
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### **PUBLISHER'S NOTE** Looking Past; Looking Forward

it will never subside, and the absence of that person—your partner in all things—casts a shadow over even the smallest moments of your day. The process of losing them, from illness or sudden tragedy to the final goodbye, is one of life's greatest challenges.

After the funeral is over, the loneliness often sets in deeply. Friends and family may surround you for a time, offering kindness and

support, but eventually, their lives pull them back to their routines. And there you are, left to grapple with the silence. Many who experience such a loss have shared how the

grief feels inescapable. The memories you shared with your spouse linger everywhere—in your home, your daily habits, and even in the way you think about the world. The ache is particularly acute when something good or bad happens, and you instinctively want to share it with them.

There is no one-size-fits-all answer to coping with such loss. Each person's grief is unique, shaped by the depth of the relationship and the individual personality of the one left behind. However, here are some thoughts that may offer comfort and guidance as you navigate this painful iourney.

It's important to lean on others-but also seek to rebuild. Family and friends can provide crucial support, but their lives will naturally continue, and you may find yourself needing to rebuild parts of your own. Consider joining

> a grief support group where others who've experienced similar losses can share their insights and struggles. Knowing you're not alone in your feelings can be deeply reassuring.

> Over time you can find new meaning and purpose. Though it feels impossible at first, try to slowly re-engage with the world. Take up an activity or explore something you've always been curious about. Join a class in art, writing, or history. Volunteer with an organization that

aligns with your values. If you're physically able, activities like yoga, gardening, or walking in nature can offer both physical and emotional relief.

You may find some healing in honoring your loved one's memory. Create a ritual or space where you can remember and celebrate your spouse. It might be a small garden, a photo album, or even a weekly moment of reflection. This helps keep them present in your life in a way that feels healthy and comforting, rather than overwhelming.

But don't remain in a constant state of sorrow. Your loved one wouldn't want that. While they may no longer be physically by your side, their love and influence live on in you. Embracing life doesn't mean forgetting them; it means carrying their memory with you as you find joy again.

Take heart, dear reader. Though the journey of loss is painful, it's also a testament to the love you shared. Grief is a long and winding road, but it does not mean your own story is over. It's a new chapter—one you didn't ask for, but one in which you can still find meaning, connection, and even hope.


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### Creative Ways to Use SNT Funds-Part 2

# Leading the way Wausau's EquiFlow

program met and exceeded its goal last year.



**City leaders say** they met and exceeded their goal for the number of lead service lines replaced last year as they announce how many they plan to address in 2025.

The city contracted with CIP last year with a goal of replacing a minimum of 553 lines. The contractors ultimately replaced 602 lines by the end of the year, according to a city report.

The work last year all occurred in census tracts 6, 5, 7 and 8, and in 2025 the city will add census tract 4 as well as more homes in the previous census tracts. The city aims to replace 1,900 lines this year.

City leaders started the EquiFlow program in order to leverage federal dollars to start replacing all 8,000 of the city's lead service lines. Lead has been shown to have health hazards in adults and especially in babies and young children.

The program raised some eyebrows recently because early information on the program didn't make clear that the funds were a combination of grants and loans. City officials will have to figure out where the funding will come from the pay back the loan portion of the agreement.

This year's is expected to be one of the more favorable grant/loan mixes the city will see, City Public Works Director Eric Lindman has said. Subsequent years will be more competitive as more cities start applying for the program.

# Weston has three vying for village board

Three candidates will vie for the Weston Village Board in a February primary.

Incumbent Village President Mark Maloney will face off against current board members Hooshang Zeyghami and James Pinsonneault.

The three will face off in a primary election on Feb. 18, with the top two vote-getters moving on to the general election on April 1.

Maloney has served on the village board since 2018, and took later over as president for retired police chief Wally Sparks. Zeyghami and Pinsonneault have experience on the village board.

### Chick-fil-A to open in Rib Mountain this fall

A new Chick-fil-A restaurant is slated to open later this year in Rib Mountain, company officials say.

The new restaurant will open sometime in 2025 at 225421 Rib Mountain Drive across the street from Texas Roadhouse. The location appears to be near the previously announced Chipotle restaurant, and both are being built by local building company Lokre Companies.

Both restaurants are new to the Wausau area. The closest Chick-fil-A restaurant currently is in the Fox Valley area, and this restaurant will be the first in the central Wisconsin area.

A press release from the company says the restaurant is slated to open in the fall but an exact date has not yet been set.

# Sheriff investigating house fire that kills one

Marathon County Sheriff's Office officials are investigating a fire that killed one in the town of Green Valley.

Police say the fire started shortly before 11 pm in a home in the 133700 block of Highway C in Green Valley on Jan. 16. The fire killed one 65-year-old woman who lived at the residence, according to the Sheriff's Office.

So far, investigators don't suspect foul play in the fire. The cause of the woman's death is still being investigated, according to Sheriff's Office officials.

Police did not name the victim who died in the fire.

## Wausau Fire receives mechanical CPR devices

The Wausau Fire Department recently took delivery of a new CPR device that is expected to save more lives.

Fire Department officials say the device, called the Zoll AutoPulse NXT, is an automated device that delivers consistent chest compression in the event of a cardiac event. The device has been shown to improve survival rates because of that consistency.

The Department received the devices because of a donation from the BA and Esther Greenheck Foundation and the Community Foundation of North Central Wisconsin. Officials did not specify the amount received in order to purchase the devices.

"We are extremely grateful for the support of the B.A. and Esther Greenheck Foundation and the Community Foundation of North Central Wisconsin," says Jared Thompson, Wausau Fire EMS Division Chief. "Their generous grant assistance allows us to equip our paramedics with the most advanced tools available, ensuring we can deliver the best possible care when every second counts." The devices will be equipped in all of the department's

emergency response vehicles.

# County discusses options for state TIF recommendations

County leaders are currently discussing some possible recommendations they can make to state lawmakers on how tax increment finance is run.

Those discussions came out of a task force the county held last year looking at how TIF districts impact municipalities.

TIF Districts work by allowing a municipality to borrow against future development to fund projects that wouldn't otherwise occur "but for" the extra funding. Tax increment generated by new development in that district goes toward paying back the loans borrowed in the first place.

But the county launched the task force because some people had concerns that TIF Districts might ultimately be costing the county and taxpayers money in the long run.

Some suggestions included possibly adding a citizen member to the Joint Board of Review which reviews districts and district amendments; increasing the time the public has to review projects before they go before the board; and providing updates on existing TIF Districts and how they're performing to the Marathon County Board.

#### County board passes Assembly ordinance with little fanfare

An ordinance change toward how the county handles large assemblies garnered a lot of discussion at the committee level but it passed Tuesday with little fanfare.

The Marathon County Board Tuesday passed the new version of the ordinance governing large assemblies with little fanfare. The ordinance passed 29-3.

The county looked at revamping the ordinance after the county's legal team raised concerns that the previous version might not be constitutional because it places restrictions on large assemblies that could violate First Amendment rights.

But the threshold the county was considering of 3,000 attendees made organizers of the eight dairy breakfasts in the county nervous because it might place an additional burden on those organizers. Most of the breakfasts have between 2,000 and 3,000 attendees, organizers had told county leaders.

Members of the Environmental

Resources Committee changed the threshold to 5,000 attendees, leaving the dairy breakfasts safely under that number.

#### Public safety chair leadership vote garners scrutiny

A fairly benign appointment of the Public Safety Committee's leadership garnered a small amount of controversy Tuesday.

The Marathon County board affirmed long-time Marathon County Board Member Jean Maszk as the committee's chair Tuesday without comment. But one member urged against voting for the recommended vice chair.

Marathon County Board Member Tim Sondalski argued against appointing Yee Leng Xiong as the vice chair. Sondelski accused Xiong of not attending meetings regularly.

Xiong replied that he had been attending the committee meetings virtually, but did miss some in the fall when he was running for State Assembly. Xiong says he has made changes to his schedule so that he can attend meetings regularly.

Xiong ultimately was appointed by a 27-4 vote.

# New transport

Duffy calls out Boeing in confirmation hearing for secretary of transportation

**At his confirmation hearing** to lead the Department of Transportation this week, former Wisconsin Cong. Sean Duffy said he would like to get Boeing back on track, assuming it is implementing its safety plan.

Duffy received many questions about various transportation issues from the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation during his three-hour hearing yesterday morning. When asked about Boeing and aviation, Duffy said Boeing needs "tough love" to ensure "our skies are safe," after a mid-air emergency with a Boeing plane last January.

Overall, the committee was friendly to Duffy, commenting on the respect shown by eight of his nine children who joined him in the hearing room. And both Wisconsin senators backed Duffy to lead the department.


"It is critical we have a Secretary of Transportation who understands Wisconsin's needs and will help us keep families safe when they travel, businesses able to get



their products on shelves on time, and keep our Made in Wisconsin economy moving forward," U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin, D-Madison, said. "We haven't always agreed, and I'm certain that will continue to be true, but at the end of the day, I am confident Sean is the right guy to help deliver for Wisconsin families, businesses, and workers."

# Moore refused to attend Trump's inauguration

U.S. Rep. Gwen Moore is among the Democrats not attending Donald Trump's inauguration, saying, "It's been very hard to respect Donald Trump."



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"It was a process, my deciding not to go," Moore said on WISN's "UpFront," which is produced in partnership with WisPolitics.com. "When I came to the realization that Inauguration Day was going to fall on MLK Day, something that hasn't happened since Bill Clinton was inaugurated, my constituents really, it was a drumbeat of folks begging me to come and go to the events I go to every single year since there's never any conflict.

"I think the final straw for me was his whining about Jimmy Carter's, about the flag being flown at half-staff to honor the 39th president," Moore added. "I just, you know, I think that it's been very hard to respect Donald Trump."

U.S. Rep. Mark Pocan, D-Town of Vermont, is also not attending, but U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin's office said the Madison Dem will.


"People have different reasons for doing it," Moore said. "You got somebody like Amy Klobuchar, for example, who's definitely going to show up because she's in charge of the inaugural ceremonies. I have no problem with my good friend and colleague, our United States Sen. Tammy Baldwin for showing up. People have their own insights and instincts about what to do."

### Karofsky pressed GOP attorneys on conversion therapy ban resistance

Liberal Justice Jill Karofsky pressed an attorney for GOP lawmakers to justify a handful of lawmakers repeatedly suspending a rule seeking to ban conversion therapy, a practice she called "beyond horrific."

After reading a description of the treatment during oral arguments Thursday, Karofsky demanded a justification for allowing some members of the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules to prevent implementation of an Evers administration proposal to essentially ban the practice.

As GOP attorney Misha Tsteylin sought to answer Karofsky's questions, conservative Justice Rebecca Bradley interjected.

"Counsel, what is left of the rule of law if this court makes its decision based not on the Constitution, not on the law, but on our visceral personal, emotional responses to what policies the Legislature may be attempting to enact or resist?" she asked.

The court on Thursday heard arguments in the Evers' administration challenge of oversight powers the Legislature has granted the JCRAR.

# State Dems outraise GOP in final months of 2024

The state Dem Party outraised the Wisconsin GOP over the final 10 weeks of the year.

And the Dem Party's fundraising machine kept churning even after Chair Ben Wikler announced his bid to lead the national party.

The latest fundraising reports show the Dem Party raised nearly \$2.8 million between Oct. 22 — the close of the last reporting period — and Dec. 31. It spent \$4.2 million and finished the year with \$650,569 in the bank.

The state GOP, meanwhile, reported \$2.4 million in receipts over that period and \$3 million in disbursements. The Republican Party finished 2024 with \$673,257 cash on hand. The state GOP received \$257,000 from Beloit businesswoman Diane Hendricks in late October. Otherwise, other committees accounted for the bulk of the party's fundraising over the 10-week period at more than \$2.1 million.

That includes \$866,589 in in-kind donations. Those often show up as both a receipt and an expense as candidates, for example, pay the party to do mail pieces to take advantage of the bulk rates it can receive.

The state Dem Party's biggest donations over the period were \$300,000 each from William Harris, a Florida executive, and William H. Harris, a Massachusetts retiree. Both donations were made last month.

## WI House delegation conflicted over transgender sports ban


Wisconsin's House delegation split along party lines this week as the chamber signed off on legislation that would ban transgender athletes from women's and girls sports.

The House signed off 218-206 as two Dems joined all Republicans voting in supporting the bill.

U.S. Rep. Mark Pocan, D-Town of Vermont, in a floor speech argued the measure put young girls at risk by exposing them to an invasive process to determine their sex.

"Does this mean hiring potential predators to peek at the private parts of kids in locker rooms? Now that sounds like an actual problem to me," Pocan said.

U.S. Rep. Tony Wied, R-De Pere, said the bill is "common sense."  $\ensuremath{\mathbf{CP}}$ 



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## COVER FEATURE by Charlie Dee

Remembering PHIL JOHNSRUD

Johnsrud was known for being able to groom cross-country ski trails in the harshest conditions in Iola, and for his work as a teacher, paddler and volunteer

There was early snow for Thanksgiving in 2009 when I was visiting my son in Denver, so I drove up-mountain to the Frisco Nordic Touring Center. In the chalet, a guy noticed my jacket from a Milwaukee bike/ski store and asked me about skiing in the Kettle Moraine. He was from Wausau and had recently retired to Colorado. Returning his curiosity, I asked, "You skied mainly at Nine Mile?" He replied affirmatively, so I queried, "Have you ever tried Iola?"

He jumped forward with his eyes bugging, put his hands on my shoulders, moved his face close to mine, and said with almost maniacal enthusiasm, "Iola?! That guy can groom frost!"

That guy was Phil Johnsrud, who passed away in October after four years of serious medical challenges. In addition to being arguably the best snow groomer in the state, he paddled the entire Grand Canyon in a solo canoe with a bunch of hotshots from all over the country and was the only one who didn't tip and swim. He and his wife, Dr. Mary Schultz, had two children.

Few people have made as big an impact on one sport and its community as Phil, yet he was a giant in two of our silent sports sub-cultures: whitewater paddling and Nordic skiing.

#### Taught Whitewater Skills to Many

I first met Phil when I joined the Sierra Club River Touring group in the mid-80s to run whitewater. Around a campfire on the Peshtigo River, beer in hand, this guy was telling stories about characters he had paddled with in the Arctic. The next day on the river, I was blown away. All the rest of us paddled newer plastic boats with rockered hulls made for turning quickly in rapids. Not Phil. He was in an ancient aluminum canoe with a keel designed for two people going straight on lakes. Phil, paddling solo, made that thing dance down rapids, eddying into tight spots between rocks, perfectly balanced.

He led several trips each year for the Sierra Club and was, for many years, the lead

instructor in its annual Whitewater Canoe Clinic, teaching hundreds over the decades how to avoid rocks, ferry, eddy, and laugh on the water. Judy Emmett of Green Bay fondly recalls his "funny, irreverent, sometimes snarky" teaching style. "I remember him most for how kind and patient he was when I was trying to learn how to handle whitewater. I was not an intuitive paddler and if not for that patience, I might have given up trying and would have missed all those wonderful paddles on the Wolf and Red Rivers."

### Arctic Rescue

His trips to run Montana Rivers every July were legendary as were the several he led to the Arctic. In 2002, he and three comrades were on the Parent River in Canada's Northwest Territories when they came upon six Canadiens who had been stranded for two days unsuccessfully trying to free one of their canoes pinned against a rock in the middle of a rapids. Katy Golden of Madison, Phil's paddling partner, said, "This was real wilderness, as in 300 miles from a road or cell tower, so they were justifiably scared. But Phil always traveled with extra rope, carabiners, and remarkable ingenuity. Within 90 minutes, he had freed their canoe, and we continued downriver."

Befitting his Norwegian heritage, Phil Johnsrud's other great outdoor passion was cross-country skiing. He completed 32 Birkies and told a half-dozen stories from each. During one, tired of waiting in line at the top of an icy downhill that folks were justifiably hesitant to descend, he took off his skis and jogged through the woods. When people started hollering at him for cheating, he yelled, "Save the prince, save the prince...!" thrusting his skis up in the air with each yell. Soon skiers on the hill joined the "Save the Prince!" chant, all mindful of the Norwegian crown-prince rescue the Birkebeiner commemorates.

Phil's Birkie goals were like the rest of his life: more about helping others than promoting himself. He "raced" wearing a hip belt filled with a vise grip and screwdriver in case anybody needed bindings repaired, and Hershey's with Almonds to revive bonkers over the last 10K. He rarely finished on Main Street without someone at Anglers Bar recognizing him and giving him a beer to power him through the final 100 yards.

To Shellie Milford, long-time Birkie Operations Director, Phil's willingness to volunteer, even on days he raced, was astounding. Shellie recalled that before there was running water to Birkie feed stations, 300-gallon water tanks at each station

had to be filled from a tank in the bed of Bill Analla's pickup. "The blizzard the night before the 2014 race made that extremely difficult," she said, "so Phil volunteered to help Bill clear snow for the truck to get close enough to the tank. Then he'd horse the huge hose over snow, connect it to the tanks, and get the heaters started underneath the tanks."

Phil only got a couple of hours sleep after that freezing, wet, miserable job, but he showed up early at the start line to see if Shellie needed any more help. Indeed, she did. The blizzard had collapsed one of the warming tents and the blower for the heater had gone out at the other one. "I asked Phil to check the heater and blower," she said, "so he hiked back to his car, got his toolbox, and in a half hour, he had the blower working again. Then he put on his skis and lined up to start in the last wave."

# Heart of the Iola Winter Sports Club

Phil's greatest volunteer gig had been decades of grooming trails at the Iola Winter Sports Club (IWSC), which he referred to simply as "the ski hill." Actually, "grooming" doesn't quite capture his contributions. He maintained and repaired the snowmobiles, built and repaired grooming equipment, and monitored real estate adjoining the club so he could pounce on additional land before it hit the market. Then he fundraised to pay for the land, designed new trails, and recruited volunteers and equipment to help him build them.

In 1996, he pulled off a great feat. Trying and failing several times to get the IWSC board to fund lights on the trail, a frustrated Phil went vigilante. He shelled out his own money, recruited his own volunteers, and simply put up lights on his own, eventually lighting 6K of varied terrain. When I discovered what that cost, I asked, "Will the IWSC pay you back?"

"They won't need to," he replied. "This is a small community; as soon as folks see how many more kids join the ski team after we have lights, and more and more adults ski after work, people will be stuffing checks in my pocket." That's exactly what happened; plus, there was a bonus.

When Chet Krause, whose publishing company was the largest employer in the region, heard about what Phil had done, he had Phil sit with him at a Lion's Club meeting. He asked, "Is there anything out there you need?" Phil was ready: "Well, we could sure use a Piston Bully to groom trails." No problem. When the Piston Bully arrived, Phil wouldn't let anyone touch it until Chet came to see it. Perceiving how large it was next to the one-story garage/ shop for storing snowmobiles, Chet mused, "It looks like I need to buy you a garage, too."

#### 📂 Snow Farmer

Grooming is a mixture of art and science, and Phil excelled at both. He liked to refer to himself as a "snow farmer." Since climate change has made freezing temperatures and large dumps less frequent, Phil said, "When we get a few inches, I've got to knock it down, pack it, and preserve it. If it lasts a few weeks, that's just like harvesting a crop."

He never wanted compensation even though, in his mind, he was on call 24 hours per day. When he was teaching junior high school shop in Iola, he often showed up at work directly from the ski hill. If, for example, the snow was in a freeze/thaw cycle, he'd set his alarm for 3:00 AM and scarify the icy surface so morning skiers would have a perfect deck.

Completing 32 Birkies was an amazing accomplishment for Phil since his entire ski season was spent grooming. The only time people in Iola saw him on skis was when he carried a shovel or saw instead of poles so he could cover brown spots on the trail or take off a branch that had been threatening skiers' faces. I once asked him how the hell he got through 52K after only being on skis for 10K all season. His reply was classic Phil:

"I train the first half of the Birkie, then race the second half."

### Living for Others With Dedication & Humor

Phil's commitment to youth transcended his teaching job and parenting his kids, Lydia and Phillip. He initiated and helped run the Wisconsin Nordic Network program to pay



entry fees for needy and deserving high schoolers to race the Kortelopet. "The more kids who ski," he used to say, "the fewer kids get in trouble."

Phil's humor and stories went hand-in-hand. He loved the tale about two hikers on a mountain trail who spotted a bear coming their way. One turned to run while the other took his running shoes out of his pack and began changing from his hiking boots. "You can't outrun a bear," shouted the first. The other said, "I don't need to, as long as I can outrun you."

I first heard this when we were both single and camped on the North Fork of the Flathead River in Montana. Having decided to drive 20 miles to a bar that night, Phil built a little pool along the riverside, boiled water on the campfire, bathed, and changed into a clean shirt and jeans. "You must have high expectations for tonight, Phil," I kidded, "trying to look so good." He responded with the bear story, then added, "I don't need to look 'good,' Charlie, just a little bit better than you."

Phil Johnsrud's life made a lot of people look better than they otherwise would have. The legacy he leaves for his kids, his community, and outdoor recreation in Wisconsin is, unlike some of his stories, impossible to exaggerate.

Book buzz The Story Cellar

brings back the used bookstore to Wausau, with a touch of coffee

**There's something about** a used bookstore that feels different from other types of stores. The dusty old books. The cavernous feel, the feeling of discovery.

The Story Cellar on Wausau's near west side doesn't have books that are dusty exactly, but it's got the same cozy feeling one expects of the best used bookstores. And it adds an element of coffee.

The Story Cellar opened Nov. 30 at 205 Callon Street in the west side of the Wausau River District business area. The business is co-located in the building that once housed River District Antiques. Located in the same building are a massage therapist and a dermatologist, Dr. Stephen Lewellis, who City Pages featured last year.

The owner, Laura Spaeth, has loved and collected books all her life, and she long dreamed of opening her own bookstore. Finally her husband prompted her to just do it, so last summer she started collecting books for her store.

When searching for a location, she wanted something that felt like the right vibe - wood floors, something that had the vibe of an old bookstore. When her real estate agent showed her the Callon Street building, it seemed just right. "I thought it was perfect," Spaeth told me from behind the register. She got the keys on Oct. 30, she says, and by Nov. 30 had the store ready to go, just in time for the Small Business Saturday event.

The store's interior underscores Spaeth's profession. She works as a freelance graphic designer after having worked on the staff at Roastar.

Not only is that reflected in the decor, which gives a cozy but stylish vibe, but in some of the non-book products she sells. Lining some of the shelves are bags of coffee, and Spaeth explains that all of the coffee featured are ones whose bags she helped design. One is from Hawaii and another is by a Wisconsin-based roaster. There's a brand of granola too.


Spaeth also brews some coffee for those who are looking for an afternoon perk up. "Yeah I have no intentions of being a fullon coffee shop," Spaeth says. It's meant to appeal to the afternoon coffee drinker and as a sampling of the coffee she sells. She changes it up on a monthly basis, Spaeth says.

But the real focus is on the books. A customer described her selection as "latemodel" used books. Most books are recent and in pretty good shape. "I didn't want it to be like one of those really old, dusty, floor-to-ceiling bookstores," Spaeth says. "I wanted it to be a little lighter than that." Spaeth adds that she enjoys those kinds of bookstores too, and always seeks out used book stores when she travels.

Besides shelves of books, she has some reading nooks for children and adults, and as I walk in a child leaves with his mother having just tested it out himself.

Spaeth says that books are back among the younger set. She's seeing a pretty steady stream of people selling their books at The Story Cellar and those including younger folks. BookTok (a trend on TikTok) is helping to make books cool again amongst younger readers. She thinks the trend started during COVID. "I think people started to look for things to do once they stopped making new seasons of their favorite shows," Spaeth says.

For Spaeth and The Story Cellar, that ought to mean a new customer base that will keep the story busy for years to come.





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
