Gleason wolfdog sanctuary gifted new ATV

Apex Angels and Warriors works to help veterans with PTSD

GLEASON – A local organization with a mission to help military veterans and wolfdogs connect and heal was recently gifted a new ATV.

Apex Angels and Warriors received the fourwheeler from Lakeland Powersports in Woodruff last month.

Apex Angels and Warriors, located at N4704 Town Hall Rd. in Gleason, is a nonprofit wolfdog sanctuary. The organization assists veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) with healing by helping them connect with wolfdogs, which are canines with both domestic dog and wolf in their genetic ancestries.

The sanctuary rescues wolfdogs from all around the country. Michelle Last, Director of Apex Angels and Warriors, said the wolfdogs they take in would otherwise by euthanized because of their DNA.

"They are a very misunderstood breed with a lot of falsehoods and statements made about them," Last ex-

plained. "Both the wolfdogs and veterans have stigmas that the public has placed on them, such as they are a danger, they are unpredictable, they are useless in society. When the veterans work with the wolfdogs to trust people again, as most come from abusive and neglectful backgrounds, and realize that these amazing animals are nothing what society says they are, then they reflect inwards and start to realize that neither are they, and that's when the healing starts. We call it 'dual healing.'"

Apex Angels and War-

riors began in Aug. 2022, but due to flooding, a completely new structure had to be built. After working throughout the summer of 2023, the facility opened its doors and is currently offering tours.

There is no cost for the tours, but Last noted that donations towards the care of the animals is appreciated

"We do take donations of meat anytime, any raw meat

except for pork or shellfish, as we feed 75 pounds of raw meat a day," Last stated. "If someone is cleaning out their freezer and it has a little bit of freezer burn on it, we will take it. We also take monetary donations for the cost of everyday care, vet bills and utilities."

Last added that the sanctuary also accepts contributions of straw and mulch for the wolfdogs' pens, as well as building materials

for the construction of its new care room.

"We are always looking for volunteers to help with daily care and projects, and of course any veteran is always welcome," Last said.

Former Tomahawk Bus Company driver reaches plea deal

TOMAHAWK - A former Tomahawk Bus Company driver accused of refusing to drop off students at their homes and instead driving to the company's parking location reached a plea deal last week.

The agreement stems

from an incident that occurred on Jan. 18, 2023, in which Debra K. Decker, 63, of Tomahawk reportedly frustrated with the behavior of students on the bus, drove the bus back to the Tomahawk Bus Company's location on Kaphaem Rd. rather than bringing the students to their destinations. The route was completed by another driver.

The following day, the School District of Tomahawk said Decker was cooperating with a Tomahawk Police Department investigation and would no longer transport district students.

Decker appeared in Lincoln County court on Wednesday, Feb. 7, facing 41 felony counts of false imprisonment and one misdemeanor charge of disorderly conduct. Judge Galen Bayne-Allison dismissed the false imprisonment charges as part of a plea deal, according to court records.

Decker pleaded no contest to the count of disorderly conduct. Under a deferred agreement, the charge will be dismissed if Decker follows several court-imposed guidelines over the next 12 months.

DOJ identifies law enforcement personnel, individual involved in Town of Crescent shooting incident

TOWN OF CRESCENT - The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI), on Wednesday, Feb. 7, identified the law enforcement personnel and the individual involved in a shooting incident in the Town of Crescent in Oneida County last month.

According to DOJ, at approximately 8:39 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 20, the Oneida County Sheriff's Office received two hangup 911 calls requiring a welfare check at a residence located in the 1600 block of River St.

Three Oneida County Sheriff's deputies - Sgt. Thomas Williams, Deputy Michael Bedish and Deputy Cole Lehman; and two Rhinelander police officers - Sgt. Christie Kondzela and Officer Graeme Biskobing, responded to the residence.

Upon arrival at the residence, law enforcement determined there were two

subjects inside. DOJ said law enforcement entered the residence, where they were met with gunfire by Steven Kincaid, 33. One of the deputies returned fire. All law enforcement retreated outside the residence, backed away and created a perimeter. Kincaid continued to shoot at the officers from the second level of the house, and gunfire was exchanged, according to DOJ.

Tactical team members from the Vilas, Oneida, Marathon, Langlade and Lincoln County Sheriff's Offices responded to the residence. DOJ said verbal commands were attempted without response, and non-lethal tactics were deployed.

Eventually, the second subject came out of the residence and was evaluated by emergency medical services on scene.

The tactical team entered the house and located Kincaid who was deceased

No law enforcement personnel were injured during the incident.

DOJ said the involved officers from Rhinelander Police Department were each wearing a body camera during the incident. Both the Rhinelander Police Department and the Oneida County Sheriff's Office have squad cam-

DCI is leading the investigation and is assisted by DCI Crime Response Specialists and members of DCI's Digital Evidence Unit. All involved law enforcement are fully cooperating with DCI during this investigation, according to DOJ.

DCI is continuing to review evidence and determine the facts of this incident and will turn over investigative reports to the Oneida County District Attorney when the investigation concludes.

DCI noted that Williams has over nine years of law enforcement experience; Bedish, over three-and-ahalf years; Lehman, over one year; Kondzela, over 10 years; and Biskobing, over one year.

TOMAHAWK - Tomahawk's American Legion Post 93 and VFW Post 2687, earlier this month, held its annual remembrance ceremony honoring four chaplains who lost their lives in World War II.

The Four Chaplains Day event, held at Generations Funeral Home on Sunday, Feb. 4, recognized the "Four Chaplains" - Methodist minister the Reverend George L. Fox, Reform Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, Catholic priest Father John P. Washington and Reformed Church in America minister the Reverend Clark V. Poling.

The four men were aboard the USAT Dorchester traveling from New York to Greenland when it was torpedoed by a German Uboat in the Labrador Sea on Feb. 3, 1943. After the troop

ship was struck, Fox, Goode, Washington and Poling gave away their life jackets when the supply ran out and died when the craft sank.

Only 230 of the 904 people on board survived.

Members of the local posts said they "hope that by annually celebrating the heroism that the chaplains displayed that day, the four men who $never\,came\,home\,from\,WWII$ won't be forgotten."

Readers are invited to submit questions about God, the Bible, and religion. I shall try to answer them for you, using the Bible as the authority for my answers.

Over the last few weeks, we have been looking at the idea that the Christian life is an ordinary life - with its ups and downs, and joys and sorrows like everyone else. If the Christian life is extraordinary, it is extraordinary in this: it is directed by a love for God and a humble obedience to what God has said. It is not a religious life, but a humble, obedient life that is confident in the One who defines what is true. Today, we shall continue looking at this, focused on the Spirit

In Ephesians 5:18 Christians are commanded to be filled with God's Holy Spirit. What does this look like? What does this mean?

Some Christians believe that being Spirit filled means the Holy Spirit takes over and causes you to do some rather strange things; speak in a foreign language, see visions, or something that is super natural. But that is not the case. The command in Ephesians 5:18, to be filled with the Holy Spirit, is then followed in verses 19 through 20 with three evidences of being Spirit filled. It is a listing, each verse starting with a participle.

In verse 19 we read, Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord. The Holy Spirit of God gives to us a song that has God for its subject and God as its intended audience. A good example would be Psalm 145, or any of the 'salms that praise God for who He is and what He does. And the music? It would be a melody that compliments the words and stays in the background, for the message of praise to God is the most important part of the song.

In verse 20 we read, Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit of God would cause us to recognize God's hand in all that happens in our life, and we would be thankful for what He is doing in us - even the troubles in life have a purpose because He loves us (Romans 5:1-6). And I would know that through the events in life, He is accomplishing the reason for which He saved me, that I would be like Christ in my character (Romans 8:28,29, Philippians 3:12-14) - which is always best.

And then, in verse 21 we read, Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God. This verse is then followed by verses 22 through 33 and a description of how a husband and wife should submit themselves to each other in the way that God says they should. In summary, the wife submitting to the authority of her husband, and the husband submitting him self to meeting the needs of his wife. Mutual submission defined by God.

As I stated in the beginning, the Christian life is an ordinary life, the only extraordinary thing would be that it is lived in humble obedience to God. Even being filled by the Holy Spirit would make us better, ordinary people who behave in obedience to how God defines life should be lived.



Quarterly transportation aids to Wisconsin municipalities exceed \$138 million

WISCONSIN - Governor Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT), on Tuesday, Feb. 6, announced that municipalities across the state received more than \$138 million in the first quarterly payments for 2024 for General Transportation, Connecting Highway and Expressway Policing Aids.

A release from Evers' office said that for calendar year 2024, local governments will receive more than \$536 million in General Transportation Aids financial assistance to support transportation-related projects, a 2% increase over calendar year 2023 allocations provided by the 2023-25 biennial budget.

Total funding for all local programs makes up almost one-third of the state transportation budget.

General Transportation Aids (GTA) help cover the costs of constructing, maintaining and operating roads and streets under local jurisdiction.

Connecting Highway Aids (CHA) reimburse municipalities for maintenance and traffic control of certain state highways within municipalities.

Expressway Policing Aids help the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department with the costs of patrolling expressways within the county.



Sophomore Kaiden Kapelliesh battled to a 3rd-place finish at 165.


Junior Blake Younker claimed 3rd place at 190.

Fishing Report: Freezing nights have saved ice

NORTHERN WISCON-SIN - This season just continues to surprise us. Earlier this month, we saw temps in the mid 40s and sunshine. It felt like April out there! It was truly amazing to be out in the beginning of February, lathering on the sunblock and wearing no jacket. It continued to get below freezing at night as we headed into last week, which prevented us from losing much in the way of ice depth ahead of last week's warmer temps.

We're seeing from six to 12 inches of ice on most lakes, but again, the unusual season has led to some iffy ice in areas. Caution is the name of the game this year. We don't expect this next week to end the season by any means, but it'll make it sloppy and slippery.

The walleye fishing has been okay but not great, with varying reports from throughout the area. Walleye are also hitting during the daytime, especially if you fish deeper. On some lakes, people are getting walleye by jigging in deeper water with some jigs like Swedish Pimples tipped with crappie minnow heads only.

The northern fishing has been great, with these fish

hitting in the usual weeds. The key to finding them is to look for good, healthy green weeds where the panfish are. Larger shiners work best for the northerns, set right on the tops of the weeds. One hint if the fishing is slow is to put two shiners on your trebles pointed in opposite directions – this makes them struggle against each other and creates more attraction as they struggle.

Panfish action has been very good, with crappies heading the action. These fish have been hitting very well in deeper water, with lakes producing in the holes and sometimes on the mud flats in deeper water. All you need is a jigging rod with small vertical jigs and a waxie, although some anglers are also getting fish with tip-downs tipped with crappie minnows. Bluegills are hitting in the weeds. Spikes or waxies are the best baits for these fish. Perch have been hitting sporadically in the deeper weeds also.

We've only got about a month left of the game fishing season. Get out there and enjoy this unusual year – let's hope it's a one-and-done for all of our lifetimes!
