


Stan Lee's Superhero "Aviore" Lands in Wausau for Armed Forces Day **Celebration on** May 17, 2025

The peregrine falcon nest box at Wisconsin Public Service's (WPS') Weston Power Plant is growing thanks to an egg-citing new addition. The first peregrine falcon egg of the season is now being cared for inside the facility's nest box.

Proud parents Sheldon and an unbanded female falcon welcomed their first egg of the year. This is Sheldon's 10th year nesting at the Weston Power Plant and likely the second for the unbanded female falcon.

The two peregrine parents will take turns incubating the egg over the next few weeks. If all goes well, the couple's first fluffy chick of the year should hatch in about a month. Now's a great time to view the live nest box cameras, as more eggs could arrive at the Weston Power Plant nest box this week. Peregrine falcons are also caring for six more eggs inside the nest boxes at We Energies' Oak Creek and Valley power plants. The falcons at the Port Generating Washington Station may lay their first egg in the coming days.



Layoffs hit Marshfield Clinic

Move part of 'integration' with Sanford Health

A sprawling health care system in Wisconsin is getting a bit smaller after cutting almost 100 positions.

The Marshfield Clinic region of Sanford Health announced the cuts earlier this week, saying they are part of the "integration process" after the two health systems merged. That process began in October and was completed in January.

About 96 leadership and administrative roles will be cut

throughout both organizations, Sanford said in a statement. Layoffs for people at the director-level are taking effect immediately, while the other employees have been given a 60-day notice. Their last day will be June 10. No direct patient care roles are affected.

While those roles are being cut, about 20 new positions will be added to the organization's health plan.


over the next five years, in addition to supporting the conversion of the electronic medical system to Epic," officials said.

The changes are part of the effort to create a "unified" organization, they added, focusing on creating a model that merges the strengths of Security Health Plan and Sanford Health Plan.

Employees are receiving severance pay, career transition services and other assistance, the company said.

Catholic Charities to Return to 6-Month Service Model at **Good Shepherd Shelter** in Wausau

City and County Proposal for Year-Round Shelter Exceeds Our Space Capacity

After a thorough review of the recently released Request for Proposals (RFP) from the City of Wausau and Marathon County for a year-round shelter, Catholic Charities has determined that the capacity requirements outlined in the proposal exceed what our current space can accommodate, and the cost of physical expansion and longterm sustainability is not feasible. Additionally, funding provided the shelter operation is for insufficient in both amount and duration for Catholic Charities to responsibly commit to operating under the proposed model. Beyond these logistical challenges, the programbased approach outlined in the RFP does not align with our core mission of providing low-barrier, emergency, night-by-night shelter for those in greatest need.

After two years of the operating Good Shepherd Shelter yearround, on May 1st of 2025 Catholic Charities will return to its longstanding six-month service model. This seasonal approach has long allowed us to provide critical emergency shelter to the most vulnerable individuals in Marathon County and beyond. We remain dedicated to ensuring that those in need have a safe place to turn.

"Our experience operating emergency shelters has shown that shifting to a programbased model could unintentionally exclude many vulnerable individuals from receiving the help they desperately need," said Roberto Partarrieu, Executive Director of Catholic Charities of the Diocese of La Crosse. "We





Renfro, an exercise physiologist with Aspirus Health, stresses the importance of regular movement, not just for fitness, but as a critical factor in maintaining a healthy weight and overall well-being.

"Physical activity doesn't have to mean hours at the gym," said Renfro. "Simple changes like taking the stairs, stretching during breaks, or walking while on phone calls can improve cardiovascular health and



The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends at least 150 minutes of moderateintensity exercise per week, which can be achieved through activities like brisk walking, cycling, or even dancing. Research shows that incorporating movement into daily routines not only helps prevent obesity but also reduces the risk of related conditions such as heart disease, stroke, and type 2

highlights Renfro the critical role of muscle tissue in obesity prevention and sugar metabolism, noting that strength training is just as important as cardio.

"When we talk about obesity, we often focus on weight and BMI, but muscle mass plays a huge role in how the body processes sugar," said Renfro. "The more muscle tissue a person has, the better they can handle sugar intake, which is key in preventing obesity and metabolic diseases.' Renfro also points to research from the British Medical Journal, which confirms that staying active reduces the risk of coronary heart disease. stroke, diabetes, and certain cancers, many of which are linked to obesity and sedentary lifestyles. The bidding war behind the NFL Draft

On May 19, 1935, the NFL club owners approved a plan for a college player selection process, now known as the NFL Draft.

"The players were free to sign with any team before this," said Packers Hall of Fame Curator Brent Hensel, "and then, Bert Bell, who at the time was the Eagles owner but would become the future NFL commissioner, called for teams to select players in

inverse order of how they finished from the previous season.

"The NFL owners would adopt this college draft with altruistic intentions in mind. Basically, the decision was driven by the high-price bidding war that would take place over one player, a player from Minnesota named Stan Kostka." Stanislaus "Stan" Kostka

was the son of Polish immigrants, born in St. Paul in July 1912.

six-foot-tall, "The

220-pound, blonde, fullback initially played at Oregon but transferred home to Minnesota for his sophomore year," recalled the Minnesota Golden Gophers The Daily Gopher in April 2017.

"Kostka had a monster college career. In his first game as a Gopher, Stan scored four touchdowns in the first half. Over his three seasons in... he averaged 6.8 yards per carry. After going undefeated in 1934, Kostka's junior year, the Big Ten announced that

Stan had used all of his eligibility. The eligibility committee had decided to retroactively count his year on the freshman football team at Oregon. Despite Bernie Bierman's protests in the offseason, Stan had no choice but to turn pro.

"As soon as the end of Stan's college career was announced, each NFL franchise contacted the Minnesota Golden Gophers star. All nine teams in the attempted to sign NFL Stan. Rumors spread that various teams were close to signing Kostka, but the two teams with the most resources to throw at him were the Brooklyn Dodgers football team), and (the the Philadelphia Eagles. Kostka had an interesting negotiating tactic, 'A team would send me a wire and say they'd give me \$3,500,' he recalls. 'I'd send a wire back and say Green Bay or the Chicago Bears said they'd give me \$4,000. I kept that up.'

"The Philadelphia Eagles were so angry about missing

out on Kostka that they convinced the NFL of the need for the Draft. Instead of letting players go to the highest bidder, the draft would level the playing field by granting the worst team from the previous year the first pick.'

Koskta only played one season of professional football.

He later coached several seasons with North Dakota State and served as a Navy lieutenant during World War II.






