MARSHFIELD—The newest member of the Marshfield Children's Hospital has four legs and the ability to achieve what may be difficult for some patients: creating a connection.

Dolly, known formally on her name card as Dolly Paw-ton, is a seventeen month old golden retriever who will be working with the Child Life and Expressive Therapies team. Dolly was trained in Georgia by Canine Assistants which is a non-profit that trains service dogs. Developed in 2012, Canine Assistants

strongly believe in a bond-based approach to training. Like any young job seeker, Dolly had to begin her career with an internship. Dolly interned at the Children's Hospital of Atlanta.

Planet Fitness brings all inclusive, judgment free gym to Marshfield

MARSHFIELD—When Planet Fitness opened in Marshfield on Nov. 16, regional manager Phil Garofano, says the community was lined up outside the doors waiting to come in. On the gym's first day what was a planned opening for 10:00 in the morning became 9:40 as new members waited outside, eager to sign up. Planet Fitness' new location saw 300 members sign up on Nov. 16. Now with less than a month of being open, they are up to over 1000 gym members.

With over 50 cardio machines and over 60 pieces of strength equipment, Planet Fitness ensures no lines or waiting times to get a workout in.

Though Planet Fitness may be a national chain of gyms, Phil Garofano says they operate like an extension of the community. Prior to opening, Planet Fitness donated equipment to the Marshfield Fire Department. Devoted to maintaing new equipment in their gyms, Planet Fitness' will donate their used equipment once it becomes six to eight years old. When a location in the twin cities was looking to donate their old equipment, Garofano and his manager Jessica Cronce were able to bring an updated gym to the Marshfield Fire Department. On Nov. 9 Phil and Jessica delivered cardio equipment and free weights to the fire department, helping the firefighters unload the equipment between the stations two fitness rooms.

"They were all so great. They were all so appreciative and excited about the oppurtunity, excited to get their hands on a few new pieces of equipment." Garofano said.

Manager, Jessia Cronce, knows the importance of community for Planet Fitness given her roots in the Marshfield community. Cronce and all employees hired at Planet Fitness are local to the community, therefore weaving together familiar faces at the front desk with the access to a gym that may be more typical of a larger city. With a staff of community members, Planet Fitness is able to know what the community wants and needs.

The Planet Fitness staff has been working to make the community aware of their new location by handing out Halloween candy to over 3000 kids, attending farmers markets, and participating in the upcoming holiday parade.

Planet Fitness is known for being a "judgment free zone". Garofano says everyone is welcome, but Planet Fitness is especially a safe place for those who have not found a gym they love or a space where they can exercise.

Two membership options are available, but Garofano says there are frequent deals that can cut down the prices even more. Currently, the two membership options include the classic membership and the black card membership.

The classic membership, for \$15 a month, gives a member access to all fitness equipment in their home gym.

The black card membership, for \$25 a month, gives a member access to all fitness equipment in any Planet Fitness location, and additional amenities such as massage chairs, hydo massage loungers, tanning, and other spa services. There is no commitment needed for either membership option.

Marshfield's location has one trainer (with another soon to be added to the staff) that is available for all members to offer orientation to machines and assist with workouts.

Cranberry, White Spruce, Fast Growing Species Packet (5 species, 2 of each species including 2 Hybrid Poplar, 2 Hybrid Willow, 2 Norway Spruce, 2 Ninebark & 2 Silver Maple) and Bird & Butterfly Packet (five species, 2 of each species including 2 Butterfly Bush, 2 Lilac, 2 Trumpet Vine, 2 Rose of Sharon and 2 Hibiscus Moscheutos). Tree and shrub bundles contain 25 trees/shrubs while the packets contain 10 trees/bushes. Sizes range from 6-24 inches and prices range from \$22.00 - \$30.00 per/bundle or packet depending on the tree species. Native prairie wildflower seeds are also available and include Pollinator Mixes, Monarch Mixes, Erosion Control Mix, Land Restoration Mix, Grass Waterways Mix, Logging Road Mix and Pollinator Seed Bear (for a 200-400 square foot pollinator garden) as well as 6 varieties of Food Plot Mixes. Generic gel and tree shelters are also available at all times throughout the year (generic gel is a starch absorbent that retains water and gives it back to the plant during dry periods; tree shelters are 4-foot plastic, seamless, twin-walled tubes which protect newly planted seedlings from wildlife damage).







Since 2019, the Wood County Health Department has distributed over 2,700 doses of 4 milligrams Narcan® nasal spray, trained 579 individuals in Overdose Prevention and Narcan® Administration. and partnered with over 30 local agencies to use and distribute Narcan®. Narcan nasal spray, along with medical treatment, can reverse the life altering effects of an opiod overdose. Narcan nasal spray can restore an individual's breathing within



2-3 minutes, and in some cases even when breathing has stopped.



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
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2024 preliminary gun deer license sales and harvest totals

WOOD COUNTY--The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced preliminary deer harvest and license sale totals for the opening weekend of the 2024 gun deer season.

Preliminary figures indicate the number of gun deer hunters in Wisconsin slightly increased compared to 2023. As of 11:59 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 24, sales for gun deer privileges (which include gun, archery, crossbow, conservation patron and sports licenses) reached 778,111, up 0.48% from the same time last year.

Final license sales figures will be available in Jan., at which time DNR staff will perform a thorough analysis and interpretation.

In total, hunters registered 89,203 deer statewide during the opening weekend of the 2024 gun deer hunt, compared to 90,831 registered for the same period in 2023. This is a 1.8% decrease from a year ago and 4.7% below the 5-year Hunters registered a total of 49,038 antlered deer on

decrease. The antlerless harvest was 40,165, which is up 1.5% from last year. Conditions for opening weekend this year were mostly cloudy and dry, with some light precipitation in places on Saturday morning. Mornings were cool and quiet. Temperatures rose to near or above 40 each day, which

made for comfortable conditions for hunters. Reports from the field varied widely from good deer activity to little or no daytime deer movement. Some reports of breeding activity were still coming in, but

overall, deer sightings and harvest were down as expected, given the late opening date relative to the peak of the breeding season.



Following the completion of her internship, Marshfield Children's Hospital team of Child Life specialists McKenzie Tischauser, Lindsey Welch and Heidi Giese traveled to Atlanta to complete on site training with Dolly. Tischauser is Dolly's primary handler, though when Dolly clocks out for the day she will spend her nights at home with all three handlers periodically to form strong bonds.

Though Dolly is a dog, she must follow the rules like all employees. Dolly is required to take breaks during the day and only allowed to work 40 hours a week.

Bringing Dolly to Marshfield has been a long process. "It's been seven years in the making, but we're just so excited she's here." Tischauser said.

The wait may have been longer if the Christmas in July charity, run by Greg Cemke, known as Santa Greg, had not stepped in. Greg survived a near fatal ATV accident that was deemed a medical miracle by his doctors.

"The doctors said I should have been leaving the

hospital—not walking, not in a wheelchair—but in a body bag. They told me medically speaking, they couldn't tell me why I was still here. God above told me firmly I was here to do something I haven't done yet, and this is it." Cemke said. The Christmas in July charity recently celebrated ten years. The charity's primary goal is to fund items that cannot fit or stay in a budget.

Santa Greg has been working on bringing Dolly to Marshfield for two years now, "They've been waiting for seven years but I'm just so excited she's here now. She's amazing." Cemke said.

Dolly is a specially educated facility dog who will assist her handler in helping pediatric patients cope while at medical appoitments, procedures, or hospital stays. Different from a therapy dog, Dolly is an extension of her handler.

"We will assess patient needs and treatment goals as we build her patient load. This program is different than pet therapy where we won't be making rounds to patients or staff to 'say hi' or cheer them up with a stop for quick pets." said McKenzie Tischauser.

Dolly will be able to calm patients down when chainging

their medical port, enduring a stressful procedure, and can even get on the MRI table to show anxious patients how simple the test can be.

Dolly is the first of her kind in the area, and the second in the state. "Dolly is the first facility dog in central Wisconsin and the second facility dog in the state. She'll be making a real difference here in Marshfield." Greg Cemke said.

Though Dolly takes her job seriously, she still has plenty of time to play and run around. Dolly has a special fenced in grass area beside the Children's Hospital full of toys and several staff members eager to help her relax and run

Dolly is able to switch her moods quickly from work to play, as one of her handlers Heidi Giese said, "When Dolly's leash is on, she is working." Then when her leash comes off, Dolly chases her ball in her play area and runs to all the staff members to get pet.

Dolly has only recently started her first full time job, arriving to Marshfield on Nov. 25. However, Dolly is already exelling and her handlers are excited to see the change she helps create in patients.




