Partnering on mats with a message

GREEN BAY – Brown County Law enforcement, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives and Green Bay Area Crime Stoppers are partnering on a campaign to help prevent the illegal purchases of firearms.

"We want to make sure that people understand that if you do make an illegal gun purchase and that gun is used in criminal activity or violent [activity], the reality, you're putting yourself at the scene as if you're pulling the trigger," said Green Bay Area Crime Stoppers Program Coordinator Hans Lux.

The mats are available at no cost to Brown County firearm dealers and pawn shops to place at their gun counters, with the verbage: "REMEMBER – Buying a firearm for someone who can't is illegal! This can result in... 15 years in prison and up to a \$25,000 fine! There's a reason that the person who is asking can't buy a firearm themselves! Should you trust

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A deeper understanding of the city

GREEN BAY – Green Bay will bring back the City Hall Academy this May for its second class.

Focusing on public education regarding local government, these courses will provide deeper insight into how Green Bay operates.

Green Bay City Hall Academy is an eightweek program designed to give attendees a look into local governmental processes while providing insight to government services, functions and activities.

The academy achieves this through "unique and informative sessions" including tours, demonstrations and hands-on activities focused in a variety of areas in the municipal government.

Some areas explored include the mayor's office, public works, transit, water, public safety and parks and recreation.

The first City Hall Academy was held in 2023 and was sparked by a desire to promote citizen engagement, transparency, accountability and educational incentives.

Green Bay Community Liaison & Special Events Coordinator Jessie Paque noted "the creation of the City Hall Academy was driven by the desire to foster a more informed, engaged and empowered community, which leads

Alyssa Specht, graduate from the inaugural City Hall Academy, said that she participated in the academy to gain a deeper understanding of how the city operates.

"Being a realtor, I'm all about being a go-to person in the community, and I figured this would be a cool way to learn more about how things work around here," Specht explained.

Specht said her favorite activity during the City Hall Academy was the vehicle accident response simulation.

"It offered a firsthand glimpse into the dedication and hard work put in by these first responders, making it a memorable experience" she said.

Specht added that she not only gained a deeper understanding of the inner workings of Green Bay, but also a deeper respect. cation of the city's employees firsthand was inspiring. It made me immensely proud to call myself a Green Bay resident, knowing that such passionate individuals are working to better our city every day," Specht stated.

The City Hall Academy will last for eight weeks, with classes hosted 6-8 p.m. every Thursday.

In order to graduate, participants must attend at least six of the eight courses, as well as one city council or committee meeting during the span of the course.

The academy operates on a first come, first serve basis with priority given to Green Bay residents

Classes start May 2.

There is no fee to register, but the class is capped at 25 participants.

Cowles will not seek reelection

GREEN BAY – Senator Rob Cowles (R-Green Bay) will not seek reelection to his District 2 Wisconsin State Senate seat.

Cowles, 73, was elected to the Wisconsin Assembly in 1982 and resigned five years later, after winning a seat in the Senate.

"After much thought and deliberation, I have decided not to seek reelection to the Wisconsin State Senate," Cowles said.

"Many of the amazing individuals that I've collaborated with do their work in the background. I want to thank some of these great people who I've had the privilege of working with during my time in the Legislature.

"First, our state government truly wouldn't function properly without the dedicated nonpartisan staff serving the Legislature... Second, few people have the chance to get to know the elected officials representing Wisconsinites at the state and local level on a professional and personal level like I have over the years. Despite policy dis-

agreements at times, I've met some outstanding individuals who serve their constituents with honor and respect. I wish my colleagues all the best in their efforts to serve the people of Wisconsin in the coming sessions.

"Third, my staff, past and present, have been dedicated to helping advance my work and assist the people of Northeast Wisconsin. I've been grateful to have these individuals willing to work in my office, and I want to wish them all the best as they go forward in their careers.

"Last but certainly not least, the people of Northeast Wisconsin have been endlessly kind to me. From entrusting me with an amazing responsibility to serve them, the civility they've largely showed even in disagreement, and the countless times I've been welcomed into events, meetings and tours, I've met so many exceptional people that always reminded me what the work of a legislator is truly all about."

Cowles serves as chair of the Wisconsin Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Energy and co-chair of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, and serves on the Senate Committee on Transportation, Veterans and Military Affairs and the Speaker's Task Force on Water Quality.

Under the new legislative maps, Cowles was put in the same Senate district as two other Republican incumbents — Andre Jacque and Eric Wimberger.

District 2 now includes parts of Brown, Outagamie, Shawano and Waupaca counties.

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Hotel Northland: A return to glory

GREEN BAY – Work on the \$44 million renovation of the historic hotel lasted through 2016 and into 2017.

But, as the redevelopment progressed, so did costs

Legal battles and funding issues soon brought work to a halt completely in June.

The hotel entered receivership in late 2017.

The receiver, Paul Swanson, appointed a new contractor and work resumed.

In February 2018, Swanson announced that the Northland would join a Marriott International chain of boutique hotels called the "Autograph Collection."

The Autograph Collection chain works with properties of historic value and with unique character and experiences.

"Financial problems that devolved into infighting among the developers plagued the project from late 2016 and into 2017, when the hotel ended up in receivership. Greenwood Hospitality Group would buy the partially completed project in spring 2018 and rush to open part of it by December, in order to salvage the historic tax credits that helped fund the building," a Press-Ga-

zette article stated.

About \$50 million later, the hotel opened in early 2019.

After what could be considered a labor of love for the city, developers and contractors, the hotel reopened on Valentine's Day.

Through the renovation, the hotel went from 350 guest rooms to 160,

while contractors worked to retain some of its historic aura.

Today, as you walk beneath the lighted neon sign and in the front, you are whisked away to the 1920s as you are greeted by a hotel clerk poised to assist you in front of rows of old-time key slots.

The hotel's significance is not lost to visitors as

they climb the front entry stairs and see a bronze replica of Vince Lombardi's hat.

This spring, the hotel hosted a "birthday party" to mark the one hundredth anniversary of the Northland's glorious welcome to the city.

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
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A first down for trees

GREEN BAY - Paul Jadin was the recent recipient of the On Broadway Impact Award — an honor that will now carry his name.

"Paul Jadin's leadership and influence over three decades has resulted in the revitalization of the Broadway District. Serving as mayor for the City of Green Bay for eight years, Jadin led the charge to create and fund On Broadway, Inc. as a catalyst to drive change," a release from On Broadway stated.

"That change included cutting crime in the district by 80%, securing multi-million-dollar investments to make streetscape enhancements, securing grant dollars to buyout and relocate establishments and signing into law the Broadway moratorium which prohibited further expansion of liquor licenses in the district without a super-majority vote by council.

"After keeping his promise not to serve a third term as mayor, Jadin became president of the Green Bay Area Chamber of Commerce where he continued his commitment to Broadway by moving the chamber's offices to the district.

"Then, as Secretary/CEO of the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation he led the launch of the Connected Communities program to assist downtowns throughout the state which didn't have full time staff, helping them grow into Main Street communities.

"The Broadway District is one of Wisconsin's most talked about comeback stories and Paul Jadin is responsible for so much of the good that has happened. This was the driving reason for renaming the Impact Award the Paul Jadin Impact Award."

"Paul's remarkable contributions to the revitalization of the Broadway District have spanned several decades and through multiple roles," said Brian Johnson, On Broadway, Inc. executive director. "It's impossible to think of another person who has had a greater direct

'n case the title and photo don't give away the game, I am finally reading War and Peace.

I emphasize "finally" because English professors live under two constant assumptions: first, that "oh, you're going to correct my grammar" and second, you're required to have read every classic ever writ-

I can't tell you how many times people have said, "What do you mean you haven't read You're an English profes-

This is why I walk into the service areas of random car dealerships and vell, "You've never changed the oil on a 1968 Bentley? Amateur!"

Really, I'm reading War and Peace for a few reasons, and one of them is to simply slow down. Concentrate.

Be involved with a single task for a long stretch and know that not only is this okay, but this is also largely how successful work has been done throughout the age of humans.

I take 20 pages at a time and I'm 60 pages in — this could take four years and I could care less, as I am going to relish every second of this fictional world.

The novel opens at a party and quickly moves to subsequent parlors and parties.

My bookmark and I are still at one of these parties, sitting on something I imagine to be a divan.

I have a snuff box.

Napoleon looms the dark horizon, but it's likely a month or so until I'm properly introduced to France's premier post-revolution emperor.

His specter hovers like most of our worldly dangers — initially quiet, just a tremor, so you can still sit among friends and chat as if the world will remain the same.



I am in no rush to find out, but I know I will get there.

This impulse to slow down has also made me want to dive back into the past — that place so derided in the world of the futurist — and revisit histories by Polybius, "old" literary criticism like Erich Auerbach's Mimesis: The Representation of Reality in Western Literature.

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De Pere moves forward with recreation plans

CONTRIBUTING WRITER

DE PERE — The De Pere Common Council moved ahead with four recreationrelated issues, suggesting that summer may eventually happen.

Kid-safe playground surfacing for Willems Park, a grand-opening for Voyageur's newest addition, a future prairie and studentbuilt tables for the summer beer garden were among the projects advanced.

Bouncing back at Willems

The common council approved funds to add rubberized, poured-in-place surfacing to the list of upgrades at Willems Park.

The total needed for the park upgrades including the surfacing — \$114,360 will come from a handful of other funds.

In addition to the \$80,000 originally budgeted for Willems Playground, the upgrades will use \$10,500 in funds for hard surfaces carried over from 2023, as well as leftover American Rescue Package Act (ARPA) funds leftover from three other park projects:

- \$6,006 from Legion Park playground
- \$9,005 from Lawton Park playground
- \$12,455 from projects at the Legion Park ball field

The total of \$114,360 includes \$50,660 for poured in place surfacing; \$44,200 for playground equipment; \$15,000 for sidewalks and borders; \$2,000 for drain tile; \$1,500 for landscaping and \$1,000 in miscellaneous expenses.

Home on the native prairie

The common council also approved the planting of two OK'd prairies totaling 6.5 acres on city-owned property along the East River Trail, between Wiese Park and Ledgeview Park.

The land areas are currently fallow, and while some natural foliage grows there, plants that are not

native to the area have taken over, according to Kevin Corbett of the Brown County Land and Water Conservation Department.

Corbett said in a memo that, in addition to providing scenery along the East River Trail, the aim of the prairie project is to plant species that are native to the area and that will provide habitat for birds, pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies and other wildlife.

According to Corbett, preparing the site will take at least a full season and includes mowing, applying herbicide, tilling, seeding the area, covering the seeded area with straw and

three mowings to control

If the site is seeded in spring, it can be moved this year, while if it's not seeded until fall, it won't be ready to be moved until next year.

Prairies take two to three years to get established, as the native plants need time to develop root systems, according to Corbett.

The future prairies will be added to the request for proposal (RFP) for the first phase of the future East River Water Trail plan.

De Pere Parks, Recreation, and Forestry Director Marty Kosobucki said that converting the two areas into prairie won't cost the city anything other

than the labor it will take to mow and spray the areas during the prairie establishment period.

The future East River Water Trail is a joint effort by the county and several municipalities along the East River to clear and improve the navigable areas along the East River from Hoffman Road upstream to Ledgeview Park.

Among its aims is to improve conditions for fish and their habitats, restore areas near the shoreline and remove invasive species.

It was launched in 2022 with money from the American Rescue Package Act. along with grant money

from the US Fish & Wildlife Service.

Pavilion grand opening

The common council also gave the green light to preliminary plans for the grand opening celebration for the Nelson Family Pavilion.

Between 2,000 and 3,000 people are expected to attend the grand opening event Friday, July 26, from 5 to 10:30 p.m. at Voyageur

The event begins with an opening ceremony and ribbon cutting, with an acoustic performer from 5:30 to 7 p.m. on the patio.

Before the main music act, Johnny Wad, at 7:30 p.m., De Pere Mayor James Boyd will make a few announcements.

Beer sales end around 10:30 p.m., and the park closes at 11 p.m.

So far, approved expenses include \$5,000 for Johnny Wad; \$1,050 for 14 portable toilets; \$605 for an 40'x80' tent: \$1,000 for a portable stage; \$500 for the electrical hookup; \$3,000 for beverage; \$500 for staffing; \$750 for police protection and \$720 for fire department services.

"As we got into planning stages with the mayor, the actual event took a much bigger leap in size and scope than we were originally guessing," Kosobucki

"It's a very, very responsible budget for such an awesome thing to showcase to the community," Alder Amy Chandik Kundinger said, adding that sales of beverages will offset the larger outlay.

The David L. and Rita E. Nelson Family Fund donated most of the funding for the Nelson Family Pavilion building project.

De Pere High School woodworking students will work with the city and De Pere Department of Parks, Recreation, and Forestry to refurbish round tables that are used for the summer beer garden concerts and other events at Voyageur Park.

They will also make signs, with designs approved by the city for the city's Urban Orchard program.

The Urban Orchard program invites the public to pick and eat organic fruit from any of the more than 80 fruit trees at seven public locations: Westwood Elementary School, Braisher Park, Voyageur Park, De Pere Community Center/ VFW, De Pere High School, Samantha Park and Foxview Intermediate School.

GBAPS board narrows candidates to six

GBAPS Vice President James Lyerly said that the discussion wasn't structured as a debate.

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GBAPS board presented with third boundary scenario

GREEN BAY - During an April 8 board meeting, Green Bay Area Public School (GBAPS) Interim Superintendent Vicki Bayer presented an update on the district's facilities master planning to the board of education.

"Facilities master planning has been an ongoing project with the district since 2016, and one of the major drivers of this work is bringing us back to the projected budget deficit that we continue to face due in part to the fiscal cliff caused by the ending of ESSER funds, which end Sept. 30, and public education funding that hasn't kept pace with inflation," Bayer recalled to

"I would reference the public back to a document we shared on June 5 that outlines the funding for public education and how that helped us get into a budget deficit along with many other districts in the state of Wisconsin.

"In addition, our district is facing a declining enrollment. In five years where we are projected to have 1463 fewer students enrolled than this current school year. The culmination of all of this work of the facilities master planning lead to board resolutions back on June 5, and later then approved by the board. That included for the first phase the closing of three schools — Wequiock Elementary School,

and Tank Elementary School.

"In addition, a resolution was presented to address the impact of adding K-8s and shifting boundaries, which is the task that was presented to the Boundary Adjustment Advisory Committee.

The district then contracted with Woolpert, who developed two conceptual scenarios for the committee to review and provide feedback.

"Committee member feedback often expanded beyond the board's charter, and I think that was a large part of the frustration for them — having to narrow it back to the focus of the work," Bayer explained.

Bayer and GBAPS Di-Keller Elementary School, rector of Communications Lori Blakeslee then presented feedback from district survey, the Boundary Advisory Adiustment Committee and the community.

In response to that feedback, Bayer asked board members to consider a recommendation that district leadership create a "Scenario C" for the Boundary Advisory Adjustment Committee to consider.

This new scenario would be created implementing using "the facility task force recommendations, which focused on building education adequacy, enrollment and short- and long-term maintenance needs." while continuing to "address the budget deficit through school closures/

consolidations. overall district capacity to address declining enrollment — currently the district is at 76% capacity (1 in 4 seats empty) and in 10-years the District is projected to be at 67% capacity (1 in 3 seats empty) — and minimize student movement and feeder pattern disruptions, with a focus on elementary schools."

Bayer said that "feedback does not support K-8 because of the impact to boundaries and feeder patterns at the middle and high school levels" and that the "community feels overwhelmed with the amount of change at one time," while "budget deficit and declining enrollment must continue to be addressed."

"Throughout this process, we have been in conversation with our community and responded to the concerns. 

Youth turkey hunt is April 13-14

he Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds families, mentors and young hunters that there's still time to plan and participate in the 2024 youth turkey hunt happening statewide April 13-14.

Each year, the youth turkey hunt gives hunters under 16 the opportunity to gain valuable hunting experience and feel the excitement of turkey season before the regular season begins.

"The youth turkey hunt is a great opportunity to get the next generation of turkey hunters active outdoors, whether they are first showing an interest in hunting or carrying on a family tradition," said Alissa Kakatsch, DNR assistant turkey and pheasant ecologist.

What youth hunters need

Youth hunters must have a spring turkey license, wild turkey stamp and valid harvest authorization.

All of these are available online through Go Wild or in person at license sales agents around the state.

Youth hunters may use a harvest authorization for any period during the youth

hunt, but they must hunt within the turkey management zone indicated on their harvest authorization.

Harvest authorizations not filled during the youth hunt may be filled during the regular hunting season in the indicated zone.

During this two-day youth hunt, the bag limit is one male or bearded turkey.

To participate in the mentored hunt program, youth hunters must be accompanied by a qualified adult 18 years of age or older and the adult may not accompany more than two youth hunters at one time.

More information on mentoring a hunter is available on the DNR's Mentored Hunting webpage.

Harvest registration

Harvest registration remains a critical component of wildlife population management, and turkey registration is mandatory, including the youth hunt.

Hunters must register their turkey by 5 p.m. the day after recovery at gamereg.wi.gov or by calling 1 (844) 426-3734. Hunters will need their harvest authorization number to register their turkey.



How to divide your possessions without dividing the family

DEAR SAVVY SENIOR,

Do you have any suggestions on divvying up my personal possessions to my kids after I'm gone without causing hard feelings or conflict?

I have a lot of jewelry, art, family heirlooms and antique furniture, and four grown kids that don't always see eye-to-eye on things.

Conflicted Parent



Divvying up personal possessions among adult children or other loved ones can often be a tricky task.

Deciding who should get what without showing favoritism, hurting someone's feelings or causing a feud can be difficult, even for close-knit families who enter the process with the best of intentions.

Here are a few tips to consider that can help you divide your stuff with minimal conflict:

Sweating the small stuff

For starters, you need to be aware that it's usually the small, simple items of little monetary value that aren't mentioned in your will that cause the most conflicts.

This is because the value

we attach to the small personal possessions is usually sentimental or emotional, and because the simple items are the things that most families fail to talk about.

Family battles can also escalate over whether things are being divided fairly by monetary value.

So, for items of higher value like your jewelry, antiques and art, consider getting an appraisal to assure fair distribution.

Dividing fairly

The best solution for passing along your personal

possessions is for you to go through your house with your kids or other heirs either separately or all at once to find out which items they would like to inherit and why.

They may have some emotional attachment to something you're not aware of. If more than one child wants the same thing, you'll have to make the ultimate decision.

Then you need to sit down and make a list of who gets what on paper, signed, dated and referenced in your will.

You can revise it anytime you want. You may also want to consider writing an

additional letter or create an audio or video recording that further explains your intentions.

You can also specify a strategy for divvying up the rest of your property.

Fair and reasonable methods

Take turns choosing: Use a round-robin process where your kids take turns choosing the items they would like to have.

If who goes first becomes an issue, they can always flip a coin or draw straws.

Also, to help simplify things, break down the dividing process room-byroom, versus tackling the entire house.

To keep track of who gets what, either make a list or use adhesive dots with a color assigned to each person to tag the item.


Have a family auction: Give each person involved the same amount of play money or use virtual points or poker chips to bid on the items they want.

April 15 individual income tax filing deadline is fast approaching

WISCONSIN - With less than one week remaining to the individual income tax return filing deadline, the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) reminds everyone to file their tax returns and pay amounts due before midnight on April 15 to avoid late filing fees and interest charges.

Like past years, DOR's Customer Service Call Center is extending hours to accommodate taxpayers' schedules during this busy time. Call Center tax specialists are available from 7:45 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Thursday until April 15.

New this filing season is DOR's WisTax electronic filing system, which is available for free to qualifying taxpayers who completed their federal Form 1040 or 1040-SR.

WisTax replaces WI e-file and plans are in the works to continue expanding this free tax filing service.

Wisconsin is also participating in the IRS Free File program

Qualifying taxpayers can use a certified Free File software provider to file their federal and Wisconsin returns for free.

Free tax preparation services are also available to qualifying taxpayers through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance and Tax Counseling for the Elderly volunteer programs, which DOR helps coordinate with the IRS and participating agencies.



The eight steps in new home construction

DEAR MONTY,

With the shortage of housing currently available, we are considering building a new home.

What are the steps in the actual construction process?

MONTY'S ANSWER

The construction process transforms a vision into a tangible structure.

The steps are in a logical order, and each step takes time to complete.

The steps below assume

you have a lot, detailed blueprint, itemized list of components and quotes or estimates.

Here is helpful informa-

1. The first step of this journey begins with the preparation of the construction site. This initial phase is of utmost importance, as it establishes the groundwork for the entire home. Assuming there is a recorded survey on record, the construction

crew begins by clearing the building site of any debris or vegetation.

2. Wooden stakes which serve as a template for the foundation identify the excavating contractor's task. Once the soil is removed, a wooden frame outlining the template is constructed, and concrete is poured into it, creating a robust and solid foundation upon which the home will stand.

tractor then fastens large metal walls on both sides of the entire template perimeter which are filled with fresh concrete. Once the concrete cures, the construction of frame of the house on the top of the foundation walls begins.

house begins to take physical shape. Skilled carpenters erect the wooden structure that outlines the walls, floors and roof of the home. This stage also includes the installation of windows and exterior doors. These elements not only provide functionality but also contribute to the overall aesthetic of the house. Once the basic frame is in place, roofing and siding are added. These exterior elements protect the house from various weather conditions, ensuring its longev-

5. The "rough-in" stage; this stage involves the installation of essential services such as plumbing lines, HVAC ducts and electrical wiring. Typically, these systems are installed in a specific order: first plumbing, then HVAC, and finally electri-

6. Now, insulation is added into the walls, providing the home with thermal efficiency. Then, drywall is hung to form the walls. The drywall is then finished and prepared for painting. This stage also often includes the installation of interior doors, baseboards and other interior trim elements. The process also includes the installation of cabinets and countertops, adding utility and style to the kitchen and bathrooms.

7. After the house has been painted, flooring is installed. The type of floor can vary depending on the homeowner's preference and can include hardwood, laminate, tile or carpet. Each type of flooring adds a different aesthetic and feel to the

8. The final stage of the new home construction process is the finish work. This is where the house truly starts to feel like a home. This stage includes installing light fixtures, outlets, and switches, as well as bathroom fixtures like sinks, toilets, and showers. It also involves painting the trim and finishing the exterior land-scaping.

Throughout each stage, municipal inspections are carried out to ensure that the construction is completed according to local building codes.

The new home construction process can take several months to a year, depending on the complexity of the design and any unforeseen challenges, such as inclement weather, material shortages and supply chain delays.

Special assessments coming in Howard

HOWARD – The Howard Village Board approved two resolutions at its Monday, April 8 meeting, authorizing the levying of special assessments on Lineville Road and Brookfield Avenue and declaring the intent to exercise special assessment powers upon Lineville Road for road reconstruction.

Special assessments function as a way for municipalities to equitably distribute the cost of public improvements among the parcels or lots which directly benefit from the improvements.

The resolution authorizing special assessments on Lineville Road and Brookfield Avenue will impact 16 existing properties which will benefit from the installation of improvements by municipal sanitary sewer service, water service, safety and health and welfare.

The resolution declaring intent to exercise special assessment powers on Lineville Road is a preliminary resolution concerning a section of Lineville Road from Belmont Road

to West Deerfield Avenue.
Construction on Lineville Road will include curb and gutter, storm sewer, sidewalks, asphaltic roadway, asphaltic multi-use trails and concrete drive-

ways and is scheduled to

being in spring of 2024,

impacting 28 properties.

Previously, a preliminary resolution was passed to assess just the section of construction set to take place in 2024, but the new resolution passed at Monday's meeting provides for the whole road to be assessed at one

Creativity converges for Wisconsin DI state tournament

Hundreds of students from across the state traveled to UW-Green Bay last Saturday, April 6, to compete in the Wisconsin Destination Imagination (DI) state tournament for a chance to advance to the Globals Finals tournament happening at the end of May.

To qualify for the affiliate tournament, teams competed at four sectional tournaments in one of six challenges — technical, scientific, fine arts, improvisation, engineering and service learning.

The technical challenge asked students to design and create a pinball system to be integrated into an action/adventure story.

Students in the scientific challenge dug

into the world of archeology, discovering artifacts and characters from the past.

In the fine arts challenge, teams were tasked with bringing a piece of artwork to life.

Improvisational teams created two-act shows complete with costumes and stock characters on the spot.

The engineering challenge had teams creating modular devices to launch bean bags and be incorporated into stories where everything goes according to plan until a catalyst occurs.

Teams competing in the service learning challenge presented fantasy stories with details intertwined with details from community service projects carried out earlier in the season.

SNC Theatre Studies presents Silent Sky

St. Norbert College's theatre studies program will present *Silent Sky* by Lauren Gunderson this weekend and next weekend in the Webb Theatre in Abbot Pennings Hall of Fine Arts.

Gunderson's *Silent Sky* follows the story of Henrietta Leavitt, who discovered how to effectively measure cast distances to remote galaxies, leading to a shift in the scale and understanding of the scale and nature of the universe.

Henrietta Leavitt is surrounded by supporting characters including Margie, her sister; Williamina Fleming, a Scottish astronomer who was the first woman to be hired to catalog the stars at Harvard; Annie Jump Cannon, who developed the contemporary stellar classification; and Dr. Peter Shaw, who was Dr. Pickering's apprentice.

Many of the characters in the play were historical people, besides Dr. Peter Shaw and Margie, although she is probably based on Henrietta's real siblings.

The play follows Henrietta's discoveries through her time at Harvard — which would change the astrological community for the rest of time — with a little pinch of romance between Peter and Henrietta.

Henrietta Leavitt discovered that some of the stars, called Cepheids, have a consistent brightness no matter where they are located, making them a good measuring stick for astronomical distances. Her work helped American astronomer Edwin Hubble measure galaxy distances in the 1920s.

As Peter Shaw would say, "(Henrietta) work made the leap — for us all. Now we have a standard measurement – for the rest of time we have a standard."

Both Cannon and Fleming also made important discoveries that are still used

today — Annie Jump Cannon is known for applying the system with a division of stars into the spectral classes O, B, A, G, K, M and Willamina Fleming was the first woman hired by Dr. Fleming to become a Harvard Computer to compute mathematical classifications and edit the observatory's publications.

This play brings the discoveries of Leavitt, Cannon and Fleming to the modern age in a way that is fun and engaging.

The cast and crew has been preparing for many weeks led by director Stephen Rupsch.

Rupsch is helped by assistant director Cassidy Catalano and nine crew members from his performance and production labs class, which he teaches with April Beiswenger who also serves as the scenographer for the production.

Dr. Michael Olson, a nuclear/particle physicist and an assistant professor of physics, helped the cast and crew understand the science behind the astronomy that is talked about in the play.

The cast is small with only five actors: Henrietta Leavitt, Naina Rattu; Margaret Leavitt, Violet Hagen; Peter Shaw, William Mlenar; Annie Cannon, Alexis Corrigan; Williamina Fleming, Jacqueline Stumpf.

"It's a story about feminism in the STEM world, which showcases women scientists from the past in a work of art. Henrietta Leavitt only received recognition after she died, so using a theatrical play to keep her story alive is quite beautiful. It shows how important these women are for the rest of human history," Naina Rattusaid, who plays Henrietta Leavitt, said when asked why this play is one that people need to see.

Performances for *Silent Sky* will be at 7:30 p.m. on April 12, 13, 18 and 19 with a matinee performance at 2 p.m. on April 14.



I was holding off on buying it at the GBUFO when it first was released because it was selling well and the customer comes first, then I was broke, then I kept forgetting to buy it and when I did finally purchase it, I still hesitated to listen to it because I knew I would be in for a case of the feels when listening to what could be a swan song for, as they say in sports a lot these days, a generational talent.

I'm not going to lie — I was wiping away tears during the King Louie Memorial Family Band performance at Gonerfest 20 last September in Memphis.

They broke the mold with King Louie. King Louie's don't grow on trees.

King Louie was a garage rock legend not only in New Orleans and Memphis, but all the hubs of where this genre is loved and supported in the United States and worldwide.

I saw King Louie perform in Chicago and Oakland, but he unfortunately never made it to Green Bay — although it came close to happening once at the Concert Cafe with his band The Royal Pendletons.

Part of the fun of coming to the state tournament, Affiliate Tournament Director Mikaela Becker said, is the opportunity for teams to see how other students took on the same challenge as them.

"We have teams across all the challenges this year, so everyone is going to see some competition and everyone is going to be able to see other kids in the same challenge as them," she said. "They'll see how other kids think about the same problem and see how kids think about different problems across the spectrum."

Wisconsin DI Affiliate Director Mary Bykowski said this year's tournament was bigger than last year's, with more than 20 additional teams attending.

"We've been trying to build our teams throughout the year, so there's new people and new faces," she said. "We're so excited to see the kids on tournament day. When you walk in the door, the excitement is hard to explain unless you've been there... It's in the air and the kids are excited."

That excitement, Bykowski said, prevails for many teams regardless of the outcome of the tournament.

"Even at the end of the day, if things didn't go so well, they're just happy to come and watch other kids and do their thing and just be part of it," she said. "Because of how the Destination Imagination experience is structured, it's all the kids. It's their work, their writing, their costumes, their concepts without adult interference — whether you're at your sectional tournament or the state tournament. But to come here and get to put on your performance, knowing that these were all the best teams in the state and you're going to perform with those

teams, it's such an amazing feeling. To be a part of that, I think, is really a cool thing for the kids."

And regardless of how a team placed at Saturday's tournament, Becker said the skills learned in DI are something participants will carry with them for life.

"There's not a single day that goes by where I don't use something that I learned in DI," she said. "I'm a project manager by day, and so I use all of those project management skills I learned in my time in DI. As a kid, I would not be confident enough to be doing a press interview right now or get up on a stage. Those are all skills that I was able to practice as a result of DI. I see kids who maybe don't otherwise get the opportunity to have their ideas heard, but they get to do that in DI which is just magical for them and for building their confidence and skills for their futures and careers."



Each team placing first through third at Saturday's tournament earned an invite to Global Finals to compete against teams from around the world in Kansas City at the end of May.



"We hope that they develop an appreciation for the work that our artists make and for each medium and the beauty it brings into the eye of the beholder," she said. "Most people who come are


supporting somebody that they care about, but they might also get that spark to try their hand at it, and so we always have class information available for people to pick something up."







ocial media's impact on fishing is often blamed for putting pressure on certain spots and species, or fueling unrealistic expectations.

But in the case of recent posts by passionate, upset anglers in the Green Bay area, it just might spawn some positive changes.

Department of Natural Resources conservation wardens have been receiving boatloads of complaints for illegal activity in bay tributaries, mostly focused on snagging and overharvest of walleyes.





Green Bay Packers to face Philadelphia Eagles in first NFL game in Brazil

GREEN BAY - Game in São Paulo will take place Friday night of Week 1, marking Green Bay's second international appearance

The NFL announced today that the Green Bay Packers will face the Philadelphia Eagles this season in a Week 1 matchup in São Paulo, Brazil, in the firstever regular season game in South America.

The game, which will take place on Friday, Sept. 6, will kick off the season for the Packers and marks Green Bay's second international regular-season appearance, following the team's game in 2022 at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in London.

"We're looking forward to being a part of this historic matchup against the Eagles in São Paulo," said Packers President/CEO Mark Murphy. "We're excited to play in front of our devoted fans in Brazil and help build upon the international popularity of the NFL and the Packers. We had a great experience playing internationally for the first time a couple of years ago and we're proud to be part of the league's continued global growth."

First announced in December, the matchup will take place at the Corinthians Arena. The venue is home to Brazilian soccer team the SC Corinthians and hosted both the 2014 FIFA World Cup and 2016 Olympic Games. The game will also be the first time the NFL has played a game on Friday night of opening weekend in over 50 years (Cardinals at Rams, Sept. 18, 1970).

"As global growth continues to be a critical and strategic priority for the NFL and its 32 clubs, we are thrilled to have the Green Bay Packers playing against the Philadelphia Eagles in our first-ever game in South America," said Gerrit Meier, NFL managing director and head of international. "With over 35 million passionate fans in Brazil, the Friday night 2024 regular season opener in São Paulo will bring an incredible energy marking a historic moment for our sport internationally."

As the Eagles were designated to host the game, the matchup will be considered a road game for the Packers. Because visiting teams typically do not receive a ticket allotment for Season Ticket Holders, tickets to the game are not currently available to purchase through the Packers. 
in the local markets of the competing teams as well as on mobile devices with NFL+.

"His legacy will be unmatched at UWGB. You could argue that he has made the biggest impact on UWGB since its inception," said Moon. "He has over 800 wins and 13 NCAA Tournament appearances. You can look at all these banners around here — the guy is just all about excellence."

Borseth said that there were multiple factors that went into his decision to pass the baton after this past season.

"A couple of things

came into play here," said Borseth. "I'm going to be 70 in June, so you have to look at age. And the second thing is that the last couple years it has been difficult to recruit. Players know that I am going to retire soon and as a result, I iust couldn't capture. It was evident in the '24 class and even more evident in the '25 class with players asking that question. At what point do I end up just draining the program and the next coach has nothing left?"

Though his career has spanned a long time, Borseth said that this decision

did not come easily at all. "I was sitting in my office a little while ago thinking, 'Alright, this is going to be a cakewalk. I'm going to go down there and get this over with and then me and my daughter are going to walk down to the river for some afternoon fishing.' Then I walked out the door and I just went, wham! It really hit me," said Borseth.

"I hope God pointed me in this direction and I hope this is where I am supposed to be, because without it there would be a void."

"It's incredible — the amount of adjusting to change that they did," said Phantom's Head Coach Chad Johnson. "This team has had to adjust to a lot of change — a new playing style, a lot more minutes in certain positions and just a different way of having to do things, and somehow they are catching on and they are keeping up."

Johnson is in his first season at the helm of the program after taking over for Matt Gazen who led the team for nearly two decades.

"This early in the season, they are allowing the coaching staff just to add little things because the previous staff really has built what is here. This staff is very lucky — we have to admit — it's a good team that we are now in charge of managing. Coach Ganzen did a great job in the past with his staff and we are just here to make minor tweaks and changes."

We have to adjust to that and the physicality. We've just got to gain more confidence on the ball. I think these are a lot of things that programs are focused on mid-season and I think that we are a little ahead of things, which is good," said Johnson.

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
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Forever a Phoenix legend

Kevin Borseth announces retirement

GREEN BAY – UW-Green Bay Women's Basketball Head Coach Kevin Borseth has announced his retirement at the conclusion of the team's 2023-24 season.

During his final season, Borseth amassed his 800th career win, as well as 500 wins as the head coach of the Phoenix and 13 NCAA Tournament appearances.

"I spent 42 years of my life doing this and it's not easy. It's something I really love to do. If I had to do anything else, I don't think I would have half the success I had on the basketball floor. To get up tomorrow morning and think that I am no longer the head coach — it's going to hurt," said Borseth.

"It goes back to when I was

younger and all I ever wanted was keys to the gym. We were crawling under fences and breaking in through windows and getting kicked out and all I ever wanted was keys to the gym. I finally got my keys to the gym so I just hope that these guys don't take my keys away."

UW-Green Bay Chancellor Michael Alexander said that Borseth's contributions to the Phoenix community are invaluable and that he is a living legend whose impact will last within the university for years to come.

"If you look in our gym and you look at all of those banners, those

don't happen by accident. That is sustained excellence," said Alexander.

"He's an incredibly easy guy to root for. He works incredibly hard and he shows us at UW-Green Bay what is possible."

Amid Borseth's retirement announcement Alexander said that the school has another important announcement to make regarding the women's basketball program and Borseth's legacy.

"Forevermore, when someone parks behind us in the Kress Center, they are going to make a turn onto Kevin Borseth Way so that everyone that comes into this facility is going to know the excellence that Coach Borseth brought to this university for over 20 years," said Alexander.

While the next few months will be focused on a celebration of Borseth's amazing accomplishments, UW-Green Bay Athletic Director Josh Moon said that remembering Borseth's legacy is an important part of the journey of his career.
