

WELCOME TO THE NORTHWOODS

Northern Wisconsin is a favorite Midwest vacation choice and thousands of people visit this area throughout the year.

This is just a glimpse into what there is to see and do here in the fall and winter. Downhill and cross country skiing, hiking, fat biking, exploring local museums and retail shops, touring a cranberry marsh, trying your luck at one of the area casinos, celebrating the holidays with a small town flair – and of course, tasting the local cuisine – those activities and more are listed in these pages.

Discover the rich logging history of Rhinelander, Crandon and Laona. The new town name came from the railroad's president, F.W. Rhinelander.

Explore the lakes in and around the Presque Isle, Mercer, Boulder Junction and Manitowish Waters area. Recreation areas including the Northern Highland-American Legion State Forest offer plenty of wildlife viewing.

Eagle River, Three Lakes, St. Germain, Land O'Lakes, Conover and Sayner-Star Lake area are premier tourist destinations that also boast a diverse heritage. German, Swedish, Irish, Polish, Norwegian and English settlers came to the region in the early 1900s. Their various cultural influences remain today.

Be sure to check out the Lakeland area, which includes Minocqua, Lac du Flambeau, Arbor Vitae, Woodruff, Lake Tomahawk and Hazelhurst. These communities all came into existence during the logging industry's heyday. However, the area has long been the vacation spot of choice for generations of families.

Natural beauty, such as the Wisconsin River flowing through town, as well as a wide variety of shops, restaurants, popular parks and trails make Tomahawk a must-visit destination for your northern Wisconsin vacation.



ATV/UTV trails provide opportunity to experience Lincoln County's scenic Harrison Hills

Those looking for a Northwoods getaway have the opportunity to experience a scenic Lincoln County area up close and personal.

On land owned and managed by Lincoln County, roughly 50 miles of ATV/UTV trails wind through the Harrison Hills. The Harrison Hills Trail is a two-way trail system primarily utilizing existing logging roads, traversing glacial moraines and upland hardwoods. Riders will see cedar swamps, small creeks and lakes throughout the hilly terrain.

The Lincoln County Forestry Department cautions that due to the area's hilly topography, there are many sharp curves and steep segments.

"These terrain features not only make the Harrison Hills Trail scenic, but result in a trail that may be challenging for some riders and certainly not a high speed trail," the Forestry Department says. Depending on trail conditions, the summer ATV trail system opens on May 1, and the majority of the trail system closes on Dec. 1 each year.

The Forestry Department says most of the trail system is also open to roadlicensed vehicles, mountain bikers, hikers and other recreationists.

"The summer ATV trail segments north of County Hwy. D intersecting with Theis Rd. and Bowman Rd. are gated and not open to highwaylicensed vehicles," the Forestry Department states. "Immediately north of County Hwy. D, the ATV trail crosses private property for approximately one-half mile. Near the community of Harrison, there are two trail segments that also cross private land. These trail segments crossing private land are only open to ATV/UTV use and are closed to ATVs earlier than Dec. 1."

There are several parking areas that provide direct access to the trail

system: three-quarters of a mile north of County Hwy. J on Turtle Lake Rd.; one and one-quarter miles northwest of State Hwy. 17 on County Hwy. B; and one and one-half miles south of Harrison on County Hwy. B.

The Harrison Hills trail system is also connected to trail systems in Langlade and Oneida counties.

The Forestry Department notes that all machines utilizing the Harrison Hills trail system must be registered and have a functioning muffler and spark arrestor.

"ATV safety education is a positive move towards a safe and enjoyable ATVing future," the Forestry Department says, adding that all operators, including nonresidents who are at least 12 years old and who are born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, must obtain a DNR safety certificate.

Ctober in the Wisconsin Northwoods is a time to celebrate cranberries.



Build it, groom it and they will come

Rhinelander organization strives to make silent trails for everyone

Silent sports have been popular in the Northwoods for decades. Well before the pandemic sent Americans outdoors in search of fresh air, a group of Rhinelander area silent sports enthusiasts banded together to support and encourage non-motorized use of public lands.

The nonprofit Rhinelander Area Silent Trails Association has worked to promote, sustain and improve local hiking, biking, snowshoe and ski trails for more than 20 years. With five trail systems in the Rhinelander area, silent sports can be enjoyed nearly year round.

"All of these sports are growing in popularity in recent years," said Laura McFarland, RASTA board president. "Mountain biking in particular has really taken off. RASTA has been adding trails throughout the years, and in addition to adding mountain bike trails, they've been grooming more and more for fat biking in the winter – which in and of itself is growing exponentially in popularity."

McFarland began informally working with RASTA 14 years ago when she and her husband relocated to the area, picking up sticks on the trails and other volunteer work. About 18 months ago McFarland joined the board as president.

"I'm a huge mountain biker as well as a recreational cross country skier; enjoy snowshoeing, hiking, all of the above," McFarland said. "I really gravitate toward the trails; they provide an opportunity to enjoy the Northwoods in all its glory and commune with nature."

The group's list of accomplishments is staggering. They include:

- 37 miles of single track bike trails
- 30 miles of groomed ski trails
- 17 miles of groomed fat tire trails
- 8 miles of designated snowshoe trails over four trail systems

For two decades, RASTA's blood, sweat and tears have been shed to ensure silent sports can be enjoyed by people of all ages and abilities.

"Groups like RASTA have invested quite a bit in the infrastructure and have really focused on increasing accessibility to folks of all abilities," McFarland noted. "Historically. mountain biking was been pretty hard core. Basically, people on early mountain bikes were riding what were hiking trails, so they were really grinding over rocks and roots and navigating these turns that weren't designed to be ridden. Now days, RASTA and other organizations like us are spending up to \$30,000 a mile to create these machine built ribbons of dirt in the forest that are more accessible to beginner riders. I think that's really helped, and you're seeing it in the next generation of mountain bikers."

Looking for a winter treat? McFarland recommends hopping on a fat bike and hit the Enterprise or Mud Lake trails.

"It's such a unique way to see the landscape in the winter," McFarland said. "Our Enterprise Trail System as well as our Mud Lake Trail System go through some pretty amazing ecotypes – through bogs that you can't access in the summertime without being up to your knees in sphagnum and mud, but in the winter time you can float through those effortlessly though those tamarack swamps. And it's really breathtaking and a beautiful and a quiet way to enjoy the landscape."

of Rhinelander, on gently rolling topography includes hardwoods, aspen, pine, and the oh-so-popular cedar swamp. Several private landowners allow access to their property to make this trail system available. **There are no restroom** facilities. Dogs are permitted. No foot traffic without wearing snowshoes.

• Over 8 miles of mostly hand-built technical single track for mountain biking in the summer and fat biking and snowshoeing in the winter.


SUMMER
