# 26 year old man arrested in connection to father's murder

WOOD COUNTY-On Jan. 28, 2025, Nekoosa police officers arrested Jason W. Tourtillott – age 26, in connection with the 2021 murder of his father, Thomas S. Tourtillott – age 58.

On July 22, 2021, a Nekoosa police officer responded to a 911 call reporting an unresponsive male at the residence. First responders attempted life-saving measures but were unsuccessful. The investigation revealed that Thomas Tourtillott


died from injuries consistent with foul play. Jason Tourtillott was identified as a person of interest, then determined to be involved in the death of his father.

Jason Tourtillott has been charged with 1st Degree Intentional Homicide by the Wood County District Attorney's Office and is currently being held at the Wood County Jail on a one-million dollar cash bond.

The Wisconsin Department of Criminal

Investigation assisted with the investigation. Jason Tourtillott was taken into custody in Wisconsin Rapids with the assistance of Wood County Sheriff's Department, Marshfield Police Department, and Wisconsin Rapids Police Department.





## **Childcaring offers grants** to strengthen early childhood support

WOOD COUNTY - In a unanimous vote of the Wood County Board of Supervisors, \$500,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds were approved to support child care. The Wood County Child Care Task Force has been working on this initiative for the past two years thanks to a Dream Up strategic planning grant received by Wood County Health Department. Task Force members have been meeting regularly, gathering input from child care providers and families, requesting funding to support a variety of strategies and keeping county board members and others informed of the child care crisis.

'This funding is a game-changer for child care in Wood County", said Sue Smith, Wood County Health Officer. "By working with Childcaring and investing in child care capacity, we're not only supporting providers—we're strengthening families, businesses, and our entire community. Access to quality child care is essential for a thriving workforce and a strong local economy "

In an effort to build back capacity and increase regulated child care, Childcaring, Inc. is offering one-time Child Care Capacity Building Grants to individuals interested in expanding or starting a regulated child care program:

Family Child Care (typically in the providers home):

\$5,000 - \$10,000 grants available

Family Child Care applications are accepted (while funding is available), until October 31, 2025.



Lark stood up the moment she saw me, her arms outstretched for a hug. "You just made my day!" she exclaimed. "Where have you been these past few weeks?" I laughed, feeling a rush of appreciation for her words. Jimmy, wearing the black fedora I'd finally given him after months of promises, tipped it with a grin. I was wearing one too. We traded stories about "the good old days," and he launched into a tale I'd heard before. I didn't mind. I never did.

But my visit was more subdued this time because not everyone was there anymore including Francis, whose presence had always been both tender and sharp. Nick and Jack were also gone: their chairs, once as familiar as their faces, sat empty around the tables. I had been there to say goodbye to Nick, holding his hand and asking him to watch over his family, who clung to one another in quiet grief around his bed. Those goodbyes leave a mark, even as they remind us of the beauty in connection.

Karen, seated near the corner, reached

for my hand. She launched into a vivid story about her days as a nurse in the ER. Her eyes sparkled with pride as she

spoke. Beside her, Mary Lou motioned for me to come closer to her wheel chair. When I asked how she was doing, she lifted her hands like she was holding onto an invisible ledge. "Just hanging on," she said with a wry

The aides began rounding everyone up for dinner so I made my last rounds, shaking hands, giving hugs, and sharing brief, meaningful exchanges. Lark pulled me into one last embrace before I pushed the buttons at the exit door to let myself out.

As the door clicked shut behind me, I couldn't help but reflect on the inevitable. Someday, I'll be in a place like this. Everything will be taken care ofmeals, medications, and all the needs of a frail body. But even with all the care in the world, the loneliness lingers. Most of the residents were waiting, one step away from the reunion that comes when the spirit departs a worn-out body. Still, there was beauty in that waiting. It wasn't despair but a quiet anticipation of something more—a peace I could almost feel as I walked to my car.

Driving away, I thought about the rest of my day and all my tomorrows. I made a promise to myself: I'll savor the moments, big and small; I'll hold tight to joy, squeezing every drop from the time I have left. And one day, when I find myself in a room like that, I hope someone will walk through the door to remind me then of the life I'm living now.







# DMV offers information on obtaining an ID for voting

WOOD COUNTY--Ahead of the Wisconsin Spring Primary Election on Feb. 18, 2025, the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) reminds citizens how to obtain identification, free of charge, that is valid for voting.

Valid identification for voting purposes includes a driver license, identification card, military or student ID card, etc. There is no separate "voter ID." A federally compliant REAL ID card is not required for voting purposes. Anyone unsure if their identification meets the requirements should visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission website to check.

Begin online to see a list of the required documents that are needed to present at a DMV Customer Service Center in order to obtain identification to show at the polls: wisconsindmv.gov/idcards. A process is available to U.S. citizens, free of charge, to obtain a receipt valid to take to the polls for voting if the ID card is not available in time.

Anyone with questions related to obtaining an ID that can be used to vote should call DMV's toll-free hotline at (844) 588-1069. 

## Columbus Catholic Middle School travels to La Crosse to compete in Brains and Brawn


