L.C. Drives and Koch deny liability

POTSDAM - LC Drives is shuttering and leaving its workforce limbo as to who will make good on outstanding paid time off estimated to be between \$700,000 and \$1 million.

The memo, anonymously supplied to North Country This Week from multiple LC Drives employees, was written by company CEO Russell Marvin and states that an investor the company was courting had pulled out of negotiations.

Employees said that aside from the company dissolving, questions about how paid time off they estimated between \$700,000 and \$1 million would be paid out was a big concern. In the memo, Marvin writes that ownership of LC Drives would revert to Koch Engineering Solutions and that employees should contact that company for answers about outstanding PTO.

However a Koch spokesperson called Marvin's description of the company taking over L.C. Drives a mischaracterization.

"Koch Industries is not now, and has never been in control of LC Drives Corp. Koch Engineered Solutions, LLC ("Koch"), a subsidiary of Koch Industries, Inc., is a passive minority investor in LC Drives and is also a creditor of the company," Rob Carlton, director of Communications & Marketing, Koch Communications Marketing, told North Country This Week in an email.

"Koch is not entitled to, nor does it plan to, take control of LC Drives. Accordingly, Koch is

Child died under DSS oversight, ruled homicide

St. Lawrence County District Attorney Gary Pasqua has confirmed an investigation is underway regarding the 2020 death of a 10-year-old Massena child who appears to have died from gross neglect.

The death occurred while the St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services had an open investigation regarding educational neglect. Since 2010, St. Lawrence County DSS had investigated 22 claims regarding the family that involved the deceased child and her seven siblings.

Ten of those cases were substantiated but most of those were confirmed following the deceased child's autopsy.

Among the verified allegations were lack of medical care, inadequate guardianship and educational neglect.

According to a report from the Office of Children and Family Services, the child died of malnutrition and dehydration. Additionally, the report referred to the death as a homicide. However, that was

gated, but said he couldn't share specifics.

"We are aware of that death. That death is under investigation," he said. "Due to the nature of it and the work that we do I'm not going to comment on the details."

When asked if the investigation included the St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services, Pasqua said that when making a determination in a case like this the goal is to figure out who is responsible for the death of the individual and decide if it rises to a criminal level.

"In any investigation we look at everyone and everything involved in it," he said. Although nearly a year has

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County calls on state to help landlords burdened by eviction moratorium

St. Lawrence County Legislators called on state officials to provide relief to landlords who have been shouldering costs of unpaid rent throughout the pandemic.

St. Lawrence County Legislator James E. Reagen. R-Ogdensburg, said that a state moratorium on evictions has left the landlords holding the bag and that it's time for the state to fix the problem it created.

"There are literally thousands of rental units in St. Lawrence County who's owners have not received any rent for going on over a year. There are utility companies that are not being paid. There are families that are facing evictions," Reagen said. "It is imperative that the state of New York, which created this problem; address this problem by releasing the funds that have been provided to address

this problem that the government created."

Reagen said at his last check, that only three landlords have received money although hundreds have applied.

The process the state is using to dole out federal funds to address the issue requires joint filing by landlords and tenants and has been largely unsuccessful.

Reagen said that landlords are still being saddled with taxes despite the fact they aren't receiving payments.

"It's a matter of simple fairness and simple equity," he said. "They still have to pay taxes, they've been picking up the tab."

John Burke, R-Norfolk, asked to be added as a co-sponsor and thanked Reagen for bringing the issue forward.

Margaret Haggard, D-Potsdam, agreed.

St. Lawrence County legislators passed a resolution opposing government-issued COVID-19 mandates in a 12-3 vote Sept. 20 at the Services Committee meeting.

The resolution was put forward by Operations Committee Chair Rita Curran

Legislators Margaret Haggard, Nichole Terminelli and John Burke opposed the measure.

Prior to voting on the legislation, testimonials came from St. Lawrence Health Systems Cancer Center Director Ben Hull, who spoke as a private citizen, and Ogdensburg Volunteer Rescue Squad Chief Ken Gardner.

Hull recently gave his resignation following New York State's mandate to require vaccinations for healthcare workers. His biggest concern over the mandate was that it also removed religious exemptions.

Hull said that there were five reasons he believed the vaccine should not be mandated. First, he said personal protective equipment works and so does the vaccine. He said vaccines are freely available to "all who desire them." It should be noted that no vaccines are available for children under age 12.

He said COVID-19 can be effectively treated, however he did not elaborate on what treatments existed. He said the government institutions have squandered the public's trust. He said the latest move by Gov. Kathy Hochul to override religious exemption

risks associated with COVID-19.

Curran said she fears the mandates being pushed by the state and federal governments will push more people out of the healthcare field at a time when workers are already in short supply.

She pointed to slides that showed incentives being offered in nearby states, where vaccines are not mandatory for health care employees.

While nearly all of the legislators who spoke said they encouraged constituents to get vaccinated, the majority also said they did not believe such a thing should be mandated by the government.

Some said they were alright with mandates issued by employers.

Most adamantly opposed to the resolution however were legislators Haggard, Burke and Terminelli.

Haggard said that she is hearing hospitals filling up with unvaccinated COVID-19 patients, not people who are having side effects from the vaccine.

Burke said he would support a resolution opposing mandates for volunteer EMS workers, but could not support a resolution as broad as the one presented by Curran.

The resolution did not consist of any action beyond support for those opposing government mandates of the vaccine.

Finance Committee Chairman

Reagen said he also believed that was the case.

Reagen has raised concerns about the issue in the past. He urged the county to work with landlords and tenants to help with the state's current relief program, and while the county did push the program it seems to have been largely unsuccessful.



"There is no vaccine for a heart attack," he said.

Gardner told the legislators that if the vaccine mandate were expanded to include emergency medical services it would "collapse" the Ogdensburg Volunteer Rescue Squad as well as other EMS providers that rely on volunteers.

He said he has staff, both paid and unpaid, who are not willing to get the shot.

Gardner, who is vaccinated, says it's easy to find support for vaccines or evidence disputing their safety and says it will likely be five or more years before anyone knows the true impact. However, the vaccines have received approval from the Federal Drug Administration (FDA) and the vast majority of doctors agree that the vaccines are far safer than the potential

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County lawmakers support 'concealed carry' court case

CANTON -- The county legislature voted in favor of a resolution to join an amicus brief filed by the state of Arizona on behalf of 26 states in New York State Rifle and Pistol Association Inc. v. Bruen.

The vote, which passed with 12 in favor and two against, means that St. Lawrence County will join the amicus brief that will be included in legal arguments before the U.S. Supreme Court on Nov. 3.

John Burke (R) and Margaret Haggard (D) both voted against the resolution.

The case is an attempt to define proper cause in the issuance of concealed carry licenses in 26 states that are considered "may issue" states.

May issue states require an applicant to demonstrate a real and tangible need to possess and carry a handgun. An application is approved or denied by a governing body in these states and the individual counties within. In St. Lawrence County, conceal

county attorney Stephen Button, legislators were given an opportunity to ask questions and express their concerns.

Burke voiced concern that the resolution and subsequent case would allow individuals to possess handguns without passing a background check. "I didn't see the remedy being sought. It's obvious the current law needs some work. I think it needs to be fixed. I think the right to bear arms should be available to all people. There shouldn't be exorbitant fees to carry. On the other hand it's nice to know that there will be background checks to ensure that those who shouldn't have weapons, can't," Burke said.

"We don't know what the end result will be, that's my concern. I'm hesitant to side with a political entity not knowing what it is, what they're really asking for and what might come down the pike. I guess my initial read is to not support something I'm wary of," Burke said.

Legislator Joseph Lightfoot responded, stating that background checks would still be required to possess a concealed carry license.

Lightfoot stated that during the course of a background check many things can come up that could prohibit the issuance of a license.

He stated he could not recall a judge ever going against his recommendation to approve or disapprove of an application during his time of conducting said background checks.

Arguments in NYSRPA v. Bruen will be heard before the Supreme Court on Nov. 3, with a ruling expected to be announced by Nov. 7.

Man accused of being combative with police, hospital personnel

RUSSELL — A Hermon man who was charged with driving while intoxicated allegedly became combative with state police and medical personnel following an incident Sept. 24.

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
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U.S. District Judge drops Potsdam police chief from Hillary lawsuit

POTSDAM — A U.S. District Judge in Albany has ruled that Potsdam Police Chief Mark Murray be dropped from a lawsuit from Oral "Nick" Hillary who was acquitted of the 2011 murder of 12-year-old Garrett Phillips. Hillary's lawsuit, leveled after the acquittal, claims racial bias in the naming him as a suspect in the murder and that the bias had led to the subsequent trial. Murray was named as a defendant in the suit along with the Village of Potsdam, Village of Potsdam Police Department and others.

Murray, a lieutenant at the time of

the murder, led the investigation into the case.

The 12-year-old boy was murdered in his Potsdam apartment on Oct. 24, 2011. Oral "Nick" Hillary, a former Clarkson soccer coach, was later arrested and charged with the murder. He was acquitted after a three-week bench trial in the fall of 2016. U.S. District Judge Gary L. Sharpe ruled on Sept. 24 in Albany that Murray be dropped from the lawsuit.

"Hillary's burden requires him to offer admissible evidence that demonstrates that

Murray's conduct in connection with the investigation and prosecution was motivated by Hillary's race. Racism in the air, or a lack of diversity in theVillage of Potsdam or its police department — which is the sum total of Hillary's attempt to show a triable issue of fact — is insufficient," Sharpe wrote in the decision.

"Accordingly, Murray's motion for summary judgment is granted, and all remaining claims against him are dismissed," Sharpe said.

DEC releases SLC foothill management plan

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) announced the finalization of the St. Lawrence Foothills Unit Management Plan (UMP).

The St. Lawrence Foothills Unit is located outside of the Adirondack Park in the central portion of St. Lawrence County, including the towns of Colton, Hopkinton, Parishville, Potsdam, Pierrepont, and Russell.

The unit includes 13 state forests containing more than 16,000 acres, including Catherineville, Crary Mills, Degrasse, Downerville, Glenmeal, High Flats, Orebed Creek, Silver Hill, Snow Bowl, Taylor Creek, West Parishville, Whippoorwill Corners, and Whiskey Flats.

State forests in this unit are managed for water quality protection, recreation, wildlife habitat, and timber, DEC officials said.

Officials said the UMP will help provide healthy, sustainable, and biologically diverse ecosystems by using the principles of ecosystem management. In addition, the St. Lawrence Foothills UMP will provide forest-based recreational opportunities, economic benefits for local communities, and sound stewardship of State Forests by protecting cultural and natural resources.

The UMP schedules nearly 5,000 acres of forest product sales, which are used to help accomplish ecosystem management goals, over the next 10 years, DEC officials said. The UMP proposes enhancements to recreational opportunities in the St. Lawrence Foothills unit by improving existing facilities and creating new opportunities.

The UMP proposes a new foot bridge across the Grass River in Downerville State Forest to expand recreational opportunities, installation of new parking areas, informational kiosks, recreational trails, and lean-tos. The UMP also includes plans for upgrading canoe launches, campsites, and access roads.

Many people will recall Obie blowing a whistle and yelling calls as a referee across the Northern Athletic conference.

Ronald O'Brien

Obie was the Official Scorer during the United States hockey team's "miracle on ice" win, 1980 Winter Olympics, Lake Placid. However, most people will

remember Obie as the magician.

Most notably, in 1971 Obie along with his mentor Eddie Fechter, created and launched what is now known as the "original close-up magic convention", Obie's Fechter Finger Flicking Frolic.

CANTON -- The St. Lawrence County Farm Bureau recently donated the first of a series of agricultural children's books to the Canton Free Library.

The books donated were former Agricultural Literacy Week books. Agricultural Literacy Week is a program through New York State Agriculture in the Classroom at Cornell University. Each year volunteers across New York State to read agriculturally themed books to second grade classrooms.

The app is a smaller version of the BFCSD website and contains the information that is updated most frequently, Halley said.

"The district decided to create the app in order to communicate information more quickly and efficiently with parents, students, community members, and staff. The district wanted a way for all stakeholders to easily be able to have all of the

Apptegy, an education technology company, worked with district staff to help develop the app that would fit the needs of the smaller district.

SLC doc provides COVID update

St. Lawrence County saw more new cases of COVID-19 per day per 100,000 residents than any other county in New York last week, Dr. Andrew Williams said.

"Our local hospitals are under strain every day to care for the increasing number of patients, many of whom are critically ill," Williams said.

The average length of hospitalizations for COVID-19 patients is three times longer than the average hospital stay for non-COVID illnesses, Williams said.

Only 53.2% of eligible individuals are fully vaccinated in the county, similar to what surrounding counties are experiencing as well.

Eight zip codes in the county have a vaccination rate of 26-39%, Williams said.

Despite the rise of the Delta variant, vaccines continue to prevent infection, hospitalization and death, Williams said.


Vaccine Efficacy

"The published efficacy data-5 times less likely to be infected, 10 times less likely to be hospitalized and 10 times less likely to die remains accurate," Williams said.

Boosters are now being offered for eligible individuals, including those over 65, individuals with underlying health conditions and the immunocompromised.

Though vaccinations can prevent infection, breakthrough infections have become a reality with the Delta variant.

"Breakthrough infections are a reality – most are mild, but some patients who are fully vaccinated are hospitalized, and some even die. We



Hospitalizations

The vast majority of hospitalizations are among the unvaccinated, according to Williams.

Of the 119 deaths in the county thus far, over 90% have been unvaccinated, with the vast majority of those hospitalized being unvaccinated as well, Williams said.

One trend that has developed in recent months is the infection rate among younger individuals, with those 18 and younger making up at least 1/3 of all cases.

Schools

In person education started three weeks ago and already the county has reported more than 350 cases among students, according to Williams.

One bright spot is that only six children have been hospitalized in the past two months, he said.

The same cannot be said for those in their 30's, 40's and 50's though.

A significant trend in hospitalizations among these age groups has presented itself in recent months, according to Williams.


Crowdsourcing vs. Peer Reviewed

Another key component of the low vaccination numbers is the influence from social media sources.

Despite the efforts of Facebook and Instagram to remove misleading and inaccurate information, false information still exists on the social media platforms, Williams said.

"Unfortunately, much of the easily accessed information on social media is not accurate – either due to intentional misrepresentation or a failure to understand the complex reports that are associated with monitoring systems designed to assess vaccine safety and efficacy. A recent study suggests that 65% of misinformation on social media platforms is generated by 12 individuals referred to as the "dis-information dozen" (many have no background in medicine)," Williams said.

"Our hospitals cannot sustain the ongoing demands, our children need to stay safe and stay in school, universities must thrive, religious communities need to stay engaged and our restaurants and businesses need to stay open," he said.

passed without charges being issued, Pasqua said it's not necessarily uncommon.

"Every investigation takes the course and time that it does based on the complexity of the situation and evidence," he said, adding that there is no set time at which an investigation should be completed.

"The most important thing is to make sure we are going to have the right person if and when we make an arrest," he said.

State report

North Country This Week was pointed to a fatality report issued by the Office of Children and Family Services by an organization called **Community Helping Individuals** Living in Distress, which is headed by Courtney Fantone. The organization has been working with Plattsburgh attorney Michael J. Phillips on a host of allegations made against St. Lawrence County DSS over the past year.

The publicly-available report was issued by the state because the child died with an open investigation underway by St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services. Fantone says she believes the child's death could have been prevented had caseworkers more thoroughly investigated complaints against the mother.

DSS reported that their investigation, which began Dec. 1, included a safety assessment via a home visit to investigate an educational neglect complaint, but the case worker did not enter the house.

"Due to a possible COVID-19 exposure and pending test result, the children were observed from the door and no concerns were noted for them. From the door, the home was observed to be cluttered; however, free of health and safety concerns."

A follow up visit was conducted virtually by DSS prior to the death of the child in which no concerns for the children were noted.

"No additional collateral contacts or in-person interviews were conducted by SCDSS (St. Lawrence County DSS) to assess the overall safety of the children or condition of the home prior to the SC's (subject child) death. The investigation had focused solely on the existing allegations of Educational Neglect for the siblings and no other health or safety factors were assessed," the report said of the DSS investigation.

The child died on Dec. 26, less than a month after DSS opened the investigation.

DSS also investigated the death and initially said there were no concerns of abuse or maltreatment as the cause of death of the child, and it was believed her "multiple disabilities including cerebral palsy with limited mobility, might have

ods of time resulting in ulcers and severe damage to her anal membrane.

The report says the responders who answered the 911 phone call found a disturbing sight upon entering the home.

"EMS reported the home had a foul odor and there was dog feces on the floors. The couch where the SC (subject child) was asleep was saturated in feces and bodily fluids."

They also reported that the G-tube was unkempt and that the child had sores on her body. The report showed that 22 com-

plaints had been filed since 2010 and 10 had been substantiated.

In fact, the children had been placed in child care for approximately two months in 2010 but were returned to the care of their parents. In 2015 the children were again placed in care. Some of the deceased child's siblings were returned to the mother's care. Some, including the deceased child, remained in foster care until March of 2018 when she was returned to her mother.

The deceased child had remained in care longer due to the mother's inability to care for the child due to her multiple medical needs, the report said.

"While the children were in foster care the family participated in prevention services which included court ordered services, community based waiver services, and mental health services. The family completed the service and had the children returned to their care."

Others had raised concerns about the child's care over the years.

"The biological father of the child was interviewed and noted several concerns for the child in the care of the mother and said that he had expressed them to DSS previously," the report said.

The father, however, was not found to be an adequate placement due to housing concerns.

The child who perished had seven siblings who were also in care of the mother. Following the report from the medical examiner, DSS put those children in foster care where they have remained "through the investigative period."

It is not clear where the children currently reside. However, due to state regulations regarding the number of children allowed under the care of one household, they have likely been split up.

CHILD speaks out

Courtney Fanton, speaking on behalf of CHILD, said that she is frustrated that no action is being taken against bad actors within the St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services and its agents despite disturbing facts coming to light.

She said CHILD has been work-

we don't change this mindset that these issues are not significant because they are not happening to us, then these issues are only going to get worse. Children are literally dving in this county. The better question is, why aren't more people making a commotion?"

Fantone said this discovery raises a lot of questions about the practices of St. Lawrence County DSS.

"This latest incident certainly calls into question why SLCDSS is not being transparent on this issue. St. Lawrence County residents should seriously be questioning why it is taking private citizens to bring these significant issues to light. CHILD would like to thank the Law Office of Michael Phillips Esq., Renee Drollette, and every community member who came forward with their individual piece of this puzzle making it possible to give a voice to the voiceless."

The report states it was forwarded to the social services district, chief county executive officer and chairperson of the local legislative body of the county where the child died.

not responsible for obligations that LC Drives may have with respect to its current and former employees. Mr. Marvin, quoted in the article through his memo, does not speak for or represent Koch in any capacity," Carlton said.

"It is our understanding that LC Drives is headed toward an orderly wind down and potential bankruptcy. Koch is supportive of this decision and may take certain steps to protect collateral that secures the credit extended to the Company in the past," Carlton told North Country This Week.

Marvin's memo to the employees announcing the company's dissolution reads:

"Unfortunately, I write to you with a heavy heart. The investor that was formulating an offer on Friday has chosen not to invest due to internal reasons; something entirely out of our control and ability to affect," Marvin writes in the memo. "At this point I do not believe that there will be an investor that will bring LC Drives back - at least not one that will allow it to be the current size and scale."

"We did great things at LC Drives and have a near commercial ready product that would revolutionize the large electric motor business. I am as perplexed as you are as to why decisions were made that put us in this situation. I am sorry," Marvin wrote. "I will continue to work to find options for a path to bring a subset of employees back, but everybody should be actively pursuing other options. Feel free to remove your personal items and leave any LC Drives property/keys on your desk/workspace."

Marvin's memo to the employees goes on to state:

'With respect to your 401k – all of your money is safe and all of the company match is vested. I will be forwarding information from our provider shortly that will provide you your options for what to do with your money.

"More than 100 of us are out there in a similar position on the job search front. As a group, let's continue to network with each other to ensure that every member of the team lands in a good place. Our teamwork is how we got as far as we did in such a short period of time. Let's make one final push together. Joe has attached a note where he is willing to help. Clarkson has also offered to help.

"I don't expect to continue sending out updates unless something changes. Good luck to all and feel free to reach out if you have any issues/questions."

Requests for direct comment from Marvin by both email and phone were not answered at the time of this writing.

LC Drives, which operates from the Shipley Center for Innovation, a business incubator run by Clarkson University in downtown Potsdam, and a location in Ballston Spa, had furloughed its employees on Aug. 30 stating that the lay off would give the company time to secure financing for its series B funding round. The international corporation Koch Engineering Solutions funded the company initially at \$15 million in 2019 for its series A round. LC Drives did employ about 100 people between its Potsdam and Ballston Spa locations.

nothing can be accomplished. They are the Town of Canton's best assets," Santamoor remarked. "I will work to open up lines of communication with staff of the town. I never condone micro managing staff. It never works and there is no place for it here or anywhere. We must trust our staff and show them that trust."

He said the town board needs to look at common sense laws and that any changes to local law should be vetted by the citizens of the town before laws are enacted.

"I will push to advocate for this," he stated.

Santamoor also pointed to shared services.

"The board needs to look at shared services much more in depth, I will push to work with village, county and state organizations to determine what works best for all groups," he noted. "I am vested totally to our citizens. I full understand the needs of our community."

If elected, what challenges would Santamoor face? "Developing new revenue

streams other than raising taxes. Creating a business friendly atmosphere to veteran businesses and new business, and developing ways to keep our young people from moving away and staying away. What can we do to encourage our young people to return after college? We need good paying jobs which cur-

contributed to her death." The child was also non-verbal and required feedings through a G-tube throughout the day and overnight.

But the reporting done by DSS seems to be in stark contrast with what was reported by the medical examiner, law enforcement and emergency medical service employees who entered the home at the time of the child's death.

The OCFS document revealed disturbing details and a history of complaints stemming from the household where the child died.

The final autopsy report identified the cause of death as malnutrition from neglect and the manner of death was ruled a homicide. The child, the report said, "had been in the sole care and custody of the mother at the time of her death due to malnutrition.'

The report alleged that the child was extremely dehydrated at the time of her death and had been left in dirty diapers for extended peri-

ing to piece together the 'breadcrumbs' that numerous individuals have brought to their attention regarding this case. Fantone said she's concerned the death of this child has been kept from the public, despite the fact that St. Lawrence County DSS, the medical examiner and OFCS refer to it as a homicide.

Fantone says she believes the death was preventable.

"In our opinion, the death of this child was entirely preventable, considering that SLCDSS was called 22 times over the span of 10 years, and was investigating and actively involved with this family at the time of the child's death," she said.

"Although some of the SLC legislators have been very receptive to our concerns, I can say that it saddens me when I pick up the paper and read comments from Chairman Sheridan referring to our work at CHILD as 'commotion.' We are advocating for issues that affect the lives and well-being of children. If

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

"Data released Friday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) showed that between Dec. 14, 2020 and Aug. 27, 2021, a total of 650,077 total adverse events were reported to VAERS, including 13,911 deaths — an increase of 284 over the number of deaths reported the previous week.

There were 85,971 reports of serious injuries, including deaths, during the same time period – up 1,505 compared with the previous week...

This week's U.S. data for 12- to 17-year-olds show: 18,523 total adverse events, including 1,091 rated as serious and 18 reported deaths. Two of the 18 deaths were suicides.

The most recent reported deaths include a 15-year-old boy (VAERS I.D. 1498080) who previously had COVID, was diagnosed with cardiomyopathy in May 2021 and died four days after receiving his second dose of Pfizer's vaccine on June 18, when he collapsed on the soccer field and went into ventricular tachycardia; and a 13-year-old girl (VAERS I.D. 1505250) who died after suffering a heart condition after receiving her first dose of Pfizer.

Other deaths include two 13-year-old boys (VAERS I.D. 1406840 and 1431289) who died two days after receiving a Pfizer vaccine, a 13-year-old boy who died after receiving Moderna (VAERS I.D. 1463061), three 15-year-olds (VAERS I.D. 1187918, 1382906 and 1242573), five 16-year-olds (VAERS I.D. 1420630, 1466009, 1225942, 1475434, and 1386841) and three 17-year-olds (VAERS I.D. 1199455, 1388042 and 1420762).

2,715 reports of anaphylaxis among 12- to 17-year-olds with 99% of cases attributed to Pfizer's vaccine.

457 reports of myocarditis and pericarditis (heart inflammation) with 450 cases attributed to Pfizer's vaccine.

97 reports of blood clotting disorders, with all cases attributed to

Pfizer.

This week's total U.S. VAERS data, from Dec. 14, 2020 to Aug. 27, 2021, for all age groups combined, show:

20% of deaths were related to cardiac disorders.

54% of those who died were male, 43% were female and the remaining death reports did not include gender of the deceased.

Average age of death was 73.1. As of Aug. 27, 3,389 pregnant women reported adverse events related to COVID vaccines, including 1008 reports of miscarriage or premature birth.

Of the 2,689 cases of Bell's Palsy reported, 50% were attributed to Pfizer vaccinations, 43% to Moderna and 7% to J&J.

545 reports of Guillain-Barré Syndrome, with 39% of cases attributed to Pfizer, 34% to Moderna and 26% to J&J.

139,180 reports of anaphylaxis with 42% of cases attributed to Pfizer's vaccine, 51% to Moderna and 7% to J&J.

8,751 reports of blood clotting disorders. Of those, 3,721 reports were attributed to Pfizer, 3,188 reports to Moderna and 1,794 reports to J&J.

2,242 cases of myocarditis and pericarditis with 1,411 cases attributed to Pfizer, 741 cases to Moderna and 83 cases to J&J's COVID vaccine.

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





Casandra Jock, math teacher at PHCS, helped start up the district's current robotics program. She ran the robotics program at Gouverneur Central when she taught there a few years ago.


She said she was surprised when she learned PHCS did not have a current program and wanted to share her knowledge with students.

This year, due to COVID, Clarkson hosted a remote regional FLL Challenge Championship tournament and a remote FLL Explore Expo. The theme this past year was "Game Changers" powered by Star Wars: Force for Change, where teams explored what it means to revolutionize the way we play and move.

Jock said there were not as many teams this year and there was no national competition. So the regional win moved the team on to compete as one of only 200 teams from across the world in the first-ever First Lego League Virtual Open International event hosted by Greece.

"I was thinking, we can't not do this," Jock said.

The international tournament

took place during Regents week, which ate into practice time.

Although PHCS did not place, it was "truy a good experience." Speaking about her students, she said "they did a great job and worked hard."

The hard work will continue through First Tech Challenge, which is a robotics program for eighth through twelfth grade students.

This is the first year the program will be offered to students in the upper grades.

Jock is hoping to blend the programs a bit to allow for mentoring.

Robot kits shift away from plastic Lego to metal robots that include aluminum beams, screws, tires and motors of various sizes.

"I've been promoting it to high school classes ... it's something they haven't seen before," she said.

Although teams are provided initial kits, they must replace parts that need to be replaced due to wear and tear.

Thanks to a \$1,000 donation from Arconic earlier this month, the district will have some funds on hand to keep the program going.

Jock said it's an "exciting" time for robotics programs in the district.

TikTok challenges hit SLC schools

The St. Lawrence County Youth Bureau and St. Lawrence County Suicide Awareness Coalition have partnered together to offer this event. According to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, there are five steps that you can take to help a person experiencing emotional pain and promotes #BeThe1To help:

1. Ask. Research shows people, who are having thoughts of suicide, feel relief when someone asks after them in a caring way. Talking about suicide may reduce rather than increase suicidal ideation.

2. Be there. Individuals are more likely to feel less depressed, less suicidal, less overwhelmed, and more hopeful after speaking to someone who listens without judgment.

3. Keep them safe A number of studies have indicated that when lethal means are made less available, suicide rates (by that method) decline and, frequently, suicide rates overall decline.

4. Help them stay connected. Studies indicate that helping someone at risk creates a network of resources (and individuals) for support and can help individuals take positive action and reduce feelings of hopelessness.


5. Follow up. Studies have also shown that brief, low cost intervention and ongoing contact may be an important part of suicide prevention, especially for individuals after they have been discharged from care services.

Volunteers needed to help seniors remain their homes

Volunteers are being sought for a new service expected to soon help senior citizens remain in their own homes and retain their independence in St. Lawrence County.

20

Community Health Center of the North Country plans to begin offering home visits, meal preparation assistance, phone conversations and help with transportation to medical appointments through the "Community Friendship Volunteer Program."

The service will also help older residents with prescription pick-up, recreational activities, housework and grocery shopping, and access

to cultural activities, crafts or gardening.

"Fewer family caregivers will be available than in the past as younger generations continue to move away for education and better job prospects, leaving their parents behind," said Ray Babowicz, director of communications and marketing.

"Combine this with the ongoing shortage of home healthcare workers, and it is easy to see why the reliance on volunteer programs is growing exponentially."

Goal of the friendship volunteer program is to help seniors remain

out of long-term care facilities unless that level of care is required, he said.

The program is scheduled to begin later this year in St. Lawrence County but CHCNC has operated the program in northern Franklin County for eight years where it currently serves about 90 clients with around 45 volunteers.

"We provide comprehensive and compassionate support to vulnerable older residents and their families, free of charge," said Donna Elliott, St. Lawrence County program coordinator.

"Due to income restrictions,

many seniors 'fall through the cracks' of traditional programs. This is not only the right thing to do, but it saves the healthcare system millions of dollars that can be reinvested in other ways."

A second round of orientation sessions will be held Nov. 3 and 4 via Zoom.

Babowicz said constraints of living in the North Country, such as

long distances from services, cold and severe winters, and lack of adequate home and community based services are amplified "as the aging population grows and government resources diminish."

The Northern New York Community Foundation, Adirondack Foundation, Sweetgrass Foundation, and the state Office for The Aging are providing funding for the program.

Volunteers "are the heart of the program" and all ages are encouraged to participate, he said.

What are the benefits of pelvic floor exercises?

Exercise can encompass anything from jogging on a treadmill to lifting weights to engaging in group cardio classes at a gym. A growing number of women are including pelvic floor exercises in their fitness routines.

A strong pelvic floor is essential for various reasons. According to Maddie Gentile, a certified personal trainer in New York, most women do not consider their pelvic floors until the muscles in this area become weakened.

According to the online health and wellness resource Healthline, the pelvic floor muscles support

the bladder, bowel and uterus. They also play an important role in sexual function, increasing the ability to feel pleasurable sensations. During pregnancy, pelvic floor muscles support the baby and contribute to the birthing process.

Various conditions can develop when pelvic floor muscles weaken. Weakened muscles may contribute to urinary incontinence or the more mild stress incontinence. which involves leaking urine after laughing, sneezing or coughing, indicates the Mayo Clinic. Weak pelvic muscles also may cause fecal incontinence.

The pelvic muscles are instrumental in keeping the body upright and supported. Heather Jeffcoat, DPT, founder of Feminia Physical Therapy, says "the pelvic floor works in tandem with the deep abdominal muscles, acting as an internal corset." Weak muscles may lead to back pain or even uncomfortable sex in addition to incontinence. Furthermore, weakened pelvic floor muscles can contribute to pelvic organ prolapse. According to Harvard Health, during prolapse the uterus, bladder or rectum drops or presses

into or out of the vagina.

after pregnancy and childbirth. Factors like age, heavy lifting, chronic coughing, and obesity also are factors, states Healthline.

By working pelvic floor muscles

To find the pelvic floor muscles, the right muscles. According to the

Mayo Clinic, to do Kegels, imagine you are sitting on a marble and tighten your pelvic muscles as if you're lifting the marble. Try it for three seconds at a time, then relax for a count of three. Be careful not to flex the muscles in the abdomen at the same time. Aim for at least three sets of 10 to 15 repetitions per day.

In addition to Kegels, squats, lifting the torso into a "bridge" while lying on the floor, or doing a "bird dog" by extending the opposite arm and leg out while supporting the body on the other knee and arm (like a modified plank) can help.



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Awarded science foundation grant

POTSDAM - Clarkson University Associate Professor and Psychology Department Chair Andreas Wilke has been awarded a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to study statistical thinking in children. The NSF grant will support the faculty member's investigation of the cognitive mechanisms underlying children's perception of randomness, and their susceptibility to erroneous judgments.

"We developed three novel statistical decision-making paradigms-based on our work with adults-that will assess how 3- to 10-year-old children decide whether sequential events will continue in a streak. how they understand randomness, and how they reason about sequential patterns in space and time," Wilke said. "Our results will contribute to developing better methods of science education for helping children and students to more accurately recognize what are likely patterns and what is random. The world is statistical in nature. A sound understanding of randomness is central to teaching statistics, informs our decision-making processes, and provides guidance when facing judgments under risk and uncertainty".

Wilke and his co-investigator Annie Wertz-a developmental psychologist at the Max Planck Institute for

Human Development in Germany-will team up to test children at daycare facilities such as the Childcare Center at SUNY Potsdam. The research team also includes Peter Todd (Cognitive Science Program, Indiana University-Bloomington), Clark Barrett (UCLA Anthropology), Bang-Geul Han (Design and Digital Media, CUNY College of Staten Island), and Steven Pedersen (Communication, Media, and Design, Clarkson University).

For their project, fun and engaging short iPad tasks will be given to the children to study the development of their statistical thinking. Wilke's study will begin later this fall under strict and safe COVID-19 testing protocols. His team is seeking to enroll more children for the study, ages three to ten. To learn more about these studies and/or help by enrolling your child in it, please email the Evolution and Cognition Lab at ecl@ clarkson.edu.

Part of the funding from this grant will go directly into training CU undergraduate students in conducting multidisciplinary international research, supporting their attendance at scientific conferences, as well as accompanying Wilke on research visits to Germany.

POTSDAM -- Clarkson University officials announced the passing of Don Seale '57, age 86, a 2017 inductee into Clarkson's Athletic Hall of Fame. Seale is a decorated Major and veteran in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

"The Clarkson Athletics family lost a great member when Don passed. He helped shape what we are as a hockey program and a campus community. We are proud that he wore the Green and Gold," said Clarkson Director of Athletics Scott Smalling.

The Don Seale '57 Clarkson Alumni Endowed Scholarship has been established through the generosity of alumni donors to honor Don and will be awarded to students who lost a parent during service in either the military or as a first responder per Don's wishes after his decorated career in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Considered the "Jackie Robinson of Clarkson Hockey" as one of the first black players in U.S. collegiate hockey, Seale was a big, strong, talented athlete.

The imposing 6-2, 195-pound defenseman from St. John, New Brunswick, Seale won numerous awards

and anchored the Golden Knights defensive corps on teams that showcased some of the best hockey in the nation.

His teams amassed 60 victories and a .896 winning percentage from 1954-57.

In his first year of varsity competition for the Knights, Seale played in all 22 games of the 1954-55 campaign, helping the Green and Gold to an 18-4 record.

One of the most renowned seasons in college hockey history happened during 1955-56 when Seale helped Clarkson to a 23-0 mark, the first perfect campaign in the NCAA since 1947.

The Knights capped off the remarkable feat by defeating arch-rival St. Lawrence 7-4 in Potsdam.

Seale skated in all 23 games, scored two goals and 10 points in the undefeated season.

His first career goal was the opening score in a 5-2 victory over Boston College on February 17 at Clarkson Arena.

Film studies professor publishes second book

Through a Red Place reshapes itself from page to page, asking what it means to navigate place as both colonizer and colonized.

It builds a map between distances and lost stories to unearth and honor the past. On writing Through a Red Place, the author says, "We don't think of poetry as the product of rigorous research, but this collection is the result of long hours in the field and in archives. I hope aspects of the

book will surprise people, but also that the questions it asks will be deeply relatable: who am I as the product of my ancestors? How do I fit into a specific place? I think those are questions many of us can identify with."

Pelky will celebrate the book launch with an event on campus on Nov. 11, with a reading by the author, a book signing, and a reception.

Earlier this year, the book was awarded the Perugia Press Prize. This national award is given for first or second full-length books of poetry by women.

Rebecca Pelky is a member of the Brothertown Indian Nation of Wisconsin and a native of Michigan's

versity of Missouri, and an MFA from Northern Michigan University.

Through a Red Place is her second poetry collection; her first, Horizon of the Dog Woman, was published by Saint Julian Press in 2020.





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


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
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Weed wins support in Canton

CANTON -- The consensus at a public meeting on Wednesday night was pro cannabis although concerns were voiced regarding where dispensaries may be located.

Lenore VanderZee, who is employed at SUNY Canton, spoke on behalf of the college and as a resident of Canton.

"SUNY Canton has already incorporated cannabis as part of our curriculum. For myself, allowing cannabis on site is a benefit to the village and town. I support this wholeheartedly," she said.

Canton resident Marti MacArthur and her husband Peter agreed.

"I am very much in favor. I use it. I have to go to Plattsburgh or the reservation, said Mrs. MacArthur, citing medical uses. "It would be great to have it in Canton

Her husband, a registered pharmacist, addressed concerns about marijuana being labeled as a gateway drug but indicated studies show alcohol and tobacco use are more likely a gateway avenue.

"Saying cannabis is a hard drug is a fallacy," he said.

Reverend Michael Catanzaro, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Canton, said he was neither pro or con on the issue but questioned how the village would handle the influx of customer traffic.

"Is there any place in the village that can handle the onslaught," he said. "I can't imagine where the flow and impact would be.'

He said if neighboring communities opt not to allow cannabis dispensaries in their respective communities, what does that mean for Canton.

"I can't see any place in the village that can handle that traffic flow," he remarked.

Canton native Austin Bailey, who now resides in Seattle, Wash., is familiar with the cannabis industry, being engrossed in the industry for a couple of years. He told board members that today's marijuana is regulated and tested, ruling out whether or not the product is safe. He said if Canton doesn't allow it other towns will benefit from the business.

The lone anti-cannabis comment came for Gerard "Rod" Tozzi who resides on East Main Street. He told board members he has found needles on Main Street and in the village park, adding "it would behoove us to introduce another dope."

"I do not agree to sell our souls just to have cannabis. It's not the 1960s, it's a lot more potent," Tozzi stated.

Mayor Michael Dalton said he appreciated the comments and said the village board will take these comments into consideration and possibly make a final decision at the board's October meeting.
