

GREEN BAY - The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Northeast Region held three public meetings for proposed improvements on 23 miles of I-41 from WIS 96 —Wisconsin Avenue — in Appleton to County Highway

F — Scheuring Road — in De Pere providing an overview and timeline for the project.

"This is a very exciting time for the project. Design is completing some projects, deep into the details on others. And we have construction starting here in just a few weeks. So, we held a public involvement meeting last July. Since then we continue to make great progress forward on this project," said DOT Project Development Manager Kurt Peters.

The project will expand 23 miles of I-41 to six lanes from Wisconsin Avenue to Scheuring Road, construct auxiliary lanes between closely-spaced interchanges and collector-distributor

GREEN BAY – A local project group is seeking community feedback as it creates a master plan to ensure year-round accessibility to the East River Recreational Trail, address flooding issues and enhance wildlife habitats along the trail.

"This project was prompted because of flooding that occurred in 2019 due to record high rainfalls, ice melt and wind. The fluctuating water levels in the bay of Green Bay and East River resulted in flooding throughout the cities of Green Bay and De Pere, the

GREEN BAY - Preble High School Teacher Clayton Vader believes that "knowledge is power," but he also believes in something more.

"As Dale Carnegie once said, 'Knowledge isn't power until it is applied.' I utilize this principle in my classroom every day. My aim is for my students to demonstrate how a concept is applied and foster hands-on experiences both inside and outside of the classroom," he said in his award application.



villages of Allouez and Bellevue, and town of Ledgeview including portions of the East River Trail which spans throughout these communities," explained Kaurie Mihm

"This flooding made it difficult to navigate certain portions of the trail, which was concerning to the trail users and the municipalities that manage them. Because multiple municipalities were working on this shared issue, there was interest for the communities to partner together to find solutions regarding the flooding. This prompted the creation of a larger partnership with The Nature Conservancy, Wisconsin Sea Grant and NEW Water who partner to make up the East River Collaborative to increase flood resilience in the East River Watershed.

"Project planning began in 2020, which included a needs assessment and municipalities conducting Coastal Re-Self-Assessments siliencv resulting in a Watershed Framework that was completed in December 2022 (East River Watershed Resilience Framework 2022 | East River Collaborative (tnc.org)). In creating this framework, we realized that the East River Trail was both problematic in terms of flooding and a priority for all the communities through which it passed.

"This particular project focusing on the East River Recreational Trail started last year with the award of a grant from the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program, but the various municipalities and East River Collaborative have been discussing it for several years

before that."

Current community leads on the East River Recreational Trail Master Plan project include Chris Clark, village of Allouez; Kyle Casper, village of Bellevue; Kaurie Mihm and Melissa Schmitz, city of Green Bay; Marty Kosobucki, city of De Pere; and Stephanie Schlag, town of Ledgeview.

The group is further assisted by ISG Local Office Engagement Lead Danyelle Pierquet and Project Manager Paul Marston.

Mihm said that the primary goal of the project is to "identify where flooding occurs on the East River Trail so a comprehensive plan can be developed to correct the flooding issues."

"Additionally, we are working to improve fish and wildlife habitat along the trail corridor as part of the planning," she said.

"By implementing proposed projects within the plan, we hope to enhance trail access and use while creating biodiverse and resilient conditions along the river. Although water levels have receded since 2019 and there is currently much less flooding along the trail than there was then, there are still areas of the trail that flood during large rain events. Therefore, projects that are identified in the plan will be prioritized and constructed as funding allows. These efforts will aid in creating a better regional multi-use trail system within

Project leaders say that the quality of the river has also been "degraded" by some of the same issues that increase flooding.

Brown County."

"Water runoff from agriculture and urban areas carries nutrients and other chemicals into the stream.

Increases in river flows have also led to erosion of streambanks which results in high amounts of sediment in the river. The increases in nutrients and sediment have negative effects on how the river functions for both wild-life and recreation," a project handout stated.

The river trail also offers limited access points to get into the river for those wanting to fish, kayak, paddle or canoe.

Public information input includes heavy trail usage, flooding impact and alternative routes during flooding.

The project is currently in the conceptual design phase, with a second open house planned for May.

Design plan completion is expected in June.

A little dirt never hurt, but there are a few rules

BROWN COUNTY – For many Wisconsinites, spring weather means riding the ATV/UTV trails and routes in northeastern counties.

However, safety must remain a priority when operating these vehicles amidst the excitement of getting back outdoors.

ATV/UTV riders can ride legally on two kinds of paths: trails and routes.

ATV/UTV trails are officially recognized, offroad trails with a dirt, sand or gravel base.

ATV/UTV routes are opened roadways that allow ATV/UTV riders to share the road with other motorists.

"Those roadways can be opened up locally by local ordinance. State statute allows a municipality or a county to open roads or a

road inside of their jurisdiction," said Off-Highway Vehicle Administrator Lt. Warden Jacob Holsclaw.

"Many state roads or highways are not going to be open [for ATV/UTV use]. Those are roads that are maintained by the Wisconsin DOT. There are some exceptions where machines can cross these roads or short stretches of these roads are opened up, but generally, those roads are not open."

Years ago, off-road trails were the only option for ATV/UTV riders and the route system was added to connect trails.

Now, routes have developed a system similar to off-road trails.

Public safety requirements

Operators must be certified in ATV/UTV safety by completing a class,

Work begins on County Highway M/Lineville Road project

HOWARD-SUAMICO – Construction will begin Monday, March 25, on a \$9,581,485, two-year project to improve CTH M/Lineville Road in the villages of Howard and Suamico.

The Brown County Highway Department said that construction in 2024 will be completed from Belmont Road to the railroad crossing west of Velp Avenue.

Construction will continue in 2025 from Velp Avenue to US 41.

"This is a reconstruction project of CTH M/Lineville Road from Belmont Road to US 41 interchange. CTH M will be expanded to four lanes with a 12-foot asphalt multi use trail located along the north side from Belmont Road to West Deerfield Road. The roundabouts will be reconstructed at Rockwell Lane, Cardinal Lane, CTH HS (Velp Ave), (at the) Festival/mini-mall access and

Cornell Road to accommodate the new four-lane roadway," a highway department release stated.

Stage 1

Will take place April – July from Belmont Road to 300 feet west of Cardinal Lane

Traffic within this area will be restricted to local traffic only with access to all properties.

Access to the Lineville Intermediate School parking lot will be maintained from Belmont Road and Cardinal Lane, with no access to CTH M/Lineville Road.

The north leg of Cardinal Lane, from just north of the Lineville/Cardinal roundabout to just south of Garden Lane will be closed after the 2023-24 school year.

Access to the Bay Port High School parking lot will be from Belmont Road and Cardinal Lane during Stage 1, except during the north leg of Cardinal Lane construction where access from Cardinal Lane will be limited to points north of Garden Lane.

Stage 2

Stage 2 will take place after Stage 1 is complete from Cardinal Lane to Railroad Crossing west of Velp Avenue.

Traffic will be restricted to local traffic only with access to all properties maintained.

The Cardinal Lane roundabout will be under construction and closed to through traffic.

CTH M/Lineville traffic will be restricted to a single westbound lane between Condor Lane and Velp Avenue, with local access from adjacent side roads for any properties in the closed section.

"It feels great to be recognized for putting in hard and dedicated work," said Caston.

Caston started working at We All Rise: African American Resource Center, dedicated to helping people in times of crisis, about four years ago.

"It's really incredible work...we focus on creating a vibrant African American community," he explained.

This is done by offering a wide array of services to those in need.

Mental health help, housing and employment are resources offered by We All Rise.

"The job is very rewarding, it's amazing to see people starting at a certain place reach goals they never thought they could," he added.

"It's okay to start later in life, it doesn't matter how old you are once you find a community that accepts you,"

Winning Young Professional of the Year means that all of Caston's hard work and dedication has paid off.

"Being recognized by funders" is a major benefit to winning the award, in addition to having "that personal honor," he said.

Caston was one of two Black men to be nominated for the award.

"It feels great to make history," he said.

Caston wasn't always on this track though.

In the context of his education, he described himself as "a troubled kid... I was in and out of different school settings. I struggled to find where I fit in."

Young Leaders Academy — which was founded in 1994 to provide young African American males with strong role models, academic support and community service activities — changed Caston's life.

"They groomed me to be a hard-working individual." he said.

The teacher, he said, that made all the difference was Malik Holt, and he is one of Caston's biggest role mod-

"In different paths of life there are different people motivating you," Caston explained.

He also credits his mom who "supported him through everything," along with Robin Scott, Jennifer Bayette, Elijah Muhammad, Malcolm X and Marcus Garvey.

On Garvey, Caston said, "he had an agenda and a plan for African American people." He currently serves as a crime victim advocate at We All Rise and currently facilitates Fathers, Everywhere, Stand, Together (FEST) at the agency.

Caston has worked to foster solidarity among the African American community and worked with the Green Bay Police Department to help build positive relationships.

Hotel Northland: Making a splash

GREEN BAY – On Jan. 12, 1924, architect superintendent Thomas Kelly announced that the hotel would open the first week of March.

Though it wouldn't be entirely completed, he said the hotel's lower floors would be ready for use.

The Hotel Northland was to become the fourth "sky-scraper" in the city, behind the Herrick building, Minahan building and the Bellin building.

In February, J. N. Huffman, Milwaukee, was announced as the first manager of the hotel.

Huffman was once employed with Green Bay's Beaumont Hotel and worked with other hotels in Milwaukee and Chicago.

He set to work on hiring 150 staff members for the new hotel.

Six cooks were hired to serve guests under the direction of Chief Lucien M. Bauer.

They were further assisted by a butcher, bakers, second cooks, roast cooks, fry cooks, assistant cooks and a multitude of other kitchen and dining staff.

The day of the March 21 opening, a *Press-Gazette* headline read "All records for speed broken at Hotel

Northland" as contractors and staff rushed to get things in place before the 7:30 p.m. dinner-dance to celebrate its launch.

"While carpenters were still placing the walnut panels of the woodwork, hotel employees were hanging draperies, washing the floors, sweeping and dusting," the article read.

The following night, the hotel welcomed guests from Milwaukee, Fond du Lac and Oshkosh, who would be the first to occupy the rooms.

"The combined wealth of the guests," the article stated, was more than \$50 million.

The Saturday night event was labeled "one of the most brilliant functions the city has seen in months" and welcomed 400 people in a mix of traveling guests and local residents.

The four parlor cars, lounging car and baggage

car that brought about 180 guests to the event which was labeled the "Fifty Million Dollar special."

"In addition to the two huge Kissel busses of the hotel, nearly every taxi cab in the city was commandeered to bring the guests from the train to the hostelry," a March 24 article stated.

After its grand opening, contractors and staff continued work on the hotel and a month later, the fifth floor was opened for use.

In May, the opening of the seventh floor was announced.

By the end of the summer, the hotel was complete in its magnificent grandeur.

The rooms were filled through the summer and fall months, and soon the Schroeder company looked to do more.

The hotel was quickly becoming the social nucleus of the city.

WisDOT released northeast Wisconsin highway construction listing

BROWN COUNTY – In addition to a major I-41 expansion project, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Northeast Region released a listing of state highway construction projects scheduled for 2024.

The following projects include work in Brown County:

WIS 172 resurfacing, culvert replacement

WIS 172 resurfacing and culvert replacement will take place on WIS 172, from WIS 54 in the village of Hobart to the Austin Straubel Airport entrance, from June 2024 to October 2024.

This project consists of milling and overlaying WIS 172 between WIS 54 and the airport, including the WIS 172 and County GE roundabout, as well as removing the steel arch culvert pipe between WIS 54 and South Overland Road and constructing a new box culvert.

The project will also include pavement markings, curb and gutter repair, shoulder rumble strips and shoulder aggregate.

WIS 172 will be closed to traffic for approximately three months while the culvert structure near WIS 54 is removed and replaced.

WIS 172 will also be closed to traffic at County GE for approximately one week while the roundabout is being milled/paved.

WIS 172 at the box culvert structure and the County GE roundabout will not be closed at the same time.

During mainline resurfacing, the roadway will be open to traffic, but drivers can expect to encounter lane closures and flagging operations.

During the culvert structure replacement and County GE roundabout work, WIS 172 traffic will be detoured north along I-41 to WIS 54 to WIS 172.

WIS 54 resurfacing

WIS 54 between University Way and WIS 57 in the city of Green Bay, Brown

Several road construction projects will take place in Brown County this summer.

County, will undergo resurfacing, May 2024 to October 2024

This project will resurface and repair WIS 54 including concrete repair and overlay and asphalt mill and overlay, resurfacing ramps for University Avenue/Nicolet Drive and resurface mainline University Avenue/Nicolet Drive and concrete repair on Bay Settlement Road ramps.

The project will also replace beamguard, curb ramps at the southwest quadrant of Bay Settlement Road and Leon Bond Drive and the intersection of the eastbound off-ramp for Bay Settlement Road and Bay Settlement Road and replace culvert endwalls, sand barrel arrays, pavement markings, shoulder rumble strips and shoulder aggregate.

The WIS 54 mainline will remain open using temporary lane and shoulder closures for most of the construction.

The ramps at I-43/University Avenue, I-43/Nicolet Drive, and I-43/Bay Settlement Road will be closed during off-peak hours during resurfacing/repairing operations.

The ramps at Bay Settlement Road will be closed and detoured for several days for concrete repairs.

A detour route will be posted.

Consecutive ramps will not be closed at the same time

The detour route uses Bay Settlement Road to Al-

goma Road to the WIS 54/57 interchange.

WIS 96 resurfacing

WIS 96 will be resurfaced from County D in the village of Wrightstown to Claribel Street in the city of Kaukauna, between May 2024 and November 2024.

This is a resurfacinglevel improvement with storm sewer and pipe culvert repair/replacement, curb ramp improvements, widening the paved shoulder from 4 feet to 5 feet in various locations, adding rumble strips and pavement marking.

WIS 96 will be open to traffic throughout most of the construction.

Traffic control in the form of flagging operations will be used to close one lane of WIS 96 at a time as necessary.

A short-term detour will be marked — approximately three weeks — for the culvert pipe replacements in rural areas and one week for storm sewer repairs within the village of Wrightstown.

Shoulder and sidewalk closures will be needed for curb ramp improvements and repair work.

Detour for culvert pipe replacement will run eastbound WIS 96 to northbound WIS 55 to northbound I-41 to County U back to WIS 96.

The detour for storm sewer repairs in Wrightstown will follow County DD and County U.

roadway system between County Highway E (Ballard Road) and WIS 441 and reconstruct three of the interchanges to diverging diamond interchanges at the southern end of the project.

"At the 41/441 system interchange, we will be reconstructing that interchange, eliminating the existing loop ramps and the current configuration and going to higher speed flyover-type maneuvers for those movements," explained DOT Design Project Manager Scott

"We will be making a little bit more selective improvements at the three interchanges, in the middle of the project at County Highway N, doing some pavement replacement work at highway 55 — some minor improvements as well as reconstructing the bridges over 55 and nearby Maloney Road and County Highway J — raising the interchange and making some improvements to the roundabouts there for oversized overweight type

vehicles.

"We will also be reconstructing the County Highway U and County Highway S interchanges to be roundabout interchanges, and we'll be constructing a brand new interchange near South Bridge Road up in Brown County. This will also be a roundabout interchange as well the reconstructed frontage roads."

The project will include the replacement of 11 local and county road overpasses and underpasses, resurfacing of three parkand-ride lots, construction

of a new salt shed, the construction of a combined Wrightstown Post/Safety and Weight Enforcement Facility and work on 17 storm water ponds

"In terms of the overall project schedule, it's the first quarter of 2024... we're kind of full speed ahead right now on our design and traffic management planning, and those types of activities. We're also in the middle of real estate acquisition on the on the project, as well as our utility coordination efforts on the project," Ebel added.

"Our schedule for construction is beginning very soon, and we had our first lets last month and we anticipate construction to begin in April," said DOT Construction Project Manager Bryan Learst.

"Some traffic impacts: we expect to maintain two lanes northbound and southbound during the peak hours with some night closures for work that needs to be required in off peak times, with some full closures for bridge removal and bridge

setting and those will have detours associated with them."

Work will begin in April,

with the Capitol Drive overpass. See the included map for the 2024 schedule. Each mainline segment

is expected to take two construction seasons each to complete. The public meeting is

which can be offered both in-person and online. These classes are required for all riders born after Jan. 1,

Holsclaw explains that ATV/UTV riders should be comfortable and knowledgeable about their vehicles before operating.

"These machines handle differently than trucks and cars. They were designed, you know, for offroad operation. So when you're talking about road routes in cities and counties being opened up, a lot of these road routes are on paved roads or hard-packed gravel. These machines, they handle a lot differently because they're going to have a low-pressure tire for gripping on the service and if somebody's unfamiliar with the machine and they decide to take a turn too quick or they're not paying attention or going too fast when they're approaching a curve, they have a tendency to roll over rather quickly. Especially on a paved surface," he said.

To operate on public routes, riders must be at least 12 years of age and accompanied by an adult until the operator turns 16 vears old.

ATV/UTV riders under 18 years old must have a helmet that is DOT-approved and all passengers must wear a seatbelt, which is provided in ATV/UTVs.

'We see a lot of injuries and fatalities from people (A) not wearing helmets and (B) not wearing seatbelts," said Holsclaw.

Any machine in operation over 15 days must be registered through the Wisconsin DNR.

The most common registration is public use registration, which is valid for two years on both routes and trails.

Similar to other vehicles. intoxication while operating is illegal.

'One thing to note — and this is the same way in a car — you can still be arrested for intoxicated operation even if you're below a .08 because alcohol affects everyone differently," said Holsclaw. "Our safety message from the DNR is to wait to drink until you're done riding for the day.

"Those requirements are probably some of the most important safety parts and then also some of the most common violations we see."

These regulations help to prevent crashes and other incidents

In 2023, the DNR reported 282 crashes, 99 injured passengers and 32 fatal incidents of which 95% of victims were not wearing a helmet.

So far in 2024, five fatal crashes have occurred.

In the event of a crash, it is required that operators involved report the incident to law enforcement officials as soon as possible and submit a written report to the DNR within 10 days of the incident

Brown County Ordinance Overview

• Brown County Public

Works does not allow ATV/ UTV routes on county highways without approval. These short lengths of ATV/UTV routes on county highways are clearly marked.

• A municipality may enact its own ordinance which authorizes ATV/UTV operation on highways with a speed limit of 35 mph or less within the territory of that municipality.

· ATV/UTVs may be authorized to operate on the shoulder of a highway on a bridge of 1,000 feet or less if it is authorized by both the county and the municipality. County highway bridges are not approved to be operated on with ATV/UTVs.

Kewaunee County Ordinance Overview

- Operators must observe a maximum speed of 35 mph or the posted speed and remain single-file.
- When operating on a paved surface, ATV/UTV riders must remain on the extreme right side of the roadway.
- Operators must be 16 years old with a valid driv-

er's license.

· ATV/UTV operators must regard Operating Hours, which are 30 minutes before sunrise and 20 minutes after sunset.

Operating ATV/UTVs must be equipped with a muffler or noise-suppressing system.

Marinette County Ordinance Overview

Designated ATV/UTV routes begin operating on May 1 and end on Dec. 1.

· Operators must observe a maximum speed of 35 mph or the posted speed and remain single-file.

· When operating on a paved surface, ATV/UTV riders must remain on the extreme right side of the roadway.

· All ATV/UTVs must have headlights and taillights illuminated when operating. · Any ATV/UTV that uses county highway routes must carry the expected minimum insurance.

Oconto County Ordinance Overview

· ATV/UTVs must obey posted speed limits on County Highways.

- · When operating on a paved surface, ATV/UTV riders must remain on the extreme right side of the roadway.
- All ATV/UTVs must have headlights and taillights illuminated when operating.
- · ATV/UTV riders cannot ride on county highways unless they have proof of approved liability insur-
- Operators must be 16 years old with a valid driver's license.
- · All ATV/UTVs must display Wisconsin registration or a Nonresident Trail Pass while operating on county highways.
- Operating ATV/UTVs must be equipped with a muffler or noise-suppressing system.

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

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GBAPS board approves cost of living increase

GREEN BAY - During its March 18 meeting, the Green Bay Area Public Schools (GBAPS) Board of Education approved a 4.12% cost of living increase for district staff.

The salary increase will raise the starting salary for teachers with a bachelor's degree from \$48,237 to \$50,224 and for those with a master's degree, \$56,856.

"In a time of teacher shortages, the increased salary for new teachers is a step in the right direction for our district," said GBAPS Interim Superintendent Vicki Bayer. "As we work with our higher education partners, we know that fewer and fewer college students are choosing teaching as a career. It is our hope that by increasing teacher salaries, we can be more competitive with other career fields for college graduates."

"Since Act 10, public school districts are restricted to offering no more than a cost of living increase to employees, unless they pass an operational referendum for the purpose of increasing staff salaries. The cost of living increases the past few years have provided the district an opportunity to offer a more competitive teaching salary," a district release stated.

Discussion on opening the floor to comment

During the meeting, GBAPS Board Member

Lynn Gerlach made a motion to open the floor for public comment during discussion on grade acceleration procedures.

While board members

were open to the possibility in the future, without procedures in place to handle it, it was ultimately voted down in a tie vote with a two-thirds majority needed.

GBAPS Board Member Bryan Milz said that while there was merit to it, "This would be an interpretation of Roberts Rules that we haven't done before, so I am going to vote against it," he said.

"I see this as an opportunity for someone who is present and can shed some light on a parent's point of view. I am willing to listen," Gerlach explained.

"This is a motion that I have been waiting many years to be a part of," said Andrew Becker. "There is a merit to having a broad open forum at the beginning (of the meeting), and I would never change that. But, I also think that there is merit for what the city council calls a motion to 'suspend the rules' to allow

dress the board when someone has something pertinent on an agenda item. It is a way to increase public input when it makes sense, and I think it makes sense here, so I am going to vote 'yes."

James Lyerly agreed with Becker, but said it was "precedence-setting."

"If we take this vote to open the floor, I do not know that we have the framework in place to turn that off...," he added.

"It fundamentally changes how we conduct a meeting. It may be for the better, but I would rather take an informed decision, make that a part of our working agreements versus in the face of an individual who wants to speak on a topic."

Over \$215K awarded to 26 local organizations and initiatives

GREEN BAY - The Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) is investigating an officer involved critical incident (OICI) in Green Bay, Wis. that occurred on the afternoon of Friday, Feb. 23.

The Green Bay Police Department responded to a weap-

Green Bay Police Officer Dan Skenandore, 6.5 years of service, located a vehicle believed to be involved on Green Ridge Drive near Open Gate Trail in the City of Green Bay. Steve Evaristo Ventura, age 40, fired his weapon.

Ventura and Officer Skenandore then exchanged gun-

Ventura was injured and lifesaving measures were per-

Ventura was transported to the hospital and later succumbed to his injuries.

A firearm was located at the scene.

The cause of the injuries sustained by Ventura remains under investigation.

No law enforcement officers were injured during the incident.

Green Bay Police Officer Skenandore was placed on administrative leave, per department policy.

Officer Skenandore was wearing a body camera during the incident and the Green Bay Police Department has squad cameras.

DCI is leading this investigation and is assisted by the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory, Wisconsin State Patrol, the Brown County Sheriff's Office, the Brown County Medical Examiner's Office, DCI Crime Response Specialists and members of DCI's Digital Evidence Unit.

All involved law enforcement are fully cooperating with DCI during this investigation.

DCI is continuing to review evidence and determine the facts of this incident and will turn over investigative reports to the Brown County District Attorney when the investigation concludes.

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

here's been a lot of good news about Wisconsin lately, and it's only just the start.

The Department of Natural Resources fish and wildlife hearings and WCC county meetings will be held April 8 in all counties, with an online option for input on natural resources issues from noon April 10 to noon April 13.

Area hearings will be held at Appleton North, Kewaunee, Shawano, Sturgeon Bay, Suring, Waupaca and Wausaukee high schools; Northeast Wisconsin Technical College in Green Bay (Room SC130); Lakeshore Technical College in Cleveland (RoomL260); Sheboygan County Transportation Department, Plymouth; and Alberta Kimball Auditorium, Oshkosh.

The annual gatherings were victims of COVID-19 restrictions in 2020, and DNR-mandated protocol in 2021.

But after hearing from citizens opposed to onlineonly voting, the agency has added the in-person

opportunity. DNR staff presentations will begin at 6:30 pm., followed by Conservation Congress delegate and alternate elections.

After that, DNR spring hearing questions, WCC questions and any citizen resolutions will be discussed and voted on.

If you didn't apply for a spring turkey tag — or missed this week's sale of bonus permits — you'll have another shot at 10 a.m. Saturday, March 23, when any leftovers go on sale.

Even though currentyear licenses don't expire until the end of the month, it's a good idea to purchase your new licenses and stamp privileges before attempting to buy a bonus tag.

Cost for the leftovers is \$10 for residents and \$15 for nonresidents, with a limit of one per hunter per day.

Hunters and anglers can purchase licenses and tags via the state's Go Wild site (https://gowild. wi.gov/) or in-person at any businesses that sell licenses.

Wolves kill dogs

Wolves have killed at least five dogs and wounded two others since early February, including pets in Ashland and Bayfield counties and hunting dogs in Clark County.

One of the pets was a yellow lab; the other was a mixed breed.

The hunting hounds were three Walkers and a Plott.

There were also verified wolf harassment or threats to 240 beef cattle in three separate incidents in Douglas and Adams counties, and to four pet dogs in Douglas and Vilas counties.

Unconfirmed depredation or complaints include captive deer in Douglas

County and livestock in St. Croix and Waupaca counties.

MFL enrollments

Nearly one-third of the more than 1,400 enrollments in the Managed Forest Law (MFL) property tax incentive program made this year are new to the program.

A total of 107,304 acres were added to MFL this year, with 1,411 individual landowners and 24 large parcels of at least 1,000 acres.

The average size of the new enrollments is 64 acres for individual landowners and 719 acres for large ownerships.

A total of 22,281 acres are open to the public for hunting, fishing, hiking, sight-seeing and crosscountry skiing, with more than 15,000 of that part of large ownership parcels.

Water levels update

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers estimates that Lake Michigan water levels are about an inch lower than at this time last year.

Levels have dropped about 32 inches since the record March high set in 2020, but are still about 32 inches above the all-time monthly low, set in 1964.

Levels are projected to rise two inches by early

GREEN BAY - The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) has announced the 2023-24 NABC Division I All-District Teams and has named Green Bay junior guard Noah Reynolds to the District 12 First Team.

The All-District honors are voted on by NABCmember coaches across NCAA Division I.

Reynolds is just the third player in Phoenix history to receive NABC All-District honors, and first since Green Bay's transition to Division I.

Tom Anderson and Ron Ripley both received All-District honors in the late

The Peoria, Ill., native was named the Horizon League Newcomer of the Year and All-League First Team earlier this year.

Reynolds finished the averaging 20.0 season points (eighth-highest mark in a single season in Green Bay history), 4.5 assists and 3.7 rebounds per game. Reynolds' numbers were even better in Horizon League (HL) games.

Reynolds scored 21.4 points and 4.7 assists in conference games, which is the second-most in each category. Reynolds scored in double figures in 23 of his 27 games played and led the HL with six 30+ point

He poured in a careerhigh 39 points in Green Bay's Dec. 29 home win against Wright State. Thirty-nine points is tied for the sixth-most in a single game in program history.

The Hugh Durham National Coach of the Year Award is presented annually to the top mid-major head coach in college basketball. Coaches of teams in the following conferences are eligible for the award: America East, ASUN, Big Sky, Big South, Big West, Coastal Athletic, CUSA, Horizon, Independents, Ivy, Metro Atlantic, Mid-American, MEAC, Missouri Valley, Northeast, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, Southland, SWAC, Summit, Sun Belt, WAC, West Coast.

The Joe. B Hall Award is

presented annually to the top rookie, first-year head coach in Division I college basketball.

Both awards will be announced in Phoenix, AZ, site of the men's Division I Basketball Championship.

Sundance Wicks authored one of the best yearto-year turnarounds in NCAA Division I history in his first year as Phoenix's head coach. After a 3-29 season a year ago, Wicks turned the program around to an 18-14 record at the end of the 2023-24 season and was named the Horizon League Coach of the Year for his efforts. That 18-win mark is the third-most by a Phoenix head coach in their first year and is also the most regular season wins by Green Bay since the 2016-17 season. It is just the second time a Green Bay coach has been named the Horizon League Coach of the Year, with the last being Brian Wardle in the 2013-14 season. Green Bay finished the season with the HL No. 3 seed and a 13-7 record, which is the most league wins for the program since the 2013-14 season.

Can a teacher learn from their student?



Can one person make a difference?

ve seen several attacks leveled against the common teacherly saying, "I learn more from my students than they learn from me."

I wish I could recall the original source, but I first started seeing pushback on this saying in a widely shared social media post which read something like, "If you learn more from your students than they do from you, then you shouldn't be a teacher.'

I have some sympathy for this pushback, as the original claim of "learning more from one's students" feels emptied of meaning and often offered as signaling some kind of humble virtue.

However, I am a believer in a revised version of the

Maybe something like, "Outside of the subject area itself, I learn a great many things from, and about, my students. And yes, even in the area where I am the subject matter expert, they often offer views and ideas I had not considered before."

While the way I have worded this revision is not concise or catchy, it captures my feelings and rings true.

How do I know? I experienced this just today, as my vounger daughter taught me something about Sylvia Plath and her famous poem "Daddy."

My younger daughter a high school sophomore submitted a multi-media project where she had to, among other things, compare a poem and its themes to those expressed in a song.

She chose Sam Fender's song "The Spit of You," which is absolutely incredible and I encourage you all to listen. Wow, the opening riff!

She sent me the finished project this morning, and I listened to it in the car while driving to the Y.

What a way to start the day! My daughter talking poetry!

"Daddy" is obviously a well-known, canonical work and usually offered right away when introducing students to Plath and/ or the Confessional movement in American poetry.

One of the poem's most cited moments occurs in the sixth stanza:

It stuck in a barb wire

Ich, ich, ich, ich,

I could hardly speak. I thought every German

was you. And the language obscene

Those well-versed in Plath know I'm referring to the line that simply repeats the German work "ich," which translates into English as "I."

Now here's the beautiful part because it shows how learning often pairs the deliberate with the serendipitous.

My daughter doesn't know any German (she takes Spanish), so she read the work "ich" as something like "ick."

And yes, the daddy in "Daddy" is icky and yucky

enough to be compared to some of history's most notable villains and atroci-

One of my daughter's tasks was to point out literary devices, and she thus identified "ich" as onomatopoeia.

My first response, showing the knee-jerk teacher in me, was, "well, not exactly. She doesn't know that 'ich' means 'I."

But then it hit me. She's right. Not only is she right, but this is something I had literally never thought of.

The poem is so steeped in its Germanness and accompanying imagery that it's an easy point to overlook, and I also don't spend much time in the higher ed classroom talking onomatopoeia.

But my daughter nailed it because Plath is indeed that smart.

Of course Plath would use a line that was both onomatopoeia and a deeply ironic pun.

Of course Plath would give us a line that reads both "I, I, I, I" and "ick, ick, ick, ick." It's brilliant.

This then sent my mind racing, especially to those who are critical of this poem in terms of Plath's comparisons to the Holocaust, etc...

I have always found those critiques misguided because the point of the poem is to present everything as outsized, just as the father figure remains in her adult imagination.

To miss this point is to underestimate Plath's intelligence and command of her subject matter a definite no-no when it comes to Plath because she's truly masterful.

More importantly, I learned from my daughter's presentation, and I learned about things both inside and outside my area of subject matter expertise.

First, I learned that if any of you are thinking you are a bad parent or made a parenting mistake, just read "Daddy" and this will reorient you and put you in a better place.

Second, the brushstroke of "ich" as an example of onomatopoeia adds a layer to reading "Daddy" that enhances the work's overall rhetorical objectives.

My 15-year-old daughter taught me this today in her presentation, and I haven't even talked about the comparison to "The Spit of You" and all the other brilliant things she had to say.

I'm not her teacher for this assignment, but it's obviously an A.

So yes, a teacher can learn from their students.

The silly mistake has always been trying to assign a measurement to this who cares whether it's "more" or "less"?

The point remains the learning itself, even if just a bit here and there, as that is how learning often comes to us.

Packers switch up backfield with more changes possible

GREEN BAY - Man, what an hour.

Green Bay Packers fans were likely pretty psyched last Monday when the team announced they planned to sign former Las Vegas Raiders running back Josh Jacobs to a four-year, \$48 million contract at the start of the new league year last Wednesday.

But the real shocker of the day came less than 60 minutes later when news broke that the Packers were set to release star running back Aaron

Last Tuesday, the Packers' NFC North rivals, the

Minnesota Vikings, said they would lock Jones down on a one-year, \$7 million deal.

Personally, I'd characterize the brief window of time between the announcements of Jacobs' signing and Jones' release as "euphoric."

Pairing Jacobs and Jones would have given Green Bay one of the best running back tandems in the NFL, if not the best, and the addition of Jacobs to a young, ascending Packers offense almost the NFC — and the AFC, for that matter — on notice.

I simply do not know how one would go about defending a Packers offense featuring Jones, Jacobs. Jordan Love. Christian Watson, Romeo certainly would have put Doubs, Jayden Reed, Dontayvion Wicks and Luke Musgrave (and Tucker Kraft, and Malik Heath, and Bo Melton and Samori Toure...).

Alas, some things are just too good to be true.

Although it's fun to see the Packers make some splashes in free agency, and going into the 2024 season with a backfield headlined by a couple of the best backs in the game would have rocked extremely hard, the organization determined that it was simply not in a salary cap position to both sign Jacobs and pony up for Jones, who'd already taken a \$5 million pay cut last vear.

Jones declined to take another hometown discount and after being informed by the Packers he'd be released, he drew immediate interest from

Jones, 29, was (and is) adored by Packers fans and spent all seven years of his career in Green Bay prior to joining the Vikings.

His departure came as a shock — Packers general manager Brian Gutekunst said about six weeks earlier that Jones would "absolutely" return to the team in 2024. Gutekunst later said letting Jones walk was one of the hardest decisions that's been

made during his time at 1265 Lombardi Ave.

Jones leaves the Packers being ranked third in seasons (three), and he ranks fourth in franchise history in rushing attempts (1.177) and rushing touchdowns (45).

Now, onto Jacobs: After leading the league in rushing yards in 2022, Jacobs, 26, is coming off a down year in Vegas. There is some context to his dip in production — the Raiders' offensive line ranked 19th in the league last season, falling from 10th place in Jacobs' breakout year, according to Pro Football Focus (PFF).

If the 2019 first-round pick out of Alabama is able to return to his 2022 form, the Packers will still have a premier back come September.

Jones' counterpart in the Green Bay backfield for the last four seasons, AJ Dillon, was expected to leave town via free agency, but on Thursday, Dillon and the team reached a deal that'll keep him in the Green and Gold for the upcoming season. Also anticipated to return is running back Emanuel Wilson.

Although the Packers have brought in Jacobs and held onto Dillon, they may still address their running back room in April's NFL Draft.

If Gutekunst is looking for a back with a build similar to that of Jones (5'9", 208 lbs.) to throw into the mix with the punishing runners Jacobs (5'10", 223 lbs.) and Dillon (6'0", 247 lbs.), he may target Michigan's Blake Corum (5'8", 213 lbs.), Bucky Irving out of Oregon (5'10", 195 lbs.) or USC's MarShawn Lloyd (5'9", 210 lbs.) after the first round.

RMU was led offensively by Catalina Saxen, who went 1-for-2 with a double and three RBIs.


