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Lincoln County Supervisor Elizabeth McCrank Iaunches bid for 35th

Assembly District

Incumbent Representative Calvin Callahan seeking third term

FOR THE TOMAHAWK LEADER

NORTHERN WISCON-SIN – A member of the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors last week launched a campaign for the Wisconsin State Assembly.

On Monday, May 13, Merrill resident Elizabeth McCrank, who currently represents District 3 on the Lincoln County board, announced her candidacy for the 35th Assembly District, which encompasses all of Lincoln and Langlade Counties, as well as parts of Shawano, Oconto and Marathon Counties.

As of press time on Monday, May 20, McCrank was the only candidate set to run against incumbent Representative Calvin Callahan (R-Tomahawk), who last month announced that he will seek a third term.

A release from Mc-Crank's campaign said she "pledges to focus on real district problems and challenges, including rural population decrease, school and library support, comprehensive care needs of the youngest and oldest in our communities, the climate for entrepreneurs and people's right to make healthcare decisions for themselves."

As a Lincoln County Supervisor, McCrank has served on the Highway, Land Services, Social Services, Local Emergency Planning and Solid Waste Committees, as well as the T.B. Scott Free Library

Board of Trustees. She serves on the Historic Preservation Committee and the Enrichment Center Committee for the City of Merrill and is a member of the Merrill Historical Society, the Merrill Noon Optimists Club and the Lincoln County Sports Club.

McCrank's voting record as a Lincoln County Supervisor relating to the recently-sold Pine Crest Nursing Home in Merrill was highlighted in the release.

"McCrank twice supported a referendum on the status of Pine Crest Nursing Home, introducing a resolution tabled by Supervisor Calvin Callahan in May 2023, and then supported Supervisor Norbert Ashbeck's Aug. 15, 2023 resolution that died by a vote of 13-9," the release stated.

The release said Mc-Crank's "diverse private and public sector work experiences help her identify

and understand real-life issues," noting that she is presently employed by the University of Wisconsin-Madison, but has worked in light construction, taught college and GED students, bussed restaurant tables and bagged groceries.

"We need leaders who believe that government is not just of the people and by the people, but for the people," McCrank said in the release. "We need to focus on real-life issues that the majority of our residents face, not contrived crises and gimmicky culture war issues meant to distract from our legislators' ineffective governance. Working people need someone honoring them, focusing on them and, most importantly, listening to them. We need to re-open the conversation about what the public wants from its government, and if the public wants a government different from a party's desires,


the public should win out over the party. Rather than disassembling local government and making our communities less attractive, we need to develop customized solutions for local circumstances, involving those most affected. Freedom for all includes freedom for women to make their own healthcare choices without interference from government or others who assert their personal freedom but choose to treat others like second-class citizens."





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Merrill man dies of natural causes in Lincoln County Jail, autopsy finds

MERRILL - A Merrill man died while in custody at the Lincoln County Jail on Saturday, April 27.

According to an independent investigation conducted by the Langlade County Sheriff's Office, Terrence Andrew Wiegel, 68, of Merrill, was found unresponsive in a holding cell in the booking area of the Lincoln County Jail just after 4 p.m. on April 27 by a corrections officer, shortly after his evening meal tray was served. He was found lying on his bunk, but did not respond when the officer called out to him.

The officer immediately entered the cell and shook him, then radioed for assistance and began CPR. Additional corrections officers arrived to assist with lifesaving measures, which included use of an AED device, and emergency medical services arrived on scene within six minutes of finding the man and continued CPR for another 11 minutes. However, lifesaving measures ultimately proved unsuccessful.

The Langlade County deputy's report indicated that, per his review of video evidence in the investigation, Wiegel had been routinely checked on by a corrections officer and found to be lying down on his mattress on his bunk and breathing at 2:59 p.m., but it appears he may have had a medical incident just minutes later, after the corrections officer had left the area.

Wiegel had been in the most secured section of the jail, a holding cell by himself, with a camera, the deputy said.

Wiegel had been arrested and booked into the Lincoln County Jail the prior night at approximately 9:32 p.m. on Friday, April 26, on a charge of theft of mail.

The Langlade County deputy investigating the incident reported, "I was told inmates are typically kept in holding cells in booking for 24 hours before being moved to general population. Terrence had been in the same holding cell since he was booked in. There was video footage of that holding cell for the entire time that Terrence had been incarcerated. I reviewed the video footage of the holding cell from the time Terrence got booked in until after EMS left."

Wiegel was the only person incarcerated in the holding cell from the time of his booking until the time of his death.

At the time of his booking, according to the paperwork, Wiegel "did not appear to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs when he was brought in. Terrence did not appear to have any major medical concerns. Terrence had stated he had a sinus infection and asthma."

Corrections officers reported Wiegel had been cooperative during booking and had at various times said he had "a hard time breathing, but stated Terrence had been very talkative and seemed okay."

Wiegel met with the Jail nurse, but he declined to use the inhaler he brought with him and had only taken Tylenol during his time

Immediately following the death, the scene was taped off, Lincoln County Coroner Valerie Caylor responded to perform her duties, and the Langlade County Sheriff's Office came in to do an independent investigation. The Langlade County deputy was on scene at approximately 6

"With the death of anyone in our jail, per policy and standard procedures we have an outside agency conduct an investigation,' Grant Peterson said on behalf of Lincoln County. "In this particular case, we requested the Langlade County Sheriff's Office to investigate the matter."

Peterson said while the matter was being actively investigated by Langlade County, Lincoln County had opted not to release any information "so as not to interfere with their investigation."

Wiegel was transported to Madison for an autopsy by Caylor and provided her preliminary findings and diagnoses report dated April 30 to Langlade County. According to that report, the autopsy determined the cause of death as natural, pending blood test results.

"She confirmed no trauma to indicate Wiegel was victim to a crime. She specifically noted cardiac and pulmonary issues," the report said of the forensic pathologist who had conducted the autopsy in her presence.

Readers are invited to submit questions about God, the Bible, and religion. I shall try to answer them for you, using the Bible as my final authority.

Over the last few weeks, we have been looking at Hosea 4 and God's complaint that the nation of Israel no longer knew God and the priests had quit teaching the truth of God. The result was that their culture was now riddled with crime. Last week, I mentioned that the answer to the problems of crime and violence in the culture was not more laws, but more of the knowledge of God in the culture. Let us look at this today.

Last week we looked at the idea of binding our selves to God – accepting God for who He says He is and what He wants, so that we seek to obey Him (Isaiah 40). Today I want to look at why it is important to do this if we are to deal rightly with the problems of society.

The Bible says that God created everything, and having done so, He established the laws that govern all that He has made – all those laws are patterned after Himself (Genesis 1:31). That is why the laws of nature are consistent, because God is consistent and does not change. Everything we say and do is in some way affected by who God is (Psalm 90:1,2,

The Bible teaches that God made us in His image and likeness (Genesis 1:26,27), that is why we have a conscience (Romans 2:14,15); God designed us to like what He likes and hate what He hates. Who God is affects us in everything we do. It is for this reason that the most important element in every relationship is honesty, because God is the God of truth who cannot lie (Titus 1:2, Numbers 23:19, John 17:17).

Putting this all together, the Bible teaches that peace is the natural result of people choosing to do what is right (Isaiah 32:17, Proverbs 14:34). The Bible warns that when people will not do what is right, then there will be no peace (Isaiah 48:22; 57:21). This is because the laws God made to govern His creation are patterned after His own person.

The Bible teaches that the reason people do not do what is right is because we have fallen from the perfection of our original creation (Genesis 3) and have corrupted life by our selfish behavior (1 Peter 1:4, Ephesians 2:1-3). We have problems in our relationships because, in our selfishness and pride, we want our own way (Proverbs 13:10, James 1:13-16). So, we are warned that if we live life by our own rules and desires, we will not understand life as we should, nor will we know life as God intended that we should (Ephesians 4;17-21).

When we know God as He has defined Himself to be, and obey what He has said, then we will do what is right and live according to God's design when He first created us. The Bible teaches that it is God's love for us to obey what He has said (1 John 2:5; 5:2,3, John 15:10). It is only as we return to God that we will know the peace He desires for us (Isaiah 11:1-9), which He designed for us to live in when He first created all things (Ecclesiastes 7:29).

They Gave Their Lives

"For love of country they accepted death, and thus resolved all doubts [about their motives] and made immortal their patriotism and their virtue." James Garfield, Ohio Congressman (at the time) Arlington National Cemetery 1868.

This coming Sunday is the day, <u>officially</u> designated in 1971, to remember all those who gave "their last full measure of devotion" in all wars where patriots fought to protect and defend the Constitution of this United States and the freedoms that constitution guarantees as rights of every citizen.

To minimize the importance of remembering the ultimate sacrifice these soldiers made in the defense of this country is, in my opinion, unpatriotic, self-centered and proof of a lack of understanding of what it took to build this country and protect the freedoms our forefathers, with amazing wisdom, guaranteed. 

Individual Unemployability (IU)

Individual Unemployability (IU) is a benefit service-disabled veterans can claim if they have service-connected disabilities that prevent them from substantially gainful employment. IU pays the veteran at the 100% rate even if the VA has rated them less than 100%.

In order to be eligible, a veteran must be unable to maintain substantially gainful employment as a result of his/her serviceconnected disabilities. Additionally, a veteran must

- One service-connected disability rated at 60% or more; OR
- · Two or more serviceconnected disabilities with

a combined rating of 70% or more, with at least one individual disability rated 40% or higher.

Special consideration will be given for veterans when the following criterion is met:

- · The veteran is considered unemployable due to a service-connected disability (or disabilities) but fails to meet the minimum percentage standards. In other words, if you don't meet the above standards but are still unemployable due to your service connected disability (or disabilities); OR
- · There is evidence of exceptional or unusual circumstances to impairment of earning capacity due to service-connected disability (for example,

frequent periods of hospitalization).

Veterans who are in receipt of IU benefits may work as long as it is not considered substantially gainful employment; it must be considered marginal employment.

Substantially gainful employment is defined as employment at which non-disabled individuals earn their livelihood with earnings comparable to the particular occupation in the community where the veteran resides.

Marginal employment is generally deemed to exist when a veteran's earned income does not exceed the amount established by the U.S. Census Bureau as the poverty level for the veteran only.

If a veteran is approved by the VA for IU, not only do they receive the 100% service-disabled rate of pay, but they may also receive additional benefits, including health insurance for their dependents, Property Tax Credit and a service-disabled military ID card.

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



the deputies without a lawyer present. The suspect was placed under arrest for child abuse and transported to the Lincoln County Jail. The suspect was later heard talking on the phone admitting to biting the child, but that it wasn't that hard, and it was in response to the child biting others.

Marshfield Clinic Research Institute asking public to submit ticks for research study

FOR THE TOMAHAWK **LEADER**

WISCONSIN - Scientists at Marshfield Clinic Research Institute (MCRI) are asking the public to submit ticks for a research study called the Tick Inventory via Citizen Science (TICS).

"Ticks might be one of people's least favorite creatures," a release from Marshfield Clinic said. "If you find a tick on yourself or your pet, the first reaction may be to squish it or flush it down the toilet, but that tick could help researchers learn more about the parasitic arachnid and its potential to carry disease."

The release said the study is surveying the distribution of tick species in the area, including any new, invasive ticks that may be moving into Wisconsin.

"Eventually, they will also identify the microbes carried by each tick, including pathogens that may cause diseases, such as Lyme disease, anaplasmosis and babesiosis, and non-pathogenic microbes that may contribute to a tick's likelihood of carrying disease," the release stated. "While we cannot return the pathogen information this year, we will use this information to design future studies

for our findings."

new areas as the environment changes," said Alexandra Linz, MCRI Associate Research Scientist. "This is an opportunity for Wisconsinites to act as citizen scientists and help us learn about ticks and their diseases, which can potentially help us better inform on disease prevention and early detection, as well as develop improved diagnostic tools and treatments."

"The first phase of this survey targeted central Wisconsin," the release stated. "Now researchers are asking citizen scientists from across Wisconsin to contribute."

The release said parks and nature centers interested in having kits available for their visitors also are encouraged to contact MCRI.

"Once the tick, dead "Ticks are moving into or alive, has been placed in the collection kit, just drop it in the mail to submit," the release stated. "Any tick found on people or pets is appreciated. Each kit will come with a unique identification number that people can use to look up, via an online dashboard, the species of ticks they contrib-


> uted." MCRI said it has long studied ticks and tick

borne diseases, including:

- · Improved and rapid diagnostic test evaluation in partnership with industry sponsors.
- · Examining and developing a deeper understanding of post-treatment Lyme disease syndrome.
- · Evaluation of occupation risks for tick-borne illnesses.
- · Exploring changes in land use and its impact on the risk of tick-borne infection exposures.
- Enrolling participants in a national effort to collect samples to improve early Lyme disease diagnosis and treatment.

"This tick research, like many research projects at MCRI, is funded through generous donor support," the release stated.



"Taking too much medication can be harmful, while taking too little may not provide relief," Aspirus stated. "Always read the label and follow the instructions provided by your healthcare provider or the package insert."

Take medications at the right time

The timing of allergy medication can be crucial, Aspirus noted.

"Some medications, such as antihistamines, work best when taken before exposure to allergens, while others, like decongestants, may be more effective when taken after exposure," Aspirus said.

Be aware of side effects

"Allergy medications can have side effects, so it's essential to be aware of these before taking them," Aspirus stated.

Common side effects of include antihistamines drowsiness, dry mouth and blurred vision.

Decongestants can cause nervousness, jitteriness and an increased heart rate.

Nasal corticosteroids can lead to nasal irritation, a sore throat and nosebleeds.

Avoid alcohol and other substances

Aspirus said some allergy medications can interact with alcohol and other substances, such as certain medications or herbal supplements.

"Always read the label and consult your healthcare provider or pharmacist before trying any new medications or supplements," Aspirus stated. "Alcohol can exacerbate certain allergy symptoms, such as nasal congestion and headache, so it's best to avoid it during allergy season."

Keep medications on hand

"Allergy symptoms can strike at any time, so it's important to keep your medications readily available," Aspirus said. "Consider keeping a supply at home, at work, and in your car to ensure access to relief when needed."

Consider allergy shots

Aspirus noted that if your allergies are severe or persistent, allergy shots, also known as immunotherapy, may be an option.

This treatment involves regular injections of small amounts of allergens over several years to desensitize the immune system and reduce symptom severity.

"If you're experiencing persistent or severe symptoms, talk to your primary care provider or local pharmacist about the best treatment options for you," As-

Rate Increases

Dear Reader,

The United State Postal Service recently announced another 10% increase in their rates effective July 14, 2024.

Since 2021, there have been five previous rate increases; this is the sixth. This announcement coincides with severe deterioration in the USPS's performance; simply put, the mail is often late. These rate increases affect individuals sending mail as well as newspapers delivering the news. The rate increases have grown to a crisis. Your voice is needed, to ask Congress to place a moratorium on any rate increases, effective immediately. Mail is a vital service to all Americans and provides information that cannot be transmitted digitally. The USPS's price increases



have been so aggressive that mail volume is declining, which creates a death spiral: Each rate increase reduces the mail volume, making another rate increase necessary, leading to still more volume declines.

Consider the following:

First Class Mail Stamps

24 percent increase since 2022; another 7.8 percent increase scheduled for July 14, 2024. Periodical Mail (Paid Newspapers)

Periodical postage increase for July 2024 will be about 5-7 percent increase since Janu-

EDDM (Free Newspapers)

11 percent increase for community newspapers; the rate increase means newspapers are paying about

33 percent more for postage than three years ago.

Many newspapers rely on the mail to deliver local news to big, medium-sized and small communities alike. We depend on the Post Office and need it to succeed, but not at the cost of our ability to continue serving our readers.

For easy reference, following is contact information for your Senate and Congressional representatives, as well as State Senate and Assembly members. Please call them or leave a message on their constituent website. Ask them to put an immediate stop to postal rate increases that affect all of us. This action will help stabilize local news in your and our communities and preserve the stewardship that the print medium has had in helping our communities to stay strong, dynamic and filled with character.

Natural Connections: Woodcock Dating Game

Dusk was deepening in the alder brush of the Bibon Swamp as we tiptoed down the gravel road. Robins yakked from the trees and spring peepers yelled from the water much louder than our feet, but still we kept our breath and movement and thoughts as quiet as possible so as not to miss it.

Peent.

I heard it first, since I knew what to expect. I pointed eagerly toward a featureless place in the bushes. Peent. The brand-new birder with me strained to pick that one sound out of the thicket. Peent. We waited; breaths held. Peent. We wanted more.

At the next grassy opening along the road, we heard another peent. We paused, peering into the place where grasses met alders. Twittering sounds burst from the grass, and a flappy little flier rose in a broad spiral, soon clearing the treetops and circling up toward the crescent moon. Fatter than a robin, smaller than a grouse, the winged shape twittered ever higher into the navy blue. About 200 feet up, the twittering became sweet chirping, and the American woodcock sideslipped down like a falling leaf. Peent. Back on his dancing ground, the male began his courtship display again. Peent. My friend and I turned to each other, grinning.

Nature has invented some pretty interesting courtship behavior over the eons, and American woodcocks are a lovely example. Somewhere in the bushes, a female woodcock pretends not to watch the male's strenuous antics. If he passes muster, she will let him approach her, bobbing with his wings raised, to seal the deal. That's it, though. She goes off to build a nest and he keeps display-

Over a decade ago, in Maine, I spent another evening surrounded by woodcocks. The blueberry bald reminded me of Friar Tuck's iconic haircut. Low shrubs and lichen-covered rocks dotted the top of the hill, with a shaggy forest forming a circle around the crown. As dusk fell, woodcocks peented and twittered and chirped in ethereal surround sound, as if in my own private Omnitheater. Private, except for an acquaintance who was not a birder. He stood by bored - while I slowly spun in circles, high on the wonderment of nature.

Fast forward a couple years to my closest encounter with a woodcock. His peent buzzed right through the thin nylon of my tent wall. When I sat up in my sleeping bag to look out of the mosquito netting, his funny shape was just a few feet away, strutting on the packed dirt of the campground. I could see the silhouette of the woodcock's three-inch-long bill open with each peent. Absolutely thrilled, I poked my tent mate so that he wouldn't miss this cool experience. Grumbling about the noise, he pulled his sleeping bag up over his ears.

Like people, woodcocks' peculiarities are what make them fun to get to know. For example, they have some great nicknames: timberdoodle, Labrador twister, and bog sucker top the list. And their oddly fantastic attributes don't stop there. Sure, having big eyes on the top of a pointy head looks like a badly drawn cartoon, but that gives woodcocks the ability to see danger in any direction. Probing the mud for food with a super long bill doesn't seem like elegant dining, except that using their flexible, sensitive bill tip, woodcocks can both perceive a worm and grab it, all underground.

Woodcocks can even dance! Stepping one foot forward, they'll bob their body rhythmically while their head stays eerily still, then take a step and bob again. TikTok has discovered all the pop music with just the right beat to match the woodcock's moves. Scientists aren't sure why woodcocks do this funny walk, but stirring up earthworms for easier feeding is one hypothesis.


Food wasn't their priority under the crescent moon last week. The peents came from both sides of the gravel road. The beginner birder and I listened to a particularly loud male call for a few minutes, and when he took to the air, we stumbled forward over grassy hummocks to get closer to where we'd thought he'd been. When his twitters turned to chirps, we crouched low and tried to become invisible. Peent. No luck, he'd landed behind us.

It didn't matter. Grinning in the darkness, we talked about all the amazing events of the evening on our way back to the car. I'm not sure what traits woodcocks are looking for in a partner, but I want to hang out with someone who goes looking for woodcocks!

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
