Red wave

Rep. Pat Snyder defeated challenger Yee Leng Xiong in an election night that largely went Republicans' way nationally





Pat Snyder won his fifth election to state office Tuesday amidst an election that largely went Republicans' way nationally.

Snyder defeated challenger Yee Leng Xiong, director of the Hmong American Center and local politician, earning 53% of the vote in the 85th District State Assembly race.

Tuesday's results were Snyder's tightest win of his four previous victories, coming after the state redrew its maps in an attempt to make them less gerrymandered. Snyder himself had to move in order to stay in the district.

Snyder in a candidate forum emphasized the need to fix child care issues in Wisconsin, and he's been speaking to county committees on the issue when it comes up. Snyder in the forum said he supported a measure similar to Michigan in which the state helps fund small in-home child care providers and also supported a plan to assist businesses that create child care for their employees.

District 7 Congressman Tom Tiffany

also won re-election against challenger Kyle Kilbourn, garnering 63% of the vote in the largely rural district.

Snyder's and Xiong's spending through September were largely similar, though Tiffany raised nearly five times the funding that Kilbourn did.

Three Republicans at the county level walked into their positions Tuesday, though two faced heated primary battles last summer. Kim Trueblood was reelected county clerk after a challenge from Toshia Ronallo in the Republican primary. And Treasurer Connie Beyersdorf was reelected after having fended off challenger Jen Seliger last August.

Jennifer Lemmer was elected as the county register of deeds and Kyle Mayo was elected as district attorney. Neither faced a challenger in either the primary or the general election Tuesday.

Mayo will replace current District Attorney Theresa Wetzsteon, who did not seek re-election to the position.

Wisconsinites also overwhelmingly

supported a ballot measure that would amend the state constitution to allow only U.S. citizens to vote. That measure passed with 70% of the vote total.

The elections came on the backdrop of a strong Donald Trump victory. Trump held a decisive electoral college lead and appeared to be winning the popular vote as of press time.

Sheriff's Office warns of scam pretending to be deputies

Sheriff's Office officials say there is a new scam that's going around - and it includes people pretending to be them.

The Marathon County Sheriff's Office is warning residents about a new scam in which people pretend to be representing the sheriff's office. The scammers then claim the person they're calling owes money to the sheriff's office and that they could go to jail if they don't pay the money immediately.

Sheriff's Office officials say no one from the department will ask for someone to pay money over the phone, or threaten someone with being jailed if they don't immediately pay over the phone.

Anyone receiving such a message should report it to the Marathon County Sheriff's Office.

Legal bills skyrocket in Kronenwetter

Kronenwetter officials will be seeking out a new law firm as legal bills in the village have skyrocketed.

According to village board member Nate Myszka, the village has spent \$120,000 in legal bills so far this year. That's most of the village's legal budget for the year, with only \$80 left in the fund for any further legal expenses.

Those bills include defending the village against a lawsuit filed by village board member Ken Charneski against contracted village attorney Lee Turonie, former interim administrator Kim Manley and current village clerk Bobbi Jo Birk LaBarge.

A judge recently ruled against awarding any damages or costs to Charneski. He had previously dismissed Turonie from the case, agreeing with Turonie's argument that as a contracted attorney he is not subject to open records laws.

The board last month voted to start putting out requests for proposals from legal firms for legal services, hoping to save the village money for those expenses going forward

Kronenwetter's finance director resigns

Kronenwetter's finance director resigned last week, according to copies of her resignation obtained by City Pages.

Lisa Kerstner in an email to the village board told them her last day would be Nov. 12. She did not give a reason for leaving her post.

Kerstner was the latest of at least three people to hold that post since 2020, and the latest of more than a dozen department heads to flee the village in that time.

Her resignation comes a few months after Peter Kampfer resigned as village administrator after only months on the job. Kampfer was the second administrator to start and resign in the village in 2024 — Leonard Ludi also briefly served as village administrator for several months after working as the village's public works director.

US DOJ monitored WI polling locations Tuesday

U.S. law enforcement monitored Wausau polling locations and other locations in the Western District, the U.S. Department of Justice says.

Those officials monitored polling locations in Wausau, and the towns of Thornapple and Lawrence in the Western District, according to the U.S. Department of Justice. Any infractions of federal election laws will be reported to the authorities, according to a DOJ press release.

The press release did not say why additional monitoring was being added to



those locations, and the press release has no contact information for further questions.

Wausau made national news when Wausau Mayor Doug Diny removed an absentee ballot dropbox from the steps of city hall and put it out of public sight. The incident eventually sparked a state DOJ investigation, which resulted in Diny's home and office being raided.

A Wausau couple since has filed a Wisconsin Elections Complaint against city clerk Kaitlyn Bernarde, pointing out several of her actions around the ballot box don't comport with best practices advocated by the state, including that the ballot box should only be for ballots, and not a multi-purpose box.

A federal court in early October filed a preliminary injunction against the town of Thornapple to comply with voting access laws, saying the town didn't provide the same private voting opportunity that it did for able-bodied residents.

No information is available on why the US DOJ might be monitoring the town of Lawrence.

Weston man who fired gun during domestic incident headed to prison


A Weston man convicted of firing a gun as a felon during a domestic incident is headed to federal prison.

A Western Federal District judge sentenced Shawn Hignite, 50, to three years of federal prison after Hignite fired a gun during a domestic incident in January.

Police say they were called to Hignite's We ston home after receiving reports of a gunshot fired during a domestic abuse incident. Hignite denied a gun was fired initially, but after obtaining a search warrant police say they found a loaded handgun in the house and a spent shell casing in the backyard.


Hignite later admitted to possessing and firing the gun.

Because of past felony incidents, Hignite was forbidden from possessing any fire-

Baldwin looks to have hung on to her senate seat in a tight race Tuesday



Dem U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin early this morning declared victory after Milwaukee's final tally of its absentee ballots pushed her to a nearly 16,000-vote lead over GOP businessman Eric Hovde.

Baldwin's campaign said it expected that margin to grow as communities such as Oshkosh and Racine reported their final results.

With 97% of precincts reporting, Baldwin had 49.2% of the vote, compared to Hovde's 48.7%. That was a margin of just less than 16,000 votes.

If Baldwin's margin holds up, she will be the first Wisconsin candidate for U.S. Senate since 1968 to win an election when the nominee for the other party won the presidential race. Dem Gaylord Nelson that year won reelection even as Republican Richard Nixon took Wisconsin's electoral votes in a landslide national election.

Along with longtime Libertarian activist Phil Anderson, who ran under the Disrupt the Corruption banner, Phil Leager of the America First Party, was on the ballot. Dems

helped Leager qualify for the Wisconsin ballot, and he had about 28,000 votes in unofficial returns, while Anderson had more than 41,000.

Before Milwaukee and other central county communities released their results, Hovde told supporters at his election night party to go home because "We need a little more time to work through this process."

"It's unfortunate. If the Democrats wouldn't have put a plant, this probably would've been called some time ago. But you know what? It is what it is," Hovde said.

Baldwin, Hovde and the groups backing them spent more than \$240 million on ads alone since Jan. 1. That surpassed the previous Wisconsin record for all spending that Open Secrets had tracked of nearly \$225 million in the 2022.

Baldwin and her backers had an advantage of about \$18 million in ad spending for the full race. But Hovde's side had a significant spending advantage from late September on as the GOP-aligned Senate Leadership Fund jumped into the Wisconsin race.

Dems pick up state senate seats

Dems picked up three seats in the state Senate on Tuesday — including knocking off GOP state Sens. Joan Ballweg and Duey Stroebel — as they kept the door open to taking a run at flipping control of the chamber in 2026.

They also led in early returns in a fourth seat that would mark a clean sweep of the contested races on Tuesday's ballot.



With Republicans now looking at an 18-15 majority to start the 2025-26 session, Dems would need to net two seats in the 2026 elections to win back control of the chamber for the first time since a brief period in 2012.

By early this morning, Dems Jodi Habush Sinykin, Sarah Keyeski and Jamie Wall had all declared victory.

Meanwhile, Dem Appleton Ald. Kristin Alfheim was leading in early returns in the 18th SD.

Spending in top legislative races soars past \$75M

The price tag for the 8th SD has already surpassed \$10.2 million, topping the previous state record set in the Milwaukee-area district when it was the site of a recall election 13 years ago, a WisPolitics review shows.

And the tab will likely be even higher once final spending reports are filed with the state in early January.

The race between Dem attorney Jodi Habush Sinykin and GOP state Sen. Duey Stroebel isn't the only one producing eye-popping numbers in the 2024 campaign. Two other state Senate races have already topped \$6 million, while five Assembly contests have crossed the \$5 million threshold.

In all, WisPolitics has tracked \$27.2 million in five state Senate races and \$54.9 million in 13 Assembly campaigns.

The money race is a confluence of the new maps that gave Dems a path to the majority and the interest megadonors have taken in shaping the legislative contests.

In the state Senate races, the money race has largely favored Dems.

The WisPolitics review found Habush Sinykin and the groups backing her have put more than \$8 million into the race. Meanwhile, Stroebel, R-Saukville, and those supporting him have dropped almost \$2.2 million.

The effort has been fueled, in part, by a GOP rewrite of campaign finance laws in 2015. The rewrite didn't impose any restrictions on the size of donations that legislative campaign committees can receive and allowed them to make unlimited transfers to candidates.

The previous spending record for a legislative race was nearly \$10 million in 2011 as former GOP state Sen. Alberta Darling beat back a recall attempt, according to the Wisconsin Democracy Campaign. Darling had a window during that campaign in which she was able to accept unlimited donations, as allowed under state law. Still, she and Dem Sandy Pasch spent just more than \$2 million in that race, with the outside groups accounting for the rest, according to the Wisconsin Democracy Campaign.

The County wants to raise taxes while sitting on millions in reserves

Marathon County has more than \$64 MILLION in EXCESS Reserves and still wants to raise your property

Call or Email your County Supervisor and ask them to cut \$1.6 million from the proposed 2025 property tax increase AND rescind the County wheel tax. The \$64M+ in EXCESS reserves are just from the County's General Fund, Social Improvement Fund, and Highway Fund and DOES NOT include the normal fund balance reserves needed for working capital.

The County's Policy is to have a minimum Fund Balance of 8.3% of the current Budgeted Expenditures of the General Fund, Social Service Fund, and Debt Service Fund and 10% of the Budgeted Expenditures of the Highway Fund. I don't believe that these percentages provide adequate working capital, so I used 25% in my calculations to provide a higher cash cushion. Using the higher 25% number, I calculate \$30,256,598 in recommended reserves out of the total \$103,237,090 available fund balance (per Audit, year end 2023) for just these 4 County Funds.

I subtracted off the \$8,000,000 that the County recently agreed to loan Bug Tussel when calculating the EXCESS reserves. I did not add in any of the \$10,384,837 surplus that the County has generated in 2024 through 8/31/24 as we don't currently know the actual end of year 2024 results.

To get a sense of the magnitude of Marathon County's EXCESS reserves, the County could totally eliminate the entire proposed \$59,851,312 of 2025 County Property Tax (which I am NOT recommending) and would be expected to still have over \$4 million in EXCESS reserves at the end of 2025.

The \$64+ million in EXCESS Reserves doesn't even take in account any excess funds that may be in the \$16.6M

Grant Fund, the \$16.4M Capital Improvement Fund, the \$6.6M Insurance Fund, or the \$11.4M Employee Benefits

The combined proposed tax reduction and wheel tax removal would only use about 10% of the excess reserves in the four funds. At this rate it would take 10 years to draw down the EXCESS reserves, but it would at least be a small step in the right direction.



FRAUD CASES IN WISCONSIN

Below is a list of people who have been prosecuted for pandemic relief fraud by the United States Attorney's Office of the Western and Eastern Districts of Wisconsin.

Both U.S. Attorney's Offices in Wisconsin told The Badger Project they will continue to work on prosecuting people for defrauding COVID-19 relief funds.

Ahmad Kanan of Madison

Ahmad Kanan was sentenced to 42 months in federal prison and ordered to pay \$147,060 in restitution for CARES Act fraud and access device fraud, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Western District of Wisconsin. Kanan applied for two business loans using a false spelling of his name and indicated that he was not under indictment when, in fact, he had been charged with access device fraud in an unrelated case. Kanan pleaded guilty in both cases in 2020.

Olivia Spellman of Janesville

Olivia Spellman was indicted on seven counts of mail fraud for a scheme to collect unemployment benefits, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Western District of Wisconsin. She used the names of other individuals to obtain \$506,097 from ten states. Spellman pleaded guilty to one count on Oct. 11, 2023, and was sentenced to 16 months in prison. She was ordered to pay \$506,097 in restitution.

Sharon Johnson of Madison

Sharon Johnson was charged with two counts of wire fraud and one count of money laundering related to applications for PPP and EIDL, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office. Johnson received \$109,773 as a result of the fraudulent applications in which she provided false information regarding a company incorporated by her in 2018, according to a press release from the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Western District of Wisconsin. She pleaded guilty to one count of $\frac{1}{2}$ wire fraud and one count of money

Eric Upchurch of Madison

Eric Upchurch was charged with five counts of wire fraud and one count of money laundering in July 2023, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office. Upchurch obtained over \$400,000 as a result of the wire fraud in which he provided false information and concealed some material facts for PPP loan applications, the U.S. Attorney's Office alleges. A trial is scheduled for June.

Stephen Smith of Milwaukee

Stephen Smith received over \$600,000 in small business loans through applications to an insured financial institution on behalf of three different companies, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Western District of Wisconsin. Providing false and misleading statements about the companies' respective payroll expenses, Smith directed his co-conspirators to send him portions of the funds. Smith pleaded guilty to bank fraud in 2021 and was sentenced to three years in prison. He was also ordered to pay \$397,500 in

Thomas Smith of Pewaukee

Thomas Smith admitted fraudulently receiving over \$1.2 million in business loans through applications to an insured financial institution on behalf of eight different companies, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Western District of Wisconsin. Smith made numerous false and misleading statements about the companies' payroll expenses and directed his co-conspirators to send him portions of the funds. Smith pleaded guilty to one count of bank fraud in 2021 and was sentenced to 57 months in prison. He was ordered to pay \$960,000 in restitution.

Nikki Brown of Milwaukee

Nikki Brown was sentenced to 33 months in federal prison for stealing nearly \$500,000 in unemployment benefits, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Western District of Wisconsin. Brown recruited third parties to file fraudulent unemployment claims in six states and convinced people to give her their personal information to file fraudulent unemployment claims. Brown pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud.

Milwaukee street gang the Wild 100s

Members of a Milwaukee street gang known as the Wild 100s, 30 in total, were charged for their role in a scheme involving millions in fraudulently obtained pandemic unemployment insurance benefits. The funds were used to solicit murder for hire and to purchase firearms, controlled substances, jewelry and vacations, according to a press release from the U.S. Attorney's Office of Eastern District of Wisconsin. Two members, Ronnell Bowman and Ronnie Jackson, are accused of arranging and executing a murder for pay in 2021.

The charges against the following 27 defendants have been revealed as the indictment is unsealed, while the charges against three additional defendants remained sealed pending their arrests.

Unemployment Insurance fraud

The Government Accountability Office estimates that as much as \$135 billion of the total amount of unemployment benefits paid - about 15 percent - was illegally claimed. The unprecedented demand for benefits and the need to quickly implement new programs increased the risk of improper payments, including those due to fraud, according to the Government Accountability Office.

"At the peak of the pandemic, with people losing their jobs, the Department of Labor and the state workforce agencies that channeled the unemployment insurance benefit were trying to get money out as quickly as possible, and that was done almost exclusively by removing to relaxing the controls they had in place," Bagdoyan said. "If you remove controls, there's an inverse relationship to risk."

Wisconsin reported incurring \$39.3 million in fraudulent UI pandemic benefit overpayments and has recovered 11% of the amount, or \$4.3 million, according to Bagdoyan.

Resetting Inheritance Expectations

Tens of trillions of dollars are expected to pass from older Americans to younger Americans over the next two decades. However, research shows a growing disconnect between how much children expect to receive and how much their parents plan on leaving them. More than half of millennials say they expect to inherit approximately \$350,000 or more from their aging parents but a study found only 22 percent of baby boomers said they expect to leave an inheritance. Part of this disconnect is that parents are not communicating with their family about their inheritances.

You generally have no right to be included in your parents' estate plan. However, if you believe something nefarious happened, such as somebody taking advantage of a parent and convincing them to change their plan, you should speak up. I'll discuss your disinheritance rights and options in the coming weeks.




