\$1.25 million water project nears end

CANTON — The village's \$1.25 million water and sewer project which extends services to the Tallman Hill subdivision is nearing its official completion.

Village Department of Public Works Superintendent Marty Miller announced at the village board meeting on Dec. 16, that village water had been connected and was flowing to the subdivision.

"The Palmers over on Tallman did

get connected today," Miller said at the meeting. "So there's water hooked in as of today, so that's a good thing on that

Miller said that water to the Community Bank facility was expected to be connected soon after a few final work projects were completed at that building.

"That's exciting. That's been a long, long, long process and I think we really need to celebrate that," said Village Trustee Carol Pynchon.

The village plans to do some sort of offi-

cial ceremony for the project completion.

The subdivision on Maple Hill contains more than 30 residential lots, the majority of them yet to be developed and the Community Bank corporate office which employs about 70 people.

Water and sewer problems were traditionally common at the site, which sits across the river from the main village

Cottage St. takeover to be studied

POTSDAM — St. Lawrence Health System will pay for an independent engineering study of its proposal to purchase a section of Cottage Street next to the main hospital campus following concerns raised by the village.

The request for the study comes after the village received a short environmental assessment form from SLHS for the plan, which would involve the municipality decommissioning the $\,$ street section and transferring ownership to the

SLHS seeks to purchase the street section which connects Leroy and Waverly streets. The hospital plans to utilize the space for additional parking spots for in-patients and visitors, and the space may figure into future expansion plans for the facility.

SLHS plans to initially gate off access to Cottage from Leroy to cut out thru-traffic past the building, while still allowing access to a PET scan trailer there, and they plan to install a crosswalk and walkway for students passing through to Potsdam Central on Leroy Street.

Several members of the public voiced concern over the St. Lawrence Health Systems plans to purchase the Cottage Street section at a public hearing on the proposal held in October.

Village residents who attended the hearing were concerned about the impact the hospital's continued expansion is having on the neighborhood around the building. Several also voiced concern that SLHS plans to purchase the street section seemed sudden and that they were not

County to keep sales tax for towns, villages stable

CANTON — The St. Lawrence County legislature's Finance Committee tabled an agreement for sharing sales tax revenue with the City of Ogdensburg, and passed a separate resolution that ensures towns and villages will keep their current share.

The committee voted on the two measures during their Monday, Dec. 21 meet-

The proposed deal would keep the current distribution through Dec. 1, 2023.

At that time, the city's would receive the percentile share as towns and villages. The city would also have the option to pre-empt, meaning opt out of the county deal and collect their own sales tax. If they don't pre-empt, the city would continue to receive sales tax revenue from the county under the same formula as the towns and

The motion to table the new sales tax deal passed 8-7, with mixed support from both parties. Yes votes came from Republicans Joe Lightfoot, Kevin Acres and John Burke, and Democrats Dan Fay, Margaret Haggard, Suzanne Fiacco, Tony Arquiett and Nicole Terminelli. No votes came from Republicans Rita Curran, Bill Sheridan, Harry Smithers, Larry Denesha, Jim Reagen and Dave Forsythe, and Democrat Rick Perkins. The motion to preserve the share for towns and villages unanimously passed. Both bills will have to get a vote in front of the full board to become official.

Ogdensburg City Councilor Dan Skamperele spoke to the board and asked them

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SLC's top doc urges county residents to celebrate smart

CANTON — With New Year's Eve just days away, St. Lawrence County's Board of Health president says people should celebrate, but with caution and abiding by public health measures aimed at stopping the spread of COVID-19.

Dr. Andrew Williams spoke with the St. Lawrence County legislature's Finance Committee during their Monday, Dec. 21 meeting.

He showed the board a slide that said a majority of COVID-19 infections are traced back to household and social gatherings.

"I could also put a slide up about how social isolation is bad for someone's health," the doctor

"People need to do the holidays. We just need to do them safely."

He said people planning holiday gatherings should plan them taking into consideration what he has been calling "The Five Pillars of Prevention," simple steps everyone should be taking to stop the coronavirus from spreading.

Those include wearing a mask. hand washing, staying home when sick, staying local and "physical distancing, not social distancing," meaning people should stay at least six feet apart.

"We just need to remember that ... family gatherings and social gatherings really do play a significant role in fueling this pandemic," Dr. Williams said.

"People need to connect with one another. They just need to plan safely."

St. Lawrence County has seen a huge spike in COVID-19, especially since Thanksgiving.

The county's rate of new COVID cases per day is 46.4, above the seven-county North Country regional rate of 33.4 new cases per day.

"Since we're a county of just slightly over 100,000, when you compare to the region, we still are having more daily cases," Dr. Williams said.

Councilwoman resigns

CANTON – Town councilwoman Karin Blackburn resigned from the town board Monday, Dec. 21. The announcement was made in a press release from Town Supervisor Mary Ann Ashley issued Dec. 23. No formal reason was given for the resignation. Requests for comment from Blackburn were unanswered at the time of this writing. A relative newcomer to the board, Blackburn was elected to the position in the 2019 fall election. She replaced Town Councilman Phil LaMarche who had decided not to run again for the spot after two terms.

Sheriff's police reform plan accepted

CANTON — The St. Lawrence County legislature voted to accept the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office police reform plan, which they have to submit to the state by April.

They voted during a brief special meeting, following a public hearing, on Monday, Dec. 21.

Two members of the public spoke during the hearing.

Michael Owen of Colton said he feels the document should be a framework for reducing the police presence in St. Lawrence County, with the Sheriff's Office being its lead agency.

"What I'm advocating for is the Sheriff's Office to be the lead agency for all law enforcement in St. Lawrence County," he said. "We need to shrink police and law enforcement budgets ... there are just too many cops."

Pat Green of Lisbon suggested a "posse" be deputized to assist the St. Lawrence County Sheriff's Office with enforcing laws.

"Look up posse comitatus. The computers won't even tell you what it is," he said. "We need a posse. They could take care of the drug problem in Massena, in St. Lawrence County. They could be the eyes of the sheriff. They'd have the power to make testimony for warrants."

Prior to ratifying the plan, legislators briefly debated if they should vote on it at their January board meeting. That came after Legislator John Burke, R-Norfolk, said one of his constituents wanted to comment but wasn't able to at the meeting.

"We've all had ample opportunity," he said. "If any of our constituents haven't had that opportunity, I'd like

to see them have that opportunity."

"I was questioned by some people from our district saying this is right before Christmas. A lot of people aren't going to take the time to attend this public hearing," said Legislator Dan Fay, D-Canton.

"I have put out to the public on many occasions, they can call me, come see me personally. We've had many public forums where they were welcome to speak," Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe said to the legislators. "I

believe we have a great police reform package, and we've done our due diligence.'

Bigwarfe held two community forums on the reform plan during autumn.

"I think that we've done our due diligence. That's what Albany is requesting. If you look in the final whereas ... it sounds like these regional town hall meetings will continue," said Legislator Kevin Acres, R-Madrid.





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New LED lighting will save village \$15k

CANTON — The village board of trustees recently approved several proposals from National Grid to convert its various municipal lighting systems over to LED lighting which is expected to save more than \$15,000 annually for the municipality.

Systems at the municipal building, DPW building, recreation pavilion, golf course clubhouse and the wastewater treatment building were each audited by National Grid for conversion projects, said Village Mayor Mike Dalton.

"The project at each location changes existing fluorescent lighting to LED lighting. Each location has unique requirements for lighting so the proposals break down by building. The Village can pick and choose which proposal(s) to accept, however all of them will

save us money annually," Dalton told North Country This Week.

The conversion projects at each of the five facilities are largely funded by National Grid with a smaller share covered by the vil-

According to proposal documents, all five conversions will save the village a total of \$15,541.75 annually in electrical

Each project, with estimated annual savings in KWH and dollars, along with total cost, and village and National Grid shares are as follows:

• Municipal Building conversion will save 26,879.3 KWH and \$2,988.98 annually; total project cost is \$11,221.58 with the village covering \$2,351.41 of that and National Grid paying \$8,870.17.

 Village DPW barn conversion will save 5,063.59 KWH and \$563.07 annually; total project cost is \$1,605.92 with the village


paying \$80.30 of that and National Grid covering \$1,525.62.

· Canton village arena/pavilion conversion will save 70,108.62 KWH and \$7,796.08 annually; total project cost is \$21,836.16 with the village covering \$1,091.81 and National Grid contributing

• Village golf club conversion will save 19,401.31 KWH and \$2,157.43 annually; total cost is expected to be \$8,723.79, with the village paying \$2,321.36 and National Grid covering \$6,402.43.

· Village wastewater plant conversion will save 18,311.09 KWH and \$2,036.19 annually; total cost is estimated at \$6,471.34 with the village paying \$428.68 of that and National Grid covering \$6042.66.

There is no upfront cost to the village required for any of the projects. The village has the opportunity to cover its share in its monthly electric bills in install-

CANTON — The Canton Town Board was forced to cancel a Zoom meeting called for Wednesday morning, Dec. 23 to appoint a new town clerk after technical difficulties blocked some potential attendees from logging into the meeting.

Due to a pass code prompting issue, several attendees, including a town board member and the town attorney were having difficulties logging into the session.

to support the new agreement.

"We ask you for your support to keep this going. I think it's better for everybody that we all move forward," he said. "I think it's in the best interests of everybody ... that we look to each other as partners."

Legislators who voted against tabling the sales tax agreement to the January Finance Committee meeting said they think the county should help financially struggling Ogdensburg.

"They're not blowing smoke when they say they're going to be losing substantially," Forsythe said. "Do I like this resolution as presented? No, I don't." He said that's because "we don't know what the city generates" in sales tax revenue.

"I've repeatedly warned the board that the problem with this, tampering with the sales tax, divides us and pits our communities against each other. It certainly is dividing this legislature," Reagen said. "I think it's important to treat the City of Ogdensburg fairly ... rebuild its finances, grow its economy, get our waterfront properties back on the tax roles."

Lightfoot said he wasn't comfortable voting on the deal that night because he thinks the board needed "information we don't have."

"I don't see a clear formula for how this is going to be distributed, especially in light that everyone is overlooking when the city preempts ... the county loses 1.5% of whatever is collected in the City of Ogdensburg. That's not being taken into consideration," he said. "There's nothing wrong with holding off on this for two weeks, three weeks, four weeks.'

Ogdensburg and St. Lawrence County have been negotiating the sales tax distribution formula for some time. Both sides recently agreed to keep the formula as is for one year as details on how best to distribute the taxes are hammered

The sales tax charged by the county was originally intended to offset state mandated costs, specifically Medicaid. For decades, the county collected 3% on each dollar, while the state collected 4%.

In 2013, St. Lawrence County successfully convinced state lawmakers to collect an extra 1%, increasing total sales tax in the county from 7 to 8%.

St. Lawrence County shares its portion of sales tax revenues with towns and villages although no such requirement exists. The county is, however, obligated to negotiate with the City of Ogdensburg.

The state basically allows for two options. The city and county can agree to a set amount of sales tax sharing, or the city can "pre-empt" and keep the full 4% of sales tax generated within the city limits.

The current sales tax distribution method is not straightforward as the original 3% is calculated differently than the 1% added Dec. 1 2013.

Here's how it works.

Fifty percent of the first 3 cents collected per dollar goes to the county government. The remainder is split between the city of Ogdensburg, which receives 6.44 percent, and the county's 32 towns and villages, which split 43.65 percent.

On the additional 1 percent added in 2013, the county collects 83%, the city gets 6.44% and towns and villages split 10.56%.

Ogdensburg's larger share than municipalities has logic behind it — because of Ogdensburg's city status, it follows different rules. For instance, the city must make up for school taxes that come up short, and pay for maintenance of its bridges. For towns and villages, the county absorbs those costs.



It's just been reported that the entire infrastructure of our country has been hacked and you fools refuse to believe that the election could not have been?



Season opener canceled

To ensure the health and safety of St. Lawrence's players, team personnel and the entire St. Lawrence community, the team is following all county, state and University guidelines regarding COVID-19 protocols.

The Saints will look to start the season at home on New Year's Eve with an ECAC Hockey game against Quinnipiac, with the opening face-off scheduled for 4 p.m. at Appleton Arena.

While no fans will be allowed to attend St. Lawrence games at Appleton this season, all games will be live streamed on ESPN+ (US) and Stretch Internet (international feed).

Getting ready for ice fishing season

Anglers in St. Lawrence County can stay busy all winter by targeting some of their favorite fish species through the ice, said the state's Department of Environmental Conservation website.

If you've never been ice fishing before and would like to test the waters - learn how to ice fish.

While most freshwater fish can be caught through the ice, only certain species are in season through the winter. Some popular species to target through the ice in New York: Yellow Perch, Northern Pike, Walleye, Lake Trout, Brown Trout, Atlantic Salmon, Black Crappie.

Ice fishing is permitted on many waters in New York State, but not all. Review state fishing regulations for ice fishing specific rules.

Ice shanties must be marked on the outside with the owner's name and address in letters at least 3 inches high. Shanties must be removed from all waters by Mar. 15 to prevent them from falling through the ice and becoming hazards to navigation.

Baitfish are commonly used when ice fishing. Make sure your baitfish are certified disease free when you purchase them. Never dump unused baitfish or water from your bait bucket into a lake or pond. Undesirable aquatic invasive species might be mixed in with your bait or bait water.

Safe ice should be your number one consideration when ice fishing. A minimum of three to four inches of solid ice is the general rule for safety. Ice thickness, however, is not uniform on any body of water. The guidelines presented here are based on new, clear ice on non-running waters. Since ice thickness can vary on a lake, check the ice periodically to stay safe.

Ice thickness guidelines:

- 2 inches or less, Stay Off
- 4 inches, Ice fishing or other activities on foot
- 5 inches, Snowmobile or ATV
- 8-12 inches, Car or small pickup • 12-15 inches, Medium truck
- This guide is based on new, clear ice on non-running waters. Slush ice is about 50 percent weaker. Clear ice over running water is about 20 percent weaker. Double the recommendations for white ice. Many ice anglers do not like to fish on less than five inches of ice, and do not like to drive a pick-up truck on less than 15 inches of ice.

Be cautious in areas where "bubblers" are used to protect docks. They can produce thin, unsafe ice some distance away. Be especially alert in areas near shore, over moving bodies of water, and where streams enter and exit lakes and ponds.

Remember, use the buddy system while ice fishing, the DEC said.



SLHS named access point for **COVID** vaccine

POTSDAM – Upon receiving the initial shipment of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines last week. St. Lawrence Health System (SLHS) was designated by New York State as an access distribution point for other healthcare institutions.

Along with providing the vaccine to some of its own essential healthcare workers from Canton-Potsdam, Gouverneur, and Massena hospitals, SLHS has been deemed the point institution to assist five other hospitals in St. Lawrence, Jefferson, and Franklin counties. Some Phase I-level healthcare employees from the neighboring hospitals have already started coming to Canton-Potsdam Hospital to receive the vaccine.

The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine must be given in a two-dose series, with 21 days between doses. The Food and Drug Administration announced this week that they also support the Moderna vaccine being used for emergency use. If the drug is granted emergency use authorization within the next couple of days, local hospitals are hopeful to have it in-hand next week. The Moderna vaccine is also given in two doses, but at a 28 day interval.

SLHS will administer the vaccines

in accordance with New York State's Administration Program, which is divided into five phases.

"Individuals who may have questions about which phase they are included in should contact their primary care provider, said SLHS Chief Administrative Officer Jeremy Slaga.'

New York State's proposed distribution plan is:

- Phase 1: Healthcare workers in hospital settings, with priority given to those in intensive care units, emergency units, and those providing medical services in high-risk COVID-19 settings; long-term care facility workers who interact with residents; and at-risk, long-term care facility patients.
- · Phase 2: First responders; teachers/school staff, childcare providers; public health workers; other essential frontline workers who regularly interact with public (pharmacists, grocery store workers, transit employees, etc.), or maintain critical infrastructure; other long-term care facility patients and those living in other congregate settings; and individuals in the general population deemed particularly high risk due to comorbidities and health conditions.

• Phase 3: Individuals over 65. and individuals under 65 with high-

- Phase 4: All other essential workers.
- Phase 5: Healthy adults and children (general population).

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

Tips for safe snowmobiling

During the COVID-19 pandemic, snowmobile safety courses continue to be offered, said a press release from the state Parks and Recreation Department. Successful completion of this course, results in the issuance of a NYS Snowmobile Safety Certificate.

This certificate is required for youth between ages 10 and 18 to operate a snowmobile, but all riders can benefit from taking a course that provides fundamental information which all should possess to ensure the safety of both rider and other trail users.

State Park Police, State Troopers, **Environmental Conservation Police** Officers, Forest Rangers and local enforcement agencies enforce State Laws on snowmobile trails, including instances of unsafe or reckless operation, speed limits including the state's maximum speed of 55 MPH, and operating while intoxicated.

Those rules apply on all local and club trails, as well as the 10,500mile Statewide Trail System, which traverses 45 counties and includes lands under the jurisdiction of state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, the state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), New York State Canal Corporation, local governments, and many private landowners.

The New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) reminds New Yorkers to register their snowmobiles. Registrations must be renewed annually and may be

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renewed on the DMV website.

Snowmobile safety courses remain available, with limited class size under state Health Department safety guidance. A listing of available classes can be found online at https://parks.ny.gov/recreation/ snowmobiles/safety-courses.aspx.

Recommendations for safe riding include:

Prior to starting your ride, check over the snowmobile to make sure it is in good working order and carry emergency supplies.

Always wear a DOT- or SNELL-approved helmet and make sure to wear the proper snowmobile gear including bibs, jackets, boots, and gloves.

Always ride with a buddy or at least one other person.

Ride responsibly.

Always ride to the right side especially at hills and curves.

Operate at a speed which is safe and prudent for the given conditions.

Respect landowners, obey posted signs, and stay on the marked trail.

Frozen bodies of water are not designated trails. If planning to ride on ice, proceed with caution and be aware of potential hazards under the snow. Consider wearing a snowmobile suit with flotation built-in and carry a set of ice picks as a precaution.

Never drink alcohol or use drugs and ride.
