# **New Public Access Land mapping resource for hunters**

STATE – Wisconsin outdoor enthusiasts now have an additional resource readily available according to the Wisconsin State Department of Natural Resources.

The Public Access Lands (PAL) mapping application is a map-based system that allows users to locate and find information on properties open for public access.

PAL can be used on your desktop or handheld devices.

To go directly to the PAL application visit https://dnrmaps.wi.gov/H5/?Viewer=Public\_Access\_Lands or go through the DNR website at https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/ and search "Public Access Lands".

Simply click the blue tab that says, "Launch Public Access Lands Mapping Application."

A state of Wisconsin map will appear.

Zoom in, out using the scroll function on your mouse, or if you are using a notebook or handheld device use the screen's fingertip feature.

Locate the area you wish to look at

At any time, you can use the blue tab located on the upper right hand side of the map that says, "I want to...", but before you do that, it definitely pays to go back to the home screen and scroll down to Documentation.

There are four highlighted blue bullet points you can click on (basically the instruction manual) with simple documents to provide guidance on web map navigation. They also identify web application tools and describe their use.

It is worth checking out before you are ready to make judgments on the usefulness of the application.

The application is a work in progress and there is an area to generate questions and feedback.

The Frequently Asked Questions FAQ tab is short and worth a read ahead of time for first time users.

The Wisconsin DNR purchases land



and conservation easements to manage and protect our natural resources and to provide recreational opportunities to everyone who lives, works and plays in the state. Through the real estate land acquisition program, wetlands, forests, scenic areas, prairies, savannas, wildlife and fish habitat, rare species habitat, glacial features, and other resources are protected and managed.

PAL also includes private lands open to public access, including the Managed Forest Law (MFL), Forest Crop Law (FCL), Voluntary Public Access (VPA) and the Turkey Hunter Access Program (THAP).

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds hunters and the public to help prevent the spread of chronic wasting disease (CWD) and other illnesses between deer by following all baiting and feeding bans and refraining from baiting and feeding in areas where no bans are in effect.

CWD is an always-fatal disease that affects the nervous system of deer, elk, moose and caribou caused by a misshapen prion protein. The disease can spread through contact with an infected animal's saliva, urine, feces or blood. It can also spread indirectly through exposure to a contaminated environment. CWD prions are extremely resilient, and they can stay in the soil for a long time, making containment of an affected area a challenge.

Baiting is the intentional placement of any material, including food, scented materials, salts, minerals and grains, to attract wild animals for hunting purposes. Feeding is the deliberate placement of material used to feed or attract wild animals for non-hunting purposes, including recreational and supplemental feeding, except as allowed for birds and small mammals.

Baiting and feeding encourage deer to congregate unnaturally around a specific location, creating an environment where infected deer can quickly spread diseases like CWD through direct contact with healthy deer or through indirect contact in the environment.

Infected deer can also leave infectious CWD prions behind in their saliva, blood, feces and urine, creating a risk to any healthy deer that may visit the site in the future. CWD can spread rapidly when these prions remain in an area where more deer are sure to congregate, such as a feed pile.

To mitigate these risks and slow the spread of CWD, state law directs the DNR to impose baiting and feeding bans within any county with a confirmed CWD-positive wild or captive deer or any county within 10 miles of the location of the positive deer.

Counties fall under a three-year baiting and feeding ban when a wild or farm-raised deer tests positive for CWD in the county. If the CWD-positive deer is found within 10 miles of a county line, the

adjoining county will fall under a two-year ban. If additional CWD cases are found during the lifetime of a baiting and feeding ban, the ban will reset for an additional two to three years. Therefore, the date when a baiting and feeding ban would be lifted on a given county may change due to new farm-raised and wild CWD positive detections.

In counties where baiting and feeding bans are in effect, individuals may still feed birds and small mammals provided feeding devices are within 50 yards of a human dwelling and at a sufficient height or design to prevent access by deer.

  NOTE: The total daily bag limit is three birds, singly or in aggregate, to include not more than the legal limit for Canada geese in the zone/season being hunted. The possession limit is three times the daily bag limit.

- Fox (red and gray): Hunting & Trapping: Oct. 19-Feb. 15. 2025

- Otter: Trapping ONLY Permits Required: North Zone: Nov. 2-Apr. 30, 2025; South Zone: Nov. 2-Mar. 31, 2025
- Raccoon: Hunting, Trapping: Resident: Oct. 19-Feb. 15, 2025; Non-resident: Nov. 2-Feb. 15, 2025
- Opossum, skunk, weasel, porcupine, woodchuck, snowshoe hare: No season limits, bag limits, size limits or possession limits, but a license is required.


### PROTECTED SPECIES

Hunting protected species-such as badger, jackrabbit, moose and flying squirrel-is prohibited. See Ch. NR 10.02 for more details.

### **GET IN THE GAME!**

Mentored Hunting Licenses: Adults and youth who have not completed hunter education may hunt through the Mentored Hunting Program. Visit dnr.wisconsin.gov and search "mentored hunting" for more information.

**Mentored Trapping Licenses:** Youth ages 16-17 and adults who have not completed trapper education may





trap through the Mentored Trapping program. Youth under the age of 16 may trap without a license when supervised y a licensed trapper, even if the youth has not completed trapper education. Visit dnr.wisconsin.gov and search "mentored trapping" for more information.

Reduced License Fees: Youth ages 11 and younger, first-time hunters and those who have not hunted in the preceding 10 years are eligible to purchase hunting licenses at a reduced fee. Resident hunters who recruit three first-time hunters, trappers or anglers are also eligible for reduced fees.


