# **Lincoln County board approves Pine Crest sale**

# Supervisors cap nearly two-year saga with 15-6 vote

MERRILL - During a nearly four-hour Lincoln County Board of Supervisors meeting on Monday, Feb. 19, prior to which members of the People for Pine Crest held a press conference to share their objections to the proposed sale of Pine Crest Nursing Home in Merrill and urge Supervisors to postpone the vote, 15 of the 21 Supervisors who were present voted in favor of a resolution approving the sale.

The resolution instructed Board Chair and District 9 Supervisor Don Friske and County Clerk Chris Marlowe to sign the Asset Purchase Agreement on behalf of the county, and they did so immediately following the meeting.

Nursing Pine Crest Home will be sold to Merrill Campus LLC and Senior Management Inc., with the closing set for June 30 and the new ownership to take effect July 1.

Prior to the item being considered on the board's agenda, however, the board heard from 22 individuals who spoke during the public comment period. The vast majority asked the board to stop the sale or

postpone the vote, questioning various aspects of the proposed Asset Purchase Agreement, in addition to their general objections to the nursing home becoming privately owned rather than county-owned.

Two of the speakers, however, spoke in support of the sale and cited the financial necessity of the

Also prior to the vote. District 3 Supervisor Elizabeth McCrank introduced a motion to amend the proposed resolution on the agenda, suggesting the addition of language that would provide that if the purchaser ceased to operate Pine Crest as a skilled nursing home, or declared an intent to cease to operate it as such, within five years, the property and improvements would revert back to the county. District 7 Supervisor Greta Rusch seconded the motion, but after discussion, the motion to amend failed on a voice vote. Some said that type of language would effectively kill any prospects for a sale.

Lincoln County Corporation Counsel Karry Johnson outlined the proposed Asset Purchase Agreement before District 12 Supervisor Julie DePasse made a motion to approve the resolution calling for the Approval of the Asset Purchase Agreement be-



tween Lincoln County and purchaser Merrill Campus LLC and Senior Management Inc. District 21 Supervisor Gene Simon seconded the motion.

After some discussion, during which numerous Supervisors shared their confidence in the proposed buyers and the process that had vetted this buyer as one who would continue to operate Pine Crest Nursing Home as a skilled nursing facility and ensure its viability going forward, along with maintaining the current staff and level of Medicaid patients, it came time for the vote.

District 19 Supervisor Julie Allen was absent from the meeting due to traveling. The other 21 Supervisors voted, and the resolution passed on a 15-6 roll call vote.

Voting in favor were Friske, DePasse, Simon, District 4 Supervisor Steve Osness Jr., District 5 Supervisor Don Wendorf, District 8 Supervisor Laurie Thiel, District 10 Supervisor and Board Vice-Chair Jesse Boyd, District 11 Supervisor Randy Detert, District 13 Supervisor George Brixius, District 15 Supervisor Marty Lemke, District 16 Supervisor Dana Miller, District 17 Supervisor James Meunier, District 18 Supervisor Ken Wickham, District 20 Supervisor Angela Cummings and District 22 Supervisor Greg Hartwig.

Voting against were Mc-Crank, Rusch, District 1 Supervisor William Bialecki, District 2 Supervisor Lori Anderson-Malm, District 6 Supervisor Norbert Ashbeck and District 14 Supervisor Brian Hafeman.

### Taking a look back at the Pine Crest saga

The board's approval of the Pine Crest sale marks the end of a nearly two-year saga regarding the facility.

In June 2022, an ad hoc committee was formed and tasked with coming up with actions Lincoln County could take regarding the future of Pine Crest, which had experienced millions of dollars in financial losses over previous years.

The committee completed its Pine Crest report in March 2023 and provided the board with several ways the county could potentially proceed, including seeking ways to cut costs and create additional revenues at Pine Crest, downsizing or finding alternative uses for the facility, selling the property and/or holding a referendum to allow Lincoln County voters to decide whether or not the county should continue its operation of Pine Crest.

In May 2023, the board voted 15-6 to direct the county's Administrative and Legislative (A&L) Committee to begin the process of securing the services of a broker to put Pine Crest up for sale.

A group calling itself "People for Pine Crest," in June 2023, gathered more than 650 signatures on a petition asking the board not to sell the facility. That same month, the A&L Committee voted to select the firm Marcus & Millichap as the county's broker for a potential Pine Crest sale.

A resolution seeking to place a binding referendum related to Pine Crest funding on 2024 Spring Election ballots was rejected by a 13-9 board vote in Aug. 2023. Under the proposed referendum, if it had made it onto April ballots and had been approved by voters, Lincoln County would have been allowed to exceed levy limits by \$3 million per year for ten years to fund operations and maintenance at Pine Crest. The referendum would have had a tax impact of \$85.14 per \$100,000.00 of equalized value of private property, according to the resolution.

In Sept. 2023, the Tomahawk Leader and the Merrill Foto News conducted a community survey for Lincoln County residents in an effort to gather public opinion on Pine Crest. The results of the survey were published the following month, and more than 80% of the survey's nearly 800 respondents indicated that they wanted Lincoln County to continue its ownership of the facility, even if it meant an increase in residents' property taxes, and that the county should not explore a Pine Crest sale.

After months of negotiations, the A&L Committee gave the thumbs up to the purchase agreement on Monday, Feb. 12, and the county board approved it one week later.

# Evers, Baldwin encouraging businesses impacted by mild winter to apply for Economic Injury Disaster Loans

WISCONSIN - Governor Conv Evers and U.S. Sena. tor Tammy Baldwin (D-Wisconsin), on Tuesday, Feb. 20, announced that Wisconsin businesses that have suffered losses due to this year's unusually mild winter may be eligible for a federal disaster loan program.

The announcement came one day after 14 northern Wisconsin legislators, including State Senator Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk) and State Representative Calvin Callahan (R-Tomahawk), in an open letter encouraged Evers to work with the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) to declare parts of the state experiencing economic losses due to the lack of snow as "economic injury disaster areas," allowing businesses in those areas to apply for loans through

the U.S. SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.

A release from Evers' office said this winter has months to be related to lacked Wisconsin's typical snowfall in many areas of the state, which has affected travel and recreation businesses that depend on it for activities such as downhill and cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and snowmobiling.

"The National Weather Service reports that snowfall statewide has been 20 to 30 inches below normal this winter," the release stated. "In the Lake Superior snowbelt, generally across Ashland, Iron and Vilas counties, snowfall was 40 to 70 inches below normal."

According to the release, Evers and Baldwin have been advocating for the SBA to confirm disaster coverage extends to businesses impacted by Wisconsin's extraordinary winter conditions, and following those conversa-

tions, SBA confirmed that it will consider business losses from recent low snowfalls over the winter drought and therefore engible for assistance.

Many Wisconsin counties are already covered by a pre-existing disaster designation for drought from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which allows businesses in those counties to seek emergency loans through the EIDL program to offset business losses related to the drought.

"The loans are designed to help businesses get through emergency situations that have impacted their economic well-being," the release said.

Under the EIDL program, businesses can borrow up to \$2 million to cover their actual losses. Businesses pay no interest on the loan for the first year and a maximum rate of 4% for the rest of the loan period, according to

the release.

In order to take advantage of the program, businesses must apply by their county's application dead-

Businesses in Lincoln, Langlade, Marathon and Taylor Counties must apply by Monday, May 13.

The application deadline for Forest, Oneida, Price and Vilas County businesses is Wednesday, May 29.

Other counties throughout the state have a variety of application deadlines, ranging from Monday, April 8 to Wednesday, July

Businesses may submit applications and find additional disaster assistance information at http:// lending.sba.gov. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 or email disaster customer service @sba.gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. Individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing or

have a speech-related disability can dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services.

Completed applications also be mailed to U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, Tex., 76155.

Applicants may also contact the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation with their EIDL-related questions at EIDLInquiries@wedc.org.

"The lack of snow we've experienced so far this winter has had serious economic impacts on folks and businesses, especially in our northern counties, who rely on snow and winter weather to attract customers and be successful," Evers said. "In partnership with Senator Baldwin, my administration has been working with the federal Small Business Administration to ensure businesses in impacted counties are eligible for

relief, and I'm glad to announce that our efforts have been successful. I encourage all eligible businesses to apply for these loans as soon as possible, and in the meantime, I encourage Wisconsinites to plan a trip, visit local businesses and find other exciting ways to enjoy winter in Wisconsin in our beautiful northern and central communities."

"In Wisconsin, snowy winters are not just another season, but also a huge economic driver, particularly in the northern part of the state," Baldwin stated. "This year's low snowfall has hit many Wisconsin businesses hard, and we need to do more to ensure they get some relief. I was happy to partner with Governor Evers to successfully push the Biden administration to ensure northern Wisconsin businesses impacted by this year's low snowfall can get the support and help they need."



Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the day we Christians are marked with ashes and remember that we came from dust - and one day, known only to God, we will return to dust.

Perhaps you know someone who has spoken about their life. They were a success in business, experienced disappointments in their marriage, they complained about growing older. Life is just not what they thought it would be. They ask "I'm just not sure where my place

Have you ever asked yourself that same question? Am I where I should be in my life? Or how will I know when I am at that place. God reminds us through His prophet Jeremiah "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jer 29:11 NIV)

Our "place" is between the "coming from dust" to "returning to

I am reminded of a poem written by Linda Ellis titled "The Dash" No doubt many of you have heard or read this poem. It speaks to our entire life between our birth date and the date of our death

On Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, the church reminds us of our place, not as a judgment or an insult, but that our life must begin

God tells us that we should live our life from the inside out. Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21 tells us, "Beware of practicing your righteousness before others in order to be seen by them, for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. So whenever you give alms do not sound a trumpet before you as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets so that they may be praised by others.

Truly I tell you they have received their reward. But when you give alms do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret and your Father who sees in secret will reward you and whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret, and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

And whenever you fast, do not look somber, like the hypocrites, for they mark their faces to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you they have received their reward. But when you fast put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal, but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is there your heart will be.

Ash Wednesday invites us into the observance of Holy Lent by examining our conscience, by prayer, fasting and self-denial and by reading and studying God's Holy Word. These are the practices that point us to that secret place where God lives.

"To dust you shall return" is not God's threat or punishment. And it is not simply a statement about bodily decay after death. It is a statement of God's faithfulness to us. It is a statement of God's love and desire for us. It is the promise of resurrected life.

Readers are invited to submit questions about God, the Bible, and religion. I shall try to answer them for you, using the Bible as the authority for my answers.

Last week we looked at love and the idea that love finds its source and definition in God. I closed with the comment that God has always loved us. The issue is, will we love God? We sin because we do not love God as we should (1 John 4:20). With this thought, I would like to look at faith in God, which is a love for God (John 14:21).

What is faith in God? Faith in God is humble obedience to what we know God has said. In Hebrews 11 we are given a number of examples where men and women, who through faith in God, made hard choices in obedience to what they knew God had said. The Bible teaches that if we do not obey God, then we really do not believe God (James 2:17-26). But there is something we need to be careful of, something that can be mistaken for faith in God when it really is not faith in God. That thing is faith in religion.

Faith is about humbly obeying what we have accepted as being true. Faith in religion is about us trying to reach and appease God through following a ritual, saying a certain prayer, observing certain days, or working at being good because that is what our religion says is true. But faith in God understands that God has given us an authoritative revelation of Himself - the Bible. Where faith in God is about following a written record of what God has said (Bible), faith in religion is about following traditions that have changed over time but are taught by people who profess to be the authoritative representatives of God. Where the written record (Bible) does not change, traditions and rituals do because they are defined by people who change.

Change over time is the big difference between faith in religion and faith in God. God does not change, and therefore He does not have to change His written revelation of Himself (Bible). People will always be people with the same basic needs and God will always be God with the same truth. But religion will adjust and change according to ideas and opinions of religious officials.

Religion, based on the changing ideas of people, can separate us from God even as we think we are pleasing God through our religion. Religion has the danger of placing obstacles between us and God that separate us through rituals and human intermediaries; things that God's revelation (Bible) does not mention.

One thing the Bible teaches over and over is that God is personal and desires a personal relationship with us (Isaiah 57:15), something religion does not offer. Religion offers us rituals and activities that do not make a relationship with God. In Matthew 15:8,9, Jesus commented on the religion of the Jews, saying: This people draw near to me with their mouth, and honour me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men (traditions). God desires us. not religious activities and traditions.




