Local guitarist makes hearts sing

Bob Shebesta's love for guitar is contagious.

For the last 27 years, Shebesta has served as the director of the Fox Cities' Childbloom Guitar Program, providing guitar lessons for children using an educational model that adapts to younger learners' learning styles.

On Sept. 4, Shebesta received a "Humanitarian" award from the Childbloom Company — the company's first of that kind - for his "gentle, mentoring, and encouraging" approach to teaching and for his work of nine years with Agape of Appleton, which offers supportive housing accommodations for people with cognitive and physical disabilities based on their individual

"Often, they're independent enough to live on their own," said Shebesta, but participants — Agape's word for their residents — may need assistance with taking medications, running errands, doing chores, planning and cooking meals or navigating interpersonal interactions. Shebesta offers a helping hand and companionship, besides.

"Usually, there's some time for [games and activities], and occasionally parties, like a Christmas party, or a Memorial party and then I bring my guitar or my karaoke setup," Shebesta continued. "I'm teaching guitar to one resident right now. I taught her ukulele and I'm currently teaching her guitar."

While his work with Agape started as a part-time job — 10-12 hours a week — in pursuit of supplemental income - over the years, Shebesta has more than doubled his hours at his particular location, one of five in Appleton.

"Guitar has always been real important," said Shebesta. Despite having other hobbies as a kid — taking up the trumpet at age 11 and building model cars, airplanes and boats with his school's modeling club - upon picking up the guitar as a 13-yearold, his interests shifted.

"All of my time went into guitar, and that became kind of a dominant thing in my life," he said. In high school, he began to play the bass guitar in the school band. At UW-Green Bay, he studied music and began to take formal guitar lessons, having been self-taught until then.

"I wasn't sure what I wanted to do with music, so I got an education degree to teach band in high school and middle school." This required him to learn "a little bit of all of the instruments" in order to teach them to new learners, including the French horn, which he took up for himself.

He also began to teach guitar at area music store Henri's Music, which closed its doors in 2010.

"I was teaching guitar, and then I started performing with guitar. I started learning classical guitar and I started playing solo guitar for restaurants, events and weddings. And then I was teaching guitar at the music store and then a few years later I came across the Childbloom program," Shebesta said.

The Childbloom Company is a national guitar program founded by Texan guitarist Kevin Taylor geared toward teaching guitar to children in a way that connects with them. Instructors across the United States may train and become certified in its teaching approach.

"I was looking for a particular method for kids and I enjoyed working with the younger students," said Shebesta, "And then this method is designed to teach kids how to play guitar, so the approach is specific for kids."

While Shebesta said that teaching kids guitar isn't harder than teaching adults, per se, it requires a different approach.

"The learning pace is slower and how they acquire things is different, so you can't throw too many things at them at once," he said. "It's more of one skill at a time, one concept, and then you can build upon those, so it's very organized in the approach. It uses the classical technique in the playing position so that that gives the most advantage for acquiring the guitar. The sitting position is one of the most important things — the left hand. The sitting position has to be with sitting with a guitar on the left leg with a footstool so that the hand is free to position, not to

Shebesta noted that the classical technique is also known as "the finger style approach" because it involves the use of all of a player's fingers on their picking hand, rather than a single pick.

guitar, so you're playing melodically."

style, Shebesta noted that Childbloom is unique in that it encourages parents to sit



in on their children's lessons.

"They're invited to come in and see," he said. "Kids have a tendency to miss the point on things, so if the parent can see what they're doing, then they can be more helpful with practice at home."

Childbloom also makes guitar learning social. Students may be paired in groups of two or three so that they can learn how to play in time with others and share in each other's learning progress.

'They have more fun than by themselves. It's more laid back. They're not as in the hot seat [as with a private lesson]," Shebesta explained.

After COVID-19, Shebesta noted a decline in enrollees into the program, but he said that there has been a recent uptick in the number of families inquiring about lessons. Just this month, he enrolled three new students.

"I do teach adults, too," Shebesta said. He has two teaching studios, one in Appleton and one in De Pere.

As for his favorite part of the job?

"Seeing their skills grow," he said. "Seeing them understand something, and when they can understand something and do well, they enjoy it more and it's fun to share the enjoyment of playing guitar."

The sentiment applies to his work with Agape, as well. "Kinda the same thing for working with people with disabilities — improving their lives is important and helping them live on their own and maintaining their independence is a good feeling, when they can maintain their independence," Shebesta said.

Jam in Joannes Park

The Joannes Park Neighborhood Association will host its first-ever Joannes Jam event this Saturday, Sept. 28, at Joannes Park.

Joannes Park Neighborhood Association President Kelsey Lutzow said the event aims to get people out to enjoy all their neighborhood has to offer.

"We know that our parks are safer and our neighborhoods are safer when people are in them," she said. "So how do we activate the neighborhood? How do we get people outside and meeting one another? We've seen some pretty great success in Green Bay with live music — we actually were part of the Tarlton Theatre's city-wide music event earlier this summer called Keys to the City... We had a painter and we had musicians in the park and just seeing the activity from every age group — the younger kids who were just playing at the park all the way up to older neighbors — everyone getting out and activating the neighborhood was really cool. We're hopeful that this will be kind of an extension of that excitement and that we can continue to do it."

Joannes Jam 2024 will bring five performances across two stages — Jasha, Ramona and the Flower, Alley Cat and the



Purrrfection, Dani Maus and Emmaliegh.

Joannes Jam 2024 will also be free for attendees to enjoy, which Lutzow said is especially important in making sure the event is accessible to all in the neighborhood.

"Joannes Park Neighborhood is lower income and our park is pretty great," she said. "It's huge and it has a lot of amenities, so we're just trying to figure out how to get people to the park to see all of that stuff and also create this space where everyone can come and feel welcome. Thankfully, our school — East High School — right here in our neighborhood is the arts school, but

we know that art is not super accessible to everyone, so we just want to make sure that we're removing barriers and providing a free, family-friendly way to engage in the arts."

In addition to free live music, the event will also feature free food provided by Schreiber Foods, Festival Foods and JBS, prepared and served by Crisis Cafe.

With the celebration taking place at the conclusion of Good Neighbor Week, Lutzow said she hopes the event encourages members of her neighborhood to continue to be neighborly towards one another.

"Green Bay Neighborhoods has Good

Neighbor Week every year," she said. "They're doing projects every single day this week to help neighbors do yard work or paint something. All the neighborhoods that are included in Green Bay Neighborhoods think about, 'What can we do to engage our neighborhood during Good Neighbor Week?' This is our way of doing that — concluding the week with some fun, some music and some food and hopefully just encouraging everyone to be a good neighbor."

Fall for all

Green Bay Botanical Garden celebrates community with **FALL FAMILY FESTIVAL**

The Green Bay Botanical Garden will open up its space for all to enjoy for free this Saturday, Sept. 28, for its annual Fall Family Festival — an event aimed at celebrating the community which supports the Garden.

"Fall Family Festival is our annual free festival for the community," said Linda Gustke, director of education and guest experience at the Garden. "We do it every fall as a thank you to the community for enabling us to be here and for supporting us. As a 100% community-supported nonprofit, we're only here if people are becoming members and bringing their friends and coming to our events. So we like to have a free day in the fall to just give back and say thank you and invite people out for a fun fall day at the Garden."

In addition to the community at large, Fall Family Festival also celebrates the Garden's ties to the Oneida Nation with special programming to highlight the partnership.

"This will be our third year where we are focusing on celebrating our connections with the Oneida Nation," Gustke said. "The land that the Garden is on is technically part of the reservation and we have a lot of similar ways that we operate and care for the environment and things like that, so we're excited to be able to showcase Oneida in our community."

This year, attendees of Fall Family Festival will be able to take in performances by the

Oneida Pow Wow Dancers and Oneida Adult Smoke Dancers, demonstrations by Oneida Artists Eliza Skenandore, Jennifer Jordan and Scott Hill and learn more about the Garden's Purple Loosestrife Biocontrol Partnership Project.

"The purple loosestrife control partnership project is a project that we participate in with the Oneida Nation," Gustke said. "Purple loosestrife is a major invasive plant that is in our area and rather than using harsh chemicals to control it like we have to do with many invasives, there's actually a beetle that specifically eats purple loosestrife. So we raise the beetle on purple loosestrife in a contained area by our horticulture team... And then the Oneida contacts and people in the project actually take the beetles that we raise and release them in various spots onto the purple loosestrife to help control it."

Other activities around the Garden this weekend will include face painting, balloon artists and an opportunity to harvest native seeds with the Brown County Seed Library — a partnership between the Brown County Library, the Garden and other community organizations to provide seeds free of charge to anyone interested in planting vegetables, fruits and pollinator-friendly plants.

"In the Central Library in downtown Green Bay and on the second floor there's a card catalog with seeds in it that the community can just come in and grab and plant in their yards," she said. "There's fruits and vegetables, but then there's also native plants because we know that in order to have the fruit, we need pollinators that are able to pollinate the flowers and then make the fruit. Planting those native wildflowers helps to bring the bees, the butterflies and the other pollinators that then will pollinate fruit and vegetable plants. With the Brown County Seed Library, part of the initiative has been to teach the community how to be able to harvest those native seeds themselves, so the Seed Library will be out that day and they'll invite the community out to our Grand Garden where wi have a wide variety of native plants to help collect ▲ Fall Family Festival provides a blend of entetaining and educational programming.

some seeds and then those seeds will be packaged up eventually and placed back into the Seed Library for new community members to grab when they're ready to plant some natives. Actually, the fall time is not only a great time to collect those seeds, it's also a great time to plant... If you plant in the fall, then they get started a little bit sooner in the springtime when it starts to warm back up."

The blend of educational components with the other activities of the Fall Family Festival, Gustke said, is in keeping with the overall goals of the Garden.

"Part of our mission at the Garden is to connect people with plants," she said. "Especially with this event, we are inviting families out and the community out, so we want to have that 'edutainment' — education and entertainment together — because a lot of our entertainment and our education go hand-in-hand. They're fun and they help connect people with our mission."

In addition to the education and entertainment that will be available at Saturday's event, Gustke said attendees should also make note of the natural beauty all around the Garden as fall settles in.

"Our roses are just beautiful right now — roses grow into October in Wisconsin, which is amazing," she said. "Our native plants are really showing off... In our Partnership Garden we display All-American Selection winning fruits and vegetables, so you're going to get to see a lot of those foods still out there and see them growing on their actual plants, which is really exciting. Our Cottage Garden, I would say that it shines in the fall with some really tall, big, draping plants"

Admission will be free for all during the Fall Family Festival from 9 a.m.-6:30 p.m. with special programming taking place between 9 a.m.-4 p.m.

Registration is now open for the Green Bay Packers 15th annual Tundra Tales at-home reading program for students in 4K through fifth grade.

The registration deadline is Friday, Oct. 4, and the program will run from Oct. 14 through Nov. 17.

The Tundra Tales program aims to support children reading at grade level by third grade and

develop lifelong reading habits by encouraging children to read outside of school.

Participating students must read or be read to for 60 minutes every week, outside of school, for four weeks (a total of 240 minutes).

An extra week to achieve the total goal has been included to accommodate school schedules.

Educators and coordinators can offer their participants one four-week segment.

Participants who achieve the final goal will receive a Packers Hall of Fame voucher good for one free participant admission and one free adult admission.

Each public or private Wisconsin school classroom registered for Tundra Tales that has a 75% or higher completion rate for the program will be eligible to receive a \$100 grant to use toward literary resources for their school or classroom.

Additionally, each school that has five classrooms or more complete the program will be entered to win one of five \$1000 grants for literacy resources at the school.

Grants are funded by Green Bay Packers Give Back and are available for public and private schools in Wisconsin only.

Homeschoolers, virtual schools, after school programs, parent-teacher organizations and families have also participated in the program and are encouraged to continue participating.




