Merrill man dies in single UTV crash

A 48-year-old Merrill man has died as the result of injuries sustained in a single UTV crash in the early hours of Dec. 31, 2023.

The Lincoln County 911 Dispatch Center received a 911 call at approximately 1:32 a.m. on Dec. 31 reporting a single UTV crash on Scott Rd. south of Heldt St. in the Township of Scott, with the driver reportedly trapped and unresponsive, a press release from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) said.


The driver, Chad J. Glaze of Merrill, was pronounced dead by Lincoln County Coroner Valerie Caylor.

A male passenger in the UTV refused medical treatment and left the scene in a private automobile, the release said.

According to preliminary investigation, it is believed the UTV was southbound on Scott Rd. when it lost control, entered the ditch, and rolled. Road conditions are believed to have been a factor. Icy road conditions were reported throughout northcentral Wisconsin counties during the evening of Dec. 30 into early morning on Dec. 31, with multiple vehicle crashes closing roads for periods of time in several area counties. The crash remains under investigation according to the LCSO.

In addition to the LCSO and Lincoln County Coroner, the Merrill Fire Department and Merrill Police Department also assisted in response to the accident.

Vehicle in the water

At approximately 7:42 a.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 26, 2023, the Lincoln County 911 Dispatch Center received a call that there was a vehicle in the Wisconsin River, partially submerged, at the end of Lokemoen Rd. in the Town of Merrill. The 911 caller was uncertain whether anyone was inside the vehicle.

Emergency crews, including Merrill Fire Department Engine 61, Medic 61, Medic 62, and Utility 68 w/Boat 69 were dispatched to the Lokemoen boat landing.

"Upon arrival at scene Engine 61 assumed command and found a mostly submerged 4-door SUV," a press release from the Merrill Fire Department said. Emergency

personnel were also unable to determine whether the vehicle was occupied from their position at the boat landing. "Personnel from Medic 61 donned cold water rescue suits," the release

said. "One rescuer attached to a safety line was able to walk out to the vehicle and visually inspect for occupants. There did not appear to be any occupants in the vehicle."

"After consulting with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, it was decided to remove the vehicle from the water. Utilizing the winch on Engine 61, personnel were able to attach a cable to the driver side rear wheel and remove the vehicle from the water. Once the vehicle was removed from the water, it was confirmed to be unoccupied. The scene was turned over to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office," the release concluded.

The incident remains investigation.

Akey is new Merrill City Administrator

Merrill takes a new approach to staffing

Effective Jan. 1, 2024, Rod Akev of Merrill became the new City Administrator for the City of Merrill. Akey had been serving as Interim co-City Administrator, sharing the duties of the position with Merrill Police Chief Corey Bennett since October 2022, following the retirement of Merrill's former City Administrator. Now, he will officially assume the role full time and Bennett will likely be relieved to go back to having "just" one job as Police Chief.

Along with his permanent new role, Akey Rod Akey is Merrill's new City will also continue as Public Works Director/ Administrator. City Engineer. He's going to have a long list of titles behind his name.

The best person for the job was already a City employee

When Dave Johnson retired in October 2022, an Ad Hoc Committee was formed to look at the options for filling the City Administrator position, Mayor Steve Hass explained. The Council appointed Akey and Bennett as Interim co-City Administrators as they explored how to recruit someone to fill the vacated role.

Early on in the process Public Administration Associates made a presentation to the committee advising that the cost of recruiting for a new City Administrator would cost at least \$50,000-\$60,000, Mayor Hass said.

As time moved on with Akey and Bennett meeting the needs of the position on a day-to-day basis, the committee considered whether the best person for the job might already be a City employee.

We decided to stay in-house with the Administrator's position," Mayor Hass said. "Rod and Corey have both proven to be very valuable in that position/role, working together. And Rod stepped up to the plate and said he'd like to throw his hat in the ring."

With more than a year of watching Akey's performance in the interim role, they already knew what they could expect from him in the role, and the decision was an easy one for the committee and the City Council. It also saved the City of Merrill considerable money.

By filling the position in-house, the City saved more than \$50,000 in recruitment expenses and then some. "We did save that amount of money by not going that route [doing an outside recruitment search]," Hass said. "We also don't have to pay moving expenses."

A creative approach to staffing needs

Overall, the City is taking a more creative approach to balancing their staffing needs, especially for critical positions, Hass and Akey explained.

We are moving in the right direction," Hass said. "Rod will still maintain the City Engineering position, but we are hiring an Engineering Assistant position."

This will result in additional savings for the City. Essentially eliminating a City Administrator's salarysince Akey will serve as both City Administrator and City Engineer-and then adding a new Engineering Assistant position, should net the City around \$60,000 in savings, he said, as opposed to hiring a new City Administrator and also continuing to have a separate Public Works Director/City Engineer.

The Engineering Assistant position will offload about



75% of his engineering workload, Akey projects. "And we do have Dustin Bonack and Gabe Steinagel," he said, referring to the Superintendents of the Street Department and Water Utility, respectively. "They've been doing a very good job." That takes the pressure off on the public works side of things, he said. In the realignment, he anticipates he will spend his time approximately "75% focusing on the City Administrator stuff and 25% the public works/engineering side."

Putting the community's interests first

Something a lot of residents probably Tina L. Scott photo. don't know? The City has been saving money since October 2022 by utilizing

Akey and Bennett as Interim co-City Administrators because both served in this role while also continuing to serve in their original positions (City Engineer and Chief of Police)-and they did so without any additional compensation. "Corey and I didn't ask for a penny more the whole time we were doing the fill-in stuff," Akey said referring to the Interim role.

The two stepped up and did what needed to be done, putting the City-and the community's interests-first, for more than 14 months.

In accepting the new position, Akey's salary will increase about \$1,500 a year going forward.

Well qualified for the position

In addition to his experience garnered in his role as Interim co-City Administrator since October 2022, Akey brings more than 30 years of engineering and management experience to the new position.

He attended the University of Wisconsin-Marathon and Madison, receiving a bachelor's degree in Civil Environmental Engineering in 1993.

Since January 2016, Akey has served as the City Engineer/Public Works Director for the City of Merrill. Responsibilities in this role included overseeing the Merrill Street Department, Water Utility, and Waste Water Utility, in addition to civil and commercial design, layout, and construction oversight; State of Wisconsin DNR permit compliance for storm water; and assisting with Tax Incremental District (TID) project coordination and RDA project development.

Prior to taking this position, Akey was a private consulting engineer operating Akey Engineering Service since February 2002, providing civil and commercial design, layout, and construction oversight for state, county, township, and private construction projects and assisting with local, state, and DNR permit compliance.

Akey's prior experience also includes training with the State of Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) District 7 in Rhinelander; six years as a resident engineer for Black Construction, Inc. in Kempster, Wis.; and three years as an engineering technician for the Lincoln County Highway Department in Merrill. Duties in those roles included construction survey, layout and design for state, local, county and private projects; job cost analysis; bid preparation and analysis; job and machinery budget cost analysis; construction project estimating; layout and management oversight for construction projects; construction project estimating; performing gravel tests; completing permits for operations; and even operating

machinery and plowing snow for Lincoln County when

Akey is accredited with the State of Wisconsin and maintains a Professional Engineering (PE) license with the state which includes 30 hours of continuing education

Engineering Assistant opening

The City is currently recruiting for the open Engineering Assistant position. The requirements? "A bachelor's degree in civil engineering with the ability to get a state job, State of Wisconsin PE within four years or so. We're looking for somebody probably coming right out of college," Akey said.

Other positions are also evolving

The City is taking a more creative, integrated approach to meeting personnel needs in all areas. "We have done a few other things as far as combining, like an Administrative Assistant from the Water Utility is going to be at the Street Department, and she's still going to be doing some of the Water Utilities work. So we're trying to find areas to save money," Akey said.

'We really have to start looking at-not just what's easy," he said. "You know, we got a job open, so let's not [just automatically] replace that person. We have to look over the whole City [City of Merrill personnel] and see what makes sense."


"You know, all we have left is personnel [expense] to cut," Akey said. "As far as our expenses going, we can't raise taxes more than our new growth. We can't just raise taxes like the school was able to do [just recently when the state changed the school's levy tax guidelines]. There's state levy limits that were imposed [on City governments] back in 2011 from Act 10." Looking at the big picture when vacancies occur is one way they're working to manage the money they have to work with.

The City is also looking at succession planning, especially as it relates to key positions and personnel. More on that to come.

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Aspirus Health provides information on prostate cancer, encourages screenings

Aspirus Health recently on prostate cancer and said screenings are a key defense against it.

detecting abnormalities sooner," said Katie Bittner, Aspirus Family Physician. Medicine "Detecting and treating certain prostate cancers can sometimes improve survival rates and minimize the extent of treatments recommended."

Aspirus Health Screening Guidelines recommend that men aged 50 and older get screened annually for

prostate cancer.

"The most common screening tool for prostate cancer is the prostatespecific antigen (PSA) test," Aspirus said. "This blood test measures the presence of PSA circulating in the bloodstream and is usually the first step in any prostate

cancer diagnosis. A digital rectal exam is less effective than the PSA blood test in finding prostate cancer, but it can sometimes find cancers in men with normal PSA levels. Therefore, it may be included as a part of prostate cancer screening based on risk."

"Patients often have questions about what it means to complete prostate cancer screening," Bittner said. "We try to make this a joint decision-making process, discussing the most up-to-date recommendations for screening options, depending on the patient's age and other risk factors. Quite often, this is simply completing a blood test."

MOVIES YOU GOTTA SEE

50 years later, "The Sting" gets better with every watch

Have you ever watched a movie for the first time, thought it was fine, then watched it again later on and realized it absolutely rules?

For me, one of those movies is *The*

Released on Christmas Day in 1973-50 years ago last week-*The Sting* stars Paul Newman and Robert Redford and reunites them with Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid director George Roy Hill. The film also features Robert Shaw, best known for playing shark hunter Quint in Jaws.

The film, set in 1936, begins with Johnny Hooker (Redford), a young con man in Joliet, Ill., scamming an unsuspecting guy on the street out of a big chunk of change. Hooker, along with job partners Luther Coleman and the Erie Kid, are ecstatic about their lucky score. Luther, an old-timer and veteran of the trade, figures he'll take his cut and call it a career and tells Hooker he should give up the small-time stuff for something more worthwhile. Luther recommends Hooker go to Chicago to meet his old pal, Henry Gondorff (Newman), and learn how to pull off the "big con."

Hooker later learns that the guy they ripped off was a money runner for notorious and brutal mob boss Doyle Lonnegan (Shaw, dialing up the menace). Lonnegan's men kill both the courier and Luther, sending Hooker on the run to Chicago. Hooker finds

Gondorff in the Windy City, Gondorff eventually agrees to make a play to take down Lonnegan and get payback for Luther's death, and we're off. What follows is the conception and execution of the "big con," and folks, it is a great

Gondorff enlists the help of some fellow swindlers who also knew Luther and want to get revenge against Lonnegan. After finding out that Lonnegan is a high-stakes poker enthusiast, the crew decides to pull a scam called "the wire," a grift in which a gambler is conned out of a large sum of money at a fake horse betting parlor. The scheme is incredibly elaborate on multiple levels: for starters, they have to find a location for the phony gambling den; then, they have to make it look legit, which requires locating and installing equipment found in such establishments; they also have to recruit a few dozen guvs to pose as employees and gamblers. And this is all before Lonnegan's even involved.

Hooking and reeling Lonnegan in is its own scam-which also might be the most fun stretch of the movie. Gondorff poses as a loud, drunken Chicago bookie named "Shaw" and buys his way into Lonnegan's poker game on the 20th Century Limited train running between New York City and Chicago. Newman is having an absolute blast in the scene, hilariously annoying and insulting Lonnegan before finally cheating him out of 15



grand. Lonnegan, although a card cheater himself, does not handle this well. Hooker then swoops in, acting as "Kelly," an employee of "Shaw" who tells the incensed Lonnegan he wants to double-cross his boss and take over his gambling operation, and he needs a hand from Lonnegan to do so. Lonnegan takes the bait, and the "big con" is officially in motion.

I won't spoil the actual execution of the con, but watching Gondorff, Hooker, and the gang meticulously pull it off is riveting. These guys are the epitome of cool-they never get frazzled,

17 Scoops: Sweet treats and good eats in Gleason year round

17 Scoops, located at N5336 Wis. Hwy. 17 in Gleason, began as a seasonal business in April 2022, but in 2023, owner Andrea Roggenbuck decided to keep the business open year-round, adopting weekend hours (12-8 p.m. Friday and Saturday; 12-7 p.m. on Sunday) for winter. Summer hours will resume in spring.

The Gleason ice-cream shop always has at least 17 flavors of Chocolate Shop ice cream to choose from, and during peak season in the summer, offers up to 24 flavors, including four Italian ices made by Chocolate Shop, along with 17 signature sundaes. Ice cream is available in cups and cones, shakes and melts, floats, smoothies, ala modes, and ice cream "to go" by the pint, sundae pint (a sundae to go), quart, and half gallon, and a 10 pack of cones.

An ala mode is one of their most popular winter ice cream treats, made with a hot drink. "It's a float [similar to a root beer float] but instead of it being soda, it's a hot drink," Roggenbuck said. "They can choose and mix and match whatever flavors they want." Two scoops of ice cream are combined with their choice of hot drink: Caribou coffee, hot chocolate, spiced chai, hot apple cider, etc. For instance, the mocha ala mode is coffee with Zanzibar ice cream. "That one's fun," Roggenbuck said. "The coffee one people have [also] been doing with the Iced Latte Da flavor, which is a caffeinated ice cream, so it really tastes more like a latte." [The Iced Latte Da flavor is described as fantastic Wisconsin-made caffeinated espresso ice cream with a fudge swirl and chocolate chunks.]

Roggenbuck is proud to offer the Chocolate Shop brand. It's made in Madison with milk from Wisconsin cows, she said. "It's the best. It's actually one of the heaviest cream ice creams. It's homemade, batch by batch, since 1962," In early 2023, "they started homogenizing their own milk. So they're actually getting it straight from the cow and doing all of it themselves," she said. "And the cows live just a few miles from the plants. It's really great."

17 Scoops also offers food—from breakfast sandwiches to hot dogs to wraps,

BLTs, and more, available as a sandwich alone or a basket that includes a pickle, chips, and a drink. They carry both Coke and Pepsi products, Roggenbuck said, as well as Jolly Good soda, another Wisconsin-made product. "We are a Jolly Good supplier, so people can buy their Jolly Good by the 12-pack, or however many they want," she said.

They also offer soups—a great winter treat—with a soup of the day, such as cheddar broccoli, tomato basil bisque, chicken noodle, Northwoods chili, farmer's market vegetable, and cheesy potato and bacon. They have daily soup and sandwich specials "so if you buy a sandwich or a sandwich basket, you get a dollar off your soup," Roggenbuck said.

While the majority of summer business orders take place at the front windows, with visitors enjoying ice cream at the outdoor tables, in winter an ice-cream cabinet/counter is available indoors along with indoor seating space.

Indoors, in addition to delicious treats and eats, 17 Scoops sells candy, small toys, some books, Gleason-themed mugs, and t-shirts and sweatshirts with ice cream and Gleason area themes that Roggenbuck designed herself to help promote local outdoor recreation opportunities including Harrison Hills, Gleason as the "Trout Fishing Capital of the World," the "Lakes of the Harrison Hills," and Gleson in general. She will be creating and adding more designs, and hopes to also offer more local and Wisconsin-made products next year, including candles and fudge. They are also considering expanding the indoor seating/store area.

The shop features a Northwoods Information Center to provide visitors more information about all of the recreation opportunities in the area, along with ATV trail maps and special maps for the Gleason Area.

In the winter, when the snowmobile trail is open, "it comes right through here," Roggenbuck said. "They can zip right off and come on in here." It's a great opportunity for a hot meal and a sweet treat on a winter day.



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

LINCOLN COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE REPORT

FOR WEEK ENDING DEC. 31, 2023 On 12/25/2023 at approximately 9:12 p.m. a deputy with the Sheriff's Office observed a vehicle traveling northbound on USH 51 near CTH V in the Town of Birch at an extremely high rate of speed. MAPS releases Community Survey results on facilities planning

A press release issued by Merrill Area Public Schools (MAPS) said residents indicate support for facilities improvements in the district and the associated \$16 million price tag associated with those improvements outlined in the "base plan" option presented in the MAPS community-wide survey conducted in November. The survey was mailed to every household in the MAPS district in November and could be completed and returned either by mail or online.

The results of that survey were provided to the MAPS Board of Education and administrators at the December School Board meeting on Dec. 13, 2023, by Bill Foster, President and Founder of School Perceptions LLC, the independent, Wisconsin-based firm hired to conduct the survey based on their "extensive expertise conducting school district surveys," according to the release.

The report from School Perceptions is available on the district website at: mapsedu.org/district/facilitiesplanning.cfm (on the far right, under the "Resources" heading, click on "December 13, 2023 Presentation Community Survey Results.")

Survey demographics

- 1,522 total survey respondents, of which 92% were residents of the MAPS district and 8% (approx. 121 survey respondents) were not.
- 18% of survey respondents (approx. 274) are employees of MAPS.
- \bullet 32% of survey respondents have children attending MAPS schools, while 68% do not.
 - 33% of survey respondents are age 65 or older
- 33% of the parents responding and a whopping 76% of the non-parents/non-staff responding said they prefer to get their school/district information from the *Merrill Foto News*.

Key findings according to MAPS

The MAPS press release cited the following key findings:

- When asked to share advice regarding the future of Prairie River Middle School, there was no clear majority or direction given.
- \bullet 68% of resident parents showed support for the \$16 million proposed base plan. This demographic (resident parents with students in MAPS) represents about 25% of the community.
- 56% of resident non-parents/non-staff indicated willingness to support the \$16 million proposed base plan. This demographic (residents without children attending MAPS) represents about 75% of the community.
- Using a weighted analysis calculation, School Perceptions estimated that there was 59% support for the \$16 million proposed base plan.

The proposed \$16 million base plan

The base plan proposed in the survey, with a \$16 million price tag, which "would address the most pressing issues and better utilize the District's best buildings," according to the press release, would consist of:

- Updates to Jefferson Elementary to accommodate new usage, including:
 - Renovate an area for the Head Start program.
 - Renovate an area for the Bridges Virtual Academy.
 - Renovate an area for the Northern Achievement Center.

- Create separate entrances for NAC and Head Start.Create dedicated playground areas.
- Move Pine River School for Young Learners (PRSYL), Bridges Virtual Academy (BVA), and the Northern Achievement Center (NAC) program to the Jefferson Elementary building.
- Demolition of the Northern Achievement Center (NAC) and the Storage Building (Old NAC).
- Renovate underutilized high school space to accommodate the District Office and build new maintenance building.
- Move District Office to the Merrill High School building.
 Demolition of the District Office and maintenance
- Sell the current Pine River PRSYL property.

Background on MAPS facilities needs

Merrill Area Public Schools currently serves grades Pre-K through 12 totaling approximately 2,272 students. The district's declining enrollment suggests some realignment of facilities would better serve current needs. Enrollment in 2013-14 was 3,515 students, and enrollment has been steadily declining in all but one year. The MAPS press release cited declining enrollment of "over 17% in the last 10 years" looking at numbers up to and including the 2022-23 academic year.

However, comparing 2013-14 enrollment of 3,515 students with 2022-2023 enrollment of 2,272 students—a difference of 1,243 students—reflects a decline of closer to 35% in the last 9 years. Funding received from the state is based on the number of students enrolled. Fewer students means less money from the state.

The district owns 11 school buildings of various ages, which has become expensive both operationally and with maintenance needs. Those operational costs aren't going down. In addition, a comprehensive study evaluated all 11 buildings owned by the district according to utilization and investment needed, revealing \$91.7 million in future investment needs for building maintenance.

In response to declining enrollment, MAPS hosted community focus groups to explore options to make the "Best Use of the Best Buildings" throughout MAPS.

Other notable findings in the report presented to the School Board include:

- \bullet Only 52% of the Prairie River Middle School building is being utilized. Future maintenance costs are projected at \$34.3 million.
- Only 56% of the Merrill High School (MHS) building is being utilized. This is one of the reasons the base plan proposes to move MAPS District Offices to the MHS building, to utilize space already available. Future maintenance costs are projected at \$28.5 million.
- 74% of the Washington School building is being utilized, and 77% of the Kate Goodrich building is being utilized, with \$7.2 million and \$8.4 million in upcoming maintenance needs, respectively.

- Currently 0% of the Jefferson School building is being utilized, and that building will require a \$6.3 million future maintenance investment, making it an excellent candidate to be utilized as proposed in the base plan.
- The future investment dollars allocated to the PRSYL building (\$2 million), maintenance shop (\$1 million), District Office (\$1.4 million), storage building (old NAC) (\$1 million), current NAC building (\$1.3 million) ... totaling \$6.7 million will cease to be a concern once those buildings are demolished/sold if the base plan is implemented.

No debt is a plus, but still coming up short

Of significant note, MAPS has no debt, and MAPS Superintendent Shannon Murray said that is not the norm. Most school districts carry the weight and cost of debt for past investments as an ongoing expense. This lack of debt is a positive. However, according to the report presented to the School Board, MAPS also has the lowest property tax mill rate in our conference and one of the lowest in the entire state, at just \$5.14 for 2022-23. Note: The MAPS mill rate for 2023-24 is \$5.84 as a result of the change in the state's guidelines implemented last summer which enabled the district to increase tax levies for operating expenses from \$7.71 million to \$9.81 million and subsequently raised taxes for most area homeowners to roughly the rate it was prior to the expiration of the most recent MAPS referendum. This, combined with adjustments to staffing and expenses made prior to the beginning of the 2023-24 year, put MAPS in a position to manage this year's operational budget without referendum. However, it doesn't provide for the funds to meet all the building maintenance needs identified in the comprehensive study and it doesn't provide for the \$16 million needed to implement the proposed base plan to better utilize the district's existing facilities based on current enrollment.

Next steps

Voters would need to approve a capital referendum to fund the project; the current base plan is estimated to cost \$16 million.

When asked to provide a summary, Foster from School Perceptions said at the School Board meeting, "What did we learn? A majority of all subgroups support the District exploring a capital referendum. A majority of all subgroups also would support the base plan as described in the survey. If the election were held today, voters would likely approve this recommended base plan."

The MAPS administration and Board of Education will continue to study and discuss this important subject moving forward, the press release said.

"We are very grateful for the survey responses from our community and staff," said Murray. "This input is critical to help inform and guide decision-making by the School Board and administration in the coming weeks regarding a facilities referendum in the future."

At school, Remington is a member of Junior Optimists and Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and his favorite class is Intro to Business.


In his free time he likes to hunt (deer, geese, bear, turkey), go snowmobiling, and go ice fishing; and he is pretty involved in sports all year long.
