Marshfield responds in big way to 'Wreaths Across America' Day

MARSHFIELD - Over 225 registered volunteers on Dec. 16 spent part of a damp, overcast Saturday morning laying more than 500 wreaths on the graves of Marshfield veterans at Hillside Cemetery.

For the first time, Marshfield was an official Wreaths Across America (WAA) location, joining more than 3,700 other locations across the country for National Wreaths Across America Day. Coordinated and led by local volunteers, groups, companies and individuals raised funds to sponsor the placement of 546 veterans' wreaths on the headstones of fallen service members laid to rest here.

"The response that we've had, I think this is going to be something that continues," said Tim Norlin, VP of Driver Employment at Roehl Transport and Wreaths Across America Location Coordinator for Marshfield Hillside Cemetery. "We're going all in. And I was just in Washington, D.C. and I met with the 'Wreaths' people out there and I told them that we exceeded our goal, so Wreaths Across America said, 'Here's what we're going to do, Tim. For every wreath you get sponsored between December 16 and when we pick the wreaths up on January 16, we will match you one for one.' So, if we can get 500 sponsors in 30 days, they'll throw in another 500 wreaths," Norlin said.

For \$17 apiece, families, individuals, and companies can sponsor as many wreaths as they wish.

"It's to cover the costs of harvesting, manufacturing, shipping," Norlin told Hub City Times. "They have a number of corporate sponsors. They actually have fundraising opportunities for non-profits. For every wreath they sell they get five dollars."

The wreaths come from Columbia Falls, Maine, 70

With members of the Marshfield Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 1866 (Mueller-Hintz Post), Marshfield High School band, and Security Health Plan staff present, SHP on Dec. 14 hosted a flag-raising ceremony to honor and celebrate a staff member's deployed husband.

"Today was basically saying "Thank you' for the flag that my husband had given my team," said Gabrial Schroeder, following the ceremony in front of the Security Health Plan building at 1515 N. St. Joseph Ave.

Early in 2023, Security Health Plan's Health Services Department orchestrated an initiative by organizing a friendly competition among its members. The purpose was to foster a spirit generosity community engagement. The challenge centered on supporting charities individual choice, encouraging participants to channel their passion for philanthropy - and in Gaby's case, honor her husband's military service at the same time, adding a deeply personal dimension to the charity drive.

With her husband, Shawn, serving in the Air Force Reserve and denloyed in Saudi Arabia at the time, Schroeder's connection to the cause was profound. In a heartfelt display of support, she and her team spearheaded a collection effort to gather essential items for Shawn and fellow active-duty troops stationed abroad. In appreciation of the donation, Security Health Plan received an American Flag that flew onboard combat aircraft.

"When you're on deployment, [it's] one of the things to say "Thank you for your support,' especially for the spouses worried about you and taking care of everything at home and all that stuff," Shawn Schroeder told Hub

City Times.
Stationed out of Minneapolis, MN, Shawn Schroeder – an 18-year veteran of the Air Force Reserve – was deployed first to Afghanistan in 2011, then Saudi Arabia for much of 2023, returning in October. He brought back with him two American flags which flew on communications airplanes during his time in Saudi Arabia. One went

to Security Health Plan. The other went to City Hall at 207 W. Sixth St., where Shawn is employed by the City of Marshfield as an IT Specialist.

"I was not expecting this," Shawn said in reaction to the flagraising ceremony at SHP headquarters. "When my wife told me that they wanted me to come up here, I was just thinking some small 'Thank you for your service.' So, when I pulled up and saw the band and everything, I was definitely not expecting that, so that's pretty cool."

"Usually he's the one that does the big deal," Gaby told us. "I am so proud of my team for supporting our deployed troops, including my husband, with this fun team-building exercise. The way Security Health Plan has honored Shawn and all troops with this flag-raising ceremony is so special. Now, every time I enter the building and see that American flag, I'll

think of my husband.' The American Flag presented to Security Health Plan included a certificate of authenticity stating that accompanying flag flew onboard aircraft under the call sign "Pack 15" that was assigned to the 430th Expeditionary Electronic Combat Squadron "Black Wolves" on Aug. 23, while supporting Operation

Inherent Resolve.

"Security Health Plan is proud to support our military and our staff who are spouses to those who serve," said Security Health Plan Chief Executive Officer Krista Hoglund. "It is an honor to receive this flag. This serves as a reminder to honor our troops and their sacrifices every day."

The donated flag is stored in a protective case and is currently on display in Security Health Plan's office lobby.




MARSHFIELD - The Marshfield Area Community Foundation and Marshfield Hub City Times are seeking nominations for the second annual "Good Heart Award."

Marshfield 150 for 150: Amber Kiggens-Leifheit

NOMINATED BY GEORGETTE FRAZER

Amber Kiggens-Leifheit's decades of dedication to community life, and especially to the quality and accessibility of our children's educational opportunities here, has made a lasting impact on our city.

Amber was born in Portage, Wisconsin, attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison, earning her BS in Medical Technology. She moved to Marshfield in 1990 with her husband, Tom, and their two children, Matt and Kate. In Marshfield, Amber found what became a lifelong passion for education and community service. After moving to town, Amber began volunteering at her kid's preschool, Pied Piper Preschool. She served as the administrator for ten years, culminating her time there by negotiating a merger between the Marshfield YMCA and Pied Piper Preschool to form the YMCA Pied Piper Preschool Early Learning Center. This merger helped both organizations maintain enrollment and balance their budgets.

She later volunteered in leadership positions with the YES Committee, passing four successful school district referendums, most notably the referendum that provided the funding to build the new Madison and Washington Schools, and remodel Lincoln and Nasonville schools. During her tenure almost \$50,000,000 in referendums were passed.

At the same time, Amber dedicated herself to hands-on work in the schools. She was a substitute teacher in the Marshfield School District from 1998-2008, often taking on long-term assignments and supporting students with special educational needs. She served as the Executive Director of Pathway Partners Mentoring Program from 2005 to 2008, matching Marshfield High School students with professional mentors from the larger Marshfield community.

Amber was elected to the school board in 2008 and served three consecutive three-year terms, deciding not to run again in 2019. She served many roles in her time on the board. She served eight years as Vice-President and four years as Treasurer. She chaired the Employee Relations, Curriculum, Finance, and Communication committees. Over this period, Amber championed many of the board's positive steps in the areas of curriculum, personalized learning, new schools and athletic facilities.

Many of these projects involved collaborating with members of the larger community. She is proudest of the work she did in conjunction with the foundation to help



make sure all students could have the tools they needed to succeed, whether that be a warm coat, new boots so they could walk to school, or a bed to sleep in.

Amber was the director of the Marshfield Area Community Foundation for eleven years. During this time, she increased the foundation's assets from \$2.8 million to \$16.2 million, while growing the number of funds from 79 to over 215.

She began the foundation's Speak Your Peace initiative, providing training to Marshfield's business leaders in civil discourse and conflict resolution. This curriculum gave the participants tools to use in everyday conversations with co-workers, neighbors, friends and family. Groups from organizations like Simplicity Credit Union, the Marshfield High School Student Council, the Wood County Human Services Department, and Staab Construction took part in the program.

As the foundation's director, Amber was an expert at building relationships with donors. She made a point of meeting one-on-one with donors large and small and was always just a phone call away. She made donors feel valued and was uniquely skilled at identifying charitable opportunities that could maximize community impact, while staying true to donors' vision for the community.

Thanks to Amber's sharp intellect and financial savvy, donors knew they could trust the foundation to grow their donations and maximize their tax deductions. Jim

Conterato described Amber as "thoughtful, open-minded, creative, and motivated." Amber created a community foundation that swept broadly across the city of Marshfield, enhancing the quality of life for all citizens.

Under Amber's wise management, and with \$7,738,000 in gifts from over 550 donors, the Community Foundation played a key role in developing or improving major projects in Marshfield, including the Adler Bear Exhibit at Wildwood Park, Hamus Park, the Boson Tennis Complex, Griese Park, Weber Park, and the Graham Olson and Miller baseball fields, Marshfield Area Pet Shelter, the Everett Roehl Marshfield Public Library, Wenzel Plaza, and the foundation's largest project, the new Marshfield High School athletic facilities.

Amber enjoyed working with community leaders to help make these projects successful. She saw that Floyd Hamus was a powerhouse. When he threw his support behind a project it was going to happen. Bill Heiting was a tremendous fundraiser. Everyone knew if you got a call from Bill, he wanted a donation. The Everett Roehl Public Library took several years to raise the \$3.1 million the city required for the project to begin. Lori Belongia and Bill Hocking were amazing, sticking with the project, and leading it to a successful outcome.

Alongside her busy career, Amber was an active volunteer with many Marshfield organizations. She is especially proud of the work with Marshfield Habitat for Humanity. She served on the board for eight years, with two terms as the chair. During those years, Habitat built or refurbished five houses for deserving families.

She served in leadership positions on other boards, including the Personal Development Center, Sunrise Rotary, AFS, Sister Cities, Chapter CY PEO, Marshfield Area United Way Allocation Committee, Wood County Literacy Council, Healthy Lifestyle Coalition, New Visions Gallery, 80 Feet is Enough! and the Wisconsin Easement Action Team. She was also a deacon at her church. Having volunteered with Amber on many of these initiatives, Dr. Mark Borchart said, "Amber is an exemplar of selfless civic service. She never sought personal accolades; her first thought was always about successfully completing the work at hand."

You can't drive through Marshfield without seeing at least one project that Amber helped to make happen; and you certainly can't raise a child here without feeling her lasting impact.

On the road with Alice: **Celebrating Wisconsin Christmas trees**

MADISON -- On a recent warm and breezy November day, I traveled to Door County to cut down the first official Christmas tree of the Wisconsin holiday season. After a turn in the small town of Forestville, I knew I was in the right place when I came upon a classic red pick-up truck with a big Christmas tree in the bed.

I spent the morning learning from Randy Krueger of Krueger Tree Farms about his business, techniques to use a saw, and Christmas tree longevity tips. The Kruegers, located in Sturgeon Bay, were such wonderful hosts and knowledgeable producers.

According to the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, more than 700,000 Christmas trees are harvested every year in our state, with a significant increase during the COVID-19 pandemic. In the 10-15 years that trees are grown before being harvested, they absorb carbon dioxide, release oxygen, and provide wildlife habitat. Once the tree is harvested, it is shaken to remove loose needles, wrapped to make for easier transporting and loaded up for the trip to its new home for the holidays. On average, two or three trees are planted the following spring for each tree that is cut down, continuing the cycle of benefits.

Whether you get your tree right after Thanksgiving, or wait until closer to Christmas, there are plenty of best practices for keeping your tree looking fresh right up until your gatherings. A well-cared-for tree should remain fresh at least three to four weeks before drying to an unsightly level. The Wisconsin Christmas Tree Producers Association is your one-stop resource for all things Wisconsin Christmas trees, and they share the following

Avoid whittling down the sides of the trunk to fit a stand,

as the outer layers of wood are the most efficient in taking up water and should not be removed;

For most Christmas trees, the stand should hold at least 1 gallon of water. A cut tree will absorb a surprising amount of water, particularly during the first week, so replenish the water daily;

Check the stand daily and add water to make sure that



miles east of Bangor - one of the country's eastern-most communities along the northeast Atlantic Coast.

'My wife and I had the opportunity to do Arlington last year and it was a pretty special event for us," said Norlin. "I'm not a veteran, but my father served in World War II. Arlington's a very special place, and we were so moved by that experience that I came back and told Rick Roehl what a wonderful event it was and said, 'We need to get involved with this organization.' So, we agreed to move some loads of wreaths. The folks at 'Wreaths' invited us out to visit with them. On our way back here we decided we needed to bring this to Marshfield."

This annual event seeks to further the year-long mission to Remember, Honor, Teach, ensuring that the memory of those who served our country endures.

"It's so important that we honor our veterans," Norlin added. "They say they're never forgotten until you don't say their name, so we gotta say their name. As long as we do that they're remembered."

"It is an honor and privilege to stand before you and with all of you today to remember the men and women who dedicated their lives, and in some cases gave their lives, to protect our great nation," said Tammy Neve, Air Force Veteran and Commander, American Legion Post 54, Marshfield, in comments during a public ceremony prior to the wreaths being laid. "As Americans, we often take for granted those things we're able to choose freely. This is why it is so important to do what we are gathered here to do today. In keeping with the mission of the National Wreaths Across America, we are not here to honor the deaths of our veterans. That's what we do on Memorial Day. Rather, we are here to remember their lives and their service, to honor those who are currently serving and to teach others about the sacrifices these men and women make and have made every day to protect our great nation," Commander Neve added. "I encourage all of you to teach your children and grand children about the things that make America both good and great, to appreciate the price that is paid for the freedoms that we enjoy. When you join the military you write a blank check payable to the United States of America for the amount of up to, and including, your own life."

The public ceremony also included the laying of honorary wreaths for each branch of the U.S. Military, one representing POW/ MIA and another for Gold Star families.

The day's events began with a police escort of American Legion officials and the tractor/trailer which carried the wreaths from Roehl Transport to Hillside Cemetery.

the level of water does not go below the base of the tree:

Keep displayed trees away from sources of heat (fireplaces, heaters, heat vents, and direct sunlight);

Monitor your tree for dryness. Run your fingers across the needles to determine if they are dry and brittle. If the needles break easily or fall off in your hand, the tree is dry and should be removed from the house.

After the holiday season is over and you are ready to dispose of your Christmas tree, there are some environmentallyfriendly options you can take. The exact options will vary based on your location,

so a little bit of research can help identify your plan of action. Generally speaking, Christmas trees are primarily recycled in a few main ways. Many local municipalities will collect trees after the season ends to turn them into mulch. This mulch is then used as a weed barrier, along walking paths, and more. Some locations will put trees out on a frozen lake so after the lake thaws, trees will become submerged and form fish habitat. These biodegradable trees can also be left outside in appropriate locations after removing all decorations to become wildlife habitat or to decompose back into the environment. It is important to not burn your Christmas tree in your fireplace because the sap will add to creosote build-up, which can become a fire risk.

TITLE TOWN 101 - WITH UW-GREEN BAY

"I'm looking to tell a story and represent either a moment in Packers history or tell a really interesting story," he said. "And so the Packers didn't do me any favors by losing that game against the Giants (Oct. 9, 2022).

"So, how do I make it interesting, with just a loss? So, what we focused on was all of the Packer fans going over to London and invading London."

Hensel said that in the museum industry "sometimes rather than reinvent the wheel, you borrow ideas from other museums you visit."

He added that this was the case with the "exploding uniform"

"We borrowed this idea from the Harley Davidson Museum in Milwaukee, they have an exploding motorcycle.

"So, you look at the motorcycle straight on and it's all put together and then you look at it from the side and you see every piece of equipment.

"We did that same thing with the Packers uniform, so you can see the different pieces of equipment that they wear.

"One of the things we learned from when we reopened this facility back in 2014, we originally had a player in it — it was actually Eddie Lacey — and then that player either (ends up) leaving or getting traded...

"It's kind of complicated to put the pieces on the tension wire and keep them there, so we've since went to the generic No. 1 in order to keep it consistent going forward."

Another item on display that told a story was a helmet that Packer linebacker Ray Nitschke wore in 1960.

"You'll see this big hole in it and there's a red circle around it," Hensel said. "It was late September in 1960. They were practicing outside and a thunderstorm comes rolling in. Practice is almost over. Ray is kneeling on the sideline with his helmet on and basically his helmet saves his life. Lightning strikes the tower and a bolt from the tower comes falling down and hits him in the helmet. And you see the hole where it was. If he was not wearing his helmet, it would probably kill them. And so it saved his life."

Hensel said one other storytelling artifact is a mink stole.

"In the Lombardi era, we highlight each of the five championships that they won, under Vince Lombardi, including the 1961 championship — the first one hosted here in Green Bay in Titletown U.S.A.

"Another really fun unit of artifact is under Lombardi, after they won the 1961 championship he gave gifts, including this mink stole, to all of the players' wives. Lombardi had a number of ladies' men on their team that had numerous girlfriends, and Lombardi was afraid that if he gave one to these certain players they would give it to whoever was the random girlfriend of the month. So, in order to avoid this he made the players that were single or bachelors give the mink stole to their mother."

Stratford, Edgar take rivalry to Lambeau Field

GREEN BAY – Thirty-one days after each community had celebrated their latest state high school football championship, members of the Stratford Tigers and Edgar Wildcats found themselves back on the gridiron – this time facing one another.

In this rare mid-December clash, Stratford and Edgar were not trying to outdo each other on the scoreboard, but rather between the goal lines. During halftime of the Dec. 17 game between the Green Bay Packers and Tampa Bay Buccaneers, three members of each school's football team – a quarterback and two of his teammates – participated in the Packers' High School Quarterback Challenge, an on-field competition offering each school the opportunity to demonstrate their passing and catching skills to the fans

at Lambeau Field. Sponsored by Hewlett Packard

Enterprise and Camera Corner Connecting Point, each school has two attempts to complete the longest pass, with both receivers from each school having the chance to catch. Whichever team wins

receives a \$500 donation for their school.

These two particular schools, separated by 14 miles in Marathon County, have been engaged in one of the best and most talked about high school football rivalries this state – and country, for that matter – has ever seen. The two teams have squared off sixty-six times since 1965, while mostly dominating the Marawood Conference. Even though recent WIAA realignment has taken Stratford out of that conference, they continue to play one another in a nonconference matchup each year. Edgar leads the overall series, 37-29.

Unofficially, you could now make that 38. The Wildcats beat the Tigers in the Quarterback Challenge by completing both of their passes, with QB Teegan Streit connecting with Karter Butt on a short pass and Brett Baumgartner on a much longer throw. Even though he slipped, Stratford halfback Gavin Leonhardt reached back and hauled in a pass from quarterback Jack Tubbs for one completion. But on the trio's second attempt, fullback Koehler Kilty could not corral a longer pass that went off the fingertips of his outstretched hands.

For five of the six players, this was the final chapter in their Stratford-Edgar story. Only junior Tiger quarterback Jack Tubbs returns next season.





WISCONSIN RAPIDS Mid-State Technical College recognized the achievements Nursing program completers in a pinning ceremony Dec. 12 on the Wisconsin Rapids Campus. Graduates were joined by their family and friends in the celebration.

The nursing pinning ceremony is a celebratory endcap to a nursing student's academic career and a bridge between nursing school and a nursing career. It honors and celebrates nursing students and their journey to becoming a nurse. It is also a day of celebration for the nursing faculty who have helped the students reach their goals.

"The nursing pinning marks ceremony transition from aspiring nursing students healthcare dedicated professionals," said Deb Johnson-Schuh, dean of

the School of Nursing. "The nursing pin is a symbol of pride and responsibility. It signifies earning the trust of others to be their caregiver and advocate."

According to Johnson-Schuh, the graduating Nursing program students completed several rigorous courses over the past few years. These courses required them to write numerous nursing care plans, practice endless skills in labs and attend

over 750 hours of clinical. "The students' journey to this pivotal point has been challenging and demanding," Johnson-Schuh added. "Their hard work and determination brought them here today. As they continue in their nursing journey, they will be called upon, to integrate into their practice, the same core values that define Mid-State Technical College: Integrity, commitment, accountability, respect and excellent service."

For Mid-State's pinning ceremony, each graduating student selects a registered nurse who is a family member, friend or faculty

member to join them on stage to place the nursing pin on the graduate during the ceremony, welcoming them into the profession of nursing. While the graduate is being pinned a recorded message from the student is shared with the audience. The Nursing graduates also take a vow to always help those who are sick or injured. Mid-State's

nursing pinning ceremony stems from a proud tradition reaching back to Florence Nightingale in the 1860s, the first nurse to receive a pin when she was awarded the Red Cross of St. George for her work in the Crimean War. Nightingale in turn outstanding honored nursing graduates with a medal of excellence, which in time inspired a tradition in the US to award all graduates with a pin, beginning in 1880 with Bellevue Hospital School of Nursing in New York City. By 1916, pinning had become a common practice in schools of nursing throughout the United Kingdom and the United States.

The actual pin used in the nursing pinning ceremony is unique to each school, incorporating a design that symbolizes the school's beliefs about nursing. The Mid-State pin has both a lamp and a book, the lamp being a traditional symbol of excellence that dates back to Nightingale, also known as the Lady with the Lamp.
