

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
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

Big chase

Sheriff's office chases vehicle through Rib Mountain; Sheriff's Office confirms suspect



One man is in custody

following a high-speed pursuit through Rib Mountain on Saturday.

Police confirmed the suspect is Cody J. Patterson, who was arrested Saturday following a burglary and high-speed pursuit that left a slough of damaged property and squad cars in its wake.

A Marathon County Sheriff's Deputy around 10 am Saturday made a

traffic stop for a minor violation. During the stop, the driver told the deputy about a burglary and vehicle theft occurring a short distance away.

The deputy raced to the site to find a vehicle speeding off from the residence, which he attempted to stop. Instead, Patterson kept going, police say.

The driver took off down Highway NN, drove through an open field in an attempt to shake the deputy off, and ended up back on NN. Patterson then headed back toward Rib Mountain, traveling down Rib

Mountain Drive and through several Rib Mountain streets and yards, police say. Wausau Police Department and the Wisconsin State Patrol helped in the pursuit.

Police didn't specify which tactics they used to ultimately stop Patterson on Jonquil Lane, but those tactics resulted in damage to several squad cars involved. The stolen truck was damaged too, according to a report

about the incident.

The driver was treated for minor leg injuries before being transported to Marathon County Jail to await an initial appearance on Tuesday.

Police also believe Patterson was involved in several other crimes along with some accomplices, but police didn't specify the nature of those crimes.

Marathon County Sheriff Chad Billeb told City Pages three squads were damaged but drivable, and another squad was damaged to the point it needed to be towed.

Community on Call activated first time this season

The city of Wausau activated its Community on Call feature last week as cold temperatures found their way to the city.

Community on Call started last year as a way to provide additional shelter for homeless people in the Wausau area to ensure they don't freeze in the cold temperatures. Through the program, businesses, churches and other agencies open up space for temporary shelters when temperatures reach a certain point. Metro Ride helped provide transportation to any off-site location.

City seeking new HR director

The city of Wausau will be looking for a new human resources director.

HR Director James Henderson resigned, according to a copy of the resignation letter received by City Pages.

Henderson's departure follows
Liz Brodek's from the Community
Development Director position. Brodek
resigned her post to take a new job earlier
this year.

The city council last week had an agenda item to recruit for a new HR director but neither committee had taken it up, so the council didn't yet act on it.

School district names Bushman permanent superintendent

After spending most of the year filling in the role, the school district made it official.

Cale Bushman will be the permanent Wausau School Superintendent.

Bushman was named interim superintendent in March follow-

ing the retirement of Keith Hilts from the position. The Wausau School Board on Monday voted Bushman permanently into the role.

School Board President James Bouche said Bushman demonstrated excellence in the more than six months he served as interim superintendent. "We know that he will continue to do incredible work; guiding and positioning the Wausau School District for success."

Bushman in a press release said he was honored to accept the role. It comes at a time when the district will weigh the potential closing of several elementary schools.





Construction on downtown streets could kick off as early as April

A plan to reconstruct city streets around the former Wausau Center mall site could kick off as early as mid-April.

Becher-Hoppe is about 90% complete with designing the project, which will reconstruct Washington, Jackson and Third streets south of Washington. City Engineer Allen Wesolowski told the city's infrastructure committee that Becher-Hoppe plans to start bidding the work in mid-January and hopes to kick off construction in mid-April, as long as the weather cooperates.

The work is connected to the mall redevelopment project. T. Wall Enterprises is working on a 150-unit, three-story building on the site right now. Called the Foundry on Third project, the mixed-use building is expected to open next fall.

Washington Street borders the project on the north end and will be converted into a two-way street. Jackson and Third streets will be extended into the mall area as part of the redevelopment.

The project is expected to cost roughly \$4 million and would be paid for with tax increment financing funds.

Construction on the streets project is expected to last into next fall, Wesolowski says. T. Wall Enterprises has presented plans for a second, similar building on the site, though nothing has been formally presented to city leaders yet.

Apartment owner wins reversal of chronic nuisance declaration

The owner of a rental property that had been declared a chronic nuisance by the city after fully cooperating with police won an appeal against that declaration.

Chad Thompson, who owns a mixedused building at 1013 N. Third Avenue, appealed the declaration imposed by Wausau Police after they arrested one of his tenants and a guest for dealing drugs.

The city's Public Health and Safety Committee overturned the declaration following a hearing before the committee. In that hearing, Thompson explained that he had anonymously tipped off police about potential drug activity because he feared retaliation. Police investigated the complaint and arrested the tenant and others from that tip.

Police notified Thompson that he could post a five-day eviction of the tenant, which he did. Thompson explained they had a young woman staying there from Michigan, and he let her stay there a few days so she could find somewhere else to go, which she did.

Residents can apply for assistance for ash tree removal

Residents in Wausau can now apply for assistance to have their ash trees removed, thanks to a new grant from the Department of Natural Resources.

The DNR awarded nearly \$500,000 to the city of Wausau to help remove ash trees. Wausau received one of the largest rewards in the state to remove the trees, according to a press release from Marathon County. That includes \$100,000 to remove ash trees from private property. It also includes money to eliminate trees from public right of way.

The city and other municipalities have

been working to remove ash trees because of an invasive species called Emerald Ash Borer, which burrows into ash trees and kills them. Though treatments exist to keep the tree alive longer than usual, there's no way to completely get rid of the ash borers.

Those interested in applying should look into it at www.marathoncounty.gov/urbanforestry. The grants will be provided on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Election deflection

Troupis attacks Kaul in court over 2020 fake electors prosecutions

Jim Troupis said Dem AG Josh Kaul should be "ashamed of himself" for seeking to prosecute him and two other former Donald Trump aides for their role in the 2020 fake electors scheme.

Troupis, after his initial appearance yesterday at the Dane County Courthouse on 11 felony counts, said Kaul is "using the courts for his own political gain."

"This is a political case," said Troupis, a former Trump attorney. "This has nothing to do with the law."

He added: "Having spent more than 40 years defending our judges, defending our system of justice, having been honored to serve as a judge in this very courthouse, I am saddened by this gross misuse of our courts by the Wisconsin Attorney General."

A DOJ spokesperson didn't immediately respond to a request for comment on Troupis' remarks.

Kaul has filed charges against Troupis, fellow former Trump attorney Kenneth Chesebro and 2020 Trump



campaign aide Michael Roman for being a part of the legal team that advised Wisconsin's 10 GOP electors to meet and cast their votes for Trump after Biden's victory in the state had already been certified.

Troupis, Chesebro and Roman made their initial appearances in court yesterday, with Roman and Chesebro

appearing by phone. Dane County Circuit Court Commissioner Mark Fremgen said during the hearing there is probable cause to continue with all three cases. All three defendants then agreed to a signature bond with no contact with Trump-Pence electors before the preliminary hearing in January.



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Biden, WI public officials offer condolences over WI school shooting

Wisconsin public officials offered their condolences after three people died in a shooting at a Madison private school yesterday. Gov. Tony Evers ordered flags to fly at half-staff through Sunday in their honor.

Madison Police said the three dead included the suspected shooter, whom they described as a student at Abundant Life Christian School on the city's far east side. A teacher and teenaged student were also killed, while another six students were injured. Madison Police Chief Shon Barnes said two of the students this afternoon were in critical condition with life-threatening injuries.

Barnes said the shooting was confined to one space in the school. But he declined to provide any additional details on the shooter, saying it was still early in the investigation. Barnes said the shooter's family was cooperating, but he couldn't provide details on a possible motivation.

"As difficult as today is, that's still someone's child that's gone, that's still someone that has to deal with what happened today and so we want to make sure that we can ensure as much cooperation as we can," Barnes said.

Evers said there were "no words to describe the devastation and heartbreak we feel today."

"As a father, a grandfather, and as governor, it is unthinkable that a kid or an educator might wake up and go to school one morning and never come home," Evers said. "This should never happen, and I will never accept this as a foregone reality or stop working to change it."

JFC pushes back on DPI assertion it doesn't need committee approval for curriculum decision

The GOP co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee have rejected the Department of Public Instruction's argument that it isn't required to seek the committee's approval of recommended reading curriculum under the state's new literacy law.

Rep. Mark Born, of Beaver Dam, and Sen. Howard Marklein, of Spring Green, in a letter to Superintendent Jill Underly Tuesday said the committee would weigh in on the recommendations regardless of DPI's interpretation of the law.

The development comes after Underly in a Friday letter to Born and Marklein said DPI had adopted reading curriculum recommendations by the Early Literacy Curricula Council and wouldn't seek JFC approval.

She pointed to a 6-1 state Supreme Court decision overturning the process the GOP-controlled Legislature has used to block stewardship purchases through JFC, ruling it violates the separation of powers.

But Born and Marklein argued DPI is required by law to submit the council's recommendations to JFC for review or approval, and the court's decision "does not relieve the Department of Public Instruction from this obligation."

Committee recommends sandhill crane hunt


A split study committee voted 8-4 to recommend legislation that would allow a hunt of sandhill cranes while providing state funding to address damage the birds do to crops.

The committee had three bill drafts on its agenda Tuesday: one that only addressed the crop subsidies, one focused on the hunt and one that combined the two.

The committee voted 7-5 to reject the standalone crop subsidy bill. It then passed on taking up the bill that only addressed a possible hunt.

Under the bill draft, the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection would administer a program to reimburse producers up to 50% of the costs to obtain a nonlethal treatment that they apply to corn seed to discourage birds from consuming it. The reimbursement would be capped at \$6,250 per applicant, per planting season.

The bill would appropriate nearly \$1.9 million in general purpose revenue in each 2025-26 and 2026-27.

Schofield Mobile Home Park story was incomplete

Dear Editor.

This letter is in response to the 11/14/24 City Pages article on the trailer park at 281 Grand Ave in Schofield. While your article is generally correct in what was stated, it is significantly incomplete as it starts somewhat in the middle of the situation and completely ignores the on-going efforts by the City of Schofield and the Mountain Bay Metro Police Department / Everest Metro Police to address the problems. In checking with city staff, no one is aware of any attempts by the City Pages to reach out to anyone within the Schofield city government. Since the trailer park is located entirely within Schofield city limits, this seems to be a very odd omission.

Since 2023, the goals of the City of Schofield through the City Council and the Health and Sanitation Committee have been the clean up and remediation of the 281 Grand Ave property, and to do it in such a way that Schofield or Marathon County taxpayers are not ultimately paying for the clean up and remediation.

Early on in discussions, it was recognized that the scope of the problem was beyond the resources of Schofield alone and that it would take the combined

efforts of the City of Schofield and Marathon County to solve the problem. As the County Board Supervisor representing Schofield at the time, I had discussions with my fellow County Board members and also reached out to County Administrator Leonhard and county staff in 2023 to raise awareness at the county level.

At the request of the Schofield City Council and the Health and Sanitation Committee the new Mountain Bay Metro Police Department and the former Everest Metro Police Department conducted regular patrols through the former trailer park documenting the many on-going health, sanitation and public safety issues. In addition, the Schofield Public Works Department worked to provide an inventory of the abandoned trailers and numerous photos of the dilapidated / hazardous conditions of the trailers.

The combination of the MBMPD police logs and the Schofield Public Works inventory and report provided key documentation required to move the legal process forward.

The next step took place on May 1, 2024 as a public meeting of the Schofield Health and Sanitation Committee along with representatives of the Marathon County Health Department and the Marathon County Corporation Counsel was held at Schofield City Hall. Public commentary was also given during the May 1 st meeting and was critical to moving forward. The meeting minutes are attached to the email.

The purpose of the meeting was three-fold: #1 – To share documented evidence regarding the conditions at 281 Grand Ave with Marathon County Staff; #2 – To discuss and evaluate the various legal options to move forward with clean up and remediation; #3 – To build a sense of urgency and a bias for action between the City of Schofield and Marathon County.

My thanks to everyone involved – this was truly a team effort between the City of Schofield, the Mountain Bay Metro PD and Marathon County. When we work together, we can achieve great results for our residents.

Choose good sources of information about climate change

Did you know that the Earth's hottest ten years since reliable measured records began in the 1800s have all been since 2014? Climate change is accelerating, and it is critical to try to slow the rate to give humans, plants, and animals more time to adapt.

Despite the efforts of some politicians and companies to hide the truth, the science of human induced climate change has been well understood since the 1980s. Primarily from the burning of coal, oil, and gas, the levels of carbon dioxide since 1750 in the atmosphere have risen by about 50%. Its concentration now is close to 425 parts per million, the highest in about 3 million years according to ice core samples and other natural indicators. Carbon based gases prevent some of the infrared heat emitted from Earth's surface from reaching space. The planet has warmed by about 1.5 degrees C above pre-industrial levels from this process, which was a threshold to avoid exceeding

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from the Paris Climate Agreement a decade ago. However, it appears we are heading for at least 2.0 or 2.5 C by the end of this century due to clean energy not yet keeping up pace with the world's growing energy demands.

You've heard about impacts like sea level rise, coastal flooding, hurricanes intensifying at record rates, and more intense droughts and heat waves. For example, Phoenix had an absurd record of 113 days in a row this summer with high temperatures of 100 degrees F or higher. Their longest stretch before that was only 76 days. Things that were once unthinkable are becoming common.

At the current rate of change, Wisconsin could have a climate similar to current day St. Louis by the end of the century. This will mean longer, much hotter summers, which will cause us to spend more money on air conditioning and make it harder on outdoor workers, as well as dairy and livestock herds. Some of the animals we currently hunt and fish may not thrive here anymore. The economic loss to recreation and tourism from warmer winters with less reliable snow and ice has been felt for many years already around here and will get even more drastic.

Rainfall is becoming more extreme as the warmer air holds more water

vapor. This was well predicted by climate models 20 years ago. For instance, in October, parts of Spain had 19 inches of rain (a whole year's worth for them) in 8 hours with the resulting flash flood killing over 200 people. Try to imagine the catastrophic damage to the land, buildings, roads, and bridges if our state was hit with 20 plus inches of rain in a day. How many of us and our loved ones would be killed outright, not to mention animals? It is more likely to happen with every tenth of a degree our planet warms.

As disasters pile up around the region, insurance costs will skyrocket. The increased volatility of rainfall patterns will make field work and crop growing conditions more difficult. In between the wet bursts, prolonged intense droughts will increase wildfires destroying valuable timber and property. New insects and diseases will move in, further threatening our crops and forests. There will be more days of poor air quality which will take a toll on our health. The list could go on and on.

Please seek out objective scientific data sources on climate change such as The American Meteorological Society, The Wisconsin State Climatology Office, IPCC, WMO, NASA, NOAA, and the journal

Nature. Let's keep trying to lower our carbon footprint on an individual and community level and the good news is that there are very simple options already available that can save us money in the process! Private industry and the energy sector are already working to make positive changes. However, they need the bi-partisan support of our state and national governments to be even more effective. For example, the Republican Governor of Wyoming, Mark Gordon, is doing an excellent job of integrating wind and solar energy into his state with great benefits for all. Contact your local elected officials all the way up to the president and press them to work urgently on sound climate policy. Even if that means fossil fuels can't be completely phased out, our leaders can still provide funding and a good framework for carbon capture techniques, research, and adaptation strategies here and abroad to grow. You and I still have the power to do our part to change the trajectory of this crisis. Seize the chance because we are late in the game already.

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Holiday music releases can be a hodge-podge stocking filled with an odd mix of festive favorites, delightful surprises and occasional lumps of coal. In other words, it's hard to know what to expect. Artists who do release Christmas albums will sometimes release them well before Halloween, while others, like procrastinating shoppers, wait until it's almost Christmas. One constant is there's almost always something for every taste – whether it's country, soul, rock or oldies. So, for those who enjoy the tradition of adding a holiday soundtrack to their seasonal activities, here's a selection of new offerings from stars across the musical spectrum.

"Sleigher"

Ben Folds



Singer-songwriter, Ben Folds, who arguably sang one of the most depressing anthems of the 1990s with "Brick," gifts fans with this melodious, but not particularly jolly holiday release. There are seven original tunes on the 10-track album, including the heart-

wrenching "Me and Maurice" about a sad man walking his dog alone on Christmas Eve. The three covers include the Mills Brothers' "You Don't Have to Be a Santa Claus," a timely tune that suggests sharing the giving spirits all year long. There's also the rarely covered Burt Bacharach/ Herb Alpert collaboration, "The Bell That Couldn't Jingle," which stands out as one of the more upbeat tunes in the collection. He also does a nice version of the oft-covered "The Christmas Song." Folds is a gifted pianist and the release includes two captivating original instrumentals, "Little Drummer Bolero" and "Waiting for Snow." "Christmas Time Rhyme" stands out as the tune that sounds quintessentially Ben Folds. He also performs a duet, "We Could Have This," with actress and singer, Lindsey Kraft. The strangest cut, "Christmas Aye Eye," purports to be an AI-generated Christmas song, and if that's true, there may be hope for humanity yet. Folds was scheduled to play Wausau's Grand Theater in October, but the show has been rescheduled to May. This release might help fill the gap for die-hard fans until spring.

"It's Christmas"

Tower of Power



For those not hip to Tower of Power, they're an American R&B and funk-based band and horn section that's been around since the later '60s. Think Earth, Wind & Fire or Chicago. The band had early success with songs like "So Very Hard to Go" and "What

is Hip?" The R&B group released their first full-length Christmas album extra early, on Sept. 27. The album features 11 tracks that are just as funky and festive as you'd expect from these veteran performers. The release opens with a surprisingly grooving instrumental version of "The Christmas Song" before launching into a soulful rendition of "This Christmas." Among the soul-infused tracks are traditional seasonal favorites like "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" and "Silver Bells." Religious favorites, "O Holy Night" and "Mary Did You Know," become slow and soulful hymns and help balance out the release. The outstanding and only original track on the album is "It's Christmas (A Long Way from Home)." An unexpected addition is "Maoz Tzur," a traditional song often sung each night of Hannukah after the last blessing. The collection concludes with an instrumental "Christmas Medley," which flows seamlessly from "O Christmas Tree" to "Christmas Time Is Here" to "What Child Is This." Throw this one on when you need to get your holiday



"The Gift of Love"

Jennifer Hudson



Hudson first rose to fame on Season 3 of "American Idol." The fan favorite garnered attention not for winning the competition, but for being eliminated in the fourth round. That was 20 years ago, and Hudson has since gone on to be one of the

most successful of all the "Idol" competitors (sorry, Kelly Clarkson). She went on to appear in the movie, "Dreamgirls," a musical that followed the rise and fall of a Motown girl group. Her performance earned her an Academy Award for best supporting actress in 2007. Two years later, she garnered her first Grammy for best rhythm and blues album. In 2020, she received a Daytime Emmy for serving as executive producer of the animated short film, "Baby Yaga." When "A Strange Loop," the Broadway musical she co-produced in 2022, was honored with the Tony Award for best new musical, Hudson became the second Black woman to win the coveted EGOT status. Since 2022, Hudson has hosted her own daytime talk show, "The Jennifer Hudson Show."

J. Hud is seemingly everywhere this holiday season. She has appeared in Old Navy holiday commercials and served as a mega mentor on "The Voice." Her first holiday album, "The Gift of Love" was released Oct. 18. Fans had a chance to see her perform two cuts from the album, the classic "Winter Wonderland" and "Make it to Christmas" on NBC's annual "Christmas in Rockefeller Center" special. Her holiday release includes a nice mix of traditional and new songs. Her powerful voice really shines on some of the cherished holiday hymns, including "Go Tell it On the Mountain" and "O Holy Night." There are some secular tunes, including the lighthearted "Santa for Someone," and even a couple of not-actually Christmas songs like "My Favorite Things" from "The Sound of Music" and Leonard Cohen's melancholy "Hallelujah."



"It's Officially Christmas"

Dan + Shay



Dan + Shay is an American country music duo composed of vocalists and songwriters, Dan Smyers and Shay Mooney. In 2023, Dan + Shay appeared as the first duo-chair on Season 25 of "The Voice." The duo released their first-ever holiday album, "It's Officially

Christmas: The Double Album" on Oct. 18. Although their style is predominately country, there's enough mainstream pop and traditional stylings in the mix to give this collection a broader appeal.

The pair's debut holiday album contains a generous 21 songs, including 10 traditional cuts and 11 originals. The release is conveniently divided into two "discs," with Disc 1 featuring the Christmas classics and Disc 2 featuring all original songs written or co-written by Dan + Shay. The two have been teasing a Christmas album for several years, releasing several of the original tunes over the last few years. The title track, "Officially Christmas," along with "Take Me Home for Christmas" and "Christmas isn't Christmas" were released as singles in 2021. Likewise, "Pick Out a Christmas Tree" and "Holiday Party" were first released in 2022. It's a good mix from the rollicking "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" to the solemn "Silent Night." The hefty number of originals, such as "Blame it on Santa" and "Save the Snowman" means listeners aren't forced to listen exclusively to the same old holiday covers. With almost two dozen songs, this is one that can be thrown on before tree decorating and might still be playing as you're wrapping up presents.

made national news. "A Philly Special Christmas Party" is the third and supposedly final holiday release from Philadelphia Eagles legend, Jason Kelce, and his former teammates, offensive tackles, Lane Johnson and Jordan Mailata.

The first album, "A Philly Special Christmas," released in 2022. The record donated over \$1.25 million to local charities, including Children's Crisis Treatment Center and fulfilled the wish lists of Philadelphia School District teachers via Donors Choose. The second holiday album,

"A Philly Special Christmas Special," was released last year. The third album features Jason's previously released collaboration with his brother, Travis Kelce, and Boyz II Men, "It's Christmastime (In Cleveland Heights)." Reality TV Rules the Holidays



Recommendation: The Lincoln Lawyer Where to find it: Netflix Type: TV Series, three seasons

Synopsis: The Lincoln Lawyer has nothing to do with the 16th President of the U.S. It centers on lawyer Mickey Haller, who operates his law practice outside of the back of his Lincoln Town Car since he feels he spends so much time there anyway. Cocktail craft

Jeff Dixon spent years honing his skill at making high-end drinks. Now he's opened a bar dedicated to them

Walking into Juliett, Wausau's newest cocktail lounge, during the daylight hours really doesn't do the place justice.

It comes alive in the evening, with lights dimmed. That's when the atmosphere really pops.

Juliett, on Third Street across from Downtown Grocery in the space formerly home to 715 Tattoos, is the brainchild of Jeff Dixon. Many might remember Dixon from something called Night Tribe Cocktails. Night Tribe grew out of the pandemic, when a new law allowed establishments to bottle up cocktails to go since no one could drink inside an establishment.

Dixon operated that business out of a couple of places around town and that led to Whitewater Music Hall launching a residency for Dixon and Night Tribe, where he'd serve his cocktail drinks.

It's there where I first met Dixon. I reached out to see if he would be interested in helping with a holiday drink special for City Pages' Winterbook. I had Dixon create the drinks, walk me through their creation while I took notes and took pictures of the finished products.

I of course sampled the results, and they were beyond good. They were the work of a man who has poured everything into his craft for years. The level of detail goes down to even the ice, which is specially prepared in a large sheet and hand-cut with a saw to create those giant, clear cubes that are part of the cocktail experience.

Dixon walked me through the development of his craft on a Thursday afternoon at Juliett, which he opened in November. It started with a job at Back When Cafe, where cocktails piqued his interest and led to him reading books, studying and practicing. He also studied chemistry in college, no doubt a help. And he worked at a place called the Biltmore estate in Asheville, N.C. where he really caught the cocktail bug. No doubt he was also influenced by his time in Japan, where craftsmanship takes on a whole new meaning.

Dixon also worked at Great Northern Distillery for five years, which re-opened a couple of years ago in Stevens Point after being located in Plover.

Which is to say that once Dixon decided to open his own place, his reputation for honing his craft and presenting a delicious cocktail already preceded him. Pretty much every night in the three weeks since he opened has been absolutely packed. Word spread like wildfire on social media and photos of the place popped up on Facebook as soon as the doors opened.

Much like the care he puts into his cocktails, Dixon put a lot into the look of the place. It's green and red, with exposed brick behind the bar (the wall covers part of the brick, as if a big chunk of it was ripped off, giving it a cool

effect). Around the bar and surrounding tables are little green desk lamps.

For sound, Dixon has a turntable and reel-to-reel player, hooked up to speakers with a special tweeter meant to bring out the high end. Jazz is a standard at the lounge, but on display is a copy of a record by Notorious BIG. Dixon says he reads the crowd, but

most nights start with jazz.

Dixon says he's very careful about the kinds of liquors he keeps for the bar. Though the focus is on cocktails, he curates some specific wines and beers as well. And there are a number of NA options. Dixon says their mission isn't to serve people delicious cocktails, it's to serve them delicious drinks, period.

Dixon isn't alone behind the bar. He hired a woman with years of experience at some of the top cocktail lounges in Madison, and has two barbacks, one who is now learning the craft of making cocktails too.

So far, chatter is all positive on Juliett. And no doubt, considering the care that Dixon puts into his craft, that isn't likely to change any time soon.



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
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


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
