



Not so easy for Clintonville

CLINTONVILLE – The Clintonville Board of Education heard the pros and cons of the possibility of the Clintonville School District switching to a different conference for sports, as well as the challenges it would have to overcome to make such a move.

The topic was discussed in detail at the board's March 31 board meeting.

"There's been some frustration from parents that have gotten in contact with me about their daughters or their sons coming home and they're just sick of just getting beat night and night and night again, and they don't want to play athletics," said Troy Kuhn, Clintonville superintendent.

Kuhn said he asked Shaun Liesch, the activities director for the Clintonville School District, what he thought about the district switching conferences for sports.

"We talked about it, because it's not just always about winning and losing," Kuhn said.

If the district would explore moving to a different conference, Kuhn said the "ideal option" would be to joining the CWC (Central Wisconsin Conference). This would mean the district would compete against Weyauwega-Fremont, Shiocton, Manawa, Amherst, Bonduel, and Wittenberg-Birnawood.

One of the positives of such a move, would be less travel, Kuhn said.

Another positive would be Clintonville would be competing against students of the same demographics, such as poverty level and needs of the district.

Kuhn said a negative of such a move would be the fact that the CWC does not offer all the sports that Clintonville's current conference offers. For example, CWC does not offer girls soccer.

"There would be a couple of other things that we'd really have to put our thinking caps on and say, 'How would this work?'" Kuhn said.

Kuhn said the coaches in the district were asked their opinion on switching conferences, and some coaches were adamant about not switching. They said they like the tough competition, and the athletes realize they are playing against "high-level" opponents.

"Even though they lose, it makes their program better," Kuhn said.

Other coaches said they struggle to get students to play sports because the students know that the team doesn't have a chance to win a conference championship, Kuhn said.

If the district would want to pursue switching conferences



Two spotted, one missing

NEW LONDON – Two all-white whitetail deer have been the talk of the town lately. They're often spotted in the field south of Beckert Road in the Township of Mukwa. On any given evening a half dozen or more cars and trucks pull off the side of the road to view the herd of deer in the field, sometimes crowned by not one, but two all-white whitetail deer.

Beckert Road is the town line between the City of New London and Mukwa Township. Each evening

out the window from the living room chair, you can see them come out in that field," said Gary Burmiester. "They stand out like a spark plug. People drive-by, stop and take pictures all the time."

Burmiester says both deer aren't always together. Most of the time there is just the one, but occasionally you'll see them both out at once.

On Sunday night, Anthony Brandt and Josh Muskevitch of Hortonville were headed home from a walleye outing on the Wolf River and saw both bucks 20-yards off the road near the intersection of Beckert Road and Wyman Street. It was right at dark.

He and Brandt are among hundreds who have seen the two deer in those fields.

Jim St. Marie and his son Michael own 140 acres just a couple 40 acres south of the field. They began seeing the bucks last year.

"There were definitely two of them," said St. Marie.

There's an 8-point and then there's a fork buck [as of last fall], he said.

The St. Maries photographed the fork buck in June of 2024 on trail cameras, and Michael took a video of the 8-point from 30-yards away while bow hunting in the fall.

According to the UW-Stevens Point Museum of Natural History, albino deer are rare. They have pink eyes, noses, ears and hooves. Their birth rate could range from 1 in 20,000 to 1 in 100,000.

White deer with brown spots, known as piebald deer, are still rare but a bit more common. The current law does not protect a piebald deer.

Recently the UW-Stevens Point Museum of Natural History attained a rare true albino buck that was hit by a car and was received through the Wisconsin Department of

STEVENS POINT—The Stevens Point paper mill will soon begin the process of changing ownership. Pixelle Specialty Solutions has operated the Stevens Point paper mill since 2020. Ahlstrom announced on April 3 that an agreement has been executed to acquire the Stevens Point facility. This transaction will be financed through a \$600 million senior-secured financing package, with excess funds available for general corporate purposes.

Ahlstrom is based in Finland, but operates in more than 20 countries.

The Stevens Point paper mill has turned over ownership several times in the last two decades, prior to Pixelle's ownership beginning in 2020, the mill was owned by Verso Paper since 2012, then previously NewPage began ownership in 2007, and a handful of owners before that in the mill's 107 year long history.

The organizational change is expected to take effect on May 1, 2025. Pixelle Specialty Solutions said they are committed to working with Ahlstrom to support a smooth transition for employees and customers.

Natural Resources. The museum will include the rare addition to its collection of mounts.

In the meantime, if people want to see the living versions they'll have to drive down Beckert Road and hope for the best.

Lee Besaw, who lives on Bean City Road, first

saw one of the bucks last year across from his house in John Rowls' field near Most Precious Blood Cemetery. He saw it again last Wednesday off Beckert Road on his way home.

Besaw called the newspaper and a photographer was dispatched.

That day, last Wednesday, about a dozen other cars stopped along the road to watch and take photos.

Two traveling custodians for the City of New London have parked their vehicle along the road and watched the deer during their lunch breaks a few times.

"It's kind of a highlight of our day," said one of them.

St. Marie explained the deer have definitely made their presence known in the area.

We've seen them throughout the property bow hunting. Obviously, they stan right out. "You can see them coming from a mile away," he said.

"The one has been in Casey's pit off Bean City Road near the cemetery. He's been as far south as us, I'm sure he's been over on Manske's Dairy Farm near Bean City Ballroom. He's been around," said St. Marie.

Dale Stiebs, a retired Tyson Foods worker, has seen them often in the field on his way fishing or checking trap lines.

"I saw one standing out on the lawn in front of the high school Monday morning," he said.

That same morning, April 7, Doug Dey who lives on County Trunk W saw one dead near the intersection of County W

and Lyons Road.

"It was one of them," Dey said in a text exchange Monday night with the Waupaca County Post. "That sucks, I was looking forward to seeing horn development this summer," he said.

Stiebs said he saw one in the field along Beckert Road again Monday night, April 7. "So I know that at least one is still alive."

Ava's Golden Paw Pet Supplies at 103 Western Ave. North, is giving consumers another choice when it comes to buying their pet food and supplies in Waupaca.

Tiffany Mucha, the manager of Ava's Golden Paw, said she was working in pet retail when she was approached to help manage the new store in Waupaca.

JoAnne Thornell, the owner of Ava's Golden Paws, is no stranger to business ownership with also owning Marley's Smoke and Vape Shop with locations in Appleton, Oshkosh and Green Bay.

Thornell named the shops after her two children, with Marley being her oldest daughter and Ava being the youngest.

Mucha said Thornell had bought the shop and was thinking of ideas of how to use the space, eventually deciding to create a pet food shop that focused on holistic, limited-ingredient types of foods for pets.

Five new school positions suggested

Help for students slipping behind

CLINTONVILLE – The administrative team for the Clintonville School District has proposed to the Clintonville Board of Education that the district add five fulltime employees to the district.

The proposal was made at the board's March 31 meeting, and recommended the following positions be added to the district: program support teacher to be paid for with funds from Fund 17; one reading interventionist for grades 4K-5th grade and one math interventionist for grades 6-12, with both positions paid with funds from Fund 10; and two fulltime counselors for grades 4K-12, with both paid with funds from a Department of Public Instruction grant.

No action was taken by the board on the proposal recommendation, except for approving the addition of a program support teacher, which was a separate item on the agenda.

During the discussion, Clintonville Superintendent Troy Kuhn told the board that the district's administrative team had been engaged in a needs assessment for the district, particularly what students need and if the district has the staff to support those needs. He said the assessment showed that the district needed to add 10 positions to meet it's needs.

"I looked at the admin team and said, I'm not bringing 10 new positions to the board,

that's not happening," Kuhn said.

After continuing to review the needs of the district, Kuhn said the administrative team wanted to inform the board about some of its findings, as well as solutions to meet the needs of the district.

Assessment findings

Madalyn Simonis, Clintonville Elementary School principal, said when she started as principal last year, the district had five fulltime literacy interventionists, but it currently has only three fulltime literacy interventionists.

"I went from having three at the elementary, down to just one," Simonis said.

She added that the new curriculum is working.

"We see the data and we see improvements, but we still need to support our teachers," Simonis said.

She said she would like to see the district add a reading interventionist.

Kuhn told the board that according to the data, there is a high number of kindergarten students who are proficient or above, but as they progress to 8th grade, there are less students who are proficient, basically not keeping up.

Clintonville Middle School Principal Britney Dobratz said the middle school does not have a math interventionist, but it had one in prior years. She said she would like to the district to add a math support position to work with grades 6 through 12. The person would be working with students in the classroom.

Scores show the middle school has a good report card, but Dobratz acknowledged

that how the scores are calculated have changed.

"I don't want to just say, 'Hey, we have really good data, we're doing great, lets just keep doing that,'" Dobratz said. "I think we need a 6-12 person to support all the kids, too."

Clintonville High School Principal James Blashe added that the number of high school students in the district who are at a basic level or below for math is high when compared to other districts. He said the district doesn't have any type of math intervention for high school students.

He added that some changes will be made for the next school year to get some help for students who need extra help.

Mental health

The administrative team also addressed student mental health and absenteeism.

Blashe said the district is averaging around 200 students being absent from school each day.

He said one recommendation would be for the district to have one school counselor for every 250 students in the district. He said the high school has 400 students and only one counselor.

Simonis said that when the district seeks counseling help from local medical organizations, it is virtual appointments only.

"We are grossly understaffed in our school counseling department," Simonis said. "Two additional counselors would do our students a lot of good."

She added, "It hurts us to put this data on here for you guys and our community

members, but it's the reality of where we are right now."

Kuhn addressed the question of what happened to the positions that are being requested.

"The best and worst thing that happened to school districts was COVID," Kuhn said.

Not sure of the exact amount, but Kuhn said he thought the Clintonville School District received an additional \$7 million over a three-year period because of COVID.

"That money was dedicated not just for health and safety of students and staff, but also dedicated to catching kids up from the loss of learning because of COVID," Kuhn said.

During that time, Kuhn said the district adopted a co-teaching philosophy. This had the district hiring special education teachers and para-professionals for every grade so co-teaching could take place. The district also had instructional coaches, as well as multiple interventionists at every level.

"When COVID money went away, it was, I'll say, our job, to figure out who stays and who goes because we don't have that extra money sitting there anymore," Kuhn said. "We proved that it can work if we have the people. But without passing local referendums time and time and time again, we can't afford the personnel to do that."

He said the positions that are being requested existed in the past because of the COVID funds the district received.

"Now that they're (positions) not here, we're seeing that the need that they should exist again," Kuhn said.

Schley wins, two write-ins elected

CLINTONVILLE – Jeannie Schley, who has served on the Clintonville Common Council in the past, was reelected to the council, as well as two write-ins being elected.

Schley defeated incumbent Tom Lederer in District 4, in the only contested council race on the April 1 spring ballot. Schley received 146 votes, while Lederer received 114 votes.

Two council districts that did not have any candidates on the ballots, were filled through the election

with write-in votes.

In District 1, incumbent Aimee Ebert, who did not file candidacy paperwork, so she was not on the ballot, but she did receive 10 write-in votes, which was enough to get her elected. She has accepted the council seat.

District 3 also didn't have any candidates on the ballot, but Thomas Behnken received the most write-in votes. He has accepted the council seat for District 3.

Incumbents Tammy Strey-Hirt in District 2 and Greg Rose in District 5 were each elected unopposed.

Board approves program support teacher

New position for special education program

CLINTONVILLE – The Clintonville Board of Education approved the addition of a program support teacher to its staff to serve the district's special education program.

The approval came when the board met March 31.

During the discussion, board member Clint Barkow asked for verification that the program support teacher would be a new position in the district, and that the district has never had such a position before.

Clintonville Superintendent Troy Kuhn said that was correct.

"A lot of this has to do

with just oversight in certain areas, particularly making sure that IEPs are correctly written, and that not only what is in the IEP (individualized education program), the goals are correct and that we are properly meeting what is required in those IEPs, in addition to professional development and a lot of the other things," Kuhn said.

Kuhn added that "the majority of the district's special development is now happening within the walls of the Clintonville School District because we have highly qualified people at Clintonville."

Barkow asked if the position would be fulltime.

Kuhn said it would be fulltime.

"We're asking that we have this position because that's what Clintonville needs at this time," Kuhn said.

Sale of \$2.1 million in bonds approved

Funds for Oshkosh Street project

NEW LONDON – The issuance and sale of up to \$2.1 million in sewerage, water, and electric system mortgage revenue bonds to help cover the cost of the Oshkosh Street project in New London was approved by the New London Common Council at its March 18 meeting.

As part of the approval, the council accepted the parameters of the debt sale. As long as the parameters are met, city officials can approve the sale. The sale is scheduled to take place on April 17, with the closing expected by May 7.

Finance Committee
The issuance and sale of the

bonds was discussed at the March 5 Finance & Personnel Committee meeting.

At the meeting, Harry Allen, municipal advisor with Ehlers, told the committee that the financing is being considered primarily for Oshkosh Street, adding that there are a lot of revenue sources to fund the street reconstruction project.

“This financing specifically is funding the sewer, water, and the utilities relocation aspect of the Oshkosh Street project,” Allen said.

Another portion of the project will be reimbursed to the city from a state grant, Allen said. That grant is around \$2 million.

The non-utility cost to the city for the project will be around \$2.3 million, Allen said, adding that there may be a need in the future for the city to take out additional debt to fund the project.

“The current plan is that the city will use reserves to front the \$2.3 million and recover the grant portion when it’s available, and then potentially looking at adding some of this project to tax increment district (TID) number 4. There were costs for Oshkosh Street included in that project plan.”

In total, Allen said the city is looking at borrowing around \$2.5 million, which includes project costs. Of that total, \$1.5 million would be assigned to the sewer utility, and \$1 million would be assigned to the electric and water utility.

With the financing, Allen said the city would be financing around \$2.5 million of utility projects, but only issuing \$2.1 million in additional debt.

The financing would be structured to be paid off over a 20-year term. The first payment would be due in December of this year, with the final payment in 2044.

Allen said the city can expect an interest rate of around 4.25%. The maximum that could be charged is 5.5%.

“We don’t expect to be at that 5.5% territory, if we do see rates creep up that much between now and the sale day, that’s on us to provide advice to city staff to really consider moving that sale to where maybe the market is a little more-calm and you could get a better price,” Allen said.

The debt can be prepaid as of Dec. 1, 2034.

As part of taking out new debt, Allen said the city did go through a rating surveillance process with Moody’s.

“We got really good news for the city, the revenue backed debt of the city was upgraded from A3 to A2,” Allen said.

pool, fitness center, and exercise programs at no cost. The program is available to fulltime city employees and their families. It is also available to part-time employees, but not their families.

Ald. John Hass said the council rejected a raise for council members last year, and including council members in the city’s wellness program could make up for some of that.

“This really isn’t a huge money thing to the city because it’s a facility that’s there,” Hass said. “And like you said, sharper minds for us are also better.”

Ald. BaLyndaCroy said she thinks the wellness program should be extended to all city employees, even seasonal employees.

Ald. John Faucher agreed, adding it could make those employees feel more welcome as employees.

“I don’t think it would break the bank to get those people involved in those various buildings,” Faucher said.

Croy and Faucher said it would also be a good idea to extend the benefit to those city employees who retire from city employment.

“To show some appreciation for the years of service that they did put in,” Croy said. “I mean, that’s a huge thing. We’ve got a lot of long-term employees who are going to retire from New London, and that’s just a nice way of saying thank you into retirement.”

A library for a river town

Architecture inspired by waterfront

FREMONT – The plans for the future Tri-County Library and Community Center were presented in the Fremont Village Hall gymnasium on March 27. Approximately 60 people attended to study the blueprints and the graphic renderings of what the building will look like.

A representative from JLG Architects presented a slide-show with images of fishing villages, boat docks, seawalls, piers, and wooden pylons—familiar sights along the Wolf River.

“The design team studied fishing villages and waterfront communities to understand the design inspirations and commonalities that we can use to design this project,” she said.

Library director Mellissa Krause went through the timeline that led up to this milestone. She remarked on the realities of running a library: rising technology costs,

inflation, and expanded staffing and hours. The pandemic also changed the role of community library and they adapted. The demand for computer usage is extremely high and they only have three

computers. “We’ve needed to update our current facility which is 30 years old. To meet the demands that the community has requested in community surveys and feedback—this

is where this project began, with the recognition that we’ve outgrown this space, we’ve outgrown these walls and the community is demanding different things of us,” said Krause.

Krause went over the key points of the project: the grant of \$4.25 million is being supplemented with an \$82,000 donation from the Friends of the Neuschafer Community Library (and of that, \$23,000 was given by an anonymous donor). This is for the land the structure will be built upon. There will be no direct tax increase as it is federally funded.

Also there is a focus on sustainability for the long-term

With local racetracks about to open for their race season, O' Bright said he is hoping that will lead to increased interest.


"To me this is a dream," he said. "If you don't have a dream, so be it. But if you have a dream, chase it, because it's not going to chase you

Both teams were held scoreless until the sixth inning when the Truckers jumpstarted their offense with an RBI by Kasson.


