Celebrate summer with fire safety in mind

With the Fourth of July right around the corner, many will celebrate with fireworks, cookouts and campfires.

While such activities can provide a fun way to spend a summer night, De Pere Fire Rescue Battalion Chief Brett Jansen said it's important to make sure they are done safely.

Fireworks

The primary concern with fireworks is their ability to start secondary fires which people may not be prepared to deal with.

"Any firework is another ignition source," Jansen said. "So what it can do is you light it off and it could start potential fires on houses, buildings, trash and other things. So the big thing to be safe with fireworks is to make sure you're using them in a safe way. Keep any combustible far enough away from those fireworks that it can't start anything else on fire and then always have a fire extinguisher, hose and bucket of water available so that if something does happen with the firework, you can extinguish the fire very quickly."

Aerial fireworks, which are not allowed

by many municipalities, pose an especially high risk for starting fires.

"Another thing with fireworks that you've got to be careful with is anything that shoots any projectile into the air or any object into the air," Jansen said. "Aerial fireworks for residential home use aren't always the best things because they can cause fires at other locations... A lot of times we see neighbors having fireworks and they're having a good time and all of a sudden, the fireworks go up in the air and they land on a neighbor's house and now we have a bigger problem."

While ground fireworks such as fountains don't pose the same risks as aerial fireworks, those planning to use them should make sure to do so in an area away from any combustibles.

"Fountains can shoot 10, 15 feet in the air and when those sparks come off, those sparks are hot," Jansen said. "Have a good, accurate distance of 20 to 30 feet around that fountain so nobody's going to catch an ember and start on fire or get burned by it and it's not going to start anything around it on fire. Keep all combustibles away from where those fireworks are going

off... People usually do them in streets or driveways because concrete doesn't catch fire, but if you do it on the grass and that grass is dry, there's a good chance you could start your grass on fire."

And if your celebration involves sparklers, Jansen said supervision is key to ensuring nobody gets burned.

"We know kids like sparklers, but make sure they're not waving them around next to other people and that there's a safe distance from each person," he said. "Have an adult present to watch them so they aren't burning themselves or burning others."

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Grills

Jansen said grill safety starts before you've even lit the grill by making sure to plan to do your cooking away from anything flammable.

"Grills are hot and they do produce fire, whether it's charcoal or natural gas or propane, so keep those a safe distance away from any combustibles," he said. "You want to cook outside — not inside your garage. You want to be at least 10 feet away from any combustibles like the side of your house and even further is better, so the heat doesn't radiate onto your house or any other things that could start a fire around it."

Once the grill is lit, it's important to stay attentive.

"Always be around and watching it so it doesn't flame up or cause a bigger fire,"

Jansen said. "Sometimes grease can leak down or build up and it could start a fire that way. The other thing with cooking is also making sure you're watching your kids around the grill so that they're not grabbing onto or pulling over the grill — just try to keep good, safe measures so kids aren't getting burned at all."

And once the cooking is done, Jansen said it's important to make sure anything you're throwing away is fully cooled to prevent secondary fires — one of the top reasons his department gets called out during this season.

"One of the other things that we recommend is if you're going to use charcoal in your grill, let it cool down sufficiently before you throw it away," he said. "Submerging it in water or putting water on it before you throw it into a metal

container. We see a lot of people throwing it into paper bags of plastic containers and then putting it in their garbage and if they haven't been cooled enough, that heat actually builds and starts your trash can on fire or your house on fire. Make sure they're sufficiently cooled and that the fire or whatever you're using for cooking is completely out before you discard any of that stuff."

Campfires

When it comes to campfire safety, Jansen said your municipality's ordinance is a good place to start.

"The biggest thing is always to check your city's ordinance," he said. "The city of De Pere has an ordinance for recreational fires. You can have them as long as there's not a burning ban, and a good place to check for a burning ban is the DNR website or call your municipality's fire department and they'll be able to tell you. Follow [your municipality's] ordinance. For the city of De Pere, the fire pit itself cannot be any larger than two feet in diameter, it has to be coverable and it has to be at least 15 feet from any combustible — that's like a wood

fence or your house or a wood pile."

As with fireworks and grilling, make sure to have a way to put out the fire on hand.

"Anytime you're having a fire, have an extinguisher or bucket of water or a hose nearby in case the fire does get out of hand," Jansen said. "Have a way to extinguish it or at least slow it before the department would have to respond and assist with it."


Jansen said people shouldn't feel discouraged from enjoying things like fireworks, grilling and campfires, but they should air on the side of caution.

"Always think about what could happen when you're doing these things," he said. "Have a fire extinguisher available, or have a water source like a garden hose. We never want to prevent anybody from enjoying themselves, but we want to make sure that they're doing it safely to prevent them from having a fire where we need to respond or having to go to the emergency room or the hospital over the holiday or the summer, because nobody likes doing that either. Just try to really think safe, and if you ever have any questions, call your local fire department and we can provide those answers." **CP**

Starting at 3 p.m., the event features beers and a seltzer from Stillmank Brewing and Ahnapee Brewery, in addition to food trucks Captain Quesadilla Co., Bacon Burger Company and Caribbean Cruiser.

The Beer Garden Party promises fun for the whole family — yes, even the dog — with live music provided by Too Much Tension.

"It's one of those events we hope to become kind of a tradition for families," said Nikki Hilker, business manager for the Brown County Parks Department. "An event where they're able to not only bring their kid and allow them to play on the playground and kind of explore the park, but it's also pet friendly... It's kind of a fun event to be at as it's not only got generations of families, but you're also able to bring man's best friend and include them."

The event, which has been hosted at Pamperin Park for several years now, got its start when the Brown County Parks Department began looking for a way to get



people into the park while also raising a bit of money to support the park.

"It came about a couple years ago when we wanted to do something at Pamperin Park that would not only generate interest in people visiting the park — they're getting out there and exploring the outdoors and their world around them by enjoying their county park — but also something where we could take a small portion of proceeds that are made... so that we can continue to do park improvements at Pamperin and so that we're continuing to keep the park relevant and fun for families throughout the years," Hilker said.

With the proceeds from the Beer Garden


Party Events, Hilker said the Brown County Parks Department is able to make improvements to Pamperin Park to help ensure it will continue to be enjoyed by families for generations to come.

"We really look at it as an opportunity for us to set aside those dollars so that we can make improvements that are going to bring people back to Pamperin Park for a long time," she said. "Some have been coming to the park for generations — their parents brought them and they're now bringing their families. It keeps things interesting for them when we're able to offer things like our newer playground installed last summer — keeping it innovative for

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Showcasing local artists

NWTC seeks to purchase new works through call for art

Local artists have the opportunity to see their work displayed around the campuses of Northeast Wisconsin Technical College (NWTC) as the college has once again opened its call for art — a process which has allowed the college to acquire nearly 400 pieces in its permanent collection over the years.

"When NWTC did our big referendum and we added big buildings, we obviously had art money included in those budgets to build and outfit the buildings, but now that we've moved to maintenance mode, we have a call for art that goes out," said Kim LaPlante, chair of NWTC's Arts Committee. "We're able to add a few new pieces a year — I think we've been averaging about five to six pieces every year — through the call for art."

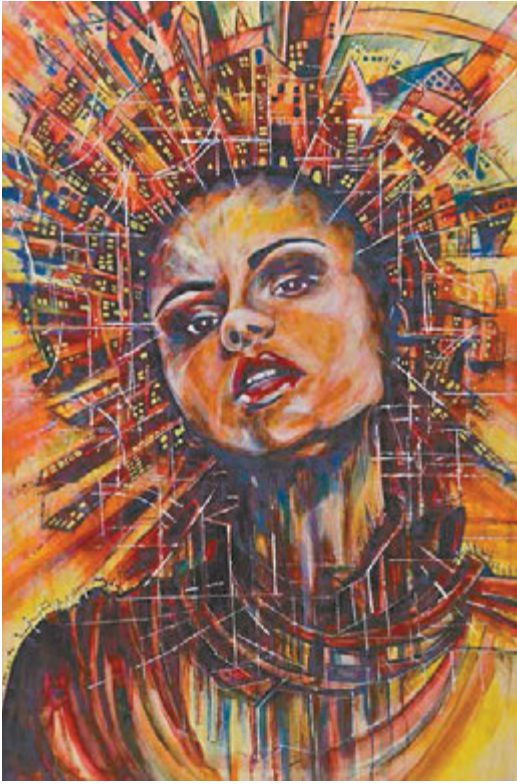
Once a piece of art is purchased, it becomes a part of NWTC's permanent collection and is displayed at one of the college's locations in Door, Florence, Kewaunee, Marinette, and Oconto counties.

LaPlante said the college is specifically looking for art that will fill some of the larger open spaces on its campuses.

"At NWTC, we have big hallways," she said. "We have big open spaces that are nine feet wide and we want statement pieces that will fill those spaces, so we're really looking for big things that are inspirational,

reviewed on a monthly basis, meaning artists don't have to wait more than a month to know whether their piece has been chosen and are welcome to continue to submit new pieces.

"We have a continual call for art, meaning that every month we review all the submissions that come in," she said. "Artists will get an answer within a month and they'll know for sure if their piece has been chosen and artists can feel that they can add new proposals so that we can continue to see the new work that they're producing."

LaPlante said the process was designed with artists in mind.

"What we really wanted to do was make a call for art that still allowed artists to sell their works," she said. "We wanted to make sure that NWTC's call for art was very focused on the artists. We want our local artists to benefit from this. We don't want

them to feel like because they submitted something, they can't sell it to someone else. We really want to showcase their art."

NWTC's call for art doesn't only benefit the artists involved, though, as LaPlante said supporting local artists is important to the college's goals.

"NWTC's mission is all about the economic vitality of our community," she said. "So our local artists are part of our mission. It's a core value of the college to be lifting up our community and when we see local artists, this is a great opportunity for us to lift them up and be able to showcase them not only with the community, but also for our students every day. They can learn more about appreciating art from what they see on their way to class."

that reflect the diverse experiences of our community or that speak to the subjects that we teach at NWTC."

The goal for art purchased through the call for art, LaPlante said, is to find art that stands out and will be memorable to those who visit the campuses.

"We are looking for big statement pieces," she said. "When you walk our halls, we want it to be a piece that you see coming at you from the end of the hall so you're looking forward to that piece. We also know that a lot of students use our art as wayfinding, so we want it to really stand out so they remember, 'Oh year, my class is by this sculpture' or, 'That very vibrant piece of art is next to my second class.' We want to make sure that anything is going to really stand out rather than blend in."

For artists looking to submit a work for consideration, LaPlante said the college is especially interested in purchasing art that relates to its areas of study.

"We really gravitate towards pieces that have anything to do with what we're teaching at the college," she said. "If it's something that is related to our health programs, technology, trades, engineering, digital arts, business, architecture, construction, public safety or manufacturing — All of these are great subjects for the different art that we get from our local artists... Our artists can really get to know NWTC and then if they have work that they've already created that reflects that or if they want to create something new that reflects that, we're really interested in those pieces."

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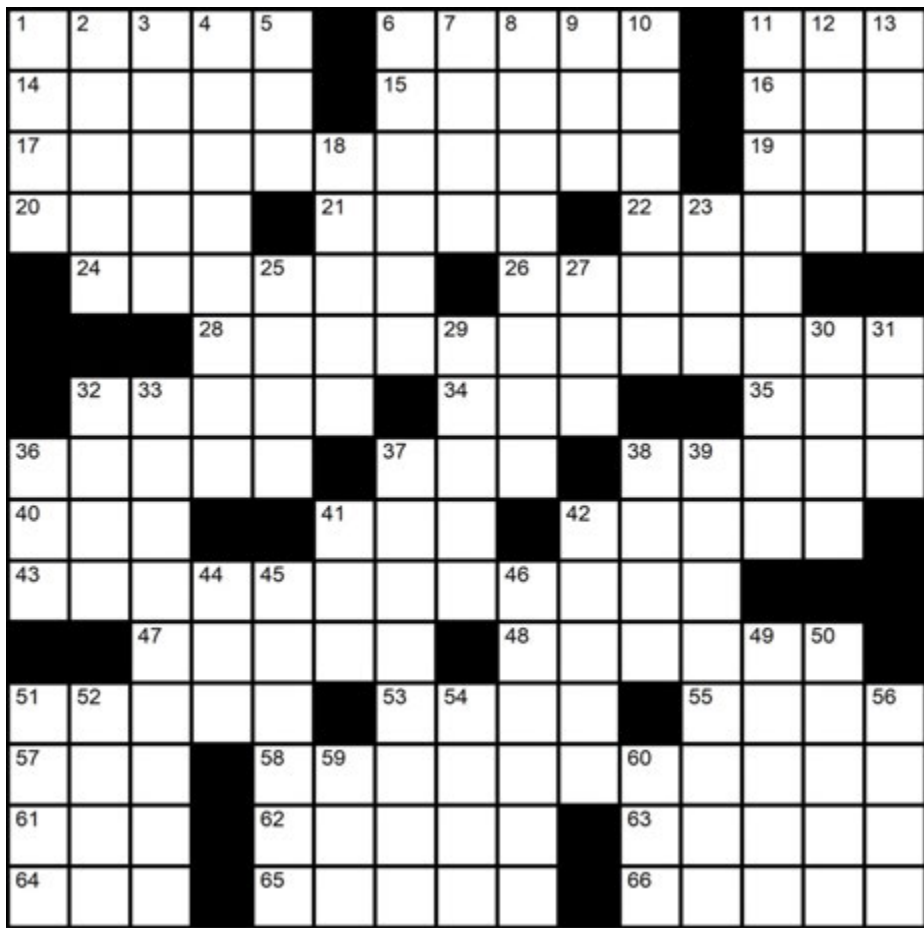

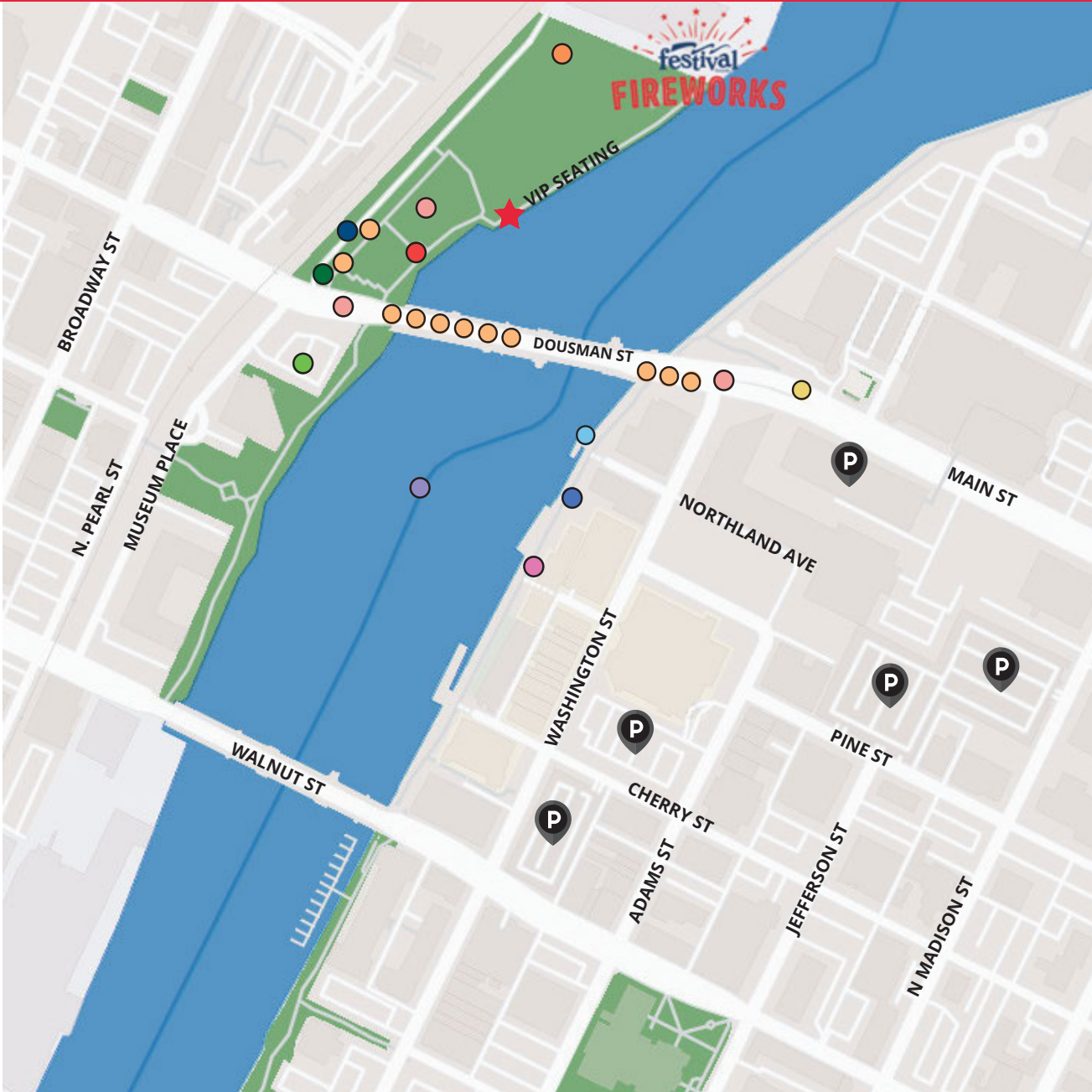
