Park swing

Mayor Diny proposes a separate parks department under public works, causes stir among council members



The city's Parks Department rarely gets heated — but the temperature rose at Monday's meeting in response to a new proposal by Mayor Doug Diny to overhaul how the

department. Diny's proposal? To separate the city's parks department from the county's and handle its parks

city handles its parks

services in-house, possibly putting it under the city's Department of Public Works. That, Diny said, would save between \$400,000 and \$500,000 in reduced costs, largely from reducing redundancy.

The proposal took city council members, including those on the city Parks Committee, by surprise. The proposal was added to the packet materials for the Monday night meeting, and many parks committee members said they heard about it from news media for the first time, which took them off guard.

The city since 1974 has shared a parks department with the county, and the joint parks department since then has handled all the county's parks and the city's parks. The Parks Committee earlier this year started looking at potential changes in how it handles the governing structure of the parks — the city has its own parks committee but the county has a Parks Commission that includes three city council members.

Originally, that commission was supposed to govern everything, but the city eventually added its own committee, so now the commission only handles county

parks matters. Some city leaders said it didn't really make much sense for city members to be on that commission just to weigh in on county issues.

But no one expected a proposal to detach the parks department, which is opposite the trend more common these days: municipalities combining their efforts to save money. The most recent example includes the new Mountain Bay Metropolitan Police Department, which combines the Everest Metro and Rothschild Police Departments.

The proposal sparked several heated exchanges between the mayor and Parks Committee members, who questioned why they weren't given a heads up on the proposal and lamented they were caught flat-footed by media inquiries.

And many of them questioned where the numbers came from to back up the savings figures. The city's finance director MaryAnne Groat says she wasn't tasked with running any kind of financial analysis on the proposal and said a consultant to weigh those numbers would cost between \$40,000 and \$90,000.

Director Jamie Polley explained that it's much more complicated than meets the

eye. The county handles all the hiring of seasonal staff with a much bigger human resources department, for instance.

Diny explained that the proposal was meant to be the start of a discussion around the idea. More specific numbers and analysis would be needed to determine if the proposal made any sense.

Police make huge southwest side meth bust

Police seized a huge amount of meth in a bust on the city's southwest side Friday, according to police reports.

The Wausau PD's Community Resource Unit, with help from the Central Wisconsin Narcotics Task Force, seized more than 170 grams of meth from a residence on the southwest side of Wausau, according to a Facebook post on the Wausau Police Department's website.

That bust came on a day when police made multiple arrests for meth and other drugs throughout the city.

According to the police log, police arrested a 31-year-old man on charges that included possession of meth, drug paraphernalia and carrying a concealed knife in the 600 block of River Drive; arrested a 36-year-old man on charges of possession of meth in the 700 block of McClellan Street; arrested a 28-year-old woman on charges possession of meth with intent to sell in the 800 block of Third Avenue; and arrested a 51-year old man on charges of possession of meth with intent to sell in the 300 block of Forest Street.

Wasps shut down city pool; others get extension

A wasp infestation shut down one of the city pools a little earlier than expected — but other pools will be extended, city officials say.

Kaiser Pool, one of three Wausau city pools, closed on Sunday after wasps took up residence in the slide tower and staff were unable to remove the little buggers.

Parks officials say the city instead has extended the season for the other two pools — Memorial and Schulenberg — to Aug. 11, a week later than they would ordinarily close for the season.

94.7 brings back rock and roll

Longtime Wausau radio station 94.7FM rebranded to rock and roll, Midwest Communications officials say.

The station had been rock but rebranded to variety hits in 2021. But many people urged the station to switch back to rock, and so starting July 25 the station started playing music from bands such as AC/DC, Nirvana, Five Finger Death Punch and more.

Air combat training will increase air activity in Marathon County

More than 1,000 military personnel will be participating in a major air combat exercise — and authorities say that could mean increased military activity in several counties including Marathon.

Marathon County Sheriff's Office officials say the Northern Lightning Counterland exercises will be conducted from Aug. 5 to Aug. 16 at the Volk Field Combat Readiness Training Center. That will involve 1,100 military personnel from the Air Force, National Guard and Marine Corps.

The training will include some of the most advanced military aircraft including the F-35A and F-35C, and the F-16.

The training will mean increased military flight activity across 22 counties in Wisconsin, including Marathon, Portage and Wood counties in central Wisconsin.

Former mayoral candidate starts GiveSendGo campaign for legal fees

A former mayoral candidate cited with disorderly conduct following an allegedly racist incident has started a fundraising campaign to pay for his legal fees.

Christopher Wood, who ran in the mayoral primary in spring after making anti-Semitic conspiracy theory speeches last summer at Concerts on the Square, was cited last month in an incident at a gas station in which he used the N word in an altercation numerous times.

Wood started a campaign on GiveSendGo to raise money for his legal fees. Wood set a goal of \$15,000 - as of late Wednesday morning he had raised a little more than \$2,000 of that goal.

Wood is facing disorderly conduct charges stemming from the incident. Police say he commented to the woman of a mixed-race couple that she ought to find someone white instead, causing an altercation in which Wood used the N word multiple times, and later used the word with an officer.

Wood on social media said he thought he should be covered via the First Amendment, and says he intends to fight the charges. The fundraiser is meant to raise money for his defense.

The Marathon County District Attorney also filed a hate crime modifier with the disorderly conduct charge, which carries increased penalties. Wood on his fundraising site says he is seeking legal advice related to the charges.

Wisconsin campaigning

Bon Iver, Baldwin slated to join Harris in Eau Claire Stump Wednesday; Vance to appear in separate, counter event

Indie folk band Bon Iver and U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin will be in Eau Claire tomorrow for Vice President Kamala Harris' rally featuring her running mate, Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz.

Meanwhile, GOP vice presidential nominee JD Vance will be in the western Wisconsin city to speak with reporters as part of Donald Trump's effort to counterprogram this week's campaign swing for Harris and Walz. Vance will make stops in the same states on the same days that Harris and her running mate will be there throughout this week.

The actual event happened after City Pages's deadline.

Harris kicks off the tour today in Philadelphia. It will be her sixth visit to Wisconsin of 2024 and the second since she was endorsed by Biden to be the party's standard-bearer. It will be Vance's first campaign stop in the state since appearing at the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, where he was introduced as Trump's running mate.

And it will be the second straight Harris rally in the state that Baldwin will attend. She also helped introduce Harris at a Milwaukee-area event shortly after Biden dropped out of the race.

Before that, Baldwin had missed a Biden event in Madison as he sought to make up for a much-criticized debate appearance. She last attended a state event with him in January. Baldwin spokesperson Andrew Mamo said Baldwin was happy to join Biden at the January event to announce federal funding for a bridge between Superior and Duluth and is looking forward to welcoming Harris back to the state.

["]Above all, Tammy is running her own campaign comparing her record of fighting for working Wisconsinites against Eric Hovde's record of insulting our families," Mamo said.

Cooke, Shankland trade barbs as campaign heats up

Rep. Katrina Shankland, D-Stevens Point, knocked 3rd CD primary rival Rebecca Cooke after a group backing Cooke's campaign started running an ad claiming Shankland is "working for Republicans, not you."

Cooke's campaign fired back that Shankland needs to answer for her record on health care as attacks between the candidates escalated two weeks out from the Aug. 13 primary, which will decide who faces off against incumbent U.S. Rep. Derrick Van Orden, R-Prairie du Chien, in November.

Shankland spoke yesterday on a media call with U.S. Rep. Mark Pocan, D-Town of Vermont, and Sen. Jeff Smith, D-Brunswick, who have endorsed her campaign. She argued the ad could have a negative ripple effect on other Dems in the region.





"It is harmful to our democracy when so much dark money comes into a Democratic primary, some of which is used to attack a longstanding lawmaker's legislative record, and it isn't just my record, it's many other Democrats, some of whom are in vulnerable positions in the third congressional district," Shankland said.

Evers taps DHS to use covid funds to boost care workers' wages

Gov. Tony Evers announced today he's directing the Department of Health Services to use \$258 million in COVID-19 funds to boost wages for direct care workers and providers serving older adults and individuals with disabilities.

The guv's office said in making the move, Wisconsin is joining 20 other states that have a minimum fee schedule for home and community-based services. It establishes the minimum that managed care organizations must pay providers for certain adult long-term care services and impacts several Medicaid programs.

DHS estimates the move will mean a 15% rate increase for most in-home services and 40.5% for those provided at residential facilities.

"Our healthcare workers have faced significant challenges these past few years, and these investments will go a long way toward helping make sure workers receive the support and fair compensation they deserve," Evers said. "While this is an important step in helping us be able to recruit, train, and retain talented folks in our healthcare workforce, it's going to be critical for these investments to continue



in our next biennial budget so we can address chronic challenges and continue building a strong, stable healthcare industry for the future."

According to Evers' office, the minimum fee schedule creates a list of the lowest prices that managed care organizations can pay for services. In doing so, DHS can require those organizations to pass along the rate increase to providers.

Elections commission seeks waiver from ERIC letter

The state Elections Commission in a costsaving move unanimously agreed to seek a waiver from the Electronic Registration Information Center to avoid sending a required mailer to eligible voters who are not registered.

The mailer — projected to cost \$92,550 — is required as part of the commission's membership in ERIC. The organization allows states to cross-reference voting records to identify issues such as those voting in more than one state.

The savings from receiving a waiver would both cover an increase in the state's membership fee to belong to ERIC and to use alternative methods to reach those who aren't registered.

ERIC, which allows states to share data to help remove from their voter rolls those who have died or moved to other states, became a target for some Republicans after Donald Trump lost the 2020 election. That includes complaints over its goal of getting more people registered to vote, as well as conspiracy theories about its funding.

The lead replacement program erases an earlier bad choice

The article entitled "Lead locked" in the July 25 issue emphasized how the replacement of lead service lines is being paid for. It provided interesting insights into how state and federal funding works in this case.

The Romans knew that lead was toxic. It was responsible for known medical conditions in those times. Lead was associated with miners' illnesses in the 17th century. In 1991, the US Environmental Protection Agency promulgated the "Lead and Copper Rule." As a result, signs went up at drinking fountains in many public buildings recommending that the water run for a while before taking a drink.

We should not have used lead for drinking water service in the first place, but we did. Due to inflation and the time value of money, the replacement is costing more now than if we had attacked the problem decades ago. I am pleased that this replacement is finally happening. It is time.

Let us use this present situation to galvanize the political will to address other environmental issues in a timely manner.

When an Adult Child is a Tenant

Today more young adults are living at home with their parents than at any time since the 1940s.

Tenants have legal rights under landlord-tenant laws. A child who is a legal tenant would have the right to the eviction process and a court hearing.

County primary battle

Tuesday features contested races for the Republican nomination for county clerk and county treasurer

This Tuesday, Aug. 13, Marathon County voters will have two choices for county clerk and county treasurer. Incumbent County Clerk Kim Trueblood will face off against challenger Toshia Ranallo and incumbent County Treasurer Connie Beyersdorff will face off against challenger Jen Seliger. All are on the Republican ticket, but all candidates City Pages spoke to said they wouldn't take partisanship into their positions. Winners will go on to the November election.

MARATHON County Clerk

Marathon County Clerk Kim Trueblood is facing a primary challenger in Marathon County Executive Assistant Toshia Ranallo on the Republican ticket. Both say they're committed to approaching the position in a non-partisan fashion, as elections need to be handled fairly. And while it may seem odd that county elected positions such as county clerk, county treasurer and county sheriff are technically partisan positions, county parties haven't historically paid much attention to these races.

From interviewing both candidates, it's clear that this race for the Republican primary is more heated than perhaps a November Republican/Democrat contest would be.

> Ranallo, 49, has worked as the county's executive assistant since 2020, and worked in Conservation, Planning and Zoning before that starting in 2018. In total, Ranallo says, she has worked in

municipal government for 17 years. That includes being a municipal clerk for the village of Wausaukee in Marinette County.

Ranallo says she is passionate about election integrity, efficient record keeping and working more closely with municipal clerks. Ranallo says she's running because she doesn't think the current clerk is doing those things.

Trueblood, 53, was appointed to the county clerk position in 2019 in a controversial county board meeting that brought up some delinquent payment charges she faced. Trueblood was then elected unopposed in 2020, serving in the role since.

Trueblood worked in the office since 2018, working under long-time clerk Nan Kottke. Trueblood says that Kottke was in the role for so long that she had perfected the processes, and Trueblood adopted those practices. She then updated some procedures for modern technology, such as posting a candidate tracker via Google spreadsheets during election run-ups so reporters and other interested parties could simply access the list to find out who is running.

Before joining the county, Trueblood worked as a school teacher.

Trueblood says she was surprised to learn that she had a primary opponent, and didn't have good things to say about Ranallo's motivations. "She said she needed to advance her career and didn't know any other way to do it," Trueblood told me. I followed up with Ranallo about that comment.

Ranallo did admit that the position would be an advancement of her career, but she says that isn't the only reason she is running. Ranallo said she approached Trueblood to inform her she had decided to run, and said that Trueblood's response was "less than professional."

"She tried to discourage me with comments such as, 'Don't waste your time, don't embarrass yourself, because I know a lot of people; What makes you think the Municipal Clerk's around here will support you?' Ranallo says.

Ranallo said Trueblood approached her the next day and apologized.

Trueblood took offense at Ranallo's suggestion of making the county clerk's office more open and transparent. Trueblood said she felt she's done a pretty good job with transparency. And she says she has many of the municipal clerks behind her in support.

Ranallo says one of her ideas is to have a quarterly meeting with other clerks in the county, in order to hear their concerns and get information out on a regular basis. And, she says, she could gain insights from them as well.

And, she would like to see more detailed minutes taken in county meetings - she said she would like to see them become more detailed to better reflect a more

accurate record of the meetings.

Trueblood said the current way county staff takes minutes is from the guidance of the Wisconsin Counties Association and from the county's attorney — they're not supposed to be transcripts. Plus, Trueblood adds, the county since COVID

has contracted with public access to film nearly all of the county's meetings, which are available any time on YouTube.

Trueblood says that she's taken on additional responsibilities since taking the office. Her office now takes the minutes for six of the seven standing committees, she says (Environmental Resources is handled by someone else).

Trueblood touts her experience working on the job for five years, her expertise and that voters can trust her as reasons voters should select her.

Ranallo cites a drive to bring more transparency, helpfulness and her willingness to go the extra mile as reasons voters should select her.

Both candidates emphasized that though they're running on a Republican ticket, neither says they plan to take any partisan politics into the position.

It may not be a partisan battle, but neither candidate shied from going on the attack. Aug. 13's race will definitely be a battle.

COUNTY TREASURER

Jen Seliger, 50, is currently the administration assistant to the principal at John Marshall Elementary School in the Wausau School District. As a Hamburg resident, she served on the Merrill Area Public School Board from 2008 to 2018, and served some of those years as its president.

Seliger says she is challenging the current office holder, Connie Beyersdorff, because she has been hearing that there is a lack of communication from the treasurer's office, that people can't get in touch with them and phone calls aren't returned. Seliger also cited a delinquent tax letter that went out from the treasurer's office to more than 500 residents in two townships before their taxes were delinquent. Corporation Counsel Michael Puerner confirmed the incident and told City Pages that the letter was the result of a database issue that led to the letter going out to residents in February before those residents were delinquent on their taxes.

Beyersdorff refused multiple requests for an interview, saying she would only respond to written questions. But City Pages explained that wouldn't be fair as the other candidate agreed to an actual interview.

Seliger says she wants to bring more transparency to the position, better communication and to set up better standard operating procedures.

The race is a Republican primary, and Seliger says that while she is a conservative, at the end of the day she needs to serve the county first and foremost, and

do the right thing for county residents regardless of any party affiliation. Seliger says she has a passion for public service and for getting the job done.



Moonstone hunt

Emi Oshima and her partners founded Wisconsin's first pickyour-own Moonstone field on Highway U.

Driving west on Highway U, my eyes keep searching for a sign I'd seen via email — one that signaled something rather unusual for the area — a place where one can pick their own Wisconsin Moonstone, run by a woman originally from Tokyo, Japan.

I found the white sign that led off of Highway U onto a grassy parking lot and a big open field. A little, colorful shed adorns the outer edges of the field, and a picnic table full of gems, paper and other necessities.

Emi Oshima greets me warmly with a smile and a big sun hat. As we sit down, I mention that I heard Wisconsin Moonstone is big in Japan. She smiles "I did that. That was me," she explains with a smile. Oshima fell in love with Wisconsin Moonstone and quickly spread it to Japan, turning it into a popular gem in the country, she says.

She's had a wholesale service selling Wisconsin Moonstone for some time, and it's become a passion of hers. But she and her partners — Trent and Shana Rebeck, and Austin and Jennifer Gausmann — started talking about how they could share the joys of Wisconsin Moonstone more with the public, and one day they decided to start a pick-your-own field. Thus began the first

pick-your-own Wisconsin Moonstone site in the whole state. "This is a unique experience," Oshima, known colloquially as Moonstone Emi, says at the site.

How does it work? Basically, customers pay \$35, get a bucket, rent some tools, and then are sent into the field to look for moonstone.

It's not hard to find on the site - the moonstone is everywhere. Customers are able to harvest up to 20 pounds of moonstone, which fills a pretty sizable bucket. The site officially opened May

15, and Oshima says they get 60-70 people per day picking moonstone.

Oshima carries a spray bottle with her, and demonstrates how raw moonstone really comes to life when you spray it with water - the colors and vibrancy really shine under the gleam of the water.

The luminance of Wisconsin Moonstone even comes out in its raw form to a degree, but it really shines a brilliant

blue when polished, and that's made it a favorite for jewelry or just for having around on a shelf.

The site is unique, Oshima says, because the field is filled with moonstone. "They're so surprised," Oshima says of first-time customers. "It's everywhere."

The site is open Wednesdays and Sundays 10 am to 4 pm, with Saturdays by special appointment. There are special discounts for seniors and youth, and those who pick more than 20 pounds pay \$2 per pound extra.
