The Badger State Games (BSG) Winter 2024 Figure Skating Competition was held this past weekend Jan. 25-28, 2024. Hosted by the Mosinee SilverBlades Figure Skating Club, the event was held at the Mosinee Recreation Center Ice Rink in Mosinee and was a qualifying event for State Games of America and National Showcase. BSG events are open to residents of Wisconsin, Illinois, and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. The BSG Figure Skating Competition is United States Figure Skating (USFS) sanctioned, the USFS being the national governing body for the sport of figure skating in the United States. However, while the USFS, founded in 1921, has 750+ member, schoolaffiliated, and collegiate clubs, the BSG Figure Skating Competition does not require membership in either the

Merrill Dance Team, White are bound for State competition this weekend

The Merrill Dance Team is headed to the Wisconsin Association of Cheer/Pom Coaches Inc. (WACPC) State Varsity Dance Competition this weekend to be held Saturday, Feb. 3, 2024, in LaCrosse.

"The team will be competing in Division 2 HipHop," said Sydney Roberts, Assistant Dance Team Coach.

Last weekend the Merrill Dance Team competed at the WACPC Northern Regionals at D.C. Everest, competing in Division 4 Pom and Division 2 HipHop. In Division Pom, they were up against 11 teams and unfortunately didn't place high enough to advance to State. "This was our first year doing Pom," Roberts said. "It's a very hard category. Coach Cassie and I couldn't be more proud of the transformation Pom

went through. They gave their best performance of the season in Pom last Saturday."

In Division 2 HipHop, the Merrill Dance Team competed against seven other teams and took third place, advancing them to State this weekend in the HipHop competition.

At State, the Merrill team will compete against nine other teams, and the top five will get trophies. "Just about every team we go against has placed at State before, with a lot of them being State Champs or State Runner Ups at one point." Roberts said. "Our goal is to just dance the best we can at State. If we get a trophy, that will be cool. But if we don't and we know we tried our hardest, that will be great, as well."

"The team's greatest challenge in going to State is being able to keep our

City of Merrill Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) helps LMI residents with deferred, interest-free loans and grants

One Merrill couple shares how the program helped them at a critical juncture in their lives

The City of Merrill offers low- and moderate-income (LMI) residents assistance with rehabilitating and improving their owner-occupied homes that are located within the city limits, through their Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Over the years, that program has changed a bit, so it's worth revisiting how the program works currently. Eligibility for the

program is based on income and family size; the current income limit for a singleperson household is \$48,350, for example.

"CDBG loans are specifically used to improve the home with siding, roof, windows, insulation, doors, drywall repairs, furnace, water heater. plumbing," and said Shari Wicke, Community Development Director/ Building & Zoning Assistant for the City of Merrill. Other eligible repairs include interior repairs, updating wiring, repairing a chimney, foundation, porch, or painting the exterior of the home. It can also assist with modifications to make a home handicap accessible. Whenever possible, the City coordinates efforts with other established agencies and organizations such as the Community Action Program and Wisconsin Public Service to help the homeowner with their needs.

"This program is a win/win situation for the homeowner and the City," Wicke said.

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"The homeowner gets a 0% deferred loan to make improvements to their home, and the City benefits by cleaning up the neighborhoods and a possible increase in tax base."

"Homeowner applicants must have adequate equity in their property to secure the City's CDBG loan," she said.

The answer they needed

Jacki and Mike Albert purchased their home at 204 E. Third St. in Merrill in August 1999 and had been paying on the mortgage for years. At one point they redid their roof and refinanced the mortgage for 15 years with a fixed rate. As they got close to having that paid off, they had planned to make more much-needed improvements to the home.

Then one evening in May nearly three years ago, Jacki tripped over their family dog in their kitchen while doing the dishes, and just like that, their lives changed. "I was doing dishes and she [the dog] was laying behind my

feet, and I didn't know she was there, and I grabbed the tan towel," Jacki said.
"And when I turned around, I couldn't see her – I had a towel in my hand. ..." It all where they companied so quickly when

happened so quickly when she fell that it was kind of a blur. "I remember her on my left foot and [then] picking myself up off the kitchen floor," she said.

At first Jacki didn't

realize the severity of her injury. She finished the dishes and went to bed. But in the days that followed, it became apparent something was very wrong. For the first few weeks, Jacki thought she was having severe mirgraines. But eventually, after a cat scan, doctors discovered she had a subdural hematoma (bleeding on the brain) which was a slow bleed, and Jacki underwent brain surgery and was hospitalized nearly three weeks. The injury left her with long-term damage and Jacki could no longer hold a job.

So they had equity in the home, but now they had huge medical expenses to pay and they didn't have the income to get a traditional loan on their home to do the necessary repairs.

"Every time we would get enough money to where we were ready to do it, something would happen," Mike said. "And then when she had her brain surgery and all that, it just wiped us out."

"We'd have lost this house if it wasn't for that block grant," he said. So many things needed to be done to maintain the house properly, and they were even getting to the point where they considered selling it, but they didn't have a more affordable housing alternative in mind either.

Instead, the Alberts were able to work with Chris Stoerzer and CTD Construction, RTL Electric, and other approved contractors on the CDBG Program list to make improvements and stay in their home.

Mike explained all the work that was done: A special company had to come in to remove their existing siding because it contained asbestos. Then, they discovered another layer of siding beneath that and CTD went to work removing that siding; followed by installing new siding, soffit and fascia, and gutters; ripping off an old enclosed porch and putting a new porch on; replacing almost every single window and trimming them out inside the house; removing a large, old unused deck in the back and putting a porch on back there; replacing doors; and building a handicap ramp. They also brought in other contractors to do some necessary replumbing and electrical work in conjunction with project.

"They did a great job," Jacki said of CTD. "They were a lot of fun." The couple explained they had

had problems in the past with some contractors never even calling them back or showing up for estimates, but Stoerzer and CTD and the companies they worked with were very responsive and good to work with.

The total process took about a year – between applying, getting approved, getting the contractor, getting the windows and siding and other materials, and getting all the work completed, they explained. Everything was finished last July.

"Don't look at it as a challenge, because Shari works with you," Jacki said. "And if you have any questions, she's right there to answer them."

"And she would stop in and check in while they were working and make sure everything was going smoothly, if there were any issues, etc. ... It's a good program. She knows her stuff."

How it works

The Alberts gave permission to share their

financial The details. Alberts explained thev were approved for a certain amount based on the value of their home and the equity available. Their total project ended up costing \$103,865.36. Of that amount, \$27,260.00 is a grant the Alberts don't have to repay; the Alberts only being responsible for \$76,605.36, Wicke said. The loan sits out there interestfree with no payments due on a regular basis, as would be the case with a mortgage or home equity loan, and only becomes due when one (the first) of the following

- In 30 years, or
- When they no longer live in the home as their full-time residence, or
- They transfer their interest in the property to anyone for any reason except that one transfer to a spouse is allowed and a transfer is allowed to an heir that also qualifies for the CDBG Program within its current income limits AND also resides there as his or her principal residence, or
- They fail to maintain insurance on the property to protect the City's interest in the event of fire or other loss (and if in a floodplain, flood insurance), or
- They fail to pay property taxes or other assessments levied on the property.

In any of those situations, the loan becomes due and payable in full upon demand. In essence, the program is set up so that the home's essential maintenance is completed, the family doesn't have to stress about repayments on the loan, and in years to come, when the home is sold, the loan will be paid out of the proceeds of the sale.

Identity Theft Awareness Week: Tips from DATCP and DOR

MADISON, Wis. - Tax-related identity theft involves the theft and misuse of your Social Security number (SSN). It generally happens in one of two ways: someone uses your SSN to get a job and their employer reports that person's income to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as if it were yours, or someone uses your SSN to file for your tax refund. You may not even know your identity has been stolen until the IRS informs you of the unreported income or multiple tax return filings.

This tax season, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP) and Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) are here to help. By taking a few proactive steps to keep your personal information private, you can reduce your risk of taxrelated identity theft.

"Consumers should protect themselves from identity thieves, who are becoming craftier and more sophisticated every year," said DATCP Secretary Randy Romanski. "There are many ways you can take preventative steps to keep your data safe and secure.'

Remember these tips to protect your identity this tax

- · Never store your SSN on any device that may be vulnerable to malware or data theft.
- Install a mailbox lock or have your mail sent to a Post Office (PO) Box™ to prevent anyone from stealing sensitive

- · Destroy unneeded documents containing personal information, such as your SSN or IRS account number, using a shredder or similar method.
- · Sign up for federal and state Identity Protection Personal Identification Numbers (IP PINs) to add an extra layer of security to your tax filings.

"The goal of the PIN program is to keep refunds in the right hands and out of the pockets of fraudsters," said Department of Revenue Secretary Peter Barca. "Another important thing to keep in mind about fraud, is that unless you have contacted us first, we never call people without first sending a letter. So, if you are getting a call or a text from us, but you haven't received a letter from us, that's a red flag for fraud. We always send letters first."

If you believe you may be the victim of tax-related identity theft, contact DOR by phone or email as soon as possible. If you received a notice from DOR, respond to the contact listed on the notice. If you did not receive a notice or have concerns about the validity of a notice, contact DOR at 608.266.2772 or DORIDTheft@wisconsin. gov. Instructions for reporting tax-related identity theft to the IRS are available on their webpage. If you confirm your identity was stolen, immediately inform your bank(s) and creditor(s) of your stolen identity and place a security freeze on your credit report with all three major credit

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




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Phyllis A. Frederick, 92, of Merrill, passed away Tuesday, January 23, 2024, at Aspirus Merrill Hospital.



MOVIES YOU GOTTA SEE

Broadcast News explores journalistic ethics with humor and heart

Broadcast News, released in 1987, was written, produced, and directed by James L. Brooks and stars Holly Hunter, Albert Brooks, and William Hurt as journalists working at a national television network's Washington, D.C. bureau.

Jane (Hunter) is a classic workaholic well, considering her daily stressinduced breakdowns, you could say she's a slightly more extreme version. Aaron (Brooks), like Jane, is a talented journalist. He's also wry to a fault and extremely smart - the kind of person who's probably too smart for his own good. Aaron and Jane collaborate often and do stellar work together.

Then there's Tom (Hurt), a new hire at the bureau. While Jane and Aaron are veteran reporters of hardhitting news, Tom's background is in sports, and even in this, he isn't very experienced - something he's self-conscious about. The guy's also not going to be splitting the atom any time soon, if you catch my drift. But he's a kind, charming, handsome dude, and he looks good on TV. Hurt absolutely kills as a guy who might be best described as a puppy that was recently transformed into a human:



NOTIFIED ON THE SECOND not especially bright, but likeable, and just generally happy to be wherever he

is at any given moment.

Broadcast News offers a thrilling and hilarious glimpse into the work of television journalists. Early in the film. Jane's in the trenches: she's in the editing room, putting the final touches on a piece while her deadline is literally minutes away. Tom's also

in the room, observing the process. By doing this, Tom represents the film's audience. Most viewers have never seen anything like this before, and neither has Tom; we're all in this together. And by "this," I mean witnessing utter chaos. Jane's story, on which she teamed up with Aaron, follows a veteran returning home from overseas. Jane gets the idea to use a Norman Rockwell painting depicting a World War II soldier's homecoming in the piece. They quickly and cleverly incorporate the artwork, producer Blair (the always wonderful Joan Cusack) literally runs the tape across the office to the control room, and the piece is featured in that evening's broadcast, just under the gun. Tom's wide-eyed shock gives way to exhilaration - he's completely intoxicated by what he had just seen, and he's especially impressed by Jane.

Later in the film, Tom gets his big break. While at an office party, word arrives that a Libyan plane had bombed an American military base in Sicily. Paul, the head of the network's news division, taps Jane to executive produce the special report, and Tom's chosen to anchor. Jane disagrees with

USFS or the Ice Skating Institute (ISI). Anyone who is a member of one of the organizations, however, must be in good standing.

Twenty-five members of the Merrill Ice Reflections Figure Skating (MIRFSC) competed in this year's BSG over four days of competition, with competitors ranging from 5-year-old Lydia Hoffman on up to 21-year-old Madison Altman-Wendt. Merrill area figure skaters competed in individual events ranging from Basic Elements to Advanced Free Skates and some also competed in duets and team production events.

Medals were presented to the top three places in each event, and placing first, second, or third in any event qualified the skater to advance and compete at the State Games of America being held in San Diego, Cal., this coming summer. Those who placed first, second, third, or fourth in any Showcase Event at preliminary level or higher also qualified the Showcase skater or team for National Showcase being held this summer.

MIRFSC figure skaters made a great showing at the BSG, with 22 of the 25 competitors placing in the top three in at least one of their events. Complete results for MIRFSC are as follows: (see table to the right.)

Tom's appointment, citing his inexperience, and pushes for Aaron, who's well-versed in American-Libyan relations, to get the nod. Paul ultimately sticks with Tom, and it's an absolute gut punch for Aaron, who reacts as any reasonable person would: by going home and making a few cocktails. The man does deserve some props, though; although he's wallowing in self-pity during the broadcast, he calls the studio and feeds useful information to Jane, who relays it to Tom, who, in turn, nails the report.

As the film goes on, Tom's stock within the network begins to rise, and Jane and Tom start to develop feelings for each other, despite their surface-level incompatibility: Tom, the embodiment of news becoming represents entertainment, everything Jane stands against as a journalist; and Tom finds Jane's experience and intensity intimidating. Meanwhile, Aaron harbors unrequited feelings for Jane, who only sees him as a close friend. The film is largely focused on the Jane/Tom/Aaron love triangle, but it's a set of circumstances exacerbated by each person's individual views on journalism in a time when how news was being reported was changing.

One of my favorite scenes features Aaron explaining to Jane why he believes Tom is "the devil": "He will be attractive. He'll be nice and helpful. He'll get a job where he influences a great, God-fearing nation. He'll never do an evil thing. He'll never deliberately hurt a living thing. He will just, bit by little bit, lower our standards where they are important. Just a tiny little bit. Just coax along flash over substance." Aaron ends his rant with a doozie of a line: "And he'll get all the great women."

Aaron's quite dismissive of Tom's reporting methods - specifically, Tom's use of emotion to drive a story home and there's a case to be made that Aaron's criticism of this is hypocritical. On a piece focused on women who were sexually assaulted while on dates with men they know, Tom tears up while listening to a subject of the story recount her attack. Aaron writes this off as cheap pandering, yet in Aaron and Jane's story about the returning soldier, the Rockwell painting is used to achieve the same goal - to evoke emotion. Why is it exploitative when Tom tries to tug at the audience's heartstrings, but when it elevates a story by Aaron, it's simply effective journalism? And would Aaron feel so strongly about Tom's approach if he wasn't carrying an unreciprocated torch for Jane? It's easy to imagine that

Aaron's anger, jealousy, and insecurity are fueled by his own feelings of rejection. Later in the movie, some surprising information about Tom's story comes to light, and it's a bombshell in his relationship with Jane.

While journalistic ethics might not necessarily be the focal point of Broadcast News, I believe the film deserves a sincere tip of the cap for exploring the subject in a way that entertains the viewer while also pushing them to ask a few questions. Is the utilization of emotion in journalism manipulative? Or is it necessary in connecting with the audience on a human level? Are these ideas simultaneously correct? Are they mutually exclusive? Are these issues that black and white? Are any, when it comes to journalism? I don't know if there are definitive right or wrong answers to these questions, but Broadcast News interrogates them thoughtfully, with both humor and heart.

In an ideal society, Broadcast News would've aged horribly. Someone watching the movie in 2024 would optimally decry how unrealistic it is, saying something like, "Man, remember how back in the late '80s, TV news almost turned into 24-hour profit-driven entertainment? That was a close one." Unfortunately, the fears Jane and Aaron had about the direction of news media have largely come to pass.

I'd be negligent in writing about Broadcast News without mentioning its ending. The saga of the three main characters arrives at one of the oddest and one of the most realistically mundane - conclusions ever featured in a dramacomedy film. Sometimes, there aren't fireworks or a party; some things just ... end with a somewhat boring peacefulness, and it took guts for James L. Brooks to wrap up his film on this note when he so easily could have gone a different route.

Broadcast News tries to pragmatically difficult questions journalism, friendship, and relationships, and it confronts the reality that although sometimes you don't get the resolution you'd hoped for, the one you end up with might be better in the long run (I think The Rolling Stones wrote a song about this). The final scene with Jane, Aaron, and Tom shows three people who took paths that might not be the most exciting, but they're the right ones, and that's okay. In fact, it might even be great. But, if you happen to be really lucky, and your real life exceeds your dreams - keep it to yourself.

Baker Barns: Built on creating community

Baker Barns, N5696 Hwy. 17 in Gleason, is a Mennonite-owned business that builds custom-made portable wooden "barn shaped" buildings, storage sheds, garages, cabins, and multi-purpose buildings. The buildings fit a wide variety of uses, limited only by the imagination of the purchaser and the zoning regulations of the municipality in which the building will be located. In fact, in Merrill, the structure that displays the 1892 horse drawn ladder wagon at the Merrill Fire Station is a custom-built Baker Barn.

Mervin Brubaker founded Baker Barns in Athens in his garage in 1999 and moved the business to Gleason when he and his wife came to the area to help establish a new Mennonite community. At his first Gleason location, Mervin modified the garage for his shop and then used a car hauler trailer to deliver the buildings to customers. In 2004, the business moved to its current location, and he modified the top story of an old barn for his shop. In 2015, the current Baker Barns shop was constructed. With each improvement to the facility, Mervin was able to make bigger, wider, longer buildings.

Baker Barns changed hands on Jan. 1, 2018, when Mervin and his family moved out of the area, and Jonathan Martin took over the business, somewhat jointly with Jonathan's brother-in-law, Ronald Martin, who has been with the company since 2006. Ronald now owns the actual property, owns and handles the delivery service for the finished barns, and works in the shop, as his time permits, while Jonathan owns and manages the Baker Barns business itself. Several years ago, Jonathan's son, Andrew, also became a part-owner in the Baker Barns business, and he is often key in working with customers to design a building according to their needs and specifications. Andrew started working for Baker Barns in 2016. His firsthand construction experience proves invaluable and also helps ensure the building design meets code.

Today the company can build up to 44' long buildings, Jonathan said. Everything is contingent on being able to haul the completed buildings down the road. "In Wisconsin, the maximum width is 16' wide on the eaves and 16' high" with the only real limitation on length being the capacity of the trailer "and being able to navigate a corner," Jonathan said. They produce 200-250 buildings of varying sizes per year, primarily serving the Merrill area and north, even into Michigan.

The business employs a number of other local area and Mennonite men and boys (not all are Mennonite) and is an important part of their community, Jonathan emphasizes. "We're not just selling sheds here," Jonathan said. "We're trying to build character." Since Mennonites end formal education at eighth grade, working alongside adults in the community provides youth with the opportunity to learn skills and a trade, build a good work ethic, focus on quality workmanship and a job well done, and form foundational character traits that will make them into contributing members of their faith community as adults. Jonathan likened it to growing up on a family farm and how that business was run and passed down through the generations. For most, a family farm is no longer feasible; creating businesses like Baker Barns is comparable.

Four things to know about ordering a Baker Barn:

- You need a building permit. Contact your local municipality to learn more.
- 2. Baker Barns need a good, level gravel pad for a foundation. Concrete is not necessary.
- 3. Plan to go to Gleason to order and design your building, working with someone face to face. They do not have a website.
- 4. Order at least six months in advance. While they build year round, delivery is dependent on weather and weight limits on roads.

Love of Jesus and togetherness highlight Catholic Schools Week at St. Francis

"Catholic Schools: United in Faith and Community" is the theme of National Catholic Schools Week at St. Francis Xavier Catholic School in Merrill Jan. 28-Feb. 3, with students spreading their love of Jesus and service to the community.

A special Mass begins the week at 9 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 28, followed by a pancake breakfast for the community and an Open House from 10:30-11:30 a.m. at the school.

"Catholic Schools Week gives us a chance to celebrate what is special about going to a Catholic school," said Principal Kate Shimel. "The week focuses on our relationships and how special it is that we get to talk about Jesus together and share our beliefs."

Faith-based activities during Catholic Schools Week will include presentations Wednesday, Jan. 31, by fourth and fifth grade students who have each selected a saint of the church to research and portray. "We are going to come together as a school, celebrating our faith and learning about the Eucharist and putting Jesus first," Shimel said. "The students look forward to the activities and getting to mingle with the other grades and enjoying the activities together."

The school has chosen the Merrill Area Community (MAC) Home, a warming center and homeless shelter, as a service project for Catholic Schools Week. Students and staff will be collecting supplies for the facility throughout the week.

"Every year we try to choose a different place in Merrill to help," Shimel said. "So this year I chose the MAC Home, because we have parishioners that volunteer there. The students are learning that there are people in need in our community, and they need our help."

Theresa Anthoney, Executive Director of the MAC Home, will give an informational talk at the beginning of the week about the facility and how it benefits the Merrill community.

"I'll probably do a rundown of what we do here and explain what homelessness is," she said.
"I'll be telling them about what they can do to help the homeless and give a general overview of how people get into the situations they are in."

Open since 2019, the nonprofit agency is both a transitional living center and warming facility which has served a total of more than 400 clients and last year provided more than 2,000 nights of safe lodging for people in the community.

"We are a warming center for adults on the main level, with five chairs and a shower facility,

laundry, and full kitchen," Anthoney said. "The transitional living center is a regular apartment upstairs for individuals and families where clients can stay up to 90

Students will be collecting kitchen and bath supplies, laundry soap, garbage bags, paper products, and other needed items for the facility.

During the school year, students work on various service projects, such as making cards and writing letters to veterans on the Never Forgotten Honor Flight, and take turns visiting residents at Pine Crest Nursing Home, among many other projects.

"We do service projects every month," Shimel said. "The students are learning that they can give something even if they don't have money. They can do something as simple as writing a card or praying with someone. You can help complete strangers."

In her first year at St. Francis, Amanda Jeffers teaches second and third grade and has two daughters attending the school.

"I think by doing the service projects, the students are learning how to be a part of the community and how to show love and kindness towards people," she said. "It gives them a sense of ownership in the community."

Jeffers' students attend morning and afternoon prayer in the school cafeteria, participate in mid week Mass, have weekly religion classes, and pray throughout the school day.

"We are able to talk about God and our beliefs, and we do a lot of praying," she said. "My students enjoy talking about God and knowing He is there. They enjoy being here and learning as much as they can about God and everything else. It's been a very rewarding experience."

As a parent, Jeffers chose St. Francis for her children because of its welcoming atmosphere and faith-based education. She will be attending the school's Open House during Catholic Schools Week as both a teacher and a parent.

"The community doesn't normally get to see the school, and the Open House gives us a chance to show off our school," she said. "We will be filling the halls with the students' work, and the community gets to come in and see what we do."

Hoeft appreciates the small class sizes at St. Francis, the religious aspect of the school, and the quality of the teachers and

"The school gives the kids the opportunity to explore their own faith and it gives them a foundation to be good people," he said. "Both of my kids love going to school, they like the classes and the teachers, and they enjoy going to Mass."

As a fundraiser for the church and school, the annual St. Francis Friday Fish Fries return Feb. 9 and run through March 22. Bingo nights, including a hot meal and snacks, take place the first Thursday of each month in the school cafeteria. cooking, and maple syrup and butter making.

"We have an EMT coming in to talk about first aid and a grandparent of two of our students will be talking about making maple syrup," Skubal said. "It will be interesting to see what the kids can do hands-on in a small group setting. They need to experience some of these life skills. That's one reason why I'm bringing back the mini courses."

Ryan Berg of Tomahawk has two grandsons attending St. Mary's and will present on maple syrup producing, beginning with a history of the product.

"I'm going to start with the history of maple syrup from 1609 when the Native Americans first discovered what the liquid was coming out of the tree's, up to the 1800's when the settlers came." Berg said.

Berg, who has been involved in syrup producing for more than 35 years, currently taps more than 1,200 maple trees and sells the product at area farmers markets. He plans to display some of the past and present tools and equipment used in the process and share photos of the large evaporators used today.

"I'm hoping the kids are interested and will ask questions," he said. "I'll have lots of visuals. I'm hoping it might spark an interest in them. If they have two or three maple trees in their backyard, they can get a starter kit and get into it as a hobby."

A mini course in butter making will be presented by Colleen Schuett of Tomahawk, who will be demonstrating an antique butter churn used by her mother and grandmother dating back to the 1920's.

"We always made our own butter at home, so it will be exciting to share something we are passing down to another generation," said Schuett, who is a member of the alumni of St. Mary's. "Of course, butter making is all automated now."

Schuett plans to explain the process of cream separation and how butter forms in the churn. Students will have the opportunity to operate the hand crank and sample the finished product.

"The process is pretty simple," she said. "The kids see it as something out of this world, and for them, it probably is. I think they will take home some nice memories."

Celebration of Mass at 8:45 a.m. and an all school retreat focusing on the subject of prayer will take place on Wednesday, Jan. 31, with students dressing in sports attire and team iersevs.

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Four inducted into Merrill Basketball Hall of Fame

A crowd turned out to cheer on the Boys and Girls during their Varsity Basketball Games Saturday night, Jan. 27, 2024, but a good number of the fans were also there to support the Merrill Basketball Program's annual Hall of Fame (HOF) Night and to celebrate this year's four inductees into the Merrill Basketball Hall of Fame (HOF).

Rory Osness - Boys' Player Inductee

Rory Osness was the evening's HOF inductee in the Boys' Player category. Osness was a Merrill Bluejay Boys Varsity Basketball player from 1988-1990 and racked up significant statistics during his years of play. He is only the second player to surpass 1,000 points in his Merrill Basketball career, finishing with 1,068 points in just three years. At the time, that was the second most points in Merrill High School (MHS) history. He still ranks 6th in Merrill for all-time scoring.

As a Sophomore player in 1988, Osness averaged 12.2 points per game. He set new Wisconsin Valley Conference (WVC) records

for most free throws made and attempted in a game, going 20-24, along with scoring 33 points in a win against Wausau East.

Player category. She played on the Merrill Girls Varsity Basketball Team coached by her dad, Bob Yuska, and was a four-year Varsity

In 1989 as a Junior, he made First Team WVC and ended up the fourth leading scorer. He scored 26 points in the Regional Final win against Rhinelander, taking the team to Sectionals at the Brown County Arena.

In 1990 as a Senior, Osness averaged 19.5 points a game, totaling 274 points for the season, including scoring 38 of Merrill's 50 points in a game against Wausau East. He made nine 3-pointers in that game. He was named Second Team WVC and Team MVP. He ranks 27th all time in WVC scoring with 726 points, placing him third among all Merrill players.

Fun fact: Current Boys Varsity Head Coach Troy Pieper readily admits Osness was his idol growing up. He said he would pretend to be Rory while playing basketball in his driveway and hoped that when he got to high school, he would become as good as him!

Melissa Yuska - Girls' Player Inductee

Melissa Yuska was a Merrill Girls Varsity Bluejay player from 1993-1997 and Saturday evening's HOF inductee in the Girls'

on the Merrill Girls Varsity Basketball Team coached by her dad, Bob Yuska, and was a four-year Varsity starter and letter winner, the first Freshman in MHS history to play Varsity Basketball. She made Honorable Mention All-State as both a Sophomore and Junior, made Second-Team All-State as a Senior, and was also an Honorable Mention All-American selection as a Senior She was WVC First-Team All-Conference in 1995, 1996, and 1997; averaged 17.2 points and 10.1 rebounds per game as a Senior; was the first Merrill girl to score more than 1,000 points in her high school career; and she finished with 1,126 total points in her career. She still holds the record for Girls Basketball at MHS.

Unfortunately,

After AFHS took an early 2-0 lead, Merrill got on the board with a 3-pointer from downtown by Mia Ott (10 pts, 2 3pt, 4 FT) that gave the Lady Jays a 3-2 lead at the 16:05 mark of the first half. Merrill built a 6-2 lead on a basket by Maddie Ott (9 pts, 1 FG, 2 3pt, 1 FT) and a made free throw to complete the And-1 three-point play. Both teams played solid defense through the midway point of the first half, as the game was tied 9-9 before the first timeout at 10:48. The Lady Green Devils went on a 5-0 run to lead 14-9 when Coach Debuhr used a timeout to regroup. After the timeout, the Lady Jays

went on a roll with consecutive 3-pointers by Freshman Grace Reimann (19 pts, 6 FG, 1 3pt, 4 FT) and Senior Maddie Ott as Merrill pulled to within 1 point, trailing 16-15 at the 5:05 mark. Haley Rindt (7 pts, 2 FG, 3 FT) gave Merrill the lead, 17-16 with a key basket late in the half. The teams traded baskets as Grace Reimann scored consecutive hoops and Mia Ott hit 2 free throws to close out the half 23-23 as both teams headed to the locker room.

Merrill came out and started off with a big 3-pointer by Mia Ott to grab a 26-23 lead. A quick 8-0 run by AFHS built their lead to 31-26, with 12:30 remaining in the game, but the Lady Jays tightened up their defense and closed the gap again to 1 point, trailing 31-30 after baskets by Grace Reimann and Haley Rindt. Maddie Ott hit another 3-pointer to put Merrill up 33-31

and played tough defense down the stretch to maintain a 34-31 lead with 5:40 left in the game. After a timeout by AFHS, the teams battled down the stretch as AFHS took their final lead, 35-34, prompting Merrill to call a timeout to discuss strategy. Grace Reimann hit another key basket and Senior Sophie Wendorf (3 pts, 1 3pt) hit a crucial 3-pointer to extend their lead to 39-35 with 2:40 left in the game, a lead Merrill would not relinquish. Junior Haley Rindt hit 2 free throws to increase the lead to 41-35. and Grace Reimann added another 3-point play with a basket and free throw as Merrill pulled away 44-35 in the last minute of play. The Lady Jays continued their hot free-throw shooting in the closing seconds, hitting all 4 attempts, and the final buzzer sounded for a final score of 48-38, lifting Merrill's record to 9-8 overall.

her basketball career was cut short due to injuries, but everything she learned from playing for her father, who she credits with much of her success, came back to benefit MHS again some years later when Yuska became the Merrill Girls Head Basketball Coach from 2007-2014.

Currently, she is the Principal at Little Chute Elementary School in Little Chute, Wis.

Tom Andreska - Coach Inductee

Tom Andreska coached the Merrill Boys Basketball Team for 35 years, from 1983-2019. He started his basketball coaching career while attending UW-Stout, coaching the fifth and sixth grade team at St. Joe's Catholic School, before coming to Merrill. During his 35-year tenure at Merrill, he coached the eighth grade team for four years, the Sophomore team (when that was a thing) for two years, the JV team for 15 years, and then served as Head Varsity Coach for 14 years from 1993-2007. During his time as Varsity Coach, he set and still holds the Merrill WVC record for the most wins in a season, going 12-4 in 1993-1994.

In addition to that, he is the only coach in Merrill Boys Basketball history to coach a State Runner-Up Team (2010-2011) [Fun fact: He coached those same kids during their fourth through eighth grade traveling team years] and to coach a WVC regular season Conference Championship Team (2018-2019).

Andreska started Merrill traveling teams being part of the Great Northwest Basketball League (GNBL) and brought the GNBL State Tournament to Merrill. It is still held in Merrill. In 1993, he started the Merrill Boys Basketball Booster Club, which still operates today, as well.

In addition to coaching, Andreska taught Technology Education at MHS from 1983 until he retired in 2018.

Fun Fact: Current Merrill Boys Varsity Basketball Head Coach Troy Pieper had Andreska as his Varsity Coach from 1995-1998.

Kate Knott - Friend of the Program/ Lifetime Achievement Inductee

Kate Knott started as the Girls Basketball Team Manager in 1996 and still continues in this role, more than 27 years later. Players and coaches have come and gone through the

program, but Knott has been a constant. She loves what she does and shows up every day ready to work with a great sense of humor, a big smile, a lot of energy, and dedication that inspires others to be better, nominators said. She is especially known for her infamous and motivating team speeches. The players love her and say Kate is "secretly hilarious" and always gets the players smiling and laughing with her. They love how she gets them pumped up.

"Kate always delivers a great pre-game speech which always ends with her hand up in the middle of the team and saying, 'Now let's go win this thing!'" nominators said.

And at the last away game of the season, "she walks to the back of the bus and delivers her season re-cap to the team, letting them know that they had a great season and should be proud of themselves."

Beyond her contributions to the Merrill Basketball Program, inducting Knott into the HOF is not only a testimony to her spirit, her humility, and her dedication to her position as the Girls Basketball Manager, but also to her character.
