"Parents who are having financial difficulties paying for toys for their children, or clothing, or even to put food on the table, we are here to help with that, as well," he said. "Last year the Friends of Vincent Foundation helped over 20 families and 60 individuals with purchasing things that were necessary for Christmas."

"We are also focused inwards," Hersil said. "Our own volunteers have so many needs. We make sure that our own kids on the Scare Crew, for example, have essential hygiene products, or school supplies, or even warm clothes to wear in the winter. It shouldn't be that way in our modern society, but it's a reality. That is a void that we can help fill through our work with the Haunted Sawmill."

Funds raised by the Haunted Sawmill events also help the F.O.V. support a grant application process where people with children and who are in need can for assistance. apply "It's an easy form," "Families Woller said. might need help with unexpected emergencies, or a child might not be able to afford paying for an extracurricular trip. Those are the kinds of things that they can come to us and apply for assistance."



Gazebo Nights shatters records in 2023

The Gazebo Nights team is celebrating after yet another successful season of Thursday night concerts held in Normal Park over the summer.

Each week local non-profits attend the event, running the concessions stand or holding bake sales or other minifundraisers, to help raise money for their organizations. This year the following nonprofits benefited from the concerts: Cancer Society, Lincoln County Humane Society, Aspirus Merrill Hospital Hospital Auxiliary, Patriot K9's, Merrill PD/Lincoln SO K9 teams, Merrill Boys Basketball, Luther Memorial Church, Merrill Boy Scouts, Merrill Lions Club, Merrill Masons Virginia Falls Lodge #226, Merrill Dance Team, Merrill Girls Tennis, Ice Reflections and the Pine River Fire Dept.

In total, a record-breaking amount of \$19,166 was raised by these non-profits and returned to the community, according to Mike "Gus" Caylor who organizes the concerts.

He estimated more than 6,900 people attended the concerts over the course of the seven-week concert series, with the

largest crowd attending the BriTins band. The budget for the concerts also surpassed the \$10,000 mark, the first time in the 14year history of the concerts in the Gazebo at Normal Park.

Caylor credits the branding sponsor Thorogood and the numerous weekly sponsors with making each each week a success. "If it wasn't for our sponsors, we never would be able to do what we do each week," he said. "It was always a dream to bring in the BriTins, which we were able to do this year. We are already talking to a large band for 2024, and if we are successful in bringing them to the Gazebo, we feel it will be the biggest concert ever at the park."





NOTICE SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

Section 32-91, Code of Ordinance, City of Merrill

of Ordinances of the City of Merrill, any owner, occupant or person in charge of any parcel or lot that fronts upon or abuts any sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk clear of all snow and ice. In the event that snow accumulates on the sidewalks due to natural means and/or by any other means said sidewalks shall be cleared of all accumulated snow and/or ice within forty-eight (48) hours from the time the snow ceases to accumulate on said sidewalk. In the event that ice has formed on any sidewalk in such a manner that it cannot be removed, the owner, occupant or person in charge of the parcel or lot that fronts upon or adjoins said sidewalk shall keep the sidewalk sprinkled with material to accelerate melting or prevent slipping.

In addition to the removal of snow and ice as provided above, no person is permitted to push, shove or in any way deposit any snow or ice onto any public street, alley, sidewalk or public lands dedicated to public use, except that snow removed from a sidewalk in front of or abutting a premises may be deposited on a street.

Violation of Section 32-91 of the Code of Ordinances will subject the owner or occupant of the property to a forfeiture in addition to the costs of removal in the event that the City removed the snow or ice after notice to the property owner. The cost of the removal of the snow or ice shall be levied as a special assessment against the lot or parcel of land abutting the sidewalk in accordance with Section 66.0907(5), Wisconsin Statutes.

Any vehicle parked on any street or right-of-way in violation of this Section and in such a manner as to obstruct removal of snow from the street or right-of-way may be removed or caused to be removed to the Street Department facilities or other facilities designated by the Chief of Police or Public Works Director/City Engineer, or Street Superintendent, and the vehicle may not be recovered until the towing, any storage charges, and parking forfeitures as imposed by this Chapter, are paid.

The Birds (available on many platforms)

"People for Pine Crest" hold press conference at nursing home

A group of Lincoln County citizens calling themselves People for Pine Crest held a press conference at Pine Crest Nursing Home (Pine Crest) on Oct. 17, 2023, calling for the Lincoln County Board to "rescind the sale and fully fund Pine Crest in 2024," in advance of the County Board meeting that evening.

To be clear, matters pertaining to Pine Crest were not on the Agenda for that Board meeting. However, representatives from People for Pine Crest wanted to go on record in advance of the meeting that they continue to be against any proposed sale of the nursing home and they believe they represent the majority of Lincoln County residents in their position. Numerous members of the group reiterated their position during the public comment portion of the Board meeting.

The group maintains Pine Crest is "in

the black" financially.

'Contrary to what we have been led to believe, the sky is not falling. In fact, Pine Crest has rebounded from COVID and is right on budget through the end of September," said Todd Frederick, a member of People for Pine Crest.

In a press release issued earlier that day, People for Pine Crest maintain that "According to North Central Health Care, which operates the nursing home for the County, Pine Crest is running a small surplus through the period ending Sept. 30, 2023. Pine Crest's improved finances is due in part to changes in Medicaid and these changes are expected to keep the nursing home on solid financial footing going forward.'

"For decades, the people of Lincoln County have been investing in Pine Crest, and we want Pine Crest to be part of our community for years to come,"

MOVIES YOU GOTTA SEE

'The Shining' further proves Jack Nicholson holds the Going **Insane Championship Belt**

If you were to ask me what my favorite Stanley Kubrick movie is, I might tell you it's 2001: A Space Odyssey. Ask me tomorrow and there's a good chance I'll say it's Barry Lyndon. Next week it'd probably be Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb.

But there's one Kubrick film that has a critical element the others don't, which ultimately makes it not only my true favorite movie of his, but my favorite horror film. It's something that might even help it earn the distinction of being Kubrick's crowning achievement. This crucial factor is "Jack Nicholson going insane."

In Kubrick's 1980 horror masterpiece *The* Shining, based on the Stephen King novel of the same name, Nicholson plays Jack Torrance, a writer who signs on to be the over-winter caretaker of the Overlook Hotel in the Colorado Rocky Mountains while it's closed for the season. During his first visit to the hotel to discuss the job, Jack is informed that the previous caretaker committed a horrific crime on the premises, to which Jack responds with an odd level of calm. I feel like such information would give most people pause. "Hey, the guy who used to have the gig you're going for went completely berserk and did something heinous beyond belief. Wanna take his place and hang out here for like four months?" "What? No. I'm good, man. Thanks, though. Take care!"

But Jack accepts the job, figuring it'd give him time to get some writing done. I gotta tell va, I enjoy his naïve optimism. I don't think there's a single place on this planet where a writer could not find a way to procrastinate. If I were stuck in an empty hotel for several months with nothing but my laptop, I'd be counting the ice machines within an hour and a half.

Jack, along with his wife, Wendy, and son, Danny, hole up in the huge, remote hotel, and as winter drags on, the vibes seriously begin to deteriorate. Danny, who possesses psychic abilities referred to as "shining," sees unsettling visions. Meanwhile, Jack's cognitive state, seemingly affected by isolation, boredom, a severe case of writer's block, and otherworldly forces within the hotel, begins to slip. As Jack declines psychologically, he grows increasingly menacing toward Wendy and Danny. At a key point in the film, Jack, who had quit drinking a few months before arriving at the hotel and had injured Danny in a drunken outburst years earlier, bellies up to the bar in a large ballroom, knocks back a bourbon or two and shoots the breeze with Lloyd, a bartender who may or may not be there. Watching a man evidently oblivious to his cataclysmic mental break, and subsequently considering the danger



he poses to his family, is truly chilling and accentuates a feeling of claustrophobia, despite the hotel's massive size. The fact that Wendy and Danny are trapped in the snowdrifted building with Jack all but reduces the colossal resort to a single-family home. There's nowhere to run. Nowhere to hide.

Jack's descent into madness is among the most entrancing and horrifying things ever put to film, and it's intensified by Nicholson's remarkable ability to convey his emotions in a physical fashion. Nicholson has one of the most expressive faces in the history of Hollywood, and the singular combination of his eyes, eyebrows, smile, voice, and laugh - and when and how he utilizes them – are invaluable traits when he's letting a few screws come loose.

The superb 1975 drama One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest showcases Nicholson at the top of his game. Playing a man who motivates his fellow patients at a mental institution to defy the iron fist rule of a dictatorial nurse, his stellar performance is propelled by his manic physicality. In Tim Burton's 1989 Batman, Nicholson shines as The Joker, the infamous villain also known as The Clown Prince of Crime - not a description typically applied to a fellow known for Being Normal. Running amok clad in a purple suit and makeup seems like the kind of thing only Nicholson could've truly pulled off. One of the most electrifying yet mystifying performances of Nicholson's career is in Martin Scorsese's astounding 2006 film The Departed, in which he plays an aging, eccentric Boston Irish mobster. I'm honestly not sure if Nicholson's even particularly good in the movie, but there's



no denying how fun he is to watch when he's given a long creative leash.

The Shining is truly one of the greatest films of all time, directed by maybe the best American filmmaker. never-ending There's content about the film to be found - documentaries, YouTube books. deep dives, and Reddit threads covering everything from the making of the film to its myriad debated themes and deeper meanings. They're fun rabbit holes to go down and make revisiting the film very rewarding, but it's Nicholson's performance that brings me back at least once a year. With every viewing, Jack's downward spiral never becomes any less captivating; if anything, it grows even more stunning and disturbing.

When looking at the totality Nicholson's of filmography, The Shining stands out as a high-water mark - maybe the highwater mark. It might be the key movie in making the case that when it comes to just absolutely sending it, there's no one better. As brilliant as he is in more laid back or subdued roles, Nicholson's at his best when he's cutting loose, and I'm sure the only person who enjoys this more than the audience does is Jack Nicholson himself. After all, it can't be all work and no play.

From Nov. 1-30 Lincoln County buildings will be illuminated in green as a way to remind veterans and their families that they have support, and Lincoln County Veterans Service Officer John B. Olson Jr. is inviting the community to do the same.

"We encourage individuals and businesses to join us by changing one light bulb in the entryway of your home or business to a green bulb," Olson said. "By shining a green light, you let veterans know that they are seen, appreciated, and supported. "

Veterans Day is Nov. 11, which is why the month of November was selected for Operation Green Light. "In 1954, President Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming Nov. 11 as Veterans Day, calling on the nation to 'solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly, on the seas, in the air, and on foreign shores, to preserve our heritage of freedom, and let us reconsecrate ourselves to the task of promoting and enduring peace so that their efforts shall not have been in vain,"

"This Veterans Day, join us in shining a light of hope and support for over 2,000 veterans who call Lincoln County home," Olson said. "Join Operation Green Light and let's turn Lincoln County green this Veterans Day."

While the event is focused on Veterans Day and the month of November, he encourages Lincoln County residents to "continue to shine the light year-round" as a visible sign of support for Lincoln County's veterans. "Now more than ever, our veterans and their families need our support," he said. "... We are here for them."

Keep Your Kids Safe Online Month

October has been designated as Keep Your Kids Safe Online Month. It's a reminder that the online world can be a dangerous place, especially for kids.

Recently the Wisconsin Attorney General, Josh Kaul, sent out a press release focused on this reality and to draw attention to resources available to protect the online safety of Wisconsin's kids.

"Online safety has become an integral part of overall safety," said Attorney General Kaul. "Just like we talk to our kids about how to stay safe in other aspects of their lives, it's vital for parents to talk to their kids about how to stay safe online."

Financial Sextortion

The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force is warning against a current and concerning trend known as "Financial Sextortion," which is occurring nationwide and right here in Wisconsin. A common situation involves a victim being coerced into sending nude or potentially compromising images to someone online. Within minutes, the person on the other end threatens to post the material sent by the victim to family, school, or friends of the victim, unless the victim sends the person a specified amount of money according to their instructions.

This victimization has led to numerous suicides across the United States as these victims feel they have nowhere to turn, Kaul's press release. Financial Sextortion should immediately be reported to local law enforcement.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children has tools to remove and identify Child Sexual Abuse Material from common websites and platforms, the release said. Take It Down (ncmec.org) and family resources at NetSmartz Home (missingkids.org) are two examples.

Talk to your kids, early and often

Wisconsin ICAC Task Force leaders suggest parents talk to their children about online safety early and often. Parents should discuss online dangers and risks with their kids. They should also have an open dialogue about their kid's online activity, including the websites they're visiting, the people they're communicating with, the information they're sharing about themselves, and any situations that make them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused.

The Wisconsin ICAC Task Force and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction created the interact! Program to help keep kids safe online. Together, caregivers and children can go through interact!, a three-module course that has the goal of creating basic discussions about online safety at home. Each module varies from 15-45 minutes and allows parents to reflect on their own technology use and set a good example for their children. There are also activities to complete alongside their children. After the modules are finished, discussions can continue with follow-up resources.

Protect Kids Online podcast

The Wisconsin ICAC Task Force also produces an educational podcast called Protect Kids Online (PKO) that serves as a resource for parents, grandparents, guardians, or caregivers of children to learn about tips for combating online child exploitation and sextortion, internet safety laws, cyberbullying, protecting your child from strangers online, safe sharing tips, and more. 

SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER ...

Community-Wide Survey Coming Soon

everyone is aware, Merrill Area Public Schools has been dealing operational issues, to facilities addition needs, and has been unable pass an operational referendum. In response to two operational referendums being rejected last year, MAPS was forced to cut 30 staff positions, eliminate programs, reduce bussing, and cut other expenses. This summer, a favorable

State budget provided the district with the necessary funds to maintain programs and operations at the new, reduced level, and eliminated the need to consider an operations referendum for the next couple of years. That's good news.

It's important for the community to understand our financial situation, how we have responded, and the impact it has had on our staff, students, and community,



as those reductions have had a significant impact on those we serve.

MAPS also has needs in our school buildings, and since initiating a long-range facilities planning process in fall 2022, the district has been diligently working to identify the areas of greatest need to phase into distinct projects to make this affordable to MAPS taxpayers. What started as a study exploring the future of the vacant

Jefferson Elementary building led us to evaluate all of our buildings in order to make the best use of our best facilities. This study included significant community focus group input during the summer of 2023, and several recommendations have emerged from that work on how and when to address these needs.

The next step in our long-range facilities master plan is to conduct a district-wide

survey to gather valuable community input. The survey, which is being conducted by an independent, third-party consultant, will be mailed to every household in the district and emailed to all staff in late October and early November. The purpose of this survey is to explain our challenges and get community input on what to do next. Data gathered from the survey will assist our School Board in making a decision on whether or not to go to a capital projects referendum in April or November 2024the survey results will be presented to the board in December. Please watch your mailboxes for this survey and take some time to respond to the survey questions as your input is very important to our district.

If you have questions about the survey, we encourage you to attend our Community Listening Session on November 7 at 6 p.m. Join us at Jefferson School to hear about the long-range facilities master planning process thus far, and to get your questions answered. No RSVP is necessary.

Types of referendum questions in Wisconsin

There are two main types of public school district referendum questions in Wisconsin:

Operational Referendum: referendum used to fund daily operations, including programs and services. This type of referendum proposes to raise the district's revenue limit. While MAPS has pursued several operational referendums over the past few years, the budget

reductions that were made going into this school year, combined with a favorable budget from the State over the summer, mean that we will not need to pursue an operational referendum over the next few years.

Capital Referendum (debt issuance referendum): referendum that allows a district to issue debt (take out a loan) to pay for major facility improvements and is typically financed over a 20-year period. Wisconsin school districts can issue up to \$1 million in debt before triggering the need to pass a referendum. Debt issued under this \$1 million threshold must be paid off using funds within the district's revenue limit. Any other debt must be approved via a referendum.

School districts in the state of Wisconsin have the opportunity to ask two referendum questions per calendar year, whether those questions are successful or not. During even-numbered years, like 2024, there are two election cycles in Wisconsin—April and November—and during odd-numbered years, only an April election.

said Judy Woller. "To do that, we need to make good decisions as a community and that will require transparency. That's why we are demanding a full independent financial audit of Pine Crest with a public report of its findings."

The group again cited the recent survey conducted by Lincoln County's two

newspapers, the Merrill Foto News and the Tomahawk Leader, and the results published in our Oct. 5 edition. that "85.3% of the 782 respondents replied, 'Yes,' they would support an increase in their real estate taxes for five or more years, in order to keep Pine Crest Nursing Home owned by Lincoln County.'

"The County Board should take Pine Crest off the market immediately. Selling Pine Crest to outside interests is not good for the residents, the staff, or the community. It's time to rescind the sale," said Dora Gorski.

"The people of Lincoln County are united. We want to keep Pine Crest affordable, accessible, and County-owned so it will continue to provide high quality care. That starts with the County Board fully funding Pine Crest in the 2024 budget," Don Dunphy said.

- Do not bring: Illegal needles/sharps, drugs, acids, aerosol cans, biomaterials hazardous (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas), or mercury thermometers.
- Participants may dispose of solid, non-liquid medication(s) by removing the label or blacking out personal information on the label of the plastic pill container or by putting the medication into a clear sealable plastic bag. Blister packages without the

medications being removed are also acceptable.

- Liquids will be accepted during this initiative. However, the liquids, creams, and sprays must be in their original packaging. Liquids without the original packaging will not be accepted.
- Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not a part of this initiative and should not be placed in collection containers.

Here in Merrill, the Merrill Police Department (MPD) has a receptable where the above drugs may be dropped off to be property disposed of this Saturday, but also year round. Stop into the MPD office to dispose of drugs in the receptable
