Team Smack Down Outdoors is a small veteran-owned business, specializing in doing European mounts of animals-typically skullonly mounts, although on occasion they've taken on larger projects. Wild game skull mounts-such as skull mounts of deer, bear, elk, etc.-are the bulk of their business.

Typical turnaround time for a European skull mount is six to nine months, they said.

Merrill native pursues career as Minnesota DNR conservation officer, inspired by her grandfather's law enforcement career

Merrill native Callie Oberg currently serves residents of the State of Minnesota as a conservation officer. The daughter of Vicki and Chad Oberg, Callie is a 2018 Merrill High School graduate who went on to attend the University of Wisconsin through their Wausau campus and then finished her bachelor's degree at UW-Stevens Point in 2022. Callie said her passion for the outdoors led her to seek work in the conservation field. Employment with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) appealed to Callie because they have a unique CO Prep Program that allows those without law enforcement background or training an avenue to becoming a conservation officer. Entering the training academy confirmed her choice, Callie said, as she soon realized the Minnesota DNR

division of law enforcement has some of the best training in the nation.

Much like Wisconsin, the state of Minnesota has a law enforcement division devoted to the state's natural Their resources. conservation wardens are highly trained through their own in-house recruit academy that typically begins each spring and enables new recruit conservation wardens to hit their field-training portion of the academy just as the fall hunting seasons begin. Although the job of a conservation warden sounds like an outdoor enthusiast's dream job, it is not without its dangers. To date, 23 members of the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources have died in the line of duty while serving as conservation officers. Joe Albert is the Communications Coordinator for the Enforcement Division of the Minnesota DNR.

PUBLISHER'S LETTER The Great Game: Humanity, AI,

And The Battle For Control

Dear Reader,

As we venture further into the age of AI, there's a prevailing narrative that suggests humanity, with all its flaws and frailties, is destined to be overtaken by the cold, calculating logic of our creations. In the end, AI may be powerful, but it is we, the selfdesignated chess masters, who will dictate the rules of the game. And as long as we remain vigilant, strategic, and committed to the greater good, we can ensure that the future, while shared with AI, is still very much under human control.



the automotive industry in Minneapolis and commuting from New Richmond, Wis., working on a lot of guns and skulls part-time, he said. Justin went to college in Wyoming for auto body/hot rod fabrication and said he lived in the Twin Cities for eight years, but ultimately decided to take the plunge to pursue the business and lifestyle he was passionate about as a full-time endeavor in 2010. He located the business in his hometown of Medford near his father's home.

Justin, age 37, grew up hunting and fishing and has been hunting nearly 20 years. He shot one of his first trophy bucks when he was just 8 years old. "[I] would commute to the Cities every day because I couldn't handle living in the city," Justin said. "But it was nice because my boss lived on a lake, so I bought a boat and kept the boat at his house and I could fish at night at least, but other than that, I was pretty much driving back to Medford every weekend, hunting, fishing.'

Erin, age 32, is fully engaged in the business, performing every aspect of the skull cleaning work and customizing, and also does the business bookkeeping, marketing, and a lot of the direct customer-service work.

Erin, who has also hunted and fished her whole life, served in the U.S. Army and has a bachelor's degree in sociology. She worked in that field for seven years while working part-time for Justin in the business for eight years. But nearly three years ago she quit her full-time job to join Team Smack Down Outdoors full-time.

Social work is not a breadwinning career, financially, Erin said, and she'd be working in the shop with Justin until midnight or 1:00 a.m. a lot. At that time, Justin also had other employees on staff to help. "It made more sense financially to invest in both of us to be here," Erin said, rather than her working out and the business paying more employees.

A skull cleaning business-wholesale and retail

"A big part of our actual skull cleaning business is wholesale work," Justin said. "Most taxidermists don't want to mess with European mounts. So they sub them out to us, essentially. We're subcontractors to them." He said they currently work with more than 100 different taxidermists in Wisconsin, as well as others in Minnesota, and the Midwest.

Team Smack Down Outdoors also does a lot of retail work, working directly with their customers here in central and north central Wisconsin. Customers can now drop off their animal head and pick up their finished European mount at either their Medford or Merrill location.

Team Smack Down Outdoors is one of-if not the-

biggest skull cleaners in the Midwest for sure, and possibly in the nation, Justin and Erin said.

"A bigger European mount guy would do like 200 a year. That would be like a lot," Erin said, but most of them don't do it full-time. Even a lot of the taxidermists we work with are part-time, she said. "They work other full-time jobs."

By comparison, Team Smack Down Outdoors is processing 3,000-4,000 skulls each year.

Customization: A skull becomes art

Their Facebook page describes the business as specializing in "custom and unique art for the outdoors sportsman" ... and indeed their European mounts are art pieces, but they don't just stop with the mount itself. Team Smack Down offers multiple options for the base to which the European mount will be affixed, as well as skull customization

The bulk of their business is delivering plain white skulls to customers, typically mounted on a base for hanging, the couple said. But they have also expanded to offer many options for customization.

Hydro dipping is one such option. Instead of the skull being a plain solid white, the skull can be covered with a design or pattern-such as camouflage, a reptile pattern, the American flag, etc. The process is called hydro dipping because the design-which is being applied over the skullis done by placing the film in water and then dipping the skull into that film to apply the design.

Even though multiple skulls might incorporate the same





basic film pattern, "no two skulls are ever going to exactly be the same," Erin said. While the film may be a repeating pattern, the way that pattern affixes to an individual skull shape will be largely unique.

The process

Every animal head that comes in gets assigned a tag with a unique number that will follow that head/skull through every step of the process, and the couple has a meticulous old-school record-keeping system. "The black binder" or "notebook" keeps every detail about each skull including the customer's contact information-whether that comes from a taxidermist as a wholesale job or directly from the customer as a retail job, services ordered, and where the skull is in the process. They also frequently take photographs for documentation purposes. "I can't tell you how many times we touch that notebook in a day," Erin said.

"The big thing is tagging it so we know whose it is," Erin said.

"These tags-once you clip them on, they don't come off unless you cut them off," Justin said.

Initially when skulls come in, they are kept in a freezer. Prior to moving to their new headquarters, we had a full 53-foot semi trailer that we would use, Justin said, and that would be filled with skulls every year. At their new location, they built a large custom walk-in freezer that serves them much better. Building their own walk-in freezer was more efficient economically. "It cost us roughly a hundred dollars a day in diesel fuel to run," Erin said of the old trailer.

"When we get cranking, we'll have 2,000 skulls sitting in a freezer," Justin said, and "probably 200 to 300 skulls in here [in the shop] at a time. And they're just cycling through.'

The process begins with skinning. Customers can skin their own animal, but if it still needs to be skinnedfor which there is a fee-that's the first step. There is an additional charge if the skull comes in with fur, lower jaw, tongue, and/or eyes due to the additional time and expense associated with skinning, Erin said.

Next comes the process that essentially takes the meat off the bones. Many people ask if we beetle clean, Erin said. "We used to do beetles. And that's the most common method," she said. But they've since found a bacterial maceration process to be more effective. "It's basically like a controlled bacterial rot." It's not the kind of process someone with a

Since 1921. National Education Week. observed this year from Monday, Nov. 18 through Friday, Nov. 22, 2024, has become a celebration during which we recognize the important roles public schools and their staffs play in student development. Communities across the country have long devoted personnel and resources to achieve this significant goal.

Historically, Lincoln County had as many as 100 schools dotting the landscape to help achieve our local commitment to education. While fewer in number today, our public schools continue their work.

Today, more than ever, communities are called upon to help our educational systems excel in their quest to inspire excellence in each child. During National Education Week, we urge everyone to take a moment and thank those people who work in the forefront of a system that was designed to help each child attain her/his potential.

Individually, Lincoln County schools will have their own ways of celebrating this week, but perhaps there's something you could do this week and beyond.

For example, maybe have your child write a thank-you note to a teacher or two. Even if you have been out of school for decades, send a note to that teacher who made a difference in your life. What a great way to brighten someone's day!

Volunteer at your child's school. Attend concerts, art displays, sporting events, fundraisers, parent/teacher conferences (even in the high school years), and any other activities that bring you closer to your schools.

Opportunities are endless. This week should inspire parents and supporters of education to help keep our

schools vibrant and effective.

Educating America's youth has never been more important and challenging than today. What can you do to help kids, schools, and teachers?

Family efforts count. As a family, make education a priority. Set aside time daily to be a part of your child's educational life. Actually talk with your child. Put reasonable limits on social media and gaming. What you do as a family can have a tremendous impact on a child's education. Remember, it's not always where the bus is going, but where it's coming from that helps create success.

Read. Hopefully, this activity has begun in the home early in a child's life. If not, it's never too late to begin. Read to and with your child. Take your kid (and maybe the neighbor kids too!) to the library. It's free, healthy entertainment. If you notice that your child experiences difficulties with reading, get help. Many of us get great joy in the hunting culture and the family and friend relationships promoted by this activity. That's great. However, the epidemic of violence in schools should tell us that schools and school property are no places for weapons. Do whatever you can to help build a safe culture in our schools. Make bullying unacceptable. Physical and verbal abuse is never acceptable, whether on the playground, in a classroom, or on any social platform. Never make it OK to bully. Report bullying threats and actions to school authorities.

Be a partner, not an adversary. Realize that every classroom is made up of students who have differing abilities, aspirations, backgrounds, and values. Addressing the needs of this unique group is a daunting task. While you must be concerned about one child's progress, that teacher has to find ways to help everybody. Working calmly and rationally together helps solve issues.

This list of suggestions, although limited in length, would be an ideal way to make National Education Week extend to a year-long commitment to our schools and those who work diligently to prepare our children and grandchildren to face a complex, demanding future stretching out for another hundred years and more.

Be aware. Adopt a watchful eye for your child's physical







During an interview via email, he said open positions within the agency are few, and the candidates selected are some of the best. On average, a Conservation Officer Academy is held annually; however, some years the Academy is postponed if the number of vacancies is lower than average.

Albert said Minnesota usually gets several hundred applications for the open positions and typically selects 15-19 officers per year to hire and accept into the Academy. Recruits describe the Academy training as very intense and typically one or two of those officers drop out, realizing this is not the career they envisioned. Callie's class, which began in May, remains intactsomething the Minnesota DNR takes pride in, knowing they hired an exceptional group to begin their honorable careers with the agency.

After classroom instruction is complete, Albert said new wardens are sent into the field for a 16-week field-training program. Here the recruits are paired with three separate experienced wardens in various parts of the state. Expectations of new wardens become progressively higher with each pairing. By their fourth phase of training, conservation officer candidates are essentially expected to perform on

their own, Albert said.

Callie said her team of field training officers were able to help her take what she learned in the classroom into the field so she could perform all of the duties of a conservation officer on her own.

When asked, Callie said her grandfather, Jay Proft Sr., inspired her passion for the field of law enforcement. Jay better known to many as Gooze—served the citizens of Merrill as a police officer for 20 years before a workrelated injury forced his early retirement.

Within the field of law enforcement, there are many unique jobs—from federal to state to local—but Callie said she was drawn to becoming a conservation officer because this unique position enables her to both protect and serve her community and to protect its natural resources. The Minnesota DNR has 155 field stations across the state, and new wardens can choose where they want to be stationed based on vacant posts. After Callie completes her field training, she expects to be stationed in Winona County where she lives with her fiancé, Eric Weber, who is serving an apprenticeship with Excel Energy.

In August, Callie's family traveled to Camp Riley near Little Falls. Minn., to attend her graduation ceremony. Each recruit is expected to have a family member or loved one complete one of the final steps of the graduationthe honorable pinning of the badge. Callie chose her grandfather, Jay Proft Sr., to pin her badge, a very fitting choice, as now a new generation will continue to serve honorably in the field of law enforcement.

weak stomach will want to do, she said.

Team Smack Down Outdoors uses bacterial maceration, Justin said. "It's all natural ... It usually takes between 6-10 days, and we try to do about two hundred heads a week."

Teeth and bones separate from an individual skull and need to be meticulously labeled so they can be reunited with the appropriate skull.

Next comes degreasing the skulls in a chemical bath. Due to the expense of the chemicals used, those tanks are smaller, and this step is the bottleneck of the process, Justin said. "So the degreasing aspect of it can take anywhere from a day to a year," he said. to go through the whole process many, many times, Justin said. Bear are just greasier, and "the older they are, the greasier they are; they're not as porous like some of the younger bear." The more solid the bone structure, the better the grease adheres, he said.

A lot of times bear need

"We get a lot of bears. Bears are very greasy," Erin said. "Same with ... wild hogs. We've had some that we literally are running through for a year."

During their busiest time, they will have multiple tanks running.

The chemical whitening process comes next and doesn't take nearly as long. "They only have to be in there for two days," Justin said.

"Every other day we wash chem," he said. [Rinse, inspect, set up another chemical bath to put them back into the same process, or move a skull along to the next step.]

Once they're all done degreasing and getting whitened, the skulls come into the shop and the Novinskas go through them. First they need to gather the bags with the correct tag numbers to focus on each individual skull and all of its parts. Then they need to reassemble and glue the jaw and glue each individual tooth into its correct location, brush them, and sand them as necessary.

Next steps depend on the customization options the customer has selected. If the customer wants hydro dipping to incorporate graphics right onto the skull itself, that process will take place in the shop.

Then the skull is typically mounted for display

"That's the city we've built a business around," Erin said, so they definitely wanted to keep that location, as well.

"We actually set up a drop-off station," Justin said.

Erin said they have it set up with clear instructions laid out and a complete system in place enabling customers to complete their information, label/tag their animal head in the freezer there, and even make payments whenever it is convenient for them. They pick up from the location multiple times per week.

The Medford location is set up for "24/7 self-service access" and "it's been working really well," she said.

"Our circle of customers is fairly big," Justin said, "and revolves around kind of the center of Medford. But we have a lot of people now that I've done work for in Merrill, Marathon and Edgar, or Tomahawk that have always traveled to Medford."

Having two locations down is really convenient for their customers, as they now have the option to drop off in either Medford or Merrill, the couple said.

While all the skull work is done at the new rural Merrill location, customers can choose to pick up their finished product in either location, as well.

Justin said either he or Erin will physically be available at the Medford location during the rut and rifle deer hunting season with some regularity to accommodate the large volume of customers there.
