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# Remains of Cassandra Ayon found in Town of Brighton

MARSHFIELD--The Wisconsin Department of Justice in partnership with the Clark and Marathon County Sheriff's Offices, and the Clark County District Attorney's Office, announced the remains of Cassandra Ayon, last seen in Unity, Wis. on Oct. 3, 2020, have

been found on private property near CTH P and Abe Lincoln Road in the Town of Brighton, Marathon County, Wis. on Saturday, Nov. 30,

"My heart goes out to Cassandra's family and friends," said Attorney General Josh Kaul. "Thank you to everyone who has worked to get justice and help provide answers in this appalling case."

"Although we were pleased with the outcome of the trial and felt that justice had been done on behalf of Cassandra Ayon, we never stopped looking for her," said Clark County

# Marshfield woman sentenced to one year in prison for drug trafficking case

MARSHFIELD--Shandel L. Mohr, 32, of Marshfield was sentenced to 12 months and one day to federal prison for conspiring to distribute cocaine and methamphetamine. Mohr's time in prison will be followed by three years of supervised release. Mohr pleaded guilty to this charge on Aug. 20, 2024.

After several years of investigation which began in Feb. of 2022, officers seized packages containing drugs from the mail, controlled purchases of narcotics, and firearms and large quanties of drugs from an operation based out of Wausau. Based on the results of the investigation, officers believe kilogram quanities of cocaine and methamphetmine were being distributed.

Mohr was identifed as a cocaine dealer for the operation who would work in the area. The individual who previously worked in Mohr's role to sell drugs in the Marshfield area had been arrested, leading Mohr to be recruited to take over distribution in Marshfield.

Eight other individuals were also charged in regards to the drug trafficking organization.

District Attorney Melissa Inlow. "We hope that the discovery of her remains lends a sense of closure and finality to her family and everyone who misses and mourns her."

"This case has been on our minds for years, said Clark County Sheriff Scott Haines. "Our hearts and thoughts go out to the family and friends of Cassandra Ayon."

Jesus Contreras-Perez of Mosinee, Wis. was sentenced to life in prison without eligibility release on Sept. 12, 2022, in relation to disappearance of Cassandra Ayon. A jury Contreras-Perez found first-degree guilty of homicide, intentional hiding a corpse, and stalking causing bodily harm after a 5-day trial in June of 2022.

Wisconsin DOJ worked in partnership with the Clark County Sheriff's Office, the Marathon County Sheriff's Office, the Clark County District Attorney's Office, Marathon County Medical Examiner's Office, DNR, the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory, and Wisconsin State Patrol on recovery of the remains.

# Marshfield Clinic seeks volunteers for a community study of common respiratory illnesses and gastroenteritis in Marshfield area

MARSHFIELD – Respiratory and diarrheal illnesses are common, but doctors rarely know which germ is responsible. Some of these illnesses can be treated or prevented by vaccination. Volunteers are needed to help researchers understand how often people develop respiratory illness or diarrhea, and to identify the germs that are making them sick.

The PACC-ER study will enroll about 1,500 people of all ages for up to two years. So far, more than 700 people have signed up, but hundreds more are needed to reach the enrollment target by the end of this year. The study is led by Marshfield Clinic Research Institute research scientists Huong Nguyen and Joshua Petrie.

"Most of us remember getting sick with cough, cold or flu symptoms or a stomach bug," Nguyen said. "These illnesses can make you feel miserable and prevent you from going to work or school. This study will provide much needed information on the frequency and causes of these illnesses in the community." She also noted that study results will help guide vaccine development and aid doctors who are taking care of patients with respiratory illness or gastroenteritis.

Volunteers will fill out a brief survey each week to let the study team know if they are sick or not. Volunteers will collect and mail back a nose swab when they have cough, cold or flu symptoms or a stool sample when they have a stomach bug. These samples will be tested for different germs, and participants will be told if they have influenza, COVID-19, or respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). Blood and saliva samples will also be collected to measure immune responses. There will be three study

visits for blood collection: at enrollment, during summer 2025, and during summer 2026. Some participants may be asked to complete additional study visits with blood collection after vaccination or illness. Children under 5 years old can participate in the study without any blood or saliva collection. Participants may receive between \$228 and \$378, depending on how long they are in the study and which activities are done. Extra payment will be given to those who complete extra activities.

"People in central Wisconsin are always willing to help out friends and neighbors and support the community," Petrie said. "This is a wonderful opportunity for Marshfield-area residents to participate in science that is community-focused. It's quite rare for a large research study like this to take place in a rural midwestern setting. This is big-time infectious disease research that will be used at the national level."

More than 18,000 study invitation letters were sent to Marshfield-area children and adults. The study team needs your help to reach enrollment targets. Interested people are encouraged to contact the study team to see if they are eligible to volunteer. The study is open to invited people who live in the following communities: Abbotsford, Arpin, Auburndale, Hewitt, Marshfield, Milladore, Pittsville, Sherry, Spencer, Stratford, Rangeline, Rozellville and Unity. Children under 5 years old may also be eligible if they live in other communities near the study area.

This medical model allows the athletic training staff, who are health system employees, provide seamless access to the entire system of services including team physician Dr. Chad Giles and team surgeon Dr. Jeffery

There are seven full-time and several casual licensed athletic trainers supporting 26 collegiate teams of approximately 800 students. This level of support provides a dedicated athletic trainer for practices and events plus daily personalized care on campus. Athletes have full access to a highly trained sports medicine team. Dr. Giles and Dr. Rossow provide office hours on campus, in the training room or through field event coverage when attending games.

The sports medicine team treats a wide range of injuries and illnesses including, but not limited to concussions, cardiovascular issues, orthopedic injuries, acute emergencies, eating disorders, viral illnesses, bacterial illnesses, skin disorders, lacerations, surgical cases, mental health, and other injuries and illnesses.

"Our continued partnership with Marshfield Clinic Health System merges two vital organizations in Central Wisconsin," said UW-Stevens Point Athletic Director Brad Duckworth. "UW-Stevens Point Athletics strives to provide our student-athletes the best experience in NCAA Division III athletics and having quality health care is an essential component. The world-renowned health care from Marshfield Clinic Health System gives our student athletes the best chance to compete at the highest level. I couldn't be more grateful for our continued partnership."

With this seamless access to care, the sports medicine team can be active with preventive resources, including early identification of injury and provide a rapid response to care and recovery. This partnership continues the trailblazing medical model.

### Deer carcass disposal available



Deer carcasses or remains cannot be mixed with trash. Hunters can drop them off, for free, in the marked dumpster at the Portage County Transfer Facility through Jan. 31, 2025.

WOOD COUNTY--Portage County Solid Waste has once again collaborated with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to offer residents a free option for deer carcass disposal. A dedicated dumpster is available at the Portage County Solid Waste Transfer Facility until Jan. 31, 2025. After this date, deer carcasses and remains will no longer be accepted. This

service is available for both in-county and out-of-county residents.

Processing facilities and businesses must arrange for deer carcasses and remains to be sent directly to the Adams County or Marathon County Landfill.

The Portage County Solid Waste

Transfer Facility is also a CWD testing site. Please place deer heads for testing in the self-service kiosk located next to the carcass disposal dumpster.

Due to CWD concerns, many Wisconsin landfills no longer accept deer carcasses, and therefore they cannot be mixed with trash. If you need to dispose of deer carcasses or remains outside of the specified timeframe, the Marathon County Landfill will accept them year-round for a fee. As a reminder, it is illegal to dispose of waste on public lands, roadways, or

## Fighting food insecurity through the deer donation program

"According to data from the Wisconsin Health Department OI Services, more than 900,000 Wisconsin residents received food assistance in 2023. There remains a high

Since the program began in 2000, hunters have donated over 98,000 deer, totaling nearly 4 million pounds of venison, to help Wisconsinites in need. A network of venison donation partners, including county land and water conservation departments, food pantries, charitable organizations, USDA-Wildlife Services and participating meat processors, all help administer and implement the program.

Some of the lead fragments may be too small to see during processing. Although research has not linked lead in venison to human health effects, hunters are encouraged to use non-lead ammunition. Visit the DNR's Safely Eating Venison webpage for more information and steps to reduce potential exposure.

### Stratford School District Celebrates Academic Excellence in State Testing

# Explore more with Wisconsin State Park System's new 12-month admission pass

WOOD COUNTY--The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced the Wisconsin State Park System will be moving to a 12-month admission pass model. The new 12-month admission passes is available to purchase as of Monday, Dec. 2, 2024.

The update to the Wisconsin State Park System admission pass follows the implementation of 2023 Wisconsin Act 113, which was signed by Governor Tony Evers on March 14, 2024. The new pass model is valid for 12 months following the month of purchase, rather than expiring on Dec. 31. The 2025 passes purchased in Dec. 2024 will be valid through Jan. 2026.

"With this new 12-month pass model, we hope that our customers are encouraged to spend more time outdoors enjoying Wisconsin's beautiful public lands," said Steve Schmelzer, DNR Parks and Recreation Management Director. "This is a great opportunity to plan a visit to a place you've never been before. There are tons of ways to make the most of your full 12 months of exploring."

The physical appearance of the pass has also been updated. In addition to being slightly larger, the 12 months of the year will be listed around the perimeter of the pass. Beginning in 2025, the pass will be marked to indicate the month and year in which the pass will expire. The pass remains valid until the final day of the 12th month following the month in which it is issued. For example, a pass that is marked to expire March 2026 will be valid through March 31, 2026.

Reduced-rate vehicle admission passes will still be available for additional vehicles registered to the same address. Reduced-rate passes must be purchased at the same time as the full-price pass or at a later date with proof of purchase of the full-price vehicle pass. Passes for additional vehicles will expire in the same month and year as the household's full-price pass.

Beginning in March 2025, conservation patron state park vehicle admission passes will be the same design as other vehicle admission passes. The validity period for conservation patron passholders is not changing. A conservation patron pass will always be marked for the

month of March, regardless of when it was redeemed.

Customers are encouraged to save time by buying their passes online. Orders placed online will receive an email receipt with a confirmation number that can be used immediately for park entry. 12-month vehicle admission passes purchased online will be delivered pre-marked with the expiration month and year according to the date of purchase.

### **Vehicle Admission Passes**

A vehicle admission pass is required on all motor vehicles stopping in state parks, forests and recreation areas. Admission passes can be purchased online or at most individual properties via drive-up window service or electronic sales kiosks.

Vehicle admission fees include daily and 12-month rates. A 12-month admission pass costs \$28 for vehicles with Wisconsin license plates or \$38 for vehicles with out-of-state plates

If there is more than one vehicle registered to the same household, additional vehicle passes are available for \$15.50 for in-state plates and \$20.50 for out-of-state plates. A senior citizen 12-month sticker is available for \$13 to Wisconsin residents 65 years of age and older. Daily passes are \$13 for

vehicles with Wisconsin licenses plates and \$16 for vehicles with out-of-state plates for all properties in 2025.

### **State Trail Passes**

The 2025 annual state trail passes will go on sale beginning Monday, Dec. 2, 2024. The annual state trail pass is valid for the calendar year. A 2025 annual state trail pass will expire Dec. 31, 2025, regardless of when it was purchased.

A state trail pass is required for all people age 16 or older who bike, cross-country ski, horseback ride or inline skate on certain trails. A state trail pass is not required for walking or hiking. The DNR reminds the public that annual state trail passes are different from vehicle admission passes.

The DNR offers the option to purchase a state trail pass online by selecting "Trail Pass" under "Product Type." State trail passes can also be purchased at individual properties via drive-up window service or electronic sales kiosks, DNR service centers or a DNR-affiliated vendor or sub-yendor.

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# DNR seeking public input on the statewide comprehensive outdoor recreation plan

WOOD COUNTY--The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking public input on the draft Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP).

The SCORP describes the supply and demand for outdoor recreation in Wisconsin. The draft Wisconsin SCORP includes an analysis of the motivations for recreating and the barriers Wisconsin residents may experience preventing them from participating in outdoor recreation.

States are required to complete SCORPs every five years to be eligible for participation in the Land and Water Conservation Fund State Assistance Program.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund was enacted by Congress in 1965 "to strength the health and vitality of the United States" through the acquisition and development of outdoor recreation resources and facilities. States are allocated funds as matching (50%) grants for the acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation sites and facilities.

The public is encouraged to submit comments using the online public input form on the DNR's Wisconsin Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan webpage. Comments may also be sent via U.S. mail, phone or email. Submit comments by Dec. 15, 2024 to:

When not on the field or in practice at the University of Minnesota State Moorhead, Lauryn will be studying exercise science and kinseology.



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

# Plan ahead to prevent impaired driving this holiday season

Dec. Law of the Month: Impaired driving

WOOD COUNTY--Dec. is here, and with it, another season of holiday celebrations. Don't cut the party short by driving impaired--it is dangerous, reckless and never the only option.

Wisconsin State Patrol's Dec. Law of the Month brings attention to impaired driving laws and encourages motorists to find safe ways to get to their destinations this holiday season.

"Across the state, Wisconsinites are celebrating the holidays and the end of another year," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Tim Carnahan said. "We encourage everyone to take responsibility and plan ahead if you plan to celebrate. Designate a sober driver ahead of time, take public transit, or use a rideshare program to keep yourself and others safe on the roads. There is never an excuse for driving impaired."

On average, someone is injured or killed in an impaired

driving crash every two hours in Wisconsin. In 2023, there were over 7,700 impaired driving crashes that claimed the lives of 186 people on Wisconsin roads.

In Wisconsin, drivers are prohibited from operating any vehicle with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of more than 0.08. Under Wisconsin's "not a drop" law, drivers under age 21 are prohibited from having any detectable amount of alcohol in their system. Drivers may not have any illegal drugs in their system when behind the wheel.

Motorists who refuse a blood/breath alcohol test will lose their license for at least one year and may have their vehicle impounded.

Over 7,500 law enforcement officers across the state are trained in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE). This helps law enforcement detect impaired drivers and get them off the road.

With almost 400 Drug Recognition Experts (DREs)

across the state, Wisconsin is helping lead the nation in eliminating drug-impaired driving. DREs help prevent tragedies by identifying the signs of drug-impaired driving and securing convictions to keep them off the roads.

The Wisconsin State Patrol is continuing to highlight the danger that impaired driving poses throughout the holiday season with its Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign. Running from Dec. 13, 2024, through Jan. 1, 2025, Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over is an annual holiday partnership with local law enforcement to keep Wisconsin roads safe and free of impaired drivers.

Driving impaired carries serious

consequences. Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) charges can cost you around \$10,000. Stay safe and save money on the road this holiday season:

- Select a sober designated driver ahead of time. If you're feeling impaired, you are likely over the 0.08 Blood Alcohol Concentration limit and should not drive.
- Remember you have options: take the bus, call a taxi, use a rideshare or ask a sober friend to drive you home.
- If you have a friend who is about to drive under the influence, step in. Take away their keys and get them home safely.
- If it's your turn to be the sober driver, take that job seriously.
- If you suspect a driver is impaired, safely gather as much information as you can about the vehicle, driver and location. Then call 911.
