Artistic variety abounds in Analog

Artists from across Northeast Wisconsin had an opportunity to showcase their non-digital work last Saturday, April 20, at Create With SAGE's most recent one-night-only exhibit, Analog.

The exhibit included works of all different mediums and themes completed by sixteen individual artists.

Some artists featured, such as Sam Rowe, the artist behind Samsconsin Art, were inspired by popular culture.

"My piece ("Barbie Swirl") I made last summer at the height of the Barbie movie craze," Rowe said. "I saw the movie and I thought it was super good — a really interesting perspective on women being expected to behave a certain way. I took the Barbie colors of my youth — the Barbie pink and teal — and blended them together. And there's some emotion behind it, some eyes kind of always looking at you when you're a woman in the world."

Other artists, such as Marcia Dalton in her piece "Breeze," drew inspiration from nature.

"Before we moved here, we lived in Illinois and it was very flat," Dalton said. "We had a big window and I could see fields and it just



inspired me — looking out the window and seeing the fields. I just started with putting my texture layer on and I went from there."

Rowe and Dalton said they hope the different inspirations behind each piece in the exhibit and the different artistic styles represented in Analog served as a reminder


to viewers that art can take many forms and that anyone can produce art.

"I think anybody can do art," Rowe said. "I think that anybody can tap into the creativity that is all around us with inspiration and nature. Just seeing the variety here and how different art is and how it's really whatever

you want to make it, I hope people go home and try to do something creative."

While anybody can do art, access to





spaces and opportunities to display that art and view the artistic contributions of other artists is not always easy to come by, but shows like Analog at Create With SAGE are working towards correcting that.

"It makes it so much more accessible," Rowe said. "Wisconsin is ranked really poorly

submit your work. It's super important to encourage people to do something that doesn't make very much money in the first place in a place like this."

"It's nice to have this place that gives us a voice," Dalton said. "I call it the people's gallery, really, because it's for everybody."

Magic of Learning at Martin Elementary

Students at Green Bay's Martin Elementary got the chance to see art in action last week, as muralist Greg Preslicka was on-site painting a new mural, titled Magic of Learning, in their library.

After the construction of Martin Elementary's library as part of the Green Bay Area Public School District's 2017 referendum, the walls of the new space have sat empty while Library Media Specialist Jennifer Georgia searched for just the right way to bring art in.

"I didn't want to make any drastic changes right off the bat, but I knew I

wanted to bring in a muralist," Georgia said. "I knew I wanted a mural. So I was searching for information and I came across Greg (Preslicka). I loved his work. I just loved how every time you look at it, you see something new."

That was about two years ago, Georgia said, and after finding funding for the project through the PTO, school district and multiple fundraisers, the design process for the mural began.

"I had given the teachers some information and I wanted them to talk to their students because I wanted the mural to come from them," Georgia said. "What do they love about Martin? What do they look forward to doing? Where is their learning?

All those sorts of things. And so we got a lot of ideas from the kids and I gave Greg a big list of information and the things the kids came up with that they love and look forward to. He was able to then present us with three different design options and we worked with one and tweaked it up a little bit and this is what we have."


The final design features many details unique to the experiences of students at Martin Elementary — their mustang mascot, basketball team, pumpkin picking field trip, music concerts, bowling for gym class, a cheese hat-wearing Packers fan and even therapy dog Oliver who students have had the opportunity to read with in the library.


While the mural will be enjoyed by students in the library for a long time to come, Preslicka said a large component of his process as a muralist, especially when working on a mural in a school, is for people to be able to see the process of creating the mural, which took place over about four days at Martin Elementary.

"I love being in schools because a lot of art that kids see is art that's already hanging on the wall and it's done and complete," he said. "Murals are a public form of art, so part of that is as it's being done, people can see it. It's great for the kids to see art kind of happen rather than just be done."






Green Bay East, Preble, Pulaski and Bay Port spring shows this weekend

There will be no shortage of opportunities to catch a play or musical this weekend as Green Bay East, Preble, Pulaski and Bay Port students are preparing to open their spring productions.

Bay Port will present The Wizard of Oz with performances at 7 p.m. on April 25, 26, 27, May 2 and 3 at 7 p.m. and May 4 at 2 p.m.; Pulaski will take Holder Posey, the Felonious Photographer to the stage on April 26 and 27 at 7 p.m.; East's production of Radium Girls will run April 26 and 27 at 7 p.m.; and Preble students will perform in The Laramie Project April 26 and 27 at 7 p.m.

The Wizard of Oz

Many are likely to be familiar with Bay Port's spring musical, but what many may not know is that this isn't the first time director Jaclyn Beattie and students have prepared to put on The Wizard of Oz.

"We were actually set to do The Wizard of Oz right when COVID hit," she said. "COVID hit in March and we were set to perform in April — we were a month and a half away — so we couldn't do it. It was always a dream of mine to do the show because it was one of my favorites when I was a little girl... Even though the same kids aren't in it, it's still such a great show so we decided to bring it back and do it."

Doing a show that is so beloved by many like herself, Beattie said, can be a difficult obstacle to navigate.

"You feel like you have to do it justice, and it's a weird line you have to walk," she said. "How much of it do we try to keep like the movie — the thing that everybody knows — and how much do we try to do our own thing with it and put our own spin on it? That's definitely a challenge."

It's a challenge students said they've had to learn to navigate as they find the balance between adhering to the original production and making their characters their own.

'When memorizing lines, so many of them are exactly as they are in the movie and they're so iconic that I don't want to mess them up or say them slightly different that people would be like, 'Oh, that's wrong," said Morgan Behrend, who plays

"How much room do you have to kind of put your own spin on it? Where's the line where people are going to start getting angry because it's not enough like the movie? How different you can make it is kind of an interesting challenge," said Elliott Peot, who plays the Scarecrow.

Beattie said the students involved stepped up to the challenge, though, and she hopes their effort is evident to

'They put in so many hours and so much work on this, and they are going to do such a great job of telling the story that I think people are going to walk out going, 'Wow," she said. "These kids blow me away every single day."

Behrend and Peot said they hope that audiences recognize the work that's gone into the show, but also that they see how much fun they and the rest of the cast have had throughout the process.

"I hope they realize how much work

we've put into it," Behrend said, "It's been a lot, but it's been worth it for sure."

"It's definitely a labor of love, but I hope it looks like we're all giving it our best and having fun up there," Peot said.

Holder Posey, the **Felonious Photographer**

Pulaski students are tackling a less wellknown show for this year's melodrama -Holder Posey, the Felonious Photographer.

True to the melodrama form, Holder Posey, the Felonious Photographer brings exaggerated characters and exciting events to the stage in the form of villains Holder Posey and Candide Cameron plotting a robbery in the little town of Holeinroad and heroes Drew Deline and Ida Claire Yawl there to thwart their attempt.

"The villain Holder Posey and his assistant have decided they're going to rob the vault of the Golden Spittoon Saloon, so under the guise of taking photos of everything and all these people, they're getting photos of the vault so they can figure out where to place the dynamite and all this stuff," Director Amy Tubbs said. "And then you've got just a bunch of kind of ridiculous characters... It's some of the stereotypical kind of characters, but it's all in great fun."

Great fun, Tubbs said, is what the melodrama is all about.

"There's just something fun about the melodrama," Tubbs said. "The plotlines are very similar — heroes, villains, etc. — but

what I like about it is the kids get to kind of overact and be ridiculous. In spring, we know that there's a lot of stress. We're finishing up the year and it's fun to just have some fun."

And that fun is felt and appreciated by the cast working on the show.

"It's so great, it's so much lighter in here," said Dahlia Maroszek, who plays Ida Claire Yawl. "The energy is up a lot higher because everyone's having fun the whole time. It's not like, 'Alright guys, this is a serious day and we're doing a serious scene.' There's not really a serious scene."

Adding to the fun, Tubbs said, are the variety acts performed between scenes, all of which were written by students in the

"The whole cast gets together and we brainstorm things that are in the same theme of the melodrama and then they create these variety acts and we put them up on stage," Tubbs said. "It's really cool come away just laughing really hard and

for them to write a skit and then see it performed."

"I'm going to get to see people act out a skit and I wrote it," said Talia Busche, who plays Candide Cameron and who wrote one of the acts which will be performed during the show. "That's so cool."

Tubbs said she hopes all who come see the show leave laughing at its goofy antics and appreciating the uplifting experience live theater can provide.

"I hope they just have a lot of fun," Tubbs said. "Some people have left the show and said, 'Oh, my stomach hurts because I was laughing so hard and it was so much fun.' I think it's just good to get out and see a live show and be participating, and I hope they

feeling good. It's not an experience that you can get in your phone or on your device. It's live theater. It's a different kind of energy."

Along with the humor of the show, Maroszek said she hopes audiences also see how much time and care the students have put into bringing the story of Holder Posey, the Felonious Photographer to Pulaski's stage.

"I hope they appreciate the humor behind it and the time it took," Maroszek said. "It's funny, but we're also here three days a week for at least two hours working and spending time outside of rehearsal to learn all of our lines. Then of course we hope they leave laughing and wanting to come back next year."

The Laramie Project

Preble High School is also tackling real-life events in their production of *The Laramie Project*, although these events take place in much more recent history.

The Laramie Project is a production put together by the Tectonic Theater Project and its founder Moisés Kaufman detailing what went on in the town of Laramie, Wyoming, leading up to and following the murder of Matthew Shepard, a 21-year-old college student who was beaten and left for dead, later succumbing to his injuries, for being gay.

Kaufman and his group traveled to Laramie after the murder and conducted interviews with more than 200 individuals, both directly related to the case and just regular citizens of Laramie, to create a play highlighting the extremes of both hatred and compassion that can coexist in any seemingly average community.

In picking this year's spring show, Director Michael Schuh said there were several contenders, but ultimately *The Laramie Project* was selected because of its ability to spark conversation about difficult topics.

"This is one of five shows we were looking at," Schuh said. "Last fall, there was a lot going on in our culture and around the world and I really felt it was time for us to look at doing Laramie. So that was a conversation I had with our administration and our superintendent for a good two to three months. We talked about what the purpose of the show would be and it really was to take a look at the concepts of intolerance and how intolerance could be weaponized in certain acts of violence and how that violence and trauma affects a community. We had fantastic conversations about that as we were taking a look at doing the show and that's why we settled on it. The thing about the Laramie project, even though it's about a story that happened over 20 years ago, is that it's still prevalent and relevant in 2024 because we're still dealing with a lot of these issues. That was the reasoning behind [doing the show] — to really start to talk about tolerance and about acceptance and the concept of hope as a means to bring a community together."

Alongside the challenging topics of hate and intolerance and the tragedy of Matthew Shepard's death, Schuh said the show features some more optimistic themes for audiences to consider as they learn about the aftermath of that event.

"When you take a look at the late '90s, this was one of the first hate crimes that gave attention to hate crimes legislation," Schuh said. "The two themes that the play talks about is hope — that any town or any place can survive if you have hope — and acceptance — that we have more in common than we don't have in common."

Tickets for Preble's production of *The Laramie Project* will be sold at the door on the nights of the performances.

Radium Girls

Green Bay East High School students are looking into the past while preparing for their upcoming production of *Radium Girls*, a play following the story of the young women who were exposed to dangerous levels of radiation while working with radium as face-dial painters, ultimately laying the groundwork for the creation of the Occupational Health and Safety Act (OSHA) that still exists today.

"I picked this show because we had done comedies in the past and this is something that, in addition to being an interesting story, can bring information about this situation to the public..." said Director Scott Willems. "It's not a funny show, but [the students] really like the heft of it.

Danny Kyme, who plays multiple roles in the show, said the play definitely takes on a different tone than what most people might think of when they think about theater.

"It's more of a subtle show," he said. "It's not very 'wizards and dragons' like most plays. It's kind of grim."

Taking on such a different kind of production required cast members to think differently about how they portrayed their characters and the events that transpire in the play.

"You definitely have to take it a little bit more tenderly because you're portraying real people and real events that happened," in Radium Girls, a play following the stories of the women who worked with radium as face-dial painters.

said Liam Renquin, who plays Arthur Roeder, president of U.S. Radium. "You want to make sure you treat it with the amount of respect it's due because it was such a big event at the time and it really carries over to a lot of things we see today."

Greta Gartzke, who plays the role of Grace Fryer. said she hopes her and other cast members' careful treatment in how they portray the historical events and issues covered in the show help audiences to see "the story of injustice that takes place."

"Grace is kind of the focus of the narrative. Her and her friends, after discovering they're contracting all these strange diseases and realizing it might be tied to their work, go to court and sue American Radium," Gartzke said. "It took years and years and at the end they reached a settlement, but justice was never served... I hope [the audience] enjoys it and I hope they have fun, but also I hope we're able to portray it well because these are real people. We're not just doing make-believe."
