Apple hunter finds new specimen

Rediscovering heritage trees

COUNTY – Waupaca County's apple tree historian is close to a second big discovery.

In 2016, Henry Jacobson discovered a Ratzburg, an apple tree near Fremont that was over 170 years old and 40 feet tall.

On the website, Pomiferous, the world's most extensive apple database, the Ratzburg is described as "an obscure apple that was believed to have disappeared."

Finding a Ratzburg in Waupaca County was a big deal in the world of apple growers and Jacobson helped distribute it to other apple growers through the North American Fruit Explorers, a group he belongs to.

Now Jacobson is on the cusp of finding another lost-to-history heirloom apple tree.

Making the match

"I may have re-discovered another Waupaca County variety. I'm sending DNA of leaf samples out to Washington in the next couple weeks to double check. You never really know with old

trees but a lot of times all these characteristics match up and the DNA test comes back as no positive matches with any of the thousands of apples in the database, so then there is a re-discovery right there," said Jacobsen

who is holding back the name of the variety until he is 100 percent sure.

The skin characteristics match a description of the apple from a catalogue from

Citywide trash collection discussed

New London seeks input

NEW LONDON – The New London Public Works Committee is developing a survey of residents to gauge their interest in the city possibly moving to a citywide garbage collection service.

Information about collection contracts were discussed by the committee when it met May 6.

Director of Public Works Robert Garske told the committee that he has received information from several communities as to how they handle a citywide garbage contract. He said most of the communities with contracts have them for five years. In those contracts, there is usually a step progression for a cost increase each year.

"So, everybody would know where they'd be at every year going forward during that contract time,"

Garske said.

Since the communities who supplied information have had citywide garbage contracts for a while, Garske said he didn't receive much information about the transition from residents handling their own garbage to a citywide system.

Public Works Committee Chair John Hass said New London residents are currently paying around \$21 per month for private garbage and recycling collection. This would equate to around \$252 per year.

Garske said most of the citywide contracts ranged from \$133 to as high as \$195 per year.

A possible lower monthly rate for a citywide service would be an advantage, he said, but it's not guaranteed.

Lower cost not guaranteed

The city would also need to consider the residents who want to take care of disposing of their own garbage, Garske said.

All but one of the communities who supplied information assessed the cost of the citywide collection to residents' property tax bills.

"It was on your tax bill at the end of the year, and you didn't have a chance to optout from that program," Garske said. "If you lived in that community, that was your garbage service, and that was your cost."

Based on the numbers provided by Garske, committee member BaLynda Croy said she would save \$80 under a citywide system.

"I just know from experience that there are a lot of residents out there that don't have garbage (collection)," Croy said. "It's reflected in their yard. And it's reflected in what they're putting in their recycling bin. So, with that being said, I kind of feel that this is something we need more public input on. What do the residents of New London want?"

Mayor Mark Herter said

based on conversations he has had with city residents, the split is about 50-50 between those who have private garbage collection and those who don't. He said some residents share garbage canisters, while some business owners take their personal garbage and mix it with their business garbage.

"Personally, I want to deal with my own garbage. It's not the city's job," Herter said. "That's my personal thought."

Hass said it would be nice to be able to negotiate a cost for everybody without making the citywide garbage collection mandatory for everyone.

Survey recommended

Herter read an email he received from a New London resident. The email said residents should have the choice of having the garbage collection bill on

Towns double down against big wakes

Ordinance moves forward

WAUPACA – In a joint meeting at the Dayton Town Hall on May 7, the town boards of Dayton and Farmington hashed out the remaining details to pass an ordinance that would prohibit enhanced wakes on shared bodies of waters in their townships.

The board members agreed to exclude Spencer Lake in the ordinance as that body of water is shared with the town of Lind.

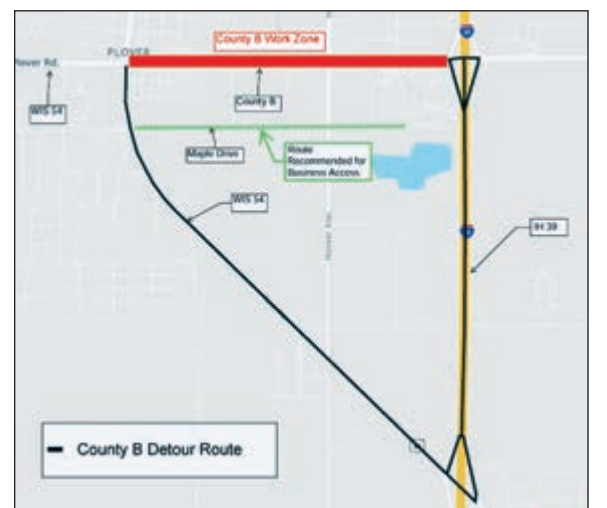
Like the situation with

Farmington and Dayton sharing the same bodies of water, Dayton and Lind will have to go through the same process at later date for adopting a co-ordinance on Spencer Lake.

The new draft ordinance will prohibit enhanced wakes on Rainbow, Round, Columbia, Long and Stratton Lakes. Also they changed the ordinance so not only the sheriff's water patrol can enforce the ordinance but any Wisconsin law enforcement officer can write a ticket for making big waves.

County Trunk B closures in Plover

PLOVER – Traffic patterns will be changing as part of the County Trunk B road improvement project in the village of Plover starting Thursday, May 16.

The next phase will include the full closure of the County B westbound lanes from Hoover Avenue to Interstate 39 while reopening the eastbound lanes in that area to one lane.

Drivers heading westbound from Interstate 39 will need to use the detour route that follows Interstate 39 and State Highway 54. County B west of Hoover Avenue will remain open to one lane in each direction during this phase.

Hoover Avenue intersection will also remain open for this phase and may be used to access businesses in the area as well as Maple Drive.

Work for the project will consist of a rural-to-urban reconstruction of County B from Wisconsin Avenue to Hoover Avenue and urban pavement replacement of County B from Hoover Avenue to the Interstate 39 ramps.

The project includes replacement of the deteriorated concrete pavement, widening the pavement median, new curb and gutter or asphalt shoulders, new concrete sidewalk, asphalt multi-use path, and a signalized intersection at Mecca Drive.

Funding was made available through the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Surface Transportation Program-Urban which provides up to 80% state and federal

the 1900s. It also matches up with descriptions from the proceedings of horticultural clubs in Waupaca County. The sweet flavor matches and it also keeps for a long-time, another unique feature of the apple.

“I grafted about ten trees from it this spring. This apple tree wasn't planted on the original farm of where it originated but it's only a half a mile down the road from where it was originally planted. So you take all those key favors and put them together and make a good case for re-discovery. That's what I did with the Ratzburg. Everything matched with the description, the size, the location, the flavor.

He has a list of 89 Waupaca County varieties that are named that he compiled from multiple sources, including old nursery catalogs from a collection at UW-Stevens Point.

Jacobson cited some stories of apple hunters out west who believed they discovered a new variety of apple tree but after DNA

testing, it matched up with an obscure apple tree that was cultivated in the eastern U.S.

“They really thought these were long-lost apples but that's just the name of the game with some of the stuff that doesn't have records,” he said.

Apple-hunting afield

Over the past four years he's accompanied a professor from UW-Oshkosh to the Keweenaw Peninsula in Michigan's Upper Peninsula to explore ghost towns where miners planted apple trees as they lived and worked at now-abandoned mines. Some places still have a few old buildings left and they get permission to explore the properties. “We go up there in the fall and we tag apples that we through would be worthy of trial in an orchard—or good for cider. I graft them,” said Jacobson.

Jacobson is a bicyclist and he uses it as a vehicle for seeking new apples. “Of course, with the apple hunter in me, I'll see an apple by the side of the road, I'll stop and quick look for cars and

run into the ditch and grab apple, see if it's good or not and mark it on the map,” he said.

Not all finds are a rare variety and not are all great apples. He must determine if the tree was grafted or a wild seedling. If it was grafted, then it was from a variety that a person deemed valuable enough to propagate. If it is a wild seedling, then it is a long-odds genetic craps shoot that the apple will be tasty enough for eating, cider making or even baking.

Jacobson looks for a graft union that looks like a bump on its trunk. “You get to know the varieties they planted in back in the day. If this apple is the same as the last apple, and they are both 100-year-old trees, then they are both definitely grafted. But a seedling on the roadside, like a ten-year-old apple tree with 20 apples on it in a ditch, somebody threw it [an apple core] out the car window and it grew up and then that's its own unique variety,” he said.

Orchard hunting

Jacobson is a Hortonville High School graduate and

now lives in Appleton and works at Pierce Manufacturing. He earned a horticultural degree from Fox Valley Technical College and in 2020, he bought 18 acres of land south of Iola. His plan was to build a house there, start a family and grow apple trees. He planted 270 apple trees and 85 were heirloom varieties.

He didn't like the idea of commuting two hours to work every day so he sold the land. “It was sad to see it go but I feel good about the decision,” he said.

He left behind some of the trees that were too big to transplant and moved the others to nursery beds at his parent's place in New London. Now he is looking for a small acreage to plant the trees but he said the real estate market was tough. He was recently out-bid on a property from a buyer that came out of nowhere.

“I just want to have an orchard and grow really old apple trees, try some new ones out and spread the word about heirloom apples because honestly—they are so good,” said Jacobson.

On behalf of a question from a constituent, Dayton Supervisor Brett Grams asked for clarification about teaching a beginner to water-ski and it was explained that all forms and techniques of waterskiing would be unaffected by the ordinance.

The verbiage was approved with a unanimous vote and both townships agreed to submit the amended draft for DNR review the next day. They expect the DNR to approve the language of the draft and they have 20 days to respond.

The boards decided to host a joint public hearing

instead of separate ones.

“Then everybody has to come and hear it twice. As long as our ordinances are the same, they only need to hear it once,” said Farmington Supervisor Phil Durrant. The boards picked 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 19 for a joint public hearing to be held at the Dayton Town Hall. The earliest the townships could enact the ordinance would be from early to mid-July after a vote by each town board.

Also this week, a conservation group published “The Effects of Wake Boats on Lake Ecosystem Health: A Literature Review.”

Wisconsin's Green Fire, a nonpartisan nonprofit dedicated to science-based management of natural resources, produced the report.

The report is a compilation from more than 200 scientific studies that list the negative effects from wake boat use in lakes that include spreading aquatic invasive species, more shoreline erosion, harming aquatic plants, churning up sediments and worsening bird and fish habitat. The report does not address recreational impact or public safety.

Medals in pickleball

WAUPACA – Pat Annen won a bronze medal at the U.S. Open Pickleball Championships in Naples, FL.

The tournament was held April 13-20 and drew 3,800 competitors. It was her first-ever sanctioned tournament and she started playing pickleball five years ago.

During the spring, summer and fall, she plays at the Waupaca Recreation Center.

During the winter months, Annen and her husband head to Sarasota and the community there has an active pickleball scene with 18 courts. Many of them are refurbished tennis courts as pickleball has exploded in popularity across the country.

Annen competed in the senior division against 16 teams with her partner Karol Maas from Oshkosh. Maas also happens to spend her winters down in Florida and the two central Wisconsinites met by chance and partnered up for the tournament.

“It was a very long day. We started playing at 7:45

and we finished around three in the afternoon. Some games last around 15 minutes and they play the best two out of three games. The winners must win by two. One match – a series of three games – lasted an hour and a half. We beat them

but it was a lengthy battle. By the time we finished playing, the temperature on the court was 90 degrees. It was brutal but super fun. We’d do it again in a heartbeat,” said Annen.

The game is played with a paddle. Annen uses a

carbon model and other than the cost of the paddle and some sneakers, it’s a relatively inexpensive game. The balls are similar to small whiffle balls and they sometimes crack and need to be replaced.

Annen played basketball, volleyball and track in high school and played basketball at UW-Green Bay.

“I would say pickleball is like a lot of different sports. I would play softball and play golf and a lot of the motions are conducive. Anything ball related really works well with pickleball. It’s a little bit easier on the body. The court size is a little bit smaller. The game tends to be quicker and has more skill involved and it’s a ton of fun,” she said.

Annen isn’t sure if she will compete in the U.S. Open again although she would like to. The tournament is set up as a lottery to maximize the chances for many people to play. The players submit their names and applications and wait for an answer if they are invited or not.

Her next competition will be in the mixed doubles category at the Beer City Open in Grand Rapids, Michigan, on July 7.

Clintonville to borrow \$4.7 million for CIP

Promissory notes approved

CLINTONVILLE – The Clintonville Common Council approved the sale of \$4.7 million in general obligation (GO) promissory notes.

The funds will be used for items in the city's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).

Council approved the borrowing at its April 9 meeting.

The council was expected to award the sale of the bonds at its May 14 meeting.

The council had previously approved borrowing funds via GO bonds, but did not go through with borrowing the funds at that time because of legislative changes to GO promissory notes.

Ehlers, the city's financial advisor, recommended against borrowing at that time because of the changes.

At the April 9 meeting, Harry Allen with Ehlers, told the council that the legislative changes allow for general obligation (GO) promissory notes to be extended from a 10-year term to a 20-year term.

Previously, if the city wanted to borrow for a 20-year term, it had to borrow by selling GO bonds, which have different regulations and controls.

He said GO bonds have to be issued for certain types of projects, while GO notes allow the city to borrow for anything that needs to be paid for over the course of more than a year.

"Having the flexibility to go out to that 20-year term is a more flexible type of GO borrowing that is really a big advantage for the city," Allen said.

The GO notes also allow the city to reallocate the borrowing proceeds at any point in the future, Allen said.

"Whereas with GO bonds, you're really locking into, if you borrow money for streets, you can only use that money for streets," Allen said.

He added, "This is a really significant advantage, and I'm glad that we've waited to take advantage of this legislative change."

The borrowing will be for the full 20-year term. The repayment of the debt

will be structured around the existing debt service of the city.

A call feature will also be included, Allen said. This means the city would be allowed to prepay the debt, or refund the debt should there be a change in interest rates in about nine years from now.

With the borrowing of funds, the city will go through the rating process. Allen said the city is currently rated by S&P at an A+ rating.

The intent of the borrowing is to fund around \$4.6 million in projects between 2024 and 2026.

"We did remove the utility portions of those road projects within that window," Allen said.

Those projects will be funded elsewhere, he said.

Costs

Allen said there will be issuance expenses, as well as a fee for bond counsel.

A fee is also included to update the S&P rating.

There will also be an underwriting fee.

Repayment

Allen reiterated to the council that the repayment would be structured around the city's current debt.

"You can get creative when you issue debt," Allen said. "You really set the structure at the time of issuance so you can create that structure to achieve whatever goal there is in your community."

Allen said the city can take out future debt without having a large spike in the tax levy for it. The debt service for the issuance of debt will be around \$220,000 to \$250,000 for the first four years because the city's existing debt is higher at that point. It would remain flat for the first four years so the city can start building borrowing capacity for future issuances of debt.

GO debt limit

Allen told the council that it needs to be aware of the amount of the city's GO debt limit the city is utilizing. He said the state recommends that municipalities only have 5% of their total equalized value. That's the amount of GO debt principal that can be outstanding.

At the end of 2023, the city was utilizing 32% of that limit. After the pro-

posed debt issuance, the city would be utilizing 55% of that limit at the end of 2024.

With no borrowing in the next couple of years, the city would be utilizing 40% of the limit in 2026, and back down to 33% in 2027.

"Generally, we recommend probably under 70%, but if you go above 70%, you constrain yourself for the future," Allen said. "But anywhere around 50% is really normal and healthy."

Long-term

From 2024-30, Allen said the city's CIP has the potential to require borrowing of \$16 million.

"It's hard to maintain a level debt service levy when you're funding this amount for projects," Allen said. "But we can get creative in other areas, such as some TID closures or revaluation."

He added that the city would project holding the debt service levy flat for about seven years, until another borrowing issuance takes place in 2030. This would impact the 2031 levy.

Allen said projected future borrowing by the city would put its GO debt capacity limit at 82% in 2030, which would be high. Then, when the next borrowing would take place in 2033, the city would be at around 66% of its limit.

"That would be elevated from where you are now," Allen said. "So, that's important to keep in mind for the future."

Looking back 150 over years

St. Martin's sesquicentennial

CLINTONVILLE – In 1863, a young Lutheran pastor, Rev. P. H. Dicke, Shawano was assigned by the Missouri Synod, to do missionary work in the towns of Larrabee and Bear Creek.

He served the area until 1872, when J. H. Lauirtzen of New London took over the duties.

Many of the pioneers who were clearing the land were Lutheran. By 1874 they thought they had enough members to form a congregation. They organized St. Martin congregation on Oct. 19, 1874.

The 10 known charter members were August Wenzel, Carl Essmann, Fred Pingel, William Gensler, Adam Volkman, John Meisner, Ferdinand Gast, John Kautz, August Kratzke and John Pingel.

In 1875, the congregation built its first church in the area where the present school parking lot is located. The land was donated with the provision that the building must be at least 24 feet high.

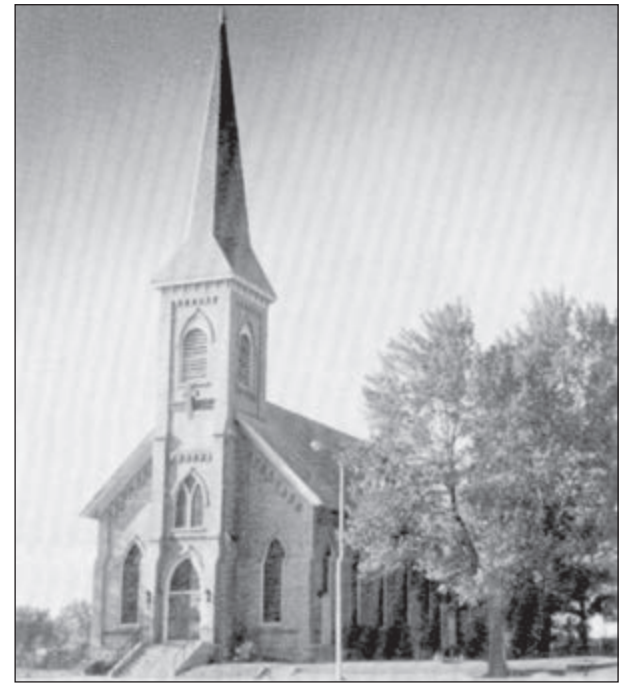
A year later a parochial school was started. Church services were held on the lower level and classes were held on the upper level with the pastor as the teacher.

The building was later moved to 119 Eighth Street where it still stands after being converted into an apartment building.

Growing congregation

By 1887, the congregation had grown considerably and they voted in May to build a new church.

The new church was to be located where the present church stands. The plans called for a building to be 40-by-76

feet, 24 feet tall, with a steeple 120 feet tall. There were to be two bells.

Members of the congregation provided much of the labor. Members who could not provide labor were to pay \$1 a day to keep the cost down to about \$7,000.

A parsonage was built shortly after and was located next to the church on the west side.

After the new church was built, the old church building continued to serve as a one-room school and later as a two-room school.

By 1914-15 the congregation had grown and the school was over-crowded. The decision was made to build a new school. Property on Eighth and Hemlock Streets was acquired.

The new school was completed in 1916. It had four classrooms, large assembly hall, and a full basement. The cost was \$20,000.

In 1952 the school was remodeled and an extension was made along with classrooms, gymnasium, heating plant, library and stage. A

modern kitchen was added. The congregation continued to grow and flourish. There had been several remodeling, redecoration and improvement projects but members soon saw the need for a new church.

New church built

In April 1967, the church that had served the congregation for 77 years was razed along with the parsonage next door and construction of a new church began the next month. In September 1968, a dedication service was held.

Library screens 'Hallowed Grounds'

NEW LONDON – The New London Public Library will screen "Hallowed Grounds" at 1 p.m. Wednesday, May 22.

This PBS documentary visits 22 American military cemeteries in eight countries, memorializing those who were not brought back to the United States after World War I and World War II.

These cemeteries, created and maintained by the U.S. government through the American Battle Monuments Commission, are

permanent memorial sites. Collectively they contain the remains of 125,000 Americans. There are 94,000 more names commemorated on Walls of the Missing.

Dignified and serene, they were created to honor America's fallen, but they are also intended to inspire and teach the living.

Most of the cemeteries are located on or near major battlefields. The narrative provides a general history of the wars and brief-

ly recounts the battles and operations that took place in the areas where the cemeteries are located.

Among the fallen profiled in the show are poet Joyce Kilmer, bandleader Glenn Miller, the five Sullivan Brothers and Gen. George S. Patton. But most were ordinary men and women caught up in the calamity of war.

Following the one-hour documentary, the library will host a Remembering Our Veterans craft project.

Memorial Day in Iola-Scandinavia

IOLA – Memorial Day ceremonies will be held in Scandinavia at 10 a.m. Monday, May 27, at the Old Bridge on the north side of Scandinavia, west of the Village Park.

The commemoration then moves to the Scandinavia Cemetery where a second ceremony will take place.

Ceremonies then move to Iola, starting with the Memorial Day parade at 11 a.m., followed by ceremonies at the Veterans Memorial Park at 200 N. Main Street.

The commemoration will honor the thousands who sacrificed their lives during all wars dating back to the Civil War through today. The names of 25 fallen service members from Iola and Scandinavia will be read by Legionnaire Ed Staal. Their names and information are on the Gold Star Recipients Monument at the Park. The American Legion also honors veterans from Iola and Scandinavia who passed away the previous year. Forty local veterans' names were added to the Memoriam Monument this year, with their names being read by Legionnaire Ed Staal, a bell will sound after each name, honoring their memory.

Their names were also added to the Walk of Honor Monument, which honors those who have received one or more of the top 11 highest medals awarded by the Armed Forces from the Medal of Honor through the Purple Heart, and the Prisoner of War Medal.

A fourth panel to the Walk of Honor Monument has also been added this year.

This year, six veterans who have been awarded 13 of these medals, will be introduced and their names and information will be read by Legionnaire Lyle Mork.

Of the six Veterans being honored, five were added to the Walk of Honor Monument this year and one was originally placed on the monument when it was dedicated in 2019. Of the five new veterans added to the monument, two served in World War I and three served in Vietnam and will be honored

with their names and information engraved on the monument.

Richard Wilker grew up in Iola and currently lives in Creston, Iowa and served in the Vietnam War. Wilker was awarded the Bronze Star while serving in the U.S. Army in a combat theater, for Heroism and Meritorious Service.

Ole Aasterud and Thomas Swenson served in World War I and were both wounded in action and received the Purple Heart.

Aasterud served in the U. S. Army in Company G, 147th Infantry and was stationed in France. On Thursday, November 14, 1918, Aasterud was going up over the top of a hill, when a shell wounded him above the left knee, and was taken to the Base Hospital.

Swenson served in the U. S. Army and was stationed in France, when he was wounded in both legs and was taken to the Base Hospital in France.

Frank Akey of Iola, served in the Vietnam War and received the Bronze Star for outstanding Meritorious Service in connection with ground operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam and was one of the original honorees placed on the monument in 2019. Akey will be added to the monument under the Purple Heart and finally be awarded the Purple Heart, 50 years after being wounded in Vietnam.

Douglas Gjertson, originally from Iola, currently lives in Harker Heights, Texas, served in the Vietnam War as a helicopter pilot. He received the Legion of Merit Medal, and also the Distinguished Flying Cross Medal for heroism.

On April 15, 1971, while serving as aircraft commander of a Cobra AH-1G attack helicopter for providing cover fire for unarmed medical evacuation helicopters during an extraction mission during the night. Gjertson was also awarded the Bronze Star Medal. He served more than 30 years in the U.S. Army. His father Clarence Gjertson from Iola served in World War II

and was awarded the Bronze Star and is also on the Walk of Honor Monument.

Donald Dineen was one of the original honorees placed on the Walk of Honor Monument when it was dedicated in 2019, but could not attend because of the health of his wife Carol, who has since passed away.

Dineen, who currently lives in Fort Walton Beach, Florida, served 23 years in the U. S. Air Force as a Jet fighter pilot. In Vietnam, he was flying a World War II, Navy A-1 Sky Raider which is a single engine prop-plane. It flew much slower than the jets and could thus deliver more ordinance, more accurately, while remaining in the battle for up to five hours above the enemy, helping American ground troops.

Dineen received the Silver Star and four Distinguished Flying Cross medals and will also be honored.

Guest speaker is BJ Elliot Prior, who as a young stewardess transported troops in and out of Vietnam from 1969-1971. She was with Continental Airlines for 40 years and will speak about the Vietnam flights and the veterans and flying into war zones with the soldiers was an experience she will never forget.

She is also an author of a book about those Vietnam years named "Behind My Wings" reminding Vietnam veterans they are not forgotten, but are men and women of valor.

Richard Wilker, Frank Akey, Douglas Gjertson and Donald Dineen all plan to be in attendance on Memorial Day, Monday, May 27.

Following ceremonies at the Park, everyone one is invited to the pork roast lunch that is free for all veterans at the Iola Historical Society at 222 Depot St. The lunch is sponsored by the Iola Historical Society and the American Legion Sheveland-Taylor Post 14.

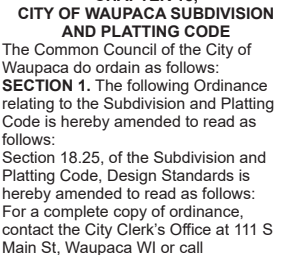

their property taxes. The resident recommended that the city create a survey, asking if residents want the cost on their tax bill. The resident also recommended that the city request competitive bidding for citywide garbage collection.

"But this has been a re-occurring thing on our agenda, and there's still nobody here that wants to talk about it," Herter said. "We get one person here, and one person there. So, I think it's up to everybody in this room to make a decision how we move forward with it."

New London City Administrator Chad Hoerth told the committee that

it must also consider the amount of time city staff will have to devote to implementing and maintaining a city-wide garbage collection system.

"We are strapped with staff time right now," Hoerth said. "This is going to be quite a bit. If we do an opt-out thing, we are going to be managing that. We have to manage who's getting charged what. We're going to get the phone calls if someone doesn't pick-up (the garbage of a resident)."

He added, "We need to bump, or factor in, administrative time into this cost. We can't do it just with what (staff) we currently have right now."

Committee member Dennis Herter said he doesn't think it's the city's responsibility to provide

citywide garbage collection.

"It's not the city's garbage, it's the residents' (garbage)," Dennis Herter said.

Hoerth said the city could place a QR code for a survey on the utility bill in order to gather input from residents. He said the cost to do that would be "pretty nominal."

Mayor Herter said at the very least, the city owes it to the residents to gather their input.

Croy agreed that the city should give residents the opportunity to fill out a survey.

"We just don't have enough information right now," Croy said.

Hoerth recommended the city create a draft survey and present that to the committee at its June meeting.
