# Where everybody knows your name

Celebrating the third annual Heroes Club Reunion

**Although the Heroes Club** has not been open in more than 15 years, the spirit of the establishment is alive and well as its regulars prepare for the third annual Heroes Club Reunion, scheduled to take place at the Blue Collar Bar and Grill next Sunday, May 19.

The Heroes Club was a tavern and premier live blues music venue at its 401 South Washington St. location in Green Bay from 1989 until 2006, when owner/operator Pat Coniff sold the property.

In 2022, seven years after Coniff passed away, former Heroes Club bartenders Skinny Skenandore and Kurt Munchoff led the charge in getting the bar's regulars back together and keep the spirit of the blues music the Heroes Club was known for alive.

"The Heroes Club had a sizable contingent of regulars," said Pat's wife Barbara Coniff. "If you remember the television show *Cheers*, there were quite a few people who were regulars and loyal to the Heroes Club — patrons who were in there often and formed fast friendships. That was part of the magic of the place... When the bar closed, they didn't see each other like they used to... One of the long-time regulars passed away and of course many of the people had seen the obituary and came to pay their respects to the widow. The widow had maintained friendships with a couple of the bartenders and their families and they were sitting around talking and she said, 'Gee, it's nice to see those people, but it would be nice to see them again at something other than a funeral."

And the bar's other regulars agreed.

"It was an overwhelming success," Coniff said. "There were hundreds of people there. Looking around, we all noticed that we had the same sparkle in our eyes and the same smiles. We may be a little grayer and we may have put on a few pounds or lost a few pounds, but all in all there was such a good feeling that people came together again... There was something about the vibe of the people, the music, the spirit of Heroes Club and my late Husband that just made it really cool. And so we did another one last year and now we are doing one again this year."

"It's very, very heartwarming," Coniff said. "Pat was charismatic. He lit up a room. He really had a way of making people feel welcome. He was the catalyst for what happened at Heroes — the music, the friendships, the great staff, the customers that kept coming back. He was the catalyst, but it really was all about them. And seeing them all reconnecting, enjoying each other's company and appreciating live music in the way that we did it back then

at Heroes Club, it's truly an awesome experience to know that something that started in 1989 still lives on in the hearts of so many people today."

While it may be former Heroes Club patrons and staff that got the reunion events going, Coniff said all are welcome and invited to attend next weekend's event, which will feature a performance by Big Mouth and the Power Tool Horns.

"People can come and gather and just appreciate the music, dance, see their friends, enjoy the hospitality of the Blue Collar in the way that they enjoyed the hospitality of Heroes Club," she said. "Big Mouth is very popular and I'm sure some of their own fans who maybe don't remember Heroes or maybe weren't going to bars yet will be there as well. It's really fun for people to appreciate that kind of camaraderie. It's about the music. It's about the people. It's about the experience."

The Heroes Club Reunion will start at 11 a.m. on Sunday, May 19, at the Blue Collar Bar and Grill. Big Mouth will perform from 1-4 p.m.

# Shining a light on UW-Green Bay artists



Jen Egeland, whose work is also featured on the cover of this week's City Pages, designs and constructs lamps as a tribute to her late grandfather. "He made lamps, so I kind of took what he did for my whole childhood and just kept doing it," she said. "But he made them mostly of wood and I took cans and stuff like that and made them out of found objects." While she was fairly confident in her commitment to art coming into UW-Green Bay, Egeland said her professors encouraged her to question and challenge how she viewed art and how she viewed herself as an artist. "I came here with the intention of doing art, so I think I was already headstrong on doing it," she said. "My professors have really changed my perception of art in general."

A closed campus gallery didn't stand in the way of this year's UW-Green Bay Studio Arts and Design graduates carrying on with their annual senior exhibition, held this year at The Art Garage.

The exhibition offers an opportunity for graduating seniors to display the skills they

have mastered and work they have created during their time at UW-Green Bay.

Cristian Anderson, UW-Green Bay alumni and curator of this year's exhibition, said the senior exhibition also represents much more than just skills learned or art produced.

"I think that the seniors and especially this group, they way they constructed things from lamps to photography to lamps to ceramic pieces to medieval weaponry, these are artists that are invested in their craft," he said. "And I think that, as artists, it is their position to make sure that they continue to share their work to tell stories, to ask questions and to do things that aren't normally done... I think that these artists are extremely bold with some of the work

I sincerely applaud them for it. The sky's the limit, right? I think that sometimes a senior exhibition could be looked at as a capstone of four years in college, but I also think it's the impetus to go out and do something. Whether that's in the arts or not, it's saying, 'I did something. I showed my work. I'm proud of my work."



**Jessica Egan's** artwork combines photography and text to examine the influence of past and present relationships. "My artwork on display is talking about relationships that I've gone through and that I've experienced, whether they're still current or I've lost them, and the effect that they've had on me," she said. Looking at the show and seeing what UW-Green Bay students have created,


Egan said she hopes people develop an appreciation for all mediums of art. "The arts is a very multi-faceted world that needs not just painting and drawing," she said. "It's not just the traditional sense of all the masters that people study."



Madyn Stevens' artwork comes from a world of their own creation to explore issues within the fantasy genre. "I kind of use art to explore a lot of fantasy concepts and things, but the main one I'm focusing on is what's commonly referred to as fantasy racism," they said. "It's a tendency to take entire groups of people and just stereotype them and have that be true." Stevens said it was not only art classes at UW-Green Bay that helped them develop as an artist, but the opportunity to take other classes such as game writing as well. "UW-Green Bay has given me the opportunity to have a lot of different things, so I've taken topics in game writing and worked for the Center for Games and Interactive Media, and my knowledge I've gained there I've been able to combine with my art. It has been really nice and actually cool to have all those options."



Rae Klein's work involves a mix of media to explore complex topics. "I'm working with dealing with grief and living with someone with dementia and kind of just dealing with that grief and forced femininity roles in my family and the emotions and feelings relating to that," they said. Klein said the people at UW-Green Bay and close relationships they were able to form helped them to grow as an artist. "I gained a lot of confidence through my education with amazing professors, wonderful peers and just a great art community within the university. It's very close-knit and really helps people as artists."



**Beau Sandvig's** art, both digital and otherwise, is inspired by his dreams. "I based if off of very intensive dreams that I often get," he said. "They had a lot of research behind them with specific figures or actions that I took or that happened in the dreams that were inspiring or motivational to me. There were a lot of important themes represented in my dreams that reflect in my personal life." Sandvig said the professors at UW-Green Bay and the expertise they offer has been hugely influential on his and other students' growth as artists. "All the professors in the Green Bay area and their extensive history in their own artwork is such a huge inspiration to my own artwork and enhancing my own skills along with their understanding of how you can make yourself a better artist and the steps that you need to take outside of college to enhance yourself and your own abilities in a real-life setting," he said.



**Cainen Shooter** uses photography to explore his relationship with Native American art. "I started photographing my stepdad's hunting dogs, and I drew the metaphor of dogs on a chain to Native Americans on a reservation..." he said. "So that's what the main inspiration behind the work was — the act of hunting, traditional practice and nontraditional practices... Before [my professors] and before their support to explore the culture, I wasn't necessarily sure what Native American art meant to me and I didn't know how to practice, so that definitely hugely impacted my experience as an artist."



**Boggart Treu** creates art by taking familiar objects and transforming them into something unexpected. "The main body of the work I have here is my series of tools and weapon forms. I've always been super interested in tools and implements and gadgets and that sort of deal..." Treu said. "You look at some of these and you're like 'That's a hammer, but wait a minute.' The second guessing of a familiar form you don't recognize right away but then you look at it a little closer and you think about it more and then it clicks. It's just kind of playing with the changing of familiar things and shapes and seeing what I can do with them while maintaining functionality." Treu said the art program at UW-Green Bay has been a very influential experience. "It's been hugely transformative. When I first came to UW-Green Bay, I was thinking I was going to be a psychology major. I took a ceramics class just because that's what I was good at in high school... And then I took a sculpture class just because I needed to get my credits and pick a certain number of studio classes..." Treu said. "And here I am five years later as a sculpture-focused art major. If I think about it, if I wouldn't have ever taken sculpture, I would have never gotten into welding and I would not be even close to where I am today."



Kaitlin Wieberdink's artwork is done primarily with ceramics and textiles in order to "explore my relationship with my own femininity and how that was formed by the church and how I've since grown from that." Her time at UW-Green Bay, Wieberdink said, prepared her to be a confident artist as she looks towards her next chapter in life. "It gave me a lot more confidence going into my art degree," she said. "I was really unsure if this was what I was supposed to be doing, but after working with really great peers and professors, it really gave me the confidence to go into graduation thinking 'I can do this' and 'I'm ready for this.""



Mailonie Johnson's work is comprised of a mix of mediums, including photography, textiles and even hair. "The work I have on the walls is just a mix of what I've been building on with my photographs, 3D media and mixed media," she said. "A big focus is hair, obviously, throughout my work and discussing the taboos of that along with its connections to women." Coming into UW-Green Bay, Johnson initially intended to follow a different path "I originally was doing a totally different major in biology so I was kind of late to the game in going into art for my college. [My professors] were my big influences in breaking me out of my shell and just being able to mix media together where I used to think that you could kind of only stick to one thing."



**Gwen Moffett** uses photography to dive into her relationships with family and familiar spaces. "This is an exploration of my familial connections and how that kind of relates to the spaces I grew up in — my home, my grandparents home — and the memories it kind of encapsulates," she said. "I'm also a twin, so that kind of plays in with the familial relationships and how that relationship compares to others with my friends." Moffett said her time at UW-Green Bay helped her discover her artistic style. "When I first came to Green Bay, I wasn't exactly sure that I wanted to do art and I feel like being immersed in the space and the people here really helped me explore who I am and what medium I wanted to pursue."




