# Gov. Evers, DNR announce 2025 Urban Forestry Program Grant Recipients

WOOD COUNTY--Gov. Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced the Urban Forestry (UF) Grant Program recipients for the 2025 grant year. In addition to helping fund projects consistent with state and national goals for increasing the urban forest canopy, reducing carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gasses from the atmosphere, and improving the quality of life and public health of communities, the UF Grant Program will help advance goals outlined in Gov. Evers' Trillion Trees Pledge commitment, which includes planting 1 million trees in urban areas by the end of 2030.

Wood County grant recepients include \$25,000 awarded to the city of Marshfield for ash tree removal and replacment and Port Edwards which received \$24,781.71 to replant shade trees in the village and parks.

"Our state forests and green spaces are vital to lowering the amount of carbon dioxide in our atmosphere, providing outdoor recreational opportunities and protection from the summer heat, preserving local wildlife habitats, and ultimately uplifting our statewide economy," said Gov. Evers. "We are confident that with help from our state and federal partners, these Urban Forestry grants will help bolster Wisconsin's forestry industry and protect our state's ecosystems so that we



leave our future generations with a better world than the one we inherited."

Through the UF Grant Program, \$630,000, which includes \$70,000 in federal funding, will be awarded to 43 applicants, with awards ranging from \$1,824 to \$25,000 to support new, innovative projects to develop sustainable urban and community forestry programs. Two types of competitive grants were available for this application cycle, including regular and startup grants. Regular grants award up to \$25,000 to support new, innovative projects to develop sustainable urban and community forestry programs. Startup grants are simplified grants that award up to \$5,000 to communities that want to start or restart an urban forestry program.



### Rudolph toddler remains in ICU two weeks after crash

COUNTY--On Dec. 2, Kamie Pupols and her two children, Olivia (6) and Jack (15 months), were injured when a car slammed into their vehicle in Rudolph. While they all

sustained multiple broken include a cracked skull that bones, 15-month-old Jack still resides in the ICU.

Jack was on the side of the vehicle that was directly impacted by the speeding pick up truck that hit the family's car. Jack's injuries led to brain swelling, which affected many other bodily functions. Jack is unable to breathe on his own or move the left side of his body.

Kamie suffered mutliple broken bones on the left side of her body and will be faced with months of therapy to regain the ability to walk.

Olivia suffered from a fractured skull and spent two nights in the ICU.

A GoFundMe has been set up by immediate family members to the Pupols family to raise money for the two helicoptors it took to transport Olivia and Jack to Marshfield Clinic. Kamie's ambulance ride, medical treatment costs, and to renovate parts of the Pupols house in order to now make it disability accessiable in order for



# Gov. Evers, DNR announce \$444 million to improve municipal wastewater infrastructure for **Wisconsinites in 50 Municipalities**

WOOD COUNTY--Gov. Tony Evers, together with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), announced that \$444 million has been allocated for financial assistance through the Clean Water Fund Program (CWFP) to 50 Wisconsin municipalities to improve their wastewater infrastructure. The funding will help municipalities across the state construct needed wastewater infrastructure, including projects that reduce phosphorus discharges and address aging equipment, with a focus on small and disadvantaged communities.

Improvments in Wood County include a chemical addition for phosphorus removal in the Town of Milladore and upgrading the northeast pump station in Marshfield.

'We're working to make sure Wisconsinites have safe, clean water straight from their tap to drink and that community water systems are safe, reliable, and can help effectively prevent harmful contaminants from being in our water supplies. Thanks to programs like the CWFP these investments will go a long way toward building the 21stcentury infrastructure we need to ensure Wisconsinites

# House fire on N. Maple Ave.

MARSHFIELD--On Dec. 17 at 12:57 in the afternoon, Marshfield Fire and Rescue initially responded to 708 N Maple Ave. with 11 personnel to a report of a house fire, with the fire located in the basement. Upon arrival heavy black smoke was showing from all sides of the house. Firefighters made entry and located the fire in the basement, which they quickly extinguished. Other firefighters made entry to search for any trapped people, they did not find anyone. The fire was contained to the basement and all smoke was ventilated from the structure.

The occupant was located at the neighbor's house and stated that everyone who lives in the house is accounted for and safe. The American Red Cross is assisting the family. A total of 16 fire personnel responded from MFRD throughout the duration of the incident. MFRD was on scene for 1.25 hours. The origin and cause of the fire is still under investigation. While no injuries were reported, damage includes moderate fire, smoke, and water damage located in the basement as well as moderate smoke damage found throughout the 1st floor.



# **Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over** enforcement campaign begins

FOR WOOD COUNTY--The Wisconsin State Patrol is joined by law enforcement

agencies throughout the state stepping up patrols to stop impaired driving during the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign. The national effort begins Dec. 13 and runs through New Year's Day.

With the holiday season and celebrations in the works, drivers are urged to plan for a sober ride ahead of time. Impairment can cloud judgement, so designate a sober driver prior to celebrating. If you are the designated driver, take that responsibility seriously. If you're hosting a gathering, consider how your guests will get home. Identify rideshare options before you get to the celebration. There is no reason to drive impaired.

During the last holiday season (Dec. 15, 2023-Jan. 1, 2024), there were 393 crashes involving impaired drivers in Wisconsin. Those incidents killed 12 people and injured

"Getting behind the wheel while impaired is a dangerous

decision with consequences that can harm yourself and others," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Tim Carnahan said. "Law enforcement officers will be out with a greater presence this holiday season to keep the roads safe for everyone, but drivers need to take the first step and make responsible choices."

The Wisconsin State Patrol works to assist local law enforcement agencies with obtaining specialty training to detect impairment and get dangerous drivers off the road. Over 7,500 officers in Wisconsin are trained in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) and the state has among the most Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) in the nation, with nearly 400 officers who have completed DRE training.

Impaired driving has many consequences for a driver in addition to the potential for a crash. OWI convictions can cost around \$10.000, including fines, court costs, lost time at work, higher insurance rates and vehicle services. A driver can also lose their license and vehicle because of an OWI conviction.

have access to clean and safe water across our state," said Gov. Evers.

The CWFP provides financial assistance to municipalities throughout Wisconsin for wastewater and water quality-related urban stormwater infrastructure projects that protect and improve public health and water quality for current and future generations. The DNR and the Wisconsin Department of Administration have administered the CWFP since 1991, providing over \$6.1 billion in financial assistance to Wisconsin municipalities. Additional information about the CWFP can be found online here.

Through this round of funding, the DNR is allocating \$399.9 million in subsidized loans and \$44.1 million in principal forgiveness funding to support wastewater improvement projects. The CWFP subsidizes municipalities to buy down the market rate on program loans (reduced-interest rate loans). The principal forgiveness funding is comparable to a grant because the municipality will not have to repay those funds.

DNR Environmental Loans programs like the CWFP are receiving more than \$900 million in additional funding in Federal Fiscal Years 2022-2026. The BIL also appropriates \$1 billion over Fiscal Years 2022-2026 to the Clean Water State Revolving Fund specifically to address emerging contaminants, including perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in wastewater, stormwater, and nonpoint source pollution nationwide. The CWFP Funding List for state fiscal year (FY) 2025 represents the third year of Supplemental Wastewater BIL funding.

Additionally, for the first time in CWFP history, loan demand has exceeded capacity. Total CWFP demand in state FY25 equaled more than \$535 million. Due to recent spikes in demand for funding, the CWFP has exhausted available revenue bonding authority and can only allocate funding to some applicants. Additional funding will be allocated to unfunded projects if it becomes available.

The village of Spencer will develop a new shooting range at 106263 County Road C in Spencer, Marathon County.

funds Subject grant originate with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Pittman-Robertson Basic Hunter Education and Safety Subprogram.

The proposed village of Spencer Gun and Archery Range will include a compact gravel driveway, two parking areas, firing lanes for guns and archery, and berms. The land disturbance will be just over half an acre. Construction will include clearing and grubbing of just over half an acre, adding wetland fill, installing a culvert and underdrains, concrete work and earthwork.

The DNR is dedicated to promoting hunter safety, hunting and shooting sports. To meet these objectives, the DNR has developed the Shooting Range Grant Program to assist with the development new ranges improvements to existing ranges that make their facilities available to the public.

DNR's The vision for shooting ranges in Wisconsin is to increase opportunities for shooting in a safe environment Doing so will maintain Wisconsin's hunting heritage and the economic impact those activities have.



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
























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





























































# Kelley Supply donates proceeds from No Shave November Campaign to Marshfield Clinic

# Human remains found in field identified





# It's the last holiday travel season before **REAL ID starts in 2025**

WOOD COUNTY--Next year, airline travelers will new identification requirements to board their flights. When enforcement of the REAL ID Act begins May 7, 2025, the regular Wisconsin driver license or ID will no longer be accepted identification for domestic air travel or to enter a federal building or military base. Travelers will need to present a REAL ID-compliant driver license or state ID card or another acceptable form of identification (such as a passport).

Wisconsin's driver licenses and ID cards have been REAL ID compliant since Jan. 14, 2013. With renewals required every eight years, all Wisconsin residents have had the option to convert to a REAL

"Under state law, Wisconsin DMV provides both options," Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Division of Motor Vehicles Administrator Winkler Tommy said. "Those who want the REAL ID designation should start now. Visit wisconsindmv. gov/REALID to learn

about what documents are required to present at a DMV, start the application online, and make an appointment for service to make your trip as quick and convenient as possible."

date, To 62%of Wisconsin's driver license or ID cards currently display the REAL ID star indicating they are federally compliant. In 2005, the federal REAL ID Act was passed by Congress to standardize state-issued driver licenses and ID cards

to enhance security and prevent identity fraud.

Those who have a driver license or ID may obtain a REAL IDcompliant card for \$14 (the cost of a replacement driver license) or \$16 for an ID card. There is no additional fee if the upgrade takes place at the same time as the renewal

To obtain a REAL IDcompliant driver license or ID card, individuals must visit a Wisconsin DMV and bring the following original

documents or a certified copy (not a photocopy, fax or scan):

Proof of Name and Date of Birth

Proof of Legal Presence in the U.S. Proof of Identity

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
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# DNR seeks nominations for 2024 Ethical Hunter Award

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
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# **New winter road condition** categories unveiled on 511 Wisconsin

WOOD COUNTY--The Wisconsin Department of Transportation announced new winter road condition categories to better reflect current conditions on roads across the state. The categories are now: Normal, Partially Covered, Completely Covered, Travel Not Advised, and No Report. The information streamlines the categories and makes it easier for motorists. Drivers are encouraged to "know before you go" with 511 Wisconsin, online at 511wi. gov or via the mobile app.

"We continually look for ways to enhance our 511 Wisconsin traveler information service," WisDOT Secretary Kristina Boardman said. "As we prepare for another winter season, we're excited to announce these new road condition categories. We know that road conditions during Wisconsin's winters can change in the blink of an eye and drivers must expect the unexpected. We're confident the updated winter road condition categories will help drivers make informed travel decisions this winter and beyond."

511 Wisconsin first launched 15 years ago in 2009, and the free travel information system has evolved over the years with its web and smartphone capabilities. Drivers have direct access to up-to-date traffic information throughout the state. On 511 Wisconsin, users can access live streaming video through hundreds of traffic cameras across the state and winter road conditions for more than 14.000 miles of roadway.

The WisDOT Traffic Management Center (TMC) oversees 511 Wisconsin to update the website and mobile app with current information based on notifications from law enforcement and other first responders.

"The Wisconsin State Patrol and other law enforcement agencies coordinate with TMC staff and dispatchers working around the clock to keep all travelers in the know," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Tim Carnahan said. "Our winter weather in Wisconsin can make driving dangerous at times, so we encourage drivers to plan ahead, watch your speed during inclement weather and avoid distractions behind the wheel."

### How to use the winter road conditions:

Visit 511wi.gov online, or download the 511 Wisconsin

In the map legend, make sure "winter road conditions" is checked.

Look for the colors outlining the roads near you.

The colors are listed from best to worst: normal (green), partially covered (blue), completely covered (pink), travel not advised (black), and no report (gray).

### How to view live traffic cameras:

Visit 511wi.gov online or download the 511 Wisconsin

In the top right corner under the Map Legend and 511 layers box, click the "cameras" checkbox.

Look for the camera icons along your route.

On 511wi.gov, click the camera icon and look for "show video" button to view the live camera feed.

On the 511 Wisconsin app, press the "play" button in the bottom right corner.

Users can still dial 511 to access travel information; however, for the most up-to-date technology, the traveling public is encouraged to use the 511 Wisconsin app or online at 511wi.gov.

Motorists should always expect the unexpected when driving in the winter in Wisconsin. When possible, avoid traveling during storms to give winter maintenance crews room to work.

# Musky season closes statewide Dec. 31

The season will reopen in the southern zone on May 3, 2025 and in the northern zone on May 24, 2025.
