"Please come out and support all of these inductees and watch a day filled with basketball and come to the social at Les and Jims after the games," Pieper said. "It will be a great day."




Measureable winter snow reminds drivers to plan ahead, use precautions

As measureable winter snow finally arrived in Lincoln County earlier this week, drivers are reminded that their approach to driving in winter should be adapted to weather and road conditions. Winter storms can definitely impact travel plans. Road conditions and visibility can deteriorate quickly based on precipitation and blowing winds.

Utilize an app on your phone to stay abreast of changing weather conditions or watch the news for weather forecasts from the National Weather Service. A press release earlier this week from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) reminded drivers to be weather aware and "know before you go" with 511 Wisconsin at 511wi.gov or via the mobile app. This allows travelers to monitor winter road conditions and view live videos from traffic cameras along their route. Locally, there are also Facebook Groups dedicated to keeping area residents abreast of rapidly changing road conditions based on their personal experience, such as the "Road Conditions - Marathon County Highways 29/51" Facebook Group which is updated frequently.

year the property taxes are levied - in this case, Jan. 1, 2023," DOR said. "If an owner is temporarily absent, typically for a period no longer than six months (ex: hospital, vacation, incarcerated), the primary residence is the home where the owner returns. Principal dwelling means any dwelling the owner of the dwelling uses as their primary residence."

To receive the credit, an eligible property owner must file an application with the county treasurer where the property is located or with the city treasurer if the property is located in a city that collects taxes under state law. A property owner may claim only one primary residence.

"You cannot claim the lottery and gaming credit on business property, rental units, vacant land, garages, or other property that is not the owner's primary residence,' DOR said.

If a property owner is eligible for the credit as of Jan. 1, 2023, but their property tax bill received in Dec. 2023 does not show the credit, they may claim the credit by applying to the municipal (town, village, or city) treasurer where the property is located, by Jan. 31, 2024; or file a late claim application (if the Jan. 31 deadline is missed) with DOR by Oct. 1, 2024.

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ATV/UTV riders beware of winter conditions

Ride sober, slow down, wear a helmet

MADISON - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is urging ATV/UTV riders to be mindful of potentially dangerous winter conditions when operating recreational vehicles during the extended riding season.

Many of the state's trails have yet to be covered in snow, but just because a winter road or trail is legally open for riding doesn't mean it's safe. Frost, ice, and fresh snow can cause slippery conditions. UTVs and ATVs may have great traction off roads, but that can change when they are driven on roadway routes in winter.

"Be extra careful, especially when slowing down and approaching turns," said Lt. Warden Jacob Holsclaw, DNR Off-Highway Vehicle Administrator. "Nothing stops fast on slippery pavement, and these machines do not handle the same as a car or a truck.'

In 2023, there were 32 fatal ATV/UTV crashes in the state, the most recent of which happened on Dec. 31 [in the Township of Scott in Lincoln County].

The consumption of alcohol or drugs, excess speed, driver inexperience, and operator error are the leading causes of fatal crashes.

A few safety tips to keep in mind when operating an off-highway vehicle in the winter include always wearing a DOT-approved helmet, using a seatbelt, letting someone know where you're going and when you'll return, and dressing for the weather and carrying a lifejacket, ice




The DNR urges ATV/UTV riders to be careful operating in winter conditions.

picks, and dry clothes when operating on the ice.

Wisconsin law requires ATV and UTV operators born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, who are at least 12 years old for an ATV and at least 16 years old for UTV must complete an ATV safety certification course to operate in Wisconsin. An exception is on private property owned by operator's immediate family. These safety courses can be taken online or in person. A list of approved safety education classes is available on the DNR Safety Education webpage.

Wisconsin law also requires every operator involved in a crash incident to report the incident without delay to law enforcement officials. Operators must submit a written report to the DNR within 10 days of the incident.

International ski event to bring hundreds to Rhinelander

Snow or no snow, 2024 Ski for Light is a go

More than 200 cross-country skiers will descend upon Rhinelander the end of the month for the 2024 Ski For Light International Week. It's the 49th such event that brings together visually- or mobility-impaired participants, sighted guides, and volunteers from across the United States and several countries to cross country ski, to better their skills, compete, and have fun. Local Ski For Light (SFL) volunteer guide and board member Michael Evelo said it's a special week for the skiers.

"For many of them this is the only time all year they get on snow," Evelo said. "And it gives them a sense of freedom. It's the only time where they can move at any speed without being attached to a cane or somebody's elbow.

"Monday through Friday, we'll be teaching and advancing the skills of the skiers and then on Saturday is the race rally. By the end of the week, they get to see how they do against each other," Evelo added.

Ski For Light is an all-volunteer non-profit organization founded in 1975. Its mission is to "enhance the quality of life and independence of visually or mobility-impaired adults through a program of cross-country skiing." The event takes place Jan. 28-Feb. 4, 2024, and will be headquartered at the Quality Inn in Rhinelander. Skiing, provided there is adequate snow, will take place at the Northwoods Nordic Trails adjacent to the Northwood Golf Course.

Having snow-covered ski trails is ideal, but Evelo emphasized the event will take place even if Mother Nature does not cooperate. He has been volunteering with SFL since 2015 and began advocating for a Rhinelander-based event the following year. In 2015 he was selected to speak at the awards banquet. He was curious who else from the Rhinelander area was there.

"I was quite embarrassed," Evelo recalled. "The closest guide was over 100 miles away from Rhinelander. And I made a pledge to the group that I was going to change that. And that was a lot of my motivation to bring this event to Rhinelander."

Evelo said he was pleased to see that there will be 40some skiers and guides and volunteers from Wisconsin at the event in Rhinelander; 27 of them attending SFL for the first time.

Volunteers needed

An event of this undertaking requires a number of volunteers - something Evelo still seeks. More than two dozen community volunteers are needed to help with an activity night at the Hodag Dome Feb. 1. Basketball and

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NATIONAL RADON ACTION MONTH

DHS encouraging testing of homes, childcare centers, other properties for odorless, radioactive gas

WISCONSIN National Radon part of Month, Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is encouraging home and building owners, along with childcare providers, to test their properties for radon.

In a release, DHS said radon, an odorless, radioactive gas naturally present in the ground, is found across Wisconsin and enters buildings through their foundations.

Approximately 10 Wisconsin homes has elevated radon levels, according to DHS.

Protection Agency (EPA)'s action level for safety is 4 picocuries per liter (4 pCi/L)," DHS said. "Last March, Wisconsin Department of Children and Families (DCF) enacted rule changes which require licensed family and group child care providers to test for radon and install a mitigation system if radon levels exceed the EPA

action level." "Reducing radon exposure is top environmental health concern," said Paula Tran, State Health Officer. "DHS applauds DCF for taking this important step toward

protecting all Wisconsinites from exposure to radon by putting children, and their caretakers, first."

DHS said radon is the second-leading cause of lung cancer, and it is estimated to cause over 21,000 deaths each year in the United States. Approximately 962 of these deaths are in Wisconsin.

High radon levels are dangerous especially people who smoke, for according to DHS. Their risk of lung cancer is 10 times higher than nonsmokers.

"Fortunately, this cause of lung cancer is largely preventable, and the first

- 5. Enrollment in an independent public charter school (i.e., a school with no District authorization or affiliation) that is open to students who are District residents. The following independent charter schools are located within the District's boundaries and each school's most recent state-assigned performance category is provided, if available:
 - No independent public charter schools are operating within the School District's boundaries as of the 2023-24 school year.
- 6. Enrollment in a private school participating in the Wisconsin parental choice program. The following participating private schools are located within the District's boundaries and each school's most recent state-assigned performance category is provided, if available:

- 7. Enrollment in a private school of the family's choosing (at the family's own cost, as applicable).

Reduced-cost test kits are available through RICs, and test kit promotions are happening throughout January.

"Any house or building can be at risk for high radon levels, including apartments and commercial buildings," DHS said. "Landlords have a responsibility to provide safe living and working conditions to their tenants and should work with a certified radon testing and mitigation contractor to get started on addressing the issue for their tenants."

MOVIES YOU GOTTA SEE

The Midwestern perfection of Fargo

Fargo, the 1996 black comedy crime film directed by brothers Joel and Ethan Coen. takes place in the Upper Midwest - more specifically, Minnesota and North Dakota. The film focuses on several characters, one of them being Jerry Lundegaard (William H. Macy). Jerry makes a few key and ultimately not great choices that set in motion an increasingly chaotic and heinous chain of events, which eventually pull Brainerd Police Chief Marge Gunderson (Frances McDormand) and a pair of lowlife criminals, Carl Showalter (Steve Buscemi) and Gaear Grimsrud (Peter Stormare), into

I won't dive too deep into the plot, because I believe Fargo's story should be

experienced with knowing as little about it as possible going in. But there are a few smaller facets to the film that make it feel like it's a key Midwestern text.

It might not seem like it, but the Midwest has had a pretty decent share of representation in film, relative to its counterparts from other corners of the country. This is owed in large part to legendary director, producer, and screenwriter John Hughes, whose string of films from the mid-'80s into the early '90s is maybe the most insane run anyone has gone on in the history of film. Sixteen Candles; The Breakfast Club; Pretty in Pink; Weird Science; Ferris Bueller's Day Off; Planes, Trains & Automobiles; The Great Outdoors; Uncle Buck; and Home Alone all take place in the Midwest. However, most of these movies admittedly don't "feel" particularly Midwestern, at least in comparison to Fargo; they just happen to be set somewhere like a Chicago suburb

Meanwhile, watching Fargo feels like I am catching a glimpse into the lives of people who could reasonably be living down the street from me, and the chief contributing factor to this is the characters' accents.

The dead-on folksy-ness of its Midwestspeak stands out among myriad reasons why Fargo is excellent. I suspect the Coen brothers intentionally wrote the script in a way that would make the character's pronunciations and intonations of words catch the viewer's ear. They dial up all the hokey hits: Yah; oh yah; yah, no; ya know?;

heck yah; I tell ya what; you betcha; oh for Pete's sake. They're all there. Also among the highlights are several instances in which a man is referred to as a "fella." And, if he's large in stature, you bet he's a "big fella."

The Coens' injection of the characters' down-home dialects into deeply distressing situations goes a long way in selling Fargo's dark humor. Among my favorite scenes involves Marge and fellow cop Lou investigating the scene of a crime that had taken place along a wind-whipped and saltstained stretch of highway the night before. Marge describes to Lou her interpretation what she believes happened and wraps up her breakdown by describing a multiple-homicide as "this execution type-

According to the Wisconsin State Patrol and the WisDOT, winter weather contributed to nearly 19,000 crashes in Wisconsin last season (Oct. 2022 to May 2023). Those incidents led to 39 deaths and 3,799 injuries. Most of those crashes happened in December and January when winter conditions typically begin to ramp up. This year winter weather is a little late to arrive, so a few annual reminders are timely now.

Advance preparation before winter travel

lot of winter driving stress, inconvenience, potential accidents, and even motor vehicle deaths and injuries can be minimized or avoided altogether with advance planning.

- · Carry a Winter Emergency Vehicle Supply Kit in your car
- · Bring along extra water, transported in the passenger area of your vehicle and remove it if/when your vehicle will be sitting outside for long periods of time to prevent freezing
- · Keep your cell phone fully charged before and during traveling
- · Fill the windshield washer fluid, check the oil, and fill the gas tank before leaving or at the start of your trip
- · Check weather forecasts and road conditions as outlined above
- · Leave early and allow extra time for traveling to avoid rushing
- · Clear all snow and ice from your vehicle before you start out
- · Tell others where you are going and when you are leaving, along with the route you plan to travel and expected travel and

- · Phone down, eyes on the road (Set your phone so it doesn't alert you to calls and messages while driving). Every trip,
- Stay focused on driving and eliminate any distractions such as a loud radio, etc.
- · Always wear your seatbelt and be sure children are also properly restrained in age-appropriate car seats or booster seats. Be sure all passengers are also buckled up.
- Be patient and expect to encounter snowplows and other possible delays.
- Snow means slow. Many winter crashes and slide offs are caused by drivers going too fast in hazardous conditions. Speed limits are set for when roads are clear and dry, so it may be too dangerous to drive the speed limit in slippery conditions.
- Be cautious on bridges, overpasses, and entrance and exit ramps.
- Increase following distance. Stay farther back from all vehicles to allow more time to stop if needed.
- Don't be overconfident in four-wheel or all-wheel-drive vehicles. All vehicles require additional time and distance to stop in adverse conditions. And all vehicles are rendered fairly ineffective on glare ice.
- Don't use cruise control in winter conditions.
- Leave room for maintenance vehicles and snowplows. Stay at least 200 feet behind a working snowplow. (Wisconsin State Law requires vehicles to stay at least 200 feet behind a working snowplow on a road with a posted speed limit more than 35 mph and at least 75 feet behind a working snowplow on a road with a posted speed limit under 35 mph.) Make sure that you can see the plow's mirrors to ensure the driver can see you.
- · Move over or slow down for stopped emergency vehicles and carefully navigate around other vehicles that may have crashed, slid off the road, or become stranded or inoperable.
- · In case of a crash or slide off or if you get stranded, stay buckled up in the vehicle, turn on the hazards/flashers, call 911 for help, and move vehicle(s) out of

traffic if possible. Getting out of the vehicle is very dangerous, especially in winter weather.

Snowplow courtesy

The Wisconsin State Patrol urges caution as we head into winter weather, to ensure snowplow drivers are able to clear roads safely throughout the season. Highway departments spend hours working to clear the roads for safe travel after every snowfall, plowing nearly 115,000 miles of roads across the state. There were nearly 300 crashes involving snowplows in Wisconsin last year.

Crews are often working when other drivers are also on the roads, which can lead to dangerous conditions, and snow plows must travel slowly to effectively clear the roads. In addition to the laws cited above requiring drivers to stay at least 200 feet behind a working snowplow on most roads, avoid trying to pass a snowplow. Instead, just be patient and maintain the appropriate distance. Plows often create a cloud of snow that can obscure visibility. Plus, road conditions ahead of a plow are likely worse.

If you do decide to pass, use extreme caution and keep as much distance as possible. The snowplow's wing blade can extend up to 10 feet beyond the width of the truck. Many snowplow wing blades are hit each season by vehicles attempting to pass a snowplow, the Wisconsin State Patrol and WisDOT said.



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

The multi-lingual P3 Tips App is a secure, anonymous, and efficient means of safely communicating with **Crime Stoppers.**

When to call 911 vs. reporting to Crime Stoppers - When someone is in immediate danger, a drunk driver, active criminal activity happening CALL 911. Time is of the essence in such matters. When you are aware of criminal activity or have details about a crime, you can send the tip through to Crime Stoppers either through the P3 app or a phone call to the anonymous line.

Below are some scams that have been reported in Lincoln County recently:

- Lost Dog Scams on Social Media Don't be too quick to share the post about a lost dog. This type of post pulls at your heartstrings. You think you're helping, but it's likely a scam. Once you share the post, the scammers change the post to something else, often with a malicious link. Always check the profile of the original person that posted the lost dog, car for sale, moving sale, etc. Often there isn't much there.
- **Grandparent Scam** You receive an urgent call from a loved one indicating they are having some type of trouble and need immediate help.

They are in a foreign country and have been arrested. They were in an accident and need money immediately. You want to help, but need to be wary.

According to the FBI you should **Resist the pressure to act quickly.**


Try to contact your grandchild or another family member to determine whether or not the call is legitimate.



deal," which sounds like something your middle school friend's great-aunt would declare from behind a newspaper, shocked by a front-page horror story.

The accent is also, to me, what really drives home the idea of "Midwest nice," and it's displayed throughout Fargo. Even with his life quite literally falling apart around him. Jerry tries his hardest to maintain his kind, Average Joe disposition. His halfbaked, boneheaded scheme catastrophically melt down at any moment, almost certainly destroying everything he holds dear, yet the last thing he wants to do is be rude. A true Midwesterner!

I would like to add a disclaimer here: I am aware that the Coens ratcheted up the accents a little, and not all Midwesterners sound like the characters in Fargo. I think it's safe to assume this is the case for films set in other parts of the United States. I mean, there's no way every single Bostonian sounds like Matt Damon in Good Will Hunting, right? But hey, for what the

filmmakers were going for in their respective movies - to immerse the audience in the setting – they were necessary exaggerations.

Also among the brilliant choices made by the Coens was to have the tale take place in the dead of winter. There have been many films in which Old Man Winter reigns supreme, but Fargo captures the season's bleak dreariness which such detail and accuracy it could reasonably elicit negative emotional response from those who've experienced Jack Frost's worst. There's a scene in which a beleaguered Jerry trudges across an empty, snow-covered parking lot to his car. The shot, taken from above, is absolutely tremendous, showing nothing but vast whiteness broken up by only a few trees, some light posts, Jerry's footprints and his vehicle. Jerry, who is unequivocally Going Through It at this juncture in his life, arrives at his car to find the windshield iced over; his subsequent freakout while scraping away the ice is exceedingly relatable. In the face of the harsh and relentless awfulness of winter, even the smallest problems seem

at least 30% more severe; going through a DEFCON 1-level event like Jerry's while it's also 15-below and windy would be all but unbearable.

The Coens and company paid special attention to details peppered other throughout the film. The interior design is impeccable; I think I've seen the Lundegaards' kitchen cabinets in at least four different homes in my lifetime. Everyone is dressed like they're straight out of a mid-'90s family photo album. The names in the movie sound like the Coens pulled them from a Northwoods phonebook there's a nonzero chance I've had a beer with a Wade Gustafson or a Norm Gunderson in a tavern once or twice.

Additional disclaimer: I do not want to misrepresent Fargo as simply lighthearted, cozy tale. I cannot stress enough that this is not a movie where you gather the kids around the TV, pop in the DVD (do people still do this?), make some popcorn, and share a collective laugh or two. The film features a pretty substantial amount of vulgarity, the culmination of its violence involves an unlucky fellow and a gaspowered yard cleanup tool. While most of Fargo's characters are Midwest nice, the story itself, on the whole, is not. Despite this, does Fargo still feel like home? You betcha.



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
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Merrill wrestlers take fifth at Bluejay Challenge, win SPASH dual


