

## **PSA Snowmobile Trails Closed to Motor Vehicles**

**CODY BRAUNER ASSISTANT FOREST ADMINISTRATOR** LANGLADE CO. FORESTRY DEPT.

COUNTY ORDINANCE LANGLADE 8.08 (12)COUNTY SNOWMOBILE TRAILS CLOSED TO OPERATION OF TRUCKS AND CARS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY WITH EXCEPTIONS BELOW:

ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS DURING SNOWMOBILE SEASON

a) During the period from December 1st of any year and extending to April 1st of the following year

no person shall operate any MOTOR VEHICLE on any designated and marked snowmobile trail within Langlade County that has been groomed unless:

i) That person is the

owner of land of which such trail crosses

That ii) person authorized by a permit from the land manager for public lands of which such trail crosses

iii) That person is officially completing snowmobile trail maintenance under a club maintenance agreement.

iv) Such trail section is plowed for motor vehicle use by actions of the land owner or land manager of such trail section

v) Rescue and official vehicles are exempt from this section.

Please note that State definition of Motor Vehicles generally includes trucks. cars, motorcycles and jeeps.

Snowmobiles and other recreational similar vehicles are not "Motor Vehicles"

Under this Ordinance all County Forest Roads/ trails which are signed and groomed as snowmobile trails are restricted from use by trucks and cars unless those roads have been plowed by authority of the Forestry, Parks and Recreation Department. Hunters and fishermen retain all access to County Forestry properties by walking or use of snowmobiles on these trails/roads, or through alternate routes, however use of trucks and cars are subject to violations and possible cost for repair of trail surfaces.

State regulations also restrict trucks and cars on snowmobile trails crossing other public or private

lands to provide safety to

the snowmobile operators. Violators of restrictions are subject to law enforcement action.

Illegal use of snowmobile trails by trucks and cars may subject violators to substantial liability if accidents by snowmobile operators can be attributed to their illegal use.



The Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) wants to assure taxpayers that IRS Direct File, a free and convenient way to file federal income taxes directly with the IRS, remains a safe and secure option during the 2025 tax season.

Direct File utilizes robust security measures to protect taxpayer information. Key security features include:

Secure Data Transmission: Tax information is transmitted securely to the IRS using SSL 3.0 128-bit encryption. This creates as many combinations as the

number of water molecules in 2.7 million Olympic-size swimming pools.

Identity Verification: The program employs rigorous identify verification procedures to ensure the authenticity of filers. Direct File uses ID.me to help prevent identity theft and to protect taxpayer data.

Ongoing Security Monitoring: The IRS continuously monitors the system for any potential security threats.

"We understand that tax information security is paramount," said David Casey, Secretary-Designee of Revenue. "The IRS has implemented strong safeguards to protect sensitive information throughout the Direct File process."

Direct File is a free IRS program that offers a convenient and user-friendly way

for eligible Wisconsin taxpayers to file their federal income tax returns electronically. It integrates seamlessly with WisTax, DOR's free online tax preparation software for filing Wisconsin state taxes. Together, they offer Wisconsinites a secure, seamless way to file both their federal and state return for FREE.

## Wisconsin Livestock Owners Encouraged to Renew Their Premises Registration Now for 2025

#### **WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, TRADE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION**

Department Wisconsin Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP), in partnership with the Wisconsin Livestock Identification Consortium (WLIC), is asking every livestock owner to renew and update their livestock premises registration. State law requires that all livestock\* owners register where their animals are kept, and current registrants must renew their premises registration by July 31, 2025.

Registrants can contact WLIC to renew. All registrants should have received email registration notifications from DATCP; however, registrants without email addresses will receive a letter this spring. Livestock owners must register their premises regardless of the number of animals they keep. There is no cost to register. DATCP uses the information to rapidly respond to animal disease outbreaks



to protect animal health, the food supply, public safety, and Wisconsin's agriculture economy. Registrant information is never shared or sold commercially. Examples of locations that require registration include:

Farms and hobby farms

Backyard poultry flocks

Veterinary clinics with large animal hospital facilities

Stables

Livestock exhibitions, markets, and feedlots

Dealers and haulers that keep livestock on their property

Slaughter, rendering, and dead animal facilities

Any other location where livestock is kept or congregated

Registration renewal is required every three years. By reviewing the information on the renewal form and providing any updates to WLIC, current registrants can renew their premises registration or, as required, report that they no longer house

Registering or Renewing a Premises

Those who need to register a new location can find more information on DATCP's website. Failing to register a premises can result in fines and ineligibility for state indemnity payments if animals are condemned due to disease exposure.

Livestock owners can register new premises or renew previous registrations

Calling WLIC at (888) 808-1910. Downloading and mailing a paper application or returning the renewal form. Registrants will receive confirmation once their registration or renewal is processed. Premises ID numbers may be required by certain municipalities, organizations, and/


Winter burns typically begin with cattail marshes, wetlands and wet prairies. Cattail wildfires can present a control challenge for suppression authorities during the warmer summer months when both dead and live cattails are available to burn. By burning in winter, DNR staff take advantage of ideal ice and snow cover, which reduces the heat and intensity of cattail marsh and barrens burns. Additional windows of opportunity for prescribed burning will continue through spring and open again in

#### **Natural Gas Safety Tips**

Natural gas is a reliable and useful source of energy, but like all other fuels it must be used with care and respect. Following is a list of important safety tips to keep in mind.

#### **Basic Tips**

- Keep combustibles (paints and other flammable fluids, papers, curtains, rags, etc.) away from any gas appliance or an open flame.
- Teach children to never light or play with the controls of any gas appliance.
- Check the flame on gas appliances. A sharp, blue flame indicates the gas is burning cleanly.
- Never use a gas range for heat. This could create both a fire hazard and a carbon monoxide hazard.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for operation of gas appliances.
- Make sure gas appliances have adequate fresh air and their vent is free of any obstructions.



many factors can contribute to AFib episodes, research shows that alcohol is a significant trigger—even in small amounts. Studies indicate that consuming just one drink can increase the likelihood of an AFib episode, sometimes doubling the risk within hours.

As part of American Heart Month, Aspirus Health is raising awareness about how alcohol affects heart rhythm and why people with AFib should consider eliminating it.

"AFib occurs when the upper chambers of the heart, the atria, quiver instead of contracting properly, which can lead to heart failure, stroke, and even early death," said John Johnkoski, MD, Cardiothoracic Surgeon at Aspirus Heart Care. "Alcohol creates a chemical environment in the heart that makes AFib more likely, and studies show there really is no safe level of alcohol for people with this condition."

For those already diagnosed with AFib, alcohol can prolong episodes, interfere with medications, and increase the risk of stroke and heart failure. Over time, continued alcohol consumption can weaken the heart and contribute to more persistent forms of AFib.

"We used to think alcohol only caused heart problems with excessive drinking, but now we know that even small amounts can negatively impact AFib," Dr. Johnkoski explained. "Avoiding alcohol gives you the best chance of staying in rhythm, whether you're managing it with medications, catheter-based therapies, or surgery."

While everyone's AFib triggers may vary, Dr. Johnkoski stresses that quitting alcohol is the safest option.



"If someone is willing to stop drinking, that's fantastic—that's a win," he said. "If they're hesitant, we might frame the conversation around testing whether alcohol is a trigger for them. But the reality is, studies show there's no truly safe level of alcohol for people with AFib."

The best way to maintain a stable heart rhythm is to avoid alcohol entirely. If you experience symptoms like a racing heart, palpitations, or dizziness after drinking, stop immediately. If symptoms persist or worsen, contact your doctor.

Aspirus Health encourages individuals with AFib or concerns about heart health to speak with their healthcare provider about strategies to manage their condition and reduce risk factors.







late summer and fall (mid-July through November).

Prescribed burns support healthy ecosystems for an abundance of plants and animals in Wisconsin. These burns mimic the benefits historic fire once provided but occur under a safer "prescription" range of weather and fuel conditions (compared to most wildfires). Throughout history, many ecosystems in Wisconsin experienced either periodic natural fire and/or were managed with cultural fire by First Nation people. These "fire-dependent" plant communities, such as prairies, wetlands and oak or pine barrens/savannas/woodlands developed a tolerance and eventual dependence on periodic fire, and would not be sustained today without prescribed burning.

Winter burns remove dead vegetation buildup and open

waterways for migratory fowl and other wildlife. The dead vegetation is reduced to ash, transferring this natural fertilizer back into the soil. Following the burn, hazardous fuels are reduced, foraging and nesting improve in the revitalized vegetation, and the stimulated growth of their root systems enhances their ability to store more carbon. Other benefits of prescribed burns include reducing non-native or invasive plant species and increasing regeneration of important native trees like oak and pine.

Planning for prescribed burns can take weeks or months. DNR staff make the decision to conduct these prescribed burns only when weather and vegetation conditions meet strict standards for safety, smoke management and burn effectiveness. Even after such careful planning, the decision to burn on a specific day is reassessed and approved at the regional scale, and once more by the burn boss, who confirms on-site conditions are as forecasted for a safe burn.

When conducting prescribed burns near roads or recreational trails, the DNR will post signs to notify the public. For your safety, we ask you to please avoid these areas while the burn is being conducted. The DNR also notifies local law enforcement and fire officials in advance about when and where DNR prescribed burns will take place. Burns planned for the following day are displayed on the DNR Prescribed Burn Dashboard.


