
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PUBLISHER'S NOTE The Fragility of Life

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

A beneficiary form that is not up to date can result in assets not passing to the correct beneficiaries. An estate plan should be regularly updated to account for major life events such as divorce, marriage, birth or adoption of a child or grandchild, loss of a spouse, child, or other beneficiary, moving assets to a new account, and a plan administrator changing. Changing your mind about your overall estate plan is another time to consider switching beneficiaries. It is prudent to check designations every three to five years even when you think nothing has changed.

A beneficiary designation cannot be changed after you are gone. Schedule an appointment to learn more.



Consolidation mapping

Wausau School Board approves boundary maps for elementary consolidation

The Wausau School Board Monday approved new boundary maps for the upcoming elementary school consolidation.

The school consolidation was approved in January. The district will close Hewitt-Texas, Hawthorne Hills, Grant and Lincoln elementary schools. Lincoln will become a site for 4K education.

The school board also approved allowing administrators to start seeking the sale of the now unused elementary schools, either through a realtor or other method at the discretion of the administration.

The elementary school consolidation was the first step toward right-sizing the district's building and staff size. It came after the Wausau School Board ultimately scrapped a more comprehensive consolidation plan that would have completely remade the district's schools, including consolidating East and West high schools into one elementary.

The consolidation will be in place for the 2025-2026 school year.

The board passed the new boundaries with little fanfare, other than a line around Forest Street dividing John Marshall and Franklin elementary schools. Board member Lance Trollop questioned why the line, which runs at a diagonal to Forest Street, doesn't just run along the street. The board approved the boundary with that change in place.

Debate about public comment takes up most of council meeting

What promised to be a very short Wausau City Council meeting was extended as a debate erupted about the public comment period.

Mayor Doug Diny began the meeting with an explanation of the city's public comment policy, which includes the statement that the city's public comment policy allows citizens to speak about items on the council agenda and "other public comment."

That drew calls for a point of order from city council members Carol Lukens and Lou Larson. Lukens said public meetings laws require specific items up for discussion to be agendized so that the public has a reasonable explanation as to what will be discussed.

But council member Terry Kilian disagreed with the framing, saying residents have a right to speak before the city council in public comment on the items they choose. In his preamble, the mayor was only clarifying that, she said.

Diny said he brought up the topic because he had gotten several emails after the last city council meeting criticizing him for not reigning in public comment more.

The discussion was eventually shut down after city council member Gary Gisselman pointed out that the discussion itself was out of order since it wasn't agendized.

Mayor appointment to ethics commission canceled

Mayor Doug Diny was poised to appoint a new member to the city's ethics board Tuesday, but that was canceled.

Diny, who faces an ethics complaint the ethics board is slated to consider over his removal of a ballot box from the steps of city hall, announced at Tuesday's City Council meeting that the candidate he had

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in mind withdrew for a scheduling conflict.

That candidate, Dylan Anderson, currently works for Rep. Tom Tiffany and has worked for other Republican legislators and the state party itself.

The ethics board is slated to meet next week Wednesday.

Council approves records request related to complaint

The city council following a closed session voted to approve the release of records after waiving attorney-client privilege.

The records request came from former city council member Keene Winters, who made the request after the city denied his complaint that the city was taking on more debt than state law allows.

Winters claimed city staff were misclassifying debt in order to get around the state debt limit. But in a presentation before the city council, outside legal counsel Quarles and Brady disagreed with that assessment.

Winters in his records request sought a copy of the opinion provided to the city in making its determination on the complaint.

Whitewater Music Hall closed

The news of Bull Falls Brewery reopening soon was followed by news that Whitewater Music Hall is closing.

The brewery's owner announced Friday that the weekend would be the last for the music hall, which featured a coffee shop and homemade beer on tap.

The owners plan to keep the building, allowing businesses such as Northern Lights Sauna, Rise Up and other organizations to continue operating out of the downtown spot.

Earlier this week, October Guitars announced it too would be closing. According to a post on its website, the business is closed right now but will re-open soon to host a retirement sale.

UWSP to kick off new dual enrollment pilot program

The University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point is kicking off a new pilot program around dual enrollment next fall, UWSP officials say.

The new program is planned to start in the fall semester and there will be another in the spring, offering Introduction to Sociology and Introduction to Astronomy, says Miranda Gentry-Siegel, interim director of campus operations at UWSP.

The school has had a dual enrollment program in which high school students could take college classes for some time. But this specific program is focused on students who have the capacity to take college classes but face barriers to doing so.

The courses will be online and asynchronous, as one barrier they heard from schools is that it's tough to fit a college class with a high school schedule because they don't line up, Gentry-Siegel says.

The program is working with D.C. Everest, Marshfield, Pittsville, SPASH

and Edgar high schools and will work with 35 students this fall and 35 students in spring 2026. That could be expanded to Wausau schools if the program is successful.

There will be no cost to students, Gentry-Siegel says.

Fuzzy's Tacos liquor license likely to be revoked

Fuzzy's Taco Shop's liquor license could be revoked following the business's closure.

The village of Weston's Community, Life and Public Safety Committee voted to move forward with revoking the license. Fuzzy's closed in December and had a nonreserve liquor license. Following revocation, that license could become available to another business.

Weston staff say they reached out to Fuzzy's representatives via email, phone call and snail mail asking what the business's plans were. They heard nothing back, staff members told the committee.

If Fuzzy's Taco Shop fights the

revocation, that could lead to a hearing in which the committee would hear arguments and make a determination. But non-reserve liquor licenses are limited by state law and so municipalities have rules that they need to be in continual use.

Investigators looking into Lincoln County shooting

Lincoln County officials are looking into a shooting in the town of Schley in Lincoln County.

Deputies responded to an emergency call for a man with a gunshot wound early Friday morning. Deputies say they discovered a man with a gunshot wound to his shoulder. He was treated on scene and then transported to Wausau Aspirus Hospital for treatment.

Lincoln County officials identified all parties involved and say there is no threat to the public. Deputies didn't say anything about the nature of the gunshot; only that the incident is still under investigation.

Donation explosion

State parties send seven figures of donations to Crawford, Schmiel in Supreme Court race

The state Dem and Republican parties turned to heavy hitters for much of their fundraising over the first month of 2025 and then made seven-figure transfers to their preferred Supreme Court candidates, a WisPolitics review shows.

The state Dem Party gave Susan Crawford \$2 million last month after collecting a \$1 million donation from megadonor George Soros and \$500,000 from Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker.

Meanwhile, the state GOP gave Brad Schimel \$1.675 million in January after it received \$975,000 from Beloit businesswoman Diane Hendricks and \$850,000 from Illinois businesswoman Liz Uihlein.

In all, Crawford, a Dane County Circuit Court judge, reported nearly \$4.5 million raised between Jan. 1 and Feb. 3, \$3.6 million spent and almost \$3.1 million in the bank to end the period.

Schimel, a Waukesha County Circuit Court judge and former GOP attorney general, reported \$2.7 million raised, \$2.1 million spent and \$2.4 million cash on hand.

The two are on record fundraising paces in a race that will determine ideological control of the state Supreme Court after liberals flipped it to a 4-3 majority in their favor in 2023 after 15 years in the minority.

Crawford has reported raising \$352,715 in contributions of \$1,000 or more since the pre-primary period closed Feb. 3. Altogether, she's raised more than \$7.7 million since getting into the race in May.

Schimel, meanwhile, has reported \$175,405 in late contributions. That puts his overall haul at \$4.9 million.

Two years ago, liberal Janet Protasiewicz had raised just more than \$1.8 million on her way to spending \$16.7 million on her winning bid.



Kinser leads pre-primary funding for School Super race

Education consultant Brittany Kinser raised \$301,316 in the pre-primary period, more than three times what her nearest rival for state superintendent pulled in.

State Superintendent Jill Underly reported \$81,773 with \$56,118 of that coming from the state Dem Party — while Sauk Prairie Superintendent Jeff Wright raised \$34,804.

Kinser, who described herself as a Blue Dog Dem in an interview with WisPolitics last fall, benefited from a string of donations from traditional GOP donors and those associated with the school choice movement.

That includes \$20,000 each from Illinois business couple and GOP megadonors Dick and Liz Uihlein, \$20,000 from Beloit businesswoman Diane Hendricks, and \$20,000 from Bill Berrien, a Milwaukee area businessman considered a possible GOP guv candidate in 2026.

In all, 11 people gave Kinser the maximum donation of \$20,000.

She also reported: \$10,000 from Agustin Ramirez, who helped launch Augustine Prep, which participates in the Milwaukee school choice program; \$5,000 from businessman Scott Mayer, who considered a run for U.S. Senate in 2024; \$2,500 from the Milwaukee County GOP; and \$1,000 from former Assembly Speaker Scott Jensen, a voucher proponent. She also listed a \$2,500 donation from Cory Nettles, who served as Commerce secretary under Dem Gov. Jim Doyle.

Her other donations included \$1,042 from Peter Bernegger, who has spread a series of falsehoods about the 2020 election. Bernegger was convicted of mail and bank fraud in 2009. He's currently facing a felony charge for allegedly doctoring a subpoena related to one of his election reviews.



Wolfe can continue in WEC role, top court says

A unanimous state Supreme Court today ruled Wisconsin's top elections official can continue serving in the role indefinitely, shooting down attempts by GOP lawmakers to remove Meagan Wolfe from the post.

The court found state law requires the six-member Elections Commission to appoint a new administrator only if a vacancy occurs. But the court found there is no vacancy with Wolfe continuing to serve in the role even though the original four-year appointment expired in 2023.

In doing so, the court cited a previous ruling in a similar case that allowed one of former GOP Gov. Scott Walker's appointees to continue serving on the Natural Resources Board even after his term expired.

Citing that decision, the court found, "WEC does not have a duty to appoint a new administrator to replace Wolfe simply because her term has ended.

Wolfe became the focus of ire for some Republicans after Donald Trump's narrow loss to Joe Biden in 2020, and some GOP lawmakers had called for her removal.

In 2023, the three GOP appointees on the six-member Elections Commission voted to reappoint Wolfe to the post, which would then submit the nomination to the Republican-controlled state Senate for confirmation.

Wimberger calls Evers PFAS plan a concession

GOP Sen. Eric Wimberger suggested a budget proposal announced by Gov. Tony Evers to combat PFAS contamination is a concession to Republican lawmakers, but said he still has concerns about language to protect innocent landowners.

Wimberger said Evers' proposal is "an admission of what I've been saying for years: we can't just write the DNR a check for \$125 million to fight this problem."

Meanwhile, Midwest Environmental Advocates said it's open to a narrow exemption to protect farmers.

Evers yesterday announced a swath of measures to improve water quality in his Feb. 18 budget proposal, including more than \$145 million to address PFAS contamination. That funding includes \$125 million set aside in the 2023-25 state budget to fight PFAS.

Evers' proposal also lists provisions aimed at helping those whose properties are contaminated through no fault of their own — a key sticking point in negotiations with the GOP-run Legislature over PFAS funding.

Wimberger, of Green Bay, co-authored SB 312 last session, which laid out how to spend the \$125 million. Republicans have argued it includes important protections for innocent landowners, but Evers vetoed it last session over provisions limiting DNR's authority to regulate PFAS. The Joint Finance Committee has rejected Evers' calls to release the money directly to DNR.

First off, service and giving back

is in my DNA. I joined the United States Marine Corps right after September 11, 2001. I have continued to serve my country, and community long after my active duty status ended. Eventually that service transitioned to local government. In 2023, I ran for village trustee, and jumped in with both feet after being elected. The village president position is generally unopposed. I have a problem with that. When there is only one person to vote for, it really gives you no choice at all. I also feel that there is improvement which can be made in the village, and I want to lead in that positive change.

What's the biggest challenge facing the village right now and how would you address it?

Chris Voll Age: 61

Why did you decide to run for village president?

Community service is my passion, something I believe in and have done from an early age, starting with Boy Scouts, and then membership in local organizations like Jaycees and Lions clubs. My goal has remained the same: advance positive change. We will capitalize on our previous accomplishments and continue that momentum into the future. I thought long and hard about running. I saw the people who were going to run and I felt like I needed to run again, to finish what has been started.

What's the biggest challenge facing the village right now and how would you address it?

Our biggest challenge, since 2020 has been staff retention and vendors. People leave for all sorts of reasons, better opportunities, etc. To get an idea of the real issues with staff, I will direct people to the Von Briesen report. This expensive report outlines in detail the reasons behind staff departures. The vendor issue is also related to the activities outlined in the report. We cannot get a variety of vendors to work with us, as well as any real development in the village. My solution is to continue with the code of conduct, work with the vendors and developers, to show we are moving in the right direction. I want to continue working with staff to help them be as effective as possible. The biggest thing that can help make change occur is for voters to attend meetings, interface with board members, review past board meeting recordings and learn for themselves what has happened and how they can make positive changes so the people who cause issues are decidedly shown their actions are hurting everyone within the village.

What would your top three priorities for the village be if you were elected?

The first priority is filling staff vacancies. We continue to have interviews with qualified candidates. We just hired a planning technician, also new is an interim finance director, and we have ongoing interviews for the clerk position. We need to continue to provide training and guidance to new staff members and help them be able to become the stellar employees that I know they will be, and that the village needs.

I firmly believe in hiring good people, helping them acclimate to their roles, and then working with them in a collaborative way. The second priority is the continuation of the

water quality plan that I created. The second step was to build a water treatment facility. The filtration plant went online last month. The filtration plant will remove the manganese and iron from our water. The facility is large enough to accommodate another well, if needed. The final piece is looking for a third well site. These items will set up the village's clean water program for years to come. The third priority is development, with the floodplain remapping completed, this will open up new areas for additional commercial and residential development. These areas around Kowalski Rd will be prime locations now. Additional residential developments off to the East as well. There are development projects that are underway for TID 2.

These development projects will assist in getting the remaining properties developable.

What is your pitch to voters? Why should voters

choose you over your opponents later this month? I have willingly served 17 years on the village board, as such I have the experience and the past knowledge to continue moving the village forward. No other candidate has the depth and breadth of my experience nor do they have the objectivity when participating in meetings. Why did you decide to run for village president?

I am running for village president because our village government is broken, which has contributed to tarnishing our village's reputation. We have had 6 village administrators (including interim and acting) in the last 3 years and a revolving door of village employees. Our Village leadership has made irresponsible budget decisions and depleted our reserves.

What's the biggest challenge facing the village right now and how would you address it?

The biggest challenge facing the village is the same as the reason I am running – Kronenwetter's village government is not functioning at optimal levels. I plan to bring order back to village government by focusing on three top priorities: Functional and effective village board meetings; bring transparency, accountability and accuracy to the village's finances and financial statements; and rebuild the village's reputation and develop a plan for the village's future.

What would your top three priorities for the village be if you were elected?

1) Functional and effective village board meetings.

Running effective board meetings is a key responsibility of the village president. Our village board meetings often are not limited to discussions of the agenda items and turn into forums to attack fellow trustees and village suppliers.

If elected, I will make it a priority to run the village board meetings in a professional and effective manner that begins to help us restore the reputation of the village.

2) Bring transparency, accountability and accuracy to the village's finances and financial statements board leadership has demonstrated a lack of understanding regarding municipal budgets and levy limits.

The board cut taxes in 2023, budgeted for deficit spending and depleted the village's unassigned reserves to \$182,212. In addition, there was an unexplained \$3,000,000 discrepancy between the village's books and the 2023 audited financial statements.

If elected, I will make it a priority to provide accurate, timely financial statements and to develop and follow a clear and understandable budget process.

3) Rebuild the reputation of the village and develop a plan for the village's future.

I am committed to addressing challenges promptly to prevent them from escalating. I will make the necessary, and

sometimes difficult, decisions while maintaining transparency with both village residents and employees.

What is your pitch to voters? Why should voters choose you over your opponents later this month? The current leadership is no longer seeing the issues of the village clearly and with a vision for the future. This is likely why we are seeing the revolving door of staff and the known issues not being resolved. Key issues are not being dealt with and the result is a village in decline.

I have the experience, education, skill set, and demonstrated ability to build consensus among board members, engage the public, and begin to rebuild our village government and village's reputation.

I look forward to working with the VOK staff, the trustees and the citizens, to make Kronenwetter a village we can be proud to live in.





In the pocket

A new renovation offers a big pool hall in the south metro

While cue sports like carom, snooker, and pool can sometimes be seen as over the hill these days and more of a niche than a major affair, a Mosinee business shows they are instead more on top.

Nestled on the side of Old Highway 51, the On the Hill Billiards Club Bar and Grill has catered to fans of putting their best shot in the pocket since opening their 3,600-square-foot addition dedicated solely to the game two years ago. In contrast to other spaces like bars which have pool tables, owner Todd Holzer – who oversees the space alongside fiancée Ruth Geier – sees the site as more of a pool hall which happens to have a bar attached and this is needed to really succeed.

"The big difference now from 30 years ago with how you operate is, back then you just had to turn on lights and wait for people," Holzer says. "Now, if you do not have something going on, people do not go out just to go out. It is why we have events every weekend and mostly these are pool tournaments. We've also done charity fundraisers and pool is the majority of our business."

Indeed, reports from organizations like Gallup, Inc. published as recently as 2023 have found the number of adults under 35 who drink is down to 62 percent from 72 percent a decade ago. This is why Holzer says the pool hall itself is closed off from the bar by a door and is in its own separate space, is equipped with eight tables, and this summer, will be the spot for an event focused on the love of the game and not the food and drink people can enjoy alongside or after, if all goes well.

"In May we are trying to fill up a tournament," he adds. "It is going to be called the Paper City Classic. Hopefully, it will bring some pro and semi-pro players and money to

the town. If you want to come up and shoot, tables are \$6 an hour or \$15 for a day. We're open six days a week." For Auburndale resident Brian Lang, it all lives up to


Holzer's promise.

"Great place to relax, shoot some pool, enjoy great burgers and a friendly group of people. Diamond tables," a Facebook review from Lang published in 2024 on the club's page reads.
