Opening doors to conversation and connection

Neville Public Museum shares voices of LGBTQ+ youth

A collaborative display at the Neville Public Museum is opening doors to conversation and connection in the community by displaying the voices, stories and art of local LGBTQ+ youth on a very fitting medium.

Community Doors, Executive Director Beth Kowalski said, is an extension of the Telling Our Stories exhibit also on display at the Neville.

"Almost four years ago, we started working with the UW-Green Bay's Archives staff," she said. "They, for the last several years through coursework, have been collecting oral histories and stories. We try not to duplicate stories and they have coursework that's taught around capturing oral histories — interviewing, recording, all that sort of stuff. We were able to go ahead and work together on an exhibit, which is *Telling Our Stories*."

While Telling Our Stories shares the experiences of LGBTQ+ adults, Kowalski said it quickly became apparent that there needed to be an outlet for youth to share their stories as well.

"With *Telling Our Stories*, you had to be 18 or older to be interviewed," she said. "We had a committee of community stakeholders and members that help shape our content and flow and they definitely wanted a youth voice and so that's where [Community Doors] started."

Kowalski said Community Doors would not have been possible without a few key community partners who provided materials and opportunities for the artwork

to come to life.

"UW-Green Bay's Pride Center, pride camps, the Bay Area Council on Gender Diversity and the Oneida Nation worked with 6-12th grade students," she said. "Habitat for Humanity donated doors. Sherwin Williams donated paint. The doors went out into the areas where the youth were doing youth camps and workshops and

those youth were able to share their stories through the community doors."

At pride camps, outreach events and group events, the doors became an opportunity for individuals to express themselves, interact with prompts and create an expression of pride ad togetherness.

The end product of the project, Kowalski said, are a series of doors decorated with symbols, ideas and thoughts representing the formative experiences of local LGBTQ+youth — granting patrons of the exhibit a unique opportunity to see the current state of the community, rather than looking back at the past.

"You're seeing first-person youth accounts of some very positive things," she said. "Some things that shaped and formed youth and still can probably continue to shape them... There's some happy moments and some challenging moments, but I think what's most important is that it's all through the youth's voice — this moment in time. And that's interesting, because normally we look back towards history, which is important, but here you're making history."

Some common themes run through the doors, despite their different appearances, sharing a fondness for memes, feelings of loneliness, pride in self discovery, hope for acceptance and a desire for understanding.

Kowalski said she hopes the messages conveyed through the doors resonate with visitors to the exhibit and foster a greater sense of understanding and respect in the community.

"We're an educational institution," she

said. "And we're hoping that if somebody comes in here that they get a chance to read those first-person accounts because they truly are primary sources. We didn't influence it — that's really that person's account of what was happening. At the end of the day, we're all human and we all want to be treated with dignity and respect. So hopefully, if you come through, you can see that it may not be the shoes that you walk in or the lifestyle that you have, but that it is part of our community. And here at the Neville, it's our responsibility to share all of those voices."

Community Doors, Kowalski said, is just one way the Neville is moving towards its goal of highlighting community voices and fostering a sense of community in Brown County.

"It's part of our mission here at the Neville," she said. "We bridge communities, we connect generations and we do that through exhibitions and public programs that take a multitude of community voices and we're able to then share them and tell them through exhibitions."

The *Community Doors* exhibit will close temporarily on April 1 and reopen May 25.

The episode will be aired on social media channels at a later date.



Excitement builds for Green Bay Fringe Festival

Excitement has begun to build for the Green Bay Fringe Festival, as organizers have begun slowly releasing the performances and acts that will be featured in the four-day celebration of art.

"What the Green Bay Fringe Festival is is a fringe festival," said Matt Worzala, vice president of the Green Bay Fringe Board. "It sounds repetitive, but it's built on the tradition of other fringe festivals. The most famous one that kind of started it all is the one in Edinburgh, over in Scotland, but there are quite a few here in the states as well. There's one in Tampa. There's one in Indianapolis. There are several in Canada and there's some out on the west coast as well. We're in that tradition where we will be a weekend of shows of different types and typically hosted in non-theater venues or non-traditional performance venues. We hope that people will come and see and get to experience plays and creators that are not from the local area and that those creators and performers will get to experience the greater Green Bay area as well."

Worzala said that in order to get a fringe festival to Green Bay, he and other organizers had plenty of support from the community.

"One person to give a huge shout out to is Alex Galt," he said. "He was actually with UntitledTow, which was a big writing and book festival that took place years ago. It's morphed into something else now, but he was one of the creators of that and when Mike (Eserkaln) and I were first meeting to figure out how to make a fringe festival happen and what limitations or what roadblocks there are, we reached out to Alex and he met with us and gave us a lot of insights on how creating a festival works."

Community interest and support for the

festival, Worzala said, has been nothing short of enthusiastic.

"The best thing has just been how enthusiastic everyone is about not only being a part of the board, but also in contributing to the festival," he said. "Whether that's offering up their space to have shows put on, financial donations, donations of time or sharing our listings across different social media... Mike and I, when we were first talking about this, were like, 'There's no reason we can't do this, right?' And we couldn't think of a real reason why we couldn't and every roadblock that we had dreamed up has been climbed over or driven around very easily."

While there are a handful of local acts in the mix, Worzala said there has been significant interest from performers based further away and even out of the state.

"We were actually surprised that the





first couple of responses that we got actually were not from even the greater Northeastern Wisconsin area," he said. "We were very impressed by the reach and the enthusiasm and energy a lot of these groups have to travel to other places to put on their shows. It's not really a 50/50 mix, but about one third of [the performers] are local now and then about two thirds are from not in the greater Green Bay area, which is very exciting."

Because of the format of the festival. Worzala said he is excited for those outof-town acts and performers to have the opportunity to explore Green Bay and for all of the performers to connect with each other when they might not have otherwise crossed paths.

"Everyone will get to do three shows and we have about 25 groups performing," he said. "They're all going to do three performances throughout those four days and then we'll kind of have a closing party/ 'Hey, we did it' celebration for any of the acts that want to stick around before we send them out on their way, back onto the road again... [Performers] come into this town kind of a tourist. What I hope is to be able to show some of the people around Green Bay, if they have the time for that. But one of the really neat things about fringe festival is that you have your performances and then you're able to see all of these other performances... You get to take your show that's only 30-55 minutes and take it to a different place.

You're trying to meet people and trying to get them to come to your show — doing a little bit of hustling to self-promote and get people to come out and see you — but then, in that time you're not performing, you're out meeting people in the area, touring around the city, going to other shows and seeing what other performers are doing. So it's a really great opportunity as a performer to just experience all of this art and all of this culture that you would not normally be exposed to."

That exposure to different elements of art and culture, though, is what Worzala said makes fringe festivals special and ensures that there will be something for everyone to enjoy.

"One of the really great things about a fringe festival is that, because it kind of started as the idea of being on the fringe of this theater festival, it's kind of unique acts," he said. "We really wanted to get a good cross-section of different performance styles and it was important to us that we be able to provide shows that different ages or different sensibilities would feel comfortable going to see and I think we've really successfully accomplished that. Obviously time will tell, but I think the groups that we're going to make available in this fringe festival will appeal to a



Recognizing and celebrating Northeast Wisconsin's music industry leaders

The Tarlton Theatre was filled with the best and brightest of Northeast Wisconsin's musical talent Thursday night as finalists waited anxiously to see who would be heading home with some hardware from the inaugural Bay Area Music Awards (the BAMMY Awards).

The BAMMY Awards, hosted by the Tarlton Theatre, aim to recognize and celebrate local leaders in the music industry and showcase the bands, musicians, performers and other music industry professionals making great accomplishments across 25 award categories.

"Last year, we held a benefit and recognition show for a great friend of mine and a lot of folks in the community — Bob Balsley," Tarl Knight, owner of the Tarlton Theatre, said. "That project was called In My Life and it was an album created in tribute to him with artists from the area who recorded a version of one of Bob's original songs. We put that all together with the show and we recognized Bob while he's still here with us. And that philosophy kind of sat with me for the next couple of months — the importance of community and coming together to recognize folks in our area while we're all still here. People didn't know the legend of Bob Balsley and his story and I think that there's a lot of unrecognized talent and sacrifice and livelihoods in the greater Green Bay area."

While it may often go unrecognized, Knight said there is no mistaking the value brought to the community by its music professionals.

"The importance of music and art in all of our lives, it can't be overstated," he said. "Those are some of the things that make life worth living, in my opinion and obviously many others. So to be able to recognize the folks who bring magic into our lives with music and to celebrate them and what they bring to our economy, to our lives and our industry, that's a big opportunity. The BAMMY's came out of a need for us to recognize the folks in our community that kept going unrecognized and making music and creating magic in our lives through it."

To provide those folks with some recognition, 25 award categories covering a range of involvement in the music industry were opened for nominations earlier this year.

"We came up with 25 different award categories, which is only the bare minimum the committee and our team could produce in order to recognize all of the most basic foundational genres and aspects of the music industry," he said. "And it's not just about the folks who are making music, but also community players who are supporting it, promoting it, producing it and creating different spaces where music can be celebrated."

Being selected as the winner of a BAMMY award, Knight said, is a celebration and recognition of that hard work and

dedication that so often goes unnoticed.

"We have a lot of really dedicated, talented individuals..." he said. "It's important that we bring that part of the community out and we shine a spotlight on it. It's about more than having one individual on the mic. It's about amplifying the voices of all

the music industry folks in our community. This is the opportunity for someone to walk away with an award knowing that they were a leader in their industry, and hopefully we'll be bringing more folks to the table to continue to create that music economy and industry."

broad variety of people and I really think that people, if they take some chances on these shows, are going to come away really enjoying it."


With the festival scheduled for July 18-21, Worzala said he hopes anticipation continues to build and that Northeast Wisconsin's thriving theater community will show up to support the performers involved so that the Green Bay Fringe Festival can continue to occur for years to come.

"I'm most excited to see if we can make a fringe festival work here in Green Bay

and Northeastern Wisconsin," he said. "In general, we've got a really growing theater community and an audience for theater. You can see that in all the different play groups that are in Green Bay and De Pere and in Northeast Wisconsin... There's that really kind of growing scene and that appetite for it, so as a producer and as a board member, I'm really excited to see if the community will respond to it. There's a real interest from performers. There's a real interest from venues. And I really just hope that the community reciprocates that energy."






