Lincoln County A&L Committee discussing possible next steps for Pine Crest

The Agenda for the Wednesday, Sept. 4, 2024, Lincoln County Administrative & Legislative (A&L) Committee, released last week, contained two items related to Pine Crest Nursing Home. Agenda item #9 was titled "Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Next Steps for Pine Crest" and Agenda item #10 was set for Closed Session indicating the committee might consider a motion to adjourn into closed session for the purpose of deliberating or negotiating the

purchasing of public properties, noting "Pine Crest Sale Negotiations" specifically as the topic of discussion.

Pine Crest Nursing Home is not currently listed for sale by the County; however, the Board had previously approved selling the facility, a sale that fell through the end of June 2024 in response to a lawsuit filed by current District 7 County Supervisor Don Dunphy that challenged the sale. Dunphy subsequently dismissed the lawsuit. He ran for County Supervisor this past April on a promise to stop the sale of Pine Crest.

Unsolicited interest in purchasing Pine Crest

During the Aug. 20 Lincoln County Board of Supervisors meeting, prior to discussion regarding a possible referendum pertaining to Pine Crest on the Nov. 5 ballot, Board Chair Jesse Boyd had noted that the initial buyer had sent a letter again expressing interest in purchasing Pine Crest and that the County had also received another letter of interest.

"Before we get to the motion," Boyd said in the meeting, "I want to be open, and I have some information to share with the Board and those in attendance. ... As we sit here today, former Asset Purchase Agreement with Senior Management for the sale of Pine Crest was terminated by the end of June. Pine Crest is not currently listed for sale. Broker contract with Marcus and Millichap has expired."

"Although not up for discussion or any action tonight, perhaps relevant for purposes of transparency to all information during our consideration of this resolution, Senior Management has expressed interest in still acquiring Pine Crest if litigation is resolved," he said. "The County also received an unsolicited letter expressing an interest in purchasing of Pine Crest by a different buyer.'

"I'm not saying more about either one of these communications," Boyd said, "as the County has not acted

Paper Cities Kennel Club to hold Annual Dog Show this weekend

The Paper Cities Kennel Club (PCKC) will hold its annual AKC licensed All-Breed Dog Shows and Obedience/Rally Trials this weekend, Sept. 7 and 8, 2024, at the Merrill Area Recreation Complex (MARC) from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days. The public is invited, and the event is free to attend, but there is a \$5 parking fee. Families are asked to keep strollers outside.

More than 100 different breeds of dogs recognized by the American Kennel Club (AKC) will be showcased, with approximately 600 entries each day. The dogs and their owners or handlers come from all over the country to compete in the weekend events, which include Conformation, Junior Showmanship, National Owner-Handled Series, Obedience, and Rally Obedience.

There will also be a Four to Six-Month Beginner Puppy Competition on Saturday.

A Pee Wee Class Special Attraction will be held Sunday, around the lunch hour, where children ages 5-9 years can show their dog or someone else's dog in a ring with their parent/guardian/responsible adult. This event is a huge crowd pleaser and PCKC is thrilled to offer it!

New this year, AKC Fast CAT tests will be hosted on the show site. Fast CAT, which stands for Coursing Ability Test (FCAT) is a relatively new sport through AKC. Dogs run one at a time, over a timed 100-yard dash, using a mechanical system chasing a lure or squawker, and get AKC titles based upon points earned. Points are earned based upon a combination of miles per hour and handicap. Handicap is based upon the height of the dog.

FCAT provides a terrific opportunity to introduce new participants to the world of AKC sports, as it's one of the few events where all that is needed to compete is a dog's natural instincts. Dogs that love to run, or run and chase bunnies or other things, love Fast CAT. It's easy for handlers, as no experience/training is needed. The Fast CAT track is completely fenced in, so people don't need to worry about their dog being able to run away. PCKC is excited to be working with their Lure Operator who is coming from Illinois. People can enter the tests "day-of," and there will be Fun Runs on Saturday after 2 p.m. Fun Runs cost \$5/run, and it's a great time to come and try it with your dog!

Conformation events are the signature events of the AKC. They concentrate on the distinctive features of purebred dogs and help to preserve those characteristics. Traditional Obedience events consist of formal exercises in which accuracy and precision are essential, but the natural movement of the handler and the willingness and enjoyment of the dog are still very important.

Rally, in which signs direct dog and handler through an obedience course, offers an experience that is fun and energizing. Rally was designed with the traditional pet owner in mind and as a foundation for more advanced

A raffle will also be held on Saturday and is open to exhibitors, spectators, and the public. Typically there are about 80 baskets (some for the dogs and some for the people). Each year the club donates a portion of the proceeds from the raffle to a very worthwhile cause, and this year, their recipient is the Marathon County Sheriff's Department "Paws Enforcing Laws" Program. "Paws Enforcing Laws" is completely self-funded — no tax dollars are used. They depend on the generosity of communities to help support their program. The raffle proceeds will go toward vet bills. equipment needs such as heat alarms systems for the squads, kennels for the vehicles, vests, and to help provide the ability to plan and prepare for the replacement of K9's when they retire. It is a source of great pride and honor that they do this completely through fundraising and donations. The balance of raffle proceeds go to support the club's Canine Ambassador Program and its Bite Prevention Program, which teaches kids (second graders, mostly) how to stay safe around dogs.

The event is a great spectator event and the show is a fun activity for families. It is also a great venue to talk to breed experts about topics such as training, grooming, and the right breed for your lifestyle and a great starting point to finding a responsible breeder.

greenhouse gases. They are also virtually silent, dramatically cutting down on noise pollution."

Aspirus said other henefits of the autonomous mowers include electric motors that are more efficient than combustion motors and require less energy and maintenance to operate; lightweight bodies that don't compact soil, allowing soil to absorb more water and reduce storm water runoff; and sharp blades that neatly cut grass, mulching it back into the ground and minimizing the need for fertilizers and chemicals.

"Not only do these autonomous mowers help reduce our carbon footprint, but they are also creating efficiencies for our grounds and landscape making teams. our landscaping maintenance cost effective. more enhancing the look of our campuses, and allowing maintenance staff who also provide grounds services focus more heavily critical assets and maintenance preventive programs within facilities," Miller said.

Aspirus purchased the autonomous mowers from Power House Lawn and Leisure in Merrill.

We appreciate collaboration we've shared with this local central Wisconsin business in making our autonomous mower initiative a reality," Miller said. "We're grateful to them for being such an excellent partner to us."

Plans are being developed to roll out autonomous

mowers at other Aspirus Health locations in the future, according to the release.





OCHD provides information on animal bites, rabies

Oneida County Department Health (OCHD) recently provided information on animal bites and rabies.

In a release, OCHD said it has conducted more than 40 animal bite and potential rabies exposure investigations in 2024.

"Rabies is a viral disease that affects the central nervous system and is typically transmitted through a bite from an infected animal," OCHD said. "Rabies is considered fatal if contracted."

Four bats have tested for rabies in Wisconsin this year. The counties involved are Columbia, Richland, Sauk, and St. Croix.

Symptoms of rabies include irritability, headache, fever, double vision, and itching or pain at the bite site. Later symptoms include spasms of the throat, convulsions, delirium, paralysis, and death.

OCHD provided the following tips to help stay safe from animal bites:

- Keep your pets current on rabies vaccinations.
- · Leave the handling of unfamiliar animals to professionals.
- Contact Wild Instincts or Northwoods Wildlife Center for wild animals that may need help.
- Contact the Oneida County Humane Society for domestic pets that may need help.
- Teach children to not approach unfamiliar animals.
- Never leave a young child alone with a pet.
- For bites and scratches: Clean the wound with
- lots of soap and water. Report the bite to law
- Contact your doctor or go to your local emergency room.

• If the animal has been or can be safely captured, hold onto the animal until OCHD can be consulted.

MOVIES YOU GOTTA SEE

Why The Breakfast Club might be the most enduring '80s movie

We've all been asked this question before: "What's your favorite '80s movie?"

I believe there's a distinction between an "80s movie" and "a movie that was released between 1980 and 1989." In taking a look back, the list of films I'd consider as being among my favorites of the decade ended up being longer than I expected. The Shining, The Empire Strikes Back, Raiders of the Lost Ark, Stand By Me, Back to the Future, Airplane!, Dead Poets Society, The Terminator, When Harry Met Sally..., Top Gun, Aliens, Do the Right Thing, Predator, The Goonies... the '80s were pretty stacked!

Even though all of those films came out in the 1980s, I wouldn't necessarily consider them '80s movies. Why not? Because, to me, the defining characteristic of a true '80s movie is the involvement of John Hughes.

I mentioned this in a column I wrote about Fargo last year, in talking about Midwestern movies: John Hughes' run from the mid-'80s through the early '90s is bananas. In this time, Hughes hammered out banger after banger, with several of them being definitive movies of the decade: Sixteen Candles, Pretty in Pink, Weird Science, Ferris Bueller's Day Off, and, my favorite of them all, and the one that might outlast the rest in both pop culture and the collective consciousness: 1985's The Breakfast Club.

To set the scene: It's March 24, 1984. Shermer High School. Shermer, Illinois. Five students, for various reasons, are forced to serve a day-long Saturday detention in the library.

On the surface, these characters couldn't be less alike. You have five pretty standard high school archetypes: the brainiac, Brian Johnson (Anthony Michael Hall); the athlete, Andrew Clark (Emilio Estevez); the quiet weird girl, Allison Reynolds (Ally Sheedy); the Prom Queen, Claire Standish (Molly Ringwald); and the rebellious hoodlum, John Bender (Judd Nelson).



I'm not sure if the average high school's social structure is quite as rigidly defined as $The\ Breakfast\ Club$ wants us to believe, but the film does a masterful job in telling us everything we need to know about these characters within a few minutes of meeting them. Well, as we come to find out, not everything – in fact, very little, and that's the brilliance of the movie.

When they walk into the library, the characters silently try to figure out where the others stand socially. Andrew identifies Claire as someone from the same side of the tracks and sits at her table. Brian sits behind Claire and Andrew at first, but immediately and without protest moves to the table to his left because John wants his spot, and Allison sits in the back. From the jump, they're separated by social class.

Enter Vice Principal Richard Vernon (Paul Gleason). Vernon runs his detentions like the Navy, and he makes it clear right away that he won't tolerate any tom foolery. He tells the students that they can't leave their seats, and to make sure they do something productive with their time, he gives them an assignment: They must each write a 1,000-word essay on "who they think they are."

Throughout the day, the students size each other up and butt heads, and through arguments and heart-to-hearts, they find out that despite their differences in upbringings and cliques, they all have more in common than they ever imagined.

A genius way Hughes demonstrates the characters' superficial dissimilarities is through their lunches. Claire has sushi, which is a pretty bougie lunch for a high schooler. Andrew's pulling sandwiches and milk and cookies and an assortment of other items out of what might be a bottomless brown paper bag, but the guy's a wrestler, so he needs the calories. All of the food groups are represented in Brian's lunch, a fact John's quick to mockingly point out. Allison has the lunch of a child left to their own devices - pure sugar. I mean, who among us hasn't washed down the occasional Pixie Stick and Captain Crunch sandwich with a crisp can of Coke? And John doesn't have lunch at all. The meals act as a representation of each character's home life, or at least, how it's perceived from the outside: high-class, goal-driven, sensible, manic, neglectful.

What makes the movie work is that each character gets their time in the limelight and under the microscope, and in learning about each other, they learn about themselves. We find out about Claire's parents' bad marriage; the toxic relationship Andrew has with his dad; the unbearable academic pressure Brian faces on the home front; Allison's empty, unsatisfying home life; and the physical, verbal, and emotional abuse John is subjected to on a daily basis. Heck, we even pull the curtain back on why Vernon's such a contemptible jerk all the time.

Years from now, I think *The Breakfast Club* could very well be the most enduring of Hughes' '80s movies because even adults can glean a thing or two from its surprisingly blunt and earnest exploration of high school-

aged people's emotional complexities. Sure, the music and fashion have aged, but the film's message is timeless. No one is *only* who they appear to be; everyone is more complicated and nuanced than meets the eye, with unique yet relatable problems, anxieties, and fears.

In the social framework of the teenage years, it might just be easier to morph yourself into who you think others want you to be in order to be accepted, rather than to live authentically and risk rejection. At 7 a.m., this was a bleak reality that the characters had accepted, but by that afternoon, they were ready to reject it altogether.

Each character wants to be loved and embraced for who they really are, even if they're still figuring out who that is. For these characters, it took a day in detention with strangers to realize they actually have agency in the process of self-discovery, and, that in order for others to achieve the same acceptance they're seeking, they themselves have to play an active part in it.

The end of the movie is a 450-foot home run, with the characters bucking Vernon by leaving behind a single letter instead of writing five separate essays.

"You see us as you want to see us – in the simplest terms and the most convenient definitions," Brian writes on behalf of the group. "But what we found out is that each one of us is a brain, and an athlete, and a basket case, a princess, and a criminal."

Were the characters all still friends on Monday? This is a question asked and answered with brutal honestly in the movie. But whether or not they were, there was bravery in their vulnerability; there was wisdom in knowing that their social structure was an illusion; and there was virtue in shattering it.

upon them and they are not a part of today's Agenda, but it seems general awareness of information that would be relevant and also I believe it is in the interest of transparency in this process. I want to be transparent to this process."

Following discussion of the original referendum asking voters if they would support a \$5 million increase in the tax levy for the next 5 years to fund the operations, maintenance, and debt service of Pine Crest - and two amendments seeking to modify that resolution first to \$1.5 million for 10 years and then to \$4.5 million for 5 years, both of which failed on roll call votes - the County Board then voted 8-11 against the resolution for a November referendum.

People for Pine Crest start online petition in Lincoln County against Renee Krueger, Lincoln

In response to the items on the A&L meeting Agenda, People for Pine Crest - a local grassroots group that has been opposed to the sale of Pine Crest Nursing Home to any outside entity and that desires to keep the nursing home Lincoln County owned - took to Facebook and announced they had started an online petition opposing the sale of Pine Crest. Offers to purchase spark new Dunphy lawsuit

Boyd's mention of Senior Management and another unsolicited buyer's interest in purchasing Pine Crest Nursing Home set events in motion that sparked a new Dunpy lawsuit. On Aug. 26, 2024, Dunphy filed a lawsuit

Renee Krueger. Lincoln Administrative Coordinator. The lawsuit asks the Court for a writ of mandamus directing Krueger to produce to Dunphy a copy of "the offer made to purchase Pine Crest Nursing Home by Senior Management, Inc. and the unsolicited offer to purchase Pine Crest Nursing Home made by an unidentified buyer." In Dunphy's filed Complaint. he alleges he requested the documents via an open records request to Krueger on Aug. 22 and was denied the request the same day "via e-mail asserting that the documents are not public records until negotiations are complete and that the Defendant believed the documents would be the subject of a closed session meeting." Dunphy cited

Wisconsin Statute 19.32(2) defining a record to include "any material ... kept by an authority" as the basis for his request and alleged "An offer to purchase a publicly owned nursing home is clearly a record within the meaning of Stat. 19.32(2)."

"The Defendant's refusal to allow inspection of public records is without authority and a brazen flouting of the Open Records Law," Dunphy's Complaint further alleged.

As of Aug. 27, Marathon County Circuit Court Judge Suzanne C. O'Neill had been assigned to the case, as Lincoln County judges were disqualified, having had previous working relationships with the parties.

County Board funding for Pine Crest

Regardless of what happens in closed

session at the A&L Committee meeting, any recommendation to sell Pine Crest or list Pine Crest for sale would need to go to the full County Board for approval.

In the meantime, the County Board needs to determine how it will fund the ongoing cost of operations, maintenance, and debt service for Pine Crest for 2025. Dunphy and members of the People for Pine Crest have suggested the nursing home could be self-sustaining insofar as operations and debt service are concerned based on recent increases in State Medicaid reimbursements based on 2023 financials and year-to-date financials. However, while the County is still under contract with North Central Health Care (NCHC) for the management of Pine Crest,

A&L the County must still pay any NCHC its annual \$440,000 payment. After receipt Crest of this payment, NCHC go to has then been paying the \$630,000 annual debt service on the Pine Crest expansion project; however, Lincoln to County is liable for the will payment if NCHC incurs an annual shortfall at the end of the year.

In addition, Lincoln County needs to provide ongoing maintenance of the Pine Crest facility and begin to address deferred maintenance, expenses they weren't planning to need to do for 2025, as it was anticipated the facility would no longer be Countyowned going into 2025. All that changed when the Asset Purchase Agreement with Senior Management was terminated the end of



The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is urging ATV/UTV enthusiasts to always recreate responsibly when hitting the trails.

"That means staying on designated routes, wearing a helmet and seatbelt, and keeping their speed in check," DNR said.

So far this year, 22 people have been killed in ATV/ UTV crashes, according to the DNR. [Note: That was prior to Labor Day weekend.] Most of them were not wearing seat beits or helmets, and alcohol and speed were also noted as contributing factors.

conservation wardens and county sheriff deputies noted that during this year's Think Smart Before You Start campaign, which occurred from Friday, Aug. 2 to Sunday, Aug. 4, 2024, many

individuals were observed not using proper safety equipment.

Anyone under the age of 18 is required by law to wear a helmet on an ATV or UTV, whether they're driving the machine or riding as a passenger. All passengers, regardless of age, must wear a seatbelt when riding in a UTV.

"We are continuing to observe young riders and passengers not wearing the safety equipment required by law," said Lt. Warden Jacob Holsclaw, DNR Off-Highway Vehicle Administrator. infractions not only result in citations, but they can also mean the difference between walking away from an accident or not."

"One of the best things ATV and UTV operators can do to operate safely is to take an online safety

course," DNR said.

Wisconsin law requires every operator involved in a crash incident to report the incident without

delay to law enforcement officials. In addition, within 10 days of the incident, the operator must submit a written report to the DNR.




