Kronenwetter chaos

City Pages obtained a confidential report that suggests a Kronenwetter board member is harassing staff



The village board met in closed session Monday night to discuss a number of legal issues, many of them stemming from complaints filed by — or against — one particular board member.

No action was taken on those specific legal issues, but City Pages obtained an investigative report about one board member — and it suggests he's been harassing village staff members.

The report, completed by law firm Von Briesen, investigated a harassment complaint filed by Village Clerk Bobbi Jo Birk-LaBarge against board member Ken Charneski. The report alleges that Charneski has harassed Birk-LaBarge and other village staff, creating a hostile work environment that caused many employees to quit. That report came from interviews with current and past staff members as well as exit interviews collected by the law firm.

Charneski ultimately refused to participate in the investigation, after a lengthy back and forth with the law firm's investigator. Charneski in an interview with City

Pages about the report called it a "biased piece of %\$&#" and that it amounted to "guilty by accusation."

The report highlighted a couple of incidents. One in which a village employee sent out an email with an item about a farmers market. According to the investigation, Charneski chastised her for using an old name for the park — Sunset Park — instead of the new name for it, Buska Park. The renaming of the park had been controversial because Joel Straub, then a board member, had pushed for the park to be named after his father-in-law.

Charneski included the board and village leadership in his chastising of the employee. She later told the clerk she was on the verge of quitting over the public chastising for what was a minor mistake.

The investigation highlights the barrage of emails Charneski sends staff members, critiquing numerous aspects of their job. Staff members told investigators that they felt like they spent more time crafting responses to Charneski and coming up with defenses than they did actually performing their duties.

One other incident in the report discusses a conflict with an oath of office — Charneski insisted on his own oath and tried to drag the county clerk into the dispute. She sent a copy of the state statuteapproved oath and refused any further involvement.


The village board on Monday took no

action on the complaint specifically. They did renew LaBarge as village clerk for another two-year term — with Charneski being the only no vote.

Also not discussed outside the closed session were Charneski's lawsuit against the village and his election complaints against LaBarge; David Baker's election complaint against the village (he's identified as an administrator candidate on the agenda); and cease and desist correspondence sent to Charneski.

Charneski disputed the report's content. Charneski said he had never seen the formal complaint filed in February that sparked the investigation. He was aware of a less formal version LaBarge had made to the board in December.

Charneski also said he didn't think former Administrator Leonard Ludi followed the correct procedure — that he was specifically directed not to contract with an outside law firm to investigate the complaint. (Von Briesen is a firm typically hired in situations involving internal complaints — they investigated the complaint against then-County Administrator Brad



Karger over his involvement in the Dylan Yang protest, for instance.)

Charneski said the report, which he said cost the village \$50,000, didn't reveal anything that the village didn't already know, and that its conclusions were subjective.

The board also passed a new code of conduct which limits how board members can file complaints against the village, setting up a process for handling complaints and misconduct by village officials. Penalties for elected officials violating their duties range from public censure to removal of office and, in extreme cases, referral to the district attorney's office for potential prosecution.

Charneski questioned many aspects of the code of conduct and said he didn't think it was well thought-out. He and board member Cindy Lee Buchkowski-Hoffmann voted against it.

The county task force on TIF presents its recommendations

The formation of a task force looking at how tax incremental financing impacts the county and what can be done about it recently wrapped up its nearly two-year assignment recently. And its recommendations include advocating for legislation and looking more closely at how the Joint Review Board that approves local districts operates.

That was presented to Marathon County's Finance, Human Resources and Property Committee last week. The report and the recommendations will be discussed at a future county board as well.

Tax increment financing is a way for municipalities to help fund projects in troubled areas. A municipality can form a district and any additional tax revenue over the set baseline can be used to provide incentives to developers to work on projects that otherwise might not be financially feasible. For projects to qualify, they must pass the "but for" test — in other words, projects must otherwise not have happened without the additional incentives.

But, Task Force Chair Dave Oberbeck

pointed out, it's almost impossible to actually prove that since you're predicting whether something would happen in the future.

And another problem, Oberbeck points out, is that in theory TIF Districts should spark new development, which ultimately would mean more money on the tax rolls when the district closes.

But in reality, that doesn't come for a while. A district that is open for 30 years today, for instance, would be paying taxes as if it were 1994. And that's a lot of lost tax revenue to make up.

And sometimes it never pays off. By the time the district created for the Wausau Center mall, for instance, finally closed, the mall was already a shadow of itself the district missed out on much of the tax revenue from the mall when it generated the most tax revenue.

Oberbeck presented numerous recommendations from the task force's conclusion:

Advocate for changes to TIF law, such as lowering the number of years a district can remain open

Focus on the Joint Review Board, which approves TIF projects locally, including more focus on the county's JRB member and expectations for that member.

Encourage state leaders to more stringently enforce the 12% valuation cap (right now, municipalities are supposed to stay under 12% of their property value inside a TIF but enforcement has been lax).

Future limitations on district extensions, since closing them is what allows municipalities to capture the increased value.

Outreach coordinator gets grant to help house homeless

The city's homeless outreach coordinator received a new grant to help get some of the city's homeless population housed — and it's already nearly run out.

Outreach Coordinator Tracy Rieger told the city's Public Health and Safety Committee last week that she received a grant of \$5,000, about half of what she



Leaving an Adult Child the Home

requested, through the United Way Impact Grant to help the population she works with get housed.

Rieger said she used the money to help those individuals she works with pay security deposits — she found often landlords would want double or even triple security deposits for the clients she worked with.

Rieger said she quickly ran through the funding.

Rieger says she's helped get three people housed in July and at the time of the meeting two more in August.

The city hired Rieger last year as a civilian within the police department to help work with the homeless population and transition them into services and housing. Rieger replaced a similar sworn officer position in the department.

Greenheck Turner facility to host World Horseshoe championship

The Greenheck Turner facility built in Weston just finished construction — and it's already slated to host a world championship.

The center is slated to host the 2026 and 2029 Horseshoe Pitching World Championships. Central Wisconsin Convention and Visitors Bureau officials say the event typically draws thousands of attendees from 48 states and five countries outside the U.S.

Visitors stay for roughly a week, contributing to the local economy, says CVB Director Tim White. "Securing these championships reinforces Wausau's status as a top-tier destination for major sporting events," White stated in a press release. "We are proud to host these tournaments and are confident they will leave a lasting legacy in our community."

A local arts organization is planning to host a free art studio for community members.

Weston weighs leaving **CVB:** decides to negotiate contract

The village of Weston had weighed the possibility of pulling out of its contract with the Central Wisconsin Convention and Visitors Bureau; but now it looks like the village will renegotiate instead.

The village's Tourism Commission had an item allowing for the possibility of pulling out of the CVB contract. Some of the village's beefs were that the village was paying a higher percentage than any other municipality.

But village leaders decided instead to work on re-negotiating its contract. "We're the highest of all municipalities," said Tourism Commission Chair Mark Maloney. Maloney said he would also like to see Rothschild rejoin.

The Tourism Commission drew heat earlier this year when it denied a grant for Wausau Pride, which City Pages learned was later restored independently by Malonev.

Many of the area municipalities withdrew from their contracts with the CVB

Know your rights: How open records law works

Election season is here, and we are about to embark on a journey of evaluating our elected representatives, the decisions they have made, and the policies they have created during their terms. If you want to go beyond the hoopla of the TV ads, it's important to understand Wisconsin's transparency laws. Journalists use them often, and the public has the same right to these powerful tools.

OPEN RECORDS LAW

All state and local government records are presumed to be open to public inspection and copying for your use. While there are exceptions, you never have to prove that you are entitled to a record - it's the government's job to prove they can withhold it.

Who is Subject to the Open Records Law?

The open records law applies to all elected officials and all units of state and local government. The governor, state agencies, the court system, public universities, and both houses of the legislature all are subject to the law. Locally, you can get records from counties, schools, cities, villages, and towns, among others.

What Constitutes a Record?

What's a record? That definition is broad, too. It includes virtually anything in government possession that contains information, regardless of the format.

Not everything that is a record must be produced. Laws like HIPAA (medical records) and FERPA (student records) exempt certain records, and there are many more exemptions. But it's the government's job to know what they can withhold, not yours, so go ahead and ask.

How Do You Request a Record?

You can ask for a record verbally, but it's better to make a written request. You can identify a record specifically (the city's 2024 budget), or by general description (all emails sent to school board members yesterday). You don't have



to give your name or explain why you want them.

Unfortunately, Wisconsin's law doesn't provide a deadline for responses other than "as soon as practicable and without delay." Good custodians will fulfill small requests immediately. A few days or a couple weeks is normal for simple requests. If your request is complex or there's a backlog, you might wait months.

You may have to pay for the record. Custodians can charge you for locating records (at the hourly wage of the lowest-paid capable person), reproducing records (their actual cost of paper and ink/toner), and mailing records to you (the actual cost of postage). Under a new law, law enforcement agencies can charge for the time they spend redacting video recordings, although there are some waivers available.

OPEN MEETINGS LAW

All meetings of state and local bodies are presumed to be open to the public and must be preceded by reasonable notice.

Who is Subject to Open Meetings Law?

This law applies only to "governmental bodies." Not every group of government officials or employees working together must follow the law. But any formal group that acts as a cohesive body counts. That includes the state legislative bodies and state agencies run by a board rather than a single secretary (for example, the U.W. Board of Regents). Locally, county boards, school boards, city councils, village boards, town boards, and their committees all count.

What Constitutes a Meeting?

All "meetings" of governmental bodies must be held open to the public and must be preceded by notice of when it is, where it is, and what's going to be discussed. To be a meeting, enough members need to get together to control the outcome of any decision (usually a majority), and they must be talking about government business. If a majority



show up at the local high school football game, that's not a meeting. Nor is a conversation among two members about government business (unless the board only has three members).

Attending Meetings

You can attend all public meetings. You can also record any public meeting as long as you don't interfere. They may be able to go into closed session, but only in very limited circumstances, and they have to announce what exemption they are using and the general nature of their discussions.

Resources

Remember, government records are the public's records and government meetings are the public's meetings. They work for you, and you have the right to see what they are doing. If you run into issues, or have more questions, valuable resources include:


Greens slam dems over suit to block Stein from ballot

The co-chair of the Wisconsin Green Party slammed a DNC effort to keep Jill Stein off the state's presidential ballot as a "high risk, zero benefit action" that would likely cost Kamala Harris votes.

The state Supreme Court Monday refused to hear the suit filed by a staffer with the Democratic National Committee arguing the Greens were ineligible to place a candidate on the Wisconsin ballot. The court's ruling didn't offer any rationale other than plaintiff David Strange "is not entitled to the relief he seeks."

State Green Co-chair Michael White said if the suit had been successful, it would've only prompted party members to write in Stein's name on the November ballot.

"They've already lost voters who were uncommitted who might've voted for Kamala because of the actions by the Democratic Party trying to push her off the ballot," White said.



Strange filed the petition for original action with the Supreme Court a week ago arguing the Green Party doesn't have any members eligible to nominate presidential electors. Without any electors, the complaint argues, the party is ineligible to place someone on the presidential ballot.

A DNC spokesperson called the ruling disappointing because the Greens' "violation of the law is crystal clear."

Primaries set the stage for fall battles

In the Assembly, it's about control. In the Senate, it's about setting the stage for 2026.

Insiders are watching more than a dozen fall races under new maps to see if: Republicans can keep legislative control for another two years; or if Dems can beat the odds and seize control of the Assembly for the first time since 2010 and set the stage for a Senate takeover two years from now.

With the primaries now out of the way, the focus turns to the November elections and the races that will most likely get the most attention from the caucuses and outside groups.

In the Senate, the calculation is simple. There's no real path for Dems to retake the majority after going into this session down 22-11. But there are four GOP-held seats considered in play. To create a path in 2026 to flip the chamber, Dems have to pick up at least three of those seats and defend state Sen. Brad Pfaff, D-Onalaska, to have a shot at the majority in two years.

In the Assembly, the puzzle is more complicated. Republicans went into this session with a 64-35 majority and are expected to see their majority shrink under the new maps.

Longtime GOP redistricting consultant Joe Handrick rates 46 Assembly seats as "safe" or "strong" Republican. He rates 44 seats "safe," "strong" or "lean" Dem. That leaves nine seats that he considers the most competitive.

For Republicans, keeping their majority is a matter of winning all 46 that are safe or strong GOP and winning four of the nine remaining seats. For Dems, it's a matter of winning the 44 safe, strong or lean seats on their side and winning six of the nine.

Harris advisor says campaign 'throwing everything' into WI

David Plouffe, a top adviser to Kamala Harris' campaign, says the campaign is "throwing everything" into Wisconsin in the final 10 weeks of the presidential election.

"Wisconsin, Michigan and Pennsylvania are the top of the list in terms of where you want to put your effort," Plouffe said on WISN's "UpFront," which is produced in partnership with WisPolitics. "And here's where the excitement matters. She'll have the financial resources and the people resources. Why? You're throwing everything you can into Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and I mean everything."

Harris brought on Plouffe, who managed former President Barack Obama's first presidential bid, after President Biden dropped out of the race.

"This is an unprecedented situation," Plouffe said. "You basically got to build and win a presidential campaign in less than 100 days. So I've known Kamala Harris a long time. I know the campaign team well. So they're just looking to add some arms and legs on top of what is already a great campaign."

Plouffe added the ground game in the key swing states like Wisconsin will be critical.

"That's the biggest concern is it's just going to be close," he said. "So I think Kamala Harris has the enthusiasm required to build the kind of organization to win a close state. The Wisconsin state party under Ben Wikler is a great organizing machine. So there's good apparatus there. The folks in that state have won a lot of close elections up and down the ballot over the last few years. So we're very confident, but in this election, Wisconsin's not going to be decided by more than a couple points, unless Donald Trump really closes poorly. I still think Kamala Harris has some upside that's even greater than where we see the race today. But at the end of the day, Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Nevada, North Carolina, Georgia, they're all going to be super close."

Baldwin: Medicare, social security at risk if Trump wins

U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin said Social Security and Medicare are at risk if Donald Trump is elected in November during remarks at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago Thursday night.

The Madison Dem told delegates her mother was a teen struggling with addiction when she was born, and she never met her father. Baldwin noted she was raised by her grandparents, David and Doris.

"In every way a child needs, my grandparents were there for me. And as they grew older, it was my privilege to be there for them," Baldwin said. "So, when I work to protect Medicare and Social Security, I do it with the personal knowledge of what those big programs meant in small, but deeply meaningful ways to my grandparents." Baldwin said she knows what the programs mean for parents and grandparents, but "that is all at risk today."

He's talking about cutting Social Security and Medicare while giving a huge new tax break to billionaires and corporations? Well, Kamala Harris is not going to let that happen, and Tim Walz is not going to let that happen; we are not going to let that happen." Madison businessman Eric Hovde,

Baldwin's GOP opponent, in response to the speech said Baldwin's record doesn't match her rhetoric.

"From record high inflation to the border crisis and a broken healthcare system, everyday Wisconsinites are struggling because of VP Harris and Sen. Baldwin's failed policies," Hovde said. "It's time for change!"


