

## Close to Infused

### City mulls extension for event space/ green space project on former Wausau Chemical site

**City leaders directed staff** to gather more information on a project that is being built on a former Wausau Chemical plant building north of downtown.

The founders of Infused, a greenspace and event space, say the project is now expected to be finished and taking customers by November. Matthew Aschbrenner told the city's economic development committee that they're booking clients for the building for December and expect to take bookings for November too.

Under an extension the owners received previously, the building was to be occupied by Aug. 19. Aschbrenner said they've had trouble finding contractors to build the project. But a contractor at the meeting said they were confident the building would get its occupancy permit by November.

The city sold Aschbrenner the building for \$40,000 in 2022, and at the time he told the city he planned to put \$250,000 into developing it. On Tuesday, he told the committee at its finish he will have invested three times the original budget for the project. The developers received an extension last year.

In a memo to the committee, Interim Community Development Director Randy Fifrick said he toured the property recently, and that it appeared the work differed from the original plan. According to the memo, Aschbrenner said he'd spent \$418,070. Aschbrenner was unwilling to provide details of those expenses so staff could determine whether the changes met the deed restrictions for the property.

The committee discussed it in closed session but took no official action, other than to direct Fifrick to discuss the project further with the developers.

### Details emerge in downtown murder investigation


More details have emerged in a murder police are investigating downtown — but the motive is still unclear.

Police say Thomas Schroeder, who is listed in court records as homeless, assaulted another man downtown Aug. 18, knocking him out. The man was transported to the hospital and died two days later.

The criminal complaint contains more details about the situation and Schroeder's subsequent arrest, but not much about what the initial altercation was about.

Police say a witness told investigators that he saw Schroeder following a man downtown and yelling at him. When the man turned around, Schroeder swung at him twice. The second time the blow knocked him out, with his head hitting the pavement, the witness told police.

When police later caught up with Schroeder with the assistance of the witness, Schroeder admitted he was involved and said they ought to arrest him. But when police were picking him up off the ground, the criminal complaint says, he lunged at one of the officers, popping his knee.

Its developers say the project will be ready by November.

Schroeder is being held on a \$100,000 cash bond. He faces a felony murder charge associated with assault, which is a class U felony.

### Multi-jurisdiction chase leads to crash, arrests

Several people have been arrested from a crash that resulted from a high-speed pursuit from Kronenwetter into Wausau last week

Police arrested Cody Mayottee, 23 of Antigo, after police say he led them on a dangerous chase from Kronenwetter to Grand Avenue, where he crashed into another car near the Wausau Police Department.

Officers were at a Kronenwetter residence around 8 pm Aug. 24 to execute an arrest warrant on Bryse Drake, 22 of Mosinee, when they say they saw Drake get into Mayotte's vehicle. Police ordered the SUV to stop, the complaint says, but instead Mayotte took off, leading police on a chase. Mayotte nearly hit a parked car and sometimes veered into oncoming traffic in the pursuit.

Mayotte crashed his vehicle into another, injuring people in the vehicle. He and Drake were arrested, as was another man encouraging them to run from officers after the crash.

Mayotte is being held on a \$50,000 cash bond and faces charges of fleeing an officer resulting in bodily harm or property damage, aiding a felon, second degree recklessly endangering safety among other lesser charges. Drake is being held for transport to another county.

# Rothschild/Schofield weigh closing aquatic center, using Weston's

The village of Rothschild and the city of Schofield are considering closing their shared aquatic center and partnering to help run Weston's.

People are already expressing concern over that potential decision.

The Village of Weston's Parks Committee discussed the idea last week, and the impact closing the pool might have on Weston's Aquatic Center, which is already pretty heavily used. The proposal includes Rothschild and Schofield potentially paying a stipend to Weston, and in return receiving a residential rate to use the pool.

Several residents wrote to the committee expressing concern for the plan. Some families liked the Rothschild pool because it seems better set up for younger children; Weston's is crowded, its pool gets deep much faster and it seems to attract many older kids, they say.

Parks Commission members said they're generally open to a discussion about a partnership but ultimately said there wasn't much for their parks committee to do until or if Rothschild and Schofield would close their pool. Neither municipality has made that decision yet.

Rothschild recently raised money to build a splash pad at the pool.

### Weston looking to fill board vacancy

The village of Weston is looking to fill a vacancy after one of its board members stepped down.

The village put out an announcement on its website after Jasper Hartinger told the village he would no longer serve in the role. In a copy of the letter of resignation received by City Pages dated Aug. 20, Hartinger cited personal issues as why he would no longer be able to serve on the board.

Hartinger still serves on the Marathon County Board, according to the county's website. City Pages reached out to the county clerk to double check on his status there. County Clerk Kim Trueblood says the county has not received anything from Hartinger. He did not attend the August or July Marathon County Board voting meetings records show.

The village is taking applications to fill Hartinger's seat until Sept. 20. Letters of interest and resumes should be sent to Administrator Jami Gebert at village hall or by email at jgebert@westonwi.gov. See westonwi.gov for more information.

### Riverside Fire District Chief resigns

The fire chief of the Riverside Fire District has resigned amidst felony charges involving a minor.

Robert Bowen resigned Aug. 6 from the district following a period of him being placed on administrative leave. The district announced the resignation last week.

Bowen was put on leave after felony child enticement charges were filed in May in Marathon County Circuit Court. The charges coincidently came at the same time as a dust-up between Riverside and Kronenwetter over ambulance service -Kronenwetter's fire chief has been pushing for the village to run its own service, saying it would improve response times and be more cost-effective.

Riverside began in 2017 as a merger between the Rothschild and Schofield departments in order to save each village money and improve staffing levels.

Rothschild Administrator Ryan VanDeWalle said in a press conference that Bowen resigned for "personal and professional" reasons and wouldn't comment on the charges Bowen is facing.

Bowen is due in court for a preliminary hearing Nov. 11.

VanDeWalle says the village is currently discussing a possible merger with SAFER, which covers Weston, Rib Mountain and some smaller communities. While those discussions are ongoing, the village and Schofield are holding off on hiring a new chief.

When asked why officials didn't announce the resignation until nearly a month later, VanDeWalle said "There were agreements in place."

### Recall bankroll

Committees spent \$1.3M in effort to recall Robin Vos



**Two groups that tried** unsuccessfully to recall Assembly Speaker Robin Vos spent nearly \$1.3 million through June 30 with more than half of the money going to "solicitation expenses," a WisPolitics review finds

The bulk of those payments went to individuals, including those who organized the recall efforts.

The campaign finance reports — filed more than a month late — also show the two committees raised more than \$1.3 million through the end of June with

most of that coming from an Arkansas philanthropist.

Two committees were formed to try recalling Vos, one for each failed attempt. The second — dubbed the Racine Recall Committee — listed 95 people who were paid for solicitation expenses. Of those, 22 were from Wisconsin.

Vos, R-Rochester, said the WisPolitics reporting confirmed his belief the effort against him was largely driven by out-of-state interests. He also said those involved in the recall efforts who say they want to

see Donald Trump elected this fall could've put the money to better use helping the former president than pouring it into the failed efforts.

"Everybody involved got paid one way or another," Vos charged in a phone interview. "This wasn't a grassroots, volunteer, local effort. It was an out-of-state paid endeavor and in many ways, it looks like these people were making money off the effort."

### Walz touts union cred during Milwaukee stop

Dem VP nominee Tim Walz in a Milwaukee Labor Day stop noted his organized labor credentials while touting Kamala Harris for being part of the most pro-union U.S. administration in history

In comparison, he charged that the only thing Donald Trump knows about working people is "how to take advantage of them."

Speaking to Laborfest, the Minnesota guv noted he was a dues-paying member of his union while a teacher and recounted how GOP opponents once accused him in a campaign of being in the pocket of organized labor.

"I said that's a damned lie. I am the pocket. I am the pocket," Walz said yesterday. "And I told them if you want to attack me for standing up for collective bargaining, for fair wages, for safe working conditions, for health care and retirement, you roll the damn dice. I'll take my chances on that. I'll take my chances."

Walz said while California's attorney general, Harris sued banks for mismanaging pension funds, resulting in millions going back to families through the pensions they had earned. He said she cast the tie breaking vote on the American Rescue Plan Act in 2021 that helped keep workers on the job, and he touted work by the Biden-Harris administration to protect pensions for retirees.

Walz added he signed a package of pro-union priorities in Minnesota that included making it easier to form a union while barring employers from forcing unions to attend anti-union meetings.

# Trump calls Harris threat to democracy in La Crosse stop

GOP presidential nominee Donald Trump at a La Crosse town hall last night knocked Dems for labeling him a "threat to democracy," arguing Dem opponent Kamala Harris is the real danger.

He also touted a new proposal aiming to boost access to in vitro fertilization.

The former president answered four questions from voters at the La Crosse Center, where he appeared onstage for about 30 minutes to weigh in on issues including illegal immigration, inflation, crime and national security. Trump also answered questions from the moderator, former Hawaii U.S. Rep. Tulsi Gabbard, an ex-Democrat who has endorsed his campaign.

Trump, who arrived about an hour late after speaking in Michigan earlier that day, told attendees his debate with President Joe Biden was "the beginning of the end for him."

"And they started looking, but they picked a woman that had absolutely no votes," Trump said. "She got no votes, and now she's running, so when you say 'threat to democracy,' they are a threat to democracy. I'm not a threat to democracy."

He also spoke about a new proposal, announced ahead of yesterday's town hall, to provide free in vitro fertilization for Americans. He touted the proposal in response to a question from Gabbard, who said she had received the fertility treatment, about those who want to ensure access to IVF.

"Government is going to pay for it, or we're going to get or mandate your insurance company to pay for it, which is going to be great. We're going to do that," Trump said, adding "we want to produce babies in this country, right?"



### Vance: Kennedy shouldn't remain on WI ballot

GOP vice presidential nominee JD Vance says it's "ridiculous" Robert F. Kennedy Jr. will remain on the Wisconsin ballot in November — even though state law doesn't provide a way to meet his request to be left off.

During a stop in De Pere yesterday, Vance said "a bunch of bureaucrats are going to keep his name on the ballot because they think it'll hurt Donald Trump."

"I think we are going to win Wisconsin anyway, and we are going to fight for every single vote," Vance said.

Kennedy dropped out of the race last week and endorsed Trump. He also sent the state Elections Commission a letter asking to be left off the Wisconsin ballot after he turned in nomination papers earlier this month in his bid to be included. Agency staff noted there was no mechanism in state law that would allow Kennedy to withdraw his nomination

papers after submitting them to the commission.

During the Elections Commission meeting Tuesday, GOP appointees originally pushed to fulfill Kennedy's request despite Dem objections that such a move wasn't allowed under state law. But after the commission deadlocked 3-3 on that motion, two GOP appointees joined the three Dems in voting 5-1 to put him on the

During last night's appearance, Vance added he is "thrilled" to have the endorsement of Kennedy and former U.S. Rep. Tulsi Gabbard, D-Hawaii.

Vance took questions from reporters and knocked Harris' policies on America's opioid crisis. Vance said Harris wants to let Mexican drug cartels do "whatever they want and go to war against American law enforcement."

"I think we ought to empower American law enforcement and go to war against the Mexican drug cartels," Vance said. 🖙

### **COVER FEATURE**



**Last month, a plan** by Mayor Doug Diny to revamp the parks department — namely, to undo a merger in the 1970s between the city and county parks department into one department — became a controversial issue during an explosive parks committee meeting.

It came at a time when the city was weighing a potential change to how it handles parks issues. When the parks departments merged into one city/county parks department in the 70s, the idea was to have one parks commission to cover them all. But eventually the city launched its own parks committee, and that left city county members of the county parks commission wondering why they were there making decisions on county parks issues.

No one saw a proposal to dismantle the department and place the new city parks department under the Public Works Department.

Diny at the meeting claimed the cleaving would save taxpayers upward of \$400,000 to \$500,000 per year. But city leaders questioned those numbers, since no financial analysis had been done.

We reached out to Diny and to City Council President Lisa Rasmussen for their takes on the parks proposal and the zero-based budgeting framework the proposal came out of.

### MAYOR DOUG DINY

We have to try. We need to take sensible actions to address the city's precarious fiscal position. Wausau has borrowed too much. We have raised water rates 60%. Our working capital is low. We have committed to an accelerated lead service line replacement without knowing either the cost or where the money will come from. And, to top it all off, the 2023 city revaluation will cause many property owners to see a double-digit increase in their taxes this December.

The path we are on is not sustainable. High taxes, high debt and high water rates handicap growth and new investment. Continuing to raise rates and borrow more is no solution.

How do we turn this around? We sharpen our pencils and get to work. Fortunately, we do not have to reinvent the wheel. We can incorporate best practice from well-known constructs such as Zero-Based Budgeting (ZBB).

For many bureaucratic organizations, growth is on auto-pilot. They start their budget process with the assumption that everything the organization is doing now is important and valuable and deserves continued funding. Then the budget discussion is confined to adding new things only. There is no re-evaluation or re-prioritization.

In ZBB, we turn that thinking on its head. We start with the assumption that last year's spending was unnecessary. Then a justification must be developed for why specific item should be put back into the budget.

A few members of the council seem to be deeply ingrained in the old way of thinking — and they have been vocal and demonstrative about it. Understand, they would have you believe that a six-figure consultant's report and a mound of evidence is necessary to discuss removing any items from the budget.

The city-county parks department has been evolving under that old way of thinking for over fifty years. It now has 44.00 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. Seven of them are supervisors or managers. That means we have one supervisor for every 5.25 FTE workers. That seems like it is too much. In ZBB, we start with the assumption that we do have too many supervisors and managers and then see if we can come up with a rationale for keeping any of them.

Again, we cannot continue the path of raising rates, borrowing more and spending more. I would like to invite those council members who have been complaining to have an open mind and join me and the other council members in using the ZBB framework to re-imagine city government in Wausau.

### CITY COUNCIL PRESIDENT LISA RASMUSSEN

Recently, a plan emerged from the mayor's office suggesting Wausau exit its contract with Marathon County to manage our park system, and place those functions under the DPW

Information sent to one media outlet claimed between \$400,000 and \$500,000 could be saved by this. Wausau just approved a contract to outline work being done and clarify responsibilities and expectations of both parties as a guide for current and future leaders and staff. Thankfully, our Park and Rec committee chair placed the item on an agenda for open discussion. Members were curious about the stated potential savings. One asked for the basic calculations used to arrive at the savings figures. We were told there weren't any, and no actual financial analysis had been done. The report he released was an organizational chart copied from the city budget and two bar graphs from the WI Policy Forum comparing park costs for other communities without detail on the number or type of facilities managed by them. Our response: Not so fast...show us the money.

Our Finance Director, with 30 years' experience, told the committee she had not been asked to review the plan, and that there is "significant risk" to the city if changes are made without actual data and research to see the true costs (or savings) and impacts to services, facilities, staff and equipment. The Parks Director advised she was not asked for any information. Yet, she has job costing software to easily show what work is done and billed to the city under the contract. She implied assumptions were made instead of asking her for facts.

It reasonable to think if one is interested in a big change, you begin with the department heads who possess most of the data relevant to the discussion. Instead, information was handed off to one media outlet, unverified, and later defended with a claim that it was to "start a discussion" and inform the public in "real time". Our mayor, instead of offering even basic math facts when asked about his idea, was critical of the committee for questioning and seeking better research. Afterward, he issued a press release complaining about being unable to 'install a gumball machine at city hall without half the council decrying it as the end of civilization and seeking a study'. He accused us of rancor, hostility and the like. Readers, please watch the video online. Members were respectful but had questions. It is our job to make educated decisions and seek information to do it with. This change is way bigger than any gumball machine. The simplicity of that analogy reveals a lack of understanding of the actual work and the complexity of management and programming needed at these sites. Hastily rolling out documents that imply large savings, gets people excited only to find out, those numbers may not even be close to accurate is not fair to taxpayers looking for real relief.

The proper process for this would have been: 1. Idea is discussed internally by the mayor with his relevant dept heads, Parks, Finance, HR, and Public Works. 2. Staff would be asked to assemble preliminary data to determine if the idea is viable and manageable. 3. If determined to yield savings, a draft plan could be placed on the agendas of the appropriate committees for discussion. 4. Based on that, if additional study or information was needed, committees may authorize a study or request more info from staff. As the process moves along, timely media coverage

would be happening to keep the public informed, using factual data. No one suggested that the council expects the mayor to carry his idea to all 11 council members individually as he has implied. We just want an organized process that begins with accurate facts and discussion with the affected departments before the plan debuts in the public and media. The way this was done, if the facts reveal this is not an effective plan, it again plays out in the community as a failure for local government.

Most concerning is that operation of our park system is about more than money. It's about facilities and programming that enhance quality of life here. People expect them to be well run and available. DPW doesn't have space to house the number of employees that would be added to the city workforce and their related equipment. The mayor toured the DPW facility with the council last month and saw the long-standing capacity issues there himself.

Parks represents about \$3.5M of an annual budget that exceeds \$100M. Below is a list from the 2024 budget document showing what we get for that money:

That is a LOT of facilities and time. In fact, it's more parks than the department manages for Marathon

There was a time, over a decade ago, I and other council members wondered if we truly got 50% of the time and attention for city parks in exchange for our financial commitment. Back then, it was harder to quantify things and Wausau had less facilities. Today, the technology and quality facilities we've added are such that it is far easier to see and measure those metrics. I remain convinced that we are absolutely getting our money's worth from the contract and that the cost sharing happening is accurately distributed.

I hope that if this plan is considered, real data is gathered and there is study of the impacts to city departments, facilities, workforce and taxpayers. Reveal all costs, including potential reductions in services and programming, impacts to user contract management and the like. Impacts to things like hiring, training and management of lifeguards, swim lessons, youth programs, collaborations with the schools and community groups. I'm also hopeful that rolling this out first to the media was not intended to create a wave of public excitement over how busy our new mayor is, only to blame the council if these unvetted plans don't fly.

There's a way for the mayor and the council to work well together. We learned in the council retreat that we want many of the same things. The council does not fear change and we all want to control costs. But, speaking to us through Op Ed's and backing the council into a corner with snide public comments is not the way to build a productive relationship. We've all experienced times before where the council and mayor had a negative relationship, and no one wants to go back there. Good communication and proper process will go a long way to avoid that. Proper workflow is not about any of us quietly killing his ideas as was implied. It is about making informed, reasonable choices that help our city and avoiding hasty ones that can end as expensive mistakes.
