Mr. Moon chose Addison Schmid as his Math Student of the Week. Mr. Moon stated that Addison always "pushes for them to get more done in class."



There has Always Been Something to Worry About

Tariffs, trade wars, inflation, interest rates, government spending, political fighting, foreign wars, ongoing labor shortages, an aging population, social security uncertainty, and so much more.

These all make for headlines, sensational reasons to worry and the subject of are many conversations. Interestingly enough though, there have always been reasons to worry, including worrying about our money.

A quick look back at history reminds us of what we've gotten through as a country and financially. Two World Wars, a great depression, and an attack on American soil in 1941 with the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Consumer goods shortages in 1944, the beginning of the Cold War in 1947, the Soviets detonating an atomic bomb in 1949, and the Korean War in 1950. The Soviets

detonated an H-bomb in 1953, Castro seized power in Cuba in 1959, and the Berlin Wall was erected in 1961. The Cuban missile crisis happened in 1962 and President Kennedy was assassinated in 1963. It must have been rather stressful to live through the late 1960's with the Vietnam War and in the 1970's we dealt with Watergate, an oil embargo, an energy crisis and the Three Mile Island nuclear accident.

Inflation ran rampant in the late 1970's and early 1980's, and in 1981, both President Reagan and the Pope were shot. The late 1980's brought the Savings and Loan crisis as well as Black Monday on October 19, 1987 when the stock market fell by 20% in a single day. The fed raised interest rates six times in 1994, and the end of the 90's brought the crash of technology stocks, fears of Y2K and the 9/11 terrorist The subprime attacks. mortgage market melted down, leading to the great recession in 2008. Unemployment hit 10% in 2009 and we faced a "Fiscal Cliff" and downgrade of US debt in 2012. The 20-teens brought hurricanes, trade wars, and then, the infamous Covid-19 pandemic. We got through all of it.

I could tell you what a few dollars invested in the stock market would have turned into going all the way back to the beginning of worry, but most of us

don't have that kind of time horizon. An interesting 10 year segment is 1968-1978, when the S&P 500 began at 96.47 and ended right back where it started, at 96.11, the epitome of a flat decade. That may lead one to worry that investing during those ten years would have gotten them nowhere. However, had one invested \$10,000 in stocks to mirror the S&P 500 during that time frame and reinvested their dividends, their ten grand would have grown to \$15,174.

A disciplined investment strategy includes remembering that when headlines sizzle markets gyrate, we recall that there has always been something to worry about.







Forerunner: Lambeau gets jump start on Draft process

"In the early 1930s there was no Draft system. It was pretty much a free-for-all, as far as free agency goes," said Packers Hall of Fame Curator Brent Hensel.

Hensel gave Packers Head Coach Curly Lambeau much of the credit for the foundation of the Draft.

"He was really ahead of the game in the Draft. He realized quickly, actually, probably by accident. He started scouting some of the college players in the All Star games as early as 1930, and what I mean by accident...Curly liked to head out to California, out to the West Coast, and he started going to the East-West Shrine game. Just by accident, he realized, 'Hey, I can learn a lot about some great college players.' He ends up drafting them and it becomes a huge advantage for him, while

others really didn't have any kind of scouting system, or (an idea of) how to look at prospects other than when they went to the Draft," Hensel said.

"So usually on New Year's Day, he would go back and watch several major college all-star games. In fact, in 1936, Lambeau and his second wife drove out from Green Bay to San Francisco, arriving on Dec. 26, and he would watch this East-West Shrine game and it influenced his first couple of picks."

In the Jan. 19, 1951 edition of the San Francisco Examiner, Sports Editor Grieve Curley calls Lambeau the "smartest builder of pro football

"As far as the pros are concerned, I discovered the East-West game. There was a time when I had it all to myself. I came out here annually and built my

team. I have missed only one game since it started,' Lambeau told Grieve.

"It was back in 1925 that I signed the first of my greats—Lavvie Dilweg of Marquette. Then came a long series—players like Clarke Hinkle of Bucknell, Hank Bruder and Tiny Ingebretsen of Northwestern, Cecil Isbell Purdue. Whatever success I had at Green Bay was due almost entirely to the East-West game. I never heard of some of the players who later starred for me until I saw them in action at Kezar. The Shrine game was-and still is-an All-America showcase. I owe my reputation to it."

Hensel said that in Lambeau's first Draft—in 1936—two of his top three choices played on the West squad.

Packers Lineman Russ Letlow-No. 1 choice and seventh overall selection in the first NFL Draft-holds the distinction of being the Packers' first-ever draft pick.

Packers End Bernie Scherer was the second.

Leading up to the April 24-26 NFL Draft, the Press Times will feature a Draft history series, based on the findings of Packer Historian Cliff Christl and Packers Hall of Fame Curator Brent Hensel.


business associates navigating the grind. In a world bustling with deadlines, The reactions vary—some are puzzled
