Zamboni back online in Potsdam **BY ADAM ATKINSON**

POTSDAM - Public skating reopened at Pine Street Arena Monday, Jan. 9 after a Zamboni breakdown last week shut down ice time for a few days.

"As of 6:00 PM Friday evening, the Zamboni was once again operational and running as it should. However, without being able to do the ice for almost 10 days, we soon discovered some low spots on the ice surface," said a post on the Village of Potsdam Recreation Facebook page Sunday, Jan. 8.

"We took all of yesterday to put more water down and build up over those areas and officially reopened this morning," the post said.

The Recreation Department posted an updated schedule on its Facebook page and held its first public skating starting at 11 a.m. Monday.

The updated schedule can be viewed online at https:// bit.ly/3GPltY2.

The rink has been closed since Dec. 27 when three of the Zamboni's 16 battery cells failed to hold charge and staffers had to push the vehicle off the ice.

"Last Tuesday, before our scheduled Raquette River Lions Club Free Skate, one of our drivers attempted to do the ice when the Zamboni died at center ice before any maintenance could be performed," Village Recreation Director Trey Smutz, told North Country This Week. "At that time, we had to manually push the machine off the ice. The Zamboni would still at that time power on, but the sound it was making was not up to par with the way it normally runs and we could quickly tell that it wasn't operating with full power."

CANTON - With about 500 hockey players from around the world, joined by coaches, officials and volunteers, coming to Canton and Potsdam Jan. 11-19 for the FISU World University Games, the economic impact to the area could be substantial.

But according to the St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce, the five major hotels in Canton and Potsdam will be busy.

"There are approximately 90 rooms booked per night in Potsdam at the two major hotels and approximately 140 rooms booked per night in Canton at the three major hotels, "said the County Chamber's Director of Tourism Brooke

Potsdam Fire Department answers 600 service calls in 2022



POTSDAM - The Potsdam Fire Department answered more than 600 calls for service in 2022.

Engine 49, which is operated by the four paid fire drivers, was the busiest apparatus in the fleet answering 446 of those 620 calls, according to Jerry Robar, driver at the department.

The department answered 492 calls in the Village of Potsdam, 98 calls in the fire protection area outside the village, and 30 mutual aid

calls.

In other news, long-time fire truck driver Robert Pierce retired after 33 years of service. Fire Driver Matthew Kroeger was hired.

The department was able to secure new equipment including battery powered Hurst extrication tools, as well as battery operated power equipment such as saws, and lighting.

Members completed numerous hours of training, both in-house and state fire classes.

The fire department also placed an order for a new heavy rescue truck to replace their current rescue which is a 1994 vehicle. The new unit should be in service by the end of 2023.

The department placed second in the annual "Run to the River" event held at Summer Fest. Members attended the 2022 Northern NY fire convention held in Morristown along with parades throughout the

Supreme Court orders state to justify stay order in gun case

The Second Circuit Court's decision to issue a stay order in a long ongoing gun control case has now drawn the attention of the U.S. Supreme Court after a gun rights organization petitioned to the high court.

The petition to the high court from Gun Owners of America elicited a response, with the Supreme Court ordering New York State to respond by Jan. 3 as to why an order allowing Judge Suddaby's decision should not be issued.

St. Lawrence County Attorney Steve Button is assisting on the case and is acting "of counsel" with approval from the St. Lawrence County Legislature.

No response from the state has been heard as of yet.

The calls from the Supreme Court come in a tit-for-tat back and forth between both parties, as well as multiple courts that have had varying opinions.

On multiple occasions, Judge Suddaby ruled that multiple provisions of the new Concealed Carry Improvement Act were, by and large, unconstitutional and in line with the Supreme Court's ruling in NYSRPA v. Bruen last June.

Suddaby argued that the requirements to prove "good moral character" was far too ambiguous and afforded licensing officers too much discretion to deny an applicant.

Suddaby also said the requirement to disclose co-habitants, existing firearms in the home, as well as social media profiles was an infringement on an individual's Fourth, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendment rights.

In one ruling, Suddaby also pared down the list of "sensitive spaces" that would restrict a lawful gun owner's right to carry concealed, removing many public parks, private businesses and a dearth of other locations.

Private businesses would also no longer be required to post a sign stating that lawfully concealed carry was permitted on the premises, removing the onus from business owners in one of the more controversial measures passed last year.

Following Suddaby's decision, state officials appealed the injunction to the Second Circuit, who in turn put a stay on the injunction. As a result, all laws passed last June in direct opposition to the Bruen ruling remain enforceable by agents of the state, according to County Attorney Steve Button.

New York State Attorney General

Letitia James has argued the underlying analysis put forth by Judge Suddaby was "deeply flawed," in particular on the issue of standing.

James argued in court documents that Suddaby erred in multiple cases, including the historical context applied, which Suddaby said fell directly in line with the standard set by the Bruen ruling.

James argued Suddaby also erred in potentially allowing a person who has never applied for a concealed carry license to challenge the CCIA to allow a church drug counselor to challenge the restrictions of guns in drug treatment clinics, according to a report posted on lawandcrime. com.

Button said the appeal was expected and the decision by the Second Circuit was not entirely surprising.

The Second Circuit has since ordered expedited consideration of the ongoing case, with a Jan. 9, 2023 deadline for briefs, court documents show.

The three judge panel, which consists of appointees by former Presidents Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Donald Trump, is the same trio that issued a stay order for another court order from Judge Suddaby in a separate challenge to the CCIA last month.

Man accused of abandoning dog after move

NORWOOD – A St. Lawrence County man was accused of abandoning an animal after moving to a new residence.

Norwood Police arrested 48 year-old Christopher M. Brooks on a warrant for animal in violation of the agricultural and markets law abandonment, officers said.

The arrest came after an investigation of an abandoned dog reported to police on Oct. 5, police said.

Officers allege that Brooks moved to Raymondville, vacating his house on Ridge Street, but he left behind his pet dog.

The animal was found to be in need of food and medical care, and was removed to the Potsdam Animal Shelter, police said.

Brooks was cited and released on his own recognizance and will answer the charges later this month in Town of Potsdam court. The Potsdam Animal Shelter was able to bring the dog back to good health. The shelter is always in need of community assistance, and gladly accepts donations of new, unopened dog and cat food, in both cans and bagged varieties.

PARISHVILLE -- As the homeowner of 49 Catherine Street let her dogs out to use the bathroom Thursday, she noticed her garage was on fire.

The structure is still standing because firefighters were on scene within minutes, because the fire station is very close-by, according to Chief Ed Cool.

Parishville Fire received the call at 11:39 a.m. and were on at 11:42 a.m.

Chief Cool said a few guys were shooting the breeze at the department after returning from a rescue call, so the timing was as good as it could be for a bad situation. The blaze has been listed as acci-

dental. Cool said the fire is believed to have been caused by a faulty battery that possibly overheated. The charger was used for power tools.

Although quick on scene, the damage resulted in the loss of a snowblower, tools and other items inside the garage, the chief said.

There is smoke, water and fire damage to the structure and contents

Cool said the residence is owned by the Darrah family and the garage was insured.

Mutual aid was provided by Hopkinton-Fort Jackson and Potsdam

fire departments. No injuries were reported.

Police officers fired following hit-and-run

MASSENA - Massena and Norwood police officers have been fired after making false statements to Potsdam police about a hit and run accident that occurred in the Village of Potsdam on New Year's morning.

Joshua E. Underwood, 23, was involved in a hit-and-run property damage accident on New Year's Day around 3 a.m., according to a Potsdam Police blotter.

Logan S. Chilton, 22, a part-time police officer with the Norwood

Village Police Department, was also involved in the incident and charged with falsifying a report to police.

Underwood, who was officially hired May 17, was fired on Jan. 5 during a special meeting of the Village Board of Trustees, according to Village Administrator Monique Chatland.

Officer in Charge Shawn Wells confirmed with North Country This Week that Chilton was fired on Jan. 4 for his role in the incident.

According to Potsdam police, officers responded to a hit-and-run property damage accident on Pierre-

pont Avenue at 3 a.m. on Jan 1. Police say further investigation of the incident revealed Underwood and two others conspired to provide false information to police regarding who was operating the vehicle at the time of the accident.

Police issued Underwood traffic tickets and an appearance ticket returnable to Town of Potsdam Court.

Chilton was charged with sixth-degree conspiracy and providing a false written statement and issued tickets returnable to Town of Potsdam Court.

CCS plans forums for capital project talks

CANTON -- The Canton Central School District will be hosting two community forums to discuss the need for voters to approve additional funds to complete the district's 2023 capital project.

Voters previously approved the \$27.5 million capital project in May 2021. The additional funds, in the amount of \$10.5 million, will bring the project total to \$38 million.

Low-bid contractors reported that supply chain and inflation have driven the prices up as much as 30%, Burke said. There is indication that these prices will only continue to increase into the foreseeable future. The tax impact from the project

• With Enhanced STAR per \$100,000, \$4.40 from additional \$10.5M, new rate is \$18.18.



Outreach to community on electricity buying program planned in Canton

CANTON – A community outreach to inform residents what community choice aggregation has to offer is expected to be held this month.

At the monthly meeting of the village board on Dec. 21, trustee Klaus Proemm updated the board on the status of community power program, citing the importance of community engagement.

"The reason that public outreach is so important is that we want Canton residents to be fully aware of the options before us, and to know the reasons why Community Choice aggregation will benefit village residents," stated Proemm.

The village has been approached by Joule Community Power, a firm which administers a large number of community choice aggregation power arrangements for municipalities throughout the state.

Proemm provided a brief summary of the Joule program.

"By sourcing all renewable energy, we'll both save money for residents, or we won't do it) and lessen the burning of fossil fuels, thereby lowering our carbon footprint, minimizing climate impacts," he said. "To clarify the actual energy purchase scenario, the decision on whether to go ahead with an energy "buy" will be made well after extensive public outreach/ education, and after we've carefully examined the rates and conditions of the energy purchase, and we're convinced it is a good rate and is secure." "All residents will have the ability to opt out, both at the start, and at any time after. A letter will go out to all Village residents explaining options before the purchase happens," Proemm continued.

The contract that the Village of Canton (and the Town of Potsdam) has with Joule Community Power is for them to be our CCA administrator. The power purchase contract will potentially come much later, probably in the fall, after the public outreach and thorough review, Proemm remarked. To date, there is no contract in place.

"This community choice aggregation program would enable the village of Canton to provide eligible residents and small businesses with the benefits of renewable electricity supply," a release on the village website reads.

The release explains a timeline. "More municipalities are joining the upcoming bid. In spring 2023, the Village will be presented with prices and the option to select between a fixed-rate or a variable-rate offer. Market conditions, including price volatility and the need to maximize the availability of renewable electricity supply may lead to the variable-rate offer providing the best value to residents and small businesses."

"If the Village selects a supplier and offering, all eligible residents and small businesses will be notified by letter in spring/summer 2023 of the details, their choices and how to opt-out. Participants can opt-out or opt back into the program at any time with no penalty by phone or online form. By participating in the program, residents and small businesses can access competitively priced electricity supply with no individual contract."

"Additional public information sessions will be scheduled over the next two months. These sessions will provide general information, explain the benefits of participation by our residents and small businesses, and answer your questions."

Additional information sessions will occur in 2023 if the Village signs a contract for CCA electricity supply. Information on upcoming information sessions can be found here: www.joulecommunitypower.com/ events

The Town of Potsdam approved a contract with Joule at its Dec. 13 meeting. The terms of that contract sees the contract lasting 18 months and then auto renewed for 18 more months unless it is terminated in writing 30 days prior to the renewal.

Joule will essentially serve as a middle man, brokering sources of renewable energy from producers at a fixed rate on behalf of residents. Joule will be responsible for the CCA organization, administration, procurement, communications and implementation. Joule will also be responsible for managing the opt out process.

Marijuana dispensary eyed at former Olympia Sports

POTSDAM — A state authority is interested in setting up in the former Olympia Sports store off Route 11 as a marijuana dispensary to be run by a cannabis business licensee.

The attention has town officials moving quickly to draft a new code to manage the local permitting process for legal pot shops.

At the town board meeting Tuesday, Jan. 10, Town Supervisor Ann Carvill told board members that the town code enforcement officer, Jeff Murray, had received a letter from an architect working for the Dormitory Authority State of New York (DASNY), expressing interest in setting up the site, located in the Tractor Supply plaza, across the highway from Walmart, as dispensary.

The architect asks if there are any municipal zoning steps taken or meetings required with the Potsdam town planning board, Carvill read from the letter. In the letter, the DASNY representative said the size of the store would not change and the maximum occupancy would be less than 50 people.

"We're not alone in thinking that New York State has kind of gotten ahead of local municipalities in keeping us apprised of where we should be," Carvill told the board. "At this point, it looks like we need a law."

"And the law, to our understanding at this point, simply states that for someone requesting a dispensary that it would have to go... that it would have to be on a case by case basis, it goes to the planning board and then it would come to us for discussion," she said.

DASNY, a "public benefit corporation" of the state, provides design and project management services, and issues bonds, notes and other obligations, for a wide variety of public purposes. The authority, and its subsidiary the Social Equity Servicing Corporation (SESC), was recently charged with providing agency services, design, construction and other services to the state's Cannabis Control Board, Office of Cannabis Management, and the New York Social Equity Cannabis Investment Fund. The Fund, a \$200 million fund established by Gov. Hochul in her budget in March 2022, provides start-up cash, other financial assistance, and support to "equity entrepreneurs at the forefront of the adult-use cannabis market."

The Fund establishes conditional adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries and then offers them, in a sublease arrangement, to those chosen to hold Conditional Adult-Use Retail Dispensary (CAURD) Licenses.

CAURD licenses are the first cannabis licenses being issued by New York State. To be eligible, at least 30 percent of the business must be owned by an individual previously convicted of a marijuana offense before March 31, 2021 and who has qualifying business experience.

This last part seems to be raising some eyebrows at the town level.

"The state also is selecting sites, like they have here with this, where they will permit it," Carvill said. "Apparently... there is going to be a lottery of former inmates who were put in prison for pot use. There is going to be a lottery and one of them will be selected to run this business. They will have 10 years to pay back the money that the state spent setting it up."

"We need to get a law in order, because its starting," the supervisor said.

According to DASNY, if a CAURD licensee does accept the offer of a state-setup pot shop, the licensee will then be obligated to enter into a repayment arrangement for the costs incurred by the fund, and will have 10 years to pay back the money spent.

According to a DASNY fact sheet, the authority has spent several months searching for and identifying potential dispensary locations for CAURD licensees around the state. According to the agency, more than 10,000 properties have been screened statewide as of December 22, 2022, with 2,300 getting a more detailed look. Of those, 350 locations have been short listed as potential sites, DASNY states. The next step is reaching out to local municipalities to confirm the locations meet local zoning requirements. Following that SESC will then start negotiating with landlords on a rental agreement, while the Fund secures insurance.

Once all of those ducks are in a row, the site is then offered to a CAURD licensee. If they choose to accept, they sign on the dotted line with the state for the 10-year payback obligation. If not, then they go back into a location assignment queue and wait for another spot to open in their region, and the first location is offered to another licensee.

The contract will bring \$848,652 to the county's Office of Emergency Services to improve "interoperability and operability of communication systems in New York state," according to officials.

The contract is set to expire on Dec. 31, 2023.

Legislators also approved signing a contract extension for the FY21 Public Safety Answering Points Grant.

That grant is administered through the New York State Office of Homeland Security and the Office of Emergency Services.

The grant will be for \$207,504 to "concentrate on the purchase of equipment to enhance dispatching and 911 call taking," officials say.

The one-year extension will run through Dec. 31, 2023.



St. Lawrence County officials take state to task over pistol permits

CANTON - St. Lawrence County officials are taking the state to task after they say up to 200 conceal carry pistol license applicants were returned incomplete by state police. The county sheriff hopes to rectify the problem.

The problem officials say is that the state is requiring training that requires a pistol, but don't allow the applicants to use a pistol prior to the issuance of the license making it impossible to complete the training.

Officials say that because they can't use a pistol for the training which requires using a pistol, the training has not been completed.

Officials say that roughly 70 applicants received letters from the state notifying them that their applications were incomplete while more than 100 or so were notified by phone.

St. Lawrence County Sheriff Brooks Bigwarfe has agreed to step in to complete the application background investigations.

"Law abiding citizens seeking to exercise their Second Amendment rights should not be penalized because of the State of New York's refusal to abide by the US Supreme Court's decision. We will complete the pending background investigations to assist the citizens in moving forward with the exercise of their rights," he said.

In a press release issued Tuesday St. Lawrence County officials uniformly denounced the actions of the state. St. Lawrence County officials taking issue with the problem include Bigwarfe, St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators Chairman Dave Forsythe and St. Lawrence County Clerk Sandy San-

"County officials were recently informed that the State of New York had decided that it would not proceed forward with pending pistol applications, leaving many applicants in a state of legal limbo," the release says.

According to the release as many as 200 pistol license applicants in St. Lawrence County were recently informed by the New York State Police that their applications, some of which had been pending since the beginning of 2022, would be denied. The state police denials of conceal carry licenses are due to what they say are incomplete background checks. Other applicants would only be permitted to receive a "premises-only" license, permitting the applicant permission only to possess their firearm in their homes and for travel to and from a gun range. Officials say that at the heart of the matter are changes made to the pistol licensing scheme employed by New York State known as the "Conceal Carry Improvement Act."

On June 23, 2022, the United States Supreme Court issued a decision in NYSRPA v. Bruen, striking down the New York State 'proper cause' requirements for the issuance of a pistol license.

Building upon District of Columbia v. Heller and the decision in McDonald v. City of Chicago, Illinois, the United States Supreme Court ruled in Bruen that the Second Amendment's protection of "the right to keep and bear arms" extends to individual self-defense outside the home. In response to the Bruen decision, the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul concluded a two-day extraordinary session on July 1, 2022 that led to Governor Hochul signing the "Concealed Carry Improvement Act" so titled by its proponents. The Concealed Carry Improvement Act moved to circumvent the decision, depriving New York State citizens of any effective right to self-defense in public in one major way; by exponentially expanding the places ["Sensitive places"] in which a person with a valid license cannot carry a firearm

ry Improvement Act included what officials say were alarming provisions that flouted the Bruen precedent by requiring concealed carry permit applicants to: display 'good moral character'; subject their social media accounts for review;

submit to in-person interviews with law enforcement; provide four character references; undergo 18 hours of combined training (an increase from the existing four-hour requirement); and recertify every three years instead of the prior recertification period of every five years.

According to the release the 18 hours of combined instruction includes a two-hour component requiring applicants to complete in-person range training.

However, applicants, unlicensed to possess firearms, would be performing an illegal act under most scenarios, were they to possess and discharge a pistol as a part of that training. It was this quandary that led state officials to notify pistol license applicants that their requests for carry conceal licenses would be denied. St. Lawrence

County Board of Legislators Chairman David Forsythe (R-District 2) identified the State's actions as 'unlawful.' "St. Lawrence County has been a leader in New York State, on behalf of all state citizens, in challenging the unlawful restrictions placed upon citizens seeking to merely exercise their constitutional rights. We will continue to dedicate our efforts and resources towards supporting our citizens' rights and holding those who would seek to deny those rights accountable."







A NEW STATE LAW signed Jan. 2 by Governor Kathy Hochul makes New York the sixth state to legalize human composting. A person can now have their body turned into soil after their death - which is seen as an environmentally friendly alternative to a burial or cremation. A dead body is placed into a reusable vessel along with other plant materials. The organic mix creates a habitat for natural decay which takes about a month. The new process may be more eco-friendly, but will initially be more expensive than other ways of handling a body following death. Do you support the new natural organic reduction law?

help keep down prices at the pump. Over the long term, we must remove the mandates, taxes and fees that drive up the cost of living and working in our state. This year, I will be co-sponsoring a series of bills that would remove many of these financial hurdles and make it more affordable to be a New Yorker.

Last year, the state Comptroller released an audit on the Department of Labor's unemployment insurance assessment surcharge. It revealed that billions in improper payments from businesses and overpayments to New Yorkers were issued, due to poor oversight and an antiquated system. This is deeply troubling, and I'm looking to remedy this situation moving forward. First, we must take steps to shore up the infrastructure and operations at the DOL to ensure further waste and fraud is prevented. Offering financial remuneration to small business owners for their overpayments, which only exacerbated the economic difficulties they faced during the pandemic and its aftermath, is also essential.

Public safety and protection remains of vital importance. To protect law-abiding residents from violent and repeat offenders, I remain committed to backing a full repeal of the state's bail and discovery reform laws and engaging law enforcement on a series of common sense reforms. Fully addressing public safety doesn't end with repealing bail reform, however. The 45th District is home to several correctional facilities and in the wake of the state's HALT Act severely curtailing the use of special housing units, corrections officers and civilian staff have been targeted by violent and disruptive incarcerates at an alarming rate. Let's put the safety of these men and women first, provide them with the resources they need and repeal HALT. One of the most controversial (and likely unconstitutional) measures to pass last year was a gun control law concerning concealed carry permits that essentially made it illegal for people In the Adirondack Park to exercise their second amendment right. In its wake,

we've seen chaos and confusion and the cancellation of several historic re-enactments. This has had a serious impact on our local economy and our way of life. Last year, I authored legislation to exempt the Adirondack Park from this nonsensical gun control law, so residents and visitors alike can fully exercise their constitutional rights and take part in the traditions that make our region unique.

While bail reform and the state gun control law are among the highest profile issues affecting our region, there's also a host of locally specific matters I'm seeking to take up and remedy this year. Rural health care is a major issue, and to that end I have two major focal points. Last year, I sponsored legislation allowing the creation of local EMS districts in the Adirondacks. This measure would help improve response times and service to residents in times of crisis. I plan on re-introducing this bill, and continuing to work with community stakeholders on measures to provide swifter EMS services and improve volunteer recruitment efforts.

there are numerous possibilities for the site and it is crucial that we make use of these opportunities and ensure the former Moriah Shock benefits our residents.

I will also continue carrying constitutional amendments for Camp Gabriels and Debar Pond Lodge. Much like Moriah Shock, the Camp Gabriels site offers great economic potential and allowing the state to sell it would create a needed economic boost for the region. Offering a land exchange with the Debar Pond Institute would enhance the size and beauty of the forest preserve in the Adirondacks. Additionally, ensuring affordable broadband access for everyone remains a focus. We took steps toward making it a reality last year by eliminating the costly fiber-optic tax. I will be using my role as Ranking Minority Member on the Senate Internet and Technology Committee to ensure we meet that important goal.

Given the economic and social uncertainty a majority of New Yorkers are feeling, we must use this year's Legislative Session to meet the challenges ahead. I'm confident we can and I look forward to working with my colleagues and all

of these statistics and their accuracy is based entirely on the integrity and thoroughness of death investigations.

Operational criteria for determining suicide provided by the CDC requires evidence of two things: that the causative injury was self-inflicted and that it was intentional. The difficulty of evidencing intentionality makes suicide particularly susceptible to inaccurate determination.

On the date that the cause and manner of this young man's death were certified, no compelling evidence was present to support either determination. The resident of the house in which the injury occurred ("friend's apartment" on the death certificate) is the singular source of information regarding the circumstances of the incident. This person, who is of material witness interest to the case, remarkably appears (with an alternate surname than that identified in first responder notes) as "next of kin" and "life partner" on a hospital document for the decedent, with an address listed that is, in fact, the address of the young man's mother.

The county sheriff's office was responsible for the investigation of the young man's death two years ago. The detective claims to have viewed a suicide note in the form of a final social media post that the non credible witness alleges to have been made by the young man. That report also describes the uncooperative nature of this witness in refusing to turn over any belongings, wallet, identification or phone of the young man. The alleged "suicide note" has never been documented or verified. One need not be Nancy Drew to suspect the true manner of death in this case is more sinister than the tragic one officially ruled. And one need not be the Hardy Boys to recognize the egregious incompetence displayed by law enforcement is not like the bumbling antics of TV's fictional Hazzard County, but terrifyingly like the real life story of Mississippi Burning. On the morning of January 8th, 2021, a young man just shy of his 27th birthday, died an unexpected death in my hometown. An autopsy was performed that afternoon. Three days later, more than two weeks prior to knowing toxicology testing results, the manner of death was certified by a county coroner as suicide with four chemicals listed under the cause of lethal intoxication.

Suicide is a tragedy that touches too many. Community awareness of the issue relies on the accuracy of mortality statistics to develop effective prevention strategies. Death certificates are the primary source

Agritourism course opportunity for farms and food businesses

Registration is open for the course Building an Agritourism Experience on Your Farm. This hybrid course is open to existing as well as planning stages farms or food businesses. The Agritourism course is the second of three offerings as part of the 2023 Ag and Food Producers Academy organized by Cornell Cooperative Extension of St. Lawrence County. The course format combines the convenience of three online evening classes on February 1st, 8th, 15th, along with a Saturday field trip to regional businesses on Feb. 18.

Whether its tours, farmstays, you pick or something else, agritourism experiences are wonderful strategies to welcome community members and visitors into the world of agriculture. Many benefits associated with agritourism include increased revenue and awareness of your business, diversifying your operation through slow seasons, and improving agricultural literacy through youth education. In this course, you will learn how to design a memorable experience, use marketing and promotion to reach your target audiences, and prepare your farm to welcome visitors with considerations for staffing, safety, insurance, liability, and accessibility.

The instructor for the course is Mary Godnick, the Communication Coordinator for Adirondack Harvest, a program of Cornell Cooperative Extension of Essex County. Mary states, "I look forward to sharing with farmers the tools they need to consider integrating agritourism into their farm operations. By the end of the course, participants will have a clear plan for how to implement or grow agritourism activities on their farm.'

There's also space in the next course, Planning and Maintaining a Greenhouse or High Tunnel, which will be held online March 2, 9, 16 with a field trip on March 18. A super simple and great side dish, this recipe is suitable for wintertime local food eating as onions, potatoes, garlic, milk and cheese produced in northern New York can all be found.

Ingredients

fresh parsley 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp salt ¹/₂ tsp ground black pepper 2 Tbsp butter or high heat oil

Mix together potatoes, eggs, and milk in a large bowl.

Stir flour, cheese, onion, garlic, baking powder, salt, and pepper into potato mixture.



SUNY Canton maintains prestigious esports reputation

CANTON -- SUNY Canton is continuing its exceptional reputation as a leader in esports.

The National Collegiate Scouting Association (NCSA) recently noted SUNY Canton in its Best Colleges for Esports list. The college was 33 on the public list of 100 entries and boasted the lowest tuition of any university. The organization analyzed more than 250 colleges with esports programs from across the country to develop a list designed to help prospective students and student-athletes.

"It's an honor to be grouped with so many prestigious colleges and universities on the top 100 esports list," said SUNY Canton Athletic Director Randy B. Sieminski. "SUNY Canton has been a leader in all aspects of esports and its growth, adding an esports major and a new esports residence hall wing. We take great pride in being the top-ranked SUNY school and among the best in the nation." The college currently offers intercollegiate gameplay for 100 students in 13 titles. The most popular games currently are, Nintendo's Super Smash Bros. Ultimate, Riot Games' Valorant, Riot Games' League of Legends, and Blizzard Entertainment's Overwatch. According to SUNY Canton Esports Coordinator Charles W. Murray, six teams have made it to the semifinals in either the Eastern

College Athletic Conference (ECAC) or the SUNY Esports league.

"We are continuing to hold our own against our peer colleges and much larger universities," Murray said. "Our most recent wins come just a year after our League of Legends team took home second place in the ECAC, and just a handful of years after our first and second place season wins in Overwatch."

Murray also serves as the commissioner of SUNY Esports, which began in the fall of 2020 with 600 students from 45 campuses. It has since grown to approximately 2,900 students from 54 campuses. "SUNY Esports was founded and is operated by SUNY Canton," Murray said. "As a frontrunner and a lead innovator, we have been able to help other colleges start programs of their own." SUNY Canton launched its varsity esports program in the spring of 2018 to complement its new fouryear Game Design and Development program. At the time, it was the first college in SUNY with a varsity esports program and among a select few in the state to compete nationally. The following fall, the college unveiled a brand-new Esports Arena and partnered with Extreme Networks and Alienware to outfit the 1.800-square-foot dedicated gaming space. In 2019, the college announced a new four-year program in Esports Management to prepare students to join the fast-growing industry of competitive video games. In 2020, the college helped orchestrate a SUNY-wide Tournament during pandemic-related shutdowns, which was a precursor to SUNY Esports. SUNY Canton created an Esports Residence Hall Wing in 2021, offering video game enthusiasts an immersive on-campus experience.

NNY Community Foundation offering scholarships

The Northern New York Community Foundation is now accepting scholarship applications from students in Jefferson, Lewis, and St. Lawrence counties who plan to enroll in post-secondary educational programs in the fall of 2023.

An online application streamlines the process for most scholarships. Students may access the portal, create a user account, and begin an online application by clicking on "2023-2024 Scholarship Application" found at the top of nnycf.org/scholarships/scholarship-overview.

With few exceptions, all Community Foundation scholarship applications are due Wednesday, March 15, through the online portal.

Scholarships with different deadlines — some after March 15 — are noted on the same web page.

Applications cannot be accepted after the published deadline.

High school seniors who plan to enroll as full-time undergraduates next fall may apply for a one-year, Community Foundation Freshman Scholarship. Students pursuing technical, trade or vocational school may also apply and should complete the same application.

Students may now apply online using the same 2023-2024 Scholarship Application for several scholarships that previously required unique applications, including: 10th Mountain Division (Light) Scholarship; George C. Boldt Scholarship; Vici and Steve Diehl Foundation Graduate Scholarships; Frances Anderson Luck Foundation Scholarship; North Country Goes Green Irish Festival Scholarship; North Pleasant Street (Watertown) Scholarship; Northpole Fire Company Inc. Scholarship; North Side Legacy Fund Scholarship; Rotary Purple Heart Scholarship; Michelle D. Salisbury Scholarship; Shaw Harbor Foundation Scholarship; and all Thousand Islands Foundation scholarships.

The Retired Educators of New York North Central Zone scholarship requires students to complete an application packet that can be downloaded and printed from the Community Foundation's website at nnycf.org/ scholarships/applications.

The deadline to apply for that scholarship is Wednesday, March 15.

Completed packets must be returned or postmarked by the dead• Nontraditional Student Scholarship — Awarded to applicants who live in Jefferson, Lewis, or St. Lawrence counties. Eligible applicants may be enrolled full- or part-time in college or a technical, trade, or vocational school Applications for this program are due by Thursday, June 1, 2023.

• Evergreen STEM Scholarship — (High school class of 2024) Awards ten, \$3,000 scholarships annually to St. Lawrence County high school juniors who plan to pursue studies in STEM-related fields — science, technology, engineering, and math. Applications for this program are due by Thursday, June 1, 2023.

• Herring College Memorial Scholarship — Awarded to students in engineering, sciences, mathematics, and related fields, as well as the Visiting Nurses Association Scholarship for students pursuing continued education in nursing or health-related fields.

• Rotary Purple Heart Scholarship — Available to residents of Jefferson, Lewis, or St. Lawrence County who were awarded a Purple Heart by the U.S. armed forces or are a dependent — spouse or child — of a U.S. military member or veteran who was awarded the Purple Heart. Purple Heart Scholarship applications are reviewed throughout the year until all available funds for the academic year are award ed.

• 10th Mountain Division (Light) Scholarship — Awarded to active or former 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry) members or family members — spouse or child — of an active or former 10th Mountain Division soldier. The applicant or their military sponsor must also be a member of the National Association of the 10th Mountain Divi sion. Scholarship applicants may live anywhere and be in any year of fulltime undergraduate study.

• George C. Boldt Scholarship — Awarded to three Jefferson County residents for full-time undergraduate study. Graduate study is not funded. Students who will be attending technical, trade or vocational schools are eligible to apply. Applications are accepted from high school seniors or nontraditional students who have had a break in their studies.

• Russell I. Wilcox Thousand Islands Bridge Authority Scholarship — Awarded to two students for undergraduate study. Applicants must be current full-time Thousand Islands Bridge Authority employees, retirees, or the children or grandchildren of the same.



UH joins coalition fighting for seniors

CANTON - United Helpers Rehabilitation and Senior Care in Canton is one of 26 non-profit skilled nursing facilities from across Upstate New York taking part in a coalition aimed at delivering the message to Albany that they can no longer continue to ignore senior citizens and their families who rely on these facilities for care.

As part of this effort the United Helpers Management Company Board of Directors, as well as the Society of the United Helpers Board is asking members of the public to reach out to Gov. Kathy Hochul through this link, which will generate a message on your behalf, https://p2a.co/Q2wLwJZ.

"Skilled nursing facilities all across New York have not seen an operating rate inflation adjustment in their Medicaid reimbursement rates for 15 years, going back to 2007," said United Helpers Chief

Operating Officer Stacey Cannizzo. "These stagnant rates have led to operating losses, not only for United Helpers, but for facilities all across the state.'

According to data compiled by the coalition, the 26 facilities have a census capacity of 4,631 beds with an average financial loss per bed of \$25,384 per year.

Over the past several years these losses have led to the closure of more than a dozen senior care facilities in the region, including United Helpers Rehabilitation and Senior Care in Ogdensburg in 2021.

Using data provided by coalition members, there is a combined loss of \$81.6 million for its 26 members in 2022. That's an average of almost \$3.14 million per facility.

"It's almost as if the people responsible for making these funding decisions do not have parents, grandparents, or other loved ones

who receive or could potentially one dav receive skilled nursing care," Mrs. Cannizzo said. "It's disheartening to constantly read in the newspaper or see on TV about the tens or hundreds of thousands of dollars available to other types of health care providers, but when it comes to folks in facilities such as ours, there is seldom any money available."

With nearly 80% of the people receiving care through United Helpers relying on Medicaid and/ or Medicare to pay for the services they receive, Mrs. Cannizzo said reimbursement rates from the government only provide enough funds to pay for roughly 50% of that care.

"The bottom line is New York State needs to do better for our seniors," she said. "Along those lines we are compelling the state to provide skilled nursing facilities with a 20% increase to their reimbursement rate. We recognize that a 20% increase may sound like a lot, but if the state had not gone 15 years without an increase, we would not be in the situation where their lack of action has led to the closure of facilities such as ours"

Mrs. Cannizzo said she would like to reassure both United Helpers employees, as well as family members for those receiving care in Canton that United Helpers Rehabilitation and Senior Care is not in danger of closing at this time, but without some changes to the state's funding structure each year that passes puts us closer to that point.

"For many of us our parents and grandparents are among the most important people in our lives. They deserve the same level of love and care in their golden years that they provided to us as children and young adults growing up" Mrs. Cannizzo said.

United Helpers Management Company Board of Directors President Dr. Galen Pletcher said the time for people to act is now.

Considerations for retirees thinking of working part-time

Retirement is an opportunity to wave goodbye to the daily grind. Retirees may focus on rest and relaxation, and many make travel a major component of their lifestyle.

According to a 2022 Gallup poll, Americans expect to retire at an average age of 66, up from 62 in 2022.

However, most do not hold out that long; the average actual retirement age is 61. Canada used to have a mandatory retirement age of 65, but that mandate was overturned in 2009. Today, the average retirement age for Canadians is 64.4 for men and 63.8 for women, according to Statistics Canada.

Upon retiring, many retirees discover that they sorely miss getting out of the house and being productive through some sort of employment. Others may find it necessary to supplement their retirement incomes. There are a few things to know about working during retirement, particularly if a person is collecting government benefits.

· According to the Social Security Administration, those falling under full retirement age for the entire year (which was raised to age 67 for those born in 1960 or later) will be subjected to an SSA deduction of \$1 from your benefit payments for every \$2 you earn above the annual limit. For 2022, that limit is \$19,560. In the year vou reach full retirement age, SSA deducts \$1 in benefits for every \$3 you earn above a different limit, but they only count earnings before the month you reach your full retirement age. For full retirelimit on earnings for the months before full retirement age is \$51,960. After full retirement age, there is no limit on earnings.

· The Financial Consumer Agency of Canada reports that individuals between the ages of 60 and 65 who continue to work while receiving a Canadian Pension Plan (CPP) retirement benefit must still contribute to the CPP. Your CPP contributions will go toward post-retirement benefits. These benefits increase your retirement income when you stop working. However, if you continue to work while getting a CPP retirement pension and are between the ages of 65 and 70 years old, you can choose not to make any more CPP contributions.

• Keep in mind that if you are on Medicare, extra income could potentially trigger surcharges for parts B and D. It's beneficial to speak with a financial consultant to weigh the pros and cons of part-time work during retirement.

· Part-time work does not need to be daily work. Many retirees work according to how they feel. Some options include seasonal jobs, such as driving shuttles in national parks or working during the holidays in retail stores. Or you may use your expertise to consult or start a business.

· A number of people work parttime during retirement simply to get out of the house. Jobs that help you interact with a number of people can be beneficial, as socialization has been shown to benefit the mental health of seniors.

Safety tips for heating in St. Lawrence County this winter season

This winter is projected to be a cold and bitter one in New York State, with many regions already experiencing record chills and snowfall. The Firefighters Association of the State of New York (FASNY) reminds New Yorkers to follow some essential safety tips when heating their homes this winter.

Fire departments usually see an uptick in home fires during the winter, with nearly half of all home heating equipment fires occurring during December, January and February. Carbon monoxide (CO) exposure and poisonings also increase during these months.

According to the National Fire Prevention Association, heating equipment is the second leading cause of US home fires and the third leading cause of home fire deaths. Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires, accounting for more than two of every five fires (44%), as well as the vast majority of deaths and injuries in home fires caused by heating equipment.

American hearts much older than they should be

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the average adult in the United States has a heart that is seven years older than it should be.

"Heart age" is a metric used by the CDC to determine if an individual is at greater risk for heart disease than they should be at any given point during their adults lives.

Factors such as body mass index (BMI), blood pressure, whether or not a person smokes or has smoked in the past, and if that person has diabetes all help to determine heart age.

The CDC indicates that millions of people in their 40s and 50s who live in the United States have high blood pressure and more than 35 million U.S. adults are current smokers. Those variables increase heart age, making individuals more vulnerable to heart disease even in middle-age.

Individuals interested in getting an estimate of their heart age can visit the Heart Foundation at heartfoundation.org.au/ heart-age-calculator.

Adults also are urged to speak with their physicians about their risk for heart disease and what

Homeowners should keep space heaters a safe distance from combustible materials, such as curtains, bedding, and upholstered furniture. To prevent CO exposure and poisoning, avoid the indoor use of unvented gas-burning appliances, unvented gas or wood-burning stoves, and unvented fireplaces.

Governor Kathy Hochul recently signed legislation to help curb the preventable deaths caused by space heater fires. Legislation (S.7863A/ A.9181B) requires that space heaters sold in New York State have a thermostat, automatic shut off, and be

certified by a testing and certification body recognized and approved by the United States Department of Labor, Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Here are some home heating tips from FASNY and the NFPA:

Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment.

Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters. Never use your oven to heat your

home. Have a qualified professional in Have heating equipment and

chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.

Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.

Always use the right kind of fuel specified by the manufacturer, for fuel-burning space heaters.

All fuel-burning equipment should

be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

Test smoke alarms once a month.

What seniors can do to safeguard their mental health

No one is immune to issues that can adversely affect their mental health, including men and women nearing retirement age and those who are already retired. Though the term "golden years" suggests life in retirement is one sunny day after another, many individuals 60 and older are dealing with mental health issues.

According to the World Health Organization, approximately 15 percent of the world's adults aged 60 and over suffer from a mental disorder. What makes that statistic even more troubling is that the WHO acknowledges it likely doesn't paint the most accurate picture of seniors and mental health, as depression is often undiagnosed among older men and women and untreated because it co-occurs with other issues affecting seniors.

In the past, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has acknowledged that late-life anxiety was not readily understood. However, much progress has been made in recent years thanks to a heightened awareness of the problem of seniors and mental health. That means seniors now have ample resources they can look to as they seek to learn what they can do to safeguard their mental health.

Recognizing warning signs

The National Institute of Mental Health notes that recognizing the signs of mental health issues is the first step to getting treatment. Mental health issues vary, and individuals with anxiety will likely experience different symptoms than those with depression. But the NIMH notes that the following are some of the warning signs of mental health issues.

• Noticeable changes in mood, energy level, or appetite

• Feeling flat or having trouble feeling positive emotions

 \cdot Difficulty sleeping or sleeping too much

- \cdot Difficulty concentrating, feeling restless, or on edge
- \cdot Increased worry or feeling stressed
- \cdot Anger, irritability, or aggressiveness
- Ongoing headaches, digestive issues, or pain
- Misuse of alcohol or drugs
 Sadness or hopelessness
- Suicidal thoughts
- · Engaging in high-risk activities

 \cdot Obsessive thinking or compulsive behavior

 \cdot Thoughts or behaviors that interfere with work, family, or social life

 \cdot Engaging in thinking or behavior that is concerning to others

• Seeing, hearing, and feeling things that other people do not see,






