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# Wisconsin Rapids man sentenced to 9 years for methamphetamine trafficking and illegally possessing firearms

WISCONSIN RAPIDS – Timothy M. O'Shea, United States Attorney for the Western District of Wisconsin, announced that Bradly Rosenthal, 42, Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, pleaded guilty and was sentenced on Feb 12. by U.S. District Judge William M. Conley to nine years in federal prison for possessing methamphetamine intended for distribution and possessing two loaded firearms as a felon.

Rosenthal sold methamphetamine to a confidential informant three times in Feb. 2024. On March 13, 2024, law enforcement received a report of suspected drug activity at a car wash located in Nekoosa, Wisconsin. Officers responded to the car wash where they encountered Rosenthal. After a K9 alerted to the presence of illicit substances, law enforcement searched Rosenthal's vehicle and found 266 grams of methamphetamine, two loaded firearms, a Taser, \$2,000, and drug distribution paraphernalia. Rosenthal is prohibited from legally possessing firearms because of a prior felony conviction.

At sentencing, Judge Conley expressed concern at Rosenthal's "repeated serious crimes," which include prior drug trafficking and firearms offenses, and his continued "endangerment of others."

The charges against Rosenthal were the result of an investigation conducted by the FBI Central

Wisconsin Drug Task Force and the Wisconsin Rapids and Nekoosa Police Departments. The ATF Madison Crime Gun Task Force also assisted with the case. The ATF Madison Crime Gun Task Force consists of federal agents from ATF and Task Force Officers (TFOs) from local agencies including the Dane County and Clark County Sheriff's Offices and the Fitchburg, Madison, Sun Prairie, and La Crosse Police Departments. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Jennifer Remington and

Megan Stelljes prosecuted this case.

This case has been brought as part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), the U.S. Justice Department's program to reduce violent crime. The PSN approach emcoordination phasizes between state and federal prosecutors and all levels of law enforcement to address gun crime, especially felons illegally possessing firearms and ammunition and violent and drug crimes that involve the use of firearms.

## **Grave Thoughts From The Graveyard**

#### Dear Reader.

Today, I visited a graveyard to pay respects to a recently departed family member. The cemetery was vast, and we found ourselves lost amidst rows of unfamiliar headstones. After wandering both on foot and by car, weaving past names unknown to us, we finally reached the gravesite.

But more than that, my mind wandered to the fate of the souls. After death, where do they go? Surely, they don't linger here. While the dead no longer have a care or say in their resting place, there's an undeniable finality to it. They

are gone from the world we know; and at an immediate or lingered point in time, their bodies become the forgotten invisible. After all of their toils, they are buried away somewhere out of sight, and out of mind.

# Letter to the Editor

Nicotine, especially from vapes, significantly affects teens today. In 2023, one in three high school students in Wisconsin reported using tobacco or nicotine products (YRBS, 2023). This epidemic impacts our friendships, mental health, school performance, sports, and family life. We need to empower students across Wisconsin to share their experiences with vaping and nicotine.

Youth are trying vapes and tobacco products daily, leading to addiction. Athletes join the Rafters from all across the country, coming to Wisconsin Rapids and joining the community with a host family. Jake Adams, Assistant General Manager, says, "We're always looking for host families. It's a great opportunity and it makes lifelong connections for both the player and the family."

For the upcoming 2025 season, new head coach



Coach Thomas "Ziggy" Zieglowsky is already building an impressive roster. With an emphasis on the community's support and involvement, Coach Thomas' saying will carry the Rafters into a successful 2025 season, "We are riding the Raft together this summer, be ready to Grab an Oar."

With a packed 72 game schedule (36 games at home and 36 games away), the Rafters give plenty of opportunities for the community to come support and see a thrilling game of baseball. For avid fans and casual viewers alike, a Rafters game has something for everyone.

"Even if someone has been to a Rafters game over a dozen times, each game promises something new and exciting to see." General Manager Ken Day explains, "We have something for everyone, from first time fans to season ticket holders, there's something for everybody."

The Rafters promise a devoted and committed team, with players rolling in straight from the spring



season into the Northwoods League. The players come to the Rafters to learn new skills and be seen by scouts who frequent the games to recruit new talent into the major leagues. Several Rafters players have gone onto the major leagues, including Kyle Teel of the Chicago White Sox and Bryson Stott of the Philadelphia Phillies. Former Rafters players have also gone onto coaching positions in the major leagues. Going to a Rafters game could mean watching future major league stars in their early days, something that excites their loyal fan base.

Assistant General Manager Jake Adams explains, "We have an extremely loyal fan base. We have 1500 fans at each home game that bring the energy and excitement to the field the minute the gate opens."

Though the Wisconsin Rapids Rafters have been around since 2015, their

home games are played on Witter Field which has been around for nearly 100 years, built in 1928. Witter Field and its historic backdrop provide a vintage and nostalgic feel to lifelong baseball fans that have watched the game and its fields evolve over the decades. Witter Field has stayed true to its roots with improvements embellishing the stadium over the last century. More recent additions to the field include the "Rat Trap"—a private deck above the third baseline that has made for comfortable private outings since 2013. Also in 2013, the Rafter's added the "Home Plate Club" right behind home plate, with tables making it a prime spot to watch a Rafter's win, and 2021 saw an addition to the "Home Plate Club" due its' popularity. In 2015, a "Craft River" was installed beneath the "Rat Trap" where you can watch your drink float to you down a water stream. In 2017, the Rafters added accessible seating with the ability of a grant, making a comfortable spot for wheelchair users to watch right by the first baseline. Witter Field has evolved with the generations and provided comfortable and exciting new features, but remains a historic hotspot for the community.

General Manager Ken Day explains, "I have fans who still come in and talk about the history of the field and the nostalgia it brings. The history of the field has impacted the fan base in such a neat way."

The Rafters have seamlessly tied history together with the future, promising a nostalgic and vintage feel to the game that is hard to find in 2025, paired together with modern features like the Craft River. The Rafters are proud to support their community and offer a place to unwind each summer, however, the Rafters are always looking for support in the form of host families to host their players. Host families not only become closer to their community and Rafters family, but create unique connections with their player that last a lifetime.

piece of shoreland that was gifted to him by his father.
The land had been in the family for a few decades.
Since the father had gifted the land while he was still alive, the original cost basis was transferred to the son.
The son wanted to sell some

a client who had a sizeable

of the land and was shocked when he learned of the capital gains taxes that would be subjected upon him. Capital gains are assessed when an asset appreciates: the difference between the cost basis (what the land was purchased for) and sale price is subject to capital gains taxation. Had his father left the land to his son as part of an inheritance, the son would have received a "step up" in basis, meaning the new basis is the value of the land on the date of death. Had the son sold the land shortly thereafter, with a step-up in basis, he would not have the capital

gains issue. We strategized on the timing of the sale of the land: he could pay less in capital gains taxes if he sold the land in a tax year when he had low income. Hopefully, he can coordinate that with a year where land values are up.

I had another client whose father gifted a stock and mutual fund portfolio to her a few months before he had passed away. The stocks and mutual funds were purchased decades ago and had gone up in value quite nicely. Same story as above: had her father transferred the assets at his death with her as

We transferred the stocks and mutual funds and began a tax-harvesting strategy to ultimately mitigate some or all of the capital gains.

Both stories are notable examples of successful and generous parents. Had they timed the gifting differently, the capital gains implications could have been significantly reduced and simplified. But both are also great examples of how in many cases, planning

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
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
