In 2022, the group celebrated their 50th year anniversary, making their Grand Ole Opry debut in Nashville as part of their Time Warp Tour. A documentary, Ozark Mountain Daredevils Backstage, was broadcast on PBS Television.

The Daredevils have released a number of major label and independent record label recordings, and have traveled millions of miles performing throughout North America and Europe. They still attract and maintain a loyal and dedicated fan base throughout the world.

Their current lineup of talented musicians allows the band to perform songs from every corner of their vast catalogue, and they continue to delight Dareheads with their live performances. With two of the original co-founders still on board, their signature sound and style remain intact and vibrant. Their most recent albums; Off The Beaten Path and Heaven 20/20 are their first studio recordings since 1997. The new albums contain all new songs, proving their nonstop evolution as songwriters and musicians.

Did you know...all about girls scouts

- ✓ The first Girl Scout cookies appeared in 1917 and they were not Thin Mints. They were sugar cookies that families baked at home and sold in their communities.
- ✓ In 1922, the first official recipe was released nationally and cookie sales as a way of raising funds for the Girl Scouts began to catch fire. (See recipe)
- ✓ In 1934, the Girl Scouts contracted their first commercial baker. By 1936, they had their first licensed industrial bakery selling these tasty treats through 125 local chapters.



- ✓ Girl Scout cookies disappeared in the 1940s because of World War II. Sugar, flour and butter were rationed, forcing the Girl Scouts to sell calendars instead. But they weren't anywhere near as popular -- or tasty.
- ✓ By the 1950s, Girl Scouts had 30 bakeries across the country, which were downsized to 14 in the 1960s and by the 1990s, it was reduced down to just two bakeries: ABC Bakers and Little Brownie.
- ✓ In 1951, the first standard cookies were created: Sandwich, which became Do-Si-Dos; Shortbread, which went on to be Trefoils; and Chocolate Mint, or what we call Thin Mints today.
- ✓ Did you know that Jan Davis, a former Girl Scout and the first female space shuttle commander, brought Girl Scout cookies into space on the Space Shuttle Endeavour in 1992.

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
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PUBLISHER'S LETTER

Human Body Design

When we stop to think about the design of the human

body, we might find ourselves wondering if it could have been crafted more efficiently. Consider the everyday processes of hydration and nutrition: why must we spend so much of our lives urinating or expelling waste from our bodies? Couldn't we have been designed to hydrate through the skin, or metabolize food



directly into energy without the need for waste?

It's a curious thought experiment—imagining a body that functions without the need to "offload" its excesses, freeing us from the sometimes inconvenient realities of biological maintenance. Wouldn't it be wonderful to live unencumbered by these daily rituals, focusing solely on the higher pursuits of life?

Yet, when we reflect more deeply, we realize that the human body as it is designed is nothing short of miraculous. It's a complex, harmonious system where countless processes—digestion, circulation, respiration— work in synchrony to sustain us. These so-called inefficiencies might actually be part of the greater design, teaching us humility and grounding us in the rhythms of life. They remind us of our interconnectedness with nature and the delicate balance we inhabit.

Could there have been a "better" design? Perhaps. But then, would we be the same creatures we are now—resilient, adaptable, and marvelously imperfect? Perhaps the true genius of the human design lies not in its flawlessness, but in its resilience and ability to grow through imperfection.

NMU accepts applicants for scholarship

Northern Michigan University invites incoming fall 2025 first-year students to apply for The Schultz Family Foundation 'First-Generation Empowerment Scholarship'. The award, worth up to \$15,000 per year for up to four years, is geared toward students whose parents or legal guardians have not completed a bachelor's degree. Howard Schultz, Starbucks chairman emeritus and former CEO, was a first-generation NMU student who graduated with a degree in communications in 1975. He and his wife, Sheri Kersch-Schultz, established the scholarship as part of a \$1 million gift to NMU through their foundation.

"The empowerment scholarship is crafted on the notion that, while talent is everywhere, opportunity is not," said Jeff Korpi, associate vice president of the Northern Student Experience. "In addition to the funding support it provides, recipients will also be included in the first cohort of the Schultz Family Foundation Fellows program. They will learn what it means to be a servant leader—a quality Howard has emphasized—and forge a path forward with opportunities for mentorship, faculty/staff support and a strong community ready to encourage them every step of the way."

The Schultz Family Foundation First-Generation Empowerment Scholarship is a "last dollar" scholarship. which means students can use up to \$15,000 per year to pay for educational expenses after all other financial aid has been applied. Educational expenses may include books, housing and meals, student activity fee, recreation pass, parking pass, transportation expenses and others.

In addition to being a first-generation student, each applicant must be a first-year, bachelor's degree-seeking student from the U.S. who is able to move into on-campus housing two weeks prior to the start of the semester. The award is not available to Global Campus or international Eligible students should apply and be admitted to NMU

(nmu.edu/apply), submit a FAFSA form to demonstrate financial need (fafsa.gov), and submit a Schultz Family Foundation First-Generation Empowerment Scholarship application and additional materials. The deadline for submissions is March 30, with decisions released on April
