The boy the city never forgot

BROWN/KEWAUNEE/DOOR COUNTIES - It was a different time in America — a time when people got married young and stuck through that marriage no matter what, and a time when morals and character were greatly valued.

Had this story occurred today, everything may have turned out very different and may have even gone unnoticed.


This would just be a story about a small-town boy, his love of football and the city that never forgot him.

The year 1853 brought about a mass migration of Belgian immigrants into Brown, Door and Kewaunee counties as families looked to escape the economic hardship of their native country.

That wave would bring more than 15,000 emigrants into northeast Wisconsin with the promise of cheap land and the "American

The migration to the area has been viewed as a result of two things.

"A big part of the immigration factor for the Belgians that came to Wisconsin was the letter-writing that came back to Belgium," said John Mertens, via the Belgian Heritage Center.

Whether by design or good timing. Earl's paternal grandfather. Victor, arrived in 1873, on the heels of the Great Fire (Peshtigo Fire) which burned about 1.2 million acres on both sides of the bay of Green Bay, killing an estimated 1,250-2,500 and leaving thousands homeless.

This led to a rebuilding period where the Belgian-Americans were converting their homes to red brick made from the heavy clay in the area.

A young and single Victor formed a business partnership with fellow emigrant, John Baptiste Rose, and began the Rose-Lambeau Mason Contracting Company.

Victor soon married another Belgian-American, Marie Adolphine Charlier, and the couple had eight children together.

The oldest, Marcellin, or Marcel, was born in 1876.

A dark-complected boy with dark hair and dark eyes, the young man soon ran into trouble due to his tendencies toward telling falsehoods and running away from the public school.

At the age of 10, he was sent to the State Industrial School for Boys in Waukesha.

After a year and two months, he returned home only to end up

Four launch campaigns for Gallagher seat

record delivering conservative wins and fighting back against liberal policies that would harm our state"

He has served as a member of the Wisconsin Senate since 2019.

Packers, Bellin team up for saving lives

GREEN BAY — The Green Bay Packers and Bellin Health are teaming up to donate updated CPR instruction and AED equipment to local schools, thanks to an NFL Foundation grant.

The funding from the \$20,000 NFL Foundation CPR Education Grant will provide up-to-date CPR training and AED instruction equipment for state schools, including Ashwaubenon High School, Bonduel High School, Coleman High School, Crivitz High School, Green Bay School District, Lena High School, Marinette

High School, Notre Dame Academy, Reedsville High School, Suring High School and Wausaukee High School.

In addition, the pair will donate four AEDs to other schools that will be selected at Bellin's Athletic Director Business Meeting in early May.

"Bellin will help pro-

"Bellin will help provide training resources to each of the schools receiving support from the grant," a Bellin release stated.

"We are so grateful to the NFL and the Green Bay Packers for their partnership in this effort to equip our schools with this potentially life-saving equipment, and the up-todate training to ensure it's used the right way," said Bellin Health Athletic Training Team Facilitator Mark Husen. "It's not just about the players, it's about the fans, referees and others whose lives could be saved by quick access to CPR and AED."

"These latest donations come on the heels of a large-scale CPR/AED effort between Bellin and the Packers in 2023, a collaboration that was developed in the wake of the cardiac emergency Buffalo Bills safety Damar Hamlin experienced in early 2023," a Packers release stated.





Referenda see local support, down statewide

BROWN/KEWAUNEE COUNTIES – While voters across Wisconsin approved 62 of 103 school district referenda placed on election ballots this spring — a 60% approval rate — those voting in Brown and Kewaunee counties approved proposed referenda at 100%.


Voters in the De Pere School District, in Brown County, approved a non-recurring referendum authorizing the district to exceed the revenue limit by \$4,750,000 per year for five years.

The vote passed 3,773-2,873.

Brown County's Seymour Community School District voters approved a three-year non-recurring referendum, 1,185-1,153.

In Kewaunee County, Luxemburg-Casco School District voters approved a non-recurring referendum to exceed the revenue limit for three years for operational expenses, 1,884-1,766, and Algoma School District voters approved general obligation bonds for improvements to district buildings and grounds including safety, security and energy efficiency upgrades, 1,003-475.

More districts asked to increase property taxes for operations rather than cap-

ital needs, a result of inflation, declining enrollment, the expiration of recent federal aid and state-wide revenue caps.

In 1993, state legislation put a limit on what districts could spend per pupil and the limit was based on spending in 1993. The limit was originally adjusted to keep in line with inflation, until the 2009-10 school year when legislators discontinued the increases.

"With 103 referenda this spring, 2024 is already shaping up to be a year with an unusually large number of ballot questions. In 2022, there were 166 total school referenda — the most since 2001 — but only 82 in the spring. Since 2014, voters across Wisconsin have approved 881 school district referenda, which averages out to more than two per district," a report from the

Wisconsin Policy Forum stated.

"These increased numbers in 2024 indicate that many districts in Wisconsin are feeling financial pressure today. Many more referenda could appear on ballots in November.

"Across ballots from

February and April, 66% of all referendum questions asked voters to raise property taxes to support school district operations. This represents the highest share of operating referenda since at least 2000.

"Yet as districts' requests for additional revenue have intensified, voter support for these requests appears to be waning. Voter approval rates of school district referenda hovered around 50% for most of the late 2000s and early 2010s. Starting in 2012, however, voters approved referenda in greater numbers, with the passage rate peaking at 89.7% in 2018.

"Over the past several years, approval rates have trended downward. After slight declines in both 2020 and 2022, the 60.2% passage rate for 2024 school district referenda so far is the lowest in a midterm or presidential year since 2010. Moreover, the 41 failed referenda in 2024 so far already constitute the greatest number of no votes in a single year since 2010. It's possible the approval rates this November will be different, but in the past school referendum passage rates have tended to be similar in the spring and fall."

St. Norbert College, UW-Green Bay collaborate on student degrees

GREEN BAY – On April 11, UW-Green Bay and St. Norbert College (SNC) inked an agreement that will allow students in selected degree programs to study at both institutions.

"This sharing of resources provides students from the region (and beyond) with an opportunity to take classes more easily at either of the northeast Wisconsin four-year campuses, regardless of campus residence or enrollment. The agreement focuses on the student's needs and provides more opportunities for degree pursuit where a student can augment the general education they receive at one school with a degree program available at the other," a joint release explained.

"For example, a St. Norbert student could access the courses needed for

a degree in engineering through offerings at UW-Green Bay, or a UW-Green Bay student could complete their economics or engineering physics major with courses provided at SNC.

"In other programs, SNC students can complete three years at SNC and then the final two years at UWGB to

earn their undergraduate and graduate degree. SNC will honor the UWGB tuition rate where applicable when UWGB students take classes at SNC, and the reverse."

"This collaboration with UW-Green Bay is a win-win for both institutions, and most importantly for the students we serve," said Laurie M. Joyner, Ph.D., president of St. Norbert College. "This partnership strengthens our Norbertine tradition of engagement in the local community. And given the enrollment and financial challenges in higher education today, these partnerships are critical in providing the best well-rounded education students want and deserve," said Joyner.

"Students win when institutions collaborate to build on the strengths that each college brings to the communities they serve," said UW-Green Bay Chancellor Michael Alexander. "Rather than try to provide everything our region needs in higher education on our own, students and the community become better when we partner with each other, ensuring our students and the region

can benefit from having two stronger, yet different institutions."

"An agreement like this honors the needs of a student," said Alexander. "In addition to offering more degree options, it also expands the college experience opportunities for students. The agreement is a great way for us to think creatively about higher education and how it can thrive into the future with a complete ecosystem in Northeast Wisconsin."

"This partnership is another example of our work to address the evolving needs of the local community and provide an outstanding educational experience for our students, which includes academic quality, curricular efficiency and advancing student success," Joyner added.

FBLA prepares students to become "communityminded business leaders" through career preparation and leadership experiences.



GREEN BAY - On April 11, Project VOTE of Brown County awarded 'Voter Challenge" trophies for the April 2 election in the Brown County Courthouse Rotunda.

Project VOTE is a local non-partisan group that works to increase

"informed voter turnout" and awareness in Brown County.

The group issues the Voter Challenge as a competition among Brown County municipalities to encourage local voting.

The contest is divided into two divisions — the "Green" for municipalities

with less than 10,000 residents and the "Gold" for municipalities with more than 10,000 residents.

The trophies are presented for the highest percentage of registered voters who turn out to the polls for general elections.

"Rockland's turnout of 47.7% of registered vot-

ers was the best among the municipalities in the Green Division, which includes the county's municipalities with populations below 10,000. The voter turnout in Allouez was 38.3%, the highest percentage among the larger municipalities that make up the Gold Divi-

sion. It's the fourth Voter Challenge victory for Rockland and the seventh for Allouez," a Project Vote release stated.

back in the reform school a vear later.

He stayed there for three more years before being released to return to Green Bay, but the home he would return to in December 1891 would look very different.

Murder-suicide

Two months earlier, on a busy Monday afternoon, downtown Green Bay was rattled by the sound of gun-

Several people witnessed the tragedy as Victor Lambeau met his wife on the corner of Main Street and Webster Avenue, where he drew a revolver, shot her and then committed sui-

"Lambeau was dead but his wife was still alive and conscious, the bullet having entered her neck," a Press-Gazette article stated.

In the upcoming days, the city struggled with the "why," as newspapers reported jealousy and a fight over money as the cause.

An Oct. 14 edition of the Green Bay Weekly Gazette recounted the coroner's

jury testimony from Lambeau's partner, John Rose, who testified that "Lambeau came to him Monday afternoon at the old city pound lot where he was engaged in laying the foundation of M. McGuire's new house. He, Lambeau, had been drinking and was much excited, more excited than he had ever known to before. When drinking, he was very jealous of his wife, being haunted by the idea that she was untrue to

After hearing the testimony, a verdict of "temporary insanity" was re-

On the day of the shooting, Lambeau was carrying a life insurance policy with him from the Modern Woodmen of America for \$3,000 — worth around \$100,000 today payable to their children.

The insurance was paid out on Oct. 29.

According to probate records, Lambeau also owned eight lots in the city of Green Bay and one in Pre-

ble at the time of his death. The property was divided among his widow, Marie,

her surviving children and one infant granddaughter Lillian.

Marie was pregnant with her eighth child at the time of the shooting.

She gave birth to a daughter months later, but the infant would die after just a few weeks.

Marcel matures

As Marcel returned to Green Bay, he did what came naturally and began working in masonry, eventually becoming the president of the Mason's Union.

He met and married Mary Sara LaTour, daughter of Belgian emigrants, Louis and Sylvia LaTour.

One year later, the couple welcomed a curly darkhaired boy into the world at their North 12th Street home in Green Bay (now 615 North Irwin Street) on April 9, 1898.

They named him Earl Louis - Louis after his maternal grandfather Louis LaTour.

Oliver Denen in 1902 and Beatrice C. in 1904.

The couple then lost a second child — a daughter in 1906 — 19 days after Mary gave birth.

The Lambeau boys were known for their burly stature — a natural brawniness given to them by their strong Belgian heritage.

A May 1900 Press-Gazette announced the arrival of Raymond at a mighty 12-and-a-half pounds.

Marty Piette, airport director of Austin Straubel, said that the two main focal points for funding usage will be the replacement and upgrade of passenger boarding bridges and improvement of the heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system within the terminal.

Currently, the 12 passenger boarding bridges at the airport are approaching 20 years of usage, and Piette said that the replacement and upgrading of these aging bridges will allow for "more accessibility from an ADA perspective."

Piette stated that the current HVAC system includes "some pretty old equipment," and a new setup will "provide better energy efficiency."

This is in alignment with Austin Straubel's goals to "continue [their] stewardship of the environment," which also includes "upgrading and retrofitting for LED lighting with more energy efficiency and using motion sensors."

Over the past two years, the airport has been making a series of improvements to its facility, grounds and airfield.

Last year, the airport improved its short-term parking and a portion of its longterm parking.

"Green Bay Austin Straubel International Airport is an economic driver in our community, providing transportation options for local businesses as well as leisure travelers, while also helping support businesses like hotels, restaurants, gas stations and tourism attractions. Investments and upgrades to our facilities and operations benefits all of us," said Troy Streckenbach, Brown County Executive.

Travelers do not need to worry about how construction will affect their flights.

Piette noted that construction "will not have an impact" and the airport has the capability to "move flights around" to ensure smooth travels. However, those traveling through the airport will notice "more accessibility and better lighting."

Work is expected to be completed by the end of the summer.

But to ensure travels go as smoothly as possible, Piette recommends allowing "an additional 15 to 20 minutes" onto planned flight arrival times during the construction period.

De Pere expresses community diligence to deter deer

DE PERE - Residents who want to keep deer out of landscaping should consider planting things that deer don't like to munch on.

That's the conclusion of the De Pere Common Council after an inconclusive aerial deer survey.

Compared to numbers from the last aerial deer survey, done in 2014, the survey found more deer in some areas and fewer in others.

with thermal Drones imaging cameras assisted with the most recent survey, done earlier this year in conjunction with the wildlife services division of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS).

"Given the numbers and the lack of car crashes, I don't believe it represents a serious traffic hazard," De Pere Police Chief Jeremy Muraski said at a recent Common Council meeting.

Muraski said there were a handful of non-serious car/deer accidents and that deer numbers tend to spike in November due to deer rutting and moving around.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources doesn't have a set threshold for deer in populated areas.

The 2014 survey, done by helicopter, didn't result in any actions on behalf of the city, such as killing or moving the deer.

Culling would cost \$400 per deer, and transporting the deer is not an option due to chronic wasting disease, according to De Pere Director of Parks, Recreation and Forestry Marty Kosobucki.

Last fall, some members of the public brought their complaints to the De Pere Common Council, saying deer were devouring their flowers and lunching on their landscaping.

The city included \$2,600 for an aerial survey in the 2024 budget.

The survey counted deer in five sections on each side of the Fox River.

The count includes the number of images that were confirmed to be deer and, in some cases, the number of images not 100% confirmed to be deer.

The west side deer count went from 109 in 2014 to 95 confirmed deer and seven unconfirmed in 2024.

On the east side, inside De Pere city boundary lines, the deer count went from 10 in 2014 to 62 confirmed deer in 2024, with 16 unconfirmed.

Kosobucki called the east side increase significant but said the jump isn't as steep if the 2014 baseline number incorporates the area just over the border from De Pere into Allouez.

The 0.59-mile swath near St. Norbert Abbey went from 46 in 2014 to 51 in 2024 with 10 unconfirmed.

Another bordering Allouez, a 0.19-square mile piece between East River Drive and the East River from Lebrun to Charles Street, went from 29 in 2014 to 22 in 2024.

"Deer move around," De Pere Alderperson Shana Defnet Ledvina said.

She pointed out that one fault with the survey was that it wasn't done in one

According to Kosobucki, the USDA conducted a culling operation late last year on Green Bay's east side, near Preble Park, and that an aerial survey had counted more than 80 deer in a smaller, more denselypopulated area.

Alderperson Amy Chandik Kundinger suggested that the city provide planting and landscaping tips on its website.

Perry Willems of Willems Landscape Service, Inc., suggested planting things that would be unpleasant to eat, such as things with needles or thorns, or things with a strong fragrance such as boxwood or spotted nettle.

"As far as evergreens, you can do spruce, boxwood or junipers; where it comes to shrubs, you can do barberry because they have thorns on them, and also roses, forsythia, lilac and ninebark," Willems said.

Perennials that deer dislike include allium, ornamental onion, astilbe, beebalm, bleeding hearts and

Annuals they dislike include lavender and mari-

Willems said deer love hostas and arborvitae, which many people have in their yards.

A spray made of water and cayenne pepper can steer pests away, as can mothballs and a variety of commercial products.

He mentioned Liquid Fence, whose active ingredients are putrescent whole egg solids and garlic, according to the company's website, liquidfence.com

To protect tree bark from deer rubbing on it, Willems suggested trunk wraps.

An online search found them in a variety of materials, including plastic, vinyl, metal, plastic or wire mesh and burlap.

GBAPS board approves creation of third boundary option

GREEN BAY – During an April 15 special board meeting, the Green Bay Area Public Schools (GBAPS) Board of Education voted unanimously to approve the creation of a third option, in addition to the two conceptual scenarios returned by Woolpert.

During their April 8 meeting, Interim Superintendent Vicki Bayer and GBAPS Director of Communications Lori Blakeslee presented feedback from a district survey, the Boundary Advisory Adjustment Committee and the community.

In response to that feedback, Bayer asked board members to consider a rec-

ommendation that district leadership create a "Scenario C" for the Boundary Advisory Adjustment Committee to consider.

This new scenario would be created implementing using "the facility task recommendations, which focused on building education adequacy, enrollment and short- and long-term maintenance needs," while continuing to "address the budget deficit through school closures/ consolidations, reduce overall district capacity to address declining enrollment - currently the district is at 76% capacity (1 in 4 seats empty) and in 10-years the District is projected to be at 67% capacity (1 in 3 seats empty)— and minimize student movement and feeder pattern disruptions, with a focus on elementary schools."

Bayer said that "feedback does not support K-8 because of the impact to boundaries and feeder patterns at the middle and high school levels" and that the "community feels overwhelmed with the amount of change at one time." while "budget deficit and

declining enrollment must continue to be addressed."

To provide the committee and the community with an opportunity to provide feedback on Scenario C, the boundary work timeline has been adjusted to:

GREEN BAY - St. Paul Lutheran Church and School of Green Bay recently completed its much needed and deserved update: an addition to the side of the church.

"Before the place was kind of a maze," he said. "You had to go through many different hallways and doors in order to find the chapel."

In addition to a more accessible front entrance, there is hope that visibility for the church will increase and it will be simpler to find and access.

"Sometimes people get confused distinguishing us from the church right next to us," Schaewe said. "We're hoping the new building allows for us to be found more easily."

This project has been in the works for six years now and was much anticipated by community members and staff alike so much so that the church hosted a dedication rite for the new building.

It was held on Sunday, April 14, right after a special service and consisted of scripture and prayer and was followed by a lunch downstairs in the new community center.

St. Paul Lutheran encourages others to come and worship with them on Sundays and check out their brand new building.

811 is a national, free service available year-round.

"Everyone is excited to get outside and start working on outdoor projects this time of year," said Adam Marxen, manager of gas integrity and standards for Alliant Energy. "Not knowing what's below the surface can lead to a major disaster. Please slow down and call to have your underground lines marked before you dig."

After you call 811 to de-

scribe where and when you plan to dig, utilities mark the locations of buried lines with high-visibility paint or flags.

Yellow paint or markings indicate buried natural gas lines; red paint or markings identify electric lines.

When you dig, Alliant Energy advises you to stay 18 inches away from the marked lines.

If you must work within the 18-inch tolerance zone, dig by hand with extreme caution.

If you happen to contact natural gas pipelines or electric lines, call 1 (800) ALLIANT — 800-255-4268.

Even minor damage such as nicks, cuts or dents can result in pipeline failure, electrical shock or a major incident, if not properly addressed.

Never attempt to fix damaged lines yourself. If you hear blowing gas or begin to smell gas, get to a safe distance and call 911 immediately.

It can also mean asking for limited packaging options when shopping online.

More than 40% of plastics are produced for packaging.

Before you place an order, online or in-store, ask if they have plastic-less packaging.

Reduce

One of the best ways to reduce the amount of plastic we consume is by simply saying "no thank you" when offered plastic materials. Many take-home restaurants will offer you an option to opt out of plastic cutlery when ordering. And if they don't have an option, you can ask them not to include single-use plastics.

Reuse

Plastic can easily be reused for many projects around your home, business or school. Plastic jugs and bottles are great for storing or moving liquids. Plastic containers are perfect for organization and storage. And plastic bags can be used over and over again.

For other plastic materials, such as toys, clothes (yes clothes have plastic fibers in them), shoes and

containers, donate them. Plastic materials are durable and can last for a long time, if you don't have a use for them anymore, someone else may.

Recycle

Most plastic containers can be recycled with your curbside recycling (check the Betterbin app to confirm it's acceptable in your recycling). Softer plastics such as films, bags and wraps, can be recycled as well,but not in your curbside recycling.

Find a location to recycle No. 2 and No. 4 plastic bags by visiting Earth911.com.

Plastic is a common material among our daily lives. It's up to us to reduce our consumption of plastics to keep ourselves and our planet healthy.

How to tap into underutilized veterans burial benefits

DEAR SAVVY SENIOR,

What types of funeral benefits are available to old veterans?

My 83-year-old father, who has Alzheimer's disease, served during the Vietnam War in the 1960s. Planning Ahead

DEAR PLANNING,

Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) National Cemetery Administration actually offers a variety of underutilized burial benefits to veterans as well as their spouses and dependents.

Most U.S. veterans (both combat and non-combat) who didn't receive a dishonorable discharge are eligible for burial benefits.

To verify your dad's discharge, you'll need a copy of his DD Form 214 "Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty."

If you don't have it, you can request online at Archives.gov/veterans.

Here's a rundown of some of the different benefits that are available to veterans that die a non-service related death.

Military cemetery benefits

If your dad's eligible and would like to be buried in one of the 155 national or 119 state, territory or tribal-operated cemeteries (see VA.gov/find-locations), the VA provides a

number of benefits at no cost to the family, including a gravesite, opening and closing of the grave and perpetual gravesite care; a government headstone or marker, a United States burial flag that can be used to drape the casket or accompany the urn and a presidential memorial certificate.

If your dad is cremated, his remains will be buried or inurned in the same manner as casketed remains.

But be aware that funeral or cremation arrangements and costs are not taken care of by the VA.

They are the responsibility of the veteran's family, but some veteran's survivors may be eligible for burial allowances.

The VA also offers a memorial web page called the Veterans Legacy Memorial for any veteran buried in a national, state, territorial

Weight restrictions end for northern Wisconsin highways

WISCONSIN - The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) ended Spring Thaw Class II and posted road restrictions for 15 counties of Zone 1 on Tuesday, April 16.

Class II roads include about 1,400 miles of state highways susceptible to damage from heavy trucks during the spring thaw period as frost leaves the ground.

The DNR will hire approximately 10 full-time wardens for the upcoming class who will begin training in January or April 2025, depending on the applicant's prior law enforcement experience.

In addition to formal STB trainings, Bellin Athletic Trainers assist in the Hands on Healthcare program that exposes middle and high school students to healthcare careers, using STB manikins to demonstrate and teach some of these life-saving techniques.

"We are grateful to NEWRTAC and our Bellin Emergency Department for their contributions to this valuable training," Schmidt said. "Working together, we can be prepared and save lives."

or tribal cemetery.

This allows families to post pictures and stories of their loved one online as a way to remember and honor their service.

If you're interested in this option, the VA has a pre-need burial eligibility determination program to help you plan ahead before your dad passes.

See VA.gov/burials-memorials/pre-need-eligibility or call the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at (800) 535-1117.

Private cemetery benefits

The VA also provides benefits to veterans buried in private cemeteries.

If your dad chooses this option, the VA benefits include a free government headstone or grave marker, or a medallion that can be affixed to an existing privately purchased headstone or marker; a burial flag; and a presidential memorial certificate.

Funeral or cremation arrangements and costs are again the responsibility of the family, and there are no benefits offered to spouses and dependents that are buried in private cemeter-

Military funeral honors

Another popular benefit available to all eligible veterans buried in either a national or private cemetery is a military funeral honors ceremony.

This includes an honor guard detail of at least two uniformed military persons, folding and presenting the U.S. burial flag to the veteran's survivors and the playing of Taps.

The funeral provider you choose will be able to assist you with all VA burial requests.

Depending on what you want, certain forms may need to be completed which are always better to be done in advance.

For a complete rundown of burial and memorial benefits, eligibility details and required forms visit Cem.va.gov.

Burial allowances

In addition to the burial henefits some veteran's survivors may also qualify for a \$948 burial allowance and \$948 for a plot to those who choose to be buried in a private cemetery, and \$231 for a headstone or grave marker allowance.

The seller is someone my wife and I have known for several years, and we are well acquainted. The seller also has a business at his residence.

The business is a small flower-farming operation he has managed for around 30 years.

My wife has been an employee at the seller's farm for around 15 years and helps manage it.

The seller's farm has historically done well, financially speaking.

Getting to the point, the seller has had two appraisals done so far.

One was for around \$450,000, and the other was around \$200,000.

There are 10 acres of land, the above-mentioned

house, two 40x30-foot plastic greenhouses and a small heated barn with a large walk-in cooler.

The seller isn't selling the property as a business, just the house, land and structures.

The property is maintained well, and the house, even though small, is essentially a custom house so it's nice on the inside.

What are your thoughts regarding the two appraisals being so far apart?

My lender has not performed an appraisal yet, but I am unsure what to make of the potential transaction.

Additionally, do you think this situation presents as a conflict of inter-

business that has done well financially and wants to sell as if there was no business. Usually, this would add value to the sale price.

It is unclear how much your wife knows.

It is very common for an employee to believe the owner is raking it in, and the owner is struggling.

On the other hand, in 30 years, he may have a fortune and want the same for a dedicated employee.

If your wife helps man-

age it and knows the balance sheet, she likely already knows the value added by operating the business.

The appraisals

All opinions will be different because the nature of the appraisal is subjective thinking with many variables.

If you know both valuations, you may have viewed the appraisal documents.

Reading each appraisal

will reveal what the appraiser is thinking.

I suspect comparable sales may be difficult to find for the business you describe, which could also account for the surprising difference.

Also, some improvements are necessary for the operation of the busi-

ness, specifically the two hoop houses and the walkin cooler.

Your lender's appraiser will also have a different opinion.

The difference between the seller obtaining two appraisals and your lender's appraiser is that this appraiser is not working for you. Even though you are paying, your lender's appraiser protects the lender's interest.

The conflict of interest

It is unclear who vou think has the conflict of interest.

You both have a conflict of interest inherent in protecting your interests.

The seller knows your wife knows the financials, and that knowledge may explain why he would sell in this fashion.

Consider asking him. It is expected to have the concerns you are sharing.

Let it play out and react as necessary.

UW-Green Bay Theatre presents The Mad Ones

UW-Green Bay Theatre will put on its final performances of the 2023-24 season this weekend as it wraps up its production of *The Mad Ones*.

"It's about a young girl who is on her way to college," said Director Thomas Campbell. "It starts off when she gets in the car and then the rest of the play takes place in her head and she reflects on the past year and the memories of some of the events in the past year of her life. And she is joined by the ghost of her recently deceased best friend... It's a small cast, but heavy material, big songs, big content and lots to process emotionally."

The show, Campbell said, was selected intentionally because of that small cast.

"The previous musical we did was a really big, large cast, so we wanted to focus on something different for a student experience," Campbell said. "So we felt that pedagogically this was a good show to focus on. Also, bringing a musical into this space presents different challenges for us artistically, as well as from a teaching standpoint."

While UW-Green Bay Theatre's shows are typically performed in the larger University Theatre, *The Mad Ones* will take place in the smaller Jean Weidner Theatre to provide both the students involved and the audience with a more intimate experience.

"I really like how intimate the space is," said Audrey Soberg, who plays the role of the main character, Sam. "Early on in the process, we were talking about how this all takes place in Sam's mind, so we're trying to give that to the audience so that they

feel like they're in there with me. And then I feel like they're in there with me, so it changes my process of how I react to things and how I interpret how the scenes are going. We just wanted everything to feel a lot closer and a lot more intimate, so I'm very excited to be able to do a musical in this space."

Cast members said that being a part of a smaller show has also allowed them to get more intimate with their own characters and how they bring them to the stage.

"With it being only four cast members, we've all been able to really allow ourselves to get intimate with our characters and really dive in deep to who they are — even deeper than just the script may allow and even playing with scenarios or different themes or different connections and relationships even," said Blake Larson, who plays Sam's boyfriend, Adam. "The show allows so much for the actor to play with their character, and it's really allowed me, especially, to figure out who Adam is and who I want him to be."

Although the show covers some serious topics, Campbell said the show's more comedic moments and the cast and crew have kept rehearsals light and enjoyable.

"Even though the content is really heavy, it's been a lot of fun," he said. "Lots of laughter. Lots of willingness to explore and try new things and challenges — just embrace the process. It's a really good group. We have a fantastic stage management team and really strong performers."

The mix of emotional and comedic moments have also provided a challenge for the cast to learn how to navigate as they



When Push Comes to Shove and Still Life: Holding Sound open now at newARTSpace

Now through May 18, newARTSpace will house two exhibits at its downtown De Pere gallery — an exhibit featuring the artwork of John Tyson entitled *When Push Comes to Shove* and an exhibit featuring the artwork of Marjorie Mau entitled *Still Life: Holding Sound*.

Although each exhibit and artist utilizes different mediums and ideas, newARTSpace Curator/Coordinator Terri Warpinski said the motivation behind the artwork connects them.

"For both Marjorie and John, art is a hugely gounding part of their daily lives," she said. "It helped both of them in very different ways and it helps them sort of make sense of their existence. What I hope people leave with is the notion that art isn't merely decorative and it's not merely pretty, but that it is an important part of human expression. I believe everybody needs a form of expression. It doesn't have to be visual, but it's essential to what it is to be human."

When Push Comes to Shove

Tyson's exhibit, When Push Comes to Shove, features strong literary ties and pairs words with densely scribed and worked backgrounds.

"They're all words of mine or words that

I've picked up from other people," he said. "And I'm obsessed with words. I like the whole thing of poetry and I've also liked art, so they just kind of came together. I was able to do a lot of drawing in prison. I had the time and I took full advantage of

that, so it just became a ritual that I follow through... It's a part of everything for me." Those who view Tyson's exhibit at

newARTSpace may recognize his work as it is also featured in *Art Against the Odds*, an exhibit on display at the Neville Public Museum composed of the artwork of individuals in Wisconsin's prison system.

Tyson was released in 2017, but his passion for art has stuck with him and he has found comfort in the repetition present in his work.

"Sometimes you like your doodle and then you might repeat those kinds

of things," he said. "Repetition is very important for us because, as humans, we repeat everything. We don't like to say that because we want to be new and exciting and different, but life is very repetitive. And so that's what my job is — to put words down



Ashwaubenon students perform in PUFFS

Although many may be familiar with *Harry Potter*, Ashwaubenon High School students are bringing a lesser-known side of the story to the stage in their production of *Puffs*, or *Seven Increasingly Eventful Years at a Certain School of Magic and Magic*.

something... It's supposed to be a story for people that were never destined to be a hero. It's for all the people who never really felt they had an adventure."

While the play focuses on a different set of characters, Hammen said some popular characters from the original series make appearances throughout the show as well — some in more traditional forms than others.

"They have a main trio just like the original trio, but they're very opposite of them," Amber said. "And there is still Harry, but Ron is played by a mop and there's not really a Hermione. So it's kind of funny in that regard."

In keeping with Ashwaubenon High School tradition, this year's spring play is being directed by students while the advisors take a step back.

"We're very much supporting rather than leading," Hammen said. "And that's what it's supposed to be."

Student directors Sarah Beaudo and Addie Thomas have taken the lead in directing *Puffs*, and said the process has provided a much different experience than being in the cast.

"It's very interesting to get to see your ideas that you have from the very beginning start to progress," Beaudo said. "And you get to watch as all of the actors get to know their roles and grow as the characters themselves."

Having experience acting in shows at Ashwaubenon, though, has helped them be able to take on the role of director effectively.

"I think it really helps that we both acted on stage, too," Thomas said. "It kind of gives us an insight of what they might be thinking when we tell them something and it

doesn't always click right away. We're kind of able to help them through some of those challenges."

To those considering seeing the show, Beaudo and Thomas said there's something for everyone in *Puffs*, regardless of their level of familiarity with Harry Potter.


"Even if you've never seen or read *Harry Potter* ever, there are a lot of jokes in [the show] that don't have to do with Harry Potter and a lot of things that people are

"Doing it over and over again, it's like, 'Okay, I did a week. Could I do a month?' And then, 'Yeah, I can do a month,' and then finally, after three months or so, 'I'm going to do it a year.' I wasn't trying to mark time — people believe that. Maybe I was, but that's kind of like if you like washing dishes... By the second, third or fourth dish, you're in your own place... That's what I like."

Tyson said seeing his artwork on display for the first time has been an emotional experience.

"It's pretty inspiring and it's pretty awesome and vulnerable..." he said. "It gets very emotional, not because I'm going back there, but one of the things I've talked to Terry and David about is that I have DID — dissociative identity disorder — so I can leave... It's not a bad thing, it's just a coping skill that I learned...This is the first time my art has been like this... This is just very vulnerable and I like it. I don't need to run from it. I can engage with it."

move along with the quick pace of the show.

"Making all the switches from moment to moment has been interesting to navigate because the tone and emotions throughout the show switch so quickly as we're going from memory to memory," said Jenny Witt, who plays Sam's mother, Beverly. "There's one moment where I'm doing a funny song and then I'm dumping all my despair from my entire life, so those switches have been interesting to navigate."

As the show deals with the transition from college to high school and Sam's journey to figuring out who she wants to be, Campbell and the cast said that many people in the audience, and even the cast members themselves, will be able to find something to relate to in the show.

"One thing that stuck with me a lot is understanding that in order to live a life that you want to live, you have to base your actions off of what you want and not what other people around you are trying to do or what the people around you want for you," said Ava Brewer, who plays Sam's recently deceased friend, Kelly.

"There's a lot of moments in the show that lots of people go through," Witt said. "So being able to realize that art imitates life, if you come see the show you will see things that you probably have or will face in your life."





Hundreds of anglers are fishing off Kewaunee and Door counties, hoping to tangle with a trophy trout. Most years, it takes a whopper larger than 20 pounds to win.

Known as the Baileys Harbor Brown Trout Tournament, the April 18-21 event allows fishing in Green Bay and Lake Michigan.

Tickets are available online at https://e.sparxo.com/Baileys-Harbor-Brown-Trout-Tournament, or in person at the four weigh-in locations (Baileys 57, Howie's Tackle, Hooked Up Tackle Shop and Yacht Works Kewaunee) and five other ticket outlets: Algoma BP, Cherryland Shell and Greystone Castle in Sturgeon Bay, Lakeshore Adventures in Baileys Harbor and Virlee Gunworks in New Franken.

Meanwhile, there were 41 teams entered the Blue Door Brown Trout Derby, head-quartered in Kewaunee last Saturday. Team Reel Deal (59.25 pounds), Team Pieman (58.91) and Team JG Express (52.85) were the top three finishers, while Team LaFond's Fish Market had the catch of the day, a 19.61-pounder.

Elsewhere, walleye spawning is winding down on

Green Bay tributaries, and fish have been active as they head back to the bay. Some bonus pike, trout and bass have also been hooked.

A large run of suckers in the tributaries means the steelhead run is on its last legs, with most fish spawned out and on their way back to the main lake.

DNR fisheries staff sorted more than 2,000 steelhead at the Root River and Besadny weirs this spring, including more than 1,200 in eight collections from the Root at Racine. Of those, nearly 800 were spawned.

The thirdegg-take at the Besadny Anadromous Fisheries Facility near Kewaunee took place April 10, and another was set for April 17. Through April 10, a total of 989 steelhead had been sorted. Of those, 245 females were spawned resulting in about one million eggs taken.

Finally, if you've been wanting to see sturgeon spawn, now's the time to check below the dams at De-Pere, Peshtigo and Marinette, or take a trip to the Wolf River at New London, Shiocton or Shawano.

Birdathon underway

The Great Wisconsin Birdathon began this week and runs through June 15.

It's like a walk-a-thon, but instead of logging miles, participants log bird sightings.

The Birdathon is Wisconsin's largest fundraiser for bird conservation. Bird enthusiasts from across the state raise support and awareness for bird conservation by forming a team or donating to a team.



April 8, 2024 ORDER OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS FOR SIDEWALK REPAIRS UNDER SECTION 66.0907, WISCONSIN STATUTES

The Board of Public Works of the City of De Pere, Brown County, Wisconsin, has found that certain sidewalks on the following streets were unsafe, defective or insufficient, to-wit:

East Side of the Fox River, South of Charles Street and East of S. Ontario Street/Jordan Road.

The Board of Public Works orders that all defective sidewalks identified on the attached property and repair listing be removed and replaced or otherwise corrected as identified therein and in accordance with the standards set forth and the established grade.

All owners of property fronting on said streets are ordered to remove and replace that portion of the sidewalk in need for repair and abutting their premises on or before the 30th day of June, 2024. If any owner fails to comply with this order, the City of De Pere shall cause the work on their sidewalk to be done by contract and shall charge the cost as a special tax against their lot or parcel. Lots or parcels with special charge costs in excess of \$1,000 will have the option of paying such sidewalk replacement expenses in up to five (5) annual installments, together with interest at a rate of 4.60%.

A copy of this order shall be mailed to each owner or their agent, and shall be published in the official newspaper.

WNAXLP Oneida Wetland Mitigation Site Invasive Species Control

Robert E. Lee & Associates, Inc. has been contracted by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) to spot treat 30 acres of invasive species (common reed (Phragmites australis), reed canary grass (Phalaris arundinacea), cattail (Typha spp), and purple loosestrife (Lythrum salicaria)) within the Oneida Wetland Mitigation Site (74 acres) located on the northwest side of the Village of Hobart. Work will begin in May and will conclude by October 31, 2024. All invasive species will be treated with an aquatic approved herbicide and follow guidelines provided by WisDOT, in order to reduce impacts to native plants and wildlife within the property. Herbicide treatments will be conducted by a combination of foliar spraying with a backpack sprayer or ATV tank sprayer, cutting stems and applying herbicide to the cut surface and hand wicking. Any request for a public meeting must be made within five days after this notice is published. 







After Kuehn struck out Sydney Rau for the first out, Payton Dudra grounded out, advancing both runners a base.


Morgan VandenBranden then ripped a two-RBI double to plate Finlan and Montie.
